P A R I S, January 6.

THE Court has just purchased in Sweden and Denmark, 18 or 20 Men of War, which being joined to those we have in our Ports, besides a prodigious Number of flat-bottomed Boats, will be more than sufficient to carry Terror and Dismay into England and Scotland, where the Court has no way lost Sight of certain Plans for Descents, that were sent to us about three Years ago. Nevertheless, in the Midst of this flattering Prospect, we see with Regret, that the Prince de Soubize is appointed to the Command on the Lower Rhine: We know his Protectress, and doubt not that this is the Fruit of her Intrigues.

Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters at Ufflar, Jan. 7.
We remain quiet in our Quarters here. We have received an Account, that Count Broglie, with a large Body of Troops, and assisted likewise in his Operations by Lieutenant-General M. de Sainville, attacked, on the 2d instant, the Town of Duderstadt, which is at the Extremity of his serene Highness's Cantonments on the Left. General Mansberg was posted there, but found it necessary to quit the Town, (which the Enemy entered) and to take Possession of the Heights of Werbighagen, where he maintained himself till the arrival of the Generals Kielmansegg and Luckner to his Succour, who, the next Day, attacked the French in Duderstadt, drove them from thence, and pursued them as far as Wittenhausen. The Loss of the Enemy upon this Occasion, amounts, by their own Accounts, to 600 Men; 200 of them have been made Prisoners; among whom are three complete Companies of French Grenadiers. The Loss on our Side, is about 190 Men.

Vienne, Jan. 2. The King of Prussia's Proposals to this Court have been rejected. England also send a Plan of Pacification, which, after being examined in Council, was dispatched to Versailles, with Orders to our Ambassador to inform the French Ministry, that the Empress his over-earn had looked upon that Plan, with great indifference, and as no Ways acceptable; and that he was determined to risk the Fate of the approaching Campaign; but that she entreated his most Christian Majesty to take such Measures that his Campaign may be the last, as she foresaw it could be impossible for her to find Money enough for making another.

Bradenburg, Jan. 8. By Means of the great Number of Recruits lately raised in the King's Dominion, we expect that his Majesty will open the next Campaign with about an Hundred and fifty Thousand Men, a good Part of which will be ready for Action towards the End of February, not sooner. Our Strength is not so far exhausted as our Enemies may imagine; nay, we have room to expect that the King's just Arms will win this Year, even greater Advantages than they have reaped since the Beginning of this War.

L O N D O N, January 6.
On Saturday died, at his House in Albemarle Street, of a Mortification in his Foot, aged near eighty, Lieutenant-General John Huske, Governor of Jersey, and Colonel of the 23d Regiment of Foot, the Welch Fusiliers.

Extrait of a Letter from France, by the Flanders Mail.
"About 39 Sail of Ships have been carried into Brest, Morlaix, and St. Maloes, in the Space of 15 or 20 Days, by our Privateers; Capt. Delile, of Dunkirk, has taken three of the above, two on board 1200 Hogheads of Tobacco, and the other 400 Hogheads of Sugar. Our Orders for the Purchase of Tobacco in England are stopped, on Account of the many Vessels from Virginia and Maryland, being brought into our Ports by Privateers."

Extrait of a private Letter from the Hague, Jan. 16.
It appears that the Deliberations of the States of

Holland and West Frizeland, which turned only upon Redress of Abuses and new Arrangements in the Republic, have been interrupted by several Demands made from England. General Yorke, at a Conference last Week with the Deputies of their High Mightinesses, called for Payment of an Hundred Thousand Pounds Sterling, which the Dutch East-India Company have engaged to lay down for the hostile Affair that happened in the River of Bengal. His Excellency declared, that as the Dutch were the Aggressors in that Affair, and fully convinced of their being in the Wrong, he intreated their High Mightinesses to give Orders, and at the same Time look after the Execution thereof, that the said Company should forthwith perform the Engagements they had contracted on that Score.

"From the Assembly of the States-General, this Demand was carried to that of their Noble and Great Mightinesses, and it is not doubted but the Money will be privately paid, in order to stop the Clamour of many Merchants, who are continually harping upon the Injustice that was done them in London, on Occasion of the Deputation sent thither to settle Differences about Trade and Navigation."

Jan. 12. We are informed that the Government has, within these few Days, contracted for 30,000 Ton of Shipping, which is to be got ready with all possible Dispatch, for the Service of an Expedition, which will shortly take Place, and for Number of Ships, Forces, &c. it is said will be the most formidable that ever went from this Island.

Jan. 19. Two French Turkey Ships are taken by an English Privateer, Simon Forbes, Commander, and are carried into Leghorn; one the St. Jean Baptista from Marseilles, and the other commanded by Capt. Mordeau for Marseilles.

Jan. 23. There have been taken, in the Space of two Months, 15 Ships from Virginia and Maryland, bound to the Port of London, having on board upwards of 7000 Hogheads of Tobacco; there are still missing from Virginia and Maryland to the Port of London, 7 more Vessels.

The Ann, Dougall Shonnan, from Maryland, bound to Glasgow, was drove on Shore the 1st Instant, about ten Miles below Glasgow; Ship and Cargo entirely lost.

Jan. 24. Several Mortars, and a great Quantity of Bombs, are preparing at Woolwich, in order to be sent to Portsmouth.

Extrait of a Letter from Portsmouth, January 13.
"Our Artificers in the Dock-yard are so extremely hurried, that they work on Sundays."

Admiralty-Office, Jan. 20. His Majesty's Ship Venus of 36 Guns and 240 Men, commanded by Capt. Harrison, arrived the 16th Instant at Plymouth, and brought in with her the Brune, a French Frigate of 32 Guns, and 316 Men, and a French Privateer of St. Maloes, of 6 Carriage and 6 Swivel Guns, and 39 Men. The Venus was in Company with the Juno, of 32 Guns, and 220 Men, commanded by Capt. Philips, when they fell in with the Brune, on the 10th Instant, 50 Leagues to the Westward of Scilly: After a Chase of some Hours, the Venus came up with her, and engaged her upwards of two Hours, when the Juno coming up, and firing a few Guns, the Brune struck. The Venus had 4 Men killed, and 18 wounded, among the latter were Capt. Harrison, his first Lieutenant and Master; the Juno had 2 Men wounded. The Brune had 19 killed, and 39 wounded.

FROM A LATE LONDON PAPER.
THE King of Portugal perceiving that the vast Quantities of Gold that came from Brazil did but just touch at Lisbon, and then travelled over all the Countries in Europe, directed this Matter to be very seriously considered and examined by his Council, supposing that if a Method could be found out to prevent this Gold from straying, the Business would be done, and himself become one of the richest Princes in Europe.

His Council accordingly examined this Point very carefully, and reported; that the English and Dutch ran away with all the Gold, in Consequence of their furnishing the Goods and Manufactures that were sent to the Brasils; they therefore proposed, that the using these Goods, and the wearing these Manufactures, should be prohibited in the Colony, and that the People should be contented with what could be sent from Portugal. This was considered as a great Stroke of Policy, and was on the Point of being put in Execution, when Lord Galway, who was there in Behalf of his Nation, and had the Confidence of the King, demanded an Audience, and delivered himself in the following Manner.

