## A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS I have received His Majesty's Proclamation of Peace, Given at St. James's the Twenty-first Day of March, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-three, in the Third Year of His Majesty's Reign, a Copy whereof is herewith annexed, as also a Letter from the Right Honourable the Earl of Egmont, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, signifying that it is His Majesty's Pleasure, I should cause the said Proclamation to be Published in all the proper Places under my Government:

I HAVE therefore thought fit, with the Advice of his Lordship's Council of State, to Publish this my Proclamation, notifying the same to all His Majesty's Subjects, and strictly charging and requiring the several Sheriffs of the respective Counties of this Province, at the most usual Public Places in their said Counties, as soon as conveniently may be, with all Solemnity possible to Publish the same; And I do hereby further will and require the several Sheriffs of this Province to give Notice to the Magistrates of their respective Counties as soon as possible, to meet and appoint a Day for Publishing His Majesty's said Proclamation. And I do hereby command the several Sheriffs, and all Others His Majesty's Officers both Civil and Military, as also the Militia in the respective Counties, to attend in the handsomest Manner, at the Time so appointed for performing the same.

GIVEN at the City of ANNAPOLIS, this Twenty-sixth Day of July, in the Thirtieth Year of His Majesty's Dominion, Annoque Domini 1763.

## A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS A Definitive Treaty of Peace and Friendship between Us, the Most Christian King, and the King of Spain, to which the King of Portugal hath acceded, hath been concluded at Paris, on the Tenth Day of February last, and the Ratifications thereof have been exchanged upon the Tenth Day of this Instant March: In Conformity thereto, We have thought fit hereby to command, That the same be published throughout all Our Dominions: And We do declare to all Our Loving Subjects Our Will and Pleasure, That the said Treaty of Peace and Friendship be observed inviolably, as well by Sea as Land, and in all Places whatsoever: Strictly charging and commanding all Our Loving Subjects to take Notice hereof, and to conform themselves thereto accordingly.

## A PROCLAMATION.

For a Day of PUBLIC THANKSGIVING.

WHEREAS Our Most Gracious SOVEREIGN, judging it proper that a PUBLIC THANKSGIVING to Almighty GOD, should be observed by all His good Subjects, throughout His extensive Dominions, for the Blessings of PEACE, between Great-Britain, France and Spain, lately restored, hath caused his Pleasure to be signified to me, by a Letter from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners for Trade and Plantations: In Obedience therefore to His Majesty's Commands, and that all His loyal and Good Subjects within this Province, may have an Opportunity of expressing, in a Public and Solemn Manner, their Thanks for the happy Conclusion of PEACE, between His Majesty Our Most Gracious SOVEREIGN, and the Most Christian and Catholic Kings, and of Adoring with humble and grateful Hearts, the Divine Goodness which maketh War to cease:

I DO, by the Advice of His Lordship's Council of State, appoint Tuesday the Twenty-third Day of August next, to be kept apart, and observed throughout this Province, as a Day of PUBLIC PRAISE and THANKSGIVING; and I do hereby recommend it to the several Ministers of the Gospel within this Province, to compose proper Addresses to the Divine Majesty, to be used in their respective Churches and Chapels on that Day, and likewise Sermons suitable to the Occasion; and I moreover require all such Ministers to Publish this my Proclamation in their several Congregations, during the Time of Divine Service, on the Sunday next preceding the said Day of Thanksgiving.

GIVEN at the City of ANNAPOLIS, this Twenty-sixth Day of July, in the Thirtieth Year of His Majesty's Dominion, Annoque Domini 1763.

GOD Save the KING.

CADIZ, April 25.

THEY write from Gibraltar, that some Difference has arisen between the English and the King of Morocco, and that the English Consul in Barbary had peremptorily left Tetuan, the Place of his usual Residence. It is said that the Ground of these Broils, is a Complaint made by Admiral Saunders to his Britannic Majesty, of the little Respect paid by the Moors to the English Flag, and their refusing to supply Gibraltar with Provisions under double Price.

Amsterdam, April 22. The different Colleges of the Admiralty seem to be busy in taking all necessary Precautions to put our Marine in a Condition to protect our Trade, in Case, as there is room to fear, we should come to an open Rupture with the Algerines.

The College of the Admiralty of Amsterdam have come to a Resolution to smother their Ships, bound to the West-Indies, with Copper and Brass. It is said that this Hint was taken from King James II. of England, who understood naval Affairs very well. Had the English taken this Method of Sheathing, they would have saved those Ships which, in Consequence of their being eat by the Worms, were either lost or much damaged, in their Return from the Havannah.

Leghorn, April 26. A Genoese Privateer took out of a neutral Vessel a famous Corsican Sea Captain, and sent him to Bastia, where, it is said, he was hanged. In return for which General Paoli made three Genoese Gentlemen, who were his Prisoners, draw Lots, and he on whom the Lot fell was put to Death.

Alger, March 1. The Bashaw of this City having some Time ago disbanded 400 Men of his Cavalry, these Fellows, being destitute of Employment and Resources, ranged about the Country, and committed Outrages of every Kind; and this City was so terrified by them, that the Inhabitants durst not venture out of the Gates. One of their Exploits was in a Village at Sphiri, at the Entrance of a Desert six Leagues from this City, where they massacred all the Men, ravished the Females, set Fire to the Place, and then went to burn another adjacent Village. The Bashaw being sensible that nothing but Force could put a Stop to their Proceedings, he sent a Body of Troops against them, headed by the Kiaya, who was seconded by several Agas. The Rioters had been joined by about 400 other Banditti, and fenced themselves in a Village within eight Leagues of this City. The Kiaya surrounded the Village; but the Mutineers sallied out, and fell so impetuously on the Kiaya's Troops, that they would certainly have routed them, if a Reinforcement of 150 Men had not opportunely arrived, who attacked the Rebels in Flank, and drove them back into the Village. The latter having spent all their Powder and Shot, were obliged to abandon their Post, and ran away in Disorder; only 16 of them could be seized, whom the Kiaya put to Death on the Spot, and their Heads were fixed upon Stakes before the Bashaw's House. It is said that the Rebels have fled into the Mountains of the Kudes; but we are not yet quite easy about them, as there is room to fear they will return and ravage the open Country.

We have Advice from Bagdad, that Tranquillity is actually restored there by the Defeat of Solymán Bashaw of Karacholan, who had advanced with a Body of Ten or Twelve Thousand Men to within three Days March of Bagdad. The Bashaw of that City went out to meet him with a Force nearly equal, defeated him, and obliged him to fly to the Mountains for Safety.

LONDON, May 3.

We hear that the Directors of the East India Company have ordered the Payment of a certain Annuity of 27,000 l. to be kept, till the Share of the Indemnification granted by the Nabob to the Heirs of the unhappy Persons who perished in the Black Hole at Calcutta be accounted for; it is also said that the Trade of Country credit by that Nabob to the East India Company, proves much less valuable than was expected.

They write from Bayonne, that there arrived that Morning in the Harbour five Rafts or Floats of Masts, brought down the Garve (which has lately been rendered navigable for the Space of four and twenty Leagues) from the Forest in the Valley of Aspe in Bearn, where 6000 Trees have been felled, cut out into different Sorts of Ship-Timber, all which are to be successively brought down by this new Navigation. The five Floats above-mentioned, being the first that ever were brought this Way, were received in the Port under a Discharge of the Cannon of the City and Citadel, amidst the Acclamations of all the Inhabitants.

On Thursday Evening the East India House was finely illuminated on Account of the Thanksgiving Day for the Peace. A double Watch was placed to prevent any Mischief which might happen from the Crowds of People which assembled there to see it.

Letters from Berlin of the 23d ult. say, that his Prussian Majesty had had a Fit of the Gout upon him for some Days.

