CONSTANTINOPLE, April 17.

M. De RIXEN Envoy extraordinary from the King of Prussia, has received some fresh Presents sent by the King his Master to the Sultan; and which are still more magnificent than those which his Majesty sent to his Sublime Highness the 9th of last Month. They consist of 4 Looking-Glasses, with Frames of Silver chased; twelve Silver Chandeliers; a large Gold Ewer, and two other Vases of the same Metal; a Tea and Coffee Equipage, both of Gold; a Sabre, the Hilt of which is covered with Diamonds; a Scarf, the Clasp of which is a large Diamond; six Gold Watches with chased Cases, set with precious Stones; a Telescope, the Tube of which is Gold; a Plume of Heron's Feathers, adorned with Brillants; and two Table Clocks, the Cases of which are of Venice Glass, and set in Gold, &c. &c.

Lisbon, April 6. All the Regiments which composed the Garrison of the maritime Cities, are in full March to the Province of Alentejo. Horses are buying up for the Service of the King. Every Portuguese who hath three Horses is obliged to sell one to his Majesty. The Arrears due to the Troops are to be paid immediately.

Dusseldorp, May 9. The Hereditary Prince of Brunswick, being determined to raise the Contributions he had demanded of the Dutchy of Berg, marched near 20 Leagues in two Days, and thereby appeared at Elberfeld, when he was least expected. The Corps of Conflans, and the other Troops that were there, retreated with great Precipitation, though not without some Loss. From Elberfeld his Serene Highness advanced to Solingen, and from thence, having fulfilled the Object he had in View, by taking Hostages for the Payment of the Contributions, retired without any Loss.

Altena, May 11. A large Train of Artillery is preparing at Magdebourg, destined, as we suppose, for Saxony.

Ratisbon, May 10. There is no Peace to be expected this Year between the Courts of Vienna and Berlin. The former hath rejected the Four Millions offered for the Cession of the rich Dutchy of Silesia. The epidemical Distemper which thinned the Austrian ranks in that Dutchy is considerably abated.

Hamburg, May 14. A Volunteer in the Austrian Army in Silesia writes, that Marshal Daun will probably lay Siege either to Neiss or Glogau. The first is the most considerable Fortress in Silesia; the other secures, in a great Measure, the Communication between Silesia and the Marche of Brandenburg.

Paris, May 14. The Artificers work with the greatest Diligence in all the Dock-Yards of the Kingdom, particularly at Toulon, since the Arrival of the large Quantities of Timber brought up from Italy.

Spain hath 34 Ships of the Line ready for Sea, viz. 2 of 80 Guns; 26 of 70; 2 of 64; and 4 of 60.

Lisbon, April 25. As we have never been at War since the Peace of Utrecht, our Troops are unexperienced; and that is what makes us uneasy. Mean while, they are continually exercised, and we have already many English Officers of Experience. When the English Regiments arrive, they will inspire ours with Emulation, and ours will be the more formidable, as they fight in Defence of their native Country.

The Marathan Company, who maintain 3 Ships of War, and 19 Merchant Ships, have, as a Proof of their Zeal, engaged to build and equip for the King's Service, a Ship of War of 60 Guns.

Hague, May 21. Letters from Breslau of the 12th advise, that a Prussian Officer, with 80 Hussars, surprized an Austrian advanced Post at Oldendorff, near Wurhen, and killed 11 Austrians upon the Spot, took two Subalterns and 24 private Men Prisoners, with 32 Horses; and, upon their return, they fell in with another Austrian Party, and took one Officer, 12 private Men, and 13 Horses.

Letters from Paris, received this Day, are full of the Progress which the Court flatter themselves that their Forces shall make in Germany, being much superior in Number to those of the Allies. Orders are sent to their Generals to begin their Operations with the utmost Vigour. The Army in Hesse is to endeavour to get Possession of the Dutchies of Brunswick and Wolfenbuttel, whilst the Army on the Lower Rhine makes the utmost Efforts to dislodge the Allies from Westphalia.

Letters received Yesterday from Hildesheim advise, that all the Allied Troops were marched out of their Quarters of Cantonment, and by their Motions indicate that they should immediately open the Campaign; so that we may expect to hear soon of Blows being interchanged.

LONDON, May 13.

Extract of a Letter from Paris, May 3.

"It should seem that the many Misfortunes which have succeeded one another since the Commencement of the War, have made an Impression, and that our Government begins to be roused from their Inactivity. The Ministry are not only taking every necessary Precaution, for insuring the Success of the Campaign in Germany; but they are concerting with Spain Projects of the last Importance, which tend to nothing less than Kindling a general

Combustion in England, and spreading the Flames of War to every Corner of it. Though the late Tumults in Ireland have vanished into smoke, not being supported, and though there is no longer a Capt. Thurot, Preparations are making for bringing the Pretender on the Stage. Trusty Persons are to be sent to Scotland and Ireland to animate his Friends, and to assure them that every Thing will be got ready by France and Spain for the Execution of their Enterprize in 6 Weeks or 2 Months."

Yesterday the Subscribers to the 2,400,000 l. to be raised by Long Annuities of one per Cent. for 98 Years, for the Service of the present Year, made good their Payment of 30 per Cent. of the said Capital at the Bank.

May 15. There is a severe allegorical Satire handed about at Paris, under the Title of a Dissertation on the Passage of Venus over the Sun. It contains a Multitude of shrewd Remarks on the Conduct of the French Venus, who, the Author says, has verified the Prediction of Monsieur de Maurepas, that if she lived 12 or 14 Years, she would survive every Statesman, Soldier, and Seaman in France, a Sarcastic for which he has paid dear, and his Country much dearer.

May 27. All our Accounts hitherto were unanimous in raising the Expectations of a happy agreement between the Courts of Petersburg and Copenhagen, in Relation to the Dutchy of Holstein, and it was even reported that a Convention was already signed to that Effect. But by the last Mails we received from the most authentic Source, the following Account of that matter, viz. That the Differences between the Czar and the King of Denmark had been on the very Point of being terminated by the Intervention and good Offices of their Britannic and Prussian Majesties; that the Emperor of Russia had consented to let his Danish Majesty remain for several Years to come in the Possession of that disputed Dutchy, provided the latter paid the Interest of its Revenues not only for those Years, but also for the Time past, since it has been a Part of the Danish Territories; and that the British Court had engaged for the Payment of these Interests, on Condition that a Body of Danish Troops, 18,000 in Number, should enter into its Service. So far in Effect was this Negotiation conducted. But his Danish Majesty perceiving, that by paying the abovementioned Interest to the Czar, he acknowledged him, in the Face of the World, as the lawful Sovereign and Proprietor of that Dutchy, Rejected these Proposals after mature Deliberation, so that we are not likely to see the End of these Differences so soon as was expected.

In the mean Time the Court of Copenhagen continues its Military Preparations with the greatest Assiduity and Vigour by Sea and Land, and leaves no Means unemployed to augment its Forces, and render its Navy respectable.

On the other Hand, the Scene of things at Petersburg, which to profound Politicians does not yet bear a fixed and determined Aspect, carries to the plain Eyes of less deep Observers, the Appearance of a firm and steadfast Propensity to maintain the Cause, and support the Interests of the Court of Berlin. It is even affirmed that the two Monarchs are actually employed in concerting a Plan, which will surprize the most provident and sagacious observers of the State and Motions of the political World.

BOSTON, August 16.

Yesterday arrived at Nantasket Road, a Brig from St. John's, in Newfoundland, in 20 Days: She was bound to Virginia, and has on board about 60 Passengers, among whom are several Masters of Vessels and others, who had refused to take the Oath of Allegiance to the French: They confirm the Account of the French having strengthened that Place, and that they were to leave a Garrison of 600 Men during the Winter: That Capt. Ross, the late commanding Officer there, and the Capt. of the Gramont, were gone to Eng-

land, and that a Cartel was soon to sail for New-York with a Number more of the Inhabitants, who were not allowed to carry off any of their Effects: That the French Troops are all Fine pick'd Men, and had recruited about 200 since they had Possession there; but that the Fleet, consisting of only two Ships of the Line, a Frigate and a Store-ship, were poorly manned: That the Antelope Man of War of 50 Guns, and the Syren Frigate, were at Placentia; and that the French were in daily Expectation of an English Fleet from the Continent. The above-mentioned Brig was one of the Fleet from Ireland with Provisions, and arrived at St. John's after that Place had surrendered, and was afterwards made a Present of to the Gentleman who now commands her, together with most of her Cargo, but for what Reason may perhaps hereafter appear.

We hear that a Brig, Capt. John Stevens, jun. Master, belonging to this Place, foundered at Sea, the 22d of July, on her Passage Home from Jamaica. The People were taken up by a Vessel in Company.

NEW-POR (Rhode-Island) August 17.

Captain Gardener arrived here on Thursday last, in nine Days from Halifax, and informs, That there were three Men of War, one of 64, one of 50, and one of 20 Guns, at Halifax: That an English Man of War of 20 Guns was kept constantly cruising off Newfoundland, to keep in the French Privateers: That there were 14 or 1500 Tons of Shipping taken up at Halifax for the Transport Service, on board of which they were putting warlike Stores, &c. and that they were in daily Expectation of 5 Sail of English Men of War, who, with the Transports, it was generally tho't, would attempt the regaining Newfoundland.