"YOUR Majesty cannot be sufficiently commended for the steady Attention you have always shewn to the Affairs of your Government; and the Pains you have lately bestowed in examining into the Balance of Trade, is a new Proof of that Merit which would entitle you to the Crown, had it not descended to you from a long and glorious Line of royal Ancestors. But permit me, Sir, to observe, that there is a greater King, one by whom all Kings reign, and whose Providence is over all his Works. According to his Distribution of Things, Riches belong to some Nations and Industry to others, and by this Means the Liberality of Heaven is made equal to all. Vain, Sir, are all human Councils when opposed to his Wisdom, and feeble the Efforts, even of royal Power, when directed to cross his Will.—You have forbid Gold to be exported out of your Dominions, and you would willingly enforce the Prohibition, but the Thing is impracticable; you may restrain your Subjects, but you cannot set Bounds to their Necessities: But say that this was possible, suppose you could defeat the Industry of the Northern Nations, what would be the Consequence? The Husbandmen, Graziers, Weavers, and all that infinite Train of Manufacturers, who now Labour quietly at Home to cloath and feed your Subjects, would then turn Soldiers, and instead of seeing them Merchantmen in the River of Lisbon, you would hear of their Fleets conveying them to Brazil to fetch much more of that Gold than you now fetch for them.

"Besides, Sir, if they are Gainers by your Trade, they become thereby the natural Guarantees of your Dominions; it is not only their Treaties but their Interests that bind them to your Service, you have potent Enemies, and you receive powerful Friends.—The Ambition of France knows no Bounds; the Pride of Spain will teach her to keep a perpetual Claim to your Territories and Crown; you have no Recourse to frustrate the Views, and defeat the Endeavours of those Potentates, but to the maritime Powers, and therefore let me beseech your Majesty to consider that every Project to distress them, is in Effect a Scheme to destroy yourself."

We have only to observe, by way of Application, that this Remonstrance had it's desired Effect.

BASSETTERRE (in St. Christophers) February 25.

Some Prisoners from Martinico have brought an Account, that a new General, with two Frigates, are arriv'd there from France.

A French Ship of 16 Guns was brought Yesterday into the Road of Baltimore, by the Letter of Marque Ship, bound from Bristol for Jamaica. The Prize was bound for the Cape from Bordeaux.

For a Little-Sort Method.

The Case of the poor Creditors is really deplorable, occasioned by the Bankruptcy of the Crown of France. Many of them who had, with great Danger and Labour, acquired Estates worth 1000 l. Sterling, by the Far Trade, or otherwise, can now scarce procure a Dinner. All their Remittances from their Mother Country, consisted in Bills on the French King, which are not now worth one Farthing, as no Body whatever will accept of them in Payment. It is computed there is above the Value of 1000000 l. Sterling of these useless Paper Scraps circulated through the Colony, which, as a Reward to the wretched Inhabitants for all their Hardships and Fatigues, must now supply the Place of Affluence and Independence. Most, if not all of them, are perfectly reconciled to the English Government, as they can now with Security enjoy any little Property they have; whereas formerly Governor Vaudreuil made no Ceremony of seizing the Produce of their Lands, their Merchandise and Manufactures of every Kind, and, after conveying them to the King's Store-houses, paid to the Proprietors any Price he pleased. If the Owners thereafter had Occasion for any of their own Commodities, they could not procure them under twenty Times the Price they had received.

PHILADELPHIA, March 26.

By Captain Robeson, from St. Christophers, we are informed, that just before he sailed, a Privateer came in, and brought Advice, that Commodore Douglas had taken a French 74 Gun Ship and a Frigate; and that he had burnt another Frigate at the Grenades.

Besides the Prizes mentioned, under the St. Christophers Head, to be carried into Martinico, the following are said also to have been taken, and sent in there, from the 23d of January to the 15th of February, viz. A Brig, two Schooners, and three Sloops, from New-London, Captains Hiern, Perkins, Defton, Durell, Stilman, and Miller. A Brig and Sloop from New-York, Captains Bush and Wilson. Two Sloops from Salem, Captains Chitman and Porter. A Schooner from Marblehead, Capt. Reed. A Snow from St. Eustatia, Captain Olson. Also two Sloops, bound to Salem, Captains Davis and Swafey, being beat off the Coast, were taken, and sent into that Island. And a Snow from Piscataqua, loaded with Masts, was also carried in, but afterwards made her Escape.

From-Boston we learn, that on Thursday, the 12th Instant, between 2 and 3 in the Morning, they had a violent Shock of an Earthquake there, which lasted about Half a Minute, but without doing any Damage: And that it was also felt at Portsmouth, in New-Hampshire, at Newport, in Rhode-Island, and in New-London.

On Friday last the Harriot Snow Packet, Captain Brailly, arrived at New-York from Falmouth. In her Passage she was struck with Lightning, which did the Vessel considerable Damage, wounded one of her Hands much, and Runned the whole Crew for some Time, but they all recovered after a While.

The Prince of Wales, Yarrow, and the Neptune, Tindall, both from Maryland for London, are taken, and carried to St. Maloes.

HANAU, January 5.

BY Order of Marshal Broglie all the Inhabitants of Hesse are forbid, on Pain of Death, from carrying any Messages to the Hanoverians, or supplying them with Money, Provisions, or Forage of any Sort.

Cassel, Jan. 1. The Marquis of Granby is entered into Winter Quarters. We are busy in repairing the Fortifications of our ancient City. We just now learn that the King of Denmark has appointed the Count de St. Germain to be Commander in Chief of all his Majesty's Forces.

Paris, Jan. 5. We shall have this Year an Army of 40,000 Men on the Lower Rhine; and Marshal Broglie's Army will amount at least to 80,000 Men.

Poland, Dec. 24. The Palace of Prince Sulikowski at Corzmin has been reduced to Ashes by a Fire. The Damage is said to exceed 130,000 Polish Florins.

L O N D O N.

Dec. 25. A Patent will soon pass the Great Seal, for appointing General Amherst, Governor General and Commander in Chief of all his Majesty's Forces in North-America.

The Losses which the Merchants and Owners of Ships have sustained, on Account of the frequent Captures made of late of their Ships and Cargoes, for want of a sufficient Number of British Privateers to oppose them, has been taken into Consideration by the Government, and an Order will be speedily given for equipping a considerable Number of 20 Gun Ships to be fully manned to cruise on all the Coasts of Great-Britain, and Ireland, to suppress the Enemies Privateers. It being accounted that within these 3 Months near 100 of our Vessels have been taken, and about 50 of them ransomed for large Sums.

It is now said, that 'tis his Majesty's gracious Intention, upon his Coronation, to discharge by a free Act all the Debtors, without Exception, in all the Goals in England, who were in Prison at the Time of the Demise of his late Royal Grandfather.

So great is the Curiosity of the People in general to see the Coronation, although no Time is yet fixed for the Purpose, that some of the Houses in and about New Palace-yard, within the View of the Procession, let at the amazing Price of 400 Guineas for the Day.

Jan. 5. The Lords of the Admiralty have ordered out four of the best sailing Frigates in the Navy, to cruise from 150 to 200 Leagues to the Westward, to protect the Trade.

Jan. 15. On Saturday Morning, at 7 o'Clock, died at his Seat at Hatchland, near Guilford, in Surrey, of a Fever, in the 45th Year of his Age, to the Misfortune of his Country, and inexpressible Grief of his Friends, the R. H. Edward Boscawen, next Brother to Viscount Falmouth; a Lord of the Admiralty, Admiral of the Blue, General of Marines, one of the Elder Brethren of Trinity House, Member of Parliament for Truro in Cornwall, and one of his Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council. Admiral Boscawen married in December 1742, Frances, Daughter of William Evelyn Glanville, of St. Clerc, in Kent, by whom he has left Issue several Children. He was chosen Member of Parliament for the Borough of Truro on the Death of James Hammond, Esq; in 1742, and was elected for the said Borough, as also for Saltash, at the General Election in 1747, but made his Election for Truro, and was elected a third Time for the said Borough in 1754. Among many other signal Services to his Country, he commanded in Chief in the Expedition against Cape-Breton, and in Conjunction with Gen. Amherst, took the important Fortress of Louisbourg, in July 1758, from the French; and upon his Arrival in England, received the Thanks of the Hon. House of Commons, in an elegant Speech from the R. H. Speaker, upon his first Appearance at the House; and in August 1759, he fell in with the French Fleet, commanded by M. de la Clue, when he took three Ships of the Line, and burnt two.