The Three great Objects of that King's Attention for the future (according to the same Letters) will be Agriculture, Commerce, and Population.

May 10. It is said, that on searching Precedents for many Years back, it does not appear that a Habeas Corpus was ever applied for in the Court of Common Pleas before those lately for Mr. Wilkes.

Col. Coote and Col. Callan are arrived from the East Indies, and declare that the Company's Affairs were never in a happier State than at the Time they came away.

Yesterday's night being a grand Festival at Court, a Lady in St. James's Chapel, having a Desire to see the Royal Family, attended the People as soon as the Preacher had left it, and continued there during the Anthem.

May 11. At Newcastle, on the Day of Thanksgiving for the Peace, a Fountain was erected that ran with Wine, from whence the King's Health was drank under a triple Discharge of Fire-Arms, by a Company of the Scotch Fusiliers.

May 12. Letters from Amsterdam mention an Account received there from the East Indies, of the debarking 3000 Dutch Troops on the Island of Ceylon, by which Force they have not only raised the Siege of Colombo, but obliged the King of Candia to take Shelter in one of his own Fortresses, in a Sally from which he was taken Prisoner; which Advantage they hoped would be followed by an entire Reduction of the whole Island.

May 19. It is reported, that a Bill of Indictment will be preferred to the Grand Jury this Session against Mr. Wilkes, and the other Parties supposed to be concerned in publishing the North-Briton of the 23d of April last.

His Majesty has been pleased to appoint Major General John Stanwix, to be Lieutenant Governor of the Isle of Wight [in the room of the late Earl of Portsmouth.]

The Republic of Genoa continues to solicit for a Body of Austrian Forces to reduce the Corsicans; but it is imagined they will not succeed, as the Pope's Nuncio, by his Master's express Orders, opposes her Demand.

May 21. Every Englishman will hear with Pleasure of the Edict of the French King, that was carried to the Parliament on the 4th, which will give such a Blow to the Credit of France, by the King's arbitrarily declaring, that all Rents due by him should be redeemable at Twenty Years Purchase of their present Produce. This is exactly the same Thing as if the English Government, at the Time when they gave about Five per Cent for Money, be paid off with 60 l. for every 100 l. that they lent to the Public.

It is said, that the Right Hon. the Earl of Hardwick will shortly be appointed Lord President of the Council, in the Room of the late Earl Granville.

A Commission is passing the Seals for constituting and appointing their Royal Highnesses the Dukes of York and Cumberland, their Graces the Archbishop of Canterbury and York, the Right Hon. the Lord Chancellor, and his Grace the Duke of Marlborough, Commissioners for carrying into Execution the original Plan for completing the Royal Hospital at Greenwich.

All the Cannon taken by the English Troops from the French during the Course of the War in Germany (some of which are very curious) have been embarked at Bremen for England.

NEW LONDON, July 1.

In Capt. Brown late from the West-Indies, came Passenger Daniel Woodhouse of Wethersfield, who on his Passage, being aloft, and standing on the Gaft, the Vessel took a roll, at which Time his Leg accidentally slipped between the Gaft and the Mast, by which Means his Leg was directly broke; it being perceived by those below they advised him to keep his Hold till they came to his Relief, but immediately falling into a Swoon he fell head foremost, and about 10 Feet before he came to the Deck one of his Arms struck in the Rattings, by which Means he came on his Feet upon the Deck, and it is said the Stump of the Bone that was broke stuck so far into the Deck that they were obliged to cut it out. After 28 Days the Vessel arrived at this Place, when Application was immediately made to Dr. Marsh, who upon Examination found not only his Leg broke, but one Elbow much dislocated, which Mr. Marsh immediately reduced, and soon after proceeded to amputate the broken Limb, just below the Joint, all which was performed with surprising Dispatch and Activity, and 'tis said the Man is like soon to recover beyond the Expectation of the most experienced Surgeons.

PHILADELPHIA, July 28.

Our Advice from Carlisle, are as follows, viz. That the Party under the Sheriff, Mr. Dunning (mentioned in our last, fell in with the Enemy, at the House of one Alexander Logan, in Shearman's Valley, supposed to be about Fifteen, or upwards, who had murdered the said Logan, his Son, and another Man, about two Miles from said House, and mortally wounded a Fourth, who is since dead; and that at the Time of their being discovered they were rising the House, and shooting down the Cattle, and it is thought, about to return home with the Spoil they had got.—That our Men, on seeing them, immediately spread themselves from Right to Left, with a Design to surround them, and engaged the Savages with great Courage, but from their Eagerness, rather too soon, as some of the Party had not got up when the Skirmish began: That the Enemy returned our first Fire very briskly; but our People, regardless of that, rushed upon them, when they fled, and were pursued a considerable Way, till Thickets secured their Escape, four or five of them, it was thought, being mortally wounded: That our Parties had brought in with them what Cattle they could collect, but that great Numbers were killed by the Indians, and many of the Horses, that were in the Valley, carried off: That on the Twenty-first, in the Morning, News was brought of three Indians being seen about 3 Miles from Shippenburgh: That on the Twenty-second, about Ten o'Clock in the Morning, one Pummery, and his Wife, and the Wife of one Johnston, were surprised in a House, between Shippenburgh and the North Mountain, and left there for dead; but that one of the Women, when found, showing some Signs of Life, was brought to Shippenburgh, where she lived some Hours in a most miserable Condition, being scalped, one of her Arms broke, and her Skull cracked with the Stroke of a Tomahawk: And that, since the Tenth Instant, there was an Account of Fifty-four Persons being killed by the Enemy.

There are many Letters in Town, in which the Distress of the Frontier Inhabitants are set forth in a most moving and striking Manner; but as these Letters are pretty much the same, and it would be tedious to insert the whole, the following is the Substance of some of them, as near as we can recollect.

That the Indians had set Fire to Houses, Dutch, German, and, in short, to every Thing that was combustible; so that the whole Country seemed to be in one general Blaze.



That the Miseries and Distresses of the poor People were really shocking to Humanity, and beyond the Power of Language to describe. That Carlisle was become the Barrier, not a single Inhabitant being beyond it. That every Stable and Hovel in the Town was crowded with miserable Refugees, who were reduced to a State of Beggary and Despair; their Houses, Cattle and Harvest destroyed; and from a plentiful, independent People, they were become real Objects of Charity and Commiseration. That it was most dismal to see the Streets filled with People, in whose Countenances might be discovered a Mixture of Grief, Madness and Despair; and to hear, now and then, the Sighs and Groans of Men; the disconsolate Lamentations of Women; and the Screams of Children, who had lost their nearest and dearest Relatives: And that on both Sides of the Sasquehanna, for some Miles, the Woods were filled with poor Families, and their Cattle, who make Fires, and live like the Savages."

A Gentleman, from Carlisle, informs us, that in a Letter from Augusta County, in Virginia, dated the 16th Instant, it is said, That the Settlements of Green Briar, and Jackson's River, in that Colony, were cut off by the Indians, a few of the Inhabitants only escaping: And that in another Letter from Virginia, Mention was made of a prodigious Extent of Country being entirely evacuated by our People.

By Captain Hasleton, who left Martinico the 28th ult. we are informed, that the Night before he sailed, a Man of War Snow (but no Transports) arrived there from England, with Orders to deliver up that Place to the French; and that the English were to go to Dominico till Vessels should arrive, or others could be got, to carry them home.

And by Captain Patterson, from the Havannah, there is Advice, that that Place was delivered up to the Spaniards on the 6th Instant.

