PUBLIC AFFAIRS:

Or, The History of EUROPE, &c.

ACCORDING to Letters from Hanover, they seem to be pretty positive that his Britannic Majesty will go over early next Spring, in order to accelerate by his Presence the Election of the Archduke Joseph to the Dignity of King of the Romans. They likewise say, that a Minister Plenipotentiary will forthwith be nominated, and ample Instructions given him; and that he is to repair first to the Court of Bavaria, and then to the Electors of Cologne and Mentz, in order to make such Propositions as may keep them in the Interest of the Court of Vienna, and prevail on them to favour the said Election. It also appears by these Letters, that they don't yet despair of bringing the King of Prussia into a right Way of thinking. The Minister of the Archbishop of Salzburg, as President of the College of Princes, having lately laid before them the Scheme for a perpetual Capitulation, to the Observation of which the Emperors are to bind themselves by Oath at their Election, there was a Division: Several Ministers were for proceeding upon that Affair without Delay, whilst others tho't it more advisable to put it off till after the Vacation, that in the Interim they might receive more explicit Instructions, to guide them in a Matter of such Importance.

August 31.

The List lately published at Petersburg, of the Russian Fleet, makes it consist of fourscore Men of War and Frigates; exclusive of Gallies and lesser Vessels; but the Orders for equipping and sending a Squadron to Sea this Summer are countermanded, the Disposition made for augmenting the Troops is changed, and the Swedish Minister not only well receiv'd, but highly caressed at Court.—Notwithstanding which, some Disturbances reign at Stockholm, where there are two Parties, one of which, being much the most powerful, is accus'd of spreading false and scandalous Reports, in order to exasperate the Nation against the Russians, not only in respect to the Fire which lately happened there, but also in regard to the injurious Designs of the Russian Court, and that the Moderation which the Russian Ministry affects, is put on with no other View than to lull the Swedes into a Security, and prevent them from taking any vigorous Resolution at the approaching Diet.

Intrigues in Germany increase about the Election of a King of the Romans, which will soon be brought upon the Carpet. Several Princes of the Germanic Body, who are not of Opinion that this Election should take Place in the Manner proposed, are united, under Pretext of maintaining the fundamental Constitutions of the Empire, of preventing any Deviation therefrom, and of adhering to the Tenor of the Treaty of Westphalia.—His Prussian Majesty has appointed the Lord Marshal (Brother of Field-Marshal Keith) his Envoy Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the Court of France, and at the same Time conferred on him the Order of the Black Eagle.

The Empress of Russia has notified to the Ottoman Ministers her Intention of sending an Ambassador thither, to strengthen the good Intelligence and Harmony subsisting between the two Courts.

The Court of Naples has received Letters from the King of Sicily, with an Account, that the earthquake, which happened there last Month, did very considerable Damage at several Places, and particularly at Palermo, where the Damage is computed above 150,000 Livres.—That 800 Workmen are arrived at Massa from Toulon, in order to work at the new

Fort the Duke of Modena is going to make at the Mouth of the River Lavenza.—After the Chevalier Chauvelin and the Marquis de Curzay had communicated to the Deputies of the Corporations of Corsica, the Conditions which the King of France had obtained for them, in order to secure their future Felicity and Tranquillity, they then made the Deputies sensible, that those Conditions could be no otherwise fulfilled, than as they were granted by a Power that had a Right to confer the Privileges they were to enjoy hereafter; that his most Christian Majesty, in Quality of Mediator between them and the Republic, could do nothing more than endeavour to procure those Privileges; that the Republic of Genoa being the only lawful Power Providence had set over them, it was of her they must hold their Advantages; but that the King, to give them fresh Instances of his Kindness and Protection, would take upon him to guarantee all that had been granted them, and look to the Execution thereof. All the Deputies declared that they acquiesced with the profoundest Respect in every Thing his most Christian Majesty required of them, and then signed an Instrument, which they swore by the holy Gospels to observe, and wherein they declare, That they acknowledge the Republic of Genoa for their sole and lawful Sovereign, return to the Obedience they owe her as such, and renounce all contrary Proceedings, of whatever Nature they may be. The Republic being thus reinstated in all her Rights, does, on her Part, grant them the Privileges and Advantages obtained for them by the King of France, which are as favourable as can be desired. The Marquis de Curzay is to remain in the Island with a Body of French Troops, in order to prevent any Infraction of the new Regulation.

Letters from Madrid advise, that through the indefatigable Pains of Mr. Keene, the Negotiation which that Minister was employed in at the Court of Spain, is very near being brought to a happy Issue. The Spanish Ministry is well disposed thereto, and as it is well known that England wants nothing so much as to strengthen the Bands of Friendship which should unite the two Nations, one may reasonably expect soon to see a second Convention, which will put a final End to that Jealousy which has subsisted Time out of Mind between them.

There is much Talk of strengthening the Alliance which has subsisted from the Origin of the Dutch Republic, between it and Great Britain: One of the Steps designed to be taken for that Purpose is, 'tis said, to marry the Princess Caroline, Daughter of the Stadtholder, to the Prince of Wales. 'Tis even assur'd, that this will be a Point of Deliberation of the extraordinary Assembly of the States of Holland, whose Consent and Approbation his Serene Highness will demand; but 'tis believ'd they will not give it, without certain Restrictions, one of which, 'tis pretended, will be, that the Princess and her Consort shall be obliged to renounce, for themselves and their Descendants, all Right and Pretension, either to the Stadtholdership of Holland, or that of the Generality.

September 7.

The Northern Regions are still in a pacific Situation: For most of the Deputies of the Provinces of Sweden, who were elected at the last Diet, have been now rechosen, and it is not doubted but that the Baron Nugern de Stenberg, who was Marshal then, will be so again: Besides, Colonel Panin, Minister from Russia, has delivered Letters to the King and Queen, on the Part of the Empress his Mistress, to congratulate their Majesties upon their Accession to the Throne of Sweden; however, the Maritime and Land Forces of Russia remain upon the same Footing, and will do so, till the Court of Petersburg sees what Turn the Affairs of the approaching Diet of Sweden will take.

L O N D O N.

