ROME, April 2.



It is given out, that the Court of Lisbon hath discovered, that one of the Officers of the Nunciature held an illicit Correspondence with the Portuguese Jesuits, transported into Italy, and having caused the Offender to be arrested, the said Court is resolved to send him hither to be punished.

VENICE, April 27. They write from Constantinople, that the new Ottoman Fleet is not yet sailed from the Dardanelles; and that the Pacha, who hath accepted the Command of it, did so only on Condition of not being in any Manner dependent on the Divan. A great Number of Greeks have entered on Board the Russian Squadron, which is still lying off Paros.

MITTAU, in Courland, May 1. One Hundred and Fifty Houses, with their Inhabitants and Cattle, were carried away by the Rapidity of the late Torrents at Riga.

FLORENCE, May 3. We are informed from Scarlino, a small Town in the Principality of Piombino, that on the 20th of last Month a Powder Magazine was blown up there; by which unhappy Accident many Houses were thrown down, and a great Number of People were buried under the Ruins.

MARSEILLES, May 3. Letters from Tunis import, that the Regency hath laid an Embargo on all the foreign Vessels in its Ports.

RATISBON, May 16. The Elector of Bavaria going a few Days ago to Nymphenbourg, was alarmed at seeing his Coach surrounded by a Multitude of People, who cried out, "That they did not want to hurt his Person, but demanded the immediate Dismissal of Four of his principal Ministers of State," whom they named, and to whom they attributed their present starving Condition, and indeed all their Distresses. The Body Guards refused to obey the Order they received to disperse the populace; so that there was no other Way to appease them, than the Elector's promising that their Grievances should be redressed. Since that Day, the Garrison of Munich, and the Elector's Guard, have been trebled.

LONDON, May 17.

Extra of a Letter from Stockholm, dated April 26.

"On Tuesday se'nnight a Courier arrived here from Finland, sent Express by General Ehrenswärd, with Dispatches dated the 19th, which advise, that Baron Ribbing, the Swedish Minister at Petersburg, has sent Two Letters to him, one dated the 23th, and the other the 25th Instant, informing him, that a contagious Sickness had manifested itself at Moscow, which, according to the Account of a great Number of Russian Physicians, was a burning Fever; but the Empress, in order to quiet the Minds of her Subjects, had ordered a Chain of Troops to be formed between Moscow and Petersburg. None are admitted to pass but by the high Roads, on different Parts of which, Houses are built, where all Passengers and Goods are to perform Quarantine, and every other Precaution is taken to prevent spreading the Infection. General Ehrenswärd has also forbid the Entry of all Sorts of Merchandise from any suspected Places, and no one is suffered to pass without a Letter of Health."

Letters from Hamburgh, dated May 3, confirm the above, and farther add, "that the Sickness had first appeared in a Woollen Manufactory at Moscow, but that, on setting Fire to the Building, and all that was contained in it, it was hoped they had put a Stop to it. However, the principal Inhabitants had left Moscow, and had retired as far from it as possible into the Country."

May 19. It is reported, that a Commission is preparing to pass the Great Seal, for appointing a new Board of Trade and Plantations, at which, it is said, the Earl of Essex will preside.

They write from Portugal, that a Brief is arrived there from Rome, addressed to the Patriarch of that City, empowering him to suppress, reform, separate, and disperse what Religious Houses he shall think proper throughout the whole Kingdom, and introduce such new Regulations into all the Monasteries, as shall, in a very great Measure, subject them to the Controul of the temporal Jurisdiction.

May 23. It is said that the late Jenison Shafto, Esq; died worth 90,000l. and that by some Time since performing the extraordinary Feat of Horsemanship, of riding 50 Miles within Two Hours, he won 12,000l.

May 27. It is said that Lady G—— has proved her Recrimination. The Success of her Ladyship's Attack on his Lordship will be very alarming to many Men of Fashion who neglect their Ladies; for if the Facts are proved, they will be in Bar of any Sentence of Separation, although any Thing may happen to be proved against a Lady; the Law holding, that Persons of Gallantry are the fittest to live together.

May 29. They write from Lisbon, that Advice had been received from the Brazils, of a dangerous Set of Pirates, who have lately infested those Parts, and taken

several homeward bound Vessels from Rio Janeiro to Europe.

A noble Earl, who is said to have lost above 30,000l. at Hazard within these Two Years, is grown tired of that sedentary Amusement, and has been prevailed on by the black-legged Gentry to visit the Tennis-Court, in order to complete his Ruin; where he is become a constant Attendant, and has within these few Days lost upwards of 5000l.

