MADRID, February 16.

**A**BODY of Troops, consisting of Eighteen Thousand Men, is marching towards Cadiz, to secure that Place from any hostile Attempts. Some other Corps, less considerable, are filing off towards the Confines of Portugal.

Paris, March 5. This Moment a Report is spread, that the King of Portugal, far from refusing to be neuter, as was generally expected, has declared for England; and that this is the Reason why the Court of Spain, who suspected such a Turn, makes so much Haste to put her Land Forces in a Condition to take the Field; yet some Circumstances prevent our giving entire Credit to this News, so that we must wait for a Confirmation of it.

Lisbon, Feb. 20. The Thunderer, Anson, and Montague, arrived here the 11th Instant from Sir Charles Saunders's Squadron, to take in Provisions. The Arethusa Frigate, in her Way from Gibraltar, having lost her Main-mast, put into this Port to refit. Captain Vane, who commands her, has taken two Prizes, one of which he sent to Gibraltar: the other is the Guerrier, of 500 Tons, and 24 Guns, laden with Provisions, and bound from Bourdeaux to Martinico: She is come into this Port.

Stargard, March 12. A Sort of Congress will be held in this Town; the Plenipotentiaries on the Side of Russia are to be the Field Marshal Count Soltikoff, Lieutenant General Prince Wilkowsky, and Major General Berg; and on the Part of Prussia, the Prince of Brunswick-Bevern, Governor of Stettin, with some other General Officers. Fifteen Houses are already hired for them and their Retinue.

Madrid, March 2. Above 9000 Mules have been purchased for the Service of the Army destined for the Siege of Gibraltar. The Troops allotted for the Army of Observation continue filing off towards Estremadura. Several Detachments arrived at Badajoz above a Month ago, and are employed in fortifying that Frontier Town, tho' there is nothing to be feared from the Portuguese.

Paris, March 15. It is assured, that we shall have upwards of 140,000 good Troops this Year in Germany.

A Fleet of Fifty English Ships, Men of War and Transports, has been lately despatched off Rochfort. Amongst them were four Fire-ships.

Berlin, March 20. This Day was published in our Gazette, the following Convention, relative to a Suspension of Arms between our King and the Emperor of Russia.

Art. I. There shall be a Cessation of all Hostilities from henceforth between the Russian and Prussian Troops every where, both on one Side and the other.

Art. II. The Suspension of Arms between the Troops commanded by Prince Wilkowsky and the Prussian Forces, shall commence from the Signing of these Presents, and with respect to the different Corps in Poland and Silesia, it shall take Place from the Day of the Arrival of the Couriers, which, after Signing this Convention, shall be dispatched with an Account thereof, according to Orders already given for that Purpose by his Prussian Majesty.

Art. III. During this Armistice the Oder shall be the Limits between the two Armies in Pomerania, and the New Marche, which neither of them shall pass. Notwithstanding this Regulation, the Garrisons of Stettin, Cultrin and Dam, may send their Patrols to the Villages named Chriilianburg, Barenbruck, Buckholtz, Klebirt and Zorndorf, situated on the other Side of the Oder, and even to Wartia, but no further on any Pretext whatever. Nor shall the Russians extend their Posts beyond their Villages.

Art. IV. None of his Prussian Majesty's Troops shall enter upon the Territories of Poland on any Account during this Armistice.

Art. V. The Russian Troops shall not touch the Frontiers of Silesia while this Treaty lasts.

Art. VI. The King of Prussia shall grant to the Troops commanded by Count Czernicheff, at the Requisition of that General, a free Passage through Silesia, and supply the Army during their March with Provisions, Forage and necessary Carriages, to the Frontiers of Poland.

Art. VII. This Corps shall observe in it's Passage the most exact Discipline, and treat the Inhabitants as Friends.

Art. VIII. During this Suspension of Arms there shall be a mutual friendly Correspondence and Freedom of Commerce by Sea and by Land, between the two Armies, and wherever Passports are needed, they shall be immediately granted, by the respective Generals, as Occasions require.

Art. IX. This Treaty shall continue till the two Courts make a further Determination, and the Party inclining to break it off, shall give 15 Days Notice to the other before Hostilities shall be renewed between them.

The two Generals, upon their Arrival at Stargard, signed this Treaty, and are now settling the Articles relative to the Exchange of Prisoners already made.

Stargard, in Pomerania, March 18. Since the Signing of the Convention for a Suspension of Arms between Russia and Prussia, the two Generals Plenipotentiaries continue their Conferences regularly, but without observing any the least Ceremony. We are assured they are actually settling the Exchange of Prisoners of War: This Exchange is indeed already executed; but it is necessary to state the Debts contracted on both Sides, and see how they may be discharged; after which, the Plenipotentiaries will agree about every Thing that is to be observed at the Evacuation of all Brandenburg Pomerania.

LONDON, March 15.

The Roman, Capt. Dubert, of 16 Guns, and 200 Men, belonging to Dunkirk, is taken by the Essex Man of War.

The Cerbere and Anguste, two French Privateers of St. Maloes, of 14 Guns each, are taken and brought into Plymouth by the Tartar Frigate.

The Villevegu, of and for Port l'Orient from the Isle of Bourbon, with 4000 Bales of Coffee, and the Squirrel Frigate from Brest, with Dispatches for Martinico, mounting 10 Guns, and 80 Men, were sent into Plymouth on the 10th Instant, by the Fame and Lion Men of War.

They write from Lisbon, that his Majesty's Ship Arethusa, Capt. Vane, has taken a Ship of 500 Tons, laden with Flour, and another of 200 Tons, with Merchandize, both bound from Mar-seilles to St. Domingo.

They write from Dublin, that 5000 Roman Catholics are to be raised in Ireland, to consist of five Regiments of 1000 Men each, to be sent to Portugal, to be commanded by Irish Officers of the same Religion, and subject to the civil and military Laws of Great-Britain and Ireland.

The Honourable William Pitt, Esq; is indisposed at his House in St. James's-Square.

March 16. The Halifax Packet-Boat is arrived at Falmouth from New-York, in 24 Days, with two Mails.

An Admiral will shortly sail with several Ships of the Line, Frigates, &c. with a Draught of Matroses, Forces, and warlike Stores, for Jamaica. Upon his Arrival there he will be appointed Commander in Chief.

All Officers of Regiments now abroad, except-

ing such as are out on Recruiting Parties, whether in Garrison or elsewhere, are ordered to join their Corps forthwith.

The last Letters from Vienna advise, that the Proposals of Peace made by the King of Prussia, were, after mature Deliberation, judged to be inadmissible, and that thereupon Orders were given to all the Officers to join their respective Regiments by the 4th of March.

It is reported that a new Treaty is on the Carpet between Russia, Prussia, Denmark, and Great-Britain, in Consequence of which Denmark is to renounce all Right and Title to the Duchy of Holstein, and in Exchange thereof is to be put in Possession of two of the Neutral Islands in the West-Indies.

March 17. From Vienna we are told, that the Empress Queen augments her Troops, for the approaching Campaign, by 50000 Men; and that the Funds for this Augmentation are already found for this Year, and the next too.

Monday a Packet of French Letters, taken on board a Merchant Ship bound for Martinico, by the Fame and Lion Men of War, was brought to the Admiralty-Office, and is said to be a most valuable Acquisition.

March 20. According to a Letter from a good Hand, received at Hanover the 5th of this Month, Affairs stood on so good a Footing between Russia and Prussia, that they reckoned the Preliminaries of a Reconciliation were actually signed.

By Letters from Lisbon, &c. it now appears, that the Portuguese, with their Allies, are forwarder in their Armaments, and would be ready to take the Field before the Spaniards.

Orders are given for all the English, Scotch and Irish Traders, to leave the Kingdom of France.

The Czar has ordered a considerable Sum to be distributed among the Inhabitants of Pomerania, which is occupied by the Russians, to repair, in some Measure, the Losses they have sustained by the War.

Last Post from Bilboa brought a Letter from Capt. Wallis, dated Feb. 8, which says, that the Commissary had given Orders for all the English Ships in that Port to be got ready for sailing, and they expected Passports from Madrid by the ensuing Post.

Thursday the Commissioners of the Navy contracted for several Ships to carry Troops to Germany to augment the Army there; a plain Proof that the Continental War is to be carried on with Vigour, and consequently that the Schemes of the late Minister are held in Esteem, and will be followed.

March 22. By private Letters by the last Dutch Mail Advice was received, that on the 9th Instant, at One in the Morning, all the Streets leading to the Place de Greve at Paris, were beset by the French and Swiss Guards, that no Person might go to see what passed there; but that it was nevertheless known, that three Persons of the first Distinction were beheaded at that Hour; but that their Names and their Crimes were still a Secret.

Saturday a great Quantity of Bedding, Tents and Poles, with Small Arms, Musket Balls, &c. were shipped from the Tower on board Transports, going round to Spithead, to join the Expedition Fleet fitting out there for Sir Edward Hawke.

March 23. Major Gates, and Capt. Darby, of the Devonshire Man of War, who brought the agreeable Dispatches from Martinico, came to England in the Nightingale Man of War. The Major came to Lord Egremont's on Monday Morning at two o'Clock. At Noon there was a numerous Court to compliment his Majesty on the important Conquest, gained with the Loss of only 96 killed, including 7 Officers; 389 wounded, including 32 Officers; and 22 private Men missing. About two o'Clock the happy News was announced to the Public by the Guns of the Tower, and those in the Park; and in the Evening there were Bonfires and Illuminations in many Parts of London and Westminster.

His Majesty's Frigate Venus is arrived at Plymouth from a Cruise, and has brought in the Lovely Joseph this street, of and from St. Sebastian, of 12 Guns, and 200 Men.



The Venetian Frigate, of Bayonne, of 12 Guns, and 100 Men, is taken by the Bellona and Juno Men of War, and sent into Plymouth. This Privateer had taken, on the 24th of January, the Wolf, Whitty, &c. and from Marblehead for Lisbon.

March 24. A Letter from Ratibon, March 17, has the following Article. In the present State of Things, there is no assuming with Certainty; and therefore, the following Preliminaries, handed about here, are given to the Public for their Speculation.

1. His Prussian Majesty Guarantees to the Emperor of all the Russian, the Country of Holstein.

2. His Imperial Majesty Guarantees to the King of Prussia all Silesia, and the Country of Cleve.

3. The King shall give the House of Anhalt Zerbst Fifteen Tons of Gold by Way of Indemnification.

4. As soon as the Prussians evacuate the Principality of Anhalt Zerbst, the Russians shall evacuate Pomerania.

5. The Russian Corps under General Czernichef shall immediately suspend Hostilities.

6. The Treaty between the two Crowns being dissolved, signed, and ratified, the Russians will evacuate the Kingdom of Prussia.

7. Twenty Thousand Russians shall join the Army of Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick to recover Cleve.

8. All Prisoners of War on both Sides shall be released without Ransom.

9. The King shall grant a free Passage thro' his Dominions for 20,000 Russians to march into Holstein.

There are already several Ships put up upon Change, and other Places, for Martinico.

It is said that the Right Hon. the Earl of Egremont will shortly refuse the Seals on Account of his great Indisposition.

