MADRID, May 11.

ON the 3d of this Month a great Concurrence of People assembled in the great Square of this City, with what Design is not yet known; but on the Approach of some Detachments of Troops, they dispersed. The Council of Castile has promised a Reward of 100 Pistols, for discovering the Motive and Promoters of this tumultuous Assembly, and a Pardon to the Promulgator, even in case he himself was concerned in the Affair.

Civita-Vecchia, May 15. It was believed that the Count Vindafchi, who is arrived here with a Detachment of Soldiers, had Orders to conduct the Spanish Jesuits into the Ecclesiastical State; but on the Arrival of Fourteen Vessels, having on board 572 of those Fathers, under Escort of Three Men of War, none of them, except the Sick, were permitted to disembark. The Rest are still uncertain of their Lot.

Leghorn, May 16. They write from Rogliano, in the Island of Corsica, that 91 of the Prisoners that were taken in the Island of Capraia, are arrived there. Those among them who are Genoese, or of other Nations, are treated according to the Rules of War in all Civilized Countries; but those who prove to be Corsicans, are sent to Prison, and treated as Rebels and Traitors to their Country.

Mittau, May 16. The Duke and the Nobility acceded Yesterday to the Confederacy formed by the Dissidents of Lithuania. In the Act of Accession, it is declared in express Terms, that this Step shall not alter in any respect the Relation or Connection in which the Duchies of Courland and Semegalia stand, with regard to the Republic of Poland, nor the Rights of the Roman Catholic Religion; that the Marshal of the Confederation shall not exercise any Jurisdiction over these Two Duchies; that he shall not impose any Contribution on them; and lastly, that this Accession shall not be alleged in Example, when hereafter other Confederations may be in Agitation.

Thorn, May 15. The 18th of this Month a large Detachment of Russian Troops, which are in this Town and its Environs, began to march, under the Conduct of Major General Count d'Apraxin, to take up their Quarters in some Places of Great-Poland.

Florence, May 15. By the last Letters from Rome, it seems as if the Pope had altered his Resolution with regard to the Admission of the Jesuits into his State.

Parma, May 15. The Infant, affected by the Ravages made in Tuscany and in the Bologna, by the Disasters occasioned by Scarcity, hath sent some Officers of the Militia, with an Order to go throughout his Dominions, and provide Grain for those Communities which may be in Want of it, and to administer to the Poor the Succours which they may have occasion for.

Turin, May 17. An Edict of the King is published, dated the 15th Inst. whereby his Majesty forbids the amassing of Grain, and the exporting it to foreign Countries; and orders every Person to make, yearly, an exact Declaration of the Quantity he shall have reaped.

Florence, May 30. The First and Second Convoy of Jesuits from Spain having been refused to land at Civita-Vecchia, they sailed from thence towards Corsica, where the Republic of Genoa had consented that a certain Number of these should be distributed in the Places that are garrisoned by the French Troops. But, by the last Letters received here from Genoa, we hear, that M. de Marbeuf, the Commander in Chief of those Troops, in that Island, had declared, that he could not permit the Jesuits to land there; and that the Republic had likewise made the same Declaration in regard to their landing in any Part of that State on the Continent; and that Notice thereof had been dispatched by a Vessel, to meet those Convoys at Sea.

Hague, June 5. M. de Larrey, Privy Counsellor and Secretary to the Prince of Orange, sets out for Berlin To-Morrow, in order to settle every Thing relative to the Marriage of his Serene Highness with the Princess Wilhelmina, Sister to the Prince Royal of Prussia.

Warsaw, June 5. We learn that an extraordinary Diet for the Determination of the Affair of the Dissidents, will be opened on the Fifth of October next.

LONDON, May 30.

It is said the Earl of Chatham will be created Knight of the Garter the first Vacancy.

June 4. The Court of St. James's this Day, on Account of its being the Anniversary of his Majesty's Birth-Day, was extremely numerous and brilliant; when many of the Nobility, of both Sexes, particularly several Ladies of the highest

Rank, appeared in the Manufactures of this Kingdom.

Private Letters from Peterburgh mention, that an Edict of the Empress was preparing, and would soon be published, forbidding the Jesuits to settle in any Part of the Russian Territories.