A debauched young Spendthrift, who has ruined his Finances by every Species of fashionable Extravagance, was lately married to a young Lady of very considerable Fortune (who, in all Probability, he will soon make a Beggar of too) with no other Ceremony of Courtship, or Prelude to their Marriage, than seeing her once at an Assembly, and saying to her, "Will you have me, Madam? You are a good fine Girl; I'll have you, by G-d, if you will." To which the Lady immediately consented, and they were married the Week following. Such are the Coxcombs and the Women of the present Age!

Extra of a Letter from Paris, dated May 20.

"The Distractions of this Country daily increase: The Princes of the Blood, and the Parliament of France, are united in one firm Body to oppose the Tyranny of the Court; and the King of Spain, as a Prince of the House of Bourbon, is strongly attached to them, and determined to support them against the Court of Versailles, whose politics he detests, and whose Plan he abhors, for re-establishing the Jesuits in France. The fine qua non of the Princes of the Blood is, the Restoration to all the Parliaments of France of their original Constitutional Privileges; their Freedom of Debate, of annulling and registering of parliamentary Edicts, and the Dismissal for ever, from the Service of France, the following Regiments of Mercenaries, the strongest Support of Tyranny in France, and at this Crisis the only Foundation for absolute Government; Cavalry, Royal Lorraine; Dragons, Jura, Schonberg; Infantry, Swiss Guards, Alsace, Anhalt, Royal Italien, D'Erlich, Boccard, Sonnenberg, Castella, Waldner, Jenner, La Marck, Dieblich, Courten, Bulkeley, Clare, Dillon, Royal Swedes, Wallis, Berwick, Royal Baviere, Salis, Royal Corse, Nassau, Lockman, Royal Deux Ponts, Eptengen, Buttafaco; Light Infantry, Legion de Lorraine, Legion de Corse."

"Very disagreeable News arrived by a Courier last Night from Strasburgh, and this Morning, it is said, the Empress Queen has complied with the Request of our Court, to form a Camp this Summer of Forty Battalions near Brussels.—not to attack France, but to stifle those Sparks of Liberty that begin to blaze in the different Parliaments of France."

June 3. On Condition General Paoli relinquishes all Views of disturbing Corsica for the future, he has been offered a very noble Income by the Court of France, to be settled upon him and his Heirs. To this Offer his Friends on this Side the Water advise him to accede, which, it is said, he is very willing to do; and when this is completed he will be presented to a considerable Command in the British Army.

June 4. Our most gracious Queen, we are assured, has within these Two Months given considerable sums of Money out of her own private Purse, to relieve the Distresses of real Objects of Charity.

Extra of a Letter from the Hague, May 23.

Yesterday Morning the grand Manœuvres of the Garrison of this Place were finished; but their End, contrary to all Expectation, was somewhat tragical, as one of the Captains of the Regiment of the Holland Guards was dangerously wounded in the Thigh, by a Ball, which, it is presumed, was discharged by a Soldier of the Regiment of the Swiss Guards, and which, according to Appearances, was not designed for that Officer, but for the Duke of Wolfenbuttle, Field-Marshal, who was very near him. This Misfortune threw all the Officers into great Consternation, and the Retreat was immediately ordered to be beaten, and the Troops to be dismissed, though they had not gone through half their Manœuvres. The Prince of Orange, the Duke Field-Marshal, and all the Generals, are returned here, very sorrowfully affected by this unhappy Adventure.

On a Motion in the Court of Chancery, for appointing a Receiver of the Rents and Profits of the Estates of the late Alderman Beckford, on Account of a Disference in Opinion of the Executors, it appeared that his Estates in England amounted to 7000l. per Annum, and in the West-Indies to 20,000l. per Annum, at the lowest: It likewise was asserted by the Attorney General, that in the Course of the last Year the Infant was brought in Debtor 37 l. odd Shillings; he said he did not doubt but it must astonish the Court, but it was a real Fact.

June 5. It is said that Lord N—— will retire to Italy for the Benefit of his Health, or the Preservation of his Life, as it is believed, from many undoubted Proofs, that he is not able to give a just Account of his Stewardship.

It was this Morning confidently reported at several Coffee-Houses about the Royal Exchange, that the Carlton House Junto were dissolved, on Account of

finding a Storm gathering over their Heads, which, if it burst, must be fatal to them all; as a certain Lady can no longer protect them in their unconstitutional Proceedings, her Influence at St. James's being lost.

June 6. When the first Report of L——'s Infidelity was carried to the Queen's Palace, their Majesties were at Cards with the D——s of A——r. The K——, who sincerely loves Lord L——r, was much affected with the News; on which her Majesty observed, that it was no Wonder such Things happened, when the greatest Encouragement was given to Places, which were only calculated to increase female Licentiousness (alluding to a certain Place of polite Entertainment). Her Majesty then returned to the D——s of A——r, and said, "and there is the Coterie too, another pretty Place." The D——s then attempted to defend the last mentioned Society, but was stopp'd short by her Majesty, who said, "It is a very silly Institution (to say the best of it) my Lady D——s, and I desire to hear no more of it."