August 24. It is believ'd that Measures will be speedily taken for repairing the old English Fort at Anamaboa, or for building a new one in the Neighbourhood, without any Loss of Time, as the Preservation of that Post, for securing the English Trade upon the Gold Coast, is a Matter generally understood, and allow'd to be of great Importance.

We hear that Count Fleming, Envoy extraordinary from the King of Poland, Elector of Saxony, has lately had a Conference with his Majesty's Ministers, when the principal Articles of a Treaty, that has been some Time on the Anvil, between this Court and that of Dresden, were settled; that a Subsidy for six Years is agreed upon; and that this Treaty is of the same Nature with that concluded with the Elector of Bavaria. So that 'tis hoped the Affair of the Election of a King of the Romans will be brought to a happy Conclusion, provided Means can be found to keep the Porte from meddling in any Broils that may happen about that or other Matters.

August 29. According to private Letters from Leghorn, the King of the Two Sicilies has absolutely rejected the Proposition made of entering into a Treaty with the States of Barbary; upon a Supposition, that the Infidels are less dangerous as Enemies than as Friends. It is also asserted, that the League which has been so long the Subject of Conversation, will speedily be made public; and that from thence it will appear, the Maritime States of Italy are far from being incapable of protecting their Commerce by a Naval Force.

They write from the Hague, that the Departure of the French Minister, in Consequence of an Express received from his Court, occasion'd a Variety of Conjectures; the rather, because it is reported, that an Express passed lately through Brussels from Stockholm to Versailles with Dispatches of great Importance; and a Report prevails, that Marshal Lowendahl has receiv'd Directions to make a Tour to the Court of Denmark before he returns to Paris.

The King of Denmark being resolv'd to maintain his Right of Sovereignty in Davis's Streights, and let none trade there besides his own Subjects, two foreign Vessels, the one commanded by Nanning Cornelisse, and the other by C. Gansle, which went thither on a trading Errand, have been seiz'd by his Danish Majesty's Guard Ships. The four Danish Ships which sail'd from Copenhagen some Time ago on a secret Expedition, are arriv'd at Saffia, on the Coast of Africa, where they are to establish a Fort and Factory.

It is pretended that the Dissatisfaction of France with the Genoese, does not arise from the pretended Insults of the Officers of her Troops in Corsica, but from the Republic's refusing to yield up that Kingdom upon the proposed Conditions.

August 30. Private Letters by the last Mail from Holland advise, that the French Ambassador at the Hague was suddenly call'd home from thence, without making any public Entry, as was expected; which occasion'd much Speculation.

August 31. Last Monday it was currently reported about Change-Alley, that the new Nabob of Golconda, set up by M. Dupleix, was killed some Weeks after by some Conspirators; whereby all the towering Prospects of the French Governor General are vanished in Smoke. It is said this Account has been brought by the Norfolk Indiaman, and 'tis hoped we may in a Post or two have a Confirmation of it from France: In the mean Time it has a very good Effect, in raising drooping Stock.

September 7. Last Week a great Quantity of Warlike Stores was shipped from the Tower and Woolwich for Nova Scotia.

Last Thursday the Marquis de Mirepoix, Ambassador from his most Christian Majesty, received an Express from his Court with the News, that the Dauphiness was delivered of a Prince Yesterday 7 night in the Morning, and were both in a very fair Way of doing well.

Orders are issued out of the Lord Chamberlain's Office for the Court's going out of Mourning Tomorrow the 8th Inst. for his late Royal Highness the Prince of Wales.

Last Thursday was the Sale of Shetland Pickled Herrings, at the Royal Exchange Coffee-House, Threadneedle Street, when 95 Whole Barrels, 26 Half, 2 Quarters, and 11 Kegs were sold among a Crowd of Buyers. Each Whole Barrel sold, on an Average, at 21. 15s. 6d. Each Half Barrel at 11. 15s. 9d. Each Quarter Barrel at 20s. 6d. and each Keg (of 50 Herrings) at 15s.

We hear that an Answer has been drawn up to the Memo-

rial lately presented here on the Part of France (by which that Crown maintains it's Right of Sovereignty on the Island of St. Lucia) and 'tis said that a Demand will speedily be made of the final Determination of the Court of Versailles on that Head.

B O S T O N.

October 28. A few Days ago, two young Women (Sisters) belonging to Shrewsbury, on their Way to Lancaster, missing the Road (as is supposed) attempting to pass over a small Water above a Mill Dam, were both unfortunately drowned.

Yesterday Capt. Partridge arrived here in about 8 Weeks from London, as did a Ship from Holland with 200 German Settlers.

Extract of a Letter from Stockbridge, dated September 25, 1751.

Some of the Mohawks are come this Day to Stockbridge from their own Country, and bring an Account of their Brethren at home, that they continue in a Disposition and Design to bring their Children hither to be instructed. A Number of the far Nations are just now come to treat with the Five Nations, with a very great Belt of Wampum, which is a Sign of great and important Business: And they say the Army that lately went to extirpate the Nation of the Toowechtooowes, are returned without Success; their Design being discovered by that Nation before they came: And that the Army in their Return stopp'd at a Place a little above Oswego, and had sent to the Chiefs of all the Five Nations to come to 'em; and particularly, That the Governor or General of the Army, had sent very earnestly for Hendrick to come, but that he utterly refused, and declared that none of his Tribe should stir. And, if the Account these Men give be true, the other Nations decline this proposed Interview with the French General, and say, If he has any Business with them, he must come to them. These Men also give an Account, that the Small Pox, and Fever and Flux rage exceedingly at this Day among the Five Nations, through the greater Part of their Countries, and prove very mortal; and that great Multitudes are swept off: That the Small-Pox was brought among them from the Country of the Flat Heads, by some that went thither to War: That the Tribe of the Caunehyennees, or proper Mohawks, had hitherto escaped.....

November 4. On the 25th of last Month, at Noon day, the House of Mr. — Hersey, of Hingham, was intirely consumed by Fire, and all the Furniture, except one Feather-bed, his Stock of Provision and Grain (which was just got in) some Money, and all the Wearing Apparel of himself and Wife, and nine Children, except what they had on their Backs. It was occasion'd by Fire falling out of the Oven among some Husks of Corn that lay upon the Floor, while the People were abroad. 'Tis said Mr. Hersey's Loss is at least 2000 l. old Tenor.