Captain Ourry, of his Majesty's Ship Astæon, by Letter of the Twenty-ninth past, gives an Account, that having Intelligence of a Brig, and a snow Privateer being off the Start, he went in Pursuit of them; and, on the Twenty-seventh, between Twelve and One in the Night, he fell in with the Brig, and fired his starboard Guns at her as she passed him; and in less than eight or ten Minutes she intirely disappeared, though it was a fine Moon light Night, and he could see for some Miles round the Horizon; and that in the Morning he saw two Sail within the Land, which he

chaced, and soon came up with; one of them proved to be a Snow Cartel from Quebec, the other the Grivois Snow Privateer from St. Maloes, of ten Carriage and ten Swivel Guns, and eighty Men, which latter he took. She had been out from Cherburg three Days.

ST. CHRISTOPHERS, January 29.

Captain Stewart arrived here since our last in a Ship from Louisburg, having on board several Officers, and about 60 Men, belonging to a Provincial Regiment, which had been in Garrison there; they were intended for Boston, but were blown off the Coast.

A Schooner, said to be from Boston, and bound to St. Kitts with Fish and Lumber, ran ashore at Berbuda about a Week ago.

On board the private Ship of War Britannia, January 26.

SIR,
THE Indignity done to my Country, and the Injury intended to myself, on Wednesday the 21st Instant, I think justly entitles me to demand of you the Reason of such unprecedented and lawless Proceeding.

I suppose I need not inform your Honour, that in the Morning of the abovementioned Day, I brought to two Vessels to the Leeward of your Island; but as soon as I found they were Vessels on a fair Trade, I acquitted them: That soon after I spoke with two small Vessels bound to St. Martin's, which I did not detain one Moment, but acquitted them also; all this happened within Sight of your Town and Batteries, tho' not within Reach of your Guns; and that some Time after I was peaceably passing along Shore with my Colours hoisted, when your Leewardmost Battery fired three point blank Shot at my Ship. Had they been fired from the Place you reside in, I assure you I should have returned the Compliment: The Reason I did not, was my believing it was done unknown to you, and perhaps contrary to your Orders. And here I must beg Leave to observe, that I defy the bitterest Enemy I have in St. Eustatia to charge me with an inhuman or bad Action, or any Thing contrary to the Law of Nations.

I make no Doubt your Answer will prevent my firing three Shot into the first Dutch Ship I meet on the high Seas; for I assure your Honour, had I lost a Malt, or received any other Damage, I should have made Reprisals on the first Vessel I met bound to or from Holland. Your Answer will much oblige, Sir, Your humble Servant,

Capt. Baxter informs us that the Captains Rodman, Wheatley, and Chapman, from this Place, lately arrived at the Mount.

NEW-YORK, March 25.

Extract of two Letters from an eminent Merchant in London dated the 10th and 15th of December last.

"I deferred answering your Letters until this Day, that I might know the Event of a Trial in Doctors Commons, relating to an English Ship, who was taken after coming out of Monto Christo Harbour by a Man of War. She had taken in her lading from Spanish Barques, and had colourable Papers on board. The Judge of the Admiralty released the Ship and Cargo without Costs, because she had colourable Papers on board. Consequently, had she no such Papers on board, he would have condemned the Captain in Costs. This I think is out of Dispute.

"By colourable Papers, I mean any Papers but what are true and genuine, such as False Clearances, Bills of Lading, Invoices or Charter Parties; a Ship from Monto Christo may produce Clearances from Jamaica or any other English Port, or in order to avoid the Risk of the French, may produce Clearances and Papers as a Danish, Dutch, or Spanish Ship. The Ship I mentioned, was taken near this Coast, by a Man of War and brought in here, and had some such Papers on board, which intitled the Man of War to bring her in; but as the Property was proved to be bought from the Spaniards on English Account, she was released and the Captors were not obliged to pay Costs, because she had some Papers on board to secure her from English Men of War, as if she had come from Jamaica, or from the Enemy, as being a neutral Ship and going to a neutral Port."

Extract of a Letter from Rhode Island, dated March 23d, 1761, to the Owners of the Letter of Marque Ship Duke of Cumberland, of this Port, Captain Cregier.

He was brought young from Consocheague by Mr. Stiger, and fed till he was Nine Years old. His Gut Fat weigh'd 173 Pounds, his Kidney Fat 82, his Hide, which was thin, weigh'd 106. P A R I S, December 31.

THE Proposals of Peace that came from the King of Poland, Elector of Saxony, by the Instruction of the King of Prussia, might have been accepted, had there been no Mention of guarantying Part of Silesia to that Prince. His Prussian Majesty, in getting the King of Poland to use his Interest at our Court, and at Vienna, acted, no Doubt, in Concert with the British Court, who, we are told, has just made the following Proposals, by the Channel of the Spanish Minister.

1. That we shall relinquish Guadaloupe.
2. Give up Port Mahon.
3. Demolish the Fortifications at Dunkirk.
4. Assist the Queen of Hungary with no more than 25,000 Men.

Upon these Conditions, England will restore to all Canada, Gorce and Senegal; reserving to herself the Liberty of supplying the King of Prussia with as many Troops as she pleases; but at the same Time engaging to send him no more than he shall think fit to take into his Pay.

Two Things immediately determined his Majesty to reject these Propositions; the first, is the Demolition of Dunkirk's Fortifications; and the other is, that he will come to no Accommodation but for a general Peace: Such, at least, are the Assurances the King has given the Empress Queen.

Dublin, Jan. 13. We hear his Majesty's Letter is come over, ordering Payment of upwards of 300l. being the Amount of Expences incurred by the Inhabitants of Belfast, on the Occasion of Thurot's late Invasion.

L O N D O N.

Jan. 13. The Charming Polly, Barber, from Virginia to London, is taken, and carried into St. Maloes.

The Polly, alias Bartholomew, Leslie, from Maryland to London, is taken by a French Privateer, and carried into St. Maloes.

Jan. 15. It is said Lord Villiers, Member of Parliament for Weobly, in Herefordshire, and eldest Son to Lord Jersey, will succeed the late Admiral Boscawen, as one of the Lords of the Admiralty; and that Admiral Pocock will speedily take upon him the Command of a Squadron at Sea.

Part of a Letter from the Hague, Dec. 30.

"The greatest Part of the English Officers who have arrived within these few Days from the Army, on their Way to England, complain openly of Prince F——, that he aims at nothing but getting Honour to himself, and filling his Pockets."

The Newcastle, Spencer, and the Volunteer, both from Maryland to London, are taken and carried into Bayonne.

Jan. 17. Yesterday Major General Studholm Hodgson kissed his Majesty's Hand on being appointed Commander in Chief of the Forces going on a secret Expedition. As did also Col. Crawford, on his being appointed Second in Command thereof.

The Peggy, Pinkhorn, of and for London from Quebec and Brest, is arrived at Plymouth. She says, that on the 3d Instant the Courageux, of 74 Guns, the Malicieuse, of 36, and the Amere of 12, sailed from Brest with Troops, supposed for the West-Indies.

The African Packet, Mawson, from Senegal, taken from Virginia, is taken and carried into St. Maloes.

The Admiral Hawke, Gregg, from Virginia to London, is taken, and carried into Bayonne.

The St. Cecilia, Maxted, from Virginia to London, is taken and carried into Havre de Grace.