#### ANNAPOLIS, August 4.

Monday last his Majesty's Proclamation of Peace, was published here by the Sheriff of the City. About XII o'Clock, his Excellency the Governor, attended by the Gentlemen of the Corporation, Magistrates, Clergy, Gentlemen of the Army, and Others, walk'd from his Excellency's House, to the Council House; and was receiv'd in the Parade by the City Militia, who made a handsome Appearance on the Occasion: After the Proclamation was Read, they went thro' their Firings, and the Great Guns were Discharged, the Loyal Healths Drank, &c. &c.

Tuesday last we had here a great deal of Thunder, both Forenoon and Afternoon, and very heavy Showers of Rain: In the Afternoon, for about a Minute, large Hail, or Pieces of Ice, fell with the Rain, by which some Windows in Town were broke; but as it did not fall very obliquely, we don't learn that much Damage was done by it in Town. Some of the Hail Stones which fell at the Printing-Office Door, measured upwards of an Inch and Three-quarters in Length.

On Saturday last one of the Ferry-men at Patapsco, as he was Rowing at the Bow Oar, (being somewhat Muddled), fell overboard and was Drowned.

"The Governor complains grievously at the manner in which he behaved extremely ill. Some Creole Slaves who escape to Demerara say, if the White People had made a Slave Affair would not have come to that Extremity. The Creole Negroes knew nothing of the Plot. Our People have had several Skirmishes with them, in which the Rebels have been obliged to retreat with Loss. The Governor had likewise received a Reinforcement of 300 Men from St. Eustatia. It was agreed to make a general Attack on the Rebels the 6th of May. By our not hearing from him, I am afraid the Rebels have retreated to Corentyne, or thereabouts, without effecting any Land Communication. We have detached



Companies of Regulars, under Command of a Major, to our Frontiers, to repel the Rebels from thence, in case they should nestle that Way.

By the lucky Arrival of a Sloop of War, and two other Vessels from Barbados, with a Party of Marines, in Demerara, they were enabled to prevent any Insurrection both in Demerara and Essequibo. Two Plantations had revolted; but were retaken, and the Ringleaders punished. If those two Colonies had also made a Resistance, we should soon have played the third and last Act. You easily will judge the dangerous Example it is to our Slaves, already too prone to revolt; if the most vigorous Methods are not pursued at Home to crush this Insurrection, and preventing those Rebels from settling or nestling in the very Bosom of all our Colonies, I am afraid we shall, in a few Years, be without any on this Continent. *I am, &c.*

#### PHILADELPHIA, August 4.

On Sunday last Sermons were preached in most of the Congregations of this City, in Favour of the distressed Back Inhabitants, and Collections are now making for them from House to House.

*Our Accounts from the Westward are as follow:*

*Lancaster, July 28.* There are certain Accounts that Indians have passed the South Mountain, and gone into York County; and that some of them have assuredly been seen near Carlisle. The Wants of the distressed Refugees have been greatly relieved, by Sums of Money collected in the different Congregations in this County. The Quakers and Menonists have been very liberal on this Occasion, having raised a considerable Sum, and hired Men to assist the poor People in gathering in as much of their Harvest as possible. And we are told, that several large Parties have again attempted to go over the Mountains, for this necessary and laudable Purpose; but the Risk they run is so great, that we cannot think of them without Dread.

*Carlisle, July 25.* Two Indians were seen at Cannedogwynnah-Creek, about four Miles from Shippensburg, on Thursday or Friday last, who attempted taking the Man that saw them, but he escaped. The People of Shearman's Valley are to go over this Day, and endeavour to save some of their Harvest. They write from Virginia, that great Numbers of People are reduced to the utmost Distress by the Savages; but that several Parties of them had been repulsed by our Men, who had taken to the Forts.

*July 30.* On the 25th a considerable Number of the Inhabitants of Shearman's Valley went over (with a Party of Soldiers to guard them) to attempt saving as much of their Grain as might be standing, and it is hoped a considerable Quantity will yet be preserved. A Party of Volunteers, between Twenty and Thirty, went to the farther Side of the Valley, next the Tuscarora Mountain, to see what Appearance there might be of Indians, as it was thought they would most probably be there, if any where in the Settlement; to search for, and bury, the Dead at Buffalo-Creek; and to assist the Inhabitants that lived along, or near, the Foot of the Mountain, in bringing off what they could; which Services they accordingly performed, burying the Remains of three Persons; but saw no Marks of Indians having lately been there, excepting one Track, supposed about two or three Days old, near the Narrows of Buffalo-Creek Hill; and heard some Hallooing, and firing of a Gun at another Place. A Number of the Inhabitants of Tuscarora Valley go over Tomorrow, with a Party of Soldiers, to endeavour to save Part of the Crops. Five Indians were seen last Sunday, about 16 or 17 Miles from this Place, up the Valley, towards the North Mountain; and two the Day before Yesterday, about five or six Miles from Shippensburg, who fired at a young Man, but missed him. The eight Companies allowed for the Defence of this Frontier, are now very near, if not quite, compleat.

On the 25th of July there were in Shippensburg 1384 of our poor distressed Back Inhabitants, viz. Men 301; Women 345; Children 738; many of whom were obliged to lie in Barns, Stables, Cellars, and under old leaky Sheds, the Dwelling-houses being all crowded.

From Fort Bedford we learn, that Colonel Bocket, with the Army under his Command, were well at that Place the 27th ult. having met with no Interruption from the Enemy; and that he was to proceed on his March the next Day. That no Mischief had been done in that Neighbourhood for three Weeks; and that the Number in all killed thereabouts is fifteen: But they had received Advice there from Fort Cumberland, that on Sunday, the 24th of last Month, a Number of Peo-

ple were assembled at a Place of Worship, at The Calf Pasture, in Augusta County, Virginia, they were attacked by a Party of Indians, who killed Twenty or upwards, of them.

#### ANNAPOLIS, August 11.

On Monday last Week, as Thomas Mulliken was riding the Road in Prince-George's County, near the Western Branch, he got a fall from his Horse, which kill'd him.

Yesterday Morning, about Day-break, a large Barn belonging to Mr. David Evans, near the Head of South-River, wherein was a Quantity of Wheat, Rye, and Tobacco, was discovered to be on Fire, and was burnt to the Ground. How the Fire happened is not yet discovered; but is supposed to have been done wilfully.

P A R I S, May 20.

**T**HE King has expressed great Satisfaction at the Success of the Project of the Canal of Bayonne. 'Tis to the Duke de Choiseul that we shall be indebted for it, as also for several other Schemes relative to the Marine, which ere long, will be as respectable as it is in the Beginning of the War.

June 3. It is reported that one Mr. Stewart, an English Gentleman, has purchased from Father Lavallette, who had powers for that Effect from the General of the Jesuits, all the Plantations and Buildings belonging to the Jesuits on the Island of Dominico, lately ceded to the English, for which he is to give 75,000 l. Sterling; and that Mr. Stewart is to come to Paris to know from the Creditors of the Jesuits, whether he can pay the Money with Safety.

Amsterdam, May 23. We just now learn, that four French Men of War, the Count d'Argenson, the Vertue, and the Marse, put into Batavia in July last, and sailed in October. It is said that they have taken the Fox English East-Indiaman, homeward bound from Comorand, richly laden.

Calcutta, May 3. Notwithstanding several Ships arrived last Week with Wheat, that Commodity still bears a very high Price, on Account of the great Drought which we have had in some Time past, and which makes us apprehensive of a dear Harvest.

Yeni, May 3. Just as our Armament was ready to sail, the Commodore's Ship, which carried 40 Guns, and 500 Men, overtook by a Squall of Wind. All the Crew perished, except the Captain, who was on Shore, and 43 Sailors, who were taken up by a French Ship. This Accident, however, did not hinder the Armament, which consists of three Corvettes, from putting to Sea.

L O N D O N, May 20.

The King has been graciously pleased to issue his Proclamation for pardoning and discharging Soldiers now in Custody on Detention.