.. And on the 26th a House at Lexington was burnt down in the Day time, and most of the Furniture, &c. consum'd.

P H I L A D E L P H I A, November 14.

Yesterday Capt. Lauderdale arriv'd here from Savannah Le Mar, in Jamaica, and brought the melancholy Account of a violent Hurricane that happen'd in that Island on the eleventh of September last, which lasted 24 Hours, and did a great Deal of Damage to the Shipping, and likewise to the Plantations, by destroying the Plantain Trees, Sugar Canes, &c. There is no particular List of the Ships lost or ashore, only in general, that all the Vessels at Kingston, (the Commodore, and a few others, excepted) were ashore; that one of the Men of War was beat to Pieces; that Capt. Noarth, of this Place, by cutting away his Masts, was one of those that rid it out; that Capt. Whitefield, in a Sloop from Savannah Le Mar for this Port, was lost in Black River, and all the People drown'd; and that a Schooner unknown had shar'd the same Fate.

A N N A P O L I S.

On Saturday last died in Prince George's County, after a short Illness of 20 Hours, Col. EDWARD SPRIGO, who was for more than 22 Years past one of the Representatives for that County in the House of Delegates of this Province; was for several Years the Honorable Speaker of that House; and presided as Chief in the Commission of the Peace for the said County for some Years, and continued in that Station until he died. His Death is much lamented, not only for his firm and

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The Election in Frederick County began on Monday last Week, and continued 'til Wednesday Afternoon, when the following Gentlemen were declared duly elected; viz. Daniel Dulany, junior, Esq; Mr. Nathan Magruder, Capt. Henry Wright Crabb, and Mr. Joseph Chaplain.

Monday last arrived here Capt. Lorain from Bristol, with about 50 Servants, chiefly Convicts. He left Bristol the 9th of October, but says he knows no later News than the Death of the Prince of Wales.

The General Assembly of this Province is to meet here on Friday next.

Yesterday Major NATHAN HAMMOND was sworn into the Office of High Sheriff of this County, in the Room of JOHN GASSAWAY, Esq; whose Term of three Years then expired; of whom, with the strictest Truth and Justice, it may be said, that no Gentleman ever discharged that difficult and important Trust with more Honesty and Circumspection, or ever went out of it with a better Name and Character, and more general Applause, than Mr. GASSAWAY.

We have a certain Account from Talbot County, that some Time ago, one Solomon Sharp seeing a Porpoise in a shallow Creek, got some of his Neighbours to go with him to assist in catching it; who shot at it, but without killing it: At length the Porpoise being pretty much fatigued, did not regard the Canoe they were in, but frequently came very near it; Sharp watching his Opportunity, leap'd upon the Back of the Fish, and was carried by it for a considerable Time, sometimes up to his Neck in Water; 'til at length the Porpoise running himself on Shore, was there kill'd by the Spectators.

Gentlemen of the Upper and Lower Houses of Assembly,
IT is with great Concern I now call you together, on the melancholy Occasion of the Death of our late noble and worthy Proprietor, whose Loss must be truly lamented by every Man who wishes well to the Trade and Prosperity of Great-Britain, and especially of her Colonies, whose Happiness, from the strongest Motives of Inclination and Interest, he had constantly and sincerely at Heart.

But however great our own particular Loss may be by this unhappy Event, on which I sincerely condole with you, it must be no small Satisfaction to us to think, that our present Lord Proprietor is so near being of Age, from whose early good Sense, and other promising Qualities, we have all the Reason in the World to hope for the Enjoyment of those Blessings that naturally flow from a mild and equitable Government, whoever may be intrusted with the Administration of Affairs.

As for my own Part, I can truly say, it has been always my sincere Desire to promote your Welfare in every Respect to the utmost of my Power; nor indeed can the Proprietor be served any other Way so effectually, as his Revenue must of Course increase with the Number and Riches of his Tenants.

But it is unnecessary to enlarge upon this Subject, or to recommend any particular Laws at present to your Consideration, as my only View in meeting you at this unreasonable Time of the Year, is, to give you an Opportunity of aiding such of our late public Proceedings as may have any Deficiency in Point of Law; and when this is done, I presume you will be desirous of returning immediately to your respective Homes.

LONDON, August 28.

A MONG the several Memorials drawn up by the French Court, to prove her Right to the Island of St. Lucia, there is one which speaks to the following Purport:

That in 1624 M. Dijet de Nambuc, after having conquer'd some of the Antilles Islands, also seiz'd upon the Island of St. Lucia, and took Possession of it in due Form, but could not

keep Footing there. That in 1638, some English Adventurers made a Descent there, and were soon after expelled by the Savages. That M. du Parquet, Nephew of M. Dijet de Nambuc, having succeeded to the Rights of his Uncle, took Possession of St. Lucia towards the End of the Year 1640, by Consent of the Native Inhabitants, who acknowledged him in Quality of Governor. In 1664, the English having attacked the Island of St. Lucia with a Body of 1500 Men, obliged M. Board, the then Governor thereof, to deliver up the Fort to them. The next Year the English having been again driven out by the Savages, the French repossessed themselves of the Island, but having neglected to maintain the Colony, the Island became almost common to all Nations, till the Year 1686, when the English came with Force and Arms, and drove out the few French that were settled there, pretending that the Island belonged to them, &c.

It is also said in this Piece, that in 1687, the Dispute about the Property of St. Lucia was treated of at London, but the Revolution, which happened soon after, prevented its being decided. In 1718, his most Christian Majesty granted the Sovereignty and Property of the Island to the Marshal Duke d'Etrees: That the Governor and the Troops which the Marshal sent thither, having been recalled some Time after, the King of Great Britain gave the said Island to the Duke of Montague, in whose Name Possession was taken of it in 1722; and that M. Champigny, then Governor of Martinico, looking upon this as an unwarrantable Procedure, had attacked the English at the Head of 2000 Men, and obliged them to acknowledge St. Lucia for a neutral Island till this Affair should be finally decided, &c.