They write from Toulon, of the 21st of December, that the Cargo of the English Ship Prince Edward, taken by M. de Morics, was sold there,

by Auction, for 13 Million of Livres, or 568,750 l. Sterling.

St. JAGO DE LA VEGA (Jamaica) Jan. 24. On Saturday last arrived at Port-Royal his Majesty's Ship Glasgow, from a Cruise, and brought in a large French Snow, bound from Marfeilles to Port-au-Prince.

Feb. 7. On Saturday last arrived from a Cruise his Majesty's Ship the Renown, and brought in a large Ship, laden with Beef, Butter, &c. from Cork, taken going into the Cape.

On Tuesday arrived from Westmoreland Capt. Hyndes, with a Party of free Negroes and Mulattoes under his Command. Every Thing remains quiet at present in that, as also in every other Parish of this Island.

CHARLES-TOWN (South Carolina) March 21.

Last Sunday Afternoon arrived in Town from Augusta, Capt. James Colbert, of the Upper Chicasahs, with a Cherokee Scalp and a Prisoner, which he, with a Party of Chicasahs, took near Fort Prince George, about the 27th ult.

The Party he fell in with consisted of five, three of whom, being on Horseback, got off; but one of them, having a Fall, lost his Gun, Ammunition and Blanket.

The Prisoner told Colbert, that he belonged to a Gang of 30, with a white Man, who had been down to Long-Canes, and burnt all the Houses and Provisions they found there, but were otherwise unsuccessful: That upon their Return they divided into small Parties: That the Little Carpenter (Attakullakulla, with whom Governor Lytleton concluded the Treaty in 1759, at Keohwee) still pressed the Nation to accept or sue for Peace, by which it is plain that he continues firm in his Attachment to the English: And that the Cherokees were rather inclined for Peace, than to continue the War; but were kept in Action by repeated Assurances from some Creeks, that their Nation would at last join them.

While Colbert had his Prisoner at Mr. Trewin's Store at Augusta, Fool-Harry's Son and some other Creeks came there to see him, appeared much dissatisfied, and behaved in such a Manner as to create a Suspicion that they intended to rescue him; upon which he was removed and concealed till brought away.—Colbert was the first who brought an Account of his Success to Town. On Thursday he set out on his Return to Augusta, and carried considerable Rewards for those Chicasahs who had been out with him. Some Time next Month he will go again, with a large Party of Upper and Lower Chicasahs, to war against the Cherokees, and join the Troops commanded by Col. Grant.

On Wednesday last four large Transport Ships, having on board the heavy Baggage of his Majesty's Troops to be employed in the approaching Campaign against the Cherokees (in Conjunction with the Forces of this Province) under the Command of Col. James Grant, sailed up Cooper-River, for Strawberry, where they are to land the same, in order to be immediately transported in Waggon to Monck's Corner. And,

Yesterday Morning early, the said Troops set out on their March from hence, to begin the Campaign: They consist of four Companies of his Majesty's Royal or 1st Regiment, two Companies of the 17th, two of the 22d, and eight of the new raised Independents: To-morrow Evening they may reach Monck's Corner, where they will halt no longer than is absolutely necessary.

The Highlanders belonging to Col. Montgomery's Regiment, who arrived last Week from Providence, remain in Town, under the Command of Capt. Alexander Mackenzie.

N E W - Y O R K, April 6.

On Saturday last his Honour the President was pleased to give his Assent to the following Act, passed this Session, viz. *An Act for raising, paying, and clothing, Seventeen Hundred and Eighty-seven effective Men, Officers included, to be employed in*

securing His Majesty's Conquests in North-America, and other Purposes therein mentioned.

We hear the General Assembly of the Colony of Connecticut, last Week voted the Number of 2325 Men, for the Service of the present Year.

Saturday Night last Captain Richardson arrived here from Antigua in 18 Days: He sailed from thence in Company with the Ship York, for this Port, but parted from her about 12 Days since. Capt. Richardson informs us, That several French Privateers have lately been carried into that Island, by the Frigates under the Command of Commodore Douglass.

Upwards of Forty Masters, Mates, and Passengers, belonging to the several Vessels taken and carried into Martinico, were embarked on board of a Flag of Truce the 15th of February; all the Foremast Men being confined in close Goals, having only a small Allowance of Salt Beef, and Bread, for 24 Hours, and bad Water to drink;—Stones and Boards to repose on; and many Lice.

On Monday last arrived here, the Brig Polly, Captain Lion, in twenty Days from Jamaica; the Advices by this Vessel are, that Admiral Holmes, with the Squadron under his Command, are very active in cruising on that Station; that they have taken several French Privateers and other Vessels; particularly, that one of our Men of War lately took and brought in there a French Frigate, and that they have likewise taken several English Flags of Truce, and Mount Traders, which are all condemned; and that the Negro Rebellion being entirely subdued, the People of that Island were no longer subjected to Martial-Law.

P H I L A D E L P H I A, April 9.

Captain Forbes, in the Atalanta, from New-York for Barbados, was taken by a French Privateer, and afterwards retaken by a Man of War.

A N N A P O L I S, April 16.

By Means of the Badness of the Weather last Week, and the Shortness of the Notice in his Excellency's Proclamation for Calling the Assembly, there did not come to Town a sufficient Number of the Gentlemen to make a House until Monday last: When the Assembly met; and after their taking the Oaths to his present Majesty King GEORGE the Third, his Excellency made the following Speech:

GENTLEMEN of the Upper and Lower Houses of ASSEMBLY,

NOT doubting but you are affected with extreme Sorrow and Concern for the Death of our late most Gracious Sovereign, of happy Memory, whose paternal Care We and all our Fellow-Subjects in these Colonies have most sensibly experienced, I sincerely condole with you on that melancholy Event; the fatal Consequences of which would be most severely felt throughout the extensive Dominions of Great-Britain, was not his Majesty happily succeeded by one of his illustrious Descendants, whose many eminent and princely Virtues render Him dear to all His Subjects, and give them full Assurance of the Continuance of the innumerable Blessings which they have enjoyed during the long, mild, just, and glorious Reign of his Royal Grandfather. That His People may enjoy these Blessings in the fullest Extent, His Majesty wishes to see His Kingdoms in a State of Tranquillity; but being thoroughly persuaded that a vigorous Prosecution of the just War in which the Nation is engaged, is the only effectual Measure to reduce the Enemy to the Necessity of accepting Peace on Terms of Glory and Advantage to His Crown, and particularly beneficial to His Subjects in America, whose Interest He hath much at Heart; His Majesty hath been pleased to give Orders, that such Part of His Regular Forces in North-America as may be adequate to some great and important Enterprize, be employed in some other Quarter against the Enemy during the ensuing Campaign; and that the Security

cases of His Majesty's on this Continent, particularly of the Colonies, which, in the Course of this War, have, by the Blessing of the Almighty on the Arms, been reduced to the Obedience of our Sovereign, may be the better provided for. His Majesty hath been pleased to signify His Expectations, that His dutiful and loyal Subjects in these Colonies will, without Delay, raise and support a sufficient Number of Troops for that Service, to be employed on this Continent during the Absence of such Regulars, in the Manner that the Commander in Chief of all his Forces in North-America shall direct.