His Majesty has been pleased to make a Present of his Ring, richly set with Diamonds, to the Duke de Nivernois, his most Christian Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary, who set out on his Return to Paris, last Monday Morning.

By a Letter received yesterday from Durham, there is Advice, that the Earl of Bute passed through that City the 17th inst., on his Way to his Seat in Scotland.

May 24. We hear Mr. WILKES has borrowed Printing Types, and a Printing Press, which was set up last Week, in a House, in Great George-street, Westminster: And yesterday appeared, dated from that Street, May 23, 1763, a Prospect for Printing by Subscription, in Royal Quarto, The Proceedings of the Administration, with all the original Papers touching the Case of John Wilkes, Esq; Member of Parliament for Aylesbury, in Bucks; with constitutional Remarks, by Mr. Wilkes. Price one Guinea, to be paid at the Time of Subscribing.

We hear that at a late Borough Election, the Coach of a successful Candidate had these Words written on it in Gold, Liberty, Property, no Excise, and ready Money.

They write from Paris that, by Order of the Parliament, public Notice had been given from all the Pulpits, that on the 19th of June will be Sold, with full Security to the purchaser, all the Houses in that City, Mont Louis, Mont de Mars, and Gentilly, which lately belonged to the Jesuits.

It is said, that on Monday Morning, at six o'Clock, a Fight was fought on Hounslow-Heath, between an Officer belonging to Col. Pettitot's Regiment, and another of Lord Murray's Regiment of Highlanders, occasioned by a Difference concerning the present State of national Affairs. The combatants were attended by three two Seconds, and Serjeants; when the Highland Officer fired his Pistol upon the other, and the other, with equal Gallantry, discharged into the Air: They then drew their Swords, and approached each other with great Bravery; and at the first Attack the latter ran his Sword through the Highland Captain's Breast and Side, but missed his Body; at the Second, the Highlander ran his Antagonist through the Sword Arm, and notwithstanding continued the Fight; at the Third, the wounded Officer received a second Wound in his Side; the Fourth, another in his Breast; on which the Highlander told him, he would run him, the next Time, through the Body, unless he yielded; the other being weak with the loss of Blood, acknowledged his Generosity, and shook hands with him; after which they parted.

We are told from Magdebourg, that the King of Prussia's demand upon the Court of Great-Britain, in Relation to the sending and Quartering of British Troops at Embden, is at length amicably adjusted, to the Satisfaction of both Courts.

May 31. We are assured that in a Conversation, a great Personage lately declared, I am a Friend to Freedom, from Slavery, and will ever protect even the meanest of my Subjects in their Rights and Liberties: But I am determined not to be an Idiot, with Impunity, though it were offered to me on the Grate.

June 7. The Countess of Leicester Packet, which failed some Time ago from Falmouth for Corunna in Spain, was used Admittance into that Port; which occasioned much Contention this Day upon Change.

June 11. On Saturday the Right Hon. the Earl Temple came to Court, to pay his Compliments to his Majesty.

A Gentleman lately arrived from Dunkirk, we are advised, that all the Fortifications towards the Sea have been demolished, by Direction of the English Engineers, according to the late Treaty of Peace.

A new Treaty of Commerce is said to be nearly concluded between our Court and that of Russia.

We hear that a certain intended Prosecution against a famous Gentleman is now entirely dropped; and it is hoped all will be compromised, to the Satisfaction of all Parties.

There is said to be a great Coolness between the Courts of Vienna and Versailles.

We hear that his Royal Highness the Duke of York will shortly make the Tour of Europe, under his Title of Earl of Ulster.

The King of Spain has come to a Resolution to confiscate all Merchandise of the Produce of Spanish America, imported into Spain, in any other than Spanish Bottoms. This Order extends to Tobacco, Cocoa, and other Commodities, which have hitherto been free. And he will not permit, for the Future, the Oporto Mails to pass through his Kingdom.

Letters from Madrid say, that as the English, since the Conclusion of the Peace, had fished on certain Parts of the Spanish Coast, from which they were excluded by Treaty; it was expected that the Catholic King would prefer a Complaint on this Head to the British Court.

We hear that the Ministry will be entirely changed, and in Consequence the Cyder Act repealed.

June 16. They write from Hanover, that in the Beginning of May, a French Engineer came to an Inn at Lutterberg, in that Electorate, where he had lodged some Years ago, when the French had Possession of the Village; and being made very welcome, for he had paid generously for every Thing during his former Visit, he asked the Innkeeper's Leave to employ two Peasants to dig up some Effects which he had buried at the Bottom of the Garden. These proved to be several Bags of Gold and Silver French Coin; with which the Frenchman set out immediately for Frankfort, after giving each of the Peasants about 5s. Sterling, and making a Present of the same Sum to the Landlord; who, nevertheless, looked very filly on losing such a Booty, which had been so long in his Power.

Captain Smith, who received the Prince of Wales a few Days ago from the Coach, when the Horse plunged, has, we are informed, been rewarded with 300 a Year, for his great Care and Tenderness on that Occasion.

By a Letter from Lisbon, there is an Account, that the Lord Clive and Ambuscade Privateers have taken two South-Sea Ships, very richly laden.

June 17. Yesterday 18 Special Juries were moved for at Westminster, by the Defendants in the several Prosecutions now carrying on by Mr. Wilkes, five by Mr. Serjeant Hewitt, five by Mr. Serjeant Davy, four by Mr. Serjeant Wiltaker, and four by Mr. Serjeant Nares, 16 of these Causes are to be tried in the City of London, and two in Westminster, but what the Issue is likely to be, we must by no Means presume to determine.

The Trial of John Wilkes, Esq; that was expected to come on this Day at the King's Bench, is said to be put off till Michaelmas Term.

The Freedom of the Press, that is, of printing, writing, and speaking, is not only the Birthright of Englishmen, but also of Use to those in Power, since it gives them Notice of the Cause of Discontent, before they can be united into Opposition; and will discover Opposition before it becomes Disaffection.

Letters from Germany of the 30th ult. advise, that on the 28th ult. two regular Regiments, four Battalions of Militia, and 500 Dragoons and Hussars of Hesse Darmstadt Troops, with 30 Pieces of Cannon, arrived at Witzlar, and seized on the Gates, and posted them throughout that City, and forced open the Doors of the Burgomaster, and 16 Aldermen, and some other substantial Citizens Houses, and put the Masters of the Houses under an Arrest, and suffered no Person whatever to stir out of the Gates, which caused the greatest Confusion among the Inhabitants. The chief Reason of this Disturbance proceeds from an Affront given to these Troops, when 600 Men of the Allied Army passed through that Place, soon after the late Peace, under an Escort of some of that City's Soldiers, conducted by several of the Citizens, by whom the Commander in Chief of the Darmstadt Troops, whom the Landgrave of Hesse Darmstadt demands Satisfaction, but has been denied, and the Affairs of the Imperial Chamber were assembled all that Day, who were of Opinion that their Dignity was grossly insulted by these Proceedings, the Issue of which was variously talked of.

The Carpoes of the Fox and Godolphin East-Indiamen are rich with Piece Goods, with 1,204,900 lb. of Saltpetre, and about 2,000,000 Pagodas Worth of Diamonds.

They write from Paris, that the most Christian King has made her Grace the Duchess of Bedford a Present of a Service of Sevres Porcelaine, valued at 17,000 Livres, [about 750 Pounds Sterling.]

A Gentleman just arrived from Dunkirk relates, that there are daily employed in blowing up and destroying the Fortifications of that Place upwards of 2000 Men; that last Tuesday Morning, which was the Day he failed from Dunkirk, the Workmen had begun to blow up a fine Bastion, which was 20 Feet deep, and able to contain 200 Sail of large Ships.