And it is also said, that Lord Melcombe, or the Hon. George Grenville, Esq. will succeed him.

By our last Advices from Portugal we are assured, that every Precaution has been taken to give the Spaniards a proper Reception in case they should attempt to invade Portugal; and that they were in daily Expectation of seeing an English Fleet in the River Tagus, as well as some British Forces to assist them.

Yesterday several Transports fell down the River, who are ordered with all Expedition to proceed to Portsmouth, to take Troops on board.

We learn a French East Indiaman is taken by Capt. Kennedy in one of our Frigates, which is worth 130,000 l. and is carried into Lisbon.

Some pretend, that as soon as the Empress Queen receives certain Advice of the Convention being signed between Russia and Prussia, she will accept of the Terms of Peace that have been proposed to her.

A great Advantage, among others, resulting from our having taken Martinico, is, that 3 or 4 Men of War of the Line, with a few Frigates, will be now sufficient for the Leeward Island Station; whereby we may reckon upon our having 10 or 12 more Line of Battle Ships at Liberty to act against his Majesty's Enemies, upon any future Undertakings which shall be thought expedient, in order to force them to yield to such a Peace, as by the Success of our Arms, and the Justice of our Cause, we are intitled to.

March 25. A French Privateer from Brest, of 10 Guns, and 100 Men, is taken by the Coventry Man of War, Capt. Carpenter, and carried into Kinsale.

Tuesday the third Payment of 660,000 l. was paid by the Subscribers at the Bank towards the Loan of 12 Millions for the Service of the current Year.

March 26. By a Letter from Belleisle, dated the 10th Instant, we learn, that the Governor was to embark for Portugal the next Day; and that it was expected that the Troops would soon follow, and the Fortifications be demolished.

Extract of a Letter from Portsmouth, March 24.

" Came into Harbour the Sequier French Privateer, of 12 Guns, and 116 Men, taken and sent in by his Majesty's Ship Adventure, Capt. Middleton."

March 29. We learn that the King of Portugal hath at length made a definitive Declaration to the Court of Madrid, importing, that his Most Faithful Majesty having no Grievances to allege, either against Spain or Great-Britain, and having no Engagements, offensive or defensive, with either of those two Crowns, he was firmly resolved to observe the strictest Impartiality with respect to the Rupture that hath happened between them; that consequently, he would permit both English and Spanish Ships to enter his Ports, provided they should conform to the Regulations established in all the maritime Places in Europe: But that if, contrary to all Expectation, an Attempt should be made to compel him, by Violence, to depart from this Neutrality, and thus to encroach on his Rights as a Sovereign, he would oppose it with his whole Force, &c.

March 29. Two or three Expresses are arrived from Peterborough, Berlin, &c. and it is said, that a Treaty, offensive and defensive, between Russia and Prussia, is as good as concluded.

It is now said that 1,200,000 l. more will be raised for the Service of the present Year, but by what Means is not yet known, though generally thought by Exchequer Bills.

Orders are given for Six Thousand Men to march to Falmouth, where they are to embark for Portugal.

March 30. A Squadron of 9 Ships of the Line is equipped at Ferrol, and only wait for sailing Orders from Madrid, as appears by Letters from thence, of the 25th of last Month.

About 2000 Men are draughted out of the Guards, who will shortly embark for Germany.

His Majesty has granted a handsome Present to be given to Major Gates, who brought over the agreeable News of the Reduction of the best Part of the Island of Martinico; and it is said he will soon have the Command of a Regiment.

April 1. A Letter from Ratibon brings a Confirmation, that the Russian General Czernichef did not take Leave of any Body at Vienna, when he set out on his Return to his Troops in the County of Glatz. The same Letter says, that the Imperial Court has assured the Circles that the Prisoners of their Contingents will soon be exchanged against the Prussian in their Hands, Field Marshal Count Serbelloni

having already begun a Negotiation for this Purpose with the Margrave Charles of Brandenburg.

Letters from Berlin, of the 16th Instant, inform us, that the King of Prussia was expected there the Middle of April, by which Time the Peace between him and the Emperor of Russia will be quite settled and ratified. It is added, that the Embassy was already transferred from Magdebourg to that Metropolis.

April 2. Letters from Berlin of the 14th ult. say, that 2000 Prussian Soldiers (who were lately Prisoners to the Russians) were daily sent there from Prussian Pomerania.

April 3. The French Indiaman brought into Plymouth by the Bedford, is the St. Prieste, bound from the Isle of Bourbon to Port l'Orient, laden with 10,000 Bales of Coffee, besides Pepper, Rattens, and Ebony. She was taken by the Expedition Fleet under Sir George Pocock.

His Majesty's Frigates Brilliant, Sapphire, Venus and Zetous, are ordered out from the western Ports, to cruise for a Month, one off Scilly, and the others further to the Westward, to protect the homeward bound Merchantmen.

The Convoy for the Leeward Islands and Jamaica, is appointed to be ready at Portsmouth the 15th of this Month.

By Letters from different Parts of Spain they write, that they have a great Number of Privateers ready for Sea, but not half manned, and most of those which they have got are afflicted with the black Fever, which carries off Numbers daily.

Col. Borgeyne's Regiment of Light Horse are ordered to Portugal, and will embark for that Kingdom in Easter Week. These are the only Horse that are ordered on that Service.

April 6. Last Thursday his Majesty's Frigate the Milford arrived at Plymouth from a Cruise, having lost her Main and Mizzen Masts on the 9th ult. off Madeira, in an Engagement with the Glory, a French Letter of Marque of 16 Guns, and 90 Men, bound from Port Passage to St. Domingo. Captain Man, Commander of the Milford, had his Leg shot off, and died soon after the Glory struck. The first Lieutenant, Mr. Day, was also killed, and only one Man besides. The French had six Men killed, and eight or nine wounded. The Glory is sent to Bristol. The above Frigate was built at Milford, the first King's Ship ever built there, and was sent to convey the Trade safe to the Sea, and in her Return had this Engagement.

We hear there will be another Draft in a few Days from the Train of Artillery at Woolwich.

Extract of a Letter from Ratibon, March 18.

" It is probable that the General Armistice between the Russians and Prussians, will be followed by a separate Peace; but it is believed the new Monarch of Russia is strenuously endeavouring to bring the Empress-Queen also to a Reconciliation with the King of Prussia. In the mean Time it is computed, that the Prussian Troops employed against the Russians, including those made Prisoners, but actually released, amount to about 50,000: So that if the War continues, the King of Prussia must regain the Ascendant over Austria. A Letter from a good Hand says, that several Russian Officers have already asked Permission of their Sovereign to make the Campaign as Volunteers, some in the King of Prussia's Army, and others under Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick."

We are informed, that there have been 16 Duels fought among some of the principal Officers of the French Army in Germany; and that six of them have taken Shelter in Prince Ferdinand's Army.

A private Letter from Paris, says, that M. Lally, late Commander of the French Forces at Pondicherry, in the East-Indies, was one of the three Persons of Distinction lately executed at the Greve in that City.

The extraordinary Rise of Stocks last Week was occasioned, we are told, by the Report of a new Negotiation being set on Foot with France. It is represented, that Mr. George Pitt, the King's Envoy to the King of Sardinia, going to Court whilst he staid at Paris, in his Way to Turin, the Duke de Choiseul took an Opportunity to enter into a Conversation with him; and among other Things, signified the King his Master's Desire to renew the Negotiation with England, and proposed that Mr. Pitt should forward to London a Letter to that Effect. Mr. Pitt excused himself from transmitting this Letter, as he had received no Instructions on that Head; but promised to mention in his own Letters what the Duke had said. He accordingly sent the Substance of their Conference in a private Letter to his Cousin, the late Secretary of State, who laid it before his Majesty. A Council was summoned; and soon after an Answer was returned to Mr. George Pitt. It is said, that we will listen to no Proposals, unless France will send over a Minister with full Powers to sign Preliminaries at once.

April 7. Yesterday Morning an Express arrived from Lisbon, with Advice, that the Spaniards were actually marching towards the Frontiers of Portugal. This Express came over in one of the Packet Boats, which has brought very few Letters.

Extract of a Letter from a Merchant in Amsterdam.

" Our Merchants here have been equally surprized and concerned on receiving the News of the Conquest of Martinico; surprized, because they expected a much longer Resistance; concerned, because their Trade to St. Eustatia is now entirely abolished; it being well known that Island has not produced sufficient to load a single Ship annually. By the Account you send us of this Expedition, it appears that the English themselves were astonished that the French should so soon capitulate. It must be confessed, the English are brave; every Place must yield to their Arms: It has been said upon Change on this Occasion, that if Hell produced Sugar, the English would conquer it, provided the French were to defend it."

April 8. By Advices from different ports in Spain, the English Shipping remain in the same uncertain State; nothing having been yet resolved on by the Spanish Court.

It is assured, by Letters which arrived on Tuesday from Lisbon, that the Portuguese had between 30 and 40,000 men in their pay, and that 28,000 new muskets have been received from hence.

His Prussian Majesty has ordered a Train of 150 pieces of heavy Cannon, with immense Quantities of military Stores and Ammunition, to be sent to Breslau, whence it is believed he will open the Campaign with the siege of Schweidnitz. The Army which is to form that siege will be commanded by an experienced General, and his Majesty will be at the Head of the Army that covers it, with his Nephew the Prince Royal, and his Brother Prince Frederick.

Last Night an Express, preceded by several Horsemen and Horns, arrived from the North at Whitehall with some Expresses; the Contents of which are not known.

Yesterday morning early a messenger was dispatched to the Court of Lisbon.

Admiralty-Office, March 15. His Majesty's Ship the Rix, commanded by Capt. Schomberg, being upon a Cruise on the 9th Instant, took off Upland the Renaim, of Dunkirk, a French Privateer of 20 Carriage Guns, mostly Six-pouncers, besides Sawgalls, with 130 Men, commanded by M. de Cui, and has sent her into Portsmouth.

His Majesty's Ship the Tartar, commanded by Capt. John Knight, being also upon a Cruise on the 7th Instant, fell in with, and took the Cerberus Privateer, of St. Malo, of 12 Carriage and 10 Sawgall Guns, and 105 Men; and on the 10th, after a Chase of eleven Hours, took the Augustine Privateer, of the same Place, having 10 Carriage Guns, and 80 Men, and is arrived at Plymouth with both the Prizes.

March 20. By Letters received from Capt. Dennis, of his Majesty's Ship Bellona, there is an Account, that on the 17th Instant he fell in with and took a French Snow Privateer, of 12 Guns, and 120 Men, returning from her Cruise to Bayonne. And that on the 17th of last Month he had taken a Snow from Martinico, laden with Sugar.

Capt. Byron, of his Majesty's Ship the Fame, in Company with the Lion, has also taken the Aimable Marie, of 250 Tons, from Bourdeaux, bound to St. Domingo, with Wine and Provisions, which they fell in with on the 5th of last Month. And on the 12th they retook the Telemachus, an English Ship, belonging to Guernsey, homeward bound from Carthage, of 250 Tons, and 12 Guns, which had been taken on the 18th by a French Privateer. The same Day they fell in with and took the Feudranger, a Frigate belonging to Bourdeaux, bound likewise to St. Domingo, of about 450 Tons, with a Letter of Marque, her Cargo consisting of Wine, Provisions, and Dry Goods.