September 6. By the last Letters from Italy we are informed, that in the Village of Fossato, in the Pope, there were felt, between the 26th and 28th of last Month, upwards of three hundred distinct Shocks of an Earthquake, by which every Thing in that Neighbourhood is destroyed.

Extract of a Letter from Dumfries, September 7.

Upon the 19th ult. the Cornelia Snow, Alexander Durkie, Commander, was upon this Coast spoke with by the Commander of a Cruizer, who demanded to know from whence he came, and where bound, and upon the former's answering from Bergen to Dumfries, the Cruizer told him, he could not make his Port that Tide, but might to Heston (being about three Leagues short) and as he was going there, might follow him in. The Master of the Snow having no Pilot on board, and being unacquainted upon the Coast, he accordingly followed the said Cruizer to the above Port, where, to his great Surprise, he was (even before the Vessel was well moor'd) boarded by the said Commander, and ten other Men well arm'd, who took violent Possession of the Snow, broke up her Under Decks, forced the Captain on Shore, and next Morning carried her off to Sea. We hear he carried the Snow first into Whitehaven, and from thence to Whitehorn, where he still keeps Possession of her by Force of Arms, having deposed the Admiral Officers, who went to put a Warrant in Execution against him.

September 18. We hear that Orders have been dispatched from the Lords of the Admiralty to Commodore Rodney, by a Sloop of War, for his pursuing, with all Diligence, the Discovery of an Island, agreeable to the Plan laid before that Honourable Board.

September 20. It appears by Letters from Corsica, that the Accommodation made by France between the Genoese and Corsicans, is far from being satisfactory to the Corsicans.

PARIS, August 28.

THE Queen and the Diana arrived a few Days ago at Port l'Orient, from the East Indies: M. de la Touche is come over in the Diana, and brings a Confirmation of the Accounts we lately had by the Way of England, concerning the Successes of our Countrymen in India. According to the Relation which M. Dupleix has sent by the Sieur de la Touche, it appears that the Nabob Narasinguen, Usurper of the Kingdom of Golconda, not being disheartened at the Loss of Gingy, and other Repulses he had met with, assembled another powerful Army, in order to try its Fortune once more with the French; which M. Dupleix being informed of, resolved to meet him at least Half-way, and therefore ordered the Sieur de la Touche to march against him from Gingy. The two Armies lay some Time four Leagues distant from one another, with a River between them which was not fordable: Bad Weather and Scarcity of Provisions also kept them inactive. At last the French decamped, and after a long and painful March found a Ford, crossed the River, and came up in Sight of the Enemy. The Sieur de la Touche having made all the necessary Dispositions for an Engagement, gave the Command of the Center to M. Villeon, the Right Wing to M. Bussi, and the left to M. Kerjean; and on the 15th of December last gave the Signal for the Battle, which lasted four Hours, when the Enemy's Troops were broken on every Side, and fled with great Precipitation. While our Men were pursuing them, News was brought to M. de la Touche that Narasinguen had been killed (by two or three of his principal Officers, as some say) and that his Nephew Mouraferinguen, whom he had long kept in Confinement, was proclaimed by the Army King of Golconda in his Room; whereupon the French General ordered the Firing to cease, and immediately after a Herald came to our Camp from the new Nabob or King, to acquaint M. de la Touche with his Change of Condition, and proposed Terms of Friendship and Alliance.

This Victory does so much the more Honour to the French, as the Enemy were vastly superior in Number, being no less than 40,000 Foot, 45,000 Horse, and 700 Elephants, with 360 Pieces of Cannon; whereas our Army consisted of no more than 800 French Foot Soldiers, with 500 Horse, 3500 Cipayes, and only 20 Field Pieces. M. Dupleix's Relation concludes with great Eacommiums on the Conduct and Bravery of the Sieur de la Touche, and the other Officers that shared with him in the Glory of the Victory.

Paris, Sept. 17. On the 13th, about Half an Hour past One in the Morning, after a Labour of ten Minutes, the Dauphiness was delivered of a Prince; with the News of which joyful Event a Person of Quality was dispatched to the Guildhall of Paris, where the Bells were immediately rung, and the People flocking thither, Money was thrown among them; this was accompanied with a general Discharge of the Town, Bastilles, and Invalids Guns: The Ringing continued four Days, without Intermission, and the Firing was regularly repeated three Times on each Day, at Dawn, Noon, and Evening; the Illuminations also were renewed every Night. The Duke de Gesvres, Governor of Paris, came every Day to the Guildhall, and, jointly with the Magistracy, threw Money to the Populace. The Shops were shut during three Days, and there seemed an universal Emulation among all Ranks in declaring their Joy. His Majesty, desirous that this Blessing should be celebrated in a Manner acceptable to Heaven, has signified to the Corporation of Paris, and of all other Cities and Towns, that the Monies designed to have been expended in public Rejoicings, should be distributed into Portions for poor Maidens;

the Answer of the City of Paris was, "Your Majesty's good City of Paris will do both;" and we expect this Answer will be general, the other Places, if not so opulent, being equally devoted to his Majesty.

The Musicians of the Royal Academy of Music gave an Opera gratis on this Occasion; which Example was followed by the French and Italian Theatres.

The foreign Ministers and chief Nobility crowd to Court to congratulate their Majesties.

The Queen being compos'd to Sleep, it was not thought proper to awake her to be present at the Dauphiness's Delivery: The King was at Trianon, from whence he came immediately to Versailles, and at Five that joyful Morning their Majesties, attended by the Dauphin and Mesdames, assisted at Mass.

On Monday Evening a fine Firework was play'd off, but some of the combustible Materials unhappily falling on one of his Majesty's Stables, set them on Fire; and notwithstanding all the Aid and Assistance that could possibly be desired, was at hand, yet the Flames could not be extinguish'd till the Damage was very considerable, several fine Horses, but what was worse, several of the Assistants lost their Lives through this Misfortune.

His Majesty himself accompanied by the Dauphin was present at this Disaster, and encouraged the Firemen and their Assistants to be very diligent and active in their Endeavours, that they suppress the Fire by Yesterday Noon; the ill Consequences that have attended it, have proved very considerable, as well as fatal to some particular Persons.