NEW-YORK, August 1.

Friday last, his Majesty's Ship the Dublin, of 74 Guns, Capt. Gascoigne, arrived off the Hook, from the Havannah, and brought under Convoy the following Transport Ships, having on board the 15th, 27th, 28th, 40th and 46th Regiments; viz. the Fraternity, Fox; Felicity, McCrane; Minerva, Lawson; Ward, Holdby; King George, Thompson; and the Amity's Benediction, Herbert. They left the Havannah the 9th of July, with all the Fleet of English Men of War, Transports and Garrison that were there (the Citadel being given up to the Spaniards on the 6th of July) except the Cerberus Man of War, who was left to

give proper Intelligence to English Vessels as they arrived, every one being obliged to stay 15 Days, after they arrive in the Harbour, before they are allowed to depart. Two Days after the Fleet sailed, they were overtaken by the Swift Snow of War, in Lat. 31:29, a Dispatch Vessel from England, who first anchored off the Moro Castle, when finding Admiral Kepple gone, she instantly pursued. The Admiral left the Fleet, the 18th in his own Ship, with one Frigate only, for Jamaica. And after the above mentioned Regiments were dispatched hither out of the Fleet, the rest proceeded for England.

The First Battalion of the Royal Scotch, with the 48th and 56th, are gone to Ireland; the 9th and 35th to Auguftine; the 22d and 34th to Mississippi and Pensacola; and we hear the 3d Battalion of the Royal Americans, that had sailed for Mississippi, is expected here.

We hear, That the Detachment of the 17th Regiment, which marched from Albany the 22d of June to assist at d'Etroit, were safe arrived at Niagara; but that they had met with a Skirmish, of which 'tis said they had the Advantage considerably. [This Party was reported to be commanded by Major Rogers; but it appears since to be under the Command of a Captain belonging to the Regulars.]

NEW-YORK, August 4.

Since our last, Advice have been received from the Detroit of the 8th of July, and the following may be depended on as authentic.

"The good Conduct of Major Gladwin, who commands at the Detroit, seconded by the spirited Behaviour of his whole Garrison, having baffled all the Schemes of the Indians, even before any Reinforcements arrived, the Savages, seemed to sicken of their Attempts, and some had threatened to leave the others, and go home, when the Letters came away; but those Letters discovered such a continued Scene of Butcheries committed by the inhuman Villains, as sagger Credibility, and are shocking to human Nature.

"It appears that the Savages massacred all the Men of Lieut. Cuyler's Party, who fell into their Hands, on their Way to the Detroit, excepting three Men, who had Resolution enough, when they came within Sight of Detroit, to attack the Indians who were guarding them in the Boat; threw the Boats overboard, and got safe into the Fort.

"The Posts at Sandusky, Miami, Michillimackinac, Ontonagon, and St. Joseph, are all cut off by Treachery, chiefly owing to the Savages having taken the Opportunity of securing the Commanding Officers, when treating with them as Friends. The whole Garrison of Sandusky (excepting Ensign Pauli, the Commanding Officer, who made his Escape, and got safe into Detroit) with all the Traders who were there, fell by the Hands of the Savages: The same Fate attended Ensign Holmes, at the Miami, who was betrayed by a Squaw, that begged him to go 200 Yards to bleed one that was dying, when he was shot by Indians, who lay in wait for him. The Commanding Officer at Michillimackinac is Prisoner; but too many of his Garrison have suffered: All the Goods at those Places have fallen into the Hands of the Indians; several of the Traders massacred, Ensign Schloffer, who commanded at St. Joseph, got safe into the Detroit, but the Villains, who came as Friends, and plundered the Fort. Man of the Garrison, excepting three, and plundered the Fort. Lieut. Jenkins, who commanded at Ontonagon, is carried to the Illinois; and it is feared his Garrison have met with no better Treatment than the others.—Ensign Christie, who commanded at Presque-Ile, and who was said to be killed, was carried by the Savages, with Part of his Garrison, to the Detroit.

"On the 30th of June, the Schooner arrived from Niagara, with a Reinforcement of Men, and a Fresh Supply of Ammunition and Provisions. And on the 4th of July, Major Gladwin sent out a Party, who attacked some Indians, killed Three (one of whom was a Chief) and pursued them for some Distance; but soon after he had the Mortification to learn that the Villains had butchered Capt. Campbell, in the most shocking Manner: This Officer had been detained ever since he went out to treat with them; and there cannot be a stronger Proof of the Ingratitude of that brutal Race than in this Instance; for while Capt. Campbell commanded at the Detroit, he was remarkably hospitable to the several Tribes of Indians who came to that Post; and made it his constant Study to befriend them. The other Officer who accompanied Capt. Campbell, had the good Fortune to make his Escape, and was safe in the Fort, when the Letters came away.

"The Measures now taking, will, we flatter ourselves, soon relieve the distressed Inhabitants on our back Settlements; for we are well assured that very formidable Reinforcements are on their Way to the upper Country, which will be employed not only in securing the several Posts for the future, but in taking such Revenge for the Butcheries committed by the Barbarians as shall be a LASTING MONUMENT of the Wrath of INJURED BRITONS, and be sufficient to deter the BRANTS from ever attempting the like hereafter.

PHILADELPHIA, AUGUST 11.

Extract of a Letter from Niagara, July 21, 1763.

"By Letters from Detroit, of the 18th Instant, we learn that the Savages were in greater Numbers than ever about that Place: That the Garrison was in high Spirits, and had made a Sortie, in which an Indian Chief, and two others, were killed; on which the Father of the former took out Capt. Campbell, of the 60th Regiment, and after having given him Time to say (on Condition he kept on his knees)



Body of the Main Chief) they killed him, taking his Heart, and eating it reeking from the Body, and then cut him to Pieces with their Tomahawks.—Sir Robert Davers they killed and eat; and an Officer who was taken at Sandusky, but since escaped, saw the Skin of Lieutenant Robertson's Arm made into a Tobacco Pouch; he belonged to Montgomery's Regiment, and commanded the Vessels on Lake Erie.—One Nation of the Indians (who took Presque-Isle after a three Days Attack, the Garrison then being out of Ammunition) have brought in their Prisoners, made Peace, and retired to their Habitations.—All the Out-posts are taken and destroyed, mostly by Surprise; but as an Officer, and eighteen Men, was the Number of each of those Posts but one, and all in Want of Provisions, a Charles of Sweden could not have saved them.—They took Michillimackinac by having two Parties of Indians playing with a Ball; one Party driving it to, the other from, the Fort; the Cheat succeeded, and having drove the Ball into the Fort, they ran in after it, without Opposition, and massacred most of the Garrison, saving few besides Capt. Ethrington, and Lieut. Leslie, of the 60th Regiment, they being the only Officers there; had that not happened, they must have been starved out; and it is feared they are not now living, as they were in the Hands of the most barbarous Nation. The Names of the destroyed Places are, Ouatinnon, St. Joseph's, St. Mary's, Meiamis, Michillimackinac, Sandusky, and Presque-Isle. It is not known whether Le Baye is destroyed or not.—The Vessels on Lake Erie have been the Means of saving Detroit, with the gallant Behaviour of Major Gladwin, the Commandant, who was almost single in his Opinion of maintaining the Place.—When the Schooner returned from Niagara, with a Reinforcement of Men and Ammunition, she was attacked in the River of Detroit by the Savages, who had entrenched themselves; but on the Firing of six or seven Guns, they abandoned their Works, and the Vessel got in. They sent down Fire Rafts to burn the Vessels, and, by their whole Proceedings, it may be presumed they were assisted by some of the French Inhabitants. However, since the Reinforcement arrived, the French have acted more for the English, having heard the Proclamation of Peace; and as Capt. Dalsell, and Major Rogers, with near 300 brave Fellows, left this fourteen Days ago, it is hoped they will be confirmed in their Faith to our glorious King; especially as from the Excellence of the Officers and Men gone there, every Thing that Conduct and Courage can effect may be expected; and now the same Schooner is leaving the Mouth of Lake Erie for Detroit, with about 40 Men, Ammunition and Provision.—The Indians have been before Detroit ever since the Sixth of May, to the Time the Schooner left it last; during which Time every One has lain on the Ramparts, nor have they had their Clothes off.

