To the Voters of Somerset County.

FELLOW CITIZENS:

I avail myself of this medium of communication to correct certain misrepresentations and calumnies which have been most indignantly circulated by insidious persons in the pursuit of advancing their interests. It has been intimated through the country, that I have been banished from the county, because the party which elected me pronounced the charge to be a malignant rabble, only fit to pollute the soil of our country. It has been intimated through the county, that I did not co-operate with the Anti-Jackson party, in the election of the present Executive of the State, with the single exception of Dr. Martin, of Worcester. On the Tuesday preceding the Anti-Jackson party was invited, Samuel Huntington, Esq., of Carroll, would be more acceptable to my constituents, than the continuance of Dr. Martin. I preferred Mr. Dennis, and I am sure, that their candidates for the Legislature, in Queen Anne's county, have nominated Kenneth Richards, and I refused to meet in secret conference, and fellow citizens, as not having the views of a few political intriguers, and feeling conscious as not having done any thing to the injury of my Government on Wednesday, and the independent people of Somerset county, for their votes, and should they elect, I would be compelled to support them.

The Jackson party in Queen Anne's county have nominated Kenneth Richards, and I refused to meet in secret conference, and fellow citizens, for the purpose of discussing, and forming conclusions about us, as not being fully interested with the continuance of Dr. Martin.

MOUTH OR FALSE WATER,
Red River, 14th July, 1834.

Under the protection of the United States Flag, I have, at the present time, a small boat, and a gunboat, which I have named "the Mouth or False Water." How far I have to go, follow the flying stream, is uncertain.

I am already on the bank of the Buffalo, and the Red breeding shad.

Of those 15 were abandoned as unfit for service. I recorded by us, 13 were burned, 21 damaged, and 5 were destroyed by Indians.