March 23. His Majesty's Ship the Adventure, commanded by Capt. Charles Middleton, on the 18th of this Month, 8. W. eight Leagues from Danzig, fell in with and took the Renaim, a French Privateer Snow, of 12 Carriage Guns, 10 Sawgalls, and 90 Men; she is a new Vessel, sailed from Dunkirk last Monday Se'night on her first Cruise, and had not taken any Thing.

April 1. His Majesty's Ship the Bedford, commanded by Captain Gambier, is arrived at Plymouth with the St. Prieste, a French East-India ship of 700 Tons Burthen, and 200 Men and Passengers, from the Isle of Bourbon, bound to France; which was taken the 11th of last Month, by his Majesty's Ship the Favourite, one of the ships which sailed from Spithead with Sir George Pocock. Her Cargo consists chiefly of Coffee and Pepper.

KINGSTON, in Jamaica, February 20.

Wednesday Afternoon arrived at Port Royal, the Tender belonging to his Majesty's Ship Centaur, under the Command of Lieut. Andrew Carr, with 4 Spanish prisoners. Same Time his Majesty's Ship Fowey, Joseph Mead, Esq. Commander, came down as far as the Keys, and sent in 3 Spanish Vessels, viz. a Snow, Brig, and Sloop, and then proceeded on her Cruise.

March 13. Yesterday arrived his Majesty's Ship Haflar, Robert Carke, Esq. Commander, and brought in Three Flags of Truce from Port au Prince and St. Mark's, and a Snow from North-America, bound into Port au Prince, and 4 small Spanish Vessels, all which were taken in the Bay of Leoganne.

Same Day arrived his Majesty's Ship Boreas, Samuel Uvedale, Esq. Commander, and brought in two large French Ships, which he took off Baroco the 7th Instant, bound to Old France, richly loaded with the finest Sugars, Indigo, Cotton and Coffee. They had been Two Transports that had lately brought part of a Regiment of Soldiers which were landed at Cape Francois; one is called the Dragon, a fine new Ship of 16 Nine pounders, the other called the Intrepide of 12 Six and Four pounders, and had on board when taken 131 Men in all.

March 20. Saturday his Majesty's Ship the Fowey, commanded by Joseph Mead, Esq. being off 11beroon, met with, took, and brought in, a Spanish man of War; the particular Account of which Action, as taken from the Ship's Log-Book, is as follows, viz. About Break of Day there being little Wind, seeing a strange Sail to the Westward, sent the Boats a-head, to see what she was; saw the pinnace fire a Shot for the Chase to show Colours; immediately the Chase fired two Shot, and hoisted a Spanish Ensign and Pendant; when the Boats returned, and were hoisted in, gave Chase, and cleared Ship for Action. At noon Cape Tiberoon bore S. S. E. about Seven Leagues distant. The Chase finding us coming up with them very fast, brought too with the Main-top-sail to the masts; at Five hailed her, and was answered from Sea, upon which they fired three shot into us; immediately returned the Compliment with a Broadside, and began to engage on both sides; at seven wore to the Westward, and stop firing on both sides, turned the people to leeward, and splice the Rigging; at Eight tacked, the Chase gave us a Broadside, which we returned; at Nine tacked, and exchanged another Broadside; at Half past nine tacked to gain the Wind of them; at Twelve brought to, as did the Enemy, little Wind.

Observed the prize to make sail to the Westward, upon which we made fail to the Eastward to join him; at three Quarters of an Hour after Five, came to close Action, at the same Time fell a flat Calm, continued firing on both sides until Half past Nine, when she struck; sent the Boat on board, and brought the Captain and Nine of his people, left in Lieu a master and 8 men; she proved to be the La Ventura, a Spanish Frigate of 26 Twelve pounders on the main Deck, and 350 men, commanded by Don Joseph de las Casas, from St. Domingo, bound to the Havannah. The Fowey had 134 people on board, upwards of 30 of whom are little Boys, besides Four sick, which reduced them to not quite 100 fighting men, when the Engagement began; so that this may truly be reckoned one of the most gallant Actions among the many performed by his Majesty's Ships for these seven Years past.

Ten Men were killed outright in the Fowey, and Twenty-four wounded, 5 of whom desperately, and 2 have since died. The Fowey mounts 22 9 pounders on the main Deck, two 6 pounders on the Fore-Castle, and Four 4 pounders on the Quarter-Deck. The ship is much damaged in her Hoil, Masts, Yards and Rigging, the latter of which must be all new. **PHILADELPHIA, May 27.**  
On Tuesday last the Philadelphia Packet, Capt. Budden, arrived here from London.

A Letter from London, of the 8th of April, mentions two of the Enemies Privateers, of 22 and 16 Guns, being sent into Plymouth, by his Majesty's Frigate *Abolus*; and that another Privateer, of 24 Guns, had been likewise sent into Portsmouth.

From Jamaica we have Advice, that Commodore Douglas was at that Island; but that most of the Ships he took with him from St. Christophers, with others that belonged to the Jamaica Station, were cruising off of Cape-Francois, looking after the Brest Fleet, which some time ago arrived there.

Captain Lawrence, from Martinico, informs us, that on the 6th Instant, Admiral Pocock, with nine Sail of the Line, above 100 Transports, and about 14,000 Troops on board, sailed from that Island; and that he had sent an Express to Commodore Douglas, desiring him to meet him as far to Windward as possible.

**ANNAPOLIS, June 3.**  
On Friday last a Tobacco-House of Captain *John Bell's*, of *Prince George's County*, was fired by Lightning, and about 800 Weight of Tobacco burnt; but was soon extinguished. There were some Negroes in the Tobacco-House, one of which, a young Fellow, who sat pretty near the Door, was instantaneously struck Dead by the same Flash.

By the last Mail, Letters from London (via Philadelphia) were brought, of the last of March, which mention, that the Fleet for *Virginia* and *Maryland*, were to sail in about Three Weeks from that Time.

**A**s the Address of the Lower House of Assembly to the Governor, and his Excellency's Answer to the Address, which were lately published in this Gazette, may be considered as an Appeal to the Public, and as I am more particularly pointed at in the Narrative contain'd in the Answer, than any Member of the Lower House, I hope it will not be thought impertinent, or an unreasonable Attempt in me, to vindicate my Character from any Aspersions that may be thought to be cast upon it by the said Narrative. Happy in knowing that I have made no Application for lucrative Offices, or honorary Preferments, I have read, with the utmost Indifference, that Part of the Narrative which gives dark Hints about Discontent and Disappointment; but as a Charge of Disingenuity has been lately exhibited against me, upon an Occurrence which happened several Years ago, at *Baltimore-Town*, I shall take the Liberty to make some Remarks upon it.

That I may not be thought too prolix, or desirous to lay a Foundation for Altercation, I shall admit the State that has been laid before the Public, of a Conversation between the Governor and myself, at *Baltimore-Town*, relative to the Bill for his Majesty's Service, which passed into a Law in 1757; tho' I apprehend the Relation is not altogether unexceptionable, as it seems to omit, or rather to recite imperfectly, what I think a very material Part of the Conversation; namely, "that I could not undertake to give a determinate Answer to the Question at that Time; but if the Bill passed into a Law, I should take Care to be well advised before I acted." But I am content to have this Matter considered as it stands, in the following Words, in the Narrative: "As I was extremely anxious to avoid and remove every Thing that might possibly cause Misunderstandings, and become Occasion of Dispute afterwards, between the Assembly and Myself, between the Officer that should be appointed to command the Troops and the Agents, between the Agents and Myself, and in short between any Persons whatever that might be concerned with the said Troops, I intimated to one of the Agents (who being a Member of the Lower House was then in Town) my Desire to speak with him, and upon his complying with my Request, I ask'd him, Whether he should think himself empowered by the Bill, which had then passed both Houses, to victual and pay any of the 500 Men that should be posted at *Fort Cumberland*, and whether he thought that Part of the Bill, which I was inform'd had been the Subject of Conversation and Dispute, was sufficiently clear and explicit? The Gentleman's Answer was to this Effect, That some Members of the House were of Opinion that the Agents would be at Liberty to pay such Troops, while others said the Bill vested them with no such Power; but

that when the Bill was Enacted into a Law, he should be for taking Advice thereon. When I perceived that the Gentleman avoided giving a direct Answer to the Question I had ask'd him, I thought the only Way left for me to have the Matter cleared up, so that both the Agents and Myself might have the Sense of the House, was, to send them a Message, which, with the Approbation of that Gentleman, I accordingly did."

As I took for granted there was some particular Purpose to be answered by this Application to me, I thought, from the Duty I owed to my own Character, I could not be too cautious in my Answer. I did not avoid giving a direct One to furnish Room for future Contests, but merely from Considerations of common Prudence; for had I complied with the Governor's Inclination in giving a precise Answer, it might have been construed as an Engagement, at all Events, to have acted accordingly; so that whatever I might have conceived on a more mature Consideration of the Matter, or whatever Advice might have been given by those whose Sentiments, in the Construction of a Law, I should much sooner rely upon than my own, I might have been involved in this Dilemma, either of adhering to what might have been thought an Engagement, against my own Judgment, and the Advice of Council, or by departing from it, of incurring the Censure of Disingenuity and Double-dealing. What rational Foundation could I have, even from any Thing suggested in the Narrative, to give my Opinion precisely, when it seems the End of asking it was to produce Effects no less important "than to avoid and remove every Thing that might possibly cause Misunderstandings, and become Occasion of Dispute afterwards, between the Governor and the Assembly, between the Officer who should be appointed to command the Troops and the Agents, between the Governor and the Agents, and in short between any Persons whatever that might be concerned with the said Troops." It appears moreover from the Narrative, that I declared "some Members of the House were of Opinion that the Agents would be at Liberty to pay such Troops, while others said the Bill vested them with no such Power." Would it not have been the Height of Presumption in me, to have decided peremptorily a Question, about which such a Diversity of Opinions was entertain'd in the House? Or could I, in so doubtful a Case, without forfeiting all Pretensions to common Prudence, and common Sense, give any other Answer than that "whenever the Bill passed into a Law, I should be for taking Advice upon it."

But there is another Consideration, which I hope will have it's due Weight in removing every Impression to my Disadvantage; and that is, that there were two other Agents nominated by the Bill besides myself. It was no Doubt the View of the Bill in appointing so many Agents, not only that they should be Checks upon one another, in the Management of the Public Money, but that the Act should be, in every other Respect, regularly executed, by the mutual Advice and Assistance which they might afford to one another. This being the Case, had I taken upon me to have determined a Point of so much Importance without previously consulting them, I should have shewn very little Regard to the Intention of the Bill in this Respect, they would have had great Reason to have resented such a Step as an Insult, and had I been mistaken in Point of Judgment, all the World must have condemn'd my Conduct as rash and presumptuous.

Upon the Whole, Was it disingenuous in me to wave my Opinion of a Matter that I did not think myself a competent Judge of? Was it my Duty, or in any Respect incumbent upon me, to give my Opinion of a Bill, that had passed both Houses, and was lying before the Governor for his Perusal and Consideration? Can it be supposed that my Opinion could have effected the important Purposes enumerated in the Narrative? Was it not prudent in me to decline giving my Opinion, as I might possibly have been embarrass'd, or justly exposed to Censure, by a contrary Conduct? How far then a Charge of Disingenuity or Double-dealing can be supported, by any Thing that has been communicated to the Public, let the Unprejudiced determine.