L O N D O N.

August 20. Some Time ago the following odd Affair happened at Bedlam: Some Patients, to the Number of Ten, who were suffered to walk about the House, being in the Kitchen one Morning when the Doctor was there, complained to him of the badness of their Broth, and told him they were determined not to suffer it any longer, for, as the Cook was out of the Way, they would rectify it themselves; and immediately laid hold of him, and were going to put him into the boiling Copper; which the Doctor happily thought of an Expedient to delay a little: He told them his Cloaths would spoil the Broth, and desired Leave to strip, which they agreed to; and he was accordingly reduced to his Breeches and Shirt, when somebody knocked at the Door which they had fastened; The Doctor called out and told them they could not come in, for he was undressing to go into the Copper. Imagining that something extraordinary was the Occasion of the Door's being fastened, they immediately called out Fire; at which the Madmen were so terrified, that they opened the Door, and ran with great Precipitation Up stairs; by which Means the Doctor escaped: And, on Representation of the Matter, they were all the next Day closely confined.

August 23. We hear from Paris, that they have been pretty much alarmed there by a very uncommon Accident, that has occasioned a great Variety of Speculations: Two dead Bodies were taken out of the River Seine, near St. Claude, the one a Woman in her Shift, the other a Man with nothing more on except his Breeches. The Woman had a Diamond Necklace of great Value, the Man seventy-eight Louisd'ores in his Pocket, they were tied together Breast to Breast, as far as can be discerned, after being in the Water at least near a Week, they were both very young. At first a strict Inquisition was made about this Affair; but, when according to Custom, the Bodies should have been exposed, that they might be the sooner known, an Order came for interring them privately. It is generally believed they were a Couple of Victims offered to the fiend Jealousy.

Sept. 15. His Majesty having received Information, that the Plague had for some Time past raged, and doth still continue to rage with the greatest Violence in Constantinople and in the Parts adjacent; and as it is of the utmost Importance to take the earliest Measures to prevent the Contagion being brought by Goods or Persons coming from any of the Places so infected, into this Kingdom, or the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark and Man; his Majesty out of his great Care and tender Regard for the Preservation of his People, has been pleased to order, that all such Ships as are arrived from the Levant, and not yet unladen, or that shall hereafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom, or the abovesaid Isles, to make their Quarantine for 40 Days, which are to commence and be computed from the Day each Ship shall come to Anchor in the Places appointed for performing such Quarantine, That until and during the Time for making such Quarantine, no Person coming, or Goods imported in any Ship shall come on Shore, or be landed in any Place within this Kingdom, or any of the said Isles. That if at the Expiration of 40 Days Quarantine to be perform'd, it shall appear to the Officers of the Customs, that such Ship, and all and every Person therein have duly performed their Quarantine, and that the Ship and all the Persons on board are free from Infection, that then the respective Persons coming in the said Ship shall be permitted to go on Shore; but the Goods imported in such Ship, together with the Bedding of the Sailors, shall be landed, opened and aired, and so remain a Week, and after may be brought to the Places of their Discharge, other than Hemp and Flax, Paper or Books, Silk raw, thrown or wrought, Feathers, Grogran, or Mohair Yarn, Human Hair, Goats Hair, Carmania Wool, Camblets, Carpets, Burdets, or other Manufactures of Silk and Cotton, Kid Skins, and Skins in the Wool or Hair, Spunges, Wine and Oil in Chests, Thread Stockings, all Goods packed with Straw or Cotton, Straw Hats and Brushes, Matting and Artificial Flowers; which Goods, after Quarantine, are not to be landed till an Account be laid before his Majesty in Council, and Orders given concerning the same. That whatever Ship or Person shall receive any Men or Goods from on board any Ship or Vessel under Quarantine, shall be compelled to perform the like Quarantine. That such Persons as after Quarantine performed shall be employed in the Hold of any Ship, for the taking any Goods not liable to retain Infection, from Hemp and Flax, Paper or Books, or any other of the Species of Goods before enumerated as liable to retain Infection, shall be obliged to perform a new Quarantine of 40 Days. And all Captains of his Majesty's Ships, Commissioners of the Customs, and all other Officers whom it may concern, are directed to use their utmost Diligence and Care that the above Orders be duly performed.

AT PORT MORANT.

Wednesday, the 11th of September, at One o'Clock this Morning, it began to blow at N. N. W. and at 9 o'Clock it blew a Hurricane Wind, veering from the N. N. W. to E. S. E. at 12 o'Clock more moderate.

Put ashore in this Harbour, the Commodore's Schooner, a Spanish Schooner laden with Sugar, drove to Pieces, the Men saved. A Pilot Boat put ashore in a Case-Piece at Morant-Bay; all the Stores and Wharfs carried away, and several Hogheads of Sugar, and Puncheons of Rum lost.

Several Sloops lost to Windward of this Harbour, the Crew lost. All the Sugar Canes lodged, and for the most Part, the Houses are blown down, or the Shingles stripped, and all the Negro Huts blown down. One White Man and several Negroes kill'd by the Falling of the Houses, the Trees in Woods, and all the Plain Trees are entirely blown down.

Most of the Wharfs in Kingston, are blown away, or greatly damaged; as likewise those to Windward and Leeward are gone, with several Houses; most of the Canes in the Canes-Pieces are either lodged or washed away, many Works are destroyed, and several Negroes, Cattle, &c. kill'd.

There are Numbers of the Crews of most of the Vessels lost, the Particulars of which shall be published, as soon as they can by Care and with Authority be ascertained.

A Ship called the Roman Emperor, was turning up from Lucea to St. Anne's, the Day of the Storm, and apprehended to be lost, not having been heard of for some Time after; till a Bird was taken up ashore, with a Label tied to its Nostrils, written on, *Ship Roman Emperor, safe off the West End, the 21st September, 1751.* And on the Return of the Vessel, the People confirmed the Account of their doing it to several of the Kind which they had caught in their Passage.

