Dean Stewart Shows Concern For Student's Personel Problems

Dean Stewart, in an interview on August 19, said that distributing contraceptives through the Health Center would force a student to make a moral decision. Speaking for the administration, Dean Stewart stated that the decision should be a personal one, free from any outside influences such as peer pressure. This underlying influence, she continued, was the one major problem in allowing the distribution in this fashion.

In asking about the avenues she has for helping a pregnant girl, Dean Stewart said that in most cases the girl just thinks that she is pregnant. "This office is concerned over the physical welfare of the girl and counsels, points out options and suggests possible roads to take for further help," she related.

This reporter continued the interview by asking whether she thought that the A.C.R. system was fair. "She replied that, it is as fair as any mathematical system can be." Most problems relate to freshmen which she attributed to the 12 years of strict schooling. Now that they are on their own, peer pressure, parental attitudes and their own ideas act as guidelines, with peer pressure being the strongest.

Dorm to Open Fall '72'

Mr. M.P.Minton announced that the new dorm will open for occupancy in the fall of 1972. A decision has not yet been reached on whether the dorm will be co-ed, Minton also stated.

The dorm will have air conditioning, carpeting, vinyl walls, t.v. and lounge on each floor as well as elevators and kitchens. Minton remained non-committal on the co-ed issue stating that "discussions with students will have to be conducted before a final decision is made." Minton commented that the Board of Trustees requires that the dorm must be named after a river on the Eastern Shore.

Job Market Grows Tight

Richard N. Yobst, Dean of Men, recommends that students begin thinking seriously about their vocational aspirations if they have not already done so. Technology, large numbers of college and higher education graduates, and current economics have created an extremely tight yet fluctuating job market.

have created an extremely tight yet fluctuating job market.

There is a definite need for people with specific skills and more technical knowledge. Specialists are important in many fields, but the duration of time over which many specialists remain useful seems to be decreasing. Specialized individuals are finding it necessary to constantly update their training and in many cases must make major occupational adjustments. The individual who plans to develop specialized competencies must plan, train, and choose in anticipation of future vocational opportunities.

It is important that students realize a college "degree" does not guarantee a job upon graduation. Students must be flexible enough to adjust to the demands of the changing job market. Students interested in seeking information concerning vocational goals are encouraged to utilize the services of the Student Placement Office located in Room 107 of Holloway Hall.

South Vietnam

There is a Presidential election scheduled for October 3 in South Vietnam. The candidates running are. . . the present President Ngyen Van Theiu. . . the only candidate. Formerly there were two other candidates in the race for the presidential seat; the Vice President Nhuyen Ky and General Duong Minh. V.P. Ky was disqualified from the ballot by the Supreme Court because he lacked "sufficient official endorsements." General Minh resigned from the race charging President Thieu with trying to rig the voting and states he will find other means to fight for South Vietnam than in an unfair and dishonest election. Pres. Thieu has stated he will continue to run for re-election for President as the only candidate on the ballot.

Ireland

Riots are still prevailing in this country over religious issues and a proposed new administration for Northern Ireland acceptable to its Catholic minority. The recent outbreak resulted when a deaf mute was fatally shot by British soldiers. Paris Peace Talks

Advancement of negotiations in the earliest part of the month has been stalled temporarily. North Vietnam suggests that the U.S. dollar crisis would be lightened if all troops were removed from Vietnam.

East Pakistan

U.S. was charged with sending military advisors during recent turmoils with West Pakistan. The W. Pakistan government voided most of the E. Pakistan's provincial assembly elections and started a military crackdown in that province.

Middle East

Egypt, Syria, and Libya signed a federation pact to become the Federation of Arab Republics. The federation met in secret in Damascus with the Palestine guerrilla leader, Yasser Arafat in order to try to settle their differences with King Hussein of Jordan. King Hussein stated that the Federation is too disorganized and weak to take on Israel in another war.




LATE NEWS

Washington - George Meany and other labor leaders plan a court battle to challenge President Nixon's new economic


London - The dollar continues to lose ground on the European Money Market.

