L O N D O N, September 12.

**I**N the Conclusion of the Remonstrances that were lately presented to the French King by the Parliament of Normandy, against his Edicts for levying of new Taxes, the Parliament thus address his Majesty: "If your Majesty be desirous to give your People a Proof of your royal and paternal Affection, you may, without any Difficulty, establish at once both their Happiness and your own Glory. You will accomplish, Sir, this Object so truly worthy of the Goodness of your Heart, by reducing all the Impôts to one only; that is to say, by demanding of the Province their proportional Contribution to the Wants of the State, and by authorizing them to levy it themselves, as shall be most for their common Interest, and to carry it directly to your Majesty. Your Treasury will then receive without Reduction; the People will pay without Compulsion; and the Nation will be rescued from the Tyranny of greedy and insatiable Men, who live only for the Misfortune of others; the Throne will be secure from being surpris'd into wrong Steps, as it continually is at present; and an evident Advantage will accrue by it to all Parts of Government. A Multitude of Men who subsist by Rapine will become honest and useful, and the State will acquire in them a number of new Citizens. You, Sir, will have the Satisfaction of restoring in one Day a great Kingdom, which being your Country, as it is that of all our Subjects, has the same Claim to your Affection that it has to theirs, and imposes on your Majesty an Obligation of Confidence which no Consideration whatever can remove.

"All Men, without Distinction of Rank, are Children of one God, the common Parent of all Nature. You, Sir, in the immense Family of which you are the Head, are the eldest of his Sons. It is to promote the Happiness of those who are placed under your Care that you are invested with the Supreme Authority. Your Subjects have Right to your Beneficence: They have therefore a right to the easiest and least burthensome Method of contributing to the Wants of the State. This Right, which is founded in Nature, belongs to every Nation in the World; whatever may be its Form of Government. It is principally the Right of the Franks, and in a more especial Manner of your Province of Normandy: The Norman Charter furnishes, on this Head, the most respectable Monuments of our national Immunities, and the Justice of the Kings your august Predecessors. We there find that no Tax can be laid on your Subjects of this Province, unless it be agreed to in the Assembly of the People of the Three Estates." This Charter subsists in its full Force; it makes part of your Peoples Rights, which you swore to maintain before him by whom

Sept. 16. If Credit may be given to the latest accounts from France, by the Way of Holland, which were received by Wednesday's Dutch Mail, the French Ministry being hung to the Quicks by a Freedom and Boldness, and the Truths contained in the Remonstrances of the Norman Parliament, the King has forbid the Members to assemble, or to stir out of Rouen; and has ordered 100 of his Troops to surround that City. These Advices add that the Duke de Harcourt being imprudently threatened, in the King's Name, that the Members of this Parliament who would refuse to register the King's Edicts and Declaration should pay for their Disobedience with their Heads, the Parliament, in return for the Compliment, ordered this Commandant of the Province to be taken into Custody. Harcourt did not wait the Consequence of this Order, but made the best of his Way to Paris.

The Postscript of a Letter from Holland says that there was such a Ferment throughout all Normandy, one Account of the new Money Edicts, that it was to be feared, if some other Provinces should take Part in these Discontents, the Consequences would be much more dangerous than those of the late War. The Court of Aids at Paris, which is somewhat

of the Nature of our Court of Exchequer, in their Remonstrances against these Edicts, inform the King: "That they think it unnecessary to add any Thing to the just and most affecting Picture which has so often been held up to him of the Misery to which the People in the Provinces are reduced; but that if any should presume to insinuate to his Majesty that the Picture is not just, and the Representation of his Magistrates greatly exaggerated, his Courts would in that Case think it their Duty to beseech him to be graciously pleased to hear the People themselves, by convoking the States General of the Kingdom."

**S I R,**  
**I** DESIRE you to communicate to the Public the following Letters, which you may be assured are genuine. I think you should premise, that Captain Forbes, by Mr. Murray's own Confession, was concealed for some Time at his House, which was the Occasion that Mr. Murray too was put under Arrest, by order of the Marshals of France, and was brought before Marshal Noailles, the senior Marshal, at the same Time with Mr. Wilkes. Diligent Search was made for Captain Forbes, but he had absconded.

Mr. Wilkes was obliged, before Marshal Noailles, to sign a *Parole d'Honneur*, that he would not proceed to any *Fai de Faire, directe ou indirecte*, with Captain Forbes, and Mr. Murray engaged in the same Manner for Captain Forbes, in Consequence of which, the Guards of Mr. Wilkes and Mr. Murray were discharged.

Mr. Forbes has never since appeared at Paris. After the first Letter enclosed, which was sent Sept. 7, Mr. Wilkes went several Times to Mr. Murray's House, sometimes with Monsieur Goy, sometimes alone, but could never be admitted. Mr. Murray only once called at the *Hotel de Saxe*, while Mr. Wilkes was absent on a two Days Tour to Fontainebleau. Mr. Wilkes left Paris the 18th of September. The Day before, he called at Mr. Murray's House, and not being admitted, left Word that he should set off for Flanders the next Morning.

Mr. Wilkes arrived at Menin the 21st in the Morning, and went directly to the Post-Office. He found no Letter there, either from Captain Forbes or Mr. Murray. He continued at Menin all that Day, and the next went again to the Post-Office, but with no better Success. He then left a Direction where he was gone, and set off for Dunkirk.

I think, Sir, that you ought to do Mr. Forbes the Justice to declare, that it is certain, in the whole of this Affair, although he was guilty of much Rashness, yet he was not of any Rudeness, or even Incivility of Expression.

To the Hon. Alexander Murray, Esq;

**S I R,**  
**I** HAVE waited with no small Impatience, and I believe you will agree with me, that before this, Captain Forbes ought to have sent to me. You know every Thing which has passed between us, and the wild extravagant Wish he formed of fighting me, on no Pretence or Provocation.

I am no Prize-fighter; yet I told him that I would indulge him, and as soon as I could. I mentioned to him the Affair of Lord Egremont, and the previous Engagement I thought myself under. I desired him to bring his Second the same Day at Noon, and our two Friends should settle between us all the Particulars of Time, Place, &c. I stated the Circumstances of the Insolence and Inhumanity of Lord Egremont, and my Resolution of calling his Lordship to Account: A Resolution not formed Yesterday, but what had struck me the second Day of my Imprisonment in the Tower, as becoming my Dignity, and which, at that very Time, I had mentioned to Major Rainsford, the Governor.

I had likewise then fixed the Hour of his losing the Scales as the Period I should call his Lordship

to that Account; and I am sure that I would have left Paris, or any other Place, immediately on receiving News so interesting to myself, so welcome to the Nation.

Mr. Forbes undertook on the same Morning, Tuesday, the 16th of August, to return at Noon, and to bring his Second. You know that he came, but brought no Second. Monsieur Goy, my Second, attended: If Mr. Forbes had kept his Promise, the Trouble I am now obliged to give you would have been unnecessary.

Lord Egremont, to my great Regret (greater I believe than that of any other Person) has prevented my proceeding farther, and, as a Frenchman would say, *il m'a fait un vilain tour*.

I am now therefore most entirely at Capt. Forbes's Service; and shall wait his Commands. I do not know where he is, for he has not appeared at Paris since Tuesday the 16th of August. As your House has been his Asylum, I am necessitated to beg you, Sir, to acquaint Captain Forbes, that I will be at Menin, the first Town in Austrian Flanders, on the Confines of France, the 21st of this Month, and that Monsieur Goy will do me the Honour of accompanying me; but he only. I shall direct my Letters to be sent there, and the Moment of my Arrival I shall go to the Post-Office.

No Person, but Monsieur Goy, is acquainted with any Part of this Transaction; he is so obliging as to take the Charge of this Letter.

Give me Leave to acknowledge the personal Civilities you have been pleased to confer on me at Paris, and to assure you that

**I** DID myself several Times the Honour to wait upon you, but have not been so happy as to find you at home. I intend to set off on Sunday Morning for Flanders, and should be very proud to take my Leave of you, therefore hope you will give Orders for my being admitted Tomorrow, any Time the most agreeable to you.