The Schooner Lively, Capt. Hunt (a Flag of Truce) arrived here Yesterday, after a Passage of 17 Days, from Cape Francois, and has brought 55 English Prisoners, mostly Men of War's Men, lately belonging to his Majesty's Ship Hussar, who was cast away some Time ago on a Reef of Rocks near Cape Francois. Capt. Hunt informs us, that he left at the Cape 6 Men of War of the Line, and 8 Frigates; and that the Talk there was, that they were to sail from thence in October next.

NEW-YORK, August 12.

Yesterday arrived here the Schooner Dolphin, Capt. Canada, of this Port, in 10 Days from Halifax. He was bound to St. John's, and proceeding to the Mouth of the Harbour, where he luckily met a Boat that informed him of its being in the Hands of the French, on which he turned to Halifax, and landed his Cargo. No Ships of War were arrived there. Several Passengers came with him, who were in St. John's when it was taken, being, it is said, shamefully given up, without firing a Gun, when it had Strength and Men sufficient to have repelled all the Force the French brought against it.

Captain Robinson, who lately arrived here from Madeira, reports, that he was informed there, that about the Middle of June last, a fine Plantation, on the West End of the Island, on which was a valuable Vineyard suddenly sunk under Water, without any apparent Cause, there having been no Earthquake perceptible before or at the Time. The Part on which were the Houses was left standing.

August 16. The Mail for Falmouth was Yesterday put on board the Duke of Cumberland Packet-Boat, Capt. Goodridge, and she fell down, to proceed on her Voyage.

August 23. Thursday Evening last a Sloop, Waterman, late Master, belonging to Providence, in Rhode-Island Government, was sent in here by Capt. Williams, of the Letter of Marque Sloop Orleans, of this Port. Captain Waterman sailed from Martinico the 21st of July, but in two Days after had the Misfortune to be taken by a Spanish Privateer Sloop, of 10 Carriage Guns, belonging to Porto-Rico, who ordered him to St. Thomas's, and in his Way thither had the good Fortune to fall in with Captain Williams abovementioned, who obliged them to steer for New-York.

When Captain Waterman was first taken, he had a considerable Sum of Money on board, which, the better to conceal, he threw into a Pork Barrel; but the Spaniards in Searching found the same, and ordered it directly on board the Privateer.

PHILADELPHIA, August 26.

The following Particulars relating to the Havannah, are here extracted from the last Carolina Papers, viz.

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That it was said the Spanish Men of War, in the Harbour, were all scuttled, and ready for sinking; which looked as if the Admiral despaired of being able to withstand the Attack of our Army on the Havannah, and was resolved to render the Ships of as little Use to us as possible: That a Company of Spanish Horse was taken by a Party of our Troops: That to the Southward of the Moore Castle is an high Hill, which was a very desirable Object in the General's Eye, and accordingly sent a Party to reconnoitre, and found it possessed by the Enemy, who were diligently raising a Battery there; whereupon a Number of Men were ordered to attack it, which they did with Success, dislodging the Spaniards, and taking ten Pieces of Cannon: That we then erected a Battery upon that Hill, of 18 Twenty-four Pounders, to play upon the Castle; and one of three Nine-inch, and two Thirteen-inch Mortars, with which we sometimes amused and terrified the Town, but that it seemed to be the General's Intention to spare it as much as possible: That we had a Ship to give Notice when the Bombs were well or ill thrown; if they fell so as to do Execution, she hoisted red Colours; and if they flew over, she shewed white Colours: That in some Clefts, under the Moore Castle, lay Perdue about 100 Marksmen, who, when they observed the Enemy loading or discharging their Guns, gave them a Salute, which occasioned the Cannon to be loaded only by Negroes; but that this gallant little Party, at a particular Time, not being satisfied with what Mischief they could do the Enemy there, imprudently advancing to do some glaring Exploit, exposed themselves too much, and lost some Men: upon which they were obliged to retire to their strong Holds, where they were so far under the Castle Walls, as not to be hurt by its Cannon: That a Party of the Queen's Regiment, clothed in white, turned up with red, were taken for Spaniards, and, by that Means, got very near one of their Parties, when they killed many, and made some Prisoners: That another Party of ours fell in with some of their Blacks, that served on Horseback, whom they endeavoured to enclose; but the Light Infantry fired too soon, by which they lost the Opportunity of intirely surrounding, tho' they killed and took a Number of them: That Colonel Howe, to the Westward of the Town, had possessed himself of two Villages, and was attacking a Third, but the Spaniards burnt and abandoned it: That he had also Possession of a Hill, but had not gained the Summit, as the Ships in the Harbour could gall him much there; and that his Operations were directed against the Governor's Castle: That the whole Town, as well as the Castle, was surrounded by our Troops, Parties being encamped all around, within Call of each other: That our Engineers said they could lay the Town in Ashes in a few Hours, but were not allowed to do it: That the Wall of the Moore Castle was said to be Fifty Feet through: And that the Town and Castle had a Communication, which our Army could not cut off, and was kept open by Means of a Valley between, where our People could not raise any Battery, nor take Possession, on account of a Spanish Gun Ship, which lay at the End of it, in the Harbour, and, by a constant Fire, kept all open and clear.

On Friday Night last arrived here Captain M'Auley from the Havannah, which he left the Seventh Instant. By him we have the following

Extract of a Letter from the Havannah, July 22, 1762.

"The Siege of this Place began about 40 Days ago, and has ever since continued very warm, by constant Cannonading in the Day, and Bombarding in the Night. The Spaniards behave with the greatest Bravery and Resolutions: Their strong Moore Castle is almost beat to Rubbish, and most of their other Batteries greatly damaged; and it is computed that they have lost 100 Men on an Average, every Day since the Siege commenced. Yesterday Morning the Spaniards sallied out upon our Batteries with about 2000 Men, who were, in the Space of two Hours, repulsed, with the Loss of upwards of 1200 killed and Prisoners. They afterwards sent a Flag of Truce to Lord Albemarle, and Sir George Pocock, who offered them some Terms of Capitulation, which the Spaniards refused, and said, they should all be buried in the Ruins, before they would accept of any such Terms; upon which our Batteries opened, and are now playing like Thunder. Our Troops got Possession of the Glacis some Days ago, and have sent about 40 Miners into the Ditch, who, I am told, have already dug about 9 or 10 Feet under the Walls of the Castle, and are now filling it with Powder; so To-morrow, or next Day, we expect to see their strong Castle blown up, and then our Troops are to storm. The Spanish Force, at the Commencement of the Siege, was 12 Ships of the Line, 9 Frigates, two new Ships on the Stocks, 4000 Regular Troops, and with Marines, Sailors, Negroes, and Militia, all together, were supposed to be about 18 or 20,000 Men. The British Forces were 23 or 24 Ships of the Line, 16 Frigates and Bombs, 12000 Regular Troops, which, with Marines, Sailors, &c.,

were supposed to be about 23 or 24,000 brave Men. Our Troops have hitherto suffered but very little, in Proportion to that of the Enemy, in Action; but the Fatigue, together with the Climate, has occasioned a considerable Sickness among them, tho' very few but what recover in a few Days, or perhaps a Week. The Spaniards, I believe, begin to be very tired of us now; and, I imagine, because we have not set their Town on Fire, and attacked them with greater Vigour before this Time, they think that we intend soon to leave them; but that was not our Intention, and I am thoroughly convinced, that in a few Days, or a Week hence, they will find their Mistake, and see, that we only mean to avoid dangerous Attempts with our Troops, and make ourselves Masters of their Town with as small a Loss, both to their Houses, and to our own Troops, as possible."

ANNAPOLIS, September 2.

By further Advices relating to the taking of the Moore-Castle, since our last, we learn, that our Forces sprung a Mine on the 28th of July, and blow'd up Part of it, and then attacked it Sword in Hand: Next Day the Spaniards fired on it to demolish that Part of the Castle which we had left standing, which they effected, and reduced it to a Heap of Rubbish. It is likewise said that it was the *Chesterfield* (and not the *Enterprise*) which was lost with the Five Transports going thro' the Old Straights of Babama. Our Forces on the 7th of August, had not fired since the 28th of July, but were employed raising Batteries, which were to open on the 10th, and it was thought the Town must surrender in a few Days afterwards.

About 12 or 14 Days ago, Captain John Johnson, arrived in *Peterwack*, in 35 Days from *Gibraltar*, and brings Advice, That one of his Majesty's Frigates, had taken and carried in there, a Spanish Ship, with upwards of 800,000 *l.* Sterling in Specie.

Saturday last, Captain Francis Richardson, arrived here in a Ship from *Lisbon*, after a Passage of 10 Weeks: He informs, that it was said there, That Part of Admiral *Saunders*'s Fleet had taken and carried into *Gibraltar*, Two Spanish Register-Ships, which, by Papers found on board, were supposed to be worth 2,000,000 Sterling, 7 or 800,000 *l.* being landed: That about 8000 British Troops were arrived at *Lisbon*, and more from *Belleville* daily expected: About 1000 Light Horse were reviewed the same Day they Landed, in Presence of His Most Faithful Majesty, the Queen, many Nobles, and a great Number of Gentry, and made a very fine Appearance: That a Portuguese Officer had causelessly quarrelled with an English Officer, who was obliged, in his own Defence, to bleed him, but did not kill him.