That you may be more fully apprized what Assistance His Majesty requires of you in particular, and how he vouchsafes to invite you by Promises and Encouragements to do what your Duty to Him, and a Regard for your own Happiness and that of your Posterity, must strongly prompt you to perform, I shall lay before you a Letter from the Right Honourable WILLIAM PITT, Esq; and another from His Excellency General AMHERST, hoping you will be thereby induced to pursue, at this Time, such Measures, as that they may both have the Satisfaction to Report to Our most Gracious Sovereign, how cheerfully you shall have complied with His Majesty's Requisition. As I did not, by Reason of the *Leicester* Packet's being lost, receive the Secretary of State's Letter so early as he expected I should receive it, and the Season is already come when the Troops, for which I am ordered to solicit you, ought to have been ready to march, I must intreat you to lose no Time, but with the utmost Expedition to prepare a Bill that will effectually answer the Purposes recommended to you: By such a Proceeding you will, I flatter myself, incline His Majesty to entertain a favourable Opinion of the Inhabitants of this Province, you will give the best Proof of your Attachment to His Sacred Person and Government, and of your earnest Desire to be thought worthy of the Blessings, which all his good and loyal Subjects have abundant Reason to promise themselves under His auspicious Reign.

To His Excellency HORATIO SHARPE, Esq;
Governor and Commander in Chief in and over the Province of MARYLAND:
The humble ADDRESS of the UPPER HOUSE of ASSEMBLY.

May it please your Excellency,
SENSIBLE of the great Loss that we and all our Fellow-Subjects have suffered by the Death of our late most Gracious and Excellent Sovereign, whose paternal Care and Protection the Inhabitants of these Colonies have in a peculiar Manner experienced, we most sincerely lament with your Excellency that melancholy Event.

Our Grief on this Occasion could only be alleviated by the Consideration of the eminent Virtues inherited from Him with the Crown by his illustrious Successor, which encourage His Subjects on the best Grounds to entertain the utmost Confidence, that, under his Auspices, they will, in the fullest Extent, enjoy the innumerable and invaluable Blessings which they have experienced during the long, mild, just, and glorious Reign of His Royal Grandfather: Happy in this Prospect, we join in the general Joy, which hath been diffused throughout the extensive Dominions of Great-Britain: And as we earnestly desire to testify our Duty and Attachment to His Majesty's Sacred Person and Government, both by our Words and Actions, we return your Excellency our Thanks for giving us this Opportunity of doing both, and for the Speech which you were pleased to make at the Opening of this Session.

We also beg Leave to assure your Excellency, that, having in Remembrance what great Efforts have been made by the Mother-Country to rescue these Colonies from the Dangers to which they were not long since exposed, we shall, for our best Return in our Power: Convinced that a vigorous Prosecution of the War, is the only effectual Measure to reduce the Enemy to the Necessity of accepting Peace on Terms of Glory to His Majesty's Crown, advantageous to Great-Britain, and particularly beneficial to His Majesty's Subjects in America, we should be extremely wanting to ourselves and our Posterity, as well as in Duty and Gratitude to our most Gracious Sovereign, were we not most readily to comply with His Requisition, signified by the Letters which your Excellency hath been pleased to lay before us.

We beg Leave therefore to assure you, that, zealous as we have been on every Occasion to promote the Service of Our Sovereign, we shall most cheerfully give our Concurrence to any equi-

table Bill for the Purposes recommended by your Excellency, which may be at this Time offered us, and shall rejoice if the Issue of this Session be such, as to induce His Majesty to entertain a favourable Opinion of this Province, and to believe that the Inhabitants of Maryland are not unworthy of the Happiness, which all His good and loyal Subjects have the greatest Reason to promise themselves under his auspicious Reign.

ST. JOHN'S (in Antigua) February 25.

WE hear from Martinico, that M. Latouche, the new Governor of that Island, is arrived there with 3 Frigates; and that the French Privateers have lately carried in a great Number of Prizes. It is said there is a List upwards of 30, some of which were Lumbered Vessels, whose Cargoes are very much wanted here.

Captain Power, who arrived here last Thursday from Bristol, was attacked to Windward, by four French Privateers, three of which he obliged to run away, and the other struck; but for want of men he could not take Possession of her. And Captain Potts, of the Ship Julius Caesar, bound from London to Jamaica, was also attacked about Leagues to Windward of this Island, by six Privateers, all which he beat off with considerable loss on the Side of the Enemy. Captain Potts had only one Man slightly wounded, but suffered much in his Rigging, that he was obliged to return here to refit.

Captain Tucker, of the Levant Frigate, has been in here a Prize Schooner.

March 4. The Diadem, of 74 Guns, and two French Frigates, have been blocked up in the Harbour of Granada near a Month, by Sir James Douglas, who had with him five Ships of the Line, one of 84 Guns, two of 74, one of 64, and one of 56; but a Vessel which arrived here two days ago met the Foudroyant and Dublin, two of his Squadron, beating up to Barbados. The French Ships fell in with his Majesty's Ship Undel some Leagues from Granada, and might have taken her, if they had pushed for it. It is believed the new French Governor is on board.

A Ship bound from Naples to Martinico, taken by Captain Reid, of the Ship Alexander, from London, arrived here last Thursday. And we hear a large Prize Ship has been carried into St. Christophers.

March 11. His Excellency the General embarked this Morning, on board his Majesty's Ship Leeward, William Tucker, Esq; Commander, to visit the Islands to Leeward, under his Government; his Excellency was received in Town by considerable Detachment of Regulars, and attended to the Sea by several of the principal Gentlemen of the Island.

Commodore Sir James Douglas has left the Island of Granada, without attempting any Thing against the French Ships there, it being judged they could not be destroyed without Bombs; but the Raisonné and Montague still remain there, and continue to block them up. It now seems to be pretty certain, that the new French Governor is not at the Granades. He arrived at Martinico in a Frigate, agreeable to our former Accounts, and the other Ships were intended for that Island, but were cut off the Land by one of the Ships of the Squadron and a Frigate, and chased down to Granada. M. Beaufremont is expected at Martinico with a Squadron and regular Troops, and will he may come. If an Attack should be meditated against that Island, his Squadron may prove (like that at Louisbourg) to increase its Fall; and his offensive Designs can give us no Concern the present State of our Troops and Militia, and whilst supported by 20 Men of War, which we already have upon this Station.

A French Privateer of 8 Guns, and a retaken Ship from Africa, have been brought in by the Aliquieu and Crescent. The Enemy had taken the Negroes out of the Snow, and got clear off with them.

T. CHRISTOPHERS, February 28. The Fleet from London arrived here on Wednesday last. His Majesty's Ship Emerald, Charles Middleton, Esq; Commander, sent Yesterday into

the Road of Basseterre, a Sloop loaded with Molasses; and a French Pettiaugre loaded with Provisions, bound from St. Eustatius for Martinico.

March 14. On Thursday was brought into the Road of Basseterre, a Sloop bound from New-York for the Coast of Guiney: She was retaken by the Foudroyant, Captain Duff.

BOSTON, March 12.

This Morning about Half an Hour after Two, the People of this Town were awaked with an EARTHQUAKE, which lasted about 20 Seconds, but without doing any Damage to our Houses. It was divided into two Shakes, with a short Pause between; and the last was the greatest. The Weather was Moderate for the Season, like that of the preceding Day; and a perfect Calm rested upon both Land and Water. The Stars over-head shone clear; but the Horizon all around was covered with a whitish Fog, which appeared as if there had been a Light behind it.

We also learn by some Fishermen that were upon the Water coming in at that Time, that the Course of this Earthquake was nearly from the S. W. to the N. E. and that they perceived the Noise, as of a distant rising Wind, some considerable Time before the Shaking came on.

March 16. Last Thursday Evening arrived here his Majesty's Ship Fowey, Captain Tonyn, from New-York; she has brought five Boxes of Portugal Gold, amounting to Fifty-six Thousand Pounds Sterling, being Part of the Sixty Thousand Pounds granted by Parliament in 1759, to recompense this Province, for the extraordinary Expence they had been at in carrying on the War in North-America: On Saturday the Money was landed and safely guarded to the Treasurer's by a Party of Marines.