"Since writing the above, an Express has arrived from Capt. Dalsell, with an Account, that as he had discovered very large Indian Encampments, he thought it most advisable to wait till the Vessel arrives to convey him; a Method that will be of the greatest Service to him, as thereby he will effectually secure his Passage up the River of Detroit, which is not so wide, but that the Savages might do Execution on naked Boats, from each Side of it. He has also with him an Officer, and some Men, of the Artillery, with Swivels, and Cohorn Mortars, fixed on a strong Boat in such a Manner, that they will be of the greatest Service, in driving the Enemy from the opposite Shores of the River.

"These Extracts I have made from the best Accounts from Detroit, and you may depend upon their Authenticity. "I must beg Leave also to inform you, that the good Behaviour of Captain Hopkins, and the Officers and Men under his Command, in the Sally they made, to level an Entrenchment the Enemy had made too near the Fort, has greatly contributed to strike a Panic in the Hearts of those Copper headed Gentry. Several Merchants were in the Sortie, and fought like Men who had their All at Stake, as well as the Interest of their Country.

"The Fort is nothing more than a square Stockade, fortified with four Bastions, and large enough to hold 3000 Troops, and in which all the English Merchants have chiefly resided with their Effects.

At the Beginning of this Affair, there were not above Eighty Men that carried Arms in the Fort, and about Thirty-four on board both Vessels. The Vessels enfiladed three Sides of the Square towards the Fields and River, and the Men defended the other Polygon. The Savages were always in great Fear of the Vessels, and when they saw them beat to Windward, thought they did it by the Power of Conjunction. Captain Hopkins, since their investing the Place, failed up in the Sloop, towards an Island, above the Town, and fired several Shot at them, on which they scampered off, with their Effects, as fast as possible.

"Many of the Traders taken going to Detroit are Prisoners, and will, when Affairs are settled, be released from the Hands of those merciless Barbarians. "Three Men, who were taken in Lieutenant Cuyler's Affair, of May 23, being in one of their own Batteries, and going up the River with two Indians, and the Provision taken in her, seeing the Sloop cruising in the River, laid Host of the Savages, and flung them overboard; and, notwithstanding there were above Fifty Indians on Shore, that kept a constant Fire on them, they arrived safe at the Vessel; a living Monument, That Fortune favours the Bold."

ANNAPOLIS, August 18.

On Monday next PEACE is to be Proclaimed here, by the Sheriff of the County, and the County Militia are to attend the Proclamation.

Next Tuesday is to be observed throughout this Province, as a Day of Public Thanksgiving, on Account of the Peace.

We have had no very late bad News from our Frontiers; and many who had deserted their Plantations, we are informed, are gone back to them again.

P A R I S, May 30.

**T**HE Parliament of Provence have at Length passed Sentence on the Members of their Body, who presumed to censure and counter-act the Proceedings of that Parliament against the Jesuits. The President d'Eguille is fined 2000 Livres, and banished for ever; de Abbe Montvallon is fined 500 Livres, and banished for 10 Years. Their Sentence has been posted upon a Gibbet. Messrs de Carliola, de Jougues, de Bonrecoûil, and another, are fined 300 Livres each, and declared incapable of holding any Office.

L O N D O N, May 23.

The Entertainment and Ball given on Thursday Night at Knightsbridge by the Hon. Miss Chudleigh, in Honour of her Majesty's Birth-Day, which happened on Monday last, was one of the most splendid and brilliant ever known in this Kingdom, and a prodigious Number of Noblemen and other Persons of the first Distinction, were present at the late; the Fireworks, Illuminations, and other Devices on the Occasion, exceeded all Description.

The Port of Fecamp, 8 Leagues from Havre de Grace, is said to those that are privileged to trade directly to the West-Indies.

We hear that the Treaty of Commerce between England, France, and Spain, still goes on.

May 24. The very high Price of Gold at this Time is said to be owing to the Dutch, who are drawing large Sums out of our Stocks, in Order to place them in those of France, where they get higher Interest. Six-and-Thirty-Shilling Piece, of full Weight, now fetch near Two Shillings more than their Value in Tale; and even Guinea are worth considerably more than they go for; which is a great Temptation for the Jews to melt them down.

We are credibly informed that one House in Paris has bought up 30,000 of our Guinea; the Profits upon which are said to amount to near 2000 l.

The Beginning of last Week the Neutrals, or Canadians, who were brought to Bristol soon after the Commencement of the late War, were sent to Southampton in Waggon, in Order to be conveyed to their former Habitations. During this Abode there, they behaved with a decent Appearance; and, by their Industry, and civil Deportment, gained the Heart of all Ranks of People. In Quinsey-street, where they lived, they carried on a little Manufactory of coarse Sheet.

We hear that the Commander of the Antelope Man of War, which is sailed for Newfoundland, has Orders to watch the Motions of the French, and oblige them to keep strictly to the Letter of the Treaty.

May 26. The Differences between the English and Dutch East-India Companies, it is said, are as good as finally adjusted.

Several Protestant Families are arrived at Portsmouth from France, to settle in England, to avoid the numerous Hardships they undergo, and the Prosecutions that are carried on against them in France.

May 28. His Majesty has been pleased to grant unto Henry Norton Esq; of the Earl of London's Regiment, a Pension of 200 l. per Annum, for his gallant Behaviour on making good the Landing at Belleisle, where he was dangerously wounded.

Letters, Yesterday, by Way of Holland, brought Advice, that an English East-Indianman, out-bound, was taken and carried into the Mauritius by two French Men of War; which is supposed to be the Walpole, Capt. Fenner, as the latter has been missing some Time.

They write from Amsterdam, that the Dutch East-India Company are fitting out three Ships of War, the Destination of which is kept very secret. They are to carry 600 Men each, and to take on board a large Quantity of Provisions and warlike Stores. They are supposed to be destined for the Coast of Ceylon, where the Company are still under Apprehensions from the Natives.

May 31. The Lord Mayor has given particular Orders to have the Mansion-House illuminated in the grandest Manner possible on Saturday next, it being his Majesty's Birth-Day.

Extract of a Letter from Lisbon, May 9.  
On the 26th inst about Noon, a large Portuguese Man of War, of 74 Guns, that was preparing to depart, and was supposed to carry in the Fleet now bound for the Rio de Janeiro, and Five, by the Pitch Kettle-boiling over, and at the People in the Yard immediately left her, she burst in a furious Manner in the Water's Edge. There are 14 People missing, and four Gallies were more burnt, as appears by their Chains.

Extract of a Letter from Paris, May 20.

The People here are in high Spirits at the repeated Intelligence they receive from London of the great Opposition that is carrying on there to the Measures of the Ministry. The Discontent and Insufficiency which this occasion among the principal Nobility, Clergy, and trading People, is discernable even to Foreigners. Should this Spirit of Opposition continue, as we have some Hopes, and indeed Reason, to think it will, the Benefits that might accrue to the English Nation from their great Acquisitions, will, undoubtedly, be for ever neglected, that our Trade in the Mississippi perhaps requires but very little Prejudice, at least for some Time.

They write from Genoa, that by Letters from Spain they are Account, that the Captain of the Hermione had received Sentence of Death, his Lieutenant condemned to the Gallies, and the inferior Officers degraded.