We are informed by a Pilot, lately come up the Bay, that his Majesty's Ship the *Gosport*, Captain Jervis, is now at *York in Virginia*. The Honourable Mr. FAUQUIER, Governor of that Colony, has published an Advertisement in the *Virginia Gazette*, of the 20th of August, purporting, That "Capt. Jervis's Instructions are very peremptory that he should Sail for England with such Ships as shall be ready to take Advantage of his Convoy, on the 20th of September, being the Day appointed by the Merchants of London; and notifying all concerned, to expedite the Lading of the Ships, that they may be ready by that Time."

have taken no further Notice of it, but that I find

imposed on. I suppose he means nothing more
than to get an honest Livelihood; and that if some
Body else were not as much interested as he in the
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I am confirm'd in by his imagining I exceed in
supposing the Distance from Annapolis to Rock-Hall,
to be 25 Miles; for if he had read his own
Advertisement, he would have seen I only took
his own Word for it, which I shall not be so ready
to credit for the future. It is then not he, but
his Amanuensis, who begins "It is no new Thing
to find that Interest blinds the Person affected
and very often Biases the Judgment." This is
an affected Sort of Speech; to blind the Judgment
and bias it too, are intended as a double Charge
by Way of Exaggeration. However he is grossly
mistaken in supposing me biased; my Arguments
are sufficient of themselves, I am not of his Kidney;
if it fell to my Lot to take Notice of the Thing,
it is not that I was interested; it was as much the
Duty of every honest Man who detects Imposture
to expose it. As to my Bias of Interest, let the
Gentlemen who have passed at *Townside* vouch; I
keep no Tavern, my Ferry on the contrary is sim-
ply a Tax upon Hospitality, where often better
Entertainment is given to Persons of Worth than
may reasonably be expected in most Taverns.
Mr. Aires's Amanuensis further saith, and Mr. Aires
hath signed, that I was so blinded as to suppose
the Traveller would carry his Horse over 25 Miles
of Water, to save 4 Miles riding. No, Mr. Aires,
not so blind, I don't suppose any Man so blind:
But I think in this Instance the Blind leads the
Blind. Your Amanuensis makes you declare in
this Sentence, that the Traveller must find a fresh
Horse if he intends beyond your House or Middle-
ton's, North or South, and at the same Time must
leave his Horse at the Mercy of your Hostler with
no small Expence; for where you object to the
Expence of other Ferries, I presume you do not
mean that it shall extend the Traveller shall save
a Penny by taking your Road; it will be no Ad-
vantage to you to let up on that Plan. Mr. Aires
has ventured to say, that by my own State of the
Matter, the Distance from George-Town to Kent-
Island is 47 Miles, and to Rock-Hall but 30.
Sure I am I never stated it so; I cannot stretch it
beyond 40; it is about 7 more to the Island Ferry,
12 Miles Eastward of Annapolis. He was led into
this Blunder by a blind Bias such as he speaks of,
or else by the Manner of Witches saying the Lord's
Prayer, by counting backwards. I set off from
Annapolis to George-Town, he reckons from George-
Town to the Narrows, and there he stops short; it
did not serve his Purpose to go further; this is not
a fair Way of Boxing the Compass. "And this
(he has the Modesty to add) must save 17 Miles,"
not content to cheat the Public of the 7 Miles a-
cross the Island, but also the vast Difference be-
tween a Traveller being at the Island Ferry in
Sight of Annapolis in a Manner, within 12 Miles,
and being at Rock-Hall at the Distance of 25, as
he calls it, tho' it is probable he never hove the
Log. In short he overlooks in this Reckoning, the
Difference between Rock-Hall and the Island Ferry
12, and across the Island 7, which is now 20 in
25, large Lee-way in a Traveller's Reckoning.
He says it is but 16 Miles from Chester to George-
Town, I suppose he Means from Chester-Town to
George-Town; granted, though I have known it
reckon'd 18, he is not so favourable to me in the
Distance from Dockery's to Townside, which he is

apt to believe are a few Miles short of the Truth;
he is apt to believe a Falstity here; the Fact is, this
Distance is not generally reckon'd so much: But
it has been measured and found to be a little short
of 18. I am not so well acquainted with the other
Roads: But computed Miles usually measure
more; however I am not apt to believe any Thing
without Foundation. Mr. Aires says "he has
often run the aforesaid 25 Miles in 2 Hours with a
moderate Gale: But with a good Wind 'tis soon
run (that is to say sooner to be sure) and being up
and down the Bay, the Tide, when it answers,
quickens the Passage much." May not we con-
clude from this, that when both Wind and Tide
answer, he may go at the Rate of 25 Miles an
Hour? *Credat Judæus Apella*. My last was purely
for the Public Good; this is not less so: But as
my Reputation seems a little concerned from the
Indecency of the Aspersions here refused, if you
think me principally interested, let this reprimand
(as mild I think as the Subject deserves) be insert-
ed in your next. To conclude, *si populus vult*
decepi decipiatur, all I mean is, that with my Con-
sent it shall not be *volens volens*. My Advertis-
ment has been of some little Service to Mr. Aires,
it has put him in Mind to point out the Situation of
Rock-Hall. Let every Man try, and I will answer
for it, that, unless in the Circumstance mention'd
in my Advertisement, he will never try again.

Annapolis, September 9.

UNDAY last we received the most Welcome, and Important Article of News, THAT THE RICH AND POPULOUS CITY OF THE HAVANNAH, HAS SURRENDERED TO THE GALLANT, BRAVE, VICTORIOUS BRITISH FORCES: With which we most heartily Congratulate our Readers. Huzza! Huzza! Huzza!

All the Particulars relating to this AUGUST Acquisition, which have yet come to Hand, were brought in to Philadelphia last Thursday after the Papers were published, by a Vessel directly from the Havannah, and are as follow:

On Friday, July 30, a chosen Number of Soldiers attacked the *Mars*, or *Moor-Castle*, and took it by Storm, with the Loss of many Spaniards. From that Day to Tuesday the 10th of August, the Soldiers, and a great Number of Sailors, were employed in raising and compleating of Fascine Batteries for the Cannon and Mortars, on an Eminence that ranges from the *Moor-Castle*, along the East Side of the Harbour, abreast with the major Part of the City, and their best Fortifications. On Tuesday the 10th of August, at 12 o'Clock, my Lord *Albemarle* sent an Officer, with a Drum, to the Governor of the *Havannah*, to demand Possession of the City; and in case of Refusal, to acquaint him, that he would set Fire to it next Morning. The Governor sent for Answer, that he would not give up the City; that he had 6 Months Ammunition to defend it. On Wednesday, the 11th, at Five o'Clock in the Morning, all the Batteries began to play on the City and Forts, and kept so warm a Fire at them, that at Three o'Clock in the Afternoon, our Batteries had dismounted the major Part of the Guns on the City Walls, and in their strong Forts, and had kill'd them a great Number of Men: At which Time the Governor sent out 3 Officers with a Drum, in order to desire Time to think of Terms of Capitulation; which was Granted: It was said, that those Gentlemen Officers desired to know, whether the Spanish Admiral, with Three other Men of War of the Line, could be permitted to sail to Spain unsearched or unmolested; [a very Modest Proposal!] and that our General and Admiral gave them for Answer, That they could not allow them even a Spanish Long-Boat; but should have good English Ships to Transport them to Spain in. On Saturday the 14th, my Lord *Albemarle*, with the Grenadiers, marched into the City, and took Possession of it; and the Remainder of the Army encamped without the City Walls. On Monday the 16th, Commodore *Keppel* sailed into the Harbour, and took Possession of the Men of War, which were reported to be Nine Sail of the Line, besides Three or Four that the Spaniards had sunk across the Harbour's Mouth. They had Launch'd a Ship of 110 Guns, but a few Days before the Arrival of the Fleet. We were inform-

ed, that the Spanish Admiral told our General, that there were more Naval Stores in the *Havannah* than would compleatly Rig all the Men of War that were there. In our Fleet, the Report of the King's Money in the Treasury, was various, some said Eight, and others Fourteen Millions of Mill'd Dollars. On Thursday the 19th, and Friday the 20th, several of our largest Men of War went into the Harbour, as also a Number of large Transports, which were designed to carry the Spanish Soldiers to Spain: The same Day the *Dragon* Man of War, Capt. *Harvey*, was to sail for England as Express; as also the *Enterprise* Man of War, with a small Frigate, sail'd as Convoy to 15 or 20 Sail of Transports, with Soldiers to *New-York*, and at that Time the *Cambridge*, an 80 Gun Ship, with a 36 Gun Frigate, lay off with the *Jamaica* Fleet, and was to proceed to England with them. The Terms of Capitulation were not known to the Public; but the Spanish Families who had withdrawn from the City to the Country, were all returned with their Effects, and were in Possession of their own Habitations; and some Soldiers and English Negroes were Hang'd for committing some small Thefts on them.

BRUNSWICK, June 8.

ACCORDING to Advices received here Yesterday from Prince Henry's Camp in Saxony, dated the 4th, the Prussian advanced Posts had been attacked on the 2d, all at the same Time, by the Austrian Army, which had been reinforced the Day before, by seven Battalions. Prince Henry had succeeded in repelling the Austrians every where, with the small Loss of 200 Men.

Hamburg, June 11. Yesterday we received Advice, that the King of Prussia is encamped with 7 Battalions only, at 3 German Miles from the Austrian Army, and 5 from Breslau.