D R E S D E N, October 5.  
**H**IS Polish Majesty died suddenly this Afternoon of a Suffocation, at Half an Hour past Five. He had for some Days past been indisposed with a feverish Cold, which was thought of no Sort of Consequence.

L O N D O N, October 15.  
The King of Portugal, in Imitation of the English, is putting several Ships of War into Commission, and Orders have been given to establish a certain Office for registering 20,000 Seamen, in Case of an Emergency.

It is said that the Occasion of the early meeting of the Parliament, which is fixed for the 15th of November, is the settling the several Revenue Laws, which are to respect the new Acquisitions in North-America.

We hear the Officers and Soldiers will have proper Implements and Utensils allowed them to cultivate the Lands allotted them in the conquered Provinces in North-America, though no express Mention thereof is made in the late Proclamation, agreeable to what was observed in the first establishing Nova-Scotia.

From the LONDON MAGAZINE, for August 1763.

SIR,

BARBARA in your Magazine of last Month, mentioning a duel between two gentlemen of Ireland, I am led, from reflecting on the frequency of those unhappy engagements, to trouble you with the following narrative.

I am, Sir, a native of Ireland, of one of the old families, and have no inconsiderable property that kingdom; I was educated in the university of Dublin, where my birth and fortune recommending me to the notice of many young fellows the first distinction, I entered into the closest intimacy with several; and was looked upon as a sort of chief in every idle party of amusement by all. In the variety of acquaintance with which I was at this time favoured, I contracted a friendship of the warmest kind with a young man of my own age, whom I shall beg leave to mention by the name of Butler. Perhaps I was ever possessed to many qualifications to render universal favour; his person had that something to it peculiarly the distinction rank, and to give a degree, that you were created in his favour the moment he appeared, I was obliged to do justice to his understanding about his speaking a single word. I was of the church, and in the creation, he was with the most benevolent of hearts, and was, I thought, all that the most virtuous can fancy of a fellow, and all that the ancient heathens did imagine of their gods.

Mr. Butler had a sister, poor Maria! near of age, I had another, unhappy Charlotte, close up twenty-two; the friendship subsisting between me and the two ladies, and both continually dwelling on the praise of their brothers, was no wonder. Charlotte entertained the most tender feelings for him, or that the bereaved Maria should have a favourable eye on me. — Not to take up your time, Sir, Mr. Butler and I grew passionately in love with the sisters of each other, and proud to be the opportunity of riveting, as I may say, friendship, we agreed upon paying our addresses, which were kindly received, and one day invited for the celebration of the two weddings, the infinite satisfaction of both our families.

O Sir, the eve of our wedding day! — How may I cry out with the poet, for ever hated by the fatal hour, for ever dark and comfortless the morn, No fun to shed its faltering power, Or mark the circling period I was born, But let all former all array'd in tears, The doom'd attendant on the time alone, The church-yard screech owl bode uncommon fears.

And fright the midnight traveller to flee! Mr. Butler, and I, Sir, had just parted from our friends, and retired to sup at a tavern to take of our batchelors with a select party of two or three hours we pulled in the most agreeable manner, when unfortunately an argument arose between him and a gentleman in company, about the superior excellence of lobsters crabs, — trivial debates have been justly re-puted to produce the most fatal consequences — was unhappily the case with us — I saw Mr. Butler exert a warmth which I fancied rather too violent, and seek the liberty of hinting my opinion. The conversation was in an instant changed, and his whole resentment turned against me, he called my friendship for him in question, he made in many fierce objections, that I could not avoid a flush of the aid in my replies, a quarrel of friends is always the most bitter, and that would appear indifferent to others, but an additional poignancy from them, and a feeling which would seem trifling in a common acquaintance, is a crisis of the most unpardonable kind, as a friend: the very consideration that would mitigate, becomes an aggravation of the fault, and the most striking plea why we should overlook an error, is constantly the reason why we

will not. — This, Sir, was our situation; Mr. Butler thought it hard that I of all men should offend him, an offence, although it equally cutting, of all men; so you see an injury given him; in this frame of mind we proceeded from society, to society, till at last he gave me the public lie. — There was now but one means of satisfaction left, the company instantly broke up, and Mr. Butler and I appointed to meet at the Phoenix park by seven the next morning, attended each by a friend.

To say how I passed the intervening night, is impossible; suffice it that I endured the torment of the damned. My anger against Mr. Butler disappeared the moment all our former friendship was recollected, and my heart dropped blood to think when I was no longer offended, of the fatal necessity of seeking for revenge. My love for his adorable sister sunk me to the soul, and what did I not suffer in the consideration of his passion for mine; but, alas! Sir, the tyranny of a boisterous custom obliged me to suppress every laudable tendency of these salutary reflections, and drove me to violate every suggestion of my reason, every argument of my friendship, and every mandate of my God, but did to you in my mind I am now.

The morning came, Sir, and we were both at the appointed place at half an hour before the time. Poor Butler! I saw his heart was equally distressed with my own, and more than once he complained of a cold to wipe a tear that would rise in spite of his attempts to keep it down. You must know, Sir, that in Ireland we are much too prone to have any notions of humanity, and much too sensible to hear any ridiculous arguments of justice and truth. 'Tis necessary there to commit a fashionable murder before your reputation can be established, and quite essential if you would possess the esteem of every body to deserve the denudation of all. In a country, situated by the monstrous notion of Honour, it is not to be supposed, our friends took any great pains to reconcile us, and that was no possibility of making the first advances ourselves. — That circumvented, we retired to our ground, meeting with mutual friendship and content, yet obliged to subterfuge the appearance of hatred and revenge. Fifteen went our weapons, Sir, and so little enmity did we entertain that we each aimed first, three several times, both intending to find the spot, and then discharge our pistols in the air. — Surprised that neither of us fired, my second cried out to Mr. Butler, — Darts me, the fellows are afraid of one another. — This reflection roused us in an instant, we both discharged, when Mr. Butler's ball tore away a piece of my hat, and mine entering his temple a little above the eye, blew off the upper part of the skull, and left him dead upon the ground.

What would I have then given for some mountain to cover me for ever! I tore my hair, beat my face, blasphemed my God; at last recollecting myself I ran to another pistol and would have done the same thing to my own head, had I not been immediately disarmed by the seconds, who were terrified I should feel any concern for the murder of my friend. I was carried home, Sir, in a dead swooning upon a litter, having upon poor Butler, and wishing for his life, for in my state it was happiness to die. The violent agitation of my spirits wrought on an immediate fever, in which I continued ten days five weeks; and the physicians I had upon my recovery, was that my unhappy Maria, at the sight of her brother's corpse, had fallen into convulsive fits which lasted three days, and then carried her off; and that my unhappy sister Charlotte, was confined in her room, having gone distracted upon the first intimation of the accident.

O! Sir, to a mind so utterly deprived, not to be totally deprived of feeling; no thousand deaths must have been more welcome than the knowledge of these unhappy consequences. Fearful of the effects which the intelligence would have on my mother, my friends never suffered me to remain a single moment alone, till the late excellent doctor Berkeley, the celebrated Bishop of Cloyne, visited me. I was in an improper situation to die, and to the disconsolation of that elegant mortal, knowing that I have not the crime of suicide to add

to the madness of my illness, the death of my wife, and the murder of my friend.

Oh my sister, my sister, Sir, if I could but bear the thought of remaining, I had sacrificed all happiness in this world, and endangered my everlasting felicity in the next. I fled for England, and purchased a little solitude within three miles of the capital, where I have now resided five and twenty years, residing as usual, desiring no company, and making no friends. — When I look back upon the scene of blood, which I might have prevented, and consider as how small a rate I have parted with them, all reflection harkens up my very soul, and points out the wide, wide, difference, between a state of imaginary happiness, and a serene justification of a good conscience, the applause of my foolish acquaintance, and the approbation of my God. — I am far from being superstitious, Sir, but I never go to bed without fancying I see my poor friend Butler the moment I put out the candle. — Sir, the reputation of my melancholy story will be of any service to your readers; I shall think my time well employed in transmitting it; but define I may be known easily by the name of yours, Sir, JAMES HAMILTON GIBBS.