A Letter from Ternate, one of the Dutch Spice Islands in Asia, dated August 23, 1770, mentions, that since the Middle of July pre eding, that Island has fallen into a most deplorable State, by the Ravages occasioned by a Volcano, which was succeeded by an a most perpetual Earthquake, the Shocks of which followed each other so quick, that in 24 Hours 60 considerable Shocks were felt, whereby not one House belonging to the Dutch Factory or the Inhabitants escaped great Damage, and even the Church. All the Inhabitants without Exception are obliged to quit their Houses, and lodge under Cabbins or Tents. The Governor is gone aboard the Ship Nord Nieuwand, which was detained here on Purpose. The last Explosion of the Volcano, which was a few Days before the above Date, is inexpressible, on account of the Quantity of Cinders, burning Stone, and inflammatory Matter thrown out. Since that Time the Shocks of the Earth are diminished to 4 or 5 in a Day.

The Reports concerning the State of the G r ifons at Gibraltar and in Minorca, having been made in Terms by no Means to be reconciled, it has been thought advisable to send a Great Personage, who having applied himself with uncommon Assiduity to study the military Sciences, is esteemed the ablest General in Great Britain.

June 8. Though we have lately suffered the French Ambassador and his Attendants to visit our Dock-yards, a Correspondent observes, that in March 1770, when an English East-Indiaman, having lost her Masts off Ushant, steered into the Road of Brest to rest, the Intendant of the Marine sent a Messige, charging the Crew not to come on Shore; the Officers indeed were permitted, but so cautious were the French, that they conducted them by the back Wall of the Forts of Louvernois, a Town about Twelve Miles off, where they continued for Five Weeks, under the strictest Inspection; in the mean Time the Ship was supplied, and being fit for Sea, the Officers were brought to Town, to a Coffeehouse near the Esplanade, where the Swiss Regiment was exercised for their Entertainment; after which they were conducted on Board their Ship, but not till it was dark, and a fair Wind springing up, they set Sail the next Morning.

A whimsical Gentleman, in the Neighbourhood of Soho, hath caused the following Label to be put over his Door: To House-breakers. No Plate nor Money kept within this House.

The Letter from the Budziack and Edissan Tartars to the Empress of Russia, lately presented by the Deputies, among other Matters, says as follows: "Our Fathers and Ancestors, who were never in Subjection to any foreign Power, passed their Days in Tranquillity, and at all Times followed their own Usages and Customs; but, for some Years past, the Ottoman Porte having, by various Stratagems and Menaces, forced our People to submit to the Yoke, we at length lost our original Freedom. At this Period, when the Turks, setting no Bounds to their Ferocity and Avarice, undertook an unjust War against their Neighbours, we, by Orders received from the Porte, were constrained to act hostily with them, by which Means we were, much against our Wills, obliged to shed a Deluge of innocent Blood, besides committing all the Horrors naturally attendant on War: But our Tyrants meeting with a Refusal, we have happily been enabled to throw off the Yoke, and beg Leave to throw ourselves under the Protection of your Imperial Majesty." Her Imperial Majesty received the Deputies graciously, ordered her Ministers to confer with, and confirm to them their Request, and to assure them of her Favour.

The following Conversation passed a few Evenings ago at a great House in the Park: Their Majesties were at Piquet, and the Prince of Wales and the Bishop of Osnaburgh in the Room. His Majesty happened to have Three Kings in his Hand, which he was going to reckon, when the Queen declared she had Four Knaves, which won the Game. The Prince of Wales (not understanding the Game) said, he thought it was very hard that Four Knaves should beat Three Kings; the Bishop made Answer, that it was no Wonder, as Knaves had so much Power. The Prince of Wales said, if that was the Case, he would not play at

CHARLES TOWN (South-Carolina) July 22.
The Spaniards of Hispaniola complain of the French encroaching on their Territory; very lately they entered a Plantation, cut down the Coffee Trees, ransacked the Dwelling-House, and maltreated the Owner. On which the French Governor sent an Officer, with Two Companies of Grenadiers, and the Maréchaussee, who not only dispossessed the Spaniards, but carried Fifty of them to Cape Francois, where they were sent to the common Jail.

BOSTON, August 5.
We learn from the Island of Hispaniola, that a malignant Fever had broke out among the Inhabitants of that Island, whereof great Numbers of them died every Day.

Since our last arrived here from the Southward, the Rose and Beaver Men of War, and the Bonnetta, from Halifax: The Mermaid was arrived there in Four Days. The Senegal Sloop of War, and Hope Schooner, failed from hence last Wednesday.

Extract from the Journal of the Honourable the House of Burgesses.