The Sloop Gazette, Capt. Carille, from New-York, was in Sight of the Island when the Hurricane began; and was obliged to cut away her Mast, also lost chief Part of what she had upon Deck, and after driving near the Shore, and letting go her Anchors, lost her Bow-sprit; but happily sav'd the People, Vessel, and Cargo:—The Day before, Capt. Carille spoke with a small Schooner (supposed, Capt. Dutty) from South Carolina, bound to Jamaica, which 'tis feared is lost, and every Person perish'd, as no News could be learnt of her after the Storm.

ANNAPOLIS.

On Wednesday last, the Honourable House of Assembly, then sitting, discharged from any further Attendance on that House, two of the Gentlemen return'd from Kent County, viz. Mr. William Rasin, he having serv'd as an Inspector within two Years of his Election; and Mr. Abraham Falconer, he being an Ordinary keeper, (each being a Disqualification to sit as a Member). And a new Writ is issued for the Election of two Members in their Stead.

On Thursday, the Election in Baltimore County was set aside, on Account of some Mistake of the Sheriff, and a new Writ is issued for the choice of four Members, in the Room of Messieurs Goane, Franklin, Buchanan, and Ridgely.

On Saturday last his Excellency our Governor put an End to the Session of Assembly, and prorogued them to the first Tuesday in April next; after passing and signing,

An Act for the Dividing of certain Warehouses in Talbot County, therein nam'd: And,

An Act for the Continuation of Aliens, and securing the Peace and good Government of this Province.

Monday Morning last, a very valuable Country-born Negro Man, belonging to Mr. James Macculbin, was found frozen and dead on the Road beyond Saulb River: and is supposed to have fallen down (being in drink) and perish'd.

This Day a Special Court is to be held, at Joppa in Baltimore County, for the Trial of John Berry, Martha Catcham, and others, for the horrid Murder of Sarah Clark, and attempted Murder on her Husband John Clark, as they were asleep in their Beds, on the 20th of November last, formerly mentioned.

PARIS, September 8.

OUR last Advices from America assure, that all our Colonies are in a very good Condition; that Trade flourishes there; that they have Plenty of all Kinds of Provisions; and that during this last Summer a great Number of Volunteers arrived from France, some to settle there, and others to serve in a Military Capacity.

Hague, Sept. 11. Besides the Decree lately issued by the King of Portugal, revoking that of the 8th of April, 1739, by which Spices, and other East India Products were forbid to be imported by foreign Vessels into his Dominions; his Most Faithful Majesty is disposed to make some other Regulations, which will prove very favourable to the Commerce of the Dutch.

Paris, Sept. 14. Lord Marshall is arrived from Berlin. The Cavalry in Alsace are very near completely mounted; an Order is expected for augmenting the Infantry from twelve to fifteen Companies in every Battalion.

Amsterdam, Sept. 12. Some private Letters received here intimate, that there is Reason to believe that King Theodore of Corsica, will again be brought upon the Scene, partly to prevent the French from making the Advantages they propose, in mediating and accommodating Matters between the Genoese and Corsicans; and partly to punish the Genoese for their Conduct in the late War, having, without any substantial Reason, taken Party with the House of Bourbon, and thereby caused the War to continue much longer in Italy than it would otherwise have done, and put the Allies of the House of Austria to extraordinary Expences, which they would have no Occasion to have been at if these Republicans had better consulted their own Interest, and had adhered to the Neutrality which they at first embraced. Moreover, it cannot be imagined that the Powers, who with well to the Court of Vienna, could see, with Pleasure, the Genoese, wearied out by the Chicanery and Turbulence of the Corsicans, dispose of that Island to any Prince of the House of Bourbon; neither would it please the King of Sardinia to have this Island, so near to his Kingdom of Sardinia, in the Possession of a Prince who was dependent upon either Spain or France, or on both.

Hague, Sept. 12. The ill Consequences are very much apprehended which the Misunderstanding between the English and the French may be of, in Relation to the Affairs of the East Indies, where Mr. Dupleix being become powerful, may possibly push the Interest of the French India Company so far as to embroil the two Nations; for an Infringement of Commerce is, to the English, a String that must not be touched upon, especially since by the Peace of Aix la Chapelle, nothing ought to be undertaken, either in Europe or the Indies, by one of the Parties, against the Interest of the other; and it is well known that good Fortune frequently renders People so insolent, that they imagine when that blind Goddess smiles upon them, they may do any Thing with Impunity.

Turin, Sept. 2. The last Letters from Savoy advise, that the Flame issues with so much Violence out of the Cavities which have been made within this Month at the Top of the Mountain de Plainejeu, in the Province of Faucigny, that the Towns of Paffi and Cervos, which are situated at the Foot of it, have already receiv'd great Damage, insomuch that the Inhabitants of those Places have abandoned them, and taken away with them all their Effects.

Genoa, Sept. 4. According to the last Advices from Corsica, the Inhabitants of Niolo, one of the Communities beyond the Mountains, seem to make a Difficulty of submitting to the Regulation proposed by the Chevalier de Chauvelin, and ac-

cepted of by the rest of the Communities, so that it is thought M. Cursay will be obliged to send Troops to bring them to Reason.

Cádiz, August 24. Orders have been sent to Commodore Stuart, who is cruising near Gibraltar, against the Algerines, not to lose Sight of the Coast, that he may be the more at Hand to protect some Register Ships from the West-Indies, which are daily expected.

Amsterdam, Sept. 24. We are surprized, tho' there is so happy a Prospect of Tranquillity being established in the North, that no Dispositions are making for a Reform of Troops, either by the Court of Russia, or those of Sweden, Prussia, or Vienna; and that the Turks remain still upon the Frontiers. This, we imagine, confirms the Notion of these Powers being desirous, before reducing their Forces, of seeing the Success of the Diet of the States of the Kingdom of Sweden.

Genoa, Sept. 15. The last Advices which the Government received from Corsica, were not near so favourable as we had Reason to hope they would be; some of the Communities, and among them that of Niolo, having refused to subscribe the new Regulation, under Pretence, that instead of securing to them the Enjoyment of the Privileges they have been so long soliciting, it subjected them, as much as ever, to the Authority of the Republic, and the arbitrary Jurisdiction of its Officers. The Inhabitants of this Community have even carried their Discontent so far, as to take up Arms again, and have openly declared themselves against the Measures of the Republic; upon which the Marquis de Grimaldi has sent a Body of Genoese Militia against them, with whom they have already had some Skirmishes.

