## NOTES ON ACADEMIC DRESS

Academic costume seems to have originated at the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge in England over 600 years ago, and to this day the most colorful gowns in the world are those worn at Oxford University functions. European institutions continue to show great diversity in their academic dress. As a consequence of each university adopting or creating its own costume, the British system is full of contradictions. Therefore, when American colleges and universities desired to adopt some suitable system of academic apparel, it seemed best to agree on a definite system which all might follow.

The distinctions set up by the Intercollegiate Code are simple. Gowns for the BACHELOR'S degree are to be fashioned from "worsted stuff" with semi-stiff yoke, long pleated front and intricate shirring across the shoulders and back. The Bachelor's gown should be worn closed and is primarily distinguished by its long, pointed sleeves.

The MASTER'S gown has the same yoke effect and is also designed to be worn closed. Although the gowns are basically similar in design, the full-length sleeves of the MASTER'S gown are distinctive because of their long crescent shape which extends below the cut at the base of the sleeve itself.

Gowns for the DOCTOR'S degree, also worn closed, carry velvet panels draped around the neck and stitched down the front edges. These panels widen to five inches at the chest and are carried at this width all the way down to the hem of the garment. Three horizontal velvet bars are attached on the upper arm of the full, round, bell-shaped sleeves. This velvet trimming may be either black or the color distinctive of the faculty to which the degree refers.

In accordance with academic custom, recipients of the Doctor's degree, members of the University's governing boards and government officials in the Procession are entitled to wear the official cap and gown.

In America, the hood is the most outstanding feature of the academic costume. The hood is an inverted shield with one or more chevrons of a secondary color on the ground of the primary color of the college. The color of the facing of the hood denotes the discipline represented by the degree. The shape of the bachelor's hood and the master's hood is similar, both being three and one-half feet in over-all length. The doctor's hood has a base which is rounded and has an over-all length of four feet. The respective widths of the velvet or velveteen border are two inches for bachelor's, three inches for master's and five inches for doctor's hoods. The lining of the hood is the official color or colors of the institution conferring the degree. In this way the official colors of the college or university are combined.

In assigning colors to signify the respective faculties, the Intercollegiate Commission retained as far as practicable, historical associations. White for art is taken from the white fur edging of the Oxford hood; red, traditional color of the church, was assigned to theology; green, the color of herbs, for medicine; golden-yellow for science, etc. Below is given a partial list of faculty colors as prescribed by the Intercollegiate Code.

Arts, letters, humanities, white; business administration, drab; economics, copper; education, pedagogy, light blue; engineering, orange; fine arts, architecture, brown; laws, purple; library science, lemon; music, pink; pharmacy, olive green; philosophy, blue; science, golden-yellow; physical education, sage green; theology and divinity, scarlet.

The tassels worn on the cap, frequently referred to as the "mortarboard", may be black or of the color indicating the major area of study pursued by the graduate. The choice of a tassel made of gold metallic thread is restricted to the doctorate and governing officials of institutions.

## CANDIDATES FOR DEGREES IN COURSE

At this Commencement degrees are conferred upon persons who completed requirements in June, 1966, January, 1966, and July, 1965. As it is not possible, prior to the printing of this program, to determine who will have completed degree requirements, the lists of June candidates are tentative. The diploma of the College, signed and sealed by its proper officers, remains the official testimony to the possession of a degree.