Resolved, nemine contradicente. That an elegant Statue of his late Excellency the Right Honourable Norborne Baron de Botetourt be erected in Marble at the publick Expence, with proper Inscriptions, expressing the grateful Sense this House entertains of his Lordship's prudent and wise Administration, and their great Solicitude to perpetuate, as far as they are able, the Remembrance of so many publick and social Virtues which adorned his illustrious Character. That the same be sent for to Great-Britain, under the Direction of the Honourable William Nelson, Thomas Nelson, and Peyton Randolph, Esqrs. Robert Carter Nicholas, Lewis Burwell, and Dudley Digges, Esqrs.

Resolved. That the Treasurer pay for the Statue to be erected to the Memory of Lord Botetourt out of the publick Money in the Treasury.

PHILADELPHIA, August 2.
The Report of a Party of Men being cut off, who were dispatched from Northampton County with Provisions for our People in the Block-House at Wioming, who are besieged by the Connecticut Party, appears by the following Extract of a Letter (which came to Town the 6th Instant, by Express) from the Person who commanded the Convoy, to be without Foundation.

Wiming, August 1, 1771.
"Last Tuesday, about break of Day, I arrived at this Place with 31 Men and the Provisions; and was attacked by the Connecticut Party, who had Information of our coming, by a Letter falling into their Hands, with which an Indian was sent by Captain Ogden. We were surrounded by their Fire, and lost Two Horse Loads of our Flour, and got in with the Remainder and Twenty-two Men, Two of whom are wounded. Nine of our Men are missing; whether they retreated, or are killed, I cannot as yet give Information. They have kept an almost continual Fire on the Block-House ever since, from Four Intrenchments; but we are determined to hold out to the last Extremity. I am, Sir, your humble Servant,

A P R O C L A M A T I O N.

ROBERT EDEN.

WHEREAS the Right Honourable the Earl of Hillsborough, One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has transmitted to me the following Acts of Parliament, viz. "An ACT to continue for a further Time, an ACT made in the Eighth Year of his present Majesty's Reign, intituled, *An ACT to continue and amend an Act made in the Fifth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, intituled, An ACT for Importation of salted Beef, Pork, Bacon and Butter, from Ireland, for a limited Time; and for allowing the Importation of salted Beef, Pork, Bacon and Butter, from the British Dominions in America, for a limited Time.*" "An ACT for further continuing Two Acts made in the Sixth and Ninth Years of his Majesty's Reign, for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters in his Majesty's Dominions in America." "An ACT to explain an ACT made in the Eighth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the First, intituled, *An ACT giving further Encouragement for the Importation of Naval Stores, and for other Purposes therein mentioned, so far as relates to the Importation of unmanufactured Wood of the Growth and Product of America; and to explain so much of an ACT made in the Twenty-sixth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, An ACT for enlarging and regulating the Trade into the Levant Seas, as relates to the Importation of Raw Silk and Mohair Yarn landed at certain Places therein mentioned.*" And, "An ACT for granting a Bounty upon the Importation of White Oak Staves and Heading, from the British Colonies or Plantations in America." And whereas I have judged it expedient to notify the same here, I do therefore, by and with the Advice and Consent of his Lordship's Council of State, hereby strictly charge and require the Sheriff of the City of Annapolis to publish, in the usual Manner, this my Proclamation, together with the Acts of Parliament hereunto annexed, that all his Majesty's Subjects within this Province may take due Notice thereof, and conform themselves accordingly, as he will answer the contrary at his Peril.

Given at the City of Annapolis, this 26th Day of August, in the Twenty-first Year of his Lordship's Dominion, Anno Domini 1771.

An ACT for granting a Bounty upon the Importation of White Oak Staves, and Heading, from the British Colonies or Plantations in America.



WHEREAS the allowing a Bounty upon the Importation of White Oak Staves, and Heading for Casks, from the British Colonies or Plantations in America into this Kingdom, under certain Restrictions, may tend to promote the Trade and Interchange of the said Plantations with Great-Britain, and be a Means of supplying the Manufacturers of Casks for the Use of the Brewers and Distillers in this Kingdom with such Materials at more reasonable Rates than they can at present be procured, as well as saving great Sums of Money to his Majesty's Subjects, which are now expended for the Purchase thereof amongst foreign Nations: May it therefore please your most Excellent Majesty that it may be enacted; and be it enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That from and after the First Day of January, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Seventy-Two, every Person or Persons who shall, within the Time appointed by this Act, import, or cause to be imported, into the Ports of London, Southampton, Poole, Exeter, Plymouth, Bristol, Liverpool, Whitehaven, Glasgow, Leith, Hull, Newcastle, and Yarmouth, or either of them, directly from any of the British Colonies or Plantations in America, in any Ship or Ships that may lawfully trade thither, manned as by Law is required, any good, sound, and merchantable Staves, and Heading of White Oak, free from Sap, Wormholes, Knots, and Bites, of the following Dimensions, of the Growth or Product of the said Colonies or Plantations, shall have and enjoy as a Bounty or Premium for such Importation, the following Sums; that is to say,