Berlin, Sept. 21. They write from Paris, that Lord Marshall, the King's Minister Plenipotentiary at the Court of France, had his first Audience of his Majesty, and of all the Royal Family, the 14th Instant, and met with a most gracious Reception.

Constantinople, August 28. The Janizaries have lately mutiny'd, and demanded the Head of the Grand Vizir, who is allowed to be one of the greatest Statesmen this Empire ever produced; but some of their Chiefs being in his Interest, and putting themselves at the Head of the Malecontents, in order to serve him, those who were the Authors of this Mutiny, were seized the following Night, and have not since been heard of.

Cádiz, August 30. Some private Letters from Paris intimate, that the Affairs of the Clergy seem to be afresh embroiled; but one of them says, that they may possibly adhere too tenaciously to their pretended Rights, and at length tire out the Moderation of the King, and determine his Majesty to have less Regard for that formidable Body than he has hitherto had.

Ferrara, Sept. 14. Some Misunderstandings having arisen lately between the Inhabitants of some Villages upon the Borders of the Modenois, and those of the State of Bologna, the latter carried Things so far as to pursue and attack their Adversaries upon the Territories of Modena, which the Duke being informed of, has demanded Satisfaction for such Behaviour, and in the mean Time has sent a Body of Troops into the Bolognese, where they live at Discretion.

Versailles, Sept. 23. Some fresh Instructions have been sent to the Duke de Mirepoix, relating to the Misunderstanding between this Court and that of London, about the Island of St. Lucia. The King persists in his Resolution of maintaining his Right to that Island, founded upon the Conquest which his Subjects made of it in 1624.

Lisbon, August 24. The French Squadron, which was upon our Coast some Days, has disappeared: It is reported, that it is gone.

gone to the East Indies; and this Report is founded upon their having taken in a great Addition of Provisions, and their being rejoined by the Frigates, which they detach'd to Cadiz to take up 150000 Pistres for the French East India Company.

L O N D O N.

August 27. Saturday last, during the Time of Service at the Portuguese Ambassador's Chapel, a Gentleman, elegantly dressed, came in, who happened not to be of the Roman Catholic Persuasion, and neglected to kneel at the Time of the Oblation; this Circumstance so enraged a Woman that knelt behind him, that she arose in a terrible Passion, and demonstrated her Zeal by knocking him down with the Chair on which she had been sitting, which rose to great a Commotion in the Chapel, that his Excellency thought proper to retire.— This Instance of Bigotry, though not a very important one, may serve however, to shew what would be the Consequences, were a Faith established amongst us that encourages its Votaries in ignorant Persecution and lawless Tyranny.

August 31. The following Instance of a remarkable Check given to the Insolence of two young Bloods of the Army deserves to be made public: About a Fortnight ago, as a worthy Alderman of this City was crossing Tower-hill, in the Evening, with a Servant lighting him along with a Glass Lanthorn, he was suddenly interrupted by the coming up of a young Officer, who, sans Ceremonie, kicked the Lanthorn to Pieces: Hereupon the Alderman seized this gallant Assailant by the Collar, and demanded his Reasons for so preposterous a Procedure. Mean Time up comes another Son of Mars, who boldly clapped his Hand to his Sword, in order to intimidate the affronted Magistrate, and release his Companion. The Gentleman, however, far from being terrified at the Odds of two to one, observed to the second Champion, "That his Behaviour was still more gross and scandalous than that of the first Aggressor; and that he deserved to be severely handled for having the Impudence and Meanness to draw upon an unarmed Person." At the same Time, like a Man of Spirit, he laid Hands on the other Offender, held him likewise fast, and then called out to the Tower Guard for Assistance. On this, one or more of the Centinels on Duty approached, but retreated on perceiving that the Gentlemen whom they were charged to take into Custody belonged to their own Corps. Hereupon the Alderman, still resolute, and determined to do himself Justice, told the young Heroes, that though he saw it was in vain to expect Assistance from that Quarter, yet he was resolved not to quit them, 'til he had obtained Satisfaction; and withal gave them to understand who and what he was whom they had so lightly made choice of to exercise their gallant Exploits upon. Our military Gentlemen finding what Hands they were got into, and that their Retreat was absolutely cut off, at length consented to attend the Victor before their commanding Officer in the Tower; who, upon hearing the Complaint, agreed with the Plaintiff, that the Outrage he had received was indeed too gross to be connived at; and that the Offenders were certainly liable to very severe Punishment. However, as they appeared sorry for what they had done, it was moved, that they should be pardoned on Submission; but this was resolutely and with great Reason denied by the Party injured, who insisted on the Delinquents being put under Arrest, and continue so 'til they should bear further from him. The next Day the Alderman went into the Country, whither he was soon followed by some Persons of Fashion, Friends to the two Prisoners, who warmly solicited their Pardon, but to no Purpose, the Complainant appearing determined to make an Example of them, in Justice both to himself and the Public. A Letter was then produced from their Colonel, who likewise interceded for them, and undertook to be answerable for their future Conduct; adding, that if the Affair was not privately adjusted, but should come to the Ear, they would both be certainly broke. Tho' this was no more than such a Conduct justly deserved, yet, as the worthy Alderman did not desire the utter Ruin of the Offenders, he very genteelly, at length, acquiesced to the repeated Solicitations of so many Persons of Rank and Character, and agreed to forgive the Affront he had receiv'd, upon Condition that the two Heroes should humbly ask his Pardon; and, by Way of Satisfaction, that each of them should pay Twenty Guineas for the Use of the Lying-in Infirmary. These Conditions were gladly accepted; and we hear that the Forty Guineas have accordingly been remitted to the said Hospital.

Sept. 9. Some private Letters from Hamburg by the last Holland Mail, assure us, that the Duke of Saxe Gotha has

concluded a Treaty of Subsidy with the King of Great Britain, by which his Serene Highness engages to furnish his Britannic Majesty with a Body of 7000 Men.