June 1. The French are now building several Men of War, which will amount to 60 Guns each.

An Extract of a Letter from Madrid, May 7, says, After the late success of the English, the Spaniards have been obliged to the State of Peace; but as the Conquerors have been

so generous to us, we could almost present them with a national Address of Thanks, did not Spanish Pride and Gravity absolutely forbid it.

June 4. We hear that three Men of War will shortly sail from Portsmouth to Newfoundland, in Order to protect the Fishery on the Banks of that Island.

A great Number of French Protestants, Men, Women, and Children, are arrived at Plymouth, in Order to get Passages to go over to settle in our new Acquisitions in America.

The French have several Men of War, from 60 to 74 Guns, now building at Brest, Rochfort and Toulon, some of which are near finished.

From Toulon we have Advice, that two new Ships of the Line have been launched there in the Course of last Month.

June 7. The King and Queen came into the Ball-Room on Saturday Night at Nine, and the Ball was immediately opened by their Royal Highnesses the Duke of York and Princess Augusta. The Minuets ended after Ten, when their Majesties withdrew, and the Country Dances and Ball ended at Half an Hour after Eleven.

The Earl of Halifax gave a grand Entertainment, which consisted of between 3 and 400 Dishes, besides the Desert.

Public Prayers were put up on Sunday the 29th ult. in all the Churches in the Electorate of Hanover, for her Majesty's happy Delivery.

The Mary, Clarke, from London to Virginia, was ashore the 6th Inst. on Sandwich Flatt, left two Anchors and Cables in the Downs, and is put into Dover Pier to refit.

His Majesty has been graciously pleased to order a Present of 500 l. to be paid to Major Robert Fletcher, of the East-India Company's Service, who brought home the Colours taken at Manila, as a Reward for his Services during the Siege.

June 11. On Saturday last, in the Morning, their Majesties went to St. James's, where her Majesty proposed to her Royal Consort to stay there till Monday, with which she complied. Soon after his Majesty's Departure from the Queen's Palace to St. James's, a great Number of Persons were immediately in Readiness, who worked on that Day, and all Sunday and Monday following, where they completely finished the most superb Piece of transparent Scenery that ever was exhibited in England. The Queen, in order to draw his Majesty's Attention, and keep him longer at St. James's, desired several Ladies to appear at Court in their Masquerade Dresses, before they went to the Duke of Richmond's Ball; so that by this tender Stratagem his Majesty did not go from St. James's to the Queen's Palace till near ten o'Clock; when, on suddenly throwing back the Window Shutters of her Majesty's Palace, his Majesty was agreeably surprised with the View of

The Entertainment concerted by her Majesty, in Honour of the King's Birth-day, which was as follows: A magnificent Temple, and a Bridge finely illuminated with about 4000 Glass Lamps, were erected in the Garden. The Painting on the Front of the Temple represented the King giving Peace to all Parts of the Earth, and at his Majesty's Feet were the Trophies of the numerous Conquests made by Britain, and beneath them were a Group of Figures representing Envy, Malice, Detraction, &c. tumbling headlong like the fallen Angels in Milton. In the Front of the Temple was a magnificent Orchestra, with above 50 of the most eminent Performers. All this Machinery, Paintings, Lights, &c. were designed and fixed by her Majesty's Direction, in so private a Manner, that his Majesty had not the least Intimation of this most elegant Mark of Affection of so amiable a Princess. An Ode, suitable to the happy Occasion, was wrote, and set to Music, by Dr. Boyce, who conducted the Orchestra. The Voices were Mrs. Scott, Miss Brent, and Mr. Beard. A select Band performed during the Supper, assisted by some suitable vocal Music.

NEW-YORK, August 15.

DETROIT, July 9, 1763.

**O**N the 2d of May Sir Robert Davers, and Capt. Robinson, set out from hence in the Barge, in order to sound the Channel from this Place to Lake Huron, to see if it was possible to get one of the Vessels into that Lake; they requested me to let Mr. Rutherford go along with them to see the Lake, that as he was a young Man, he would have a good Opportunity of making useful Remarks along with them; to which I readily consented, as I looked upon him being very happy in such good Company; but, alas! he has been so unhappy as to fall into the Hands of the Savages, as you will see by his Letter to me, of the 18th of May, which you have there-enclosed. I wrote to a Frenchman of my Acquaintance, in the Country, to endeavour to purchase him from the Indians; for which Purpose I conveyed him privately, and gave him Orders to receive also from my Correspondents in the Country, Goods to the amount of Eighty Pounds. He accordingly made the Purchase of him from his Master, who was a Sotou, or Saganon Indian, who would not part with him but on Condition that the Frenchman should not suffer him to come into the Fort before the Siege was over; which I agreed to, rather than suffer him to remain in their Hands, as they were committing the most cruel and horrid Barbarities every Day, in murdering their Prisoners in the most barbarous Manner they could invent. He was but one Day and Night in Possession of the Frenchman, before Pontiac (an Ottawa, Commander in Chief of all the Nations engaged in the War) sent a Band of 50 Indians, and took him away by Force, saying, that no Nation should have Liberty to sell their Prisoners before the War was over. He is returned since to his former Master, the Saganon Indian, who still uses him very kindly, and took him Yesterday to see the Frenchman he had sold him to, and promised him that he would not suffer him, by any Means, to be killed, for he loved him as his own Child.

May the 7th. The Ottawa, and some of the Chipewas, to the Number of 300 Men, came to the Fort, and held a Treaty with Major Gladwin, who had Information

the Evening before, that the Indians were determined to fall upon and murder the Officers in Council, while they were to have Parties at the different Merchants Houses to treat them in the same Manner, and then make themselves Masters of the Garrison, by rushing into the Guard-house, Barracks, &c. and seizing the Arms. The Major would not refuse them Admittance, that they might see he was not afraid of them, but took proper Precaution, nevertheless, to have the whole Garrison under Arms; the Merchants shut up all their Houses, and assembled with their Servants at night, all well armed. The Indians all entered about 10 o'Clock, and made their Dispositions according to the proposed Plan; Pontiac (as we are informed since) had in his Pouch a certain Belt of Wampum, which he was to have produced as a Signal to begin the Massacre; but he, naturally a Coward, seeing the Garrison under Arms, dared not to produce it, made a Pretence of being surprised at our being under Arms, and feigned to be ignorant of the Cause. The Council ended; they retired, seemingly much disconcerted, and encamped on the farther Side of the River; the young Warriors reproached Pontiac for not producing the Signal, saying, that they could have carried it with the Loss of only a few Men; to which he answered, he did not imagine they would be contented to lose any Men, but if they were willing, they should have a second Opportunity to strike, whether the Garrison should be under Arms or not; to which they all agreed. In Consequence of which, Pontiac, with some others of the Chiefs, came next Day, being Sunday, to make the Pipe of Peace with the Major, who despised them so much, because of their Treachery, that he would not go nigh them, but told Capt. Campbell, if he had a Mind he might speak with them; on which Capt. Campbell went and smoked with them, when Pontiac told him, he should come the next Day and hold a Conference with the Major, and to wipe away all Cause of Suspicion, he would bring all his old and young Men to take him by the Hand in a friendly Manner; after repeating several Pieces of such Stuff, he withdrew with his Gang to his Camp. Next Morning, about Eight o'Clock, we counted 64 Canoes, all full of Indians, crossing the River above the Fort; soon after they landed, a few of them came to the Fort, and demanded Permission for the whole to be admitted into Council; which the Major absolutely refused, telling them that it was not because he was afraid of them, for he had already given them a sufficient Instance of the contrary, but that it was not customary to admit so many into Council; however, they might bring 40 or 50 of their Chiefs, which he looked upon as a sufficient Number for that Purpose.