For every One Thousand and Two Hundred (each Hundred containing Five Score) of Pipe Staves, each

Stave not being less than Five Feet Six Inches long, from Four Inches and One-half of an Inch to Six Inches broad, and Two Inches thick at the thinnest Edge, which shall be so imported from the First Day of January, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Seventy-two, to the First Day of January, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Seventy-five, the Sum of Six Pounds, and in the like Proportion for any greater or less Number.

For every One Thousand and Eight such Hundred of Hoghead Staves, each Stave not being less than Four Feet Six Inches long, from Four Inches and One-half of an Inch, to Six Inches broad, and One Inch and One-half of an Inch thick at the thinnest Edge, which shall be so imported from and after the said First Day of January, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Seventy-two, to the First Day of January, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Seventy-five, the Sum of Six Pounds, and in the like Proportion for any greater or less Number.

For every Two Thousand and Four such Hundred of Barrel Staves, each Stave being from Three Feet Six Inches to Three Feet Eight Inches at the least in length, from Four Inches to Five Inches broad, and One Inch and One-half of an Inch thick at the thinnest Edge, which shall be so imported from and after the said First Day of January, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Seventy-two, to the First Day of January, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Seventy-five, the Sum of Six Pounds, and in the like Proportion for any greater or less Number.

For every Three Thousand and Six such Hundred Pieces of Pipe, Hoghead and Barrel Heading, each Piece of Pipe Heading being Two Feet Eight Inches long, each Piece of Hoghead Heading being Two Feet Four Inches long, and each Piece of Barrel Heading being Two Feet and One Inch long at the least, and each being Two Feet and One Inch thick at the thinnest Edge, which shall be so imported from and after the said First Day of January, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Seventy-two, to the First Day of January, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Seventy-five, the Sum of Six Pounds, and in the like Proportion for any greater or less Number.

For every One Thousand Two Hundred such Pipe Staves; for every One Thousand Eight Hundred such Hoghead Staves; for every Two Thousand Four Hundred such Barrel Staves; and for every Three Thousand Six Hundred Pieces of such Heading as above described, which shall be so imported from and after the said First Day of January, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Seventy-two, to the first Day of January, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Seventy-five, the Sum of Four Pounds: And for every One Thousand Two Hundred such Pipe Staves; for every One Thousand Eight Hundred such Hoghead Staves; for every Two Thousand Four Hundred such Barrel Staves; and for every Three Thousand Six Hundred Pieces of such Heading, as above described, which shall be so imported from and after the said first Day of January, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Seventy-eight, to the First Day of January, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Eighty-one, the Sum of Two Pounds; to be paid on Demand to the Importer of such Goods, by the Collector of the Port where the same shall be respectively imported as aforesaid, out of any Money in his Hands arising by any of the Duties of Customs on Goods imported: And in Case the Collector of the Customs where such Goods shall be imported shall not have Money sufficient in his Hands to pay the same, he is hereby required to certify the same to the Commissioners of the Customs, who shall cause the same to be paid by the Receiver-General of his Majesty's Customs the said Premium of Bounty for the said Goods imported into England; to be paid by the Receiver-General of the Customs in England; and for such as shall be imported into Scotland, to be paid by the Receiver-General there.

And, in order to intitle the Importer of such Goods to the Bounty or Premium granted by this Act, and to prevent Frauds by importing foreign or other Staves or Heading not intitled thereto, be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That it shall and may be lawful for the proper Officer or Officers of his Majesty's Customs, before such Goods are laden on board any Ship or Vessel in any of the said Colonies or Plantations, with an Intent to be imported into this Kingdom, for the Bounty or Premium herein before granted, carefully to examine such Goods, by such Means