June 15. The 12th Inst. his Swedish Majesty's Ratification of the Treaty of Peace concluded here the 22d inst, arrived by a Courier to M. Zoge de Manteuffel, Minister from that Court in this Residence; and the Day following the Exchange was made at M. Manteuffel's House, with M. de Hecht, the Prussian Minister. The same Day Te Deum was sung at the French reformed Chapel, which is at M. Hecht's Hotel, upon the King of Prussia's Peace with the Emperor of Russia, and the King of Sweden, at which were present their respective Ministers: And in the Evening the Prussian Minister gave an Entertainment to both these Gentlemen.

Lisbon, June 18. The Letters from Madrid, of the 31st inst, pretend, that the whole Province of *Tras-los Montes* had been evacuated by the Portuguese; and add, that a body of Spanish Troops was in March from Galicia to invest Almeida.

Paris, June 10. The last Letters from Madrid advise, that the Spanish Army was marching in five Divisions to lay Siege to Almeida, the only Fortress that can stop their March to Oporto. The 13 Battalions sent by our Court to the Assistance of Spain, entered that Kingdom the Beginning of this Month. They are to join in Galicia the Spanish Troops commanded by the Marquis de Croix, and proceed against Oporto.

According to our last Accounts the Toulon Squadron, consisting of ten Ships of the Line, four Frigates, and eight Flutes, was gone out of the Harbour into the Road, and we suppose is now at Sea. Its Destination is a Mystery. If it joins a Spanish Squadron of the same Force, they may in Conjunction make a powerful Diversion.

LONDON, June 17.

It is said that of 6000 Men, which the Spaniards embarked by Stealth for the West-Indies, on board Dutch Transports, 3000 died in their Passage, by the Distemper which broke out among them in Consequence of their being crowded in the Vessels, in a Manner scarce credible.

The Count de la Lippe Buckerbourg is a Sovereign Count of the Empire. His Title in Portugal will be Generalissimo, where he will command in Chief an Army of about 50,000 Men.

The Right Hon. the Earl of Halifax is appointed First Lord of the Admiralty, in the room of Lord Anson, deceased.

June 18. The *Epreuve* Frigate, *Pefer Blake*, Esq; Commander, is arrived at Plymouth from Virginia, and has brought over with him three Cherokee Indians.

Transports are said to receive a considerable Number of Horse and Foot Forces, particularly some Light Horse: The Number of British Forces to be employed in Portugal, will be completed in a few Days to 20,000, besides which a Number of Highlanders will shortly embark for that Place.

Extract of a Letter from Portsmouth, dated June 20.

"The Right Hon. Lord Howe has quitted his Majesty's Ship the *Magnanime*, and has taken Possession of the *Princess Amelia*; on board which Ship we hear his Royal Highness the Duke of York is to hoist his Flag. The whole Expedition is now compleated, and ready for the Sea; and we expect Sir Edward Hawke to put to Sea every Day."

Letters from Paris of the 10th of June say, that besides Chaves and Moncorvo, the Spaniards are also in Possession of another little Place, which makes the Fifth, called *Otoyra*.

There are Reports about Town, that some of the English Forces, being an advanced Party, had fallen in with an advanced Party of Spaniards, about 24 Miles inland from the Frontiers of Portugal, and that the latter retired with great Precipitation, without standing a third Fire.

A House is taken in Suffolk-Street, and an Equipage preparing, for the three Cherokee Indian Chiefs. Clothes are also making, after the English Fashion, in which they are to make their Appearance.—They are to be clothed in scarlet.

BOSTON, August 16.

NEWFOUNDLAND.

A Brigantine arrived here this Week from Newfoundland, having a Number of English Inhabitants on board from St. John's, which they left the 22d of July, by whom we have Intelligence, That the French Fleet from Brest consisted of the *Robuste* of 74, the *Eveille* of 64, *Lecorne* of 56, and the *Caronne* of 30 Guns; this last was only a Storeship, and had formerly been a Mast-ship, now commanded by an Irishman, one Sutton, born at Newfoundland, and well known there, but calls himself by the Name *Clanard*. The Troops consisted of 1300, one Half picked Men, under Marquis *Ossonville*, but that the Commodore de *Tournay*, commanded in Chief the whole Land and Sea Forces: The Ships were ill manned, scarce enough capable of managing the Vessels.

When the Enemy got into Bay of Bulls, they landed 650 of their Regulars, who immediately insisted about 25 Irishmen, and marched to attack the Fort at St. John's; having first put a Number of Cannon in some Boats, to land them near the Garrison, as it would have been very difficult to carry them from Bay of Bulls by Land. Upon the sudden Appearance of the French, who were unexpected on that Way, and the Fort being Defenceless on the Land Side, the Commanding Officer, having no Opportunity to strengthen it, and having but 46 Regulars, and 16 Artillery-men, they fired two Guns, and surrendered, as it was judged impossible to stand the Enemy ten Minutes. They could get no other Terms than what M. de Tournay promised in the Manifesto he gave out on his first Landing: It is farther said, that the French had declared they were 5000 strong, and were determined to storm the Fort when they had got their Cannon ashore: As soon as the French had Possession of St. John's, they immediately set about fortifying the Place, as if they intended to keep it; they have made a Tier of Ramparts all around, and mounted them with Guns taken from the different Ships; they have also built a new Battery on the Southward of that called Fort William, or the South Battery: They have insisted about 200 Irishmen there, most of which were insisted by the Captain of the Storeship; there were a great Number of them: Work every Day, and seem to be fond of their new Masters. The French have laid a Boom across the Mouth of the Harbour of St. John's, with Masts fastened together, and banking Chains, a Quarter of an Inch through: It is the Opinion of several Persons that have seen these Fortifications, that they could make but little Resistance if a regular Force came against them; for though their regular Forces are the best of their Kind, yet the Seamen are so very bad, that they are not able to fight their Ships: The Ships in the Harbour have their Yards and Top-masts down, and Sails unbent, designing to stay till the latter End of September, as they themselves declare, and that when the Ships return Home, it is to be garrisoned by 4 or 500 Men.

Notwithstanding the seeming Resolution of the French, they were continually alarmed with the Expectation of English Men of War, and it is said keep an armed Vessel or two to look out.—The Enemy being determined to remove all the English from St. John's, and leave only those of the Irish there who would engage on the Side of the French King, they sent to England the Commanding Officer, Captain *Ross*, with the Regulars, in a Vessel provided for that Purpose, some say it was the *Gramont* Frigate:—The Inhabitants were all ordered away on board the respective Vessels provided for them, with very short Allowance of Provisions; and permitted only to take a Bed and Blanket, no more was granted even to those who had Possessions of great Value there:—But it is said this was contrary to the Disposition of the Commander of the Land Forces; whose Behaviour to the English was very humane and generous; though it could not extend far, as he was under the Controul of M. de Tournay; whose cruel Disposition would not allow the least Favour to be granted to the Inhabitants: Which M. *Ossonville* has given out that he will represent to the Court on his Return to France: He gave Liberty to some of the principal Persons that came in the Brig which arrived here, to take some of their own Stock of Poultry for their Voyage, but before they got out of the Harbour, the Commodore ordered most of them to be taken away: He is so severe as to threaten with Death any Englishman that only kills a Hog.

The above Brigantine was given to Capt. *Hearn*, who commanded her when she came in here, on Condition of his carrying from St. John's 92 Englishmen, Women and Chil-

down, to Maryland; he landed 17 of them, at their Desire, at Annapolis, in Nova Scotia, the rest he brought to this Port. Some of the principal Persons who came in her age, William Thomas, Esq; a Merchant of St. John's, whose Family arrived here some Time before; Capt. Shepherd, whose Vessel was taken there; Capt. Kelley, of Rhode-Island, who went into the Harbour of St. John's with his Vessel, after the Prize was taken, as formerly mentioned;—Captain John Johnson, of New-York, and Mrs. John Lewis, of London: These Gentlemen were taken in the Ship Sally, on her Voyage from London to New-York, having a very valuable Cargo on board; she was taken in Lat. 48. Long. 36. by the above-mentioned Caroline Stirling; the Commodore would have confirmed the Vessel, had not the Irish Captain ordered him from it: When they got Possession of the Sally, they had not Sea-men suitable to navigate her; and the Post-rooms, after opening the Hatch, and breaking up some of the Boxes of Goods, destroyed her.—Captain Hearn was also taken in the same Latitude; he was in the Ship Dolphin, bound from Portsmouth to New-Foundland, was taken out of his Vessel, and confined on board the Commodore's Ship.

At 12 o'clock, Friday last arrived here the Captain Phipps and his crew, in 10 Days from Halifax, by whom we learn, that the 8th of June Lord Colville, in his Majesty's Ship Northumberland, and the 10th of June, together with the Gulfport of a French Privateer, Ship King George, of 20 Guns, failed from the Port of St. John's, with the three Vessels, for Placentia in Newfoundland, in order to join his Majesty's Ships Antelope, of 20 Guns, and Stirling, of 20, from whence it is said they are to proceed to the Coast of Labrador, in order to block up the French Ships in that Harbour.

ANNAPOLIS, September 9.

Thursday Night last, Mr. Clark's Store in this Town was broken open, and robbed. Some of the Goods are since found, and two Men are in Goal, on strong Suspicion of being the Perpetrators.