PARIS, September 26.

THE King has issued an Ordinance, dated the 14th of July last, of which the following is the Substance:

When young Fellows of Family shall be guilty of irregularities, capable of wounding the Honour, or disturbing the Quiet of their Families, or which are reprehensible by the Police, without being Crimes punishable by Law, it shall be lawful for their Parents or all the Secretaries of State in the Department of the War and of the Marine, to transport them to the Island of Reinde. If the Parents, which they shall be obliged to deliver for that effect, are found just, an Order shall be delivered to them from the King, by Virtue of which they may conduct, at their own Expence, those young Fellows to the Port of Rochfort, where they shall be detained in Prison, and maintained at the King's Expence, till they be put on board a Packer Boat, the Commander of which shall be answerable to His Majesty for their safe Custody, and shall oblige them to meet with the common Sailors. At their Arrival at Martinique the Captain shall consign them to the Governor-General of that Island, and take a Receipt for them, which, at his Return to France, he shall deliver to the Secretary of State. The young Fellows shall be sent to Prison by the Governor-General, and disposed as the common Soldiers, till they be sent to Reinde. On their Arrival there, the Commandant to whom they shall be delivered, shall furnish them in a fruitful healthy Basin the Island. They shall be lodged in Cabins built on Reinde for them. He shall forbid them the use of any Sort of Arms, and take all necessary Precautions to prevent their making their Escape. They shall be fed as the common Soldiers are, and shall be furnished gratis with Instruments for Tilling the Earth, and Seed to sow it, and the Commandant shall do for their own Benefit. They shall be also educated every Year; and in case of sickness received at the Hospital of Soldiers. — The young Fellows shall be divided into Classes, as follows: the first, the second, the third, the fourth, and the fifth. The Commandant shall give an Account to the Minister at War and of the Marine that he may inform the Parents.

Paris, October 5. The Morality among the Gentle people evidently at wane in the Neighbourhood of Rochfort, Orlans, Combray, and Calais, etc. suddenly, without any visible Cause, they are all gone out of their Heads, they die instantly.

LONDON, October 13.

On the 11th ult. at Seven in the Evening, Mr. Muller discovered from the Observatory of the Marine at Paris, a new COMET, which was seen near to the two Stars Spica and Deneb of the Constellation Capricorn. It was crossed in 4 great Minutes, that of the 11th of the 12th and 13th Instant, at Seven in the Evening, was the 11th

Head



Head of this last Constellation, having about  $231\frac{1}{2}$  Degrees of right Ascension, and  $15\frac{1}{2}$  of northern Declination. Its Motion, which is from South to North, is retrograde, going contrary to the Series of the Signs, and it slackens every Day. In 24 Hours it does not traverse above Half a Degree in right Ascension, and as much in Declination. From the Day it was first observed, to the 10th Instant, it had advanced 12 in right Ascension, and 20 in Declination. It is not luminous; so that it is imperceptible to the naked Eye: It is only a Nebulosity of about 6 Minutes in Diameter, in the Center of which is a bright Light.

October 24. Her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales has made a Present to the Right Honourable the Earl of Bute, of the Library of his late Royal Highness the Prince of Wales.

There is a Report that all insolvent Debtors, now confined in the several Goals thro' Great Britain, and whose Cases are not extremely atrocious, will have the Benefit of transporting themselves to our new Settlements, on the usual Bounty.

We hear a Bill is preparing against the ensuing Sessions, for several wealthy Jews to have leave to occupy some Lands on the Banks of the Ohio and Mississippi, conditionally.

It is said great Encouragement will be given for the Importation of American Bar Iron, which, on repeated Trials, has been found equal, if not superior, to that of Sweden.

Every Post from America confirms, that the French were the Instigators of the Indians in their most bloody and villainous Attempts.

A vast Number of poor People from the different Counties of Ireland, well skilled in Husbandry, are preparing to go over for the new Settlements; and we hear Transports are already collecting at Cork for their Embarkation.

It is computed that the Damages sustained by France and Spain, in the Captures of their Merchantmen by the Barbary Rovers, amount to Ten Millions of Livres since the Peace.

The famous John of Gaunt, Duke of Lancaster, made the following Will, which, with Submission to the Gentlemen of the Law, we apprehend to be as valid as one that fills 40 Sheets of Parchment:

I, JOHN OF GAUNT,  
DO GIVE AND DO GRAUNT,  
TO ROGER BURGOYNE,  
AND THE HEIR OF HIS LOYNE,  
ALL SUTTON AND POTTON,  
UNTIL THE WORLD'S ROTTEN.

Sutton and Potton in Bedfordshire are the Estates of the present Sir Roger Burgoyne, Bart.

October 31. The Dutch are boasting that they shall soon have a powerful Fleet at Sea, and are beating up for Seamen. They own they have no Admirals, yet insolently vaunt they have some Captains fit to encounter the best naval Commanders in the British Service. They insult the English in their public Streets; and have shewn the Audacity to affront and abuse the Domesticicks of the British Ambassador.

It is said that Five Men of War will be sent to North-America; as also a Body of 5000 Troops on board several Transports, to join General Amherst's Forces.

The French East India Company is dissolved, yet their Actions bear a good Price and are negotiable, the King having engaged to pay the Interest thereon.

Nov. 1. On Friday the 11th Instant is expected to come on, in the Court of Common-Pleas, before the Right Hon. the Lord Chief Justice Pratt, a Trial on an Action of Trespass, wherein John Wilkes, Esq; is Plaintiff, and Philip Carteret Webb, Esq; Defendant, Subpoenas being already served for the above Purpose.

Leave is given to bring in Heads of a Bill for limiting the Duration of Parliaments.

A Ship arrived this Week at Portsmouth from New-England, fell in with Five Algerine Ketches, and two Sixty Gun Ships, cruising off the Western Islands. They offered no Molestation, but only inspected her Papers.

NEW-YORK, December 26.

Extract of a Letter from Pensacola, October 5, 1763.

The Spaniards, and Indians who lived with them, are all gone from hence to Havannah or Vera Cruz; and left Col. Prevost, with his battalion of about 300 men, in possession of this fort and a few houses. Great Part of the lands without the fort are purchased by Mr. Noble, who is employed by some great men: he is very busy in clearing the grounds, and has done more already that way than has been done in a hundred years before by the Spaniards, who never durst, for fear

of the Indians, venture out of the reach of their Guns, and depended, for provisions, entirely on the French at Mobile. This fort is a stockade situated on a sandy Beach, the harbour is very good, we had never less than four fathom coming in, and the bay is fine and large, abounding with oysters and all sorts of fish. Some weeks ago about 150 Indians came here armed, demanding presents; they had all their kegs filled with rum, and said they would soon return for more. They always kept the Spaniards in terror, and when they were sparing, the Indians would take a few scalps to put them in mind of their duty, on which the bounty used to be increased. We are in daily expectation of the 35th regiment to relieve the battalion now here, the men will go to New-York, but Col. Prevost believes he will be obliged to winter in Carolina. The 22d and 34th regiments commanded by Major Farmer are here bound to Mobile to take possession of that garrison.

Mobile is about 60 miles by land distant from this place, but two large rivers, which must be passed, render the journey tedious. The town is situated on the river about 30 miles from the sea, is irregular, but the houses pretty good; the French inhabitants very complaisant, and many of them say they do not intend to remove; they had all their supplies from New-Orleans, and the war has greatly impoverished them; every species of European goods was incredibly high, a hat that cost only three shillings sterling being sold for thirty dollars, &c. Mobile bar has no more than ten feet water. The fort which they call Conde is strong and well built of brick. The lands are very good, but they raise only live stock and Indian corn: There is great plenty of fish and game of all kinds.

Extract of a Letter from Mobile, Oct. 27th, 1763.

