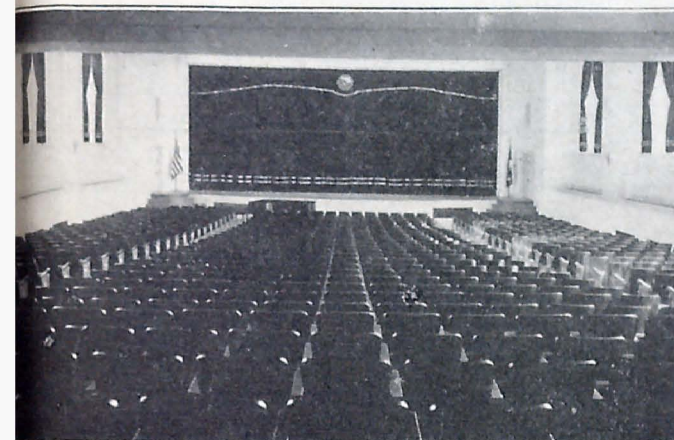

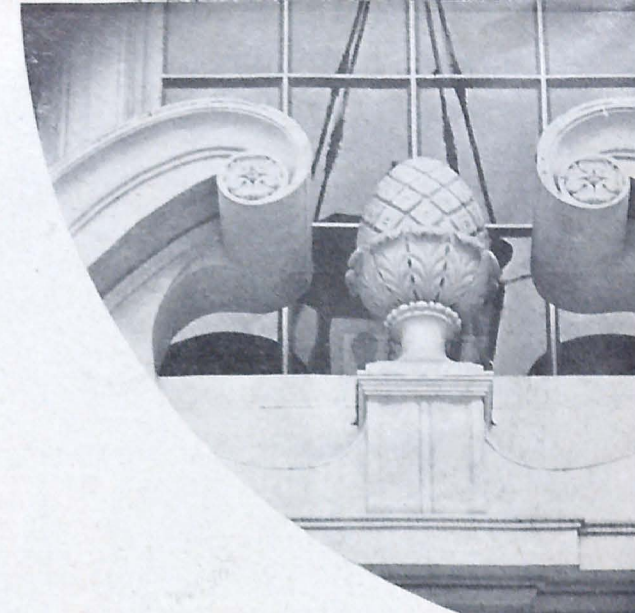

 - B. Students represent best Eastern Shore families.

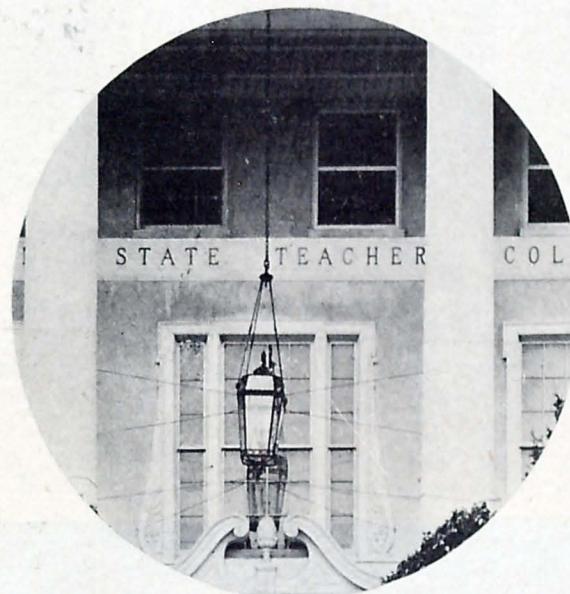
- IV. Curricula adapted to needs of most prospective college students.

LIGHT UNDER COLUMNS — MAIN ENTRANCE

- A. A four year curriculum leading to a B.S. degree in Education.
 1. Tuition for prospective elementary and junior high teachers eliminated.
 2. Proposed salaries of \$2,200 minimum and \$3,800 maximum to graduates.
- B. A two-year transfer curriculum.
 1. Satisfactory completion enables students to transfer with junior standing in Arts and Science, Dentistry, Education, Journalism, Law, Medicine and Veterinary Medicine.
 2. Students have transferred to Dickinson, Drexel, Haverford, Western Maryland, and Universities of Maryland, Virginia, Missouri, etc.
- C. One year transfer curricula in Business Administration.
 1. Agriculture, Business Administration, Home Economics, Industrial Arts and Nursing.
 2. Students have transferred with sophomore standing in each of the above listed fields.

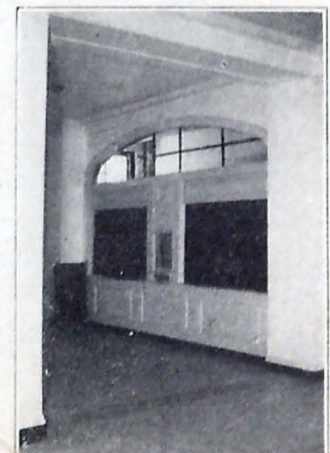


"GOOD CHEER" THE FIREPLACE

- D. A one semester Curriculum for nurses.
 1. In cooperation with Peninsula General Hospital.
 2. Includes courses in Anatomy, Micro-biology, General Chemistry, Massage, Psychology and Sociology.
- V. Activity program under direction of Student Government Association.
 - A. Athletic, Christian, Men's and Women's Day Associations.
 - B. Assembly, Camera, Chorus, Debate, Dramatic organizations, and Publications Staff.
- VI. A comparatively low annual cost per student.
 - A. Board and room -- \$216
 - B. Fees-activity and breakage ----- \$15
 - C. Textbooks, \$10 (minimum)
 - D. Tuition, required of transfer students, only, \$100

Total: For prospective teachers, \$241; transfer, \$341.