June 6. Yesterday the Dukes of Grafton and Ancaster, the Earl Talbot and Shelburne, and the Right Hon. Henry Seymour Conway, gave grand Entertainments at their respective Houses, to the Nobility, &c. in Honour of his Majesty's Birth-Day.

Last Night their Excellencies the French and Spanish Ambassadors illuminated the Fronts of their respective Houses in a most elegant Manner.

The Mansion House was also illuminated on the same Occasion.

Two Companies of the Royal Train of Artillery are ordered to embark for New-York, to relieve those who have been there for some Years.

Orders are sent to Woolwich for a considerable Quantity of Ordnance Stores to be got in readiness to be shipped for Halifax and Quebec.

Letters from the North of Ireland inform, that great Swarms of Dutch and French Fishermen were arrived on that Coast.

This Morning the Britannia and Pitt Transports fell down the River to Woolwich, to embark a Quantity of Ordnance Stores for North-America.

His Polish Majesty, and the Republic, having insisted upon the Recall of the Russian Troops from Poland, the Empress has given for Answer, That she will consent to that Demand, as soon as the Dissidents receive the Satisfaction due to them in respect to their Rights and Privileges.

Extract of a Letter from Berlin, dated May 10.

"The 17th Instant we received the melancholy News, that Prince Frederick-Henry-Charles, Brother of the Prince of Prussia, died the Day before, at Protzen, where, being on his March with his Regiment, he was seized with the Small-Pox, and the Purples. This Prince, who cannot be sufficiently regretted, was 29 Years of Age, and about Five Months."

A Letter from Rome, dated the 18th ult. says, "Cardinal York hath presented Prince Edward, his Brother, to the Pope, who admitted him as a Stranger, keeping himself incognito, and gave him a tender and distinguished Reception."

They write from Lisbon, that Mr. Hay, the British Envoy, was shortly to embark on board an English Man of War in the Tagus, on his Return home.

Last Saturday died at Portsmouth, in his 28th Year, after a tedious Illness, Lord Hope, eldest Son of the Earl of Hopetoun. He had arrived but a few Days before from America, where he had gone by the Advice of his Physicians, in Hopes that a long Sea Voyage might contribute to his Recovery.

June 11. In a Letter from Lord Clive, received by the Grenville East-Indian, is the following Passage: "The general Terms in which I have mentioned the Depravity of this Settlement, obliges me to point out to your Attention the Instances, the very few Instances of distinguished Merit among the superior Servants. To God a Man, who, in the midst of Luxury and Licentiousness, had retained the true Idea of commercial Oeconomy, who, inferior in Fortune to most of your civil Servants, in the Rank of Counsellor, was yet superior to all in Moderation and Integrity; whose Regard for the Welfare of the Public, and for the Reputation of Individuals, had made him warn others from falling into the Temptations of Corruption, which he saw were approaching, and who could actually resist these Temptations himself, when a Share was allotted him of Money he thought unwarrantably obtained. To find such a Man in such a Settlement, would appear incredible to those who are unacquainted with Mr. Verelst. I have represented this Gentleman to you, as I would every one, in his real Character, and shall only add, that if you wish to see the Measures we are now pursuing, supported with Integrity, Abilities, and Resolution, you will endeavour to prevail upon him to continue in your Service, by appointing him to succeed Mr. Sumner in the Government."

Yesterday Sir James Grey, appointed Ambassador to the Court of Spain, took leave of his Majesty at St. James's; and on Tuesday next he will set out on his Embassy to that Court.

William Henry Lyttleton, Esq; appointed Ambassador to the Court of Lisbon, also took leave Yesterday of his Majesty, and will set out on his Embassy to the said Court in a few Days.

Extract of a Letter from an English Traveller, dated Rome, May 22, 1767.

"Since my last arrival at Civita Vecchia about 900 Spanish Jesuits. They were forbidden to land

there. The Night of the 17th, they quitted that Port, and sailed for Corsica. Part of them are to debark there, at Bastia, and the remainder in the Riviera of Genoa.