PETERSBURG, February 23, 1762.  
The following is the Copy of a Declaration delivered a few Days since, by the Emperor's Order, to the Imperial, French and Swedish Ministers residing here.

### D E C L A R A T I O N.

**H**IS Imperial Majesty, who, upon his happy Accession to the Throne of his Ancestors, looks upon it to be his principal Duty, to extend and augment the Welfare of his Subjects, sees, with extreme Regret, that the Flames of the present War, which has already continued for 6 Years, and has been for a long Time burthensome to all the Powers engaged in it, far from tending now to a Conclusion, are on the contrary gathering fresh Strength, to the great Misfortune of the several Nations; and that Mankind has so much the more to suffer from this Scourge, as the Fortune of Arms, which has been hitherto subject to so many Vicissitudes, is equally exposed to them for the future:

"Wherefore his Imperial Majesty, compassionating, through his humane Disposition, the Effusion of innocent Blood, and being desirous, on his Part, of putting a Stop to so great an Evil, has judged it necessary to declare to the Courts in Alliance with Russia, that, preferring to every other Consideration, the first Law, which God prescribes to Sovereigns, which is the Preservation of the People intrusted to them, he wishes to procure Peace to his Empire, to which it is so necessary, and of so great Value; and at the same Time to contribute, as much as may be in his Power, to the Re-establishment of it throughout all Europe.

"It is in order to this, that his Imperial Majesty is ready to make a Sacrifice of the Conquests made by the Arms of Russia in this War, in hopes that the allied Courts will, on their Part, equally prefer the Restoration of Peace and Tranquility, to the Advantages which they might expect from the War, and which they cannot obtain but by a Continuance of the Effusion of human Blood. And to this End his Imperial Majesty, with the best Intention, advises them to employ, on their Side, all their Power towards the Accomplishment of so great, and so salutary a Work."

*Translation of the Answer given by the French Court to the Declaration of the Emperor of Russia, which was delivered the 23d of February to the Ministers of France, Austria, Sweden, and Saxony, at Petersburg.*

**T**HE King maintaining with Regret, these six Years past, a twofold War for his own Defence and that of his Allies, has sufficiently manifested, on every Occasion, how much he abhors the Effusion of human Blood, and his constant Desire to put an End to so cruel a Scourge. His personal Disinterestedness, the Steps which he thought could be taken consistent with his Dignity, and the Sacrifices which he did offer, in order to procure to Europe the desirable Blessings of Peace, are sure Pledges of the humane Sentiments with which his Heart abounds. But at the same Time his paternal Tenderness, which makes the Happiness and Preservation of his Subjects a Duty to him, cannot make him forget the first Law that God prescribes to Sovereigns, even that which constitutes the public Safety, and fixes the Condition of Nations and Empires, Fidelity in executing Treaties, and Punctuality in performing Engagements to their full Extent, preferably to every other Consideration.

"Tis with this View, that after having given so great Examples of Constancy and Generosity, his Majesty declares that he is ready to listen favourably to Propositions for a solid and honourable Peace, but will always act in the most perfect Concert with his Allies; that he will receive no Councils but such as shall be dictated to him by Honour and Probity; that he should think himself guilty of a Defection, in lending a Hand to secret

leys are equipping with great Diligence; and a  
great Quantity of Timber is cutting down in the  
Forests of Calabria."

"The Shore between the Bridge of Magdelaine  
and Pophippus is covered with Bastions and In-  
trenchments, and the Fort of Oeuf is well fur-  
nished with Artillery."

The Allies have repaired the Fortifications of  
Manila, furnished them with Artillery, augmented  
the Garrison, and are forming a flying Army of  
Horse, Dragoons and Hussars, who will take the  
Field as soon as the Season will permit.

April 3. His Majesty's Ship Diana, William  
Adams, Esq; Commander, from Virginia, is ar-  
rived at Portsmouth; she came out the 4th of March  
with several Ships under her Convoy, but cannot  
learn when or where she parted with them.

Extract of a Letter from Hamburgh, March 26.

"Six Thousand Danes are already encamped  
within a League of Lubeck; and we are informed,  
that before their Arrival, a Russian Party was seen  
at a little Distance from that City. This made the  
Magistrates resolve to keep the Gates shut during  
almost two Days and two Nights, and to double  
the Guards and the advanced Posts. The King of  
Prussia likewise hath demanded of the Magistrates  
of Lubeck, the young Fellows of the Duchy of  
Mecklenbourg, who were enrolled among his  
Troops, and made their escape into their City;  
but they refused to deliver them up. Mean while,  
the Clouds that threaten Denmark still increase;  
and scarce any Hope is left, that an amicable Ac-  
commodation can be accomplished. The Number  
of Recruits that are raising for the Service of Den-  
mark exceeds Belief. All the young Fellows  
enter Volunteers. We are assured, that the Militia  
of Denmark will be embodied; and that a Body  
of Volunteers is to be raised at Altena, equal in  
Number to the Body of Hussars, which is almost  
complete; their Number amounting already to  
1800. The King of Denmark hath published a  
general Amnesty in Favour of all Defectors from  
his Troops, with Leave for them to join any Re-  
giment they please. It is thought that by the End  
of April he will have an Army of 50,000 Men  
ready to take the Field."

NEW-YORK, May 31.

Saturday Afternoon His Majesty's 46th Re-  
giment arrived here from Albany. And,  
Several Vessels with Connecticut Provincial  
Troops arrived here since our last.

Yesterday the Captains Doran and Tallman ar-  
rived here in 20 Days from Antigua: By them we  
have Advice, that a Number of Negroes belong-  
ing to that Island had concerted a Scheme in order  
to become their own Masters, but the Plot being  
discovered, they were taken proper Care of.

The following is a List of the Ships that arrived  
from England with Admiral Pocock, viz. Namur,  
90 Guns, Vice Admiral Pocock; Valiant 74;  
Hampton Court, 74; Belleisle, 70; and Rippon,  
of 60 Guns.

PHILADELPHIA, June 3.

In a late Letter from London, by the last Ships, a  
Gentleman writes as follows:

"The Operations of the War are carrying on  
with their former Vigour; and a great Fleet is just  
sailed, in all Probability, to attack the Spaniards  
in some of their distant and most valuable Settle-  
ments, which must quickly bring them to Reason.

Affairs in Germany, by the Death of the  
Czarina, are like to take a favourable Turn. In  
that Part of the World all Sides are sufficiently tired  
of the War, where, it is generally agreed, the  
next Campaign will be the last. Thus all Things  
go on as well as we could reasonably expect. It  
is true, the protracting the War, at any Rate, at  
a Time when we thought ourselves at the Eve of  
a Peace, somewhat alarmed us; but we are no-  
thing daunted, and unanimous to proceed with

Spirit; having the Satisfaction to know, that our  
Enemies have far greater Reason to wish for a Pe-  
riod to the Calamities of War than we."

On Tuesday last arrived here the Snow Two  
Friends, Capt. Ireland, from the Isle of May, by  
whom we are informed, that a French 40 Gun  
Ship, bound to the East-Indies with Stores, ran  
ashore on St. Vincents, one of the Cape de Verd  
Islands, and was entirely lost: That Admiral  
Saunders, with 18 Sail of the Line, 3 Fire Ships,  
5 Bombs, and as many Frigates and Sloops as  
made his Number about 56 Sail, was cruising in  
the Gulf of Gibraltar, the 18th of March, for the  
Toulon and Carthage Squadrons, having re-  
ceived Advice of their Junction, and being at Sea;  
their joint Force said to be 12 Ships of the Line,  
and 5 Frigates: That they had Advice at Gibrat-  
tar, that the English Vessels in Spanish Ports were  
discharged; and those at Malaga, with the English  
Consul, expected daily at Gibraltar: And that the  
Bellona Frigate, on her Passage from England for  
Gibraltar, off of Bayonne, fell in with and took  
a French Merchantman, of 24 Guns, belonging to  
Marseilles.

With Captain Ireland came Passenger Captain  
Byvanck, of the Brig John, of New-York, who  
was taken on his Passage for the Coast of Guiney,  
by a Privateer Brig from Martinico, between the  
River Senegal and Cape Verd.

By Captain Hazelwood, from Martinico, we  
learn, that when Admiral Pocock left that Island,  
he had about 12 Thousand Land Forces with him;  
but that he was to touch at Antigua and St. Chris-  
tophers, where it was said, he would get a Rein-  
forcement of between two and three Thousand  
Men more, white and black, and expected a Re-  
giment of Blacks from Jamaica: That General  
Rufane was left at Martinico, with about 5000  
Men: And that two large French Ships, bound to  
the Mississippi, and a Spanish Ship of 16 Carriage  
Guns, have been lately carried in there by our  
Men of War.

In a Letter from Martinico, dated May 11, it  
is said, "The Inhabitants here seem now quite  
satisfied with their Condition; and indeed they  
have Reason, for they are indulged in every  
Thing they desire, and I believe never were so  
happy before."

His Excellency General Monkton failed from  
Martinico for Antigua the ninth ult. from whence  
he was soon to sail for his Government of New-  
York.

The Sloop Rachel, Captain Walker, from Ber-  
muda was taken by a Spanish Galley at Turks  
Island, and burnt.

ANNAPOLIS, June 10.

Last Friday being the Anniversary of the Birth  
of our most Gracious Sovereign King GEORGE  
the Third, when his Majesty entered into the 25th  
Year of his Age; the same was observed here with  
the usual Solemnity; and in the Evening his Ex-  
cellency our Governor gave a Ball at the Council-  
House, where there was a splendid Appearance of  
Ladies, and a great Number of Gentlemen.

On Tuesday last Week, one William Wright,  
an old Man about 75 Years of Age, attempting  
to swim across Magothy River, near the Head,  
to fetch a Canoe, which some ill natur'd Boys re-  
fused to bring over to him, sunk, and was Drown-  
ed when he had got almost over. He told the  
People whom he left on the Shore, that tho' he  
had not swam for Thirty Years, they should see  
that he could swim yet. His Body was taken up  
soon after.

On Wednesday the 26th of May, Richard Crosby,  
alias Dew, was Executed at Frederick-Town, in  
Frederick County, for the Murder of old Mr. Wirt,  
on the Road, as formerly mentioned.

NEW-YORK, June 10.

Last Tuesday Night arrived the Halifax Packet, Capt. Bulmerston, in 6 Weeks from Falmouth, which he left the 25th of April, and has brought the London Prints to the 20th of April, from which we have the following Particulars.

St. JAMES'S, April 7.

**T**HIS Day the Right Hon. the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled, waited on his Majesty, and, being introduced by the Earl of Bute, one of his Majesty's principal Secretaries of State, made their Compliments to his Majesty in a Congratulatory Address spoken by Sir William Moreton, the Recorder, on the Glorious Conquest of Martinico.

To which Address his Majesty was pleased to return the following most gracious Answer.