On the 20th inst. the British troops took possession of this place. Most of the French inhabitants it is thought will remain, if they are indulged with a civil government. The French are greatly in arrears to the Indians, and its said the governor of New Orleans is to have a meeting with them here in about three weeks, in order to settle matters.

By a Letter from Schenectady, dated the Beginning of this Month, we are informed, That Sir William Johnson was then greatly engaged with a large Number of Indians, who came to assure him of their Attachment to the English, and to make Offers of accompanying his Majesty's Troops against the Enemy, whenever they shall be called upon; than which Nothing can be more conducive to the Security and Success of an Army marching thro' an Indian Country, which otherwise would meet with constant Ambuscades and Opposition.

His Majesty has ordered two Regiments to guard the Island of Jamaica from intestine Comotions of Rebellious Slaves, or other sudden and unexpected Dangers. The Fortifications (from the late dreadful Accident) are under Repair in that Island.

ANNAPOLIS, January 12.

The Ship *Edward*, Capt. Ritchie, arrived here on Sunday last, in 6 Weeks, from London.

Extract of a Letter from London, dated October 11, 1763.

"We have had no Summer; nothing but continued Rains, and chilling Weather. The oldest Man does not remember such a Season. We have not, literally, had one Day comfortably warm. Our Harvests all over the Kingdom have been exceeding unfavourable. Grain has got to an immense Price, and is daily rising. Both Sides are mustering their Forces against the Meeting of Parliament, which is fixed for the 15th of November. It is expected that there will be a sharp Conflict between the *Little Endians* and the *Big Endians*. Stocks are very low, which is owing to the bad Prospect of a lasting Peace; and the great Bankruptcies in Holland and Germany, the Scarcity of Money, and the Lowness of all Credit, are not to be described. It is given out, that some Regulations in our American Affairs are to take Place at the next Meeting of Parliament.

Extract of a Letter dated London, October 31.

"The Parliament is to meet the 15th. It is expected that the Expulsion of Wilkes will be the first Business. This early Meeting has been advised by the Lord P-----, for the Purposes of the present Ministry, the Stability of which is much doubted. The North Britons are continued with somewhat more Modesty than formerly. There is great Agitation among the Politicians, great Expectations, and great Fears,

A certain General, who lately distinguished himself in the *East-Indies*, told me that he expects to take another Trip thither very soon, as he looks upon a War in that Quarter to be inevitable. Stocks have fallen 12 or 15 per Cent. The great and mighty TOUCHSTONE is broke for more than Half a Million. The King of Prussia has demolished Half the Minchants at Hamburg, Amsterdam, Stockholm, and Berlin. Credit is absolutely at an End. The Bankers will discount no Bills."

Extract of another Letter of the same Date.

"The Bankruptcies in Europe has made such a Scarcity of Money, and had such an Effect on Credit, that all our American Commercials fall greatly. We don't know whom to trust. Tobacco is very low, and fear it will be lower. A Lading of *Panama* Tobacco has been sold at 2½, among which some good Coloured, poor Price indeed."

The Tobacco-loaded Ship which went 10 Weeks ago into *Norfolk*, on account of springing a Leak, proves to be Capt. Watson, who sailed in *Wye River*: And the Ship is Condemned.

## A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS his Majesty was graciously pleased, on the 7th Day of October last, to issue his Royal Proclamation, in the Words following, viz.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS we have taken into our Royal Consideration the extensive and valuable Acquisitions in America, secured to our Crown by the late Definitive Treaty of Peace, concluded at Paris the Tenth Day of February 1763; and being desirous, that all our loving Subjects, as well of our Kingdoms as of our Colonies in America, may avail themselves, with all convenient Speed, of the great Benefits and Advantages which must accrue therefrom to their Commerce, Manufactures, and Navigation; we have thought fit, with the Advice of our Privy Council, to issue our Royal Proclamation, hereby to publish and declare to all our loving Subjects, that we have, with the Advice of our said Privy Council, granted our Letters Patent under our Great Seal of Great Britain, to erect within the Countries and Islands ceded and confirmed to us by the said Treaty, our distinct and separate Governments, styled and called by the Names of *Quebec, East Florida, West Florida, and Grenada*, and limited and bounded as follows; viz.

First. The Government of *Quebec*, bounded on the East by the River St. John, and from thence by a Line drawn from the Head of that River, through the Lake St. John to the South End of the Lake Nepissing; from thence the said Line crossing the River St. Lawrence and the Lake Champlain, in Forty-five Degrees of North Latitude, passes along the High Lands which divide the Rivers and empty themselves into the said River St. Lawrence, and those which fall into the Sea; and also along the North East of the Baye des Chaleurs, and the Coast of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, to Cape Reger, and from thence crossing the Mouth of the River St. Lawrence by the West End of the Island of Anticosti, terminates at the aforesaid River of St. John.

Secondly. The Government of *East Florida*, bounded to the Westward by the Gulf of Mexico, and the *Apalachicola* River; to the Northward, by a Line drawn from that Part of the said River where the *Chatahouchee* and *Flint* Rivers meet, to the Source of St. Mary's River, and by the Course of the said River to the *Atlantic* Ocean; and to the Eastward and Southward, by the *Atlantic* Ocean, and the Gulf of Florida, including all Islands within Six Leagues of the Sea Coast.

Thirdly. The Government of *West Florida*, bounded to the Southward by the Gulf of Mexico, including all Islands within Six Leagues of the Coast from the River *Apalachicola*, Lake *Penchastrain*; to the Westward by the said Lake, Lake *Mauripis*, and the River *Mississippi*; to the Northward by a Line drawn due East from that Part of the River *Mississippi* which lies in Thirty-one Degrees North Latitude, to the River *Apalachicola* or *Chatahouchee*; and to the Southward by the said River.

Fourthly. The Government of *Grenada*, comprehending the Island of that Name, together with the *Grenadines*, and the Islands of *Dominica*, *St. Vincent*, and *Tobago*.

And, to the End that the open and free Fishery of our Subjects may be extended to and carried on upon the Coast of Labrador and the adjacent Islands, we have thought fit, with the Advice of our said Privy Council, to put all that Coast, from the River St. John's to Hudson's Straights, together with the Islands of *Anticosti* and *Madeline*, and all other smaller Islands lying upon the said Coast, under the Care and Inspection of our Governor of *Newfoundland*.

We have also, with the Advice of our Privy Council, thought fit to annex the Islands of *St. John's* and *Cape Breton* to the *Isle Royale*, with the lesser Islands adjacent thereto, to our Government of *Nova Scotia*.

We have also, with the Advice of our Privy Council aforesaid, annexed to our Province of *Georgia* all the Lands lying between the Rivers *Altamaha* and *St. Mary's*.

And whereas it will greatly contribute to the speedy settling our said new Governments, that our loving Subjects should be informed of our paternal Care for the Security of the Liberties and Properties of those who are and shall become Inhabitants thereof; We have thought fit to publish and declare, by this our Proclamation, that we have, in the Letters Patent under our Great Seal of Great Britain, by which the said Governments are constituted, given express Power and Direction to our Governors of our said Colonies respectively, that so soon as the State and Circumstances of the said Colonies will admit thereof, they shall, with the Advice and Consent of the Members of our Council, summon and call General Assemblies within the said Governments respectively, in such Manner and Form as is used and directed in those Colonies and Provinces in America, which we under our immediate Government; and we have also given Power to the said Governors, with the Consent of our said Councils, and the Representatives of the People, so to be summoned as aforesaid, to make, constitute, and ordain Laws, Statutes, and Ordinances for the Public Peace, Welfare, and Good Government of our said Colonies, and of the People and Inhabitants thereof, as near as may be agree-

able to the Laws of England, and under such Regulations and Restrictions as are used in other Colonies: And in the mean Time, and until such Assemblies can be called as aforesaid, all Persons inhabiting in, or resorting to our said Colonies, may confide in our Royal Protection for the Enjoyment of the Benefit of the Laws of our Realm of England; for which Purpose, We have given Power under our Great Seal to the Governors of our said Colonies respectively, to erect and constitute, with the Advice of our said Councils respectively, Courts of Judicature and public Justice, within our said Colonies, for the hearing and determining all Causes, as well Criminal as Civil, according to Law and Equity, and as near as may be agreeable to the Laws of England, with Liberty to all Persons who may think themselves aggrieved by the Sentences of such Courts, in all Civil Cases, to appeal, under the usual Limitations and Restrictions, to Us in our Privy Council.