"It seems the King of Spain, on receiving a Letter from the Pope, in which he refused, and shewed the Impossibility of his admitting the Jesuits into his State, requested the Genoese to find Place for them. The Genoese, who have almost lost Corsica, and want Friends, immediately consented; hoping, by this Measure, to engage the King in their Favour, or, at least, to prevent his becoming downright their Enemy.

June 13. An Express is arrived, with an Account of the Death of the Empress of Germany, of the Small-Pox, in the 29th Year of her Age. She was Sister to the present Elector of Bavaria, and was married to the present Emperor the 13d of January 1765. This is the second Consort his Imperial Majesty has lost by that fatal Distemper.

Some Letters from Vienna say, that the Empress Queen being on a Visit, the 23d Ult. to the Empress Joseph, who was then ill of the Small-Pox, her Majesty was also seized the next Day with a Fever, which terminated in the same Distemper.

A Camp is to be formed at Compeigne, by the 22d of July, of 17,000 Men, composed of the Flower of the French Army.

The King of Prussia has now an Army of 60,000 Men, of his veteran Regiments, in the Duchy of Cleves, which adjoins to Holland.

They write from Gibraltar, that the Venetian Consul had concluded a fresh Treaty of Peace with the Dey and Regency of Algiers.

They write from Guernsey, that a large Dutch Transport, with Naval Stores for Brest, has been drove on Shore in a hard Gale of Wind, between Cape La Hague and the Caskets; the Crew were saved, but the Ship and Cargo lost.

June 16. A Letter from Paris, dated June 2, says, "We have here an Account that the English Government are about to make an entire Prohibition of Blond Lace, of the Manufactory of this Kingdom. The Merchants and Dealers in that Article are likewise going to lay the same before the King's Council here, in order to have a Stop put to all Kinds of Hardware and Wrought Goods coming in to France, of the Manufactory of England."

Private Letters from Rome assure, that the late Interview granted by the Pope to the pretended Prince Edward, was in Reformation for certain vigorous Measures taken here, for checking the Growth of Popery.

Other Advices insinuate, that an open Rupture is not far off, and that the Friends of the young Chevalier are in high Spirits, as expecting he will soon be acknowledged by his Holiness in Form.

There are Letters in Town advising, that the Crew of the Falmouth Indiaman, lately cast away, were reduced to such Distress, as to cast Lots for their Lives, and that Two had actually been killed and eaten by the Survivors.

June 18. The Parliament, it is said, will break up on Thursday, the 14th Instant.

In a Letter addressed to a Minister, on the Subject of the East-India Dividend, a certain great Man, who has been charged with being the Author of a Measure disagreeable to some of the Members of an opulent commercial Company, is exculpated of the Charge, as follows: "Your Grace has an Example before your Eyes; in him, who in our Days has run the noblest Career of honest Ambition; ever grand in the Formation of his Projects, as well as bold in the Execution; he scorns to employ public Measures as the Means of private Gratification; and I will venture to say, that in all his Views even the most unexceptionable, he never proceeded upon Considerations so trifling and selfish. They were ignorant, indeed, of his Character, who at first ascribed the present Measure to him. The Public are in general now satisfied of the Part he took in it. Your Grace, at this Time, alone enjoys the — of so — an Act."

In the above mentioned Letter it is positively asserted, that "the Dutch have actually fold out immense Sums, not chusing to continue in our Funds at a low Interest, when their Confidence in the faithful and exact Payment is lost. They prefer lodging their Money at a higher Rate with the French, since, if they are to be left at the Discretion of the Borrower, an absolute French Monarch, or an absolute English Minister, is Matter of little Choice."

It is reported that the Hon. Hans Stanley, Esq; is shortly to succeed Sir Joseph Yorke, as his Majesty's Ambassador to the States General.

June 20. We are informed, that his Majesty will go to the House of Peers on Thursday next, and, after signing such Bills as are ready, will prorogue the Parliament.

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The following, among other Bills, lie ready for the Royal Assent; viz.

The Bill to continue several Laws relating to the running of uncultivated Goods; to prevent the running of Goods, and the Danger of Infection thereby; to the granting Liberty to carry Rice from Carolina and Georgia, in America, directly to any Part of Europe, Southward of Cape Finisterre; and to the prohibiting the Exportation of Books reprinted abroad, and first written and printed in Great-Britain.