"I THANK you for your loyal and affectionate Congratulations on our late important Success. Too much Praise cannot be given to the Bravery and Conduct of my Fleet and Army. You say truly that I am not dazzled by the Splendour of repeated Victories. The permanent Prosperity of my People as a free and commercial Nation, has always been the Object of my Ambition: What conduces most to that End, I shall count my greatest Glory."

They were all received very graciously, and had the Honour to kiss his Majesty's Hand.

LONDON, April 15.

We hear that in the rich Dresses which are making up for the Court at Petersburg, the Preference is chiefly given to British Workmen; and it is said, so great is the Czar's Dislike to France, that he is determin'd to wear nothing of the Manufacture of that Country on any solemn Occasion, particularly on his Coronation.

The Danish Troops have formed a Chain from the Elbe to the Baltic, to whom his Danish Majesty has given strict Orders not to enter or invade any Part of Ducal Holstein, by which it was thought the Danes would avoid being the Aggressors.

The Jesuits at Rouen, in order to move Compassion in their Favour, began to make public Processions; but a speedy Stop was put to it by the Parliament. All their Schools were shut on the first of April.

We are informed, that General Monckton is to quit the Command of the Army in the West-Indies, upon the Arrival of the Earl of Albemarle, and to go to his Government of New-York.

Monday Lieut. Gen. Noel kiss'd his Majesty's Hand on being appointed Colonel of the 44th Regiment of Foot, now in the West-Indies.

Tuesday a considerable Quantity of Military Stores, and also a Number of Tin Boats, were shipped at Woolwich, for Germany, and several more are getting ready for the same Purpose.

We are informed, that with the intended new Dress for the Court, all English Laces are to be worn; which will totally suppress that very extensive Branch of Smuggling, (the French Blonds) and be a happy Encouragement to a very important Manufactory, which would employ Thousands of our Women, and afford a comfortable Support to many indigent Families, besides cutting the Sins of an implacable Enemy.

The Entertainment given on Monday by the Lord Mayor at the Mansion-House, was in every Respect, sumptuous, elegant and magnificent. The Ball at Night was opened by the Lady Mayorefs and the Earl of Errol; and the Room where they danced being lightened up after a new Manner, the Appearance of the Ladies there, was uncommonly brilliant. The Minuet given out was a la Marti-

nique; and in the Desert, which was most curiously ornamented with Palm-Trees and Felloons of Flowers, upwards of three Feet high, was a Representation of the Island of Martinico, with the British Fleet riding in Triumph round it; and at one End a large Man of War, completely rigg'd and arm'd, all in Pastry, with a Hat de la Touche of the same Materials, pull'd off in Reverence to the British Flag. The first Course at Dinner consisted of 600 cover'd Dishes from the Kitchen alone, exclusive of the Pasties and other Eatables; and the whole Number of Dishes sent up is said to have amounted to upwards of 1000.

The Island of Martinico contains by the nicest Calculation 260 square Miles; Cuba, against which, it is said, our Fleet is going, 38,400; Hispaniola 36,000; Porto Rico 3,200; and St. Jago, 1,400.

The following new Promotions are made for North-America: Mr. Cox, to be Collector of the Customs at Quebec. Mr. Engley, to be Comptroller at the said Place. Mr. William Lee, to be Surveyor likewise at Quebec. Mr. Edward Lamb, to be Collector at Montreal; and Mr. Richard Oaks to be Waiter and Searcher also at Montreal.

Sheerness, April 14. It is rumoured here, that the French threaten us again with an Attack in their Frigates and Flat bottom'd Boats; and that some Men of War are to be immediately placed in the Mouth of the Thames, to stop their Progress, should they attempt going up that River; and others are to lie in different Stations to watch their Motions.

LONDON, April 17.

On the 5th Instant several Transports sailed for Belleisle to receive the Troops on Board, design'd for Portugal, and carried over a large Draught of Engineers, from the Train of Artillery, to destroy all the Fortifications upon that Island, after which they are to proceed to Lisbon to join the British Forces.

Letters from Hamburg of the 9th Instant, import, that by Letters from Pomerania they had Advice, that the Russian General Romanzow had received Orders to march his Troops into Holstein.

The Republic of Genoa have advanced a considerable Sum to the Empress Queen of Hungary, on the Security of the Duchy of Transylvania.

A Letter from an Officer in the Allied Army, dated Denderstadt, April 8, says, "Yesterday a smart Conflict happened in our Neighbourhood at Heiligenstadt, where a Body of 500 Hussars were posted in order to cut off the Communication between the Werra and Gottingen. In order to open this Passage, the Garrison of Gottingen sent out between 3 and 400 Men, either to seize them, or drive them from thence; but General Luckner being apprised of their March, reinforced that Post with 1100 Hussars more, attacked the French, beat them, and chased them into Gottingen again, killed about 60 or 70, and took above 200 Prisoners, besides a great Deal of their Plunder."

Some Letters from Holland advise, that fresh Broils have happened between the English and Dutch at Bengal; and that the former had made Encroachments on the latter.

They write from Cadiz, that two of the principal Merchants, Timmerman and Kelly, the former a Hamburger, and the latter an Irishman, were put under Arrest there, as it is said, for holding a Correspondence with Gibraltar.

Sir Edward Hawke sets out To-morrow for Portsmouth, to take upon him the Command of a Fleet there, to be employed in a secret Expedition.

The Prussians are making great Levies in Pomerania and Prussia, notwithstanding the Russian Troops are in both Countries; and in the latter his Imperial Majesty has given express Orders for restoring 300,000 Rubles, which had been levied upon them for Contribution, and that the Magazines erected there should be distributed gratis in

such Manner as may be most serviceable to the Inhabitants.

They write from Breslau, that Count Czernicheff, attended by Prince Lubomsky, and other Officers of high Rank in the Russian Service, had been to pay their Respects to his Prussian Majesty, and were most graciously received.

Yesterday General Crauford's Baggage, Stores, &c. were embarked at the Tower for Portugal.

April 18. A Letter from Lisbon, dated the 30th of March, says, "Our Forces are every Day increasing on Account of the Army assembled by Spain on our Frontiers, which we are informed already amount to 40,000 Men. Our Fortifications in the Frontier Towns have been examined by several experienced Officers, and are allowed to be in a good State of Defence: Our Army is augmented to 32,000 Men, some of whom have already begun their March, these with the Troops and Arms we expect from England, will enable us to defend ourselves against three Times the Number of Spaniards: Our Naval Force also is in a better State than it has been for some Years past, having eight Ships of the Line in the Tagus, all well mann'd, two of which are of 74; and 6, of 64 Guns. One of the largest is gilt in a very extraordinary Manner, as if designed for the Reception of some of the Royal Family. The Spanish Ambassador has Orders to leave this Court in two Hours, and we expect Spain will declare War in 2 or 3 Days."

Captain Dorby, just arrived at Plymouth from Leghorn, off Cape Spartell, spoke with Admiral Saunders's Squadron, consisting of 17 Ships of the Line.

They write from Ostend of the 7th Instant, that several English Men of War had blocked up Dunkirk, in such a Manner that no Vessel could go in or out.

They write from Plymouth, that two large Spanish Men of War had been seen to the Westward of that Port; and that the English Colours were flying over the Spanish; which we hope will prove true.

Great Quantities of Stores are shipping from Woolwich, for the Expedition Fleet fitting out at Portsmouth; the Command of which will be taken in a few Days by Sir Edward Hawke.

By the Emanuel, Milbeck, arrived at Leith, after a very quick Passage from Christiansands, we learn, that just before her Departure, an Embargo had been laid on all the Ships in the Danish Ports, and that a large Body of Troops had been ordered instantly to march into Holstein.

April 20. Letters from Petersburg of the 22d ult. advise that a Peace between Russia and Prussia was on the Point of being concluded; and that a Quadruple Alliance was expected soon to fall between the Courts of Petersburg, London, Berlin, and Stockholm.

A private Letter by the last Dutch Mail brought Advice from Germany, that the Prussians had invaded Schweidnitz, and another strong Body of them had penetrated through Upper Silesia into Bohemia.

The Perla Catalana de Barcelona, —, from Spain for St. Domingo, with upwards of 100,000 Dollars on board, was taken off Cadiz by one of his Majesty's Cruizers, and carried into Gibraltar.

Several more of the French Prisoners at Winchester and other Places, have offered to enlist into his Majesty's Service, which has been approved of, and they are to be incorporated in the new raised Troops.

A French Officer (lately Prisoner on his Parole at Weymouth) writes to his Acquaintance in Belfast, dated Jan. 29, 1762. "On the 10th of January I sailed from Havre de Grace on board his Majesty's Frigate the Zenobie, of 22 Guns, and 210 Men, commanded by M. de Sage. We were attacked on the 12th by a most violent Storm; and finding all our Resistance to be in vain, and



our Suffering. At sea to be insupportable, as the last Effort for our Lives, we were obliged to run our Ship ashore on the Peninsula of Portland; where, with great Difficulty, 71 of us were saved, and the rest in a very melancholy Plight, being almost all wounded and naked; and, to complete our Misery, the barbarous Islanders, seeing our Ship wrecked, rushed down upon us, and of the 1000 Crewing the mercilefs Sea had left us, poor Wretches! they with more hardened Cruelty stripped every Soul: And had not the Generosity and Humanity of the Sloop Faver (Commander in Portland) interposed, we should have all undoubtedly perished. When we had recovered Strength enough to walk about, we were removed to this Town; and then wrote to the Lords of the Admiralty, petitioning their Lordships, that in Consideration of our Distress, they would not add to our Misfortune. Their Lordships answered us with an Answer, That we were not to be regarded as Prisoners: And further, that our Letters had been presented to the King, and that his Majesty, in Compassion for our deplorable Circumstances, had ordered, that we should be all immediately clothed at his Expence; and that a Vessel should be equipped and victualled at his Cost, to carry us home with all convenient Speed; and that until the Transport could be prepared, we should be quartered on the Public Houses, he paying for whatever we might call for."

The Humanity and Generosity lately shewn to the Crew of the Zenobie Frigate, from Havre de Grace, has been attended with the following good Effect: On the Night of the dreadful Storm of Snow and Hail, or rather Hurricane, the 21st ult. an English Trading Vessel was drove on Shore at Havre de Grace, and broke to Pieces, but the Crew saved; the Commandant of the Town being informed of the Affair, ordered them to be quartered at a Coffee-House, and allowed the common Men Thirty Sous per Day while they remained there; and the latter End of last Week they all arrived safe in England.

*Hannover, April 9.* Gen. Luckner having detached 500 Hussars to Heiligenstadt, the Marquis de Lottum marched out of Gottingen with 1800 Horse, and 2000 Foot, to intercept them, of which the former having Notice, he put himself at the Head of 1600 Horse, and having come up with the French General the 6th Instant, as he was retreating towards Gottingen, he fell upon his Rear, killed 36 Men, and took 80 Prisoners, besides 100 Horses. M. de Vaux, Commandant at Gottingen, has, on a sudden, set at Liberty the Town's People whom he had imprisoned, by Order, as is supposed of his Court, in Consequence of Representations made there by Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick, of the tyrannical Conduct of that Officer.

*Petersburgh, March 9.* Great Numbers of Recruits are raising in this City, for our Army going to Holstein. The Czar has given Orders for the Regiment of the Guards to be clothed in the Prussian Manner.