Samuel Hill, William Galt, a young Man, fell from the Round-top of a Ship at Hyl-King, and received so much Hurt, that he died yesterday.

A Gentleman at O'ford, in a Letter of Yesterday Morning, just as the Oxford-Packet failed, writes, "Two Ships are this Morning arrived; but I have not yet seen the Captains, as they are not yet come on shore." [They are from Quebec.]

Monday Evening last, there was a Grand BALL in the Council-House, and other Rejoicings, upon the great and happy Event of taking the HAFENNAB.

It is more than probable, that the Information given us last Week, by the HONEST Virginia Pilot, who said he was on board the Great Man of War at York, was all a Fib; as the Reader will judge by turning his Eye to the last above *Essex* Article.

By Captain CALDWELL, from LONDON, we have the
London Chronicle of the First of July, in which there is the
following most material Intelligence.

From the LONDON GAZETTE EXTRAORDINARY.

ST. JAMES'S, June 30.

THIS Afternoon Lieut. Colonel Boyd, first
Aid-de-Camp to Prince Ferdinand of Brun-
swick, arrived here, being dispatched by his
Serene Highness to the King, with the fol-
lowing Account of a Victory gained by his
Majesty's Forces under his Command, on the
24th Inst. over the French Army commanded by the Mar-
shals D'Etrées and Soubise.

THE French Army has been surprized this Day in their
Camp of Graebenstein, by his Majesty's Forces. The
Marshals D'Etrées and Soubise had encamped their Troops
between that Place and Meibrenken. The Center of their
Army was posted on a very advantageous Eminence, their
left Wing inaccessible by several deep Ravines, and their
Right covered by Graebenstein, several little Rivolets, and
by a Body of Troops, under the Command of M. de Castris,
posted at Carlsdorf. Prince Ferdinand made the following
Dispositions for attacking the Enemy.

General Luckner, who was situated on the Leine, having
Eimbeck in his Front, with six Battalions of Grenadiers,
four Squadrons of Dragoons, and eight Squadrons of Hussars,
to observe Prince Xavier's Motions, who lay encamped with
his Corps de Reserve between the Werra and Gottingen, re-
ceived Orders in the Night, between the 22d and 23d, to
march to Göttingen in the Reinhardt's-Wald, with the Gren-
adiers, four Squadrons of Horse, and his own Regiment of
Hussars. The Hessian Hussars were ordered to remain near
Mohringen, in Order to conceal his March, and to observe
Prince Xavier. M. Luckner began his March from Hollen-
stadt on the 23d at six in the Morning, got to Uslar at Noon,
passed the Weiser at Bodenfeldt at six in the Evening, and
towards Night reached Göttingen. He had Orders to pro-
ceed on the 24th, at three in the Morning, to Mariendorf,
and to form between that Place and Udenhausen.

M. de Sporken passed the Dymel at Sielem, at four in the
Morning, when twelve Battalions of Hanoverians, and part
of the Cavalry of the left Wing, in Order to march by Rein-
hardt's-Wald, between Hombixen and Udenhausen. As
soon as he had formed, he was to attack the Enemy's Corps,
which was posted at Carlsdorf, in Flank, while Luckner
charged their Rear; and, if he succeeded, was to continue
marching in such Manner, as to take the Enemy's Camp at
Graebenstein, both in Flank and Rear.

Prince Ferdinand passed the Dymel at four in the Morning,
with twelve Battalions of the English, eleven Battalions of
Brunswickers, and eight Hessian Regiments, together with
the English Cavalry, and part of the German Cavalry of the
left Wing, with an Intent to draw up behind the Ponds of
Kalle.

The Picquets of the Army formed the Van Guard on the
Left, and the Chasseurs of the English and German Infantry,
commanded by Lord Frederick Cavendish, with Freytag's
Hanoverian Chasseurs, that of the Right, in Order to seize
upon the Langenberg.

The Marquis of Granby was to pass the Dymel at War-
bourg, between two and three o'Clock in the Morning,
with the Reserve under his Command, to march by Zierem-
berg and Ziebelhausen, upon the Eminence which is opposite
to Forstenwald, in Order to fall upon the left Wing of the
Enemy. This whole Plan was put in Execution. We were
in Presence of the Enemy before they had the least Appre-
hension of being attacked. However, M. de Castris had
Time to retreat, and did it with a very small Loss.

Prince Ferdinand came on in the Center, & gained Ground.
The Enemy, seeing themselves attacked in Front, in Flank,
and in Rear, were not long in taking their Parts. They struck
their Tents, and retreated, Prince Ferdinand pursued and
pressed upon them as close as possible; and they would,
without doubt, have been intirely routed, if M. de Stainville
had not thrown himself, with the Grenadiers of France, the
Royal Grenadiers, the Regiment of Aquitaine, and other
Corps, being the Flower of the French Infantry, into the
Woods of Wilhelmshah, to cover their Retreat. That Re-
solution cost him dear; his whole Infantry having been
taken, killed, or dispersed, after a very gallant Defence, ex-
cepting two Battalions, which found Means to get off.
Some of those Troops had before surrendered to Lord Granby's
Corps; and, upon the coming up of the Army, the Re-
mainder, after one Fire, surrendered to the 5th Regiment of
Foot.

Lord Granby acquitted himself upon this Occasion, with
remarkable Valour, and had a great Share in the Victory.

All the Troops behaved extremely well, and shewed great
Zeal and Willingness; but particularly the first Battalion of
Grenadiers, belonging to Colonel Beckwith's Brigade, which
distinguished itself extremely.

The Enemy's Army retreated under the Cannon of Cassel;
and a great Part of it passed very hastily over the Fulda.

We have taken between Two and Three Thousand Prison-
ers, several Standards and Colours. M. Reidesel attacked,
beat, and totally overthrew the Regiment of Fitz-James,
took 300 of their Horses, and their two Standards.

Our Loss in Men is very inconsiderable, amounting only
to between 2 and 300; and we have no Officer of Distinction
killed, except Colonel Townshend.

The French Infantry consisted of 100 Battalions, and the
Allies had no more than 60.

Among the French Prisoners taken in the Action, there
are upwards of 200 Officers. The following is a List of such
of them as we have hitherto been able to procure an Account
of.

general Action wherein the Spaniards were defeated, as was
reported by Way of New-York, and published lately in the
Papers: However, the last Accounts from Portugal are very
favourable; for it is said in Letters from Lisbon, That the
Number of Defectors from the Spanish Army are almost in-
credible, which encourage the Portuguese Troops greatly:
The Reason of this great Desertion is said to be the Want of
Bread among the Spaniards: That the main Body of the
Spanish Army had retreated a considerable Way from the
Frontiers of Portugal: That General Crawford, with what
British Troops he had, followed them, and made a Stand,
until the Troops which were hourly expected from Belleisle
joined him. Some Regiments were also expected from Ireland.

Yesterday several Ships, Snaws, and Brigantines, besides
a Number of Sloops and Schooners, arrived in this Port:
Nine of the Vessels were from Halifax, and had on board
above 700 French Neutrals (commonly so called) that were
collected from several Parts of Nova-Scotia, and sent here.

August 30. Last Thursday Night arrived here a Brig
in 21 Days from St. John's, in Newfoundland, having on board
a Number of Men, Women and Children, late Inhabitants
of that Place, together with about 50 Regulars belonging to
the Garrison, but no Officer of any Note.—This Vessel was
sent from St. John's, in order to proceed for England, and
was commanded by Frenchmen, but not having Provision
for such a Voyage, they confined the Captain and Mate, and
brought the Vessel to this Port, and when they got in here,
they had expended all their Provision, except Bread and Wa-
ter:—By this Brig we learn, that the French are still fortify-
ing the Place, and even oblige the English to work daily on
the Fort, one of which refusing, was instantly shot dead on
the Spot by a Frenchman.

The Brig Thoris, Captain Hale, bound from St. Christo-
phers to Piscataqua, was taken in Lat. 31, Long. 64, on the
8th Inst. by the Prince of Austria Privateer of Porto
Rico, John Tyrell, Commander, and ransomed; the above
Privateer sailed from St. Croix the latter End of July, in
order to cruise between the Capes of Virginia and New-York,
has 10 Carriage Guns, and 76 Men, and had taken two
other Vessels, viz. the Brig Graham, Joseph Fulgham, from
Boston to New Providence, and the Sloop Victory, Joseph
Kennecut, from Guadalupe to Rhode-Island, which Vessels
were also ransomed: The latter for 2000 Pieces of Eight.

N E W - Y O R K, September 2.

Copy of a Letter to a Gentleman in Halifax, dated Liverpool, in
Nova-Scotia, August 4, 1762.

"You find by the Date hereof that I have got into your
Neighbourhood, occasioned by the Misfortune I had of be-
ing taken on the 29th of May last, in the Ship Fairview,
bound from Liverpool in England, to New-York, in Lat. 48,
and Long. 32, from London, by three Sail of French Men
of War, and a Storeship, who carried me and my Vessel into
Newfoundland, the Capital of which, they have taken with-
out firing a Gun, and as I was shipped and re-shipped from
one Man of War to another, before they made Land, I had
an Opportunity of knowing their Force, Situation, and some
of their further Intentions, which I now take the Opportu-
nity of transmitting to you, for Want of Knowledge of the
commanding Officer at your Place (as Mr. Ellis, your Go-
vernor, I know is not yet arrived on the Continent) desiring
it as a Favour, being a Duty I owe to my Country, your
communicating the same to him, and the greatest Satisfac-
tion I can receive will be to find it of Service, and it may
be depended on as true, viz.