They immediately retired to the others, who were lying all round the Fort, at the Distance of about 200 Yards, to whom when they had communicated what the Major had said, they all got up and fled off, yelling like as many Devils; they instantly fell upon Mrs. Turnbull, (an English Woman, to whom Major Gladwin had given a small Plantation, about a mile from the Fort) and murdered and scalped her, and her two Sons; from thence they went to Hog's Island, about a League up the River from the Fort, and there murdered James Fisher and his Wife, also four Soldiers who were with them, and carried off his Children and Servant Maid Prisoners. The same Evening, being the 6th, we had an Account by a Frenchman of the Defeat of Sir Robert Davers, and Capt. Robinson.

The 10th in the Morning, they attacked the Fort very resolutely; there continued a very hot Fire on both Sides until the Evening, when they ceased firing, having had several killed and wounded. They posted themselves behind the Garden Fences and Houses in the Suburbs, and some Barns and Out-Houses, that were on the Side of the Fort next the Woods, to which we immediately set Fire, by red hot Spikes, &c. from the Cannon, which dislodged them.

Wednesday, the 27th, some of the French advised us to try to come to Terms of Peace with the Indians, which was thought advisable, as we had then but three Weeks Provisions for the Garrison, at a Pound of Bread, and two Ounces of Pork a Man per Day; they went accordingly, and acquainted the Indians of what they had advised us to, in Consequence of which 5 of the Indians came to the Fort, and demanded that two of our Officers should go out and hold a Treaty with them in their Camp, and that Capt. Campbell should be one of them, to which he readily agreed, and the more so, as the French, who had advised the accommodating of Matters, told him there was no Rhéque in going out; that they would go along with him; that they would answer Life for Life, Body for Body, that he should return safe into the Fort; the Major did not like the Scheme, for which Reason he would not order him out, but told him, if he had a Mind to go, he might, though he did not imagine it would be of any great Service, only to amuse them, whilst he might get Provisions into the Fort: He took Lieut. M'Dougall along with him, however, in the Afternoon, and went off with the 5 Indians, accompanied by 5 or 6 Frenchmen, who, after having given their Parole d'Honneur, went and proved their true French Faith, by delivering him up into the Hands of the Enemy, left him there, and brought Pontiac's Proposals for us to capitulate. Judge of the Conduct of the Canadians here, by the Behaviour of these few Sacres Bougres I have mentioned: I can assure you, with much Certainty, that there are but very few in the Settlement who are not engaged with the Indians in their dam'd Design; in short, Monsieur is at the Bottom of it; we have not only convincing Proofs and Circumstances, but undeniable Proof of it. There are four or five sensible honest Frenchmen in the Place, who have been of a great deal of Service to us, in bringing us Intelligence and Provisions, even at the Risk of their own Lives: I hope they will be rewarded for their good Services: I hope also to see the others excited on High to reap the Fruits of their Labours, as soon as our Ar-



my arrival; the Discoveries we have made of their horrid Villanies, are almost incredible. But to return to the Terms of Capitulation: Pondiac proposed that we should immediately give up the Garrison, lay down our Arms, as the French, their Fathers, were obliged to do, leave the Cannon, Magazines, Merchants Goods, and the two Vessels, and be escorted in Battrees, by the Indians, to Niagara. The Major returned Answer, that the General had not sent him there to deliver up the Fort to the Indians, or any Body else; and that he would defend it whilst he had a single Man to fight along-side of him. Upon this Hostilities recommenced, since which time, being two Months, the whole Garrison, Officers, Soldiers, Merchants and Servants, consisting of 120 Men, have been upon the Ramparts every Night, not one having slept in a House, except the Sick and Wounded in the Hospital.

Our Fort is extremely large, considering our Numbers, the Stockade being above 2000 Paces in Circumference; judge what a Figure we make on the Works. The Schooner arrived from Niagara about ten Days ago, and brought some Provisions, with 22 Men of the 80th, and 23 of Capt. Hopkin's Company, who luckily escaped from that unhappy Affair of Lieutenant Cuyler, which I suppose you may have heard of long e'er now. About six Days ago we made a Sally, in which we killed and wounded several of the Enemy; among the Killed was a Chief of the Soteaus; those of his Nation, to revenge his Death, fell upon Capt. Campbell, and cut him all in Pieces; they skinned his Legs and Arms, to make Tobacco Pouches, and other Toys. Lieut. M'Dougall would have shared the same Fate, but very luckily made his Escape from them, and got into the Fort about two Nights before. Lieut. Pauly made his Escape from them a few Minutes after Capt. Campbell was massacred; we have also got Ensign Schlosser, and two Soldiers, for an Indian Prisoner we had, Presque Isle, Sandusky, St. Joseph's, Miami, Ocus, and Michillimackinac, are taken, and almost all the Soldiers belonging to each of them put to Death, except the Garrison of Ocus, which they have carried off to the Illinois. Lieut. Holmes, Commander at Miami, is killed; also Lieutenant Jamett, at Michillimackinac, with about 17 of the Soldiers, and Warrant Tracey, a Trader, Capt. Etherington, Lieut. Leslie, and a few Soldiers, remain their Prisoners. They have plundered every Thing belonging to the English Posts they have taken.

Since writing the above, the Hurons, who begin to be wearied of the War, have brought and delivered up to us 3 Prisoners, among whom are Ensign Christie, late Commandant of Presque Isle, and Little Levy, from Niagara. The Hurons and Pontenatumis, who were partly forced into the War, by the Menaces of the Ottawas, begin to withdraw, being afraid, I believe, of the Arrival of our Army; so that Pondiac, whose Army lately consisted of about 7 or 800 Men, cannot muster at present more than 500. They were so confident of succeeding, that they began to divide the Lands with the French, and have planted large Fields of Corn; but I know who will reap them. We have at present Plenty of Provisions and Ammunition, and our Men are in high Spirits; we are also happy in having one of the best Commanding Officers the Army can afford, and under whose Command, I think, we can give a good Account of all the Indians who come against us.

#### PHILADELPHIA, August 18.

Extract of a Letter from Fort Bedford, August 10.

"When I wrote you last the 2d Instant, we had no Account of our little Army since their March from hence on the 28th ult. As a great deal depends on that Convoy's getting into Fort Pitt, so, doubtless, every One must be anxious for its Safety. The whole got safe to Ligonier the 2d Instant, without a single Shot being fired at them. On the Fourth Col. Bouquet resumed his March, leaving the Waggon, with Capt. Hay, and some other Officers, at Ligonier. On the Fifth, about One in the Afternoon, a full Mile on this Side of Bushy Run, he was attacked (I don't hear by what Numbers) the Fire continued till Six; when the Colonel took Post on a Hill for the Night. Next Morning the Indians, having been reinforced, renewed the Attack, which was very warm, about Ten o'Clock, when the Colonel, having drawn up in a Lane, formed by his Bags, rushed upon the Savages, and pursued them upwards of a Mile and a Half, and then ordered the Retreat. In these different Attacks, we have lost some Men and Officers; but as this Intelligence is founded upon the Report of six Rangers, who returned to Ligonier, because, as they say, the Enemy got between them and our People, I am cautious of relating Particulars, till a more authentic Account comes to hand. In the mean time, it appears from the whole, that the Enemy has been repulsed; and, in all Probability, the Convoy may have got to Fort Pitt, unless attacked again, the 7th at farthest. I have Reason to believe, that the whole Force the Enemy had on this Communication was collected for that Stroke, for, from the Time the Troops arrived here to this Day, we have not seen nor felt the Effects of an Indian. And the Reapers, under Cover, and by Assistance of Captain Lem's Company, have cut almost all their Grain, without the least Interruption; but now I shall expect that they will visit us again."