We have also thought fit, with the Advice of our Privy Council as aforesaid, to give unto the Governors and Councils of our said three New Colonies upon the Continent, full Power and Authority to settle and agree with the Inhabitants of our said New Colonies, or with any other Persons who shall resort thereto, for such Lands, Tenements, and Hereditaments, as are now, or hereafter shall be in our Power to dispose of, and them to grant to any such Person or Persons, upon such Terms, and under such moderate Quit-Rents, Services, and Acknowledgments as have been appointed and settled in our other Colonies, and under such other Conditions as shall appear to us to be necessary and expedient for the Advantage of the Grantees, and the Improvement and Settlement of our said Colonies.

And whereas we are desirous, upon all Occasions, to testify our Royal Sense and Approbation of the Conduct and Bravery of the Officers and Soldiers of our Armies, and to reward the same, we do hereby command and empower our Governors of our said three New Colonies, and all other our Governors of our several Provinces on the Continent of *North-America*, to grant, without Fee or Reward, to such Reduced Officers as have served in *North-America* during the late War, and to such Private Soldiers as have been or shall be discharged in *America*, and are actually residing there, and shall personally apply for the same, the following Quantities of Lands, subject at the Expiration of Ten Years to the same Quit-Rents as other Lands are subject to in the Province within which they are granted, as also subject to the same Conditions of Cultivation and Improvement, viz.

To every Person having the Rank of a Field Officer, Five Thousand Acres.—To every Captain, Three Thousand Acres.—To every Subaltern or Staff Officer, Two Thousand Acres.—To every Non-commissioned Officer, Two Hundred Acres.—To every private Man, Fifty Acres.

We do likewise authorize and require the Governors and Commanders in Chief of all our said Colonies upon the Continent of *North-America*, to grant the like Quantities of Land, and upon the same Conditions, to such Reduced Officers of our Navy, of like Rank, as served on Board our Ships of War in *North-America* at the Times of the Reduction of *Louisbourg* and *Quebec* in the late War, and who shall personally apply to our respective Governors for such Grants.

And whereas it is just and reasonable, and essential to our Interest and the Security of our Colonies, that the several Nations or Tribes of *Indians*, with whom we are connected, and who live under our protection, should not be molested or disturbed in the possession of such parts of our Dominions and Territories as, not having been ceded to, or purchased by us, are reserved to them, or any of them, as their Hunting Grounds; We do therefore, with the Advice of our Privy Council, declare it to be our Royal Will and Pleasure, that no Governor or Commander in Chief in any of our Colonies of *Quebec, East Florida, or West Florida*, do presume, upon any pretence whatever, to grant Warrants of Survey, or pass any Patents for Lands beyond the Bounds of their respective Governments, as described in their Commissions; as also, that no Governor or Commander in Chief in any of our other Colonies or Plantations in *America*, do presume, for the present, and until our further pleasure be known, to grant Warrants of Survey, or pass patents for any Lands beyond the Heads or Sources of any of the Rivers, which fall into the *Atlantic* Ocean from the West and North West, or upon any Lands whatever, which not having been ceded to, or purchased by us as aforesaid, are reserved to the said *Indians*, or any of them.

And we do further declare it to be our Royal Will and Pleasure, for the present as aforesaid, to reserve under our Sovereignty, Protection, and Dominion, for the Use of the said *Indians*, all the Lands and Territories not included within the Limits of our said Three New Governments, or within the Limits of the Territory granted to the *Hudson's Bay* Company, as also all the Lands and Territories lying to the Westward of the Sources of the Rivers which fall into the Sea from the West and North West, as aforesaid; and we do hereby strictly forbid, on pain of our Displeasure, all our loving Subjects from making any Purchases or Settlements whatever, or taking Possession of any of the Lands above reserved, without our especial Leave and Licence for that purpose first obtained.

And we do further strictly enjoin and require all persons whatever, who have either wilfully or inadvertently seated themselves upon any Lands within the Countries above described, or upon any other Lands, which, not having been ceded to, or purchased by Us, are still reserved to the said *Indians* as aforesaid, forthwith to remove themselves from such Settlements.

And whereas great Frauds and Abuses have been committed in the purchasing Lands of the *Indians*, to the great Prejudice of our Interests, and to the great Dissatisfaction of the said *Indians*; in order therefore to prevent such Irregula-

rities for the future, and to the End that the *Indians* may be convinced of our Justice, and determined Resolution to remove all reasonable Cause of Discontent, we do, with the Advice of our Privy Council, strictly enjoin and require, that no private person do presume to make any purchase from the said *Indians* of any Lands reserved to the said *Indians*, within those parts of our Colonies where we have thought proper to allow Settlement; but that if, at any Time, any of the said *Indians* should be inclined to dispose of the said Lands, the same shall be purchased only for us, in our Name, at some public Meeting or Assembly of the said *Indians* to be held for that purpose by the Governor or Commander in Chief of our Colonies respectively, within which they shall lie; and in case they shall lie within the Limits of any Proprietary Government, they shall be purchased only for the Use and in the Name of such Proprietaries, conformable to such Directions and Instructions as we or they shall think proper to give for that purpose: And we do, by the Advice of our Privy Council, declare and enjoin, that the Trade with the said *Indians* shall be free and open to all our Subjects whatever; provided that every person, who may incline to trade with the said *Indians* do take out a Licence for carrying on such Trade from the Governor or Commander in chief of any of our Colonies respectively, where such person shall reside; and also give Security to observe such Regulations, as we shall at any Time think fit, by Ourselves, or by our commissaries, to be appointed for this purpose, to direct and appoint for the Benefit of the said Trade; and we do hereby authorize, enjoin, and require the Governors and Commanders in chief of all our Colonies respectively, as well Those under our immediate Government as Those under the Government and Direction of Proprietaries, to grant such Licences without Fee or Reward, taking especial care to insert therein a condition, that such Licence shall be void, and the Security forfeited, in case the person, to whom the same is granted, shall refuse or neglect to observe such Regulations as we shall think proper to prescribe as aforesaid.

And we do further expressly enjoin and require all Officers whatever, as well Military as Those employed in the Management and Direction of *Indian* Affairs within the Territories reserved as aforesaid for the Use of the said *Indians*, to seize and apprehend all persons whatever, who, standing charged with Treasons, Misdemeanors, or other Felonies, or other Crimes or Misdemeanors, shall fly from Justice, and take Refuge in the said Territory, and to send them under a proper Guard to the Colony where the crime was committed of which they stand accused, in order to take their Trial for the same.

GIVEN at Our Court at Saint James's, the Seventh Day of October, One thousand seven hundred and sixty three, in the Third Year of Our Reign.

And whereas a Copy of the said Proclamation hath been transmitted to me by the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Trade and Plantations, who have also signified to me his Majesty's Royal Will and Pleasure, that the same should be published in the several Parts of my Government, to the End that all his Majesty's Subjects there may pay due Obedience thereto: I have therefore, in Obedience to the said Royal Order, signified to me as aforesaid, with the Advice of his Lordship's Council of State, caused the said Proclamation to be this Day published at the City of *Annapolis*; and I do hereby strictly Charge and Command the several Sheriffs of this Province to make this his Majesty's Proclamation Public in their respective Counties, in the usual Manner, that all his Majesty's Subjects within the same, may take Notice thereof, and conform themselves thereto accordingly.

GIVEN at the City of *Annapolis*, this Twelfth Day of January, in the Thirteenth Year of his Lordship's Dominion, Annoque Domini 1764.

GOD Save the KING.

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LONDON, October 20.