The Bill for the free Importation of Cochineal and Indigo, and for allowing the Bounties upon the Exportation of Corn and Malt, declared or made for Exportation, and Barley steeped, and entered to be made into Malt for Exportation, before a limited Time.

We hear that the Insinuation which was lately propagated, that the Right Hon. Mr. Conway was to resign as Secretary of State, and get the first vacant Regiment, is entirely without Foundation, that Right Hon. Gentleman's Conduct, since his coming into the Administration, having given such universal Satisfaction, that it is the Opinion of the most sensible Politicians, that he will be continued, till he himself chuses to deprive the Public of a Minister, whose Patriotism and Steadiness had been equalled by few, and surpassed by none.

A Letter from Leghorn, dated May 23, says, "Notwithstanding the Advantage obtained by the Corsican Rebels in the Isle of Capraia, the Fortress has not yet surrendered; and when the Commissary Otto, and Masconi, the Commander, went to it, thinking it would capitulate, the Garrison answered them firmly, they were not to flatter themselves that they should be Masters of it for a long Time, inasmuch as it was well provided with Provisions and Military Stores."

On Thursday a Letter was received here from Lord Clive at Bengal, dated the 3d of February last, which mentions his perfect Recovery from his late dangerous Indisposition, and that he was then about to embark for England; so that his Lordship's Arrival is hourly expected. We hear, that his Lordship hath not only received the large Debt due from Sourah Doula, but Two Millions in Specie besides, on the Company's Account.

They advise from Hamburg, that a great Number of Saltzburghers were preparing to embark on board an English Ship in the Elbe, for the new British Settlements in America.

They write from Senegal, that a Crew of Pirates, in an armed Schooner, who had committed divers Robberies on the Coast, finding themselves pursued by an English Man of War, and that it was impossible to escape her, blew themselves up, by setting Fire to the Powder Room, and every one on board perished.

They write from Amsterdam, that an Embargo was hourly expected to be laid on all outward bound Vessels laden with Corn; on which Account, several Vessels were preparing to sail with half their Cargoes.

They write from Edinburgh, that such great Additions and Improvements are about to be made to that City, as will render it almost equal to any Metropolis in Europe for Extent and Elegance; some new and spacious Streets are to be built on a fine healthy Piece of Ground, commanding a Prospect of the Sea; and a Bridge is to be constructed over a deep Glen, to connect them to the rest of the City.

Newcastle, May 23. Last Week Two Couple from the South were married at Gratna Green. One of the Ladies was only Fifteen, and said to be a Nobleman's Daughter, stolen from a Boarding School; and will have a Fortune of 5,000 l. a Year. She objected to be married in a Private House, and was with much ado prevailed on to comply at the Time; crying out, "Oh, must I be married in such a shabby Place as this!" The Parson however from this Demur, took the Hint to raise the Price, and would not marry them under Ten Guineas. The Gentleman comes from the Neighbourhood of Haltwhistle.

N. E. W. - Y. O. R. K. August 24.

The English Papers brought by Captain Jefferies contain nothing new or interesting, relative to America, and all we can collect from Private Letters, is, That the Bill for stopping the legislative Authority in this Province, until we comply with the Bill of Rights, had passed the House of Commons; that the Americans were permitted to import the Produce of the Straights without calling at England to enter; that there was no Probability of obtaining a Paper-Currency this Session; that a Board of Customs was settled for America; and that 'twas supposed the Parliament would break up about the First of July.

Wednesday last Captain George Tucker arrived here from Turks-Island, in 17 Days: He says that many Settlers have lately arrived there from Bermuda, and that the Place bids fair for being, in a short Time, very considerable, on Account of Trade; that Governor Seymour has appointed a Council, and the Inhabitants have chose an Assembly, by Virtue of an Order from England; and that several French Sloops have lately been there, but could not dispose of their Cargoes, there being but very few Purchasers. Salt very scarce.

PHILADELPHIA, August 27.