Sept. 14. Some Days ago, a Linnen Draper in the City of London, received a Parcel inclosed in such a Number of Papers, that his Patience in unfolding them was near exhausted, that he began to conclude it some Trick put upon him, but determining to see the End of it, he at last found six Guineas, without any Particulars being specified on Account, or in what Manner they were to be applied, and all his Recollection could not furnish him, with the least Hint concerning it: But within two Days after, he received a Letter by the Penny post, acquainting him, that the Persons who had sent them, had some Time before been at his Shop, and looking over some Goods, the most urgent Necessity had prompted them to make free with a Piece of Cambric, which they conveyed off without giving the least Room for Suspicion: The Letter was very expressive of a strong Sensibility of the Fraud they had committed, and assured him, that as their Circumstances were mended since that Time, the six Guineas were more than an ample Re-compence for the Debt they had so unjustifiably contracted.

In a private Letter from Edinburgh we have the following remarkable Story which happened there: An old Woman who was reputed a Miser, being very anxious to know how her Effects would be disposed of after her Death, provided she should make no Will, fell upon the Scheme of counterfeiting Death. She communicated the Secret to her Maid, who readily embraced it, and gave it out that she was dead; the Apparatus being finished, a great many Relations assembled, who waited impatiently for her Death, and began to talk very freely about her Affairs, one claiming one Thing, and another, another; 'til at last her Patience being quite exhausted, she could no longer contain her Rage at hearing her Effects disposed of contrary to her Inclination, and rose up immediately, telling them, that she should prevent their Designs by making a Will, which produced so terrible a Consternation in the Company, that some scream'd out, and others fainted away.

A Scheme is said to be drawing up, which is to be presented to Parliament next Session, for paying off the Debts of the Navy by a Lottery, to consist of 100,000 Tickets at 10 l. each.

By the Success, Capt. Gattrell, arrived at Portsmouth, we have certain Advice that the French Fleet were off the Rock of Lisbon when the above Ship came away; and their Destination is yet a Secret.

Advices are received in Holland, that there have died at Constantinople, by the terrible Contagion, near 70,000 Persons in a very short Time, upon which the States General have likewise issued out Orders for all their Ships arriving from thence, to perform the long Quarantine.

We hear that the Marquis de Mirepoix had some Days ago, a Conference with the Earl of Holderness, and complained that the English assumed a Right to visit such French Ships as fall in their Way: Upon which, 'tis said, the Earl assured his Excellency, Care should be taken to verify the Subject of his Complaint, in order to apply a proper Remedy.

The foreign Gazettes are so kind as to let us into an important Secret, viz. That our Court is informed, by the Dispatches of a Courier lately arrived from Madrid, that there is Nothing more meant by the Armaments making in Spain, than just to put the Marine on the old Footing, his Catholic Majesty being resolved to use his utmost Endeavours to maintain a General Peace. And this, we presume, may be depended on, as our Ministers there is keen enough to worm the Secret out of the Spanish Ministry, if any Thing else was designed by their Armaments. They also tell us, that the said Courier brought a List of the Spanish Navy, whereby it appears, that the Number of Men of War which that Crown keeps up, both in Europe and the Indies, does not amount to above 45, including some Ships actually on the Stocks.

Sept. 28. Letters by the Mail Yesterday from Leghorn, shew that two Neapolitan Barks, had, after an Engagement which lasted three Hours, taken three Corsairs from Tripoli.

Private Letters from Hamburg, are filled with most melancholy Accounts of the Damages sustained by Land and Sea through the late Storm, by which several of the Villages, and many of the fine Gardens in the Neighbourhood of that famous City, are ruined, and the Town of Cluckstad had certainly been swept away, if the Dyke in its Neighbourhood had not failed, by which a Passage was opened for the Water that fell upon the flat Country behind it.

The King of France has sent Instructions to his Ministers at foreign Courts, to declare, that the Alteration which has happened in the French Ministry, by the voluntary Resignation of the Marquis de Puyfieux, and the Nomination of M. de St. Contest as Secretary of State for foreign Affairs, shall make none in the general System of his Court; and that his Most Christian Majesty would always be equally attentive to the Means of strengthening the Peace which at present happily subsists in Europe. The same Declaration has been made to the foreign Ministers residing at the French Court.

WILLIAMSBURG.

October 31. A Letter from the Governor of South-Carolina advises, that the Cherokees, who were lately in Williamsburg, under the Character and Denomination of Ambassadors and Nobles, are People of no eminent Quality or Dignity, but obscure Persons; that they had committed many Cruelties, and Injuries, to the Inhabitants of that Province, and were to have been delivered up by their Countrymen to be punished; that it is false that they ever made Application to the Governor of Carolina, or had not been furnished with Goods, they having been abundantly supplied with every Thing by that Province for near forty Years: This Intelligence is therefore inserted in the Gazette, that the Inhabitants of this Colony may be cautious in their Commerce with them.

ANNAPOLIS.

Wednesday last a Special Court of Oyer and Terminer and General Goal Delivery, was held at Joppa in Baltimore County, for the Trial of the Persons concerned in the Murder of Mrs. Clark, on the 20th of November past; when Four were condemned, and one, a Boy, acquitted; Martha Bassett (otherwise Catbam) pleaded Guilty; John Berry and Mary Powell, appeared on Trial, to be harden'd resolute Offenders, and pleaded Not Guilty, but the Jury found them Guilty; Edward Evans, appeared very Penitent, and said he should never have been concerned in so horrid a Crime, if it had not been for the Threats and Menaces of Berry who was then his Overseer. They all received Sentence of Death, and we hear are soon to be executed.

Elizabeth Jenkins, charged with the Murder of her Bastard Child, was acquitted.

Stephen Rose, and Samuel Mitchellson, tried for stealing sundry Goods, were both found Guilty, and Burnt in the Hand: The same Persons tried a second Time for Prison-breaking, were found Guilty, and a second Time Burnt in the Hand.

There were sundry other Persons to be Tried, but as the Evidences against them did not appear, they were remanded back.
