ALGIER S, *June 16.*

SOME Weeks ago, the Aga, who is the Chief General of the Regency, marched with a great Body of Troops against the Moors, who inhabit the Mountains, to oblige them to pay their annual Tribute; which as they refused, he was obliged to make War against them. In the end he met with great Success, but the Moors afterwards considerably reinforced, routed the Aga, and made a great Number of them Prisoners. The Regency being informed by Letters from the Aga, that this Defeat was owing to the want of the Aga, the Dey gave orders that he be strangled. As soon as the Order was shewn, he put himself in a Posture of Defence, and tried to make his Escape; but Eight Men, who were prepared for that Purpose, massacred him with Swords. Upon taking an Inventory of his Effects, were found in his House 19,000 Sequins, 66 Diamonds, and a great Number of Gold Watches, which were confiscated.

Stockholm, July 10. It has hardly ceased raining Six Weeks, during which Time the Wind has been cold, and we have had some Hail. It is to be feared that this Weather, so unusual at this Season, will be a Mischief to the Fruits of the Earth, which is to be lamented, as all the Necessaries of Life are thereby rendered dear.

Warsaw, July 18. It is said that several Prelates of the Kingdom are preparing an Act of Accession to the General Confederacy. Among them are the Arch-bishop of Lemberg, the Prince Bishop of Cracow, and the Bishop of Kamienek. It is added, that the new King has had some private Conferences with them on this Subject.

Corfica, July 27. The last Advices from Corfica that the Inhabitants of Calvi, in Concert with the Malcontents, had contrived to bring into the Arms concealed in Fascines and Sacks: Their Design was to have put themselves in a Condition of being the Defiant of the Genoese, when the French should have embarked; but the Plot being discovered, the French Commander had caused the Arms seized, and Seven of the principal Inhabitants to be hanged.

Warsaw, July 29. Prince Charles de Radzivil, of the General Confederacy of Poland, arrived yesterday.

Affairs of this Kingdom seem to be daily more troubled. The Confederates do not agree with respect to the Abuses that are to be redressed, and the Confederacy is not the most favourable to the State. From some Circumstances it even seems as if the General Confederacy, if it was not for the sake of the new Primate, had already lost the support of Prince de Repnin, the Russian Ambassador.

Warsaw, August 1. The General Confederacy of Poland has sent to the several Waywodes of this Kingdom, requiring their Compliance with the following Resolutions. I. That all Gentlemen who have not yet taken the Oath of Fidelity to the Confederacy, shall do it immediately. II. That all the Courts of Justice shall subsist as heretofore, but shall not judge any of the Confederates. III. That the Marshals of the Crown shall not pass any sentence without the Participation of at least Four of the Confederates. IV. That the Marshals of the Crown and Treasurers shall be immediately restored to the exercise of their respective Rights.

Members of the Commission of War, and the Army, have demanded their Dismissal; and others, on the First of this Month, the Oath to the Confederacy and the General Confederacy; after which these Tribunals resumed their Sittings.

August 11. The Public has hitherto in vain expected a Manifesto from the King of Spain against the Subjects of this Kingdom. It is now said that this Paper (if there should be one) will be only delivered to the Sovereigns of Europe.

L O N D O N, *August 15.*

Yesterday Morning some Dispatches arrived in Town from the Hon. Colonel O'Hara, Governor of Senegal, which were immediately carried to the Secretary of State.

It is heard that as soon as a new Ministry is formed, the Earl of Chatham will take a Tour to Italy, for the recovery of his Health.

Physicians are now convinced through what Channel the Stream of Court Favour runs, when the Secretary of State, an unpopular Nobleman, is appointed Secretary to a neighbouring Kingdom.

The British Minister, at a foreign Court, has lately written home, that none of his Memorials had the least effect paid to them, on account of the contemptible Idea which they entertained of the Instability of Councils at home.

A vulgar Error generally prevails, that no Irishman can be appointed to the chief Government of our Nation, as if we could have any Objection to an Irishman, when they are every Day appointed to the most important Offices (the Secretaryship, for Instance) on the Side of the Water.

They write from Smyrna, that a Knight of Malta, who had been a Prisoner in the Castle of the Seven Towers, near Constantinople, Ten Years, lately made

his Escape on board a French Man of War, and had the good Fortune to get clear off.

This Day arrived a Mail from Holland, by which there is Advice, that a Squadron of Four Venetian Men of War was arrived at Algier, on board one of which Ships was a Member of the Senate of that Republic, who had Orders to offer Peace to the Dey and Regency, and in case the Conditions were not accepted, to declare War against them immediately.

We hear that the Earl of Chatham's present Illness is principally a nervous Fever, attended with a kind of rheumatick Ague, affecting the Head chiefly; and it is supposed to have been occasioned by his Journey to Town from Bath, in a Fit of the Gout, in the severest Weather of last Winter. Dr. Addington now resides in his Lordship's House, as his Indisposition requires the constant Attendance of one of his Physicians.

The Assertion in the Papers, that Lord Clive, with his late Acquisitions, is now worth Eighty Thousand Pounds per Annum, is void of Truth; and the Public may be assured, that his Lordship has not made the least Addition to his Fortune by his late Expedition to India.

We are informed, that a great Personage's late Resignation of a very high Office, was by no Means voluntary, he having previously declared, that if it was taken from him, he never would accept of any other Place from the Crown, especially while the present Ministry continued in Power, at whose Behaviour he is so much irritated, that it is thought he will be a perpetual Thorn in their Side for the future.

They write from Glasgow, that a surprising Take of Herrings was lately made at the Isle of Sky, which amounted to One Hundred Boar Loads; and they had likewise great Success in the Bays of Glenluce and Kintyre.

In most of the Counties in England, and Part of Scotland, the Corn in general looks extremely well; and although not quite so forward as is usual at this Season, yet there is a better Prospect of a good Crop of Grain than has been seen at any Time within these Twenty Years past.

August 11. A Plan is said to be under Consideration, in order for discovering a North-West Passage over North-America by Land, which has so often, in vain, been attempted by Sea.

We hear from repeated Trials of North-American Oak, at the principal Dock-Yards in this Kingdom, the Master-Builders are entirely of Opinion, that the Timber of that Country is by no Means hard enough, or of sufficient Durability, to be used in the Construction of his Majesty's Ships of War.

Letters from Paris are full of the Resolutions of the Parliament of Paris against the whole Body of Jesuits, for totally depriving them of their Privileges and Prerogatives, and banishing them out of the Kingdom for ever.

Letters from Paris, dated August 7, say, "The Duke of York is to go with the King, the 10th Instant, to Chantilly, where the Prince of Conde has invited about 300 Persons, approved of by the King."

We hear from Paris, that a Shark, Twenty-two Feet long, was lately caught in the Mouth of the River Seine, and was shewn about the Country as a great Curiosity.

It is said there is no less than 200,000 Papists at this Time in and about London; so that their Number has increased above One Third within these 20 Years.

From Scotland we are informed, that the Pleadings and excellent Speeches of the Lawyers, in the famous Cause of Hamilton and Douglas, reflect great Honour both to themselves and their Country, being nothing inferior, in Point of Eloquence and Subtlety, to any that has ever been made in Westminster-Hall, or either of our British Senates. In short, Greece or Rome, in the most flourishing and distinguished Periods of those famous Republics, never produced greater Orators than North-Britain does at present.

August 13. A Waiter at a certain well-known Tavern, it is said, keeps no less than a Phæton, with a Pair of handsome Hunters, and a Footman in Livery.

A Bishop, we are told, has a Play to be performed at one of our Theatres the next Season.

A Gentleman of Eminence on the Stage, we hear, is shortly to be ordained a Clergyman.

August 14. By Accounts from various Parts of the Continent, they have a Prospect of the most plentiful Harvest that hath been known for many Years past.

August 15. We hear that a great Patriot intends to do all in his Power the next Sessions of Parliament, to put a Stop to the future Practice of Reverendary Grants, and divers other lucrative Sinicures, and that the latter may die with the present Possessors.

We hear orders will soon be given for raising Twelve Companies of Foot to be sent out in the next Ships for the East-Indies.

August 17. This Morning some Dispatches of Importance were sent off from the Secretary of State's Office, for his Excellency Governor Bernard, of New-England.

August 18. They write from Brest, that Dispatches had been just sent off to the Governors of the French West-India Islands, containing some fresh Instructions concerning a Regulation of Trade between the Subjects of their Britannick and Most Christian Majesties in America.

We are credibly informed that the Quantity of Bohen Tea in the East-India Company's Sale, which is to commence on the First of September, is prodigious great,

so that it may reasonably be expected that Article will be sold for less, than has been known in the Memory of Man.

August 20. They write from Paris, that the Governors of all the Sea-Ports in the South of France, had received strict Orders to prevent the Embarkation of his Majesty's Subjects, whether Labourers or Artificers, on board any foreign Ships, as the Court had received Information, that great Numbers were preparing to leave that Kingdom, to go and settle in North America.

According to one of the Morning Papers, it is said his Portuguese Majesty insists on having an Article inserted in the intended new Treaty, that his Subjects shall enjoy the same Privileges in this Kingdom, as the British Subjects do in Portugal.

August 22. We have an Account from the Palatinate of Marienburgh in Prussia, that the whole Town of Tolmekir was reduced to Ashes on the 29th Ult. the Castle and Two or Three Barns only being left standing: And the poor Inhabitants were not able to save any Thing but their Lives.

The Expences of the great Douglas Cause, we are told, already amount to 60,000*l.*

The Terror that has spread itself amongst the Papists in the Country is, we hear, so great, that all the pious, and more ignorant Sort amongst them, have accused themselves, on being asked concerning their Religion.

August 24. The Earl of Chatham is now judged by his Physicians to be in a fairer Way of Recovery than for these Two Months past.

By a Gentleman just come from America, we learn, that our Colonies have increased at least One Third, in Point of Populoufness, since the Peace; that the Cities of Philadelphia and New-York are greatly enlarged and improved; that the Number of Inhabitants in Canada are doubled; and that the Settlers invited to the Floridas, from the Continent of Europe are daily increasing.

August 25. It is assured, that a great Nobleman, makes no Scruple of declaring, that he obtained his late Increase of Dignity through Lord C——'s Influence, with the King; a Circumstance which affords room for Speculation, as it was little thought at one Time, his Lordship's Influence would have been employed to aggrandize the Allies of the Throne.

We are assured that another great Nobleman, whose bodily Infirmities have lately been the Object of much popular Conversation, ordered, a few Days ago, upwards of Two Hundred Letters, which had been sent him, to be burnt unopened.