THE late King of Poland was born October 7. 1696, and elected King, October 5, 1733, so that he reigned exactly Thirty Years. It is supposed there will be, as usual, a Number of Competitors for the Throne. Tho' the Poles, in general, are willing to have a Native, the powerful Princes; by whom they are surrounded, always interest themselves much in the Election, and a War has generally ensued. It is said, that besides the eldest Son of the late King, now Elector of Saxony, one of the Sons of the Empress Queen will be proposed; and others talk, that the King



of Prussia's Brother, Prince Henry, will offer himself; if so, he must change his Religion.—The Revenues of the King's Household arise out of his Lands and Saltpit, and are computed to amount to above Three Millions of Florins per Annum, besides the Sum of 100,000 Livres allowed to the Queen for keeping of her Court. But the State provides Money for the maintaining of Wars, and defraying all other extraordinary Expenses.

The Algerines have broke their Peace with the French, have put the French King's Consul there, and all the Merchants (as they have there a great Trade to Marfeilles) in Irons; and have ordered all the Cruisers they have to take any French Vessels they meet. Their Cruisers indeed are but few to what they used to be, their maritime Force being of late much dwindled. This rash Step will probably expose them to a Bombardment, as the French have besides many Scores to wipe off with them, for some of the Algerines past Infults and violent Outrages some Years ago.

The Dutch were greatly alarmed about their Dykes during the late Hurricanes and continual Rains: More than 4000 Men were daily employed to support and repair them.

Oct. 22. Several Transports are now Contracting for in the River, and other Ports on the North Coast, which it is thought are to be employed in carrying over new Settlers, and their Effects to America; as Multitudes are preparing to take the most early Advantage of the late Proclamation.

The Sarah, Dixon, from Virginia to Bristol, sprung a Leak, and foundered at Sea. The Crew were taken up by a Vessel bound to Liverpool.

They write from Toulon, that the Le Fier and L'Hippopotame, two French Men of War, and two Frigates, sailed from thence the 1st Inst. on a Four Months Cruise on the Barbary Rovers.

Oct. 29. It is said, that Bills to double the Duty on French Wines, to repeal the Cyder Act, and to reduce the Price of Porter to 3d. a Pot, are preparing to be laid before the House at the meeting of the Parliament.

The Sum for which the Neufvilles failed at Amsterdam, is Five Millions more than it was thought at first. It amounts to Nine Millions of Dutch Florins [above 750,000l. Sterling].

It is said a List of the several Losses, sustained by his Majesty's Subjects from the French in North-America, in the Years Fifty-four, Five and Six, to the Amount of a very large Sum, is now ascertaining, in order to balance some Accounts lately exhibited by the French Court, respecting the Captures of their Merchant Ships, and sundry other Articles, previous to the Commencement of the late War.

Letters from Spain say, that the Emperor of Morocco had put in Motion an Army of 70,000 Men, without declaring what he intends to do with it. His Catholic Majesty apprehending it may be to attack some of the Spanish Places on the Coast of Africa, has ordered them to be put in a good Posture of Defence.

It is said a certain foreign Manifesto, powerfully backed, is soon expected to make its Appearance, which will not fail to surprize all Europe.

It is said the Government, in Consequence of some Dispatches lately arrived, entirely to be depended on, have now under Consideration the actual State of the Naval Forces of three different Powers, who insolently stile themselves the Triumvirate, and the Pains daily taken to augment their Marine; the Result of which, it is expected, will occasion some fresh maritime Orders and Dispositions speedily to take place.

Some Gentlemen, of great Experience in the Trade of Nova Scotia and Newfoundland, have lately been in consultation with the Lords of Plantations; which, it is expected, will produce good Effects in those important Fisheries.

It is said that the Governors for America have received Orders to embark for that Continent by the first of January.

Monday some Dispatches, which came by the New-York Mail from General Amherst, arrived at the Secretary of State's Office.

Letters from Brest of the 15th ult. advise, that several flat-bottomed Vessels, that were going round to Nantes for Ship Timber, had been cast away on the Coast; but the Crews saved their Lives.

Last Monday Night the Right Hon. William Pitt, Esq; came to Town to attend the ensuing Sessions of Parliament; and Earl Temple is expected in Town this Evening.

All the Troops in India are ordered to return home.

Fourteen Men of War of the Line, besides Frigates, are fitting out for the East-Indies, to relieve the Men of War that have been some Years on that Station.

It is rumoured that there will be Four Competitors for the Crown of Poland; three whereof are Sons of Crowned Heads, and the Fourth is a Polisher.

Extract of a Letter from Paris, October 8.

"We hear from Abbeville, that a Youth of Seventeen Years of Age, of a genteel Family at that Place, has poisoned both his Father and his Mother. Having quarrelled with a Man who always was his Friend, he determined to poison him also; the Consequences of this Resolution were terrible. Being invited to dine with his Friend at a Neighbour's House, he went thither before Dinner, to make his Excuse for being obliged not to stay Dinner, and taking an Opportunity to step into the Kitchen, threw a Paper of Arsenick into the Pot. The Guests who were to dine, were in Number Fourteen. Ten died almost immediately, the other four are given over. The young Villain was taken up on the Deposition of a Child, who declares that it saw him salt the Pot. It is reported that he has confessed all."

Oct. 22. A few Days ago was buried at White-chapel Church, a Child of Mr. Wells's, one of the Watchmen at the South Sea-house, aged five Years; her Death was occasioned by a Cat fastening on her Neck, with her Mouth to her's, when she was in Bed and asleep: In this Situation she was supposed to have continued some Time, when her Mother found it, without any Appearance of Hurt to the Child; but the next Day complained of not being well; she soon after fell into great Agonies, and died at Three the next Morning, with all the Actions and Noises of a Cat.

The late King of Poland, for about three Weeks before he died, was troubled with an almost continual Drowsiness, to which was joined a frequent Cough: He was himself surprized, at Times, at the Kind of Lethargy into which he found he was fallen. The Day on which he died, he heard Mass in his Apartment, and no visible Alteration appeared in him: On returning to his Bed-Chamber, he found himself very ill, and had such a long Intermision of his Pulse, that they were obliged to Blood him in the Foot, and to apply Blisters to both his Legs; but these Remedies being insufficient to prevent the Return of the Suffocations and Faintings, which succeeded one another almost every Instant, he expired about Five in the Evening.

Letter from Urney, near Strabane, Oct. 9.

"Yesterday I went to Castlelynn, a Town adjoining to my Parish of Urney, to visit an honest and industrious Countryman, Wm. Kemp and his Family lying in great Misery. The occasion of their Misery was this: He had some Time ago admonished, for his dishonest Tricks, Charles Wright who attended about the Mill of Castlelynn, whereupon Wright was heard to say, 'he would give him a Posset'; Kemp suspecting no harm, brought a Peck of Shelling to the Mill to have it Ground. Wright ran to the Apothecary's, brought Ratbane, and threw it into the Hopper with the Shelling. Kemp carried home his Meal, and had Part of it made into Stirrabout, which he supped up greedily, being hungry; his Children and Family, being nine in Number, took Share with him, but more sparingly; six other Persons also, who came into his Cabin, got Part of this fatal Dose. They were all immediately seized with violent Gripings and Vomiting; the Doctor being called in, pronounced that they were poisoned, and the Apothecary had remembered that Wright got the Poison at his Shop. In this Confusion Wright made his Escape; but it is hard to express the Misery these innocent People have suffered; they who only got a small Dose struggled through with Life, but the old honest Man, Kemp, whose Death is hourly expected, lies one of the most miserable Spectacles I have ever seen; his Eyes, Tongue, and Cheeks, full of Ulcers, his Throat and Bowels parched up, his anguish inexpressible, and the Hopes of Death his comfort. In these deplorable Circumstances I received from his own Mouth this shocking Story, which all the Neighbours attested. It now is found out, that this same Villain, about a Year ago, poisoned James Devanny, and his Family, all of whom, six in Number, died in cruel Torments."

B O S T O N, December 26.

We hear that a remarkable large TURNIP was raised this Season in the Field of Captain Draper of Dedham; the Weight of which is said to be

seventeen Pounds, and that it measures three Feet two Inches round; supposed to be the largest Turnip ever raised in this Country. The Seed was sown the 21st of July last.