Le Robuste, of 74 Guns, Chev. Le Tournay Commodore,
300 Soldiers. L' Eveille, 64, 250 Soldiers. Le Licorne
28, Monf. Celler, 80 Soldiers. Le Garonne, a Store Ship,
26 Guns, M. Clonard, 250 Soldiers, in all 880 Land Forces,
Officers included. M. Clonard, alias Connor, is an Irish
Man, and has been but two Years in the French Service.
It was given out at St. John's, that he was to be Governor,

whereupon 161 of the Irish Passengers, taken in different
Vessels, who were in the late Mutiny in Ireland, called
White Boys, being afraid to return to their own Country,
insisted in the French Service, on board the Garonne, and
other Men of War, as they intend to leave about 730 Sol-
diers in the Garrison, unless they take Placentia, and then
they will leave 500 at St. John's, and 300 at Placentia,
and take what Irish and others they can get to help to work
their Vessels, for I can assure you, that on board the 74
Gun Ship they have not 90 Seamen, and the others are as
badly manned, the Remainder of their Complements being
made up of Landmen and Boys, who are half dead Wretches.

The Licorne was to sail in a few Days after I left the Place,
which was about a Fortnight ago, but could not learn whereto:
However, I suppose it is to meet 2 Store Ships, of about 900
Tons each, which came out of Brest with the Fleet, and went
to Bourdeaux to load Provisions & other Stores for them. The
lower Fort at St. John's was destroyed; but on the Commo-
dore's coming in they set to to rebuild it, and have made
another Row of Pickets round the Grand Fort, and have
erected a 3 Gun Battery on the Shore, to the Northward of
the Chain Rock, about 50 Yards from it, and fixed a Chain,
which they brought from France, with Booms at the Entrance
of the Harbour, in the same Place as usual. The Enemy
have fitted out six Sloops and Schooners with Land Forces,
&c. to go round the Island, to burn and destroy, &c. M.
Gallifoniere, who is third Lieutenant of the Robuste, to re-
trieve the Character of his Uncle Gallifoniere, whom Admi-
ral Hawke trapped, has undertaken an Expedition with
Sloops and Schooners, against Placentia, where, I hope, he
will meet with his Family's Fate. When I was taken I
was carried on board the Robuste, where I found Captain
J. Johnston, of the Ship Sally, who was bound from London
to New-York, and was taken by the aforesaid Fleet on the
26th of May, and Captain F. Hearn, of the Sloop Dolphin,
who was bound from Dartmouth to Newfoundland. I
found the aforesaid Hearn often telling the Officers and
Ship's Crew of the Robuste, that he was well acquainted
with every Harbour and Creek in the Land, and on or about
the 12th of June, he, the aforesaid Hearn, told me, that
the Commodore, Chev. Tournay, and the General of the
Land Forces, had been examining him about St. John's, in
Newfoundland, and other Harbours contiguous thereto, and
offered, nay assured him, that if he would Pilot the Fleet
into St. John's, or other Places in the Land, they would
give him a good Ship and Cargo for his Trouble; the said
Hearn told me he would Pilot them into the Bay of Bulls,
or some other Bays, I am not certain of the Names, if he
was sure they would not go to Ferryland, or some other Har-
bour, as his Owner's Son, and other of his Friends, lived
there. For there was a Merchant in that Bay that had in-
jured him, and was, as he expressed it, a damn'd Rogue, and
often said that the whole Land was peopled with Whores
and Rogues. That on or about the 17th of June, at 11
o'Clock at Night, the French Linguist came down into the
Hold, where Capt. Hearn and I lay, and wanted him to go
to the Commodore, which he did, and stayed away about one
or two Hours. That on the 18th of June, or thereabouts,
being the very next Day, Mr. John Caton, my chief Mate,
and I were ordered overboard in half an Hours warning, with-
out any Reason being assigned for it, and I could not surmise
any, excepting that I told the aforesaid Hearn, at several
Times, if he piloted, or gave the Enemy any Intelligence to
the Prejudice of his Mother Country, he should certainly be
hanged; and on Thursday June 24, the Fleet followed the
Commodore into the Bay of Bulls, excepting the Garonne,
who was piloted by another Person; where they took the
Brig Elizabeth, Capt. Mandville, from Waterford in Ireland,
and after taking out about one half of her Cargo, the Com-
modore and General gave her to the aforesaid Capt. Hearn.

Henry Southerland, Boatfain of the Ship Sally (belonging
to Mr. Buchanan aforesaid) informed me, that Capt. Hearn,
after he got into the Bay of Bulls, told him, that he had
agreed to pilot the Fleet, and at the same Time told him on
what Terms, and to what Places he was to go, and every
Thing relating thereto. It is to be observed, that from the
Morning the Commodore made the Land, all the Prisoners
on board, excepting Capt. Hearn, who staid on Deck, were
kept close confined in the Hold, until the Ship was at An-
chor in the Bay of Bulls; into which Place James Rey-
nolds, Commander of the Schooner Litchet (belonging to
Mr. Nathaniel Brooks in Pool) stood Pilot for the Garonne,
and Moses Cahon, from Waterford in Ireland (who was
Owner of the aforesaid Elizabeth, Capt. Mandville) assisted
in piloting the Commodore into St. John's, as he would cer-
tainly have been on Shore on a Place called Wash Ballacks,
on the North Side of the Entrance of the Harbour, had he
not told them to wear Ship, and work her round; and when
the Fleet got in, the Chevalier de Tournay gave him his
Choice of any Vessel in the Harbour, and he accordingly got
a fine new Ship of 170 Tons, which Capt. Whey, or Way-
land, commanded, and who had arrived but a few Days from
Waterford.

Sept. 6. About 9 o'Clock last Night, Capt. Branscomb
arrived here from St. John's, in Newfoundland, in a Sloop,
with 78 Men, Women and Children, belonging to the dif-
ferent Inhabitants of that Place: He left St. John's the
12th of August, with Provisions scarce enough for one Week,
but he put into Ferryland, and got a small Supply: He con-
firms the Inhumanity of the French to the English Inhabi-

tants, and that between 4 and 500 of the Fishermen were obliged to enter into the French Service or Starve; that several Parties of the French Soldiers had deserted, and gone to the English at Placentia, and other Places; and that a Letter of Marque Schooner, from Madeira, was taken off St. John's Harbour by three Boats from the Men of War, about the 9th of August.

PHILADELPHIA, September 9.

It is said, that the Viceroy of Mexico, and Governor of Carthage, were at the Havannah all the Time of the Siege: That the Governor of the Havannah should have said, That Providence had taken the Place; for that during the Time he had resided there, he never knew a Month, in which there were not Gales of Wind sufficient to have drove the English Fleet on Shore, until the Siege commenced: That the Spanish Officers, it was reported, went to their Governor, in the Time of the general Attack on the Eleventh of August, and told him, That the English Fire was so hot, there was no Possibility of standing by their Guns with any Safety; and that they could not, nor would not, do it any longer: And that during the ten Hours our Batteries played on the Town and Fortifications, 600 Spaniards were killed; but that the Town was not much damaged, the Firing being chiefly against their Forts.

N. B. On the 20th of July, a Spanish 36 Gun Frigate, which enlisted our Lines, and retarded the finishing our Batteries, was sunk in the Harbour; but, in less than an Hour's Time, her Place was supplied by a 74 Gun Ship.

In Addition to the foregoing, we have Advice by the Men of War and Transports arrived at New-York from the Havannah, as follows, viz. "That there were Five Million Sterling, in Specie, found in the Spanish Treasury; and 'twas thought as much more would be got, which had been conveyed into the Country: That two Gallies likewise were taken in the Harbour, and one French 74 Gun Ship: That four Dutch Vessels arrived at the Havannah two Days before our Fleet appeared off, loaded with Ammunition; and 'tis thought without their Assistance the Spaniards could not have held out above a few Days: That there were seven Spanish Men of War of the Line on float in the Harbour; and two of the Line, and one Frigate sunk: That there were two other Frigates burnt, the one by Lightning, the other by our Shells; That the Spanish Garrison was all embarking for Spain as fast as possible; our Troops not to enter the Town till they were gone: That we lost a considerable Number of Officers and private Men during the Siege; and that the Royal Highland Regiment alone lost no less than 17 Officers, and Mr. Johnson, their Chaplain.

"There were 30 Sail of Transports left the Havannah for that Port, having the 17th Regiment, the two Battalions of Royal Highlanders, and Montgomery's on board, mostly sick; but only 15 arrived there, with their Convoy, the Enterprize, of 40 Guns, and Porcupine Men of War, having parted with the others two Days after they left the Havannah; who, 'twas imagined, joined the Fleet from Jamaica of 100 Sail, then beating through for Europe."

Extract of a Letter from New-York, Sept. 6, 1762. JOURNAL of the Siege of the Havannah, from July 30.

"July 30. ABOUT Ten o'Clock the Mine was sprung. At first it was thought not practicable; but it was attempted, and carried, when 150 were killed in the Castle, 300 made Prisoners, and many lost in the Water. The gallant Don Valesco, Governor of the Castle, was wounded; and Don Gonfales, Lieutenant-Governor, killed.