We hear that a Commission is preparing to pass the Great Seal, for appointing the Right Hon. Henry Seymour Conway, Esq; Lieutenant-General of the Ordnance, in the room of Lord Viscount Townshend.

They write from Civita-Vecchia, of the 25th of last Month, that the Genoese have at last concluded a Truce for Four Years with the Corsican Malcontents; and that the latter have engaged themselves to furnish with Provisions, the Spanish Jesuits in Corsica.

Letters from Naples, dated July 23, advise, that the Guards on the Frontiers of that Kingdom, had some Time ago stopped Two Persons near San Germano, who were not provided with Passports. That they had with them several Bales, One of which was filled with Gold Coin; and a great Number of Ingots of the same Metal, together with a Casket of Jewels; that they have undergone frequent Examinations, but had hitherto persisted in concealing themselves, tho' there is great Reason to believe that they are Jesuits in Disguise.

By a Private Letter from Bombay, by the Speaker Indianman, we learn, that the Arabs on the Sea Coast up the Gulph, have lately cut off One of our Country Vessels, Captain's Name Brewer; and that they are fitting out, at Bombay, Two of the Company's Frigates, and the Salamander Bomb, to go in quest of the Robbers. The same Advices add, that they are getting ready Troops there to go out upon an Expedition to Mocha.

Letters from Berlin, of the 8th Instant, say, that the Day before, being the Birth-Day of the Princess Wilhelmina, of Prussia, that Princess received a Present of Jewels of very considerable Value from the Prince Stadtholder, with a Letter of Felicitation on the Occasion.

By Letters from Genoa there is Advice, that a Portuguese Man of War had chased a Corsair of Tunis, mounting 24 Guns, on Shore, near Cape Spartel, on the Coast of Barbary, and afterwards set her on Fire, after an Engagement of Two Hours.

They write from Toulon, that M. Bompard, Naval Commander, had just received an Order from his Court, to equip a Number of Men of War and Frigates for Sea, with the utmost Expedition.

A Letter from Paris, dated August 7, says, "The Question agitated here for Two Years past, relating to the Liberty or the Prohibition of foreign Commerce in our Colonies, has lately been finally determined in a Council at Compeigne. The Letters Patent of 1727, respecting the Prohibitive Laws, are confirmed, notwithstanding which, the Two Free Ports are established, One at St. Lucia, for the Levant Islands, and the other at St. Nicholas, for the Leeward Islands, whither Strangers may not only resort and import Ship Timber, and certain other Goods, but Liberty is given for the Purchase of whatever Staple Commodities the Colonists may bring thither. It is also agreed, that the Duty of 10 Livres per Head for each Negro, and Duties on Cod-Fish, shall be suppressed; and that the Produce

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A vulgar Error generally prevails, that no Irishman can be appointed to the chief Government of our Nation, as if we could have any Objection to our Fellow Subjects of that generous Kingdom with an Office, when they are every Day appointed to the most important Employments (the Secretaryship, for Instance) on the Side of the Water.

They write from Smyrna, that a Knight of Malta, who had been a Prisoner in the Castle of the Seven Towers, near Constantinople, Ten Years, lately made

his Escape on board a French Man of War, and had the good Fortune to get clear off.

This Day arrived a Mail from Holland, by which there is Advice, that a Squadron of Four Venetian Men of War was arrived at Algier, on board one of which Ships was a Member of the Senate of that Republic, who had Orders to offer Peace to the Dey and Regency, and in case the Conditions were not accepted, to declare War against them immediately.

We hear that the Earl of Chatham's present Illness is principally a nervous Fever, attended with a kind of rheumatick Ague, affecting the Head chiefly; and it is supposed to have been occasioned by his Journey to Town from Bath, in a Fit of the Gout, in the severest Weather of last Winter. Dr. Addington now resides in his Lordship's House, as his Indisposition requires the constant Attendance of one of his Physicians.

The Assertion in the Papers, that Lord Clive, with his late Acquisitions, is now worth Eighty Thousand Pounds per Annum, is void of Truth; and the Public may be assured, that his Lordship has not made the least Addition to his Fortune by his late Expedition to India.

We are informed, that a great Personage's late Resignation of a very high Office, was by no Means voluntary, he having previously declared, that if it was taken from him, he never would accept of any other Place from the Court, especially while the present Ministry continued in Power, at whose Behaviour he is so much irritated, that it is thought he will be a perpetual Thorn in their Side for the future.

They write from Glasgow, that a surprising Take of Herrings was lately made at the Isle of Sky, which amounted to One Hundred Boat Loads; and they had likewise great Success in the Bays of Glenluce and Kintyre.

In most of the Counties in England, and Part of Scotland, the Corn in general looks extremely well; and although not quite so forward as is usual at this Season, yet there is a better Prospect of a good Crop of Grain than has been seen at any Time within these Twenty Years past.

A Plan is said to be under Consideration, in order for discovering a North-West Passage over North-America by Land, which has so often, in vain, been attempted by Sea.

We hear from repeated Trials of North-American Oak, at the principal Dock-Yards in this Kingdom, the Master-Builders are entirely of Opinion, that the Timber of that Country is by no Means hard enough, or of sufficient Durability, to be used in the Construction of his Majesty's Ships of War.

Letters from Paris are full of the Resolutions of the Parliament of Paris against the whole Body of Jesuits, for totally depriving them of their Privileges and Prerogatives, and banishing them out of the Kingdom forever.

Letters from Paris, dated August 7, say, "The Duke of York is to go with the King, the 10th Instant, to Chantilly, where the Prince of Conde has invited about 300 Persons, approved of by the King."

We hear from Paris, that a Shark, Twenty-two Feet long, was lately caught in the Mouth of the River Seine, and was shewn about the Country as a great Curiosity.

It is said there is no less than 200,000 Papists at this Time in and about London; so that their Number has increased above One Third within these 20 Years.

From Scotland we are informed, that the Pleadings and excellent Speeches of the Lawyers, in the famous Cause of Hamilton and Douglas, reflect great Honour both to themselves and their Country, being nothing inferior, in Point of Eloquence and Subtlety, to any that has ever been made in Westminster-Hall, or either of our British Senates: In short, Greece or Rome, in the most flourishing and distinguished Periods of those famous Republics, never produced greater Orators than North-Britain does at present.

A Waiter at a certain well-known Tavern, it is said, keeps no less than a Phaeton, with a Pair of handsome Hunters, and a Footman in Livery.

A Bishop, we are told, has a Play to be performed at one of our Theatres the next Season.

A Gentleman of Eminence on the Stage, we hear, is shortly to be ordained a Clergyman.

By Accounts from various Parts of the Continent, they have a Prospect of the most plentiful Harvest that hath been known for many Years past.

We hear that a great Patriot intends to do all in his Power the next Sessions of Parliament, to put a Stop to the future Practice of Reversionary Grants, and divers other lucrative Sinicures, and that the latter may die with the present Possessors.

We hear orders will soon be given for raising Twelve Companies of Foot to be sent out in the next Ships for the East-Indies.

This Morning some Dispatches of Importance were sent off from the Secretary of State's Office, for his Excellency Governor Bernard, of New-England.

They write from Brest, that Dispatches had been just sent off to the Governors of the French West-India Islands, containing some fresh Instructions concerning a Regulation of Trade between the Subjects of their Britannick and Most Christian Majesties in America.

We are credibly informed that the Quantity of Bohea Tea in the East-India Company's Sale, which is to commence on the First of September, is prodigious great,

so that it may reasonably be expected that Article will be sold for less, than has been known in the Memory of Man.

They write from Paris, that the Governors of all the Sea-Ports in the South of France, had received strict Orders to prevent the Embarkation of his Majesty's Subjects, whether Labourers or Artificers, on board any foreign Ships, as the Court had received Information, that great Numbers were preparing to leave that Kingdom, to go and settle in North America.

According to one of the Morning Papers, it is said his Portuguese Majesty insists on having an Article inserted in the intended new Treaty, that his Subjects shall enjoy the same Privileges in this Kingdom, as the British Subjects do in Portugal.

We have an Account from the Palatinate of Marienburgh in Prussia, that the whole Town of Tolmekir was reduced to Ashes on the 29th Ult. the Castle and Two or Three Barns only being left standing: And the poor Inhabitants were not able to save any Thing but their Lives.

The Expences of the great Douglas Cause, we are told, already amount to 60,000 l.

The Terror that has spread itself amongst the Papists in the Country is, we hear, so great, that all the poorer, and more ignorant Sort amongst them, have accused themselves, on being asked concerning their Religion.

The Earl of Chatham is now judged by his Physicians to be in a fairer Way of Recovery than for these Two Months past.

By a Gentleman just come from America, we learn, that our Colonies have increased at least One Third, in Point of Populousness, since the Peace; that the Cities of Philadelphia and New-York are greatly enlarged and improved; that the Number of Inhabitants in Canada are doubled; and that the Settlers invited to the Floridas, from the Continent of Europe are daily increasing.

It is assured, that a great Nobleman, makes no Scruple of declaring, that he obtained his late Increase of Dignity through Lord C———'s Influence with the King; a Circumstance which affords room for Speculation, as it was little thought at one Time, his Lordship's Influence would have been employed to aggrandize the Allies of the Throne.

We are assured that another great Nobleman, whose bodily Infirmities have lately been the Object of much popular Conversation, ordered, a few Days ago, upwards of Two Hundred Letters, which had been sent him, to be burnt unopened.

We hear that a Commission is preparing to pass the Great Seal, for appointing the Right Hon. Henry Seymour Conway, Esq; Lieutenant-General of the Ordnance, in the room of Lord Viscount Townshend.

They write from Civita-Vecchia, of the 25th of last Month, that the Genoese have at last concluded a Truce for Four Years with the Corsican Malcontents; and that the latter have engaged themselves to furnish with Provisions, the Spanish Jesuits in Corsica.

Letters from Naples, dated July 28, advise, that the Guards on the Frontiers of that Kingdom, had some Time ago stopped Two Persons near San Germano, who were not provided with Passports. That they had with them several Balles, One of which was filled with Gold Coin; and a great Number of Ingots of the same Metal, together with a Casket of Jewels; that they have undergone frequent Examinations, but had hitherto persisted in concealing themselves, tho' there is great Reason to believe that they are Jesuits in Disguise.