#### L O N D O N.

*April 17.* The last Letters from the Hague say, that the Court of Copenhagen have made fresh Proposals to that of Petersburg, which it is hoped will be accepted, as his Danish Majesty is extremely desirous of preserving to his Subjects the Blessings of Peace, that he has omitted nothing that could be done to provide a Force by Sea and Land for their Protection. There are Letters from Lubeck directly, dated the last of March, in which there is no Notice of the Danish Troops having infringed their Privileges. Peace is said to be actually signed between the Courts of Petersburg and Berlin; and that an Officer of Distinction had presented to his Imperial Majesty the Ensigns of the Prussian Order, set with Diamonds to a very great Value.

We have received Advice, that the English settled at Belleisle have received Notice to quit the Island as soon as their Affairs would permit them; and that all necessary Assistance should be given them therein, with an Assurance to the Natives, upon their dutiful Behaviour, to be left in the peaceable Possession of what they held and enjoyed on the Island. They have begun the Embarkation of all the live Cattle for different Islands in the West Indies.

We learn by some of the French Officers, says a Letter from Tavidock, dated April 11, that the French King has conferred the greatest Marks of Honour, besides a handsome Pension, upon Count d'Estange, for his gallant Behaviour in the East-Indies, though he broke his Parole. That they are terribly chagrined at the Loss of Martinico; but are in great Expectations from what the Spa-

niards will do, and are meditating some mighty Blow.

The last Letters from the Hague inform us, That Sir Joseph Yorke, the English Ambassador, has had frequent Conferences with the Members of the Government; in which his Excellency represented, that he was commanded to give them the strongest Assurances, that his Court was sincerely disposed to settle amicably the Differences that had arisen between the two States in India, and to prevent Disputes for the Future.

His Excellency also took Occasion to ask a tacit Permission to export a Quantity of Forage, purchased for the Allied Army in the Territory of the Republick.

His Excellency further represented, that as the Enemies of the King his Master seemed to be meditating an Invasion of one of his Three Kingdoms, his Majesty hoped, as he had already intimated, that in that Crisis the States General would fulfil the Engagements they have already entered into by Treaty.

The Account of Gen. Lally's being one of 3 Persons lately executed privately at Paris, must be a Mistake, as that Gentleman is a Prisoner upon his Parole; and we hear, he took Care before he left Paris, to obtain proper Assurances, that he should not be exchanged or ransomed without his own Consent.

*April 18.* The Emperor of Russia presented the Prussian General Winne, whom the King of Prussia sent to Petersburg, a Purse of 1000 Ducats, towards his travelling Expences, besides other valuable Gifts.

Private Letters from Petersburg intimate, that it was generally believed the Imperial, French, and Danish Ministers, would speedily leave that Capital. The Czar seems determined to open his Reign with the entire Recovery of his Patrimonial Dominions; and with that View Patents are, or will be speedily given out, for raising six new Regiments. It is thought that some Changes of great Consequence will take Place immediately after the Coronation of the Emperor and Empress at Moscow.

*April 20.* The Prussian General Werner, by Permission of his Royal Master, has entered into the Service of the Emperor of Russia; he is to have the Command of the Russian Troops destined for Pomerania, with a Salary of 12,000 Rubles per Annum, besides the Income from a Regiment he is to have given him.

Letters from Spain of the 24th ult. advise, that his Catholic Majesty had issued Orders, that no Galleons, Men of War, or any other Ships whatever, should return to Old Spain, from any Part of the Spanish Colonies in America, till further Orders, Notice of which was dispatched to all the Settlements in America.

Yesterday the Kingston of 60 Guns, and the Ambuscade of 36 Guns, being repaired in his Majesty's Yard at Deptford, came out of the Docks, and are preparing to sail as soon as possible, as Privateers, with two others of Force, by Way of the East-Indies into the South Seas, upon a very important Expedition, in which they are to be attended by a Victualling Vessel.

The Spanish Ship from the Havannah, mentioned in our last to be taken by the Richmond Man of War, Captain Elphinston, and sent into Madeira the 3d of March, has on board 100 Tons of Campeachy Logwood, 2000 raw Hides, and about 30,000 Dollars.

The Representations made by the Spanish Grandees, in respect to the Blockade, or Siege of Gibraltar, have been fully verified; inasmuch, that if the Court persists in that Measure, they must be obliged to have a Corps of Auxiliary Troops, Generals, and Engineers from France.

His Majesty has been pleased to appoint Thomas Pownall, Esq; late Governor of New-England, to be Director-General of Comptroll, with the Rank of Colonel in the Combined Army in Germany.

We are told that the King of Spain has declared, that the Moment any of the British Troops land in Portugal, he will declare War against that Kingdom.

Spain has languished under a passive Commerce ever since the Discovery of America; whereby the Treasures of her Mines are dug up for other Nations, who carry on an active Trade, so as to supply the Spaniards either with the Necessaries or the Luxuries of Life: Though, in the Opinion of the Marquis Belloni, who is now an eminent Banker at Rome, this is the present Situation of all the Kingdoms in Europe, with respect to the Trade which they carry on to the East-Indies.

The great Quantities of Jewels and Manufactures, Liquors and Spices, brought from the East-Indies, render that Trade so exorbitant, that the great Advantages the European Kingdoms receive from the West-Indies, or all America, with the great Quantities of Gold and Silver, and other useful Things brought from thence, are not sufficient to compensate the Loss sustained by that expensive Trade.

#### NEW-YORK, June 7.

By a Letter from a Gentleman in London, to his Friend in this City, we learn, That on the 17th of March last, the Lords of Appeal reversed the Sentence of 10 Vessels belonging to North-America, that were lately carried down to Jamaica, in their Voyages to and from Monto-Christo.

On Tuesday last arrived the Sloop Brothers, Captain Paul Bascome, in 11 Days from Bermuda, by whom we learn, that there has been a great Scarcity of Provisions in that Island for some Time past, nor have they yet received a sufficient Supply. The Conspiracy among the Negroes was entirely suppressed, a few of the Ringleaders having been executed.

Since our last fell down to Sandy-Hook, his Majesty's Ships the Intrepid, Chesterfield, and Porcupine Sloop, with 13 Transports, having on board his Majesty's 46th Regiment, 4 Independent Companies, and about 1000 Provincial Troops; and we hear they are to sail in a few Days, and are to be commanded by Col. Burton.

In a London Paper of April 10th, it is mention'd, that the Alarm Privateer of Guernsey, has retaken the Polly, Wynn, from New-York for London, and carried her into Guernsey: The said Privateer has also taken a French Ship from St. Domingo, called the Syren, worth Eight or Ten Thousand Pounds.

#### PHILADELPHIA, June 10.

By Captain Flint, from St. Christophers, we are informed, that Captain M'Pherson in the Privateer Ship Britannia of this Port, being cruising on the Spanish Main, on the 8th or 9th of April, off of Lagaira, fell in with, and engaged, a large Spanish Ship, of 24 Guns, bound in there from the Havannah: That Captain M'Pherson endeavoured to cut the Spaniard off from the Land, but could not do it, he keeping close by the Shore; and had laid him along Side, in order to board, but durst not grapple, as both Ships would unavoidably have run ashore, and been lost; the Surf running prodigious high, so that the Enemy got into his Port: And that the Britannia had one of her Officers, and two Foremastmen killed; had lost her Foretopmast, and received some other Damage; but that it was repaired, and the Ship had proceeded on her Cruise again, in Company with Captain Reed, of St. Christophers. This Information Captain Flint had from Mr. Robinson at Old Road, in St. Christophers, who was Capt. M'Pherson's First Lieutenant the Time of the Engagement.

Captain Flint, in his outward bound Passage, was taken, and carried to Porto-Rico.

The Brig Hannah, Captain Warner, from this Place for St. Christophers, was taken by a French Privateer, and carried likewise to Porto-Rico; the Privateer said to have three other Prizes in Company.

Capt. Watson, from Montego Bay, in Jamaica, on the 20th ult. fell in with Admiral Pocock's Fleet, off of Cape Nichola, where they were waiting for Sir James Douglas's Squadron from Jamaica. He left the Fleet there the 21st.

And by Captain Story, who left Kingston, in Jamaica, the 16th of May, we learn that Commodore Douglas sailed four Days before him, with 8 or 9 Ships of the Line, and two Bombs, in order to join Admiral Pocock: That on the 22d he saw his Squadron between Cape Tiberoon and Cape Nichola: And that on the 23d one Ship of the Line, and the two Bombs, had got to the last mentioned Cape; but he saw none of Admiral Pocock's Fleet. There were left at Jamaica only one Ship of the Line, the Centaur, and the Boreas Frigate.

Commodore Douglas's Tender had taken, after a smart Engagement, a large Sloop, full of Sugar, and sent her into Jamaica, but was afterwards taken by a French Privateer.

Captain Watson, on the 23d of May, saw a Vessel ashore on Ackland's Keys, in the Windward Passage.

Captain David Stewart, in the Ship Sally, of this Harbour, and bound to Jamaica, was taken on his Passage, and carried, we hear, to Port-au-Pee, but afterward sent out by one of our Men of War.

In Jamaica they for the Expedition order to join the 1st. It is said that they had made an Attempt some of our Men resolved to attack.

It is said that the French Fleet in Cape-Francois, had made an Attempt to get out; but finding that some of our Men of War were waiting for, and resolved to attack them, they returned.

ANNAPOLIS, June 1.

"That another Expedition is on Foot in the East-Indies, and will be executed in proper Time, nothing less than the *Philippine Islands*, *Manilla* being the first Object in View: That the *Portuguese* are in daily Expectation of the *Spaniards* entering their Country with a powerful Army: That the Court of Portugal has asked a Subsidy of Two Hundred Thousand Pounds, which will be granted: This shews Old England does not want for Money, nor is in Danger of Bankruptcy, as was artfully propagated by some People: One Hundred and Twenty Thousand Pounds of said Money is already laid out in Warlike Stores, and gone to Portugal; the other Eighty Thousand Pounds will be paid in Money: That Lord *Trawley*, and several other General Officers, are at *Lisbon*, waiting, as it is said, for 8000 Troops from *Belleisle*, *Ireland*, &c. The *Portuguese* have 30,000 at this Time under Arms, such as they are; but it is hoped, not worse than the *Spaniards*: That the King of Spain intends to besiege *Gibraltar* (but it is supposed at a great Distance) in Person, nay and will take it too, if he can: And that as to Germany, Things look well, the Face of Affairs since the Death of the late Empress of *Russia*, having surprizingly changed in Favour of the King of *Prussia*."

# MARYLAND GAZETTE,

THURSDAY, June 24, 1762.

M A D R I D, March 22.

**T**ROOPS continue to file off to Salamanca, the Place of the general Rendezvous. The Marquis de Sarria, Commander in Chief, let out Yesterday for the Army. It is reported that the Cavalry will be augmented with 25 Squadrons.

M. de Valiere, a French Lieutenant General, is arrived here with a Lieutenant Colonel of Artillery; and it is said they will soon be followed by two other French Colonels.