"July 31. A Flag was sent, with Thanks, for the Tenderess shewn Don Valesco, and desiring the Body of Don Gonfales, which could not be found.

"August 1. A Number of Batteries were begun to be erected against the Ponto and the Town.

"August 11. A most tremendous Fire, from all the Batteries, began at Five o'Clock in the Morning, which occasioned the Governor to desire to capitulate.—The Execution done by this Firing was scarcely credible.

"August 12. Was taken up in Messages and Answers.—The Spanish Admiral was extremely averse to giving up his Ships, which was insisted on. But, at last, the Spanish Governor accepted all the Terms that Lord Albemarle would grant, which amounted almost to a Charte Blanche, and the English Army took Possession of the Havannah.—The Capitulation included all that Part of the Island, which was under the Jurisdiction of the Governor of the Havannah.—Our whole

Loss is as follows, viz. 400 killed, 600 wounded, 200 of which died, and 700 dead by Sicknefs."

Copy of a Letter from the Governor of the HAVANNAH, to LORD ALBEMARLE.

"The humane Offers I received from your Excellency in your Letter Yesterday, I find myself obliged to listen to, by the Cries of the Inhabitants, who have experienced the Miseries of War; therefore the Sentiments I expressed to your Excellency, of holding out the Place to the last Extremity, are altered. I now intreat your Excellency for a Truce of Hostilities for the Space of 24 Hours, during which Time no Works shall be carried on in the Fortifications of the City, that I may regulate and submit to your Excellency, the Articles of Capitulation, by which I am ready to surrender the City.—May God preserve you many Years. (Signed) JUAN DEL PRADO."

Our other HAVANNAH Intelligence from New-York is as follows,

"That Eight Millions, in Specie, had been counted, and more expected to be found. That when the Reinforcements arrived from New-York, they were so much wanted, that it was thought the Place could not have been taken without them, there being but about 3000 fit for Duty. That after the last Mine was sprung at the Castle, the Breach would hardly admit three Men, and if well defended, could not have been taken at that Time.—That the Spirit and Ardour of our Seamen, during the Siege, was of the utmost Consequence. That Lord Albemarle has declared, the Booty taken at the Havannah, shall be equally divided among the Land and Sea Forces. That the Shares of the two principal Officers will amount to above 12,000l. per Annum. That Lord Albemarle will sail for England about the First of October. That the English Ships at the Havannah, on the Surrender, were 16 Frigates, and 22 Ships of the Line, besides Captain Campbell, who was broke. That the Spanish Fleet, at the Capitulation, the 13th of August, was 12 Ships of the Line, and three on the Stocks; three of the Ships were sunk at the Harbour's Mouth, and two of their Commanders killed. That the Spaniards had 6000 Sick: That the Spanish Seamen were chiefly employed in the Sallies, and behaved admirably: And that their Blacks fought the Guns."

ANNAPOLIS, September 16.

same Morning saw two Sail which came up with us, notwithstanding our Endeavours to avoid them. They proved to be a Privateer belonging to New-London, and her Consort, belonging to New-York. We then bore away for Cape Nichola, but finding no Ships there, we proceeded for the Havannah: in the Passage we met with the Enterprize Man of War, of 40 Guns, and a Transport, going to take in the Troops that had been cast away upon the Island of Cuba. On the 29th we came in Sight of the 6 Ships which were cast away, they were all bilged, but the Men all saved. The Ships were the Chesterfield Man of War of 40 Guns, and 5 Transports, viz. the Smiling Nancy, the Industry, the Swallow, the Juno, and the Malquerade."

Extract of a Letter from Lisbon, dated July 11, 1762.

"Count de la Lippe Buckebourg, is just arrived as Commander in Chief of all the Forces here; great Things are Expected from his great Abilities; the Prince of Mecklenburgh is also arrived, with a great many other Officers, he is to command a Regiment of Portuguese Horse; Lord Loudon is every Hour expected here; General Crawford is up with the Portuguese Army, instructing them, he is in great Esteem here and at Court; Lord Tyrwley, it is said, is going Home again. Capt. Sawyer, in the Active of 28 Guns, and Capt. Pownall, in the Favourite of 16 Guns, have taken a Spanish South Sea Man, with upwards of a Million of Money, some say a Million and a Half, without Doubt it is thought to be the richest single Prize that ever was taken."

Extract of a Letter, received this Morning at Ten o'Clock, dated Hartford, Sept. 6, 1762.

"I give you Joy of the great Success of Prince FERDINAND over the French Army on the 24th of June, as per London Gazette extraordinary, which Mr. Chew received last Friday Night, by a Vessel just arrived from Scotland, at New-London, in a short Passage. He says we killed and took 5000 of the Enemy, among which are a great Number of Officers, with all their Baggage and Cannon, &c."

"Of late the Spaniards have made but little Progress on our Frontiers; Defection, and the Want of Provisions, have been severely felt among them; and some Advices say, that now Sickness prevails. The Count De la Lippe Buckebourg, a German General, of great Reputation, and the Prince of Mecklenburgh Strelitz, are arrived; Lord Loudon is also daily expected, and four British Regiments of Foot from Belleisle.—Admiral Hawke, according to our last Advices, was coming out, but where designed, not certainly known.—The Active Frigate, Captain Sawyer, and the Favourite Sloop, Captain Pownall, have taken a Spanish Register Frigate, called The Hermione, from the South Seas, and carried her to Gibraltar, said to be worth from six to Seven Hundred Thousand Pounds Sterling; some Letters say more. It is said there is Intelligence of more such Ships coming to Europe, and that our Men of War are on the Look-out.—Sweden has followed the Example of Russia, in making Peace with Prussia; and, it is said, Overtures are made from Saxony for the same Purpose; so that we hope the Empress Queen must soon find herself obliged to accede, that Peace may be restored to all Germany, as it may influence the rest of the belligerent Powers to accommodate Matters the sooner."

Another Letter from Lisbon, of July 3, mentions four Spanish Vessels being carried in there by two small Privateers; three of which said to be loaded at Cadiz, for the Fleet at Ferrol.

By a Letter from the Havannah, come to Hand since our last, we learn, that besides the twelve Spanish Ships of the Line found in the Harbour at the Surrender of the Place, there were likewise nine Frigates, and about 30 Sail of Merchantmen there: That our Men of War had taken four Frigates, one of which of 24, and another of 18 Guns, said to be exceeding rich Vessels: And that we had lost a great many Soldiers and Sailors, who went a plundering the Villages, but generally fell in with the Enemy's Light Horse, who murdered them in the cruelest Manner, by cutting out their Tongues, and mangling them in a most horrid Manner, such as a Regard to Decency forbids to mention.

ANNAPOLIS, September 23.

The Provincial Grand Jury last Week, found a Bill against Michael Peck, a Dutchman, of Frederick County, for the Murder of Mr. George Jacob Poe, in July last, by Shooting him thro' the Body: To which he pleaded Guilty.

Thomas Cooper, an Englishman, a Servant belonging to this Town, was likewise Indicted for House-breaking, and the Jury found him Guilty. Saturday last both the Criminals received Sentence of Death.

On Sunday last, a little Boy, about three Years old, Son to Mr. Beard of this County, was bit by a Mad Dog in the Face, his Nose and Cheeks being mangled by him in a most shocking Manner. This Dog was bit a few Weeks before by another Mad Dog, which was killed; and altho' he had shewed Signs of Madness, yet they neglected to kill him, till after the above unhappy Accident.

Yesterday a very valuable Negro Lad, belonging to a Gentleman of this Town, was found dead over Severn. He was sent out to catch a Horse, and staying longer than usual, upon Search, the Horse was found with a Bridle on, and the Boy lying dead, having received some Blow on the Head, but how it was done, is not known.

MADRID, June 15.

THE King has sent to the Sovereign Tribunals his Declaration of War against Portugal, which runs thus:

NEITHER my Representations, founded in Justice and Utility, nor the fraternal Persuatives with which I accompanied them, have been able to alter the King of Portugal's blind Affection for the English. His Ministers, engaged by long Habit, continue obstinate in their Partiality, to the great Prejudice of his Subjects; and I have met with nothing but Refusal, and been insulted by his injurious Preference of the Friendship of England to that of Spain and France. I have even received a personal Affront by the Arresting of my Ambassador, Don Joseph Torrero, at Estremoz, who was detained there in Violation of his Character, after he had been suffered to depart from Lisbon, and had arrived on the Frontiers in Virtue of Passports from that Court; but notwithstanding such Insults were powerful Motives for me to keep no longer any Measures with the King of Portugal, nevertheless, adhering to my first Resolution of not making an offensive War against the Portuguese, unless forced to it, I deferred giving Orders to my General to treat them with the Rigour of War; but having read the Edict of the King of Portugal of the 18th of last Month, in which, misrepresenting the upright Intentions of the Most Christian King and myself, he imputes to us a pre-concerted Design of invading his Dominions, and orders all his Vassals to treat us as Enemies, and to break off all Correspondence with us, both by Sea and Land; and forbids the use of all Productions coming from our Territories, confiscating the Goods of the French and Spaniards, and likewise ordering them to leave Portugal in a Fortnight, which Term, however straight, has been further abridged, and many of my Subjects have been expelled, plundered, and ill-treated before the Expiration of it. And the Marquis de Sarria having found, that the Portuguese, ungrateful to his Goodness and Moderation, and the Exactness with which they have been paid for every thing they have furnished for my Troops, have proceeded so far as to excite the People and Soldiers against my Army; so that it would be dishonourable to carry my Forbearance any farther. For these Causes I have resolved, that from this Day my Troops shall treat Portugal as an Enemy's Country, that the Property of the Portuguese shall be confiscated throughout my Dominions, that all the Portuguese shall leave Spain in a Fortnight, and that all Commerce

Lisbon, June 26. Advices which have been received from the Provinces, from the 5th Instant to this Day:

B E I R A.