April 6. The General Court of this Province, in order to provide for the Security of his Majesty's Dominions in North America, and particularly of the Possession of his Majesty's Conquests there, during the Absence of such Part of the Regular Forces as shall be employed in an Enterprize against the Enemy; hath made Provision for raising 3000 Men, to be formed into 3 Regiments, under the Command of Gentlemen of this Province, to be commissioned for that Purpose, and to be put under the supreme Command of General Amherst.

The Men are to be enlisted to serve till the first Day of July, 1762, at which Time they are to be discharged at all Events. But if a Peace shall intervene, or if the Regular Forces shall return sooner, they will be discharged immediately after either of those Events. They will not be employed South of Albany; and as there is no Probability of there being any War Northward of that Place, they can only serve in doing Duty in Garrison.

The Bounty given on this Occasion, will be Nine Pounds; Three Pounds fourteen Shillings and eight Pence of which will be paid in a compleat suit of Cloaths, &c. the remaining five Pounds five Shillings and four Pence in Money. They will also have a Blanket for each, and suitable Camp Equipage, and all Allowances as usual.

~~We have Advices from the West Indies, that~~ Captain Welsh, in a Schooner from Surinam for this Place, was taken by a French Privateer the Day after he came out of that River, and carried into St. Vincents.

We hear from Salisbury, that last Friday the House and Barn of Lieutenant Henry Eaton of that Place, together with the Household Furniture, Hay, &c. was consumed by Fire; also the Town Stock of Powder, which was in the Garret of the House: The Fire was occasioned by some Sparks from the Chimney, which fell on the Top of the House.

From Wrentham we are informed, that there hath been lately made in that Town, a Dutch Machine, for Winnowing Grain, viz. Wheat, Rye, Barley, Oats, Indian Corn, Flax-Seed,

Clover-Seed, &c.—It was made by the Direction of a Gentleman in the Jerseys:—From thence we are assured, that two Boys can winnow 100 Bushels of Wheat in one Day, and do it in the best Manner: It makes all the Wind it wants; and lays the Grain, the Chaff, & the Cobs, in 3 different Heaps. That it has been tried at Wrentham with the before mentioned Sorts of Grain; and answers the utmost Expectation.—That two Boys about 15 or 16 Years of Age, winnowed 21 Bushels of Rye in 50 Minutes, in the best Manner; which a Gentleman, with his Watch, who was present, can attest to; and since which, it winnowed 50 Bushels in one Hour and an Half, done as well as the other.—It is esteemed a useful Instrument for a Farmer; and being not very cumbersome to move from Place to Place, might serve a large Neighbourhood:—The Director of this Instrument expresses himself thus; *I should be glad if the most useful Arts, and the best Methods in Husbandry were more generally known, it would afford the Husbandman renewed Cause of Praise and Thankfulness to that GOD who doth instruct him with Discretion.*—We are further informed, that on Monday last it winnowed 40 Bushels in one Hour as can be attested by many Witnesses.

NEW - P O R T, April 7.

Yesterday arrived the Brig Fox, of this Port, Audley Clarke, in 16 Days from Monto Christo. Capt. Clarke informs us, that in Latitude 28, he fell in with seven Sail of large Men of War, steering to the Southward, but could not learn what Ships they were.

The General Assembly of this Colony, at their Session at Providence, the 30th of March last (in Obedience to his Majesty's Command, signified to them by the Right Honourable Mr. Secretary Pitt) ordered a Regiment to be immediately raised, to consist of 665 Men, Officers included, for the ensuing Campaign; of which the following Gentlemen were appointed Field Officers, viz.

Christopher Hargill, Esq; Major.

NEW - Y O R K, April 13.

Friday last the Brig Neptune, Captain Morgan, arrived here, in seven Weeks from Lisbon; he informs us, that a French Privateer, of 24 Guns, that had taken seven of the late Virginia Fleet, bound to Europe, and three smaller Ones, were taken by an English Frigate, and carried into Lisbon; and that the Frigate was commanded either by Captain Kennedy or Ogilvie.

New-England, March 31, 1761.

A TRANSIT of Venus over the Sun being, beyond comparison, the most curious and uncommon appearance the heavens afford, as well as of the greatest consequence, has for a long time been a principal object of the consideration of Astronomers; and it is no wonder if a general curiosity should be excited among other persons, by the near approach of so rare a phenomenon. So very rare indeed it is, as to have happened but once, since the revival of the ancient Ptolemaean, which is the true Astronomy, by Ptolemy, about 240 years ago. Before that period, they pass'd unobserved, if not unthought of. The only one that has been since, was in the year 1639, on the 24th of November O. S. This was observed by a young English astronomer, whose name was Horrox, and his friend, in Lancashire, for about half an hour; till the too early setting of the Sun put an end to their observations. These two were the only persons from the beginning of the world, that had the good fortune to behold this curious spectacle. In the long interval since elapsed, of above 120 years, it has never happened once; so that the Transit next following, at of 1639 is this of the 6th of June 1761; which was predicted by the great Kepler so long as the year 1604. On that day, the planet Venus, which now makes so brilliant an appearance every evening in the west, will be totally deprived of her borrowed lustre; and, for the second time since the creation, will be seen traversing the face of the Sun, in the form of a spot, perfectly round and perfectly black; making a peculiar sort of solar eclipse, by covering a small part of the Sun's luminous disk. The diameter of the planet will be $\frac{1}{3}$ part of the Sun's diameter, and the will pass 9 min. 44 sec. to the southward of the Sun's center, or almost $\frac{1}{2}$ part of the Sun's diameter, within his southern edge; spending near 7 hours in the passage. Upon this occasion, thousands will be employed in gazing on a sight, which neither they nor their fathers had seen; every telescope in Europe will be turned to the Sun; and the most skillful astronomers there, busy in making their observations with all possible accuracy.

Such observations will not be confined to Europe: They will be carried on in Asia and Africa with the same attention. For it ought to be particularly mention'd, as it will for ever be remember'd, to the honour of some of the greatest Princes of the present age, that amidst the tumults of war they have listen'd to the still voice of the Sciences, and have sent into the remotest countries of the South and East, proper persons to make the important observations. Important they may well be called, since (besides other purposes not so needful to be enlarged on at this time) those made in distant parts of the earth, when compared together, will solve one of the most noble and difficult problems in astronomy,—that of finding the distance of the Sun from the Earth. They will determine this distance, not in the way of probable conjecture, but of mathematical demonstration; and that to a degree of exactness far superior to what has ever yet been attained to, or ever can be in any other method. The methods heretofore used for this purpose by astronomers were strictly true in speculation, but not so proper for practice; the observations required in them being such as could not be made with near the exactness as the present observations may be. At the same time, the distance of Venus and of all the other planets will be discovered;—and of all the comets too. And when their true distances are once known, the real magnitudes of all these bodies will be likewise determined. Which points well settled, will elucidate some others that will give us a deeper insight into the wonderful works of GOD.