U.S. ATTEMPTS TO STUFF BALLOT BOX

One cannot help but watch with amusement at the attempts of the South Viet Namese to hold elections and one must wonder at the futile escapades of Ambassador Bunker to make

The United States should realize that the democratic process as we know it cannot work for all people. Nixon's efforts to force the "American Way" upon the people of Viet Nam has brought more inner political conflict and turmoil within Saigon than Washington would care to admit. Threats of coups and counter coups have been publically voiced. The presidential palace remains surrounded with troops to protect it from coups and not the Viet Cong. The election has resulted in a one man race largely due to American efforts. Ambassador Bunker has done more to discredit the free election cause than the communists. He has caused sufficient suspicion which has resulted in the refusal of two men to run for office leaving a one candidate race. The only benefit derived from free election is another feather in Nixon's campaign hat.

South Viet Nam's only presidential candidate.

WHAT'S SO GOOD **BOUT OCEAN CITY?**

Baltimoreans thoughts turn to Ocean City, Maryland; the crowded beaches, the cold dirty water, the over-priced, discriminating hotels and motels, the no-place-to--park-a-car problem, the endless parades of young people and the humorous hours spent waiting in an over-heated car to pass over the Bay Bridge.

For some crazy reason, still to be explained by sociologists, every Memorial Day, rain or Baltimoreans fall into an alien trance and automatically head for Ocean City.

By car, by bus, by thumb and even by plane, the influx begins in the early morning, late in May. The mesmerized subjects, mostly young people, make their waydown Route 50. These habitual vacationers bring with them money, drugs, noise and

crime; which helps to offset the off-season Ocean City norm of no business, quiet and less frequent, less serious

Now that last sentence is a bit misleading. Even the increased crime during the 'in-season' doesn't approach any real crime problem as in an urban metropolis. It's completely relative of course. In Ocean City, the crime problem is serious when the jail saturates with young vagrants, or too many parties get too large at the same

The Ocean City Police Department maintains a complaint log, which is a listing of all complaints reported to the police. This log reflects a definite pattern of increased crime as the year progresses toward summer.

In the winter and spring, the record shows property

related complaints such as: lost dog, a door left open, fires, accidents; acts which surveillance .more require than enforcement. But, ah ha. . .when May pokes its hot little head into the scene, the evil people-related complaints pour in: liberated bicycles, strange people sleeping in cars on lawns, on the beach and under the boardwalk. Reports of noisy parties, fights, people with candles walking on the roof; these complaints lead to arrests of mostly young people for vagrancy, drug abuse, disorderly conduct, petty larceny and other anti-social acts.

And while the OCPD is patroling and arresting, the hotel and motel business is not only ripping off every human being at the resort, but they are discriminating against young people and less affluent citizens. . . and they get away with it.

The name of the arbitrary policy is '2-night minimum; all your money maximum' (3-night minimum on holiday week-ends). How does it

A young student has a week-end to spend at the ocean. So the happy, anxious victim gathers his meager' savings together, takes a bus or some cheaper means to get


to Ocean City.

Many times, the few \$3, \$4 and \$5 rooms are taken, so the youth looks to other motels and hotels for his Saturday night sleep. He finds that rooms range anywhere from \$15 a night on up. But, he also discovers that it is close to impossible to get a room for only Saturday night. The desk-man or woman says, "We only rent for 2 nights on the week-end, sorry.

ass! When Sorry my they're hunting for customers during the week, or on a cold week-end, they become flexible, "A room for the flexible, "A room for the night sir? Yes sir, number 107

sir, yes sir."

Many young week-end vacationers just can't afford



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at the RADIO SHACK in the salisbury mall (in money and time) to be soaked for a room, especially for 2 nights.

Not all establishments adhere to this "screw the customer" tactic, but so many do exercise it, whether to consciously discriminate against long hair, blue jeans, colored skin, or just to try and force a desperate bed-seeker into an over-extended stay.

All one has to do is travel down the main street in Ocean City and inquire about vacancies; the policy stands at most of those places.

It is simply a matter of "raking in the money is more important than serving the people, especially those young, under \$20,000 a year people...echh."

Aside from the obvious criminal nature of the hotel-motel policies, Ocean City does offer a socially acceptable time.