as he or they shall think proper, to find out and discover whether the same in every Respect answer the Description herein before mentioned: And all and every Person and Persons importing any such Goods into Great Britain as aforesaid, shall produce to the Collector, Comptroller, or principal Officer of the Customs, at the Port of Importation, a Certificate, under the Hand and Seal of the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, Collector of his Majesty's Customs, and Naval Officer, or any Two of them residing and being within the said Colonies or Plantations, that before the Departure of such Ship or Vessel the Person or Persons loading the same had made Oath before them, that the said Goods so shipped on board were truly and bona fide the Growth and Produce of some or One of the British Colonies or Plantations in America, and specifying the Colony or Colonies, Plantation or Plantations respectively, of which such Goods is or are the Growth or Produce, (which Oath the said Governor, Lieutenant-Governor and Collector of his Majesty's Customs, and Naval Officer, or any Two of them, are hereby authorized to administer); and the said Certificate shall also express the Number, Quantity, Quality, and Species of each Sort of Goods respectively, and that the same had been examined by the proper Officer or Officers of the Customs before the shipping thereof, pursuant to the Directions of this Act; which Officer or Officers is and are hereby required to certify therein, whether such Goods, or any Part thereof, are or are not made from White Oak, and good, sound, and merchantable, free from Sap, Wormholes, Knots, and Bites, and are or are not of the Dimensions and Descriptions herein before respectively mentioned; and the Master, or other Person having the Charge or Command of the Ship or Vessel importing such Goods, shall on his Arrival, make Oath before the Collector, Comptroller, or principal Officer of the Customs, at the Port of Importation, that the said Goods so imported were truly laden on board his Ship or Vessel, in One of the said Colonies or Plantations, and are the same Goods as are contained and mentioned in such Certificate:

And, for the better preventing Frauds in the entering any of the Goods before mentioned, in order to obtain the Bounty thereon, be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That it shall and may be lawful for any proper Officer or Officers of the Customs, after the Entry, and at or after the Landing of such Goods, to take Samples thereof, in such Manner, and in such Proportion, as he or they shall judge proper, to examine the same; and if, upon such Examination, it shall appear, that in the whole Quantity so entered there are to the Amount of Ten Pieces in an Hundred that do not, in all Respects, answer the Descriptions and Dimensions herein before described, so as to be entitled to the Bounty herein before granted; then, and in such Case, no Bounty shall be paid or allowed for any Part of the Hundred Pieces in which such deficient Ten Pieces shall be found; and if more than Twenty Pieces in an Hundred of the Quantity so entered shall be found, on such Examination, not to be entitled to the Bounty; then, besides the Loss of the said Bounty, the Importer shall also forfeit and lose the Sum of Fifty Pounds; to be prosecuted and recovered as herein after mentioned.

And be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That no Fee, Gratuity, or Reward, shall be demanded, taken, or received, by any Officer of his Majesty's Customs for examining, viewing, or delivering such Staves and Heading with Respect to the Premium or Bounty allowed by this Act, or for the signing any of the Certificates in order to the receiving such Premium or Bounty, or for paying the same; and any such Officer demanding or taking such Fee or Reward, shall, for such Offence, forfeit his Office, and be forever incapable of executing any Office or Employment under his Majesty, his Heirs and Successors.

And be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That if any such Staves and Heading of the Growth or Produce of any of the said Colonies or Plantations shall be again exported from Great Britain, then, and in every such Case, the Persons exporting the same shall, before the Entry thereof, pay unto the Collector of the Customs of the Port where the same shall be exported, or to the Chief Officer of the Customs there, the full sum which is allowed as a Premium or Bounty by this Act on all such Staves and Heading as he intends to export.

And be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That if any Person, his, her, or their Agent or Agents, Assignee or Assigns, shall be found fraudulently to export or load on board any Ship, Vessel, or Boat, in order to be exported, such Staves and Heading, without paying such Premium or Bounty to the Chief Officer or Collector of the Customs as aforesaid, such Person and Persons shall forfeit and lose all such Staves and Heading, and double the Value thereof.

And be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That if any Collector or Comptroller of the Customs, or Naval Officer, shall make any false Certificate; or if any Merchant, Trader, Factor, or other Person, shall make any false Oath with regard to the Growth of such Staves and Heading; or if any Master or Commander of any Ship or Vessel shall make any false Oath concerning the Certificate for or the Identity of such Staves and Heading; or if any Person or Persons shall counterfeit any such Certificate, as is herein before directed to be made, in order to obtain any Premium or Bounty hereby granted; all and every such Person and Persons so offending in any of the Cases aforesaid, shall forfeit the Sum of Two Hundred Pounds; And if any such Person so offending shall be a Collector, Comptroller, or Naval Officer, or any other Officer of the Customs, he shall also forfeit and lose his Office, and be incapable of serving his Majesty, his Heirs and Successors.

And be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That the several Penalties and Forfeitures by this Act inflicted shall and may be sued for, prosecuted, determined, and recovered, by Bill, Plaint, or Information, in any of his Majesty's Courts of Record at West-

minster, or the Court of Exchequer in Scotland, or in any of the Courts of Admiralty in his Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America respectively, where such Penalty or Forfeiture shall be incurred; wherein no Essoin, Protection, Wager of Law, or more than One Imparance shall be allowed.