By a Private Letter from Bombay, by the Speaker Indianman, we learn, that the Arabs on the Sea Coast up the Gulph, have lately cut off One of our Country Vessels, Captain's Name Brewer; and that they are fitting out, at Bombay, Two of the Company's Frigates, and the Salamander Bomb, to go in quest of the Robbers. The same Advices add, that they are getting ready Troops there to go out upon an Expedition to Mocha.

Letters from Berlin, of the 8th Instant, say, that the Day before, being the Birth-Day of the Princess Wilhelmina, of Prussia, that Princess received a Present of Jewels of very considerable Value from the Prince Stadtholder, with a Letter of Felicitation on the Occasion.

By Letters from Genoa there is Advice, that a Portuguese Man of War had chased a Corsair of Tunis, mounting 24 Guns, on Shore, near Cape Spartel, on the Coast of Barbary, and afterwards set her on Fire, after an Engagement of Two Hours.

They write from Toulon, that M. Bompart, Naval Commander, had just received an Order from his Court, to equip a Number of Men of War and Frigates for Sea, with the utmost Expedition.

A Letter from Paris, dated August 7, says, "The Question agitated here for Two Years past, relating to the Liberty or the Prohibition of foreign Commerce in our Colonies, has lately been finally determined in a Council at Compeigne. The Letters Patent of 1727, respecting the Prohibitive Laws, are confirmed, notwithstanding which, the Two Free Ports are established, One at St. Lucia, for the Levant Islands, and the other at St. Nicholas, for the Leeward Islands, whither Strangers may not only resort and import Ship Timber, and certain other Goods, but Liberty is given for the Purchase of whatever Staple Commodities the Colonists may bring thither. It is also agreed, that the Duty of 10 Livres per Head for each Negro, and Duties on Cod-Fish, shall be suppressed; and that the Produce

of America imported into France in return for Negroes, shall pay but Half the usual Duties."

We are credibly informed there are at present upwards of Ninety Thousand Quarters of Wheat deposited in Granaries below Bridge, Two Thirds of which have been imported from abroad.

August 26. They write from Cadiz, that a Detachment of Spanish Troops had just embarked there, on board Three Transport Ships, for the Havannah, escorted by a King's Frigate of Thirty Guns.

August 27. We are assured from good Authority, that John Wilkes, Esq; intends offering himself a Candidate to represent this City in Parliament at the ensuing General Election, and that he will be supported by some very respectable Persons.

The Addition of One Shilling per Day to the Half Pay of the Lieutenants of the Royal Navy, is confirmed by Order in Council on the 5th Instant.

We hear that his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland will have the absolute Disposal of all Offices in that Kingdom.

Yesterday his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland appointed Lord Frederick Campbell principal Secretary of State in that Kingdom.

Since the masterly and glorious Expulsion of the Jesuits out of Spain, their Friends on the Continent have given out, that the King of Spain is mad.

We hear the Douglas Estate, about which the Contest is now subsisting, amounts to 12,000 l. a Year.

We hear that the Opinion of One of the greatest Sages of the Law in England, is in favour of the Defendant in the famous Cause of Hamilton and Douglas, and that he will support the same when it comes before a most August Assembly.

By a Letter from Gibraltar, we learn, that for some Months past, no Port in the Adriatic or Levant Seas has been visited with the Plague, all the Ships lately arrived from thence, or any of the Greek Islands, having clean Bills of Health on board.

Wednesday a Number of Colony Agents, as also some eminent Portugal Merchants, attended the Board of Commissioners for Trade and Plantations.

A private Letter from Lisbon mentions, that Orders were given for the Monte Carmelo, of 64 Guns, the St. Joseph, of 70, the Deliverance, of 64, and the Nativity, of 52, with the Arrabida Frigate, of 32 Guns, to be fitted out for Sea, said to be intended on an Expedition, the Object of which hitherto remained a Court Secret.

Extract of a Letter from the Hague, August 9.

The following is the King of Prussia's Answer to the Letter of Felicitation of the States-General on the Marriage concluded on the 9th Ult. between the Princess Sophia-Frederica-Wilhelmina, and the Prince Stadtholder.

"High and Mighty Lords, our good Friends and Allies: As the eminent Qualities of the Prince of Orange and Nassau, and the particular Affection which we have at all Times avowed for the House of that Prince, have engaged us to give, with all possible Good-will, our Consent to the Marriage of his Serene Highness with the Princess Sophia-Frederica-Wilhelmina of Prussia, we are extraordinarily pleased to find, by the approaching Alliance of our well-beloved Niece, with a Prince so dear to the respectable Republic of the United-Provinces, and so worthy of her, the joyful Occasion to strengthen, and more closely unite the Bond of Friendship, in which we have the Satisfaction to live with them. We therefore acknowledge, in the most cordial Manner, the agreeable Assurances which your High Mightinesses have been pleased to give us, by your affectionate Letter, of the 9th of this Month, of the Part which you take in this happy Event: We join with you our Prayers to Heaven, that it may please the Almighty to regard this Marriage with a favourable Eye, that there may result therefrom to us a reciprocal Joy, that it may contribute to the Completion of our Happiness, and be attended with Blessings. Finally, We are disposed, and ready to give your High Mightinesses every Testimony of Friendship subsisting between Two good Neighbours.

"July 21, 1767. Signed FREDERICK." Translation of a Letter from the Princess of Prussia to the States-General.

"High and Mighty Lords: The Friendship of your High Mightinesses, which I have always greatly esteemed, is become in so particular a Manner valuable to me, on Occasion of my approaching Marriage with his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange, that I wait Expression to testify the Pleasure I have in the Assurances your High Mightinesses give of the Part you take in this Affair. I shall not fail to convince you, that the Affection of the Prince of Orange towards the Republic, is actually become my own; and that the same Zeal shall animate us both for advancing its Honour and Happiness. I shall do all in my Power to gain the Approbation of your High Mightinesses, and to shew that I am, with particular Respect, your affectionate Friend,

WILHELMINA, Princess of Prussia.

The Count de Malzhon, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Prussia, and Count de Welderen, invested with the same Character from the States-General, having communicated to his Majesty the approaching Marriage of the Prince Stadtholder with the Princess, Niece of the King of Prussia, his Majesty has sent Compliments in Writing, on this Alliance, to the King of Prussia, to their High Mightinesses, and to the Prince and Princess, who are to be espoused.

LEGHORN, August 12.

THE following Edict has been published in Corsica:

"You are well apprized, dear People, that our Nation has no Enemy but the Republic of Genoa, and that it is with her only that we are at War. The Departure of the Troops of his most Christian Majesty, offers us a very favourable Opportunity of further establishing that Liberty we so much value. This is our precious Moment, wherein our Zeal and Courage should be shewn. The People of Calvi continue in the firmest Resolution of acting for the Common Welfare; and if you sustain this Resolution by your Courage, we may answer for the happy Success of our Enterprizes.

"Mean while, in endeavouring for the Good of our Country, to animate your Courage, it is our Intention, that in the present Circumstances the sincerest Marks of Respect be shewn by the Nation towards the Arms of their Most Christian and Catholic Majesties, together with the high Veneration we have for the Company of St. Ignatius, and our Compassion for their Misfortunes.

"It is therefore our Order and Will, that under Pain of Death, no Person use any Hostility against the Nations above-mentioned; and it is our express Order, that the Fathers of the Company of Jesus be well received, and furnished with all possible Assistance, as being worthy of Attention. (Signed)

JOHN ANTHONY ORTICONI, Chancellor."

GENOA, August 15. The Master of a Vessel, who is arrived in 8 Days from Mahon, brings Advice, that 5 Venetian Ships of War were arrived there, with the Venetian Consul, from Algiers, not having been able to renew the Peace between the Republic of Venice, and the Dey and Regency, and had declared War against the Algerines.

WARSAW, August 20. Divine Service continues to be performed according to the Lutheran Ceremony, in the Chapel of the Danish Minister; and as the Jesuits Church joins to that Chapel, their Service is frequently interrupted by the singing of the Lutheran Hymns. The Jesuits thereupon applied to the Prince Primate to put his Seal upon that Chapel; in Answer to which, that Prince asked them, If they were acquainted with the Law of Nations? What they would say, and what Method they would take to relieve themselves, if the Seal of Russia was to be put on their Church and the rich Convents? And whether it would not be more consistent with their Institution if they were to employ themselves in converting Heathens, rather than sowing Dissentions among Christians?

VENICE, August 22. Yesterday arrived here an Express to the Senate, with the News, that the Dey of Algiers had, immediately after the Departure of the Venetian Fleet from the Harbour of Algiers, come to the Resolution to beg Peace of the Venetians, as soon as he found that the Orders of the Senate to Admiral Emo were, to keep cruising with the Eight Ships under his Command, and to sink, burn, and destroy all Algerine Vessels that he could meet with.

GENOA, August 29. Yesterday arrived Two Spanish Frigates of War, with a Convoy of Nine Ships, and One Polacco, having on board 560 Jesuits expelled from Spain: They came last from Hiace in Corsica; but there not being room in that Town to receive them, the Corsicans occupying the Town, the Spanish Commodore brought them hither, as he was likewise in want of Provisions, having Bread left only for 48 Hours. Last Night a Courier was dispatched to Madrid for Orders where they must be carried to, as the Towns belonging to the Republic in Corsica are filled with those already landed; and another Vessel is daily expected from Carthage with about 50 more.

Letters from Calvi of the 25th say, that Hostilities were committed daily, between the Republic's Troops in Garrison, and the Corsicans: That on the 24th a smart Skirmish happened; and that the Corsicans had been dislodged from the Convent of St. Frances, which was almost destroyed by the Bomb Shells and Cannon shot fired from the Castle.

LONDON, August 31.

By a Letter from Bengal there is Advice, that the Morattoes and Zimmanders, having made an Incursion upon Midnapour, a frontier Country, were repulsed with great Loss by the Forces of the East-India Company, and obliged to retire to the North of Piplly River.

Sept. 1. We hear Mr. De Grey is appointed Chancellor of Ireland.

His Majesty has appointed John Randolph, Esq; to be Attorney General, and Commissary of the Court of Vice Admiralty, in Virginia.

Sept. 3. They write from Civita Vecchia, that Two Thousand Corsicans have possessed themselves of a Convent of Capuchins, within Musket Shot of Calvi, and raised a Battery there. Five Hundred Jesuits are landed at Agajola, and Eight Hundred at Calvi.

Sept. 5. The People of Ireland are so extremely sanguine for a septennial Parliament, that all the Corporations in the Kingdom are instructing the Members to obtain such a Measure at their next Assembly.