Most young people from the suburban dwellings in Maryland, Virginia, Delaware and D.C. admit to having social reasons for invading the Eastern Shore. The young folks have free summer time, time for sexual conquerings, which is foremost in most minds. The males admit to "trying to pick up some ass" and the girls, a bit more diplomatic, "hope to meet someone."

Mornings and afternoons bring the sun bathers and even the ocean bathers. Blankets, sleeping bags and bodies dress the stretching beach.

Guys with squinting eyes, survey the stock of female meat, and the girls offer every chance of knowing what your're getting.

Conversations start, usually lead to meetings for impromptu parties, and of course whatever type of relationship develops from that is up to the parties involved; Ocean City has done its part in getting them together.

Another traditional beach personality is the Jock. The muscled balltossers. They come from winter football fields to exhibit themselves to the drooling mortals who fall victim to endless sprinklings of sand and batterings of loose footballs. No one

complains mind you, they just toss the balls back to the grunting Jocks and whisper under their breath, "Asshole."

In the evening, the sun checks out and the ocean spray checks in. The boardwalk parade begins; thousands of walking bodies. . .up and down the boardwalk. .up and down. . .many still cruising for the evasive partner of the opposite sex.

At Ninth Street, the boardwalk clogs up, somewhat like a diseased artery. The people-flow either gets trapped in the clot, or several minutes after reaching one side of the area, the flow squeezes out the other side.

The young people of the world gather at Ninth Street; singing, rapping, eating, negotiating and crashing. Its an outdoor party, with music supplied by the open doors of The Beach Club.

The area is suspiciously lacking in any forceful show of uniformed police surveillence. The word is out that it is a risky area to deal any illegal entities.

A bunker-style bathhouse

sits in the beach at Ninth Street. People sitting on top of it perching beside it. . . all checking each other out.

A hip status permeates the entire Ocean City social scene. It is "IN" to be seen in Ocean City. Though most young people have long hair and faded jeans, most are not as earthly or as humanitarian the Hippie image represents. Many of the young Ocean City visitors are into the status. They're into the earth-life as a fashion, not as a style. They are pretty callous when it comes to helping their brothers, and their main concern is the sex organ and the groovy image. That's the way it has always been with so many of the Ocean City visitors, only the fashions have changed, but the perverted personalities still have a way of sneaking through.

The resident/business community of Ocean City has a knack for minding other people's business. They love to complain about the influx of summer youth; about their noise, their looks, their crazy

resident/business community never complains about the money.

Complaints come into the Police Department about kids sleeping in various "private" places, even though the kids aren't bothering anyone, the citizens feel a civic urge to report the sleeping youth as a menace to society.

Many of the complaints appear to be simply the complainer interfering in another person's life, even though the complainer is not involved in the complaint. Just protecting society.

And, when the Fall falls, exaggerated stories echo through dorms and classrooms about the insane time to be had in Ocean City. . .insane.

When he tells her that she is pregnant, asks about her plans for prenatal care and delivery, she'll remember you then.

Or searches frantically for someone who will do an abortion, legal or illegal. . .

Or faces the disbelief and anger of her parents. .

Or lives from day to day with the sick heaviness of an unwanted, unplanned pregnancy--she'll remember you.

She'll remember all the things you said, all the things you talked about, but that you didn't talk about contraception.

She'll remember your long conversations about love, honesty, the new morality, personal freedom. She'll remember that you, or she, talked about marriage, but that you're not ready yet (not now, and for God's sake, not to her.) She may remember that you coaxed, or argued, or threatened.

Any honest, responsible relationship that includes sex also includes contraception, and this means that both of you go to a physician or clinic for medically supervised assistance. If she's too embarrassed, too shy, too insecure to get contraceptive help, you have only one honest choice. You wait or you get another girl. If you're the one who's too embarrassed (you don't really know her well enough to discuss it?) why don't you just wait a few years until you grow up.

But don't talk to her about love, honesty, or personal freedom. Without a decision on

contraception, that kind of talk is a coward's lie.

When she's signing the relinquishment papers for her baby (your baby), or while she's waiting for her abortion to be approved, she'll remember that lie.



and upon the continuity of both.


To destroy them is to destroy myself.