And be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That all Penalties and Forfeitures by this Act imposed, shall, if incurred in Great Britain, be applied, One Moiety to the Use of his Majesty, his Heirs and Successors, and the other Moiety to such Person or Persons as shall sue for the same; and all such Penalties and Forfeitures as shall be incurred in any of the said Colonies or Plantations, shall be applied, One-third Part thereof to the Use of his Majesty, his Heirs and Successors, One-third Part to the Use of the Governor of the Colony or Plantation where such Penalty and Forfeiture is incurred, and the remaining Third Part to such Person or Persons who shall sue for the same.

And be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That if any Action or Suit shall be commenced against any Person or Persons for any Thing done in pursuance of this Act, every such Action or Suit, if in Great Britain, shall be commenced within Six Calendar Months next after the Fact committed, and if in any of the said Colonies or Plantations, within Eighteen Calendar Months next after the Fact committed, and not afterwards; and the Defendant or Defendants, in any such Action or Suit, may plead the General Issue, and give this Act and the Special Matter in Evidence, at any Trial to be had thereupon, and that the same was done in pursuance of and by the Authority of this Act: And if it shall appear so to have been done, the Jury shall find for the Defendant or Defendants; and if the Plaintiff shall be acquitted, or discontinue his Action after the Defendant or Defendants shall have appeared; or if Judgment shall be given upon any Verdict, or Demurrer, against the Plaintiff, the Defendant or Defendants shall and may recover Treble Costs, and have the like Remedy for the same, as any Defendant or Defendants hath or have in other Cases by Law.

And be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That if any Doubt or Dispute shall arise, whether the Staves and Heading, or any Part thereof, so to be imported or exported as aforesaid, are of the Growth or Produce of any of the said Colonies or Plantations, or of any other Growth or Produce; or if any Action shall be brought by the Owner or Claimer of such Goods, against any Officer of the Customs, or any other Person, for any Thing done in pursuance of this Act, and any Doubt or Question, shall thereupon arise concerning the Place of the Growth or Produce of such Goods, the *Onus probandi* shall lie on the Owner or Claimer of such Goods, or the Person claiming the Premium or Bounty, and not on the Person who seized or stopped the same, or against whom such Action shall be brought; any Law, Custom, or Usage, to the Contrary notwithstanding.

PETERSBURGH, May 14.

THIS City is at present the Rendezvous of many different Nations. We have Bredziah and Jeddian Tartars, Kirizes that border on China, Georgians, Greeks, Circassians, Caburdians, and Crebans, Poles and Cossacks, all of them differing in Physiognomy, as well as in Dress and Language. The Kirizes inhabit Mount Imaus. They have sent a numerous Embassy, which has been Six Months on its Journey. Among them is a young Prince, who has 29 Brothers, and cannot tell how many Wives the Chan his Father possesses.

LEGHORN, May 14. We learn from Calabria, that they have apprehended a Robber called Bruno Grillo, who had rendered himself formidable by the many Assassinations which he has committed for these 12 Years past. He had made himself, in a deep Forest, a subterraneous Retreat, which would never have been discovered, had he not been betrayed by the Man who carried him Provisions, and who was the only human Being with whom he held any Commerce. This Villain has confessed, that he committed 63 Murders.

VIENNA, May 25. Couriers constantly pass and repass, between our Court and those of Berlin and Petersburg; but we know nothing of the Contents of their Dispatches. The Marks of Esteem, however, which are shown to Count Orlov and Prince Dolgorucki, who are unexpectedly arrived here, clearly prove that a good Understanding subsists between her Imperial Majesty and the Empress of Russia.

PARIS, May 31. On the 27th Inst. 42 Counsellors of the Chatelet received Letters de Cachet, which banish them to different Places. They have Orders to depart within 24 Hours.

It is said that M. de Guignes, our Ambassador at the Court of London, is recalled.

There has been an Insurrection at Nancy, on Account of the bad Quality and Dearthness of Bread.

We have Letters from Rochford, which say, that the Women of the Isle of Rhe have occasioned a Riot on Account of a Tax that was to be laid upon Beef. We learn from Nancy, that there was a considerable Riot in that Place, likewise, on Account of the bad Quality of the Bread that was sold. Four Thousand Women were in Motion, and the Garrison were obliged to take up Arms to disperse them.

VERSAILLES, June 5. The Dearthness of Corn has reduced Franche Comte to a deplorable Situation. The King has ordered 50000 Livres to be distributed among the Poor of the different Communities. The Incumbents of the different Parishes have seconded his Majesty, and distributed Alms.

LONDON, June 10.

It is reported that Lord Gower will resign the Prebendship of the Council, and be appointed Lord Privy Seal.

It is likewise reported, but we know not from what Authority, that in case the above Change takes Place, Lord Camden will be appointed Lord President.

The last Letters from Gibraltar intimate, that a Spanish Camp was forming, in the Neighbourhood of La Roche, and that one Moldivi, a French Engineer in the Spanish Service, had declared that Gibraltar was not impregnable.