Letters from the Frontiers of Poland advise, that a Plan is drawn up, whereon a Law is to be formed, concerning the Affair of the Dissidents, which will be the first and principal Object of the Deliberations of the

approaching Diet of Warfaw. This Plan consists of 15 Articles, of which the following is the Substance.

"The Laws made against Hereticks before the Time of the Reformation, and which were brought in Question in the last Diet against the Dissidents, to make them looked upon as Hereticks, shall be abolished.

"The Dissidents shall no longer bear the Name of Hereticks, nor be distinguished, either in Conversation or Writing, by the Names of Lutherans or Calvinists; but shall only be called Dissidents; their Doctors shall not be called Preachers, but Pastors; and their Churches shall no longer bear the Names Zchory, Fana, or Synagogue, but that of Temple; on Pain, to the Offenders, of being treated according to the Rigour of the Laws against Calumniators.

"They shall be at free Liberty to repair to their Churches, and to build new Ones; and to have Bells and Organs therein; and likewise establish Schools and Hospitals, without being obliged to ask Permission of the Bishop or Dean.

"Their Pastors shall have the Liberty of Baptizing, Marrying, and visiting the Sick, &c. and that publicly, throughout Poland, Lithuania, and all the Provinces thereon depending.

"When there shall be any Dispute about Land belonging to a Church, or Church-Yard, the King shall appoint Commissaries out of the Senate of the Noblesse, who are not to be Ecclesiastics, and whose Duty it will be to examine the whole with Care, and to pronounce with Impartiality.

"The Dissident Noblesse, who form the only Object of the 13th Article of this Plan, shall be restored to all their Rights and Privileges of Nobility, in such a Manner that they may occupy Employments and Dignities in the Senate, may be Nuncios, and possess Starosties, or other Royal Benefices.

"Foreign Gentlemen, though Dissidents, may demand of the Diet, the Right of Naturalization, with Consent of the States, especially if they can be useful to the Country.

"The Dissidents are to enjoy all municipal Privileges, and may be admitted into any Societies, or Communities, and even into the Corporations of the Towns or Cities where they reside.

"The Laws or Statutes made in 1717, 1733, 1736, 1764, and 1766, which are all against the Dissidents, and do them infinite Injury, shall be annulled and entirely abolished.

"From these Premises, a Constitution shall be formed, which shall be regarded as a Treaty made under the Guaranty of foreign Powers, particularly Russia, Sweden, Prussia, England, and Denmark.

"And moreover, all those who shall oppose the Formation of this Constitution, founded upon the Laws of the Kingdom, shall be regarded as Perturbators of the Peace, and of the Public Tranquility, and punished in Consequence."

Sept. 7. It is said, that to prevent any farther Animosity between the Mother-Country and the Colonies, the Expediency of granting the Americans Representatives in the English Parliament, will be considered the Moment a new Administration is established.

The late Right Honourable Charles Townsend, Esq; has passed through the several Offices, besides those already mentioned, of Lord of Trade and Plantations, of Lord of the Admiralty, of Treasurer of his Majesty's Chambers, of Secretary at War, of Pay-Master General of his Majesty's Forces. His great Force was in the Senate, where no one ever excelled him in Eloquence or Ability. To this may be added, that there could not be a more affectionate Husband, tender Parent, a better Master, or more enchanting and instructive Companion. He was 42 Years of Age.

Sept. 8. A Letter from Bristol says, "The People in this Neighbourhood have been much afflicted with the Ague, and have found an infallible Remedy, viz. Half a Quarter of green Usquebaugh, with a Table Spoonful of Lemon Juice, when the Fit comes on."

We hear that an Express is arrived, with an Account, that the Island of Segovia, the Principal of the Philippine Isles, has been entirely destroyed by an Earthquake, except about 100 Houses.

According to Letters from Warfaw, of the 19th ult. the Situation of Affairs there, becomes every Day more and more critical, their Grandees being all in Movement, and Prince Radzivil having never been at Court, since the Audience he obtained of his Majesty.

Last Saturday's Gazette contains Two Orders of his Majesty in Council, dated the 18th ult. by the First of which, the free Importation, into this Kingdom, of Oats, or Oat-Meal, Rye, or Rye-Meal, Wheat, or Wheat Flour, Barley, or Barley-Meal, Peas, Beans, Tares, Callivances, Malt, Bread, Biscuit, and Starch, from any Part of Europe, is permitted from the Expiration of the Time before limited, viz. the 10th Instant, until 20 Days after the Commencement of the next Sessions of Parliament. By the Second, the Prohibition of the Exportation of any Sort of Corn, Grain, Meal, Malt, Flour, Bread, Biscuit, or Starch, is further extended from the said 10th Instant, until 20 Days after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament.

They write from Pensacola, that the Spanish Governor of New-Orleans had received positive Orders from his Court, to prevent the Subjects of Great-Britain from having the least commercial Intercourse with those of his Catholic Majesty under his Command.

We are credibly informed by the last Letters from Salkee, that a Person of Distinction is arrived at the

Court of Morocco, from Portugal, with an Offer to the King of a Present of 600,000 Spanish Dollars for a Treaty of Peace, besides 15,000 Dollars per Annum while the Peace may last.

Another Offer of 500,000 Dollars down, and 15,000 per Annum, has been made to the Bey of Algiers, on Condition that all the Portuguese Slaves there, shall be delivered up, and also the Algerine Slaves at Portugal, to be set at Liberty.

Sept. 10. His Majesty has been pleased to appoint Sir William Trelawny, to be Vice Admiral of Jamaica, in the room of William Henry Littleton, Esq;

Yesterday the Right Honourable Lord Mansfield was sworn in Chancellor of the Exchequer, *pro Tempore*, and the Seals were delivered to him accordingly.

It is said Lord Chatham has already sold One of the great Estates left him by the late Mr Pynsent, to Mr. Taylor, for 20,000l.

Sept. 11. It is said that the Parliament will meet for the Dispatch of Business the beginning of December.

It is strongly reported that an additional Sum of 100,000l. will be granted next Sessions of Parliament, in Consideration of the high Price of Provisions, for the Augmentation of the Livings of poor Clergymen, in England and Wales, under the Patronage of a great Personage.

Sept. 12. We learn from Copenhagen of the 8th Ult. that a Treaty of Commerce is negotiating between the Courts of England and Denmark, by which, among other beneficial Articles, the Subjects of Great-Britain are to enjoy an exclusive Privilege, in case of future War, in being supplied with Naval and Military Stores from the Danish Settlements in the West-Indies.

It is said that Lord North, and Mr. Dowdeswell, have both declined accepting the Place of Chancellor of the Exchequer.

It is said the Earl of Bute is very ill, and attended by Three eminent Physicians.

We hear the Quantity of Plate allowed to the Lord Lieutenants of Ireland, is always valued at 2,800l.

A Commission is said to be received, to purchase several stout Ships of Burthen, to be fitted up for War, and laden with Naval Stores, for the Service of the Corsicans.

The King has been pleased to grant unto the Right Hon. William Lord Mansfield, Chief Justice of his Majesty's Court of King's Bench, the Office of Chancellor of his Majesty's Exchequer, in the room of the Right Hon. Charles Townsend, deceased.

They write from Paris, that the celebrated John James Rousseau is at present at the Seat of a Person of Quality, in Auvergne, where he is composing with all his Might, a Piece upon the Manners and Genius of the English; and that, besides 1800 Livres a Year, of his own, he has actually a Pension of 2000 Livres per Annum, conferred on him by his Britannic Majesty.

According to Letters from Gibraltar the Dey of Algiers had caused the Commander of one of his Xebecs to be strangled immediately on coming into Port for having plundered a Mahonese Vessel in the Mediterranean, belonging to the Subjects of his Britannic Majesty.

The new Negotiation for a new Set of Ministers, advances daily, says a Daily Paper of Yesterday.

Sept. 17. Yesterday Lord Viscount Townsend took Leave of his Majesty at St. James's, on his Departure for Ireland, next Week.

John Elliot, Esq; is appointed Vice-Admiral of West-Florida, in the room of John Johnston, Esq;

They write from Breft, that 2000 Tons of Ship-Timber had just arrived there, in Swedish Transports, from the Baltic, for the Use of the King's Dock-Yards.

According to private Letters from a certain Kingdom, our Ambassador has been received with a Coldness by that Court, which seemed to promise but very indifferent Success to his Negotiations.

Letters from Italy, by Yesterday's Mail, bring a Confirmation of a violent Earthquake, in the Isle of Cassaloni, belonging to the Venetians; half the Capital Town is destroyed; a great Number of the Inhabitants lost their Lives; and the Number of the maimed is still greater. The Governor of the Island very narrowly escaped with his Family and Domestic on board a Ship, the House which he occupied being entirely demolished. The Shocks had not ceased when the Letters came away; and they were also felt at the Islands of St. Maure, Tenedos, and Argos, which have all greatly suffered.

Letters from Madrid of the 23d say, "Expresses continue to arrive at Aranjuez very frequently from Paris and Lisbon, which have occasioned many Councils to be held. It is pretended that they relate chiefly to the Affairs of the Jesuits; but those whose Judgment and Information are most to be relied on, and who dare speak out, make no Scruple to declare, that some Matters of great Importance, respecting Great-Britain, are in Agitation between this Court, and those of Paris and Lisbon."

Sept. 18. Some Dispatches of Importance are said to have been received Yesterday from Commodore Graves, Commander in Chief on the African Station.

Some Letters from Leghorn mention, that Deputies from all the chief Towns in Corsica, still remaining under the Dominion of the Genoese, had been sent to General Paoli's Head Quarters, with Proposals for effectually throwing off the Yoke of the Republic, which was daily expected to take Place.

They write from Cagliari, in Sardinia, that Fourteen Xebecs and armed Gallies, with Two English built

Frigates, of 30 Guns, are now fitting out there, to cruise against the Algerine Corsairs, and other Barbary Pirates, in the Mediterranean.

A Letter from Dublin, dated Sept. 8, says, "It is reported here, that at the next Meeting of our Parliament, the State of the Penfions upon the Civil Establishment of Ireland, will be taken into Consideration."

Extract of a Letter from Algiers, July 23.