Almeida, June 12. By a Letter of this Date, we are informed, that the Enemy, to the Number of Eight Thousand Men, has entered the Frontier, and is encamped between Val de la Mulla and Val de Coelho, a League from Almeida; that several Parties had fallen forth from the Camp, and had pillaged the Villages upon that Frontier, and had not even spared the Churches; but that these Parties had been driven back by the Portuguese Militia, who had killed and taken Prisoners upwards of 200 Spaniards; and that there was a great and frequent Defection from this Corps.

From the same Place we have Advices of the 18th of this Month, that the Spaniards then remained in the same Camp, without any other News, than that they continued to send out Parties to guard the Cattle, which they could find dispersed about the Fields.

M I N H O.

Amarante, June 20. The Advices received from the Province of Tras-os-Montes are, That the Spanish Army in this Province is divided into three Corps; the principal Body is encamped at Duas Igrejas, near Miranda; another of 5000 Men at Torre de Moncorvo; and a third, of the same Number of Troops, near Chaves.

Those who retired from Villa Real, and Mirandella, towards Miranda, were attacked upon their March by the Militia, which were posted at the Villa poucha de Aguar, who killed some of the Spaniards, and took twenty odd Prisoners, which were sent to the Head Quarters.

We have Advice of the 22d, that a Convoy of Sixty Mules, laden with Provisions, had been taken from the Enemy about two Leagues from Chaves.

The same Advices add, that the Spaniards are preparing to invade this Province in different Places.

L O N D O N, July 1.

Yesterday was presented to the King a Letter from a Nabob in the East-Indies, inclosed in a Gold Box about ten Inches long, curiously wrought; brought by one of the India Ships that arrived this Week in the River.

July 6. Letters from Vienna of the 16th mention, that the Prince de Galiczin, Minister from the Court of Russia, had lately an Audience of the Empress Queen, which lasted but 15 Minutes, when he demanded, in the Name of his Principal, the Restitution of all the Protestant and Greek Churches in Hungary, that have been taken away from those People in a very unjust Manner.

Extract of a Letter, dated Camp near Ober Weimer, June 25. "Our Success over the Enemy Yesterday near Wilhelmshahl, was equal in its Consequences to most of our former Victories, of which the sudden Retreat of the Enemy last Night over the Fulda, and the Numbers of the Prisoners and Trophies, may be looked upon as convincing Proofs,

In short, it was a Victory obtained by the Greatness of our Chief, and the Alacrity and good Countenance of our Troops. It is allowed to be the completest Surprise that has been executed this War. The Enemy's Loss is computed at 5000; our's is inconsiderable; so that we have conquered the Enemy without impairing our own Army. Our Grenadier Company being detached in Front to cover two Pieces of Cannon, were surrounded by three Regiments of French Cavalry, and made Prisoners. This was all the Loss we sustained."

A Confirmation is come to the Admiralty of the Capture of the Spanish Register Ship, with this Addition, that she is valued at One Million One Hundred Thousand Pounds. Some say that 300,000 l. is English Property; others, that our Insurers will lose 300,000 l.

The Prince de Soubise's Plate is taken. The French have also lost 17 Pieces of heavy Cannon.

The Chevalier de Muy, and several other General Officers, lost all their Baggage. No General or Staff-Officer of the French, it is said, was killed or wounded.

On the 25th the Hereditary Prince in Person, at the Head of 400 Horse, made an Attack on a Body of the Prince de Conde's Army, commanded by M. de Conflans, but was repulsed, and his Highness himself made Prisoner by two Hussars, who were bringing him away, when 40 of Bock's Dragoons came up and rescued him.

The Report of a Cessation of Hostilities between the Courts of Berlin and Dresden is not confirmed. Nor is that Event expected without the Consent of the Austrians.

There are some Advices which say, that the Spaniards have received a severe Check near Almeida.

The following is a Translation of the Decree, or Declaration of War, issued by Order of his Portuguese Majesty against the Crown and Subjects of Spain, on the 23d of May, 1762.

W Joseph Torrero, in Conjunction with Don Jacob O'Dunne, Minister Plenipotentiary of France, by their Representations, and the Answers I have given thereto, it appears that one of the Projects agreed on between the aforesaid Powers in the Family Compact was, to dispose of these Kingdoms as if they were their own; to invade them, to occupy them, and usurp them, under the incompatible Pretext of assisting me against Enemies, which they supposed for such, that never existed; and whereas different General Officers of his Catholick Majesty have successively, since the 30th of April last, spread various Papers through my Dominions, prescribing Laws and Sanctions to my Subjects, invading at the same Time my Provinces with an Army divided into various Bodies, attacking my fortified Places, and perpetrating all the aforesaid Hostilities, under Pretence of directing them to the Advantage and Glory of my Crown and of my Subjects, and in such Light even the Catholick King himself has represented the Case to me; and whereas notwithstanding all these contradictory and unheard of Motives, an Offensive War has been made against me, contrary to Truth and Justice, by the aforesaid two Monarchs, thro' mutual Consent: I have ordered it to be made known to all my Subjects, that they hold all Disturbances or Violations of the independent Sovereignty of my Crown, and all Invaders of my Kingdom, as public Aggressors and declared Enemies; that from henceforward, in natural Defence, and necessary Retortion, they be treated as Aggressors and declared Enemies in all and every Sense; and that to oppress them in their Persons and Effects, all military Persons, and Others, authorised by me, make Use of the most executive Means, which in these Cases are supported by all Laws; and that in like Manner, all said military and every other Person or Persons, of whatever Rank, Quality or Condition they be, quit all Communication and Correspondence with the said Enemies, under the Penalties decreed against Rebels and Traitors. I likewise order that all the Subjects of France and Spain,

residing in this City, or in the Kingdoms of Portugal and Algarva, retire within the precise Term of 15 Days, to reckon from the Day of the Publication of this Decree, otherwise they shall be treated as Enemies, and their Effects confiscated; and that in all the wet as well as dry Ports of this Kingdom all Commerce and Communication cease with the aforesaid Monarchies of France and Spain, all Fruits, Manufactures or Goods of any Kind, of the Produce of said Monarchies, be deemed contraband, and the Entry, Sale and Use of them, be prohibited. Ordered that this Decree be affixed and transmitted to every County, that it may come to the Knowledge of all my Subjects. I have given Orders to the Intendant General of the Police to grant Passports to all the aforesaid, who have entered these Kingdoms *bona fide*, on their Business, that they be permitted to retire unmolested.

July 8. Commodore Young, in his Majesty's Ship Guernsey, has blocked up at Caen, 13 flat-bottomed Boats, that were under the Convoy of four armed Vessels going to Brest.

Advice is received by the Flanders Mail, that the Toulon Fleet, having been joined by some Spanish Men of War, consists of 16 Ships of the Line, and two Frigates, and was ready to put to Sea with Troops on board, and a large Quantity of Warlike Stores; and that Admiral Saunders, having received Intelligence of their being ready to sail, had left Gibraltar, and was cruising off Toulon, with 18 Ships of the Line, and 4 Frigates, in order to meet them, that there are two more Ships equally rich with the Spanish Register Ship lately taken, expected home from the South Seas, and that Lord Anson, about a Month before he died, had Intelligence of them, and gave Instructions accordingly.

The above Register Ships mount 26 Guns each, and well manned; and it is said that 125,000 l. is insured here on one, and 50,000 l. on the other.

We hear that the Spaniards have declared, that they will take all Neutral Ships they meet with, that are bound to or from any of the British Ports.

The last Letters from Silesia inform us, that a scorbutic Distemper rages so much in the Austrian Army, that few Regiments have less than two or three Hundred Men seized with it, most of whom are carried off by it.

July 10. The Marshal d'Etrees, who piqued himself on knowing the Country of Hesse as well as any of the Natives, and who had exact Intelligence of the Situation of Prince Ferdinand's Army, is said to have formed a Design of surprising it, at least that Corps which was commanded by his Serene Highness in Person; which was to have been executed upon the 25th, if he had not been himself surprized on the 24th, by Motions so happily contrived, and executed with such Precision, that the French were attacked in three Quarters of an Hour in Front, Flank, and Rear.

We hear that Sir Edward Hawke is ordered to make the quickest Passage he can to the Groyne, where he is to send a Flag of Truce on Shore, with a Letter to be forwarded to the Spanish Court, to demand an immediate Evacuation of the Spanish Troops from Portugal, and to allow a certain Number of Days for an Answer; and if they refuse to comply with our Demands, the Admiral is to proceed immediately to Naples, and there make Reprisals.

Yesterday Advice came, that a Spanish Advice Ship from the Havannah, bound to Cadiz, is taken by one of our Men of War.

Two Guernsey Privateers have taken two French Vessels, bound with Naval Stores to Marseilles.