It were greatly to be wished, that America also might bear a part in so laudable an undertaking;—an undertaking not calculated to serve the separate views of any particular party, but the common interest of the civilized world; and in the benefit of which the whole Republic of letters, in every nation and in every age, will equally partake. For the more observers there are, and the more distant their stations, the more firmly and accurately will the conclusion be established. But unfortunately for us, this most desirable spectacle, which will be presented to all the other continent, will be concealed from the greatest part of our western world, by happening when it is night with us. This may be seen by the following calculation, carefully made from the best astronomical tables that have ever been published;—those of the celebrated Dr. Halley; which, if not perfectly exact, are yet probably very near the truth: According to which the times of this Transit, as reckoned under our meridian, will be as follow,

Venus first touches the Sun, 1761. June 5	9 21

She is wholly within — — — — —	45
Middle, or Venus nearest the Sun's center —	12 40
Venus begins to pass off the Sun — — — —	15 36
Her center passes off — — — — —	48
She wholly leaves the Sun — — — — —	16 00

Hence it appears, that under our meridian and near it, the whole of the Transit will be in the night. In New-England, it will begin about 2 h. after Sun-set on the 5th of June, and end half an hour before Sun-rise on the 6th. And as our meridian runs thro' the length of America, the Transit will be invisible to almost the whole of this continent. The beginning may indeed be seen a little before Sun-set, in the most north-westerly parts, about California; and the end, a little after Sun-rise in the most north-easterly parts, about Newfoundland. At Halifax, it will be intirely over just as the Sun is rising. At Louisburg, the last interior contact, when Venus begins to pass off, will be but one minute after Sun-rise; and this is the nearest place to New-England, where Venus's leaving the Sun can be observed. Both the beginning and end cannot be seen in any Part of America, but what is in 60 d. or upwards of north latitude. But it may justly be doubted, whether in the places now specified, where the Transit will be visible, there be any persons qualified to observe it.

The foregoing general calculation may be reduced to any other place, by allowing the difference of meridians. But in adapting this calculation to particular places, regard must be had to the parallax of Venus; that is, to the difference of her place on the Sun, when view'd from different parts of the earth. The effect of this parallax will be, that in some parts of the earth the whole Transit will be of a shorter; in others, of a longer continuance, than according to the foregoing calculation. And where only the beginning or end is visible, they will happen sooner in some places, and later in others, on this account. And it is by comparing these differences together, that the Sun's distance will be determin'd. It would be endless to particularize here: Two or three instances of this diversity may serve as a specimen.

In Lat. 32 N. & Long. 21 E. from hence, the time of Venus's leaving the Sun will not be alter'd by parallax; but will be the same as in the foregoing calculation, allowing only for the difference of meridians. To the southward of this, the time of this phasis will be later; to the northward, earlier. So that in Lat. 47 S. it will be 8 m. 26 s. later on this account; but at Louisburg, 2 m. 31 s. sooner. If this emersion could be observed in the setting Sun in 49 N. Lat. and under a meridian 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ h. W. from hence, it would happen 8 m. 39 s. sooner, on account of parallax.

The difference therefore between this observation of the end, and that just mention'd in S. Lat. would be 17 m. 5 s. more than what is due to the difference of their meridians: and this is the greatest difference that can take place. The differences for any assign'd places may be found likewise by computation.

These conclusions are drawn from the supposition that Venus's parallax is precisely of that quantity, which it has of late years been generally supposed to be: Other suppositions of the quantity of this parallax would lead to other conclusions as to these differences of time. And conversly, when it shall be found by the observations now to be made, what these differences of time actually are, we shall from thence collect what the just quantity of this parallax is; by which means, the hitherto immeasurable distances of the heavenly bodies will at length be nicely ascertained.

WILLIAMSBURG, April 10.

This Day the Business of the General Assembly being finished, his Honour the Governor gave his Assent to such Bills as were ready, and then made the following SPEECH:

Gentlemen of the Council, Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Burgesses,

I AM arrived at a Day the most disagreeable to me of any one since I have been intrusted by his Majesty with the Administration of your Affairs: As you have shown yourselves on all Occasions dutiful Subjects, by your Loyalty and Attachment to your Sovereign and his Government, I consider you as my Friends; as Friends, grieve to part with you. I should not justly acquit myself of the Duty I owe to his Majesty, were I to omit thanking you, before I dismiss you, for the Readiness and Alacrity with which you have engaged in the Measures recommended to you to assist his Majesty's Arms, in the Recovery of that Country which the French had usurped; and on my own Part I can with Truth assure you, that the many Marks of Affection and Respect you have shown me, the Confidence you have placed in me, and the strong Proofs you have given me of your Approbation of my Conduct, has made an Impression on my Mind which nothing can efface, as long as it shall please the Almighty to continue to me the Blessings of Life and Memory.

The Constitution of the Council is such as secures to me the meeting you, Gentlemen, who compose it, in the same Capacity the ensuing Assembly: This gives me the greatest Satisfaction, as I have so often experienced your Ability and Zeal to serve his Majesty, and your Integrity and Candour in conducting every Measure to promote his Interest, and the general Good of this Colony. But,

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Burgesses,

My Assurances of meeting you again as Particulars are not so certain as I could wish they were, for I can never expect, or even desire, to meet an Assembly composed of Gentlemen more acceptable to myself; who have happily found the Means of joining your Duty to his Majesty to your Care for the Interest of the Colony, which can never be separated but to the Disadvantage of both. In this Light, I hope your Constituents will see your Conduct; approve the whole Tenour of it; and show their Approbation by the Choice which the Circumstances of the Times will give them an Opportunity to make.

Gentlemen of the Council and of the House of Burgesses,

All that remains for me to do, is to put an End to this Assembly, which I do with great Unwillingness; but it is requisite you should be now dissolved, and you are dissolved accordingly.

CHARLES-TOWN (SOUTH-CAROLINA) March 25.

OUR Advice from Great-Britain to the 28th January, represent Peace as an Event much wished for, but at a great Distance. All Kind of military Preparations are going on with the greatest Vigour. The Fleet for the West-India is said to consist of twelve capital Ships. A Fleet is likewise getting ready for the East-Indies. The Grand Expedition is resumed, and carrying on with fresh Spirit. Mr. Pitt continues the Darling of the King and People. Sweden and Poland, especially the latter, are heartily tired of the War, and it is said with Confidence, they will withdraw before the next Campaign. In the mean time the Motions of the King of Sardinia give Reason to dread the Flames of War will spread to Italy.

On Thursday Captain Colbert, set out for Augusta, with the Chickesaw which came with him hither, and Presents for those that remained at Augusta, and had been with him in his last Excursion. He is to go towards the Cherokees with them, and some of the Lower Chickesaws, immediately, without waiting for the Army coming up.

Letters from Gentlemen at Augusta of the 10th, 14th and 16th Instant, say, "The News from the Upper Creeks is not near so bad as was at first represented. That Nation will scarcely break with us; what Mischief has lately happened, was done by those Villains who had a Hand in the Murders last Year, and was not in the least countenanced by any of the Headmen. Douglas, with his Goods and Horses, are safe, under the Protection of the Gun Merchant. The Wolf King's Return, with the Accounts he carries, will have great Influence in the Creek Nation. His coming down here was very lucky, and Governor Bull's inviting him to Charlestown was well judged, and of great Service."

We hear from Mr. Galphin's Fort at Silver-Bluff, that there never was known so great Plenty of Fish there as at present, which is a providential Relief to the poor People who have taken Shelter there. The Creeks still remain at that Fort, and the People that Way flatter themselves that these Indians will keep off worse Neighbours. One Perry, who was sent down lately from thence with Dispatches to the Governor, found on his Return, his House burnt, and other Mischief done; it is uncertain whether by Indians, or white People, no Indian Tracks could be discovered.

Yesterday his Honour the Governor received Dispatches from Captain Lauchlan M'Intosh, Commandant of Fort Prince-George, Keowee.