N E W - Y O R K, January 2.

About 11 o'Clock last Tuesday Night, we had a small Shock of an Earthquake.

About 3 Weeks ago, 7 Men deserted from a Detachment of the 44th Regiment, posted at Owegatchie: They were immediately pursued by a Party of Indians sent after them by the Commanding Officer, when their Scalps were soon brought into the Fort. ## CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 1.

**T**HE late News from Smyrna has alarmed us very much. About ten Days ago the Ambassadors and Ministers here received from thence the Account of a very extensive and devouring Fire, which, by some fatal Accident, broke out on the 6th of last Month, at midnight, and in 26 Hours, involved in its Progress the whole Quarter of the City, called the Frank Quarter, inhabited entirely by the different factories of several foreign Nations trading there, particularly the English, French, Dutch, Venetian, Imperial, Swedish, Danish, and Ragusan. By the English Consul's Account, not a Merchant's, nor Consul's House is left standing, except his own, and that not entire, nor without suffering great damage. Even their Magazines, the Repositories of all their various Merchandize (which had hitherto been looked upon as Fire-proof) burst, through the intense Violence of the Flames; the scene of Desolation is on all Sides terrible. The loss sustained is reckoned, by a Gross Computation, at a Million and Half of Turkish Dollars, or 200,000 l. Sterling.

As by the Accounts received from thence, the behaviour of the Turkish Officers, during the Fire, gave the greatest Cause of Complaint to the Powers by it, all the Christian Ministers residing here, have presented Memorials to the Porte on that Occasion.

**Rome, Sept. 17.** A Cause has lately been tried here, the Decision of which gives general Satisfaction. In the Month of December, 1760, one Flavio Frisicatti, a very rich old Gentleman of Macerata, was murdered at his Country-House at Vita-Nova. One Cippolato, and another named Spiccia, two of the Murderers, were immediately taken, and confessed their Crime; but a third Person, named Marconi, who was suspected, made his Escape: He was afterwards apprehended by the Diligence of Mr. Frisicatti's Son, but instantly denied having any Part in the Murder. The Governor of Macerata, in order to get Possession of the Deceased's immense Wealth, instigated one of the two Assassins, who had confessed his Crime, to accuse the Son of suborning them to kill his Father. Young Frisicatti, perceiving the Governor's Villainy, fled from Macerata, came and surrendered himself a Prisoner here, and demanded Justice. The Governor was turned out of his Place, and imprisoned a great while ago. Frisicatti having just now proved his Innocence before the Tribunal of the Sacred Consult, to which he appealed from the Sentence of the Court at Macerata, the Judge who tried him is sentenced to pay him his Costs and Damages, the Criminal notary, Joseph Carlini, is sent to the Gallies for life, Germanus Sanni, Lieutenant of the Jurisdiction, is ordered to be sent to the Gallies during the Pleasure of the Sacred Consult, and declared capable of ever acting in any Court of Judicature; and two Evidences are ordered, one to the Gallies for Life, and the other to perpetual Banishment. The two Assassins who confessed the Murder have been hanged; the third, who even under the Torture denied the Crime, is condemned to the Gallies for ten Years. When Frisicatti was brought out of Prison, after having had his Innocence fully justified, a great Number of Gentlemen carried him, in a Kind of Triumph, to the Pope, who honoured him with his Blessing, and as an Earnest of the good effects of it, immediately presented him with a Purse of 200 Roman crowns.

**Ratisbon, Oct. 13.** It is apprehended that the Election of a new King of Poland will disturb the tranquility so lately restored to Europe; several of the neighbouring Powers being too much interested in that Election, to look upon the Event of it with indifference. The Russian Troops remaining upon the Frontiers, the Differences respecting Courland, the intestine Divisions among the Grandees of Poland and Lithuania, and the Preparations already made by the neighbouring Powers, shew that this Election will not be very quietly carried on.

## LONDON, November 2.

*Abstract of the Convention made between the King of Sardinia, the most Christian King, and the Catholic King, concerning the Pretensions of his Sardinian Majesty to the Duchy of Placentia.*

**Article I.** Their most Christian and Catholic Majesties acknowledge again, in Favour of the King of Sardinia, the Right of Reversion to the Sovereignty of the City of Placentia, and to the Part of the Placentine, as far as the River Nura, as mentioned in the Treaty of Aix-la-Chapelle, in Case of Failure of the Male Line of the Infante Don Philip, as also in Case this Prince or his Heirs should succeed to one of the Crowns of his Family.

**II.** Their most Christian and Catholic Majesties Guarantee the aforesaid Reversion against all Powers that might attempt to oppose it.

**III.** Till such Time as the said Reversion may happen, his Sardinian Majesty shall enjoy the same annual Revenue (deducting the Charges of Government) which the City and Territory mentioned in the first Article would yield him, were he in actual Possession thereof; to which End, his most Christian Majesty will remit to his Sardinian Majesty the Capital Sum of the Revenue of the said Territories.

**IV.** Whenever the Reversion happens, the King of Sardinia is to restore the capital Sum mentioned in the preceding Article.

**V.** The King of Sardinia shall enjoy the Equivalent for the Revenues of the Placentine, from the 10th of March of the present Year, being the Day of exchanging the Ratifications of the Treaty of Peace of France and Spain with England; agreeably to the most Christian King's Letter to his Sardinian Majesty, dated the 5th of February 1759.

**VI.** The present Convention shall be communicated to the other Powers concerned in the Treaty of Aix-la-Chapelle, and the Three contracting Monarchs will require their Guarantee thereof.

**VII.** The Ratifications of the present Convention shall be exchanged within a Month, or sooner, if possible.

Done at Paris the 10th of June 1763, signed by the Baili Solar de Breille on the Part of Sardinia, Choiseul Duke de Praslin for France, and the Marquis Grimaldi for Spain.

There are two separate Articles, the first of which is only Matter of Form, about Titles in the full Powers of the Ministers; and the other stipulates, that though the Convention is made in the French Tongue, this shall not be considered as of any Consequence, nor be drawn into a Precedent.

The erasing and demolishing the Fortifications of Wesel, Gueldres, Lipsadt and Hamm, are, by his Prussian Majesty's Orders, carried on with the greatest Expedition.

A certain noble Person of Distinction expended very lately the Sum of 4000 l. in about six Weeks, at Paris, to the great Credit of himself and the Nation.

It is hoped that an Embargo will be shortly laid on the Lords and Ladies of this Kingdom, or the Amusements of Paris will leave our Nation Peegle, Lord H—d's Son, now at Paris, we are assured, drew on his Father in one Bill for 30,000 l. which was immediately paid.—[Thus goes the Treasure, which has been drawn from the Vitals of this Nation.]

The Hon. Lord Clive has purchased the large Estate and Manor of — Wallcott, Esq; of Wallcott, in the County of Shropshire, for 90,000 l.

Yesterday about Noon a Publican in Shore-ditch, and one Mr. Phillips, who keeps an Intelligence Office in Finch-lane, were brought before Alderman Dickenson at Guildhall, by a large Body of Sailors, who charged Mr. P. with having taken divers Sums of Money from Sailors at the Publican's House, under Pretence of getting the Government to take their R's off, which the Sailors believed was only a Deceit: Upon hearing their Story, the Alderman told them, as the Case arose in Middlesex, he would recommend them to go to one of the Justices of that County; upon which they took the two Delinquents away; and as the Sailors went out of the Hall, some of them swore

that if they could not have the said Delinquents committed to Prison they would cut both their Ears off. The Sailors let the Publican go after they came out of Guildhall, and carried Mr. Phillips to Towerhill where they obliged him to go down on his knees and ask Pardon; and then they took him to the Flower-Pot in Boshopgate-Street, where after staying some Time, they left him: And, some Person having made them believe the above Publican had designed to defraud them, about five o'Clock in the Afternoon they went in a riotous Manner to the Publican's House, and, notwithstanding he had placed a Guard of Soldiers before his Door, they pulled down the Sign and broke it to Pieces; upon which the Soldiers fired several Times, and killed four People upon the Spot, besides wounding several others: A Lad in particular was shot through both Cheeks: An additional Party of Soldiers came soon after the Affair was over, and as the Sailors threaten to come with a great Number this Day, it is said the Guards will be kept for some Time. There did not appear to be either a Justice of Peace or a Constable present when the Soldiers fired, and the whole Mischief was done in a few Minutes after the Sailors came to the Publican's House. One of the Persons killed was a well dressed Man, who was passing by when the Affair happened.