A few Days ago we received Advice, that Lord Tyranny was arrived at Lisbon, with 40 English Officers. This News has occasioned a Commotion here, and will probably hasten the Opening of the Campaign.

Genoa, March 27. The Spanish Troops assembled in Castile amount to 30,000 Men. The right Wing of this Army was to be, on the 18th Instant at Zamora, which is only four Leagues from the frontiers of Portugal. The left Wing directs its March to Ciudad Rodrigo, which is not nearer to Portugal. The Court of Madrid will be forced to break with that of Lisbon.

Ten Ships of War, victualled for three Months, are ready to sail from Cadix. The Ferret Squadron is completely equipped.

Hague, March 20. According to the last Advices from Stettin, Frankfurt on the Oder, Breslau, Berlin and Magdebourg, his Prussian Majesty, by being released from his Disputes with the Russians and Swedes, by the Release of Prisoners, and the Recruits he will be able to raise in those Dominions that are now evacuated, will be able to take the Field in Silesia next Campaign with at least 60,000 Men more than he had in the last. It seems also not improbable, that before it opens, he may, by the powerful Interposition of Russia, compromise Matters with the King of Poland, which would afford the Army of the Empire (what they certainly wish) a fair Pretence for dispersing, and then the War must be determined by a sharp and bloody Dispute in Silesia.

Hamburg, April 3. The Emperor of Russia seems determined to seize the Bailiwicks which he claims in Holstein; and the King of Denmark to keep Possession of them. It is reported, that the King of Denmark is negotiating Four Millions of Crowns in the Canton of Berne under the Guaranty of France. There seems to be some Foundation for the Report that 14,000 Russians are on their March to enter Holstein.

Paris, April 2. One of the Transports that had on board the Regiment of Augoumois, bound to Louisiana, is taken by the English. M. de Froment, the Colonel of the Regiment, was on board this Ship.

Dusseldorf, March 28. Defectors from the Allied Army inform us, that it is expected to be reinforced by a Body of 25 or 30,000 Russians by the 1st of May. We are astonished, but not terrified at this News. What chiefly occupies us for the present, is our Impatience for the Arrival of the Count d'Etrees. With that General at our Head, we shall have nothing to fear. He will lead us to certain Victory. Our Enemies cannot have forgot the Battle of Hastenbeck.

Paris, April 3. We have just received, by the Way of London, the disagreeable News of the Surrender of Fort Royal, at Martinico, and that most of the Quarters of the Island had followed its Example. This News was little expected, after what had been said of the respectable Posture of the Island, and of the Reception of the Enemy at their first Landing. Having been told that there were not fewer than 30,000 Men on the Island, well armed, and full of Resolution, we made ourselves perfectly easy; and were astonished to see by the Capitulation, that the Garrison of Fort Royal consisted only of 800 Men. M. de la

Touche, an intrepid Officer, having retired to Fort St. Pierre, will indeed retard the Reduction of the rest of the Island; but that will be of no Advantage to us.

It is assured that the Marshal d'Etrees will set out for the Army immediately after Easter, or perhaps sooner. The Prince of Conde will make the Campaign in Hesse, under the Prince de Soubise.

It is said, that Half of the Cavalry of the King's Household will make the Campaign this Year; and that the Prince of Conde will command a Body of 25,000 Men on the Lower Rhine. The Chevalier de Bouville, Major General, is to serve in Spain.

The Design of fortifying the Isle of Aix is attended with many Difficulties, that it hath been laid aside. The Regiments designed to be employed in that Service have received Orders to be ready to march where ever Circumstances may require. It is thought they will make a Part of the 12,000 Men intended for Spain.

Breslau, April 3. The King has sent Orders to all the Austrian Officers, Prisoners of War, who are absent on their Parole, to repair, in the Space of eight Weeks at farthest, from the 2d Instant, to Magdebourg. We are told that the Emperor of Russia has declared, that he will not be crowned till a Peace be signed with Prussia.

We learn from Breslau, that all the Regiments are complete, and abundantly provided with all the Implements of War, so that the Campaign may be opened as soon as the King pleases. Mean while, we are informed that his Majesty has signified that he will readily listen to an Accommodation, provided the Court of Vienna will admit, as the Basis of it, that Matters with Regard to the Possessions of the two Crowns shall be put on the same Footing as they were before the present Rup-ture.

L O N D O N, April 10.

Yesterday Morning the Porter of the Falmouth arrived at the East-India House, with News of the Falmouth, Dale, and the Prince Edward, Haldane, from Fort St. George, being arrived at Plymouth: And that the Orlery, Vincent, the Worcester, and the Prince George, Rois, from London, were arrived at Bencoolen: The Fox, Hume; the Warren, Glover; the Earl of Temple, Folter; and the Earl of Holderness, Brooke, from London, at Madras: And that the Hawke, Kent, and the Pitt, Jackson, left the Indies about the same Time. The Falmouth and Prince Edward bring 52,000 Pagadoes in Diamonds. There is also Advice of the Deaths of Admiral Stevens, Mr. Jackson, and Mr. Palmer, two of the Company's Writers.

Admiral Stevens being dead, the Command in Chief devolves on Admiral Cornish. Capt. Tideman had sailed from Madras with five Men of War, to join Admiral Cornish, who it is thought would attempt Mauritius.

The Falmouth and Prince Edward have on board Monsieur de Laree, the French Governor of Pondicherry, and several Military Officers; all the Fortifications of which Place were totally destroyed, and the Guns carried to Madras.

A Draught of 100 Men has been made out of the Royal Regiment of Artillery at Woolwich; and they are now under Orders to embark for Lisbon.

Extract of a Letter from Plymouth, April 4.

"This Evening, since Six o'Clock, the *Æolus* Man of War, of 28 Guns, has sent in here a Privateer of 22 Guns, and another of 16 Guns; and sent into Portsmouth one more of 24 Guns. The *Æolus* is hourly expected in here with a great Number of Prisoners, said to be about 700.

"P. S. We just now learn, that the *Æolus* is gone in Chase of another large French Privateer."

Notwithstanding the many Reports to the contrary, no Orders are given to discontinue the Preparations making for an Embarkation of Troops for Lisbon.

They write from Lisbon, that the Spanish Ambassador was ordered to leave that Court, upon four Hours Notice.

Extract of a Letter from Portsmouth, April 8.

"All the Ships of the Line, except the Royal Sovereign, are sailed from Spithead into the Harbour to refit, as we expect a large Fleet to be made up for Admiral Sir Edward Hawke as fast as possible against the Beginning of May.

"We expect his Majesty's Ship *Britannia* to be launched from our Dock in May or June next. She is a prodigious fine First Rate, of 120 Guns.

"At Spithead Admiral Geary, with eight Sail of Men of War."

They write from Petersburg, that the Emperor wears the King of Prussia's Picture in a Ring set round with Diamonds, with this Motto, FRIENDSHIP GIVES IT VALUE.

The Resolution, Blackstone, of and for Timmouth, is arrived at Plymouth from Corunna, by Permission from the Court of Spain. She left Corunna Thursday Sevensnight, where were detained 4 Packets, 4 Ships with Fish, the Wilson, and the Reynolds. The Master reports, that there were 9 Sail of the Line at Ferrol; and that the Kingdon, from Guadaloupe, belonging to Liverpool, was taken and carried in there.

The Syren, Bydat, a Letter of Marque, from Cape Francois to Bourdeaux, with 108 Hogheads of white Sugar, and 30,000 lb. of Coffee, is taken by the Alarm Privateer of Guernsey.

Twenty-three Privateers, and other Vessels, have been taken by our Cruizers from our Enemies, in three Weeks Time.

The Three Sisters, of and from Glasgow for Maryland, is arrived at Falmouth, first being taken by a French Privateer and afterwards retaken by His Majesty's Ship *Bellona*.

Letters from Germany advise, that Prince Ferdinand proposes to open the Campaign with an important Blow. His Army is considerably reinforced by the numerous Recruits that have been raised, during the Winter, in Hanover, and in other Places where the Troops were quartered. It is added, that his Serene Highness would have taken the Field before this Time, had he not waited for his final Instructions from the Court of London, which (these Letters add) is negotiating with certain Princes of Germany, and of the North, for Troops to serve in British Pay.

According to the last Letters from Paris, the Courts of France and Spain give up their West-India Settlements as lost; and are determined to make a home Thrust into the Bowels of Great-Britain and Ireland; assuring themselves, that if they succeed, England will be glad to restore all her Conquests.

Extract of a Letter from Amsterdam, April 9.

"They write from Copenhagen, that the King hath resolved to augment his Navy this Year with 24 Ships of the Line, and 12 Frigates; which occasions much Speculation.

"Letters received this Day from Paris advise, that the Plan of Operations is at length settled; and that it hath been resolved in Council, to open the Campaign by giving Battle to Prince Ferdinand, and immediately after to make the utmost Efforts to take Possession of the Electorate of Hanover."

Various Reasons have been assigned for the sudden and surprising Change in the Politics of the Court of Russia; and amongst others it is said, that a Design was laid by the French and some Malecontents, to set aside the Succession of the present Emperor; which last Account has been fully confirmed by some authentic Advices lately received from Petersburg, importing, that about two Hours before the late Empress's Death, she sent for the Grand Duke; and ordering every Person to depart the Room, informed him there was a Conspiracy to assassinate him the Moment after her Decease; that she herself had consented



to it, but that he now advised him to repair immediately to Mr. Keith, the English Minister's House, as the best Place of Safety; which he accordingly did: This accounts for the great Mark of Liberty shown by the Emperor to that Minister.

*April 15.* The following Troops are to be embarked by the 1st of this Month for Portugal, viz. From Belleisle, 5d Regiment, Old Buffs, 6th, Lamberts; 7th Buffs; 8th, Cranford's, 10 Comp. The Buffs to be completed out of Forrester's, now at Belleisle; Lamberts and Buffs by Draughts from the new Corps in England.

From Ireland, 83d Regiment, Armstrong's; 9th, Blaney's. From England, Only Burgoyne's Light Horse.

Generals; Earl of Loudoun, Geo. Townshend, Brigadiers; Cranford, Lambert, Armstrong. Adjutant-General, O'Hara. Quarter-Master General, O'Hara.

We hear that all the Regiments of Militia are ordered to hold themselves in Readiness to encamp on the first Notice.

The Embargo on all Corn and Provision Ships in the Ports of Great Britain and Ireland is prolonged one Month longer.

Yesterday Sir Edward Hawke was a great while with His Majesty at St. James's.

Letters from Rochelle advise, that the Garrison of Fort Royal was already arrived there from Martinico.

The Governor and the whole French Council of Pondicherry came over in the Prince Edward Indianman.

*Extract of a Letter from Gibraltar, March 20.*

Three Days ago was brought in here, by one of our Men of War, the Flora, a French Privateer of 20 Guns, and 250 Men. She had been out three Months from Marseilles, and had taken nothing. She was going to Cadiz for Provisions and Water, as she always cruised to the Westward of Madeira.

*April 20.* The French have nine Sail of the Line rigged, and two Frigates, in the River Charente, which leads from Rochfort; but these Ships cannot come down the River, with their Guns on, and are likewise blocked up by Commodore Howe, in the Magnanime, with ten Sail of the Line, two Frigates and two Fireships.