The Salary of the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, it is said, is to be increased 4000*l.*—from 16000*l.* its present Establishment, to 20000*l.* per Annum.

A new Treaty is now on Foot between the Courts of Versailles and Turin, and nearly concluded, which, it is said, is in direct Opposition to the Treaties between the Sardinian and British Courts.

We hear that Commodore Byron has carried out with him fresh Instructions to keep the French within their Boundaries, for carrying on the Cod Fishery at Newfoundland, as every Season, since the Conclusion of the late War; they have given great Trouble to the Governors, and the Captains of the Men of War stationed there, by setting up fresh Claims to Harbours, Fishing-works, &c. besides pretending a Right to the Salmon and Whale Fisheries.

His Majesty's Ship the Panther of 60 Guns, Capt. Gayton, in which the Hon. Commodore Byron was proceeding to his Command to Newfoundland, is put back to Plymouth, with the Loss of her Mainmast.

Saturday Morning, at Four o'Clock, died George Montague Dunk, Earl of Halifax, Viscount Sunbury, Secretary of State for the Northern Department, Ranger and Warden of Salcey Forest and Bushy Park, Lord Lieutenant and Custos Rotulorum of Northamptonshire, and one of his Majesty's most Hon. Privy Council, Knight of the Garter, a Governor of the Charter-House, and Lieutenant General of his Majesty's Forces.

Last Night died at his House near Hanover-Square, after a tedious and painful Illness, which he bore with the greatest Fortitude and Resignation, the Bishop of St. David's in 1744, and translated to the See of Durham in 1752, in both which Dioceses his Name will be long remembered with Honour and Regret, by Laity as well as Clergy.

June 13. Monday Evening some Dispatches were received by Count Brehl, the Saxon Ambassador, which confirm the Accounts of an Accommodation taking Place between the Empress of Russia and the Porte; and add, that a Suspension of Arms has already taken Place.

Private Letters from Paris assure, that the Princes of the Blood and Nobles, who have been banished, are expected daily to be recalled, and that the Affairs of that Kingdom will then be put on a more amicable Footing.

June 14. Yesterday there was a grand Court and Drawing-room at St. James's, at which his Majesty was present; all the great Officers of State, foreign Ministers, &c. attended; after it was over, a Cabinet Council was held, at which the Lords North, Rochford, and Suffolk, assisted.

We are informed that the Yearly Revenue of the late Lord Halifax's Estates is now (being free from Incumbrances) worth 30,000*l.* per Annum.

Eighteen Horses in training, the Property of the late Jennison Shatto, Esq; were sold by Mr. Pond, at Newmarket, last Monday, for 6144 Guineas; the principal Buyers were Lord Grosvenor, Mr. Strode, Mr. Blake, and Mr. Christopher Blake; the latter purchased the famous Horse Gnawpost for 700 Guineas.

June 15. Lord North is appointed Ranger and Warden of Bushy Park, in the Room of the Earl of Halifax, deceased; and also Ranger and Warden of Salcey Park, in the County of Northampton, as being contiguous to his Estate in that County.

It is reported that the Duke of Grafton's being appointed Lord Privy Seal was without the Consent of Lord North, who had offered it to Lord Chatham, by whom it was rejected, he insisting on Lord Camden's being restored, as likewise on a Dissolution of Parliament.

We are well assured, that several Changes of Consequence will take Place in a short Time, upon the Resignation of several great Men now in Office.

Yesterday the Right Hon. Lord Suffolk kissed his Majesty's Hand, on being appointed Secretary of State for the Northern Department, in the Room of the late Earl of Halifax.

All the foreign Ministers resident here are hourly making a Jest of the egregious Folly and glaring Absurdity, in appointing Lord Suffolk Secretary of State, and Mr. Wheatley his *Comes*, neither of whom can speak a single Sentence of French.—*O Fleish, fleish, how art thou shifted!*

We hear that the Society of the Bill of Rights, who have again begun a Subscription for the Payment of Mr. Wilkes's Debts, will, at their next Meeting, take into Consideration the State of the 1500*l.* which was remitted to that Society from Charles-Town.—The several Members of the Assembly, who voted that Sum out of the publick Money, did it, no Doubt, with a good Design, and for the good of the Province; but have since found to their Cost, that they must stand to the Loss of this Sum themselves, as it can not now be taken from the publick Cash of the Province. And it is certainly every Way consistent with the Spirit and Conduct of so publick spirited an Institution as the Society of the Bill of Rights to preserve their Friends from being Sufferers in their private Capacity, for what they did as Members of the Assembly, especially if it be considered, that many, who, in their Zeal for a good Cause, gave their Vote, can very ill afford to pay their Quota towards such a Sum of Money.

A very powerful Association is forming in the capital Provinces of France, to refuse the Payment of all Taxes.