It has been an old Observation, that the *vox Populi* is the *vox Dei*: In some Cases it may be true; but whoever considers the fatal Consequences of some late Riots, particularly that of the Sailors on Towerhill a few Weeks ago, and that in Shoreditch on Monday last, will be rather of Opinion that the *vox populi* is too often the *vox diaboli*.

On Monday Night, at the Disturbance in Shoreditch, the Rioters were so Outrageous as not only to pelt the Guards with Brickbats, Stones, &c. but even forced Bayonets from several of their Muskets, before they were ordered to fire.

At the late Riot in Shoreditch a Carman was shot across the Belly that some of his Bowels came out.

**Oct. 28.** We learn from France, that an Artist there has lately invented a new Kind of Spectacles, three Inches long, and eighteen Lines in Diameter, with four Glasses, which are far superior to any hitherto discovered.

We are informed, that notwithstanding the British Subjects are in Possession of all Canada, a great Quantity of Furs, &c. from those Parts, by Way of Mississippi, have lately arrived in France.

At the Window of an Office, not far from Crutched-friars, the following Notice we are told, is stuck up in the Window, in the true Hibernian Style, viz. *No Certificates will be delivered but on the first Wednesday in every Week.*

Wednesday a Butcher, near St. James's-market, driving some Sheep home for Slaughter, one running from the Rest, he sent (what they term a *Keepback*) his Dog after him, which seizing the Stray, held him till his Brother Brute came up, who very dexterously cutting his Legs off at the Knuckles, drove him home with much Pleasure and Satisfaction.

In Order to secure a perpetual Tranquility with the Spaniards to the Southward, three Ships of War are constantly to cruise near the Island of Rattan, in the Bay of Honduras, about ten Leagues from the Mosquito Shore, whose Harbour of Port Royal is capable of containing Five Hundred Sail in all Weathers.

Letters from Altena, of the 15th Instant, advise, that they had a certain Account from Lunenburg, that the Workmen were employed there, with the greatest Expedition, to get the Palace ready by the 29th of next Month, for the Reception of the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick, and his intended Consort Princess Augusta of England.

It is expected that the Number of Petitioners who will attend the next Sessions of Parliament to obtain the Repeal of the Cyder Act, will be no less than they were in 1733, against the General Excise, when the Common Council of London, declared, that "The Extension of such Laws must necessarily increase the Number and Power of Officers, which would be inconsistent with those Principles of Liberty on which their happy Constitution



stitution was founded; and would farther deprive the Subjects of England of some of those valuable Privileges, which had hitherto distinguished them from the neighbouring Nations."

No less than Twelve Sixty-four-Gun Ships, which were contracted for by the French King during the late War, are ready to be Launched in the several Ports of the Northern Powers.

Letters arrived from Lisbon Yesterday, dated the 6th, bring Advice of the Arrival there of the Centurion Man of War, on board of which was His Royal Highness the Duke of York, who, on his going ashore, was attended by a great Number of Persons of the highest Rank; and, during his Stay there, was to reside at Count Carvalho's, his Portuguese Majesty's Chief Secretary of State.

Tho' several material Articles are omitted in the late Proclamation for the Encouragement of Settlers in Florida, we hear every Adventurer who chuses to accept the Benefit, will be entitled to the same Advantages with the Settlers of Nova-Scotia, and also be subfisted for twelve Months after their Arrival, at the public Expence.

A few Nights since, a Man, genteelly dressed, knocked at a Lady's Door in Martlet Court, Bow-street, and it was opened by the Lady herself. He enquired if her Name was W—, and being answered in the Affirmative, he said he wanted to speak to her on material Business. He was ushered into the Parlour, when he instantly fastened the door on the inside, pulled out a Pistol, and demanded two Guineas; Mrs. W— replied she had not so much in the House; he told her he knew she had much more, and if she did not instantly supply him, she was a dead Woman. "Will you not then (says she) if I should supply you with two Guineas, take all the Cash I have from me?" "No, replied he, upon my Honour." She then opened a Drawer, in which were above twenty Pounds, and gave him the Sum he required, which he received, without offering to touch any of the rest, and very politely took his Leave.

*Extract of a Letter from New-York, Sept. 12.*

"You who indulge in Ease and Luxury in London, feel no Sensations for the Cruelties practised on our Frontier Settlers, from the *provoked, despised and neglected Indians*, tho' otherwise I might have filled them *bold and courageous Indians*, by the Introduction of that cursed parsimonious Economy into our Continent. We might have prevented all these Cruelties if our \*\*\*\*\* had listened to the Advice of Sir W— J— on the Surrender of Montreal, where was found a Quantity of Presents to the Value of a few Hundred Pounds, designed by the French for the Indians; who gave it as his Opinion, "That a formal Procession, as Conquerors, should be made into the City; that it was then necessary, to gain the Esteem and Friendship of the Indians; and, to give them some Ideas of our Power and Grandeur, not only to invite them to assist at the Procession, but at the End of it make a general Distribution of such Presents to the Heads of all the Tribes present." But this Advice was neglected, as well as the poor Indians, who, from a Sense of the many Contempts thrown on them, have now united to Defend their own Properties, and drive the English out of their Lands, &c."

*Extract of a Letter from Gorde, in Provence, Sept. 6.*

"The World has heard of the great Earthquakes we have had in our Neighbourhood, but it knows not yet the deplorable Consequences they have been attended with. Three of the highest Rocks on the Hill which our Town stands on were shook so violently by the Earthquakes, that it was feared they would soon tumble down. Under these Rocks was a considerable Village, whose Inhabitants, seeing the imminent Danger, abandoned their Houses: Happily for them! for the Day before Yesterday, about VIII in the Evening, these three enormous Rocks fell down, with a most dreadful Crash, entirely destroyed 14 Houses, which are buried under them, and Splitting and Tearing to Pieces 5 or 6 others. There were but one Man and a Woman killed, who were so obstinate they would not quit their Habitation. A Number of Cattle perished. The heavy Rains we had last Month have doubtless hastened the fall of these Rocks. All the Country is in a Consternation, some for what they have lost, others for what they run the Risk of losing. The Tanneries, which produced here a considerable Revenue, have been swallowed up. There are still 3 or 4 Rocks which threaten Destruction, and which, if they should fall, will drag with them above half the Village."

A Letter from Smyrna concludes thus: "We know not from what Motive the Cadi had the Barbarity to refuse giving any Orders to prevent the

Progress of the Fire, which certainly might have been stopt at the first House, but for his Obstinacy and Inhumanity. Perhaps he imagines that it is an Action agreeable to Mahomet, not to prevent, or even to second, the Ruin of Christians. But what is still more greivous, and which proves the Badness of Heart of the Inhabitants in general, is that the Unfortunate, who have lost their All, can find no Assistance, nor lodging. Their distressful Situation is not capable of moving the Compassion of either Turks, Greeks, or Jews, who have set a most exorbitant Price upon every Thing the Sufferers immediately stand in Need of; so that if Providence does not supply them, nothing but Death can put an End to the Misery of the poor Christians."

Newcastle, Oct. 11. We have Advice here, that last Week there was a great Riot at Edinburgh, and that the Lord Provost has been gassed, i. e. superseded by the City Electors: The Train-bands were raised, and the King's Guards attacked and dispersed, and the Guard-house, &c. destroyed. How this Disturbance will end, we are at a Loss to conjecture. The Lord Provost is generally elected for two Years; and, it is said, the late one had laid some Sort of Tax upon the common People, which they would not submit to.