"M. Angelo Emo, who commands the Venetian Squadron, has not been able to re-establish the Peace between his Republic and this Regency. The Dey, with whom he has had several Interviews, abated, indeed, in the Demand which he first made of 50,000 Sequins, and reduced it to 30,000, but on Condition that the Republic made him an annual Present of 12,000 Sequins, with a Cargo of Timber, proper for the Construction of Ships. Admiral Emo, on his Side, offered no more than 10,000 Sequins, besides the Presents which the Dey demanded on his Accession to the Regency, but without the Ship-Timber. The Dey refused these Offers, and told M. Emo, that, 'if he did not agree to what he had demanded, he had nothing to do but to return.' This last Interview passed the 20th of this Month, and next Day the Four Ships, which composed the Venetian Squadron, put to Sea. Immediately after their Departure, Notice was given to the Corsairs, that they might attack the Venetian Ships, and take them wherever they met with them."

"The Dey has also notified to the Danish Consul, 'that if his Nation does not send, within the Term of Three Months, the Presents which the Dey demanded on his Advancement to that Dignity, War shall be declared against the Danes.'"

Extract of a Letter from Lisbon, August 30.

"The 24th of this Month arrived in the Tagus, a Shallop with an Express on board, dispatched by the Governor of Senegal, with Orders to repair to London as soon as possible, to inform the Government, that a Mortality rages with such Violence among the Troops, that out of 300 Men, of which they were composed, scarce 60 are remaining; and moreover, that there is a great Scarcity of Provisions."

B O S T O N, October 26.

It is with Pleasure we can inform our Readers, That within the last Year, 30,000 Yards of Cloth were manufactured in one small Country Town in this Province; so far does the Spirit of Industry begin to prevail among us, and we hope will, in this Way, assisted by Frugality and Oeconomy, daily afford us a more promising Prospect of our Emergency from the present alarming Scarcity of Money, and consequent Stagnation of Trade; and from the almost universally increasing Complaints of Debt and Poverty.

By Captain Bruce we learn, that the Gentlemen in England who were appointed Commissioners of the Board of Customs, had taken their Passage in Captain Watt, who was to fail in a few Days after him for this Place.

BOSTON, November 1.

At a Meeting of the Freeholders and other Inhabitants of the
Town of BOSTON, legally assembled at Faneuil-Hall, on
Wednesday, the 13th of October, 1767.

The Hon. JAMES OTIS, Esq; MODERATOR.
A written ADDRESS to the Inhabitants, subscribed Philo-
patric, recommending Oeconomy and Manufactures, was
by their Order read.

THE Town then took into Consideration the Peti-
tion of a Number of Inhabitants, That for
effectual Measures might be applied upon, to pro-
mote Industry, Oeconomy, and Manufactures; there-
by to prevent the unnecessary Importation of Euro-
pean Commodities, which threaten the Country with
Poverty and Ruin. Whereupon, in a very large
and full Meeting, the following Votes and Resolutions
were passed unanimously.

Whereas the excessive Use of foreign Superfluities is the
chief Cause of the present distressed State of this Town, as
it is thereby drained of its Money; which Misfortune is likely
to be increased, by Means of the late additional Burthens
and Impositions on the Produce of the Province, which threaten
the Country with Poverty and Ruin; and whereas

Therefore, VOTED, That this Town will take all
prudent and legal Measures to encourage the Produce
and Manufactures of this Province, and to lessen the
Use of Superfluities, and particularly the following
enumerated Articles, imported from Abroad, viz.

Silks, Sugars, Cordage, Shirts, Coaches, Chaises and
Carriages, of all Sorts, Horse Furniture, Men and Women
Hats, Mens and Womens Apparel, ready made, Household
Furniture, Gloves, Mens and Womens Shoes, Sale-Leather,
Shathing and Deck Nails, Gold and Silver, and Trench
Lace of all Sorts, Gold and Silver Buttons, Wrought Plate
of all Sorts, Diamonds, Stones and Paste Ware, Snuff, Mus-
tard, Clocks and Watches, Silver-Smiths and Jewellers
Ware, Broadcloths that cost above 10s. per Yard, Muffs,
Furs and Tipsters, and all Sorts of Millinery Ware, Starch,
Womens and Childrens Stays, Fire-Engines, China Ware,
Silk and Cotton Velvets, Gammes, Pewterers Hollow Ware,
Lined Oil, Glue, Lavum, Cambricks, Silks of all Kinds
for Garments, Malt-Liquors, and Cheese. And that a
Subscription for this End be, and hereby is recom-
mended to the several Inhabitants and Householders
of the Town; and that John Rowe, Esq; Mr. William
Greenkase, Melanah Bourne, Esq; Mr. Samuel Austin,
Mr. Edward Payne, Mr. Edmund Quincy, Tertius,
John Rudbeck, Esq; Jonathan Williams, Esq; Joshua
Hemlow, Esq; Mr. Henderion Incher, Mr. Solomon
Davis, Joshua Winslow, Esq; and Thomas Cushing, Esq;
be a Committee to prepare a Form for Subscription, to
report the same as soon as possible; and also to procure
Subscriptions to the same.

And whereas it is the Opinion of this Town, that divers
new Manufactures may be set up in America, to its great
Advantage, and some others carried to a greater Extent,
particularly those of Glass and Paper:

Therefore, Voted, That this Town will, by all pru-
dent Ways and Means, encourage the Use and Con-
sumption of Glass and Paper, made in any of the Brit-
ish American Colonies; and more especially in this
Province.

[The said Meeting adjourned till 3 o'Clock Afternoon.]

III o'Clock, P. M.

THE Committee appointed in the Forenoon, to pre-
pare a Form for Subscription, reported as follows:
WHEREAS this Province labours under a heavy Debt,
incurred in the Course of the late War; and the Inhabitants
by this Means, must be for some Time subject to very burthen-
some Taxes: — And as our Trade has for some Years been
on the Decline, and is now particularly under great Em-
barassments, and hurthered with heavy Impositions, our
Medium very scarce, and the Balance of Trade greatly a-
gainst this Country:

We therefore, the Subscribers, being sensible that it
is absolutely necessary, in order to extricate us out of
these embarrassed and distressed Circumstances, to pro-
mote Industry, Oeconomy and Manufactures among
ourselves, and by this Means prevent the unnecessary
Importation of European Commodities, the excessive
Use of which threatens the Country with Poverty and
Ruin — DO promise, and engage, to and with each
other, that we will encourage the Use and Consumption
of all Articles manufactured in any of the British A-
merican Colonies, and more especially in this Province;
and that we will not, from and after the 1st of Decem-
ber next ensuing, purchase any of the following Ar-
ticles, imported from abroad, viz. *Leaf Sugar*, and all
the other Articles enumerated above.

And we further agree, strictly to adhere to the late Regu-
lation respecting Funnels, and will not use any Glasses, but
what are manufactured here, nor procure any new Gar-
ments upon such an Occasion, but what shall be absolutely ne-
cessary.

The above Report having been considered, the Ques-
tion was put, whether the same shall be accepted? Voted
unanimously in the Affirmative. And that said Committee
be desired to use their best Endeavours to get the Sub-
scription Papers filled up as soon as may be. Also, Voted
unanimously, That the foregoing Vote and Form of a
Subscription, relative to the enumerated Articles, be
immediately published; and that the Select-Men be di-
rected to distribute a proper Number of them among
the Freeholders of this Town; and to forward a Copy
of the same to the Select-Men of every Town in the
Province; as also to the principal City or Town Officers
of the chief Towns in the several Colonies on the Con-
tinent, as they may think proper.

That Clause in the Warrant, "That the Mind and
Resolution of the Town may be taken with respect
to the Expediency of a humble Request to his Excel-
lency the Governor, that he will convene the General
Assembly as soon as may be," was read, and con-
sidered. Whereupon, Voted unanimously, That the Repre-
sentatives of the Town, having already made humble
Application to his Excellency the Governor, for the
Purpose above-mentioned, the Town do approve of
their Conduct therein; hereby declaring their Sense
of the Importance of the Measure, and expressing their
Hopes, that his Excellency will be pleased to favour it,
by convening the General Assembly as soon as con-
veniently may be.

The Clause in the Warrant, viz. "To consider of
some Measures for employing the Poor of the Town
of Boston, by reviving the Linen Manufacture, and
in such other Ways as shall be thought most bene-
ficial," was read; whereupon Voted, that John Barret,
Esq; Mr. Edward Payne, Middlecot Cook, Esq; Mr.
Henderion Incher, Melanah Bourne, Esq; Jonathan Wil-
liams, Esq; Henderion Goldswall, Esq; be a Committee
for the Purpose aforesaid, to report as soon as may be.

Upon a Motion made, Voted, That the Town will
take all proper Measures, by keeping in their Children
and Servants, and other Ways, to prevent the Distur-
bances which have sometimes happened on or about the
3th Day of November.

mined People; to pursue Industry and Oeconomy, and en-
courage our own Manufactures.]

Then the Meeting was adjourned to the 20th Day of
November Instant.

At the above Meeting several Samples of Starch,
called *Poland Starch*, and of the Common Sort of
Starch: Hair Powder of the best Sort, Glue, and Snuff
like *Kippen's*, so-called, all manufactured in this Town
by Messrs. Hewes, Baker, and Gillespie, were produced
in Town Meeting, and much approved of.

Mr. John Baker, who manufactures the *Poland*
Starch, so-called, being present, declared his readiness
to contract with the Inhabitants for 1000 Barrels at the
prime Cost of that Article in London.

Mr. Gillespie, the Manufacturer of *Scott's Snuff*, so
called, offered to furnish the Inhabitants with what
may be wanted, at the first Cost of that Article, in
North-Britain.

The Town were also informed that our Paper Manu-
facturers have given Assurance, that in case they can be
supplied with the necessary Materials, usually burnt or
thrown away, in our great Towns, they could supply
the Province with whatever Sorts of Paper they have
Occasion for, in sufficient Quantity, with some left for
the other Colonies.

There is a certain Herb, lately found in this Pro-
vince, which begins already to take Place in the room
of Green and Bohea Tea, which is said to be of a very
salutary Nature, as well as a more agreeable Flavour.
— It is called *LABRADOR*.

We are confidently told, that in the Town of Lynn,
upwards of Forty Thousand Pair of Womens Shoes
have been made in one Year, equal in Goodness to
any imported from Abroad. — It is thought that in a few
Years they will be supplied with Calamanco, and other
Stuffs, manufactured in this Province.

We are assured from good Authority, that many of
the Ladies of this Town have said, that in the List of
Articles not to be purchased, *TEA* ought by no Means
to have been omitted; and that they are resolved to
omit the Use of it for the future.

It is judged that the Spirit of Frugality and Oecono-
my prevails in our Country Towns, as the Demand for
European Superfluities is of late very greatly dimi-
nished.