Fort Prince-George, March 15. The Day after Mr. Miln and Major Thompson left us, four Prisoners were brought here by the Indians, viz. Stephens's Wife and two Children, and one Trowel, of Captain Demere's Company. The Indians continue to bring in the Prisoners; we have received 20 in all since Mr. Miln's Departure, viz. 12 Women and Children, and 8 Men. To-morrow six more are expected. Some Days ago Attakullakulla, or the Little Carpenter, and his Brother Tisney, the Wolf of Keowee, &c. came to this Fort, and on the 12th Instant Attakullakulla delivered some Prisoners, and a Talk, in the Name of the whole Nation, to Captain M'Intosh: He said, That Willanawaw and M'Nammar are gone to the Virginia Camp, with several white Prisoners, agreeable to what he had told Colonel Byrd. Salloue, the Young Warrior of Effatou, with a Number of his desperate Gang, are gone out against the Settlements, chiefly, it is said, for Provisions, of which they are in great Want. Salloue said he got 100 of the Rangers Horses. Captain M'Intosh gave Attakullakulla several Presents, which he immediately distributed among his Attendants, who are in Number near 500. He is still here, and has sent a Talk to the Governor, with a String of white Beads, in Behalf of the whole Nation. This faithful Cherokee is treated with great Kindness by the Commandant, as his unalterable Attachment to the British Interest merits. He enquired, in the most affectionate Manner, for his old Friend Captain John Stuart, and has desired Captain M'Intosh to acquaint that Gentleman of his good Wishes, and that he will be glad to hear from him or see him.

On Monday the 16th Instant, eight of the Settlers on Bush River, a Branch of Saluda, went from Brookes's Fort to look after their Plantations, and were set upon by a Party of Indians, supposed to be Salloue and his Party, who killed and scalped Cadwallader Eaton, and took Edward Box Prisoner; the remaining six got off, and returned to the Fort. Eaton's Body was shockingly mangled, a Bullet was lodged in his Hip, on which he fell, he was stabbed in five different Places, with a broken Bayonet, and his Head was almost cut off; the Bayonet was found stuck in his Body.

April 1. This Day the Highlanders marched from Town for the Camp.

We hear from Virginia, that several large Parties of the Six Nation and other Indians, have been seen going against the Cherokees; and that both Virginia and North-Carolina are raising Men for the common Cause. We hope soon to hear this confirmed.

BOSTON, April 14.

Extra of a Letter from New-Providence, dated March 17. "On the 14th Instant, Captain Johnson, in the Privateer Schooner New-Experiment, sent in a small Prize Sloop, laden with Dry Goods, Coffee, and Indico. The 15th Captain Kemp, in the Privateer Brig Speedwell, sent in a Brig belonging to New-York, and which was pretended to be a Prize of Captain Koffler's. Yesterday Captain Tucker, in the Privateer Snow General Shirley arrived with a large Ship of eight 9 Pounders, and 28 Men, (pretended to be Danish) laden with Sugar and Coffee, and some Indico. Capt. Tucker has also taken a Snow, but she is not yet arrived, though she sailed some Days before he left the Coast of Hispaniola: It is thought she is either retaken, or gone down to Jamaica. Several Spanish Vessels and their Cargoes, sent in here as Prizes, have been lately acquitted. Our Assembly have lately voted an Addition of 100 l. to the Governor's Salary; and made Provision for an Agent in Great-Britain."

NEW-LONDON, April 10.

The General Assembly of this Colony have ordered Two Thousand Three Hundred Men, including Officers, to be employed in securing his Majesty's Conquests in America; to consist of two Regiments. The Field Officers appointed to command the first Regiment are, Col. Lyman, Lieut. Col. Payton, and Major Durkee; and those to command the second Regiment are, Col. Whiting, Lieut. Col. Smedley, and Major Baldwin.

Those Soldiers who have already been in the Service, are to have a Bounty of Eleven Pounds, and One Pound Fifteen Shillings, to purchase a lappelled Coat. The new Levies to have a Bounty of Seven Pounds, and also One Pound Fifteen Shillings, for a lappelled Coat. Their Wages to be the same as last Year; and they are to have suitable Camp Equipage, and all other Allowances as usual.

NEW-YORK, April 20.

The Ship Sally, Captain Marshall, and the Snow Olive Branch, Captain Fowler, arrived here, Saturday last, from South Carolina. The Ship Prince Tom, of and for Bristol, John Chilcott, Master; and the Snow Molly, of and for Lancaster, William Denison, both from Charles-Town, were taken about the 15th of January, in Latitude 47. 47. Longitude 30. 40. by a French Privateer of 22 nine Pounders, belonging to St. John de Luz, who was afterwards taken herself by his Majesty's Frigate the Aquilon, and made the seventh Privateer taken by that Ship, in less than a Month's Cruise between Scilly and Lisbon. The Aquilon was stationed off Scilly.

The Snow Eglinton, Archibald Robertson, was taken between South-Carolina and Bermuda, on the 12th of March, in Latitude 21. Longitude 66. 43. by a French Letter of Marque Brig, but ranfomed for 200 Guineas. The French put six Englishmen on board, belonging to a new Snow from Newbury for St. Kitts, which he had taken. The Ketch Jenny, Ash, Master, from Lisbon, was taken by the same Brig on the 14th. This Brig is Bermuda built, mounted eight 6 Pounders and 8 Swivels, and had about 40 Men, was from Martinico bound for Marcellles, with a very valuable Cargo of Indico, Cocoa, and Coffee on board, which she was to land at Cadix. Captain Ash made the 5th Vessel she had taken, three of which she burnt, one of them a Schooner.

Captain Valentine's Prize, from Jamaica, is expected in every Hour, the Man of War's Claim having been thrown out of Court. The Privateer continues her Cruise.

The Schooner Delight, Thomas Wallace, Master, from South-Carolina for Philadelphia, run ashore the 8th Instant in the Night, at Little Egg-Harbour; the Vessel and Cargo will be entirely lost, as the Men went ashore, and left her to drive to Pieces: The Captain could not be found, neither will the Men give any Account of him. The Register of the Vessel was in Captain Wallace's Name, tho' the People say one Burns was then Master.

Tuesday last the Brig Royal-American, Captain Fairley, arrived here in thirty Days from Madeira: Some Days before he sailed from thence, two Dutch Men of War having about 50 Sail of Merchantmen under their Convoy, for the West-Indies, put in there, but were soon to proceed on their Voyages.

Thursday last Captain Johnson arrived here in a Brig in 29 Days from Jamaica: Off Crooked-Island he met with a Boat, with five Men in her, who said they belonged to the Privateer Sloop Harlequin, Capt. Omen, of this Port, who was cast away on Ackland's Key, and that they were bound to Providence, to endeavour to obtain a small Sloop, to carry away all that could be saved of the Wreck.

About the 8th of February, the Ship Marquis of Granby, Captain Lisle, of and from Philadelphia to Lisbon, sprung a Leak at Sea; when, within 10 Leagues of Fyall, all the Hands took to their Boat, and left her; and the next Day she was drove close in with St. George's, where she was towed into a good Harbour.

The Brig Lord Howe, Audley Clarke, of Rhode-Island, from New-York to Barbados, that was taken last Fall, is retaken, and carried into St. Kitts.

PHILADELPHIA, April 23.

By Captain Jenkins, from Barbados, there is Advice, that the Barbados has retaken, and carried into that Island, a Guiney Man; and likewise the Privateer that took him. The Legislature of New-Jersey have passed an Act for raising Six Hundred effective Volunteers, Officers included, for his Majesty's Service.

By Captain Bridges from Antigua there is Advice, that Captain Speer, from this Port for Guadaloupe, is taken, and carried into the Grenades; that Captain Long for Antigua, likewise from this Place, is also taken, and sent to Martinico.

ANNAPOLIS, April 30.

Last Week the Negro Fellow who lately kill'd his Mistress, her Child and a Negro Wench, in St. Mary's County, was taken alive; but in apprehending him, he had one of his Arms broke, and was otherwise maim'd. A Commission is gone down for holding a Special Court for his Trial.

We hear from Baltimore, that a Man who was lately condemned there for robbing a Store, has broke out of Joppa Goal, and made his Escape.