The three English Transports, that arrived at Rochelle with the French Garrison from Martinico, about 80 Leagues from our Islands fell in with the French Squadron that sailed from Brest the 23d of January, which, on hearing of the Loss of Martinico, steered directly for Cape Francois.

It is remarkable, that many of the Sovereign Princes of Europe now living, are the Third of their respective Names, viz.

1. George III. King of England.
2. Charles III. King of Spain.
3. Augustus III. King of Poland.
4. Charles Emanuel III. King of Sardinia.
5. Mustafa III. Emperor of the Turks.
6. Peter III. the new Emperor of Russia.

*Cope of a Letter from Dublin, April 1, 1762.*

You will probably have heard strange Accounts of a great Number of Rioters in the Counties of Tipperary, Waterford, and Limerick. Their Afflictions are in Fact very extraordinary, and the real Cause is not fully understood: But there seems to be no Foundation for the Reports of their having French or Spanish Officers among them, of their being well armed and disciplined, or indeed of their being in any Manner formidable; tho' it is supposed from what they have done, that they must be very numerous.

They at first called themselves Fables, because they appeared at Night only, and then levelled Ditches, and dug up Fields, which they alleged to have been Commons; and inclosed by neighbouring Gentlemen; and then departed before Day-light. They afterwards took the Name of Levellers, and declared they would restore the Property of the Poor, oblige Landlords to let their Land on reasonable Terms, and reduce the Price of Meat and Grain to reasonable Rates.

It is thought that large Tracts of Land are fallen into the Hands of Gentlemen in these Counties, who, on selling their Farms, removed a Number of Tenants; that these Tenants have been able to stir up their Cotters and Under-tenants to these Acts of Violence; and as the Spirit of Mischief increases fast when not quickly corrected, a large Party of the Levellers marched to Tallow, forced the Goal, and set the Prisoners at Liberty. The Magistrates had before been called upon to put the Laws in Execution, and orders were sent to the Troops throughout these Counties to assist the

Justices of the Peace in the Execution of their Offices, and a Reward of 100l. each for the discovery and apprehending the first five Rioters was proclaimed, and Promises of Pardon to the Discoverers and Parties concerned; but no Advantage followed: the Rioters increased in Number, and spread such a Terror, that the Inhabitants durst not discover, and the Magistrates were afraid to act.

The Lord Lieutenant has therefore been obliged to send Lord Drogheda's Regiment of Light Dragoons, consisting of near 500 Men, to quell these Riots; and it is not doubted, but the quartering the Regiment in proper Stations, will put an End to the whole Business. An Account came Yesterday, that 100 Levellers made an Attack on the Barracks of Cashell, in the Middle of the Night, and that a Serjeant and 12 Men drove them off, and took four of them Prisoners; and in conducting them the next Day to the Goal of Clonmell, a great Number of Levellers attempted a Rescue, but the Party firing on them, killed one Man, dispersed the rest, and lodged their Prisoners in Clonmell Goal.

There is Advice from Ireland that the Rioters have proclaimed the Pretender in that Kingdom by the Name of James III. &c. that they march with a white Flag, with the Harp and a Crown over it, and wear white Cloakades; and that it is certain that their Commanders are Officers from France and Spain. The Association of the Protestants of the City of Cork shews that they make not light of this Affair.

Some Letters from Ireland, dated the 10th Instant, mention, that a Ship had been taken upon the Coast, with several French and Spanish Officers, and a great Number of Stands of Arms on board.

Sunday Morning sailed from the Nore a Fleet of Transports, with the Horse and Foot on board, bound to Bremen.

*Admiralty Office, April 7.* His Majesty's Ship the Renown, commanded by the Hon. Captain Maitland, is arrived at Plymouth, with the Donnaville, a French Privateer Snow, of Eight Carriage and Eight Swivel Guns, and 64 Men, which she took the 24th of last Month, twelve Leagues S. W. from Scilly.

*Admiralty Office, April 14.* His Majesty's Sloop the Diligence, commanded by Capt. Osborne, is arrived at Plymouth, with a Privateer Brigantine called the Melouen, from St. Maloes, mounting six Carriage and four Swivel Guns, and manned with 34 Men, which she took on the 8th Instant off the Editons, having been out but four Days.

**I R E L A N D.**

*Cork, April 5.* This Morning Dennis Connor, of Tallow, Wool-camber, one of the White Boys, who was lately apprehended at Youghall, was carried under a proper Guard for Dublin.

Thursday last was committed to the City Goal, Darby Fitzpatrick, Taylor, for knocking down Thomas Sheehy, and for drinking good Luck to the White Boys.

Saturday Evening was committed to the County Goal, Henry Size and Nicholas Margrath, who were apprehended at Kilworth, charged and suspected of being aiding and assisting the Clan called White Boys. The same Evening was committed to the same Goal, James Drue, Peter Deneen, Garret Nagle, John Corkran, and John Mourouney, apprehended at Rathcormack, charged with being guilty of rebellious Practices.

Just now 16 more of the White Boys, one of whom is said to be a Captain and a Man of considerable Property, who were taken Yesterday near Tallow, were brought from thence to Town, guarded by a Detachment of Foot, and a Party of Light Horse, and lodged in the County Goal.

We are in hourly Expectation of more of these Levellers from Youghall, against whom Informations have been given; so that the Fears of the People in those Parts, occasioned by these lawless Rioters, are pretty well over.

Yesterday all the Roman Catholic Clergy of this City, by order of their Superior, exerted themselves in the most pathetic Terms, to excite their respective Congregations to the just Abhorrence of the infamous Practices of the Persons called Levellers, whom they represented as unfaithful to their God, by giving Umbrage to the State; and not only Enemies but Persecutors of their Religion, by provoking the Indignation of the most indulgent Government.

*Extract of a Letter from Youghall, April 2.*

Last Night the Army and Militia of this Town were under Arms for several Hours, in Expectation of a Visit from the Levellers, agreeable to their repeated Threatenings, but after waiting till 12 o'Clock without the Favour of their Company, we determined to seek them in their own Quarters:

and at One this Morning, about Fifty of our Militia, well mounted and armed, with Matthew Parker, Esq; at their Head, and Forty Soldiers, commanded by Lieutenant Lewis, marched silently from thence, arrived at Tallow about 5 o'Clock, where they took (mostly in their Beds) 11 Levellers, against whom Information on Oath was given; marched them through this Town about Noon in their White uniform, and then lodged them under a strong Guard in the Barracks, from whence they will be sent to Cork in the King's Boat the first fair Wind. The Joy in every honest Countenance on seeing these White Boys brought to Town, is inexpressible, and I hope will soon be increased by the taking some more of them; for I assure you our Lads are as eager to hunt them as ever a keen Pack of Dogs were to hunt a Fox.

*Limerick, April 5.* Yesterday and this Day two Divisions of the Earl of Drogheda's Light Dragoons arrived here.

*Dublin, April 10.* A Gentleman in the County of Cork writes to his Friend in Dublin, April 5, "What you in Dublin think of the White Boys, or Levellers, I cannot say; but, be assured, both you there, and we here, have abundant Reason to thank God, that some of those taken have discovered their Confederates. I am in hopes soon to have Information against some of their principal Gentry and Officers. Yesterday a Man was sent off to Dublin, who says he will make great Discoveries when before the Government."

*Extract of a Letter from Cork, April 5.*

By an Express from Lismore, we learn, that the Queen, with 40 of the Heads of the White Boys are taken. The Queen proves to be a Spanish Friar or Priest, who came over some Time ago to take Possession of an Estate of considerable Value; most of the People taken are Persons of good Fortune.

Several Letters from Cork, Limerick, and Waterford, advise, that upwards of 70 Rioters were already taken; that the Right Hon. Lord Beresford was remarkably active in the County of Waterford.

They write from Tipperary, that two of the Rioters being taken, they were sent under a Guard to Clonmell. On the Way a Rescue was attempted, the Soldiers fired, killed some, and wounded others. The rest ran away.

**CHARLES-TOWN (South-Carolina) May 22.** Private Letters, by an Express from Fort Prince-George last Monday, dated the 6th Instant say, that the Cherokees seemed still to have as much Venom at Heart, as at the first breaking out of the late War; and that notwithstanding their late reiterated Promises to deliver up our Prisoners, none had then yet appeared.—Capt. Mackintosh had not heard from ever the Hills since the 16th ult. nor a Word of the Prisoners.

*May 20.* On Tuesday last arrived here a French Prize Snow, called Le Bien-Aime, Francis Suau, late Master, from Cape Francois, bound for Bourdeaux, taken the Thursday before in Lat. 28, Long. 65; by the Nelly Frigate of London, Capt. Benjamin Smith Commander. The French Captain offered 5000l. for her Ransom. Her Cargo consists of about 100 Hogheads of best white Sugars, about 5 Tons of Indico, and 10 of Coffee, &c. &c. She sailed from the Cape on the 10th Instant with a Fleet of about 12 Dutch armed Sloops for Coracoa, &c. and some English Vessels, and was taken the 20th. Two Days before she left the Cape, Capt. Harvey appeared off there with 7 British Ships of the Line. The French Captain says, that he left in the Ports of Hispaniola about 80 Sail of English Traders from North-America, Providence, &c.

**NEW-YORK, June 14.**

Last Saturday Afternoon, his Majesty's Ship the Lizard, Capt. Banks, arrived here from Antigua, in 14 Days Passage; on board of whom returned his Excellency the Honourable ROBERT MONCKTON, Esq; our Governor and Commander in Chief, and Major General of his Majesty's Forces, from his successful Expedition against the Island of Martinico. His Excellency landed at Whitehall Stairs, where he was received by his Honour Lieut. Governor COLDEN, and a great Number of other Gentlemen, under the Discharge of the Cannon in Fort-George; his Excellency's sudden (though not unexpected) Arrival, affording no Time for the Militia, who were under marching Orders, to appear for his more general welcome Reception.

The Lizard had under Convoy, a Schooner which had on board Governor Monckton's Baggage, and five of his Domestic's; but the third Day after they sailed, they were seized by two large Ships, who giving Chase, came up with the Schooner, and detained her; from which it was conjectured they were Enemy's Ships. It is said one of them appeared to be a Double-decker, the other a Frigate. The Schooner has not been heard of since and it is feared is made a Capture of.

*Part of a Letter from London, April 20.*

"Every Thing is carried on so secret in the Cabinet, that nothing transpires. We hear of single Ships sailing, as well as Fleets, but never hear of their Destination, till their Arrival at the designed Place, or return with Prizes. It is the Opinion of Numbers, that tho' Mr. Pitt has declined the Ministry, he is consulted, and all his Plans pursued, he being frequently at Court, and in private with his Majesty."

The Fleet at Sandy Hook got under Way last Thursday Morning; but were obliged to come to anchor; his Majesty's Ship Intrepid having struck on the Middle Ground; and they were obliged to start 20 Tons of her Water before she got off: But they again put to Sea Friday Evening.

The 16th of May an English Fleet, consisting of 13 Ships, was seen off Montserrat.

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**T**HE Managers of the Subscription for making the River Patuxent navigable for Small Craft, from *Wills Creek* to the *Great Falls*, have resolved to postpone their Meeting at *Frederick-Town* to the 20th Day of July next.