In a large Circle of very agreeable Ladies in this
Town, it was unanimously agreed to lay aside the Use
of Ribbons, &c. &c. &c. for which there has been so
great a Report to Milliners, in Times past. — [It is hoped
that this Resolution will be followed by others of the
Sex, throughout the Province. — How agreeable will
they appear in their native Beauty, stripped of these
Ornaments, from the prevailing Motive of Love to
their Country.]

We must, after all our Efforts, depend greatly upon
the Female Sex, for the Introduction of Oeconomy a-
mongst us: And those who have the Pleasure of an Ac-
quaintance with them, assure us, that their utmost Aid
will not be wanting.

So strong is the Disposition of the Inhabitants of this
Town to take off the Manufactures that come from the
Country Towns, especially Womens and Childrens
Winter Apparel, that nothing is wanting but an Ad-
vertisement, where they may be had in Town, which
will be taken in, and published by the Printers of the
Boston Gazette, gratis.

L O N D O N, August 29.

It is reported that his Grace the Duke of Northum-
berland will be appointed one of his Majesty's Secreta-
ries of State, in the room of the Right Hon. the Earl
of Shelburne.

We are told that the Dissensions among the Great,
are now less likely than ever to be removed; and it is
added, that the political Flock will certainly be under
the Gentle Shepherd's Care before the Meeting of the
Parliament.

A celebrated Exile, we hear, lately wrote a very af-
fecting Letter (relative to his Case and present Situa-
tion) to a great English Personage (Duke of York)
then at Paris, and we are told it was most graciously
received. It is rumoured that it was followed by a
private Audience.

Sept. 2. A Letter from Copenhagen informs, that
the Court had sent Orders to recal the Danish Con-
sul from Algiers.

Sept. 3. We hear that a Gentleman who lately offered
himself a Candidate for a Northern Borough, had in
his Retinue, Two Sumpter-Horses, heavy laden, with
a superb Covering over their Backs, on which was
wrote, in large Gold Letters, on the one, *Money for the*
Election, and on the other, *More Money for the Election*.

Sept. 4. His Majesty has been pleased to appoint the
Right-Hon. William Spry, Esq; Judge of all America
to be Vice-Admiral in the Island of Barbados, in the
room of Governor Pinfold, who has resigned.

Sept. 7. The following political Conjectures, we hear
occurred in a Conversation this Week at a Coffee-House
near St. James's.

That the Marriage of the Prince Stadtholder with
a Princess of Prussia, would be a fine Barrier to the
Dutch; and that in case of a Rupture with England
the King of Prussia would immediately seize Hanover.
Nay, it was even expected that the King of Prussia
would offend at his Demand of Three Years Subsidy
being accepted of by England, who put him off with
only, and made Peace without his Consent, that

will take the first Pretence of joining the Family Compact, who will then permit him to seize Hanover as a Recompence.

That a War with France, Spain and Holland, must soon happen; and that the French had got 60 Ships of the Line already more than they ought to have, besides a great Number of Frigates, and would take the first Opportunity of retaliating upon England, by seizing their Fleets, when the Seas were covered with them in coming home.

That as an Inducement for the King of Prussia to join the Family Compact, France was to allow a Toleration of Religion throughout her Dominions, which would be the greatest Blow England could receive.

Many of the Gentlemen were of Opinion, that a War with France, Spain and Holland, would be of Advantage to England, because then it must be confined to a Naval one, and would be the only Means of uniting the Nation.

Sept. 17. By a Gentleman from Ireland we learn, that the Generality of the People there, are so fired with the Love of Liberty, that unless the Bill for limiting the Duration of their Parliament to Seven Years, which has already been so often brought into the House and rejected, shall pass into a Law the ensuing Sessions, it is the Opinion of those who are best acquainted with the Temper and Disposition of the People, that the whole Kingdom will be in a Ferment, and Mobs be more frequent and outrageous than they have been since the Revolution; but it is hoped the Prudence and Moderation of their present Lord Lieutenant, and of the Legislature in general, will prevent all this, by gratifying them in what they have in vain so long solicited for.

WILLIAMSBURG, October 22.

Col. Terry, from Halifax County, informs, that some Time in August last, a Man was taken up, and committed to their Goal, who, upon Examination, confessed himself one of Depriest's Gang, and that he, with others, guarded the said Depriest, until he had struck 80,000 l. Maryland Currency, the Bills mostly of the Dollar Denomination. And some Gentlemen, now in Town, inform, that Depriest himself is now apprehended, and committed to Frederick County Jail in Maryland.

ANNAPOLIS, November 19.

The few following Articles, under the LONDON Head, are copy from an IRISH Paper, dated the 7th of last September, just now come to Hand.

A Letter from Copenhagen, dated the 17th of August last, says, There is one Christian Drachenberg, at present living at Aarhus, in Jutland, aged 140 Years. He walks abroad every Day, but is obliged to have some Person to attend him, on Account of his Sight, which is very iadifferent.

A private Letter from Scotland, mentions, that in the great Cause between Hamilton and Douglas, a reclaiming Petition is preparing on the Part of Douglas, to be presented to the Court of Session, at their First Meeting, in November. By the Constitution of that Court, after Judgment is given, either Party may petition or reclaim against such Judgment, provided they advance new Matters of Law or Fact. If such is advanced, the other Party is allowed to answer, and the Court then determines. It is well known, in many Instances, that the Court, on such reclaiming Bills, have altered their first Opinion. From this Circumstance, it is probable this great Cause will not come before the House of Peers next Session of Parliament.

The Estate of the late Duke of Douglas, now in the Possession of Mr. Douglas, is worth upwards of 20,000 l. a Year, besides the Honours of Earl of Angus.

The following is a more correct List than any that has been yet published of the Establishment of the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland's Household, viz. Right Hon. Lord Frederick Campbell, Principal Secretary. Richard Jackson, Esq; Second Secretary. Hon. Mr. Cornwallis, Mr. Young, Sir Robert Pynsent, and Mr. Hodgkinson, Chaplains. Hon. Capt. Walsingham Boyle, Usher of the Black Rod. Col. Robert Walsh, Majors Brooke and Frazer, Captains Fleming, Dilkes, and Manby, Aids-du-camp. Capt. Baudin, and Mr. Swan, Gentlemen of the Bedchamber. Capt. Jephson, Master of the Horse.

A Morning Paper says, It has been observed, that since the Accession of his present Majesty, there have been Seven Lord Lieutenants of Ireland, viz.

The Duke of BEDFORD,
The Earl of HALIFAX,
The Earl of NORTHUMBERLAND,
Lord Viscount WEYMOUTH,
The Earl of HERTFORD,
The Earl of BRISTOL,
Lord Viscount TOWNSHEND.

Of the above Noblemen, there were no less than Four successively in the Government, in little more than the Space of a single Year, from the Middle of May 1765, to the latter End of July 1766, viz. Lord Northumberland, Lord Weymouth, Lord Hertford, and Lord Bristol. In former, less enlightened Times, the Government of Ireland had been usually held by the same Person for Three Years. There are Instances of some who enjoyed that high Office for Six. Immediately on the Appointment of a new Lord Lieutenant, it is the Custom to remit to him, from the Irish Treasury, 3000 l. for his Equipage. This Douceur is independant of the Salary. A Reverend Officiate at the Savoy Chapel, was transported some Years ago for a similar Practice.

Last Night was safely delivered of Twins, the celebrated Mrs. Evans, a favourite Cat of Lady Love-Puppy's, to the great Joy of her Ladyship.

Eloped, at Two this Morning, from her Nephew and Guardian, Miss Charlotte Manlove, Spinster, aged 74, along with Mr. Sampson Thickset, aged 18. 'Tis supposed they are gone to Scotland. STOCKHOLM, August 21.

DURING the Course of this Summer, a contagious Distemper has manifested itself among the Cattle at Elfsdahl-Hard, which has destroyed a great Number of them, and has not yet ceased its Ravages. The Beasts which were attacked with it have their Necks distorted, the Mouth and Nafe red and inflamed, and their Eyes covered with a Pellicle: They die of the most violent Convulsions the Third Day of their Illness.

VIENNA, August 19. The last Letters from Constantinople, which are dated the 1st Instant, advise, that a contagious Distemper rages there in almost every Quarter of the City, and had likewise appeared in the Suburbs of Pera and Galata. They add, that on the 10th of last Month, the Interpreter of the Russian Resident being sent for by the Grand Vizir, had a Conference of Two Hours with him, and some Persons presume that a great Difference has arisen between the Two Empires.

PARIS, Sept. 11. They write from Bourdeaux, that Captain Clemenceau is arrived there, who commanded the Zephyr of Nantes. On the 5th of March last, the Vessel being in Danger of Shipwreck on the Coast of Guinea, the Inhabitants of the Country came down, boarded the Ship, and carried away the Goods. Five of the Crew were killed, and the rest, after being stripped, were carried ashore, where they continued in Misery for several Days. Some Days before this, an English Ship suffered the same Treatment. Part of Captain Clemenceau's Crew were taken on board Two French Ships, the Rosalie, and the Algonquin; but the Captain went in an English Ship to Barbados, from whence he took his Passage to Martinico, and from thence to Europe.

Sept. 14. The Abbe Rochon, who sailed from the Road of Brett, on the 7th of April, on board the Union, commanded by Count de Breugnon, who went to Morocco, is returned from his Voyage, having made his intended Observations. He has viewed several Eclipses of Jupiter's Satellites with an Instrument of his own Invention, which obviates a Difficulty with which these Observations have been hitherto attended. The Difficulty consisted in keeping the Star in view during the Agitation of the Ship, by a Telescope not magnifying less than Sixty Times; but with the Abbe's Instrument, whatever be the Motion of the Ship, the Star can never be lost above Four Seconds of Time. It has been approved by a Committee of the Academy of Sciences, in whom a Memoir has been sent for Examination, containing an Account of the Observations made with it.

LONDON, September 15.

Wagers of a Hundred Guineas to Five are offered, that a Septennial Parliament will not be granted to the People of Ireland.

According to Letters from Leghorn, it was expected the Malecontents of Corsica would be in Possession of the whole Island before Christmas next.

A great Personage, we hear, exclaimed, when he was told of the Right Hon. Mr. Townsend's Death, "Then we have lost the ablest Minister in England."

Sept. 17. We hear from Liverpool, that Mr. Woods, a Mathematician there, observed on the 11th Ult. about Half past Ten at Night, a Comet arise out of the South-East Quarter of the Hemisphere, about 53 Degrees above the Horizon, and about 20 in Gemini. Its Tail described an Angle of about 30 Degrees in Length, and its Direction was towards the Pleiades, where it vanished away.

A Letter from on board his Majesty's Ship Dolphin, dated Port Famine, January 20, 1767, says, "On the 18th of September we left St. Jago, sailed for the Straights of Magellan, and arrived there after Three Months Voyage. When we approached the Shore, we were followed by great Numbers of Men on Horseback; and in the Evening we anchored off Cape Virgin Mary; in the Morning there were upon the Beach near 300 Patagonians, hallooing to us. The Captain went on Shore with Three Boats, manned and armed; and to be sure of their Height, he carried a Standard on Shore, and measured several of them, and found them to be about Seven Feet high. The Captain brought Five of them on board, and gave them Victuals and Drink, Ribbons, Beads, and other Things. They are all well proportioned to their Height; their Horfes are about the same Size with ours; and they have Cane Spurs, and Thong Whips. Their Cloathing is the Skins of wild Beasts. They seemed very much pleased, and hallooted us a great Way through the Straights. On the 19th of December we arrived at this Place; it is a desolate Spot, nothing but Wood and Mountains of Snow. It is a very cold Climate, but plentiful for Wood and Water, wild Fowl and Fish."

Sept. 19. It is most certain that a Ministerial Negotiation is now carrying on, and that it is on a Basis that strongly promises the utmost Permanency, being greatly different from, and infinitely more extensive and conciliating, than any proposed Administration hitherto in Agitation.

We are told that the Dukes of Newcastle, Bedford, Northumberland, and Richmond; the Marquis of Rockingham; the Earls of Halifax, Sandwich, Gower, and Shelburne; the Right Hon. Mr. Dowdewell, and Mr. Conway; and Isaac Barre, and Edmund Burke, Esquires, are all included in the intended new Ministry.

They write from Mobile, in West-Florida, that the Spanish Man of War, Nuestra Señora del Carmo, with a Regiment of Foot on board, from the Havannah to New-Orleans, was lately cast away near Cape Corrientes, in the Gulf of Mexico, when the Ship was entirely lost, and Part of the People taken Prisoners by the Indians.

The Number of Cadets, educated in the Royal School at Woolwich, has hitherto been confined to Forty-eight, but it is now to be extended, under the Patronage and Superintendence of the Marquis of Granby, to One Hundred.

It is said, that the high Office of Chancellor of the Exchequer, will certainly be bestowed on the Right Hon. George Grenville before the Meeting of the next Session of Parliament; till when, it is thought Lord Mansfield will continue in that Office.

By the best Accounts from Abroad, we are assured that the great Object now in Agitation between the Courts of Paris, Madrid, and Lisbon, turns on the best Manner of totally excluding the Papal Jurisdiction out of their respective Dominions, and engaging other Roman Catholic Powers to do the same.

It is said the Portuguese Court have given a very insolent Answer to our Remonstrances; the Purport of which is said to be, that if we do not like our present Situation of Trading with them, we may take what Remedy we please, for they shall buy where they can cheapest; and as to their Wines, we cannot do without them, for no other Wines will adulterate with our made Wines.

We are informed by recent Accounts from Jamaica, that that Island has as yet received no Benefit from the free Port lately established there; that Trade is very dead in it, and all our other Islands, under the torrid Zone; and that the Spaniards cannot be prevailed on to resume their Connections with our Subjects in those Parts, which were broke off by the inconsiderate Measure of converting our Men of War into Spanish Guard-Costas.

A Letter from Malaga, dated July 21, says, "It is impossible to express the Hatred many of the Inhabitants of this Place shew to the English Protestants, which appeared in their Declaration, that they would not let the Body of our late worthy Consul, Nathaniel Ware, Esq; rest in Peace in his Grave; on which Account it was privately interr'd in the Dead of the Night, attended only by Three or Four English Merchants; the next Evening the Flugs were hoisted on board the Ships in the Harbour, and the Guns were fired, as is usual at the Interment of any great Personage; by which the Inhabitants were disappointed. The Reason of their shewing this Respectment was occasioned by some Gentlemen, in Mr. Ware's House, not bowing to the Host, as it passed by the Window, a few Months before; in consequence of which, Three Priests broke into the House of one of the young Gentlemen present, with an Intent to assassinate him,

STOCKHOLM, August 21.

DURING the Course of this Summer, a contagious Distemper has manifested itself among the Cattle at Elfsdahl-Hard, which has destroyed a great Number of them, and has not yet ceased its Ravages. The Beasts which were attacked with it have their Necks distorted, the Mouth and Nose red and inflamed, and their Eyes covered with a Pellicle: They die of the most violent Convulsions the Third Day of their Illness.

VIENNA, August 29. The last Letters from Constantinople, which are dated the 18th Instant, advise, that a contagious Distemper rages there in almost every Quarter of the City, and had likewise appeared in the Suburbs of Pera and Galata. They add, that on the 30th of last Month, the Interpreter of the Russian Resident being sent for by the Grand Vizir, had a Conference of Two Hours with him, and some Persons presume that a great Difference has arisen between the Two Empires.

PARIS, Sept. 11. They write from Bourdeaux, that Captain Clemenceau is arrived there, who commanded the Zephyr of Nantz. On the 5th of March last, the Vessel being in Danger of Shipwreck on the Coast of Guinea, the Inhabitants of the Country came down, boarded the Ship, and carried away the Goods. Five of the Crew were killed, and the rest, after being stripped, were carried ashore, where they continued in Misery for several Days. Some Days before this, an English Ship suffered the same Treatment. Part of Captain Clemenceau's Crew were taken on board Two French Ships, the Rosalie, and the Algonquin; but the Captain went in an English Ship to Barbados, from whence he took his Passage to Martinico, and from thence to Europe.

Sept. 14. The Abbe Rochon, who sailed from the Road of Brett, on the 7th of April, on board the Union, commanded by Count de Breugnon, who went to Morocco, is returned from his Voyage, having made his intended Observations. He has viewed several Eclipses of Jupiter's Satellites with an Instrument of his own Invention, which obviates a Difficulty with which these Observations have been hitherto attended. The Difficulty consisted in keeping the Star in view during the Agitation of the Ship, by a Telescope not magnifying less than Sixty Times; but with the Abbe's Instrument, whatever be the Motion of the Ship, the Star can never be lost above Four Seconds of Time. It has been approved by a Committee of the Academy of Sciences, to whom a Memoir has been sent for Examination, containing an Account of the Observations made with it.

L O N D O N, September 13.

Wagers of a Hundred Guineas to Five are offered, that a Septennial Parliament will not be granted to the People of Ireland.

According to Letters from Leghorn, it was expected the Malecontents of Corsica would be in Possession of the whole Island before Christmas next.

A great Personage, we hear, exclaimed, when he was told of the Right Hon. Mr. Townsend's Death, "Then we have lost the ablest Minister in England."

Sept. 17. We hear from Liverpool, that Mr. Woods, a Mathematician there, observed on the 31st Ult. about Half past Ten at Night, a Comet arise out of the South-East Quarter of the Hemisphere, about 53 Degrees above the Horizon, and about 20 in Gemini. Its Tail described an Angle of about 30 Degrees in Length, and its Direction was towards the Pleiades, where it vanished away.

A Letter from on board his Majesty's Ship Dolphin, dated Port Famine, January 20, 1767, says, "On the 28th of September we left St. Jago, sailed for the Straights of Magellan, and arrived there after Three Months Voyage. When we approached the Shore, we were followed by great Numbers of Men on Horseback; and in the Evening we anchored off Cape Virgin Mary; in the Morning there were upon the Beach near 300 Patagonians, hallooing to us. The Captain went on Shore with Three Boats, manned and armed; and to be sure of their Height, he carried a Standard on Shore, and measured several of them, and found them to be about Seven Feet high. The Captain brought Five of them on board, and gave them Victuals and Drink, Ribbons, Beads, and other Things. They are all well proportioned to their Height; their Horses are about the same Size with ours; and they have Cane Spurs, and Thong Whips. Their Cloathing is the Skins of wild Beasts. They seemed very much pleased, and hallooed us a great Way through the Straights. On the 29th of December we arrived at this Place; it is a desolate Spot, nothing but Wood and Mountains of Snow. It is a very cold Climate, but plentiful for Wood and Water, wild Fowl and Fish."

Sept. 19. It is most certain that a Ministerial Negotiation is now carrying on, and that it is on a Basis that strongly promises the utmost Permanency, being greatly different from, and infinitely more extensive and conciliating, than any proposed Administration hitherto in Agitation.

We are told that the Dukes of Newcastle, Bedford, Northumberland, and Richmond; the Marquis of Rockingham; the Earls of Halifax, Sandwich, Gower, and Shelburne; the Right Hon. Mr. Dowdeswell, and Mr. Conway; and Isaac Barre, and Edmund Burke, Esquires, are all included in the intended new Ministry.

They write from Mobile, in West-Florida, that the Spanish Man of War, Nuestra Señora del Carmin, with a Regiment of Foot on board, from the Havannah to New-Orleans, was lately cast away near Cape Corrientes, in the Gulf of Mexico, when the Ship was entirely lost, and Part of the People taken Prisoners by the Indians.

The Number of Cadets, educated in the Royal School at Woolwich, has hitherto been confined to Forty-eight, but it is now to be extended, under the Patronage and Superintendence of the Marquis of Granby, to One Hundred.

It is said, that the high Office of Chancellor of the Exchequer, will certainly be bestowed on the Right Hon. George Grenville before the Meeting of the next Session of Parliament; till when, it is thought Lord Mansfield will continue in that Office.

By the best Accounts from Abroad, we are assured that the great Object now in Agitation between the Courts of Paris, Madrid, and Lisbon, turns on the best Manner of totally excluding the Papal Jurisdiction out of their respective Dominions, and engaging other Roman Catholic Powers to do the same.

It is said the Portuguese Court have given a very insolent Answer to our Remonstrances; the Purport of which is said to be, that if we do not like our present Situation of Trading with them, we may take what Remedy we please, for they shall buy where they can cheapest; and as to their Wines, we cannot do without them, for no other Wines will adulterate with our made Wines.

We are informed by recent Accounts from Jamaica, that that Island has as yet received no Benefit from the free Port lately established there; that Trade is very dead in it, and all our other Islands, under the torrid Zone; and that the Spaniards cannot be prevailed on to resume their Connections with our Subjects in those Parts, which were broke off by the inconsiderate Measure of converting our Men of War into Spanish Guarda Costas.

A Letter from Malaga, dated July 21, says, "It is impossible to express the Hatred many of the Inhabitants of this Place shew to the English Protestants, which appeared in their Declaration, that they would not let the Body of our late worthy Consul, Nathaniel Ware, Esq; rest in Peace in his Grave; on which Account it was privately interr'd in the Dead of the Night, attended only by Three or Four English Merchants; the next Evening the Flags were hoisted on board the Ships in the Harbour, and the Guns were fired, as is usual at the Interment of any great Personage; by which the Inhabitants were disappointed. The Reason of their shewing this Resentment was occasioned by some Gentlemen, in Mr. Ware's House, not bowing to the Host, as it passed by the Window, a few Months before; in consequence of which, Three Priests broke into the House of one of the young Gentlemen present, with an Intent to assassinate him,

from whom he received Twelve dangerous Wounds in the Head and Body; but happily survived."

Extract of a Letter from Dominica, dated October 10.
 "Two Gentlemen just returned from Martinico, bring a Confirmation of the Ports in that Island and Guadalupe being to be shut against any English Vessel, after the 31st of December next, upon any Pretence of Business whatever, even Lumber and live Cattle. There is at present great Demand for Fish here; but the French being abundantly supplied with Flour from Old France, makes that Article in no Demand: Heavy Philadelphia Flour was retailed by the Merchants here at 45 Shillings a Barrel, this Week. Many Vessels from Philadelphia, and other Parts of the Continent, laden with Provisions, have touched here in the Course of 30 Days, and all proceed further to Leeward.—We have been much afflicted with a putrid Fever, and many People have (and continue) to die; they scarce ever continue longer than Three or Four Days after the Illness seizes them.—Sugars are in great request here, there being seldom less than Three or Four European Ships buying them up as fast as they arrive from the adjacent Islands.—We are now certain of a separate Government, and expect an Assembly to be elected before the Expiration of the present Year, which, to the Honour of the Chamber of Commerce, may be said to have been effected by the prudent Measures they have taken, and its generally expected our present worthy Governor will be continued, which will be much to the Satisfaction of every Well-Wisher to the Island. By a Sloop, Captain Walker, just arrived from Eustatia, we have the following Account, that he tried that Place, St. Christophers, Antigua, and Montserrat, and that he could not sell his Bread and Flour at any Rate, and the Captain further says, there is great Quantities stored at all the above Places.—The Spirit of Party runs very high here and at the Grenades. We have already begun to pick Coffee, which is expected will be One-fourth more in Quantity than has ever been produced from the Island of Dominica in One Crop before. Our Collector has finished his House by far the best of any upon the Island. And the Church has Divine Service performed in it regularly every Sunday, and is the First erected in the ceded Islands, which was built by Subscription. The Pensacola Packet has Orders to call here, for the Convenience of our Merchants, which will be very agreeable, as heretofore she used to leave the Dominica Mail at the Grenades.—The Four and Half per Cent Duty upon our Produce, causes much murmuring, being not laid upon us by Act of Parliament, or Act of Assembly, but only by Prerogative Royal, which is looked upon as unconstitutional and dangerous, not only to us, but all his Majesty's Subjects."

BOSTON, November 5.

Last Week we had a very heavy Storm of Wind and Rain, the Severity of it was on Wednesday, no great Damage done in this Harbour; but in the Bay the Wind being violent at N. E. many Vessels were in great Distress: It is said 17 Sail, chiefly Sloops, were drove on the Southern Shore; a Brig from the West-Indies, — Brown, Master, laden with Molasses, drove on the Back of Cape Cod, the Vessel and most of the Cargo lost, valued at 1000 l. Sterling; a Brig — Smith, Master, from Newfoundland, a-shore at the same Place, the Vessel lost; a Brig from Petersburg, John Bryant, Master, a-shore near Barnstable, but likely to get off; a Sloop from North-Carolina, a-shore near Marshfield, the Vessel lost, but the Cargo saved; a Sloop near Duxbury, the Vessel, Cargo, and all the People lost: Two dead Bodies have been taken up, several Chefts, some Bedding, great Quantities of Cheese, Butter, Cyder, &c. were washed a-shore, by which it is supposed she was from Connecticut; but have not learnt the Master's Name.

A Snow from the West-Indies, Capt. Somerville, bound to Piscataqua, was cast away on the back of New-Castle; the Vessel and Cargo are said to be lost.

Nov. 9. In Capt. Watt, who arrived here last Week from London, came Passengers Henry Hulton, Esq; William Burch, Esq; with his Lady and Family, and Charles Paxton, Esq; Three of the Commissioners for the Receipt and Management of his Majesty's Customs and other Duties in America; also Samuel Venner, Esq; Secretary to the Board of Commissioners, with his Lady and Family; John Porter, Esq; Comptroller-General; John Williams, Esq; Inspector-General; and Three or Four Clerks. The Hon. John Temple, Esq; and John Robinson, Esq; were in America before.

We hear the Subscription Paper for encreasing our own Manufactures, and laying aside certain enumerated Articles, fills up surprizingly; and that said Measure is so well approved of in the Country, that Town Meetings are now calling, in order to agree upon similar Measures. The public Papers and private Advices acquaint us, That Rhode-Island, Connecticut, New-York, New-Jersey, &c. &c. are steadily pursuing Measures for lessening their foreign Imports, by encouraging Frugality and their own Manufactures. It cannot be disputed that the Colonies are greatly in Debt, so that whatever is drawn from us by Way of Duty, must be those Monies which would go to Britain, as Pay, and to procure more Goods. A Necessity is laid upon us, to be industrious and frugal, and *Woe be unto us*, if we are extravagant.

Saturday last we were favoured with a Sight of the China Tea-Plant in Foliage, being cultivated by Capt. Harrison of this Town; some of the dried Leaves being by Mrs. Harrison presented with the Shrub, in Flavour exactly resembling the common Green-Tea.—The Shrub is annual, sowing its own Seed in this Climate, and wants nothing but the Method of Cure to render it useful thro' the Continent.

One of the Portsmouth Packets was cast away in the late Storm, going round from hence, with Goods on board, to the Value of £4000 Sterling, belonging to the Merchants there.

CHARLES-TOWN, (S. CAROLINA) October 6.

Michael Muckenfuss, dispatched by the Post-Master General, with the Mail for St. Augustine, returned here last Wednesday, and gives the following Account, upon Oath, that on the 20th ult. (Three Days after he left Savannah) he reached the Store on Santilly River, kept by James Lemmon, who told him, that the Day before, while George Mills, Benjamin Baker, Je-

remiah Wyly, and one Cummins, were driving some Cattle across a Run of Water, near the said Wyly's House, the Three last mentioned were fired upon and killed on the Spot; Mills made his Escape, and rode towards Wyly's, where he saw Five Indians killing Two Women, Three Children, and old Mr. Mills, his own Father, on which he rode off; he knew the Indians to be Creeks, belonging to the Village of Allatchaway, who, to the Number of Fifteen, had been for some Time hunting in that Neighbourhood. The House where this Murder was committed, is in East Florida, on St. Mary's River, Fifteen Miles above the Ferry, which the said Muckenfuss reached on the 22d in the Evening, but finding no Boat, and no Answer from the Ferry House, on the other Side, he supposed the People were fled, and not being able to cross the River, he was obliged to return.

October 20. Mr. Job Elliot, living at Saltketcher, has brought to Goal one Moon, chief of the Villains who have done so much Damage in the back Parts of this Province, and whose Name has struck such Horror into the Minds of his Majesty's Subjects; Mr. Elliot met with him accidentally, a considerable Distance from home, and having some Remembrance of him when a Boy, decoyed him to a convenient Place, and then secured him, agreeable to the Governor's Proclamation; and without any Assistance, or other Authority, brought him safe to Charles-Town Goal, where he is now lodged; and it is hoped, the numerous Robberies and Outrages, it is said he has been guilty of, will be known to some of the many Persons who will be Attendant at the ensuing Sessions, so that there may be no Want of Evidence to bring him to his deserved Punishment. Said Moon is own Brother to one of the same Name, and Half Brother to one Black, who was executed about Three Sessions ago.

NEWPORT, November 9.

Captain Giles Stanton arrived here, last Saturday, from Monto-Christi, in Twenty Days Passage. He informs, that the Spanish General at St. Domingo had sent Orders to the Mount, forbidding any English Vessel to lie there more than 24 Hours.

NEW-YORK, November 16.

Captain Sheldon, from Newfoundland, in 17 Days, informs us, that Governor Palliser had lately condemned there, a French Ship and Cargo, which he found out of her Limits, for having only 6 Beaver Skins on board; the Vessel was afterwards cleared, and gone out of Port, but the Cargo detained.

This Morning the Snow Jersey, Capt. Lawrence, arrived here from Bristol, in 8 Weeks: He took up at Sea, and has brought in with him, the Crew of the Ketch Mercury, Capt. Kennedy, of and from this Port for the West-Indies; which Vessel went all to Pieces in a Gale of Wind, about Six Days since, being then only Seven Days from this Port.

PHILADELPHIA, November 19.

Extract of a Letter from London, September 19, 1767.

"As to Politics, every Thing still remains as it has done for some Time past. Lord Mansfield is made Chancellor of the Exchequer *pro Tempore*, till our great Men can agree among themselves, or till some spirited, and honest Man, shall take the Lead (which I wish may be the Case) and, trusting in the King's Countenance and Support, who means nothing but the Happiness of his People, make a proper Arrangement of the Candidates for public Offices, and establish a Ministry upon a solid and respectable Footing; a Situation highly necessary for this Country.—Perhaps, in a few Weeks, you may hear something to the Purpose, but don't depend on it, for I think we were never farther from a Settlement than at this Juncture; I wish I may be found to have been mistaken."

We hear from Burlington, that the new constructed light travelling Waggon, contrived by RICHARD WELLS, Esq; on a full Trial last Week, was found to answer its Design, to great Exactness. Among other Improvements, his Invention to discharge the Horses, in case of their running away, is particularly worth Attention. This is done, at the Expence of about a Pistole, by the Riders (in the Inside of the Carriage) only pulling a String, when the Horses go off, and leave the Carriage standing. An Invention that bids fair to be of great Use and Safety to those who ride in close Carriages.

THE Lower House of Assembly of MARYLAND, have constantly, and ineffectually, hitherto, since Seventeen Hundred and Thirty-nine, RESOLVED, That his Lordship hath no Right to collect Twelve-pence per Hoghead on Tobacco exported.