From Bucks County we learn, that one Robert Stewart, having employed a Man to deepen his Well, who, after working some Days, refused to go down again; that on Monday last said Stewart sent one of his Sons down to make a Fire, in order to dry it, who, as soon as he got to the Bottom, fell down speechless; another Son went down to his Assistance, and was taken in the same Manner; then a Third Son went down, who also was taken ill in like Manner; at last the Father went down, and likewise shared the same Fate. Their Bodies were afterwards taken out, and all buried in one Grave the next Day, at Neshaminey Meeting.

The Bill to continue several Laws relating to the running of uncustomed Goods; to prevent the running of Goods, and the Danger of Infection thereby; to the granting Liberty to carry Rice from Carolina and Georgia, in America, directly to any Part of Europe, Southward of Cape Finisterre; and to the prohibiting the Exportation of Books reprinted abroad, and first written and printed in Great-Britain.

The Bill for the free Importation of Cochineal and Indigo, and for allowing the Bounties upon the Exportation of Corn and Malt, declared or made for Exportation, and Barley steeped, and entered to be made into Malt for Exportation, before a limited Time.

We hear that the Infusion which was lately propagated, that the Right Hon. Mr. Conway was to resign as Secretary of State, and get the first vacant Regiment, is entirely without Foundation, that Right Hon. Gentleman's Conduct, since his coming into the Administration, having given such universal Satisfaction, that it is the Opinion of the most sensible Politicians, that he will be continued, till he himself chuses to deprive the Public of a Minister, whose Patriotism and Steadiness had been equalled by few, and surpassed by none.

A Letter from Leghorn, dated May 23, says, "Notwithstanding the Advantage obtained by the Corsican Rebels in the Isle of Capraia, the Forts has not yet surrendered; and when the Commissary Otto, and Masconi, the Commander, went to it, thinking it would capitulate, the Garrison answered them firmly, they were not to flatter themselves that they should be Masters of it for a long Time, inasmuch as it was well provided with Provisions and Military Stores."

On Thursday a Letter was received here from Lord Clive at Bengal, dated the 3d of February last, which mentions his perfect Recovery from his late dangerous Indisposition, and that he was then about to embark for England; so that his Lordship's Arrival is hourly expected. We hear, that his Lordship hath not only received the large Debt due from Sourah Doula, but Two Millions in Specie besides, on the Company's Account.

They advise from Hamburg, that a great Number of Saltzburghers were preparing to embark on board an English Ship in the Elbe, for the new British Settlements in America.

They write from Senegal, that a Crew of Pirates, in an armed Schooner, who had committed divers Robberies on the Coast, finding themselves pursued by an English Man of War, and that it was impossible to escape her, blew themselves up, by setting Fire to the Powder Room, and every one on board perished.

They write from Amsterdam, that an Embargo was hourly expected to be laid on all outward bound Vessels laden with Corn; on which Account, several Vessels were preparing to sail with half their Cargoes.

They write from Edinburgh, that such great Additions and Improvements are about to be made to that City, as will render it almost equal to any Metropolis in Europe for Extent and Elegance; some new and spacious Streets are to be built on a fine healthy Piece of Ground, commanding a Prospect of the Sea; and a Bridge is to be constructed over a deep Glen, to connect them to the rest of the City.

Newcastle, May 23. Last Week Two Couple from the South were married at Gratna Green. One of the Ladies was only Fifteen, and said to be a Nobleman's Daughter, stolen from a Boarding School, and will have a Fortune of 5,000 l. a Year. She objected to be married in a Private House, and was with much ado prevailed on to comply at the Time; crying out, "Oh, must I be married in such a shabby Place as this!" The Parson however from this Demur, took the Hint to raise the Price, and would not marry them under Ten Guineas. The Gentleman comes from the Neighbourhood of Haltwhistle.

The English Papers brought by Captain Jefferies contain nothing new or interesting, relative to America, and all we can collect from Private Letters, is, That the Bill for stopping the legislative Authority in this Province, until we comply with the Bill of the House of Commons; that the Americans were permitted to import the Produce of the Straights without calling at England to enter; that their was no Probability of obtaining a Paper-Currency this Session; that a Board of Customs was settled for America; and that 'twas supposed the Parliament would break up about the first of July.

Wednesday last Captain George Tucker arrived here from Turks-Island, in 17 Days: He says that many Settlers have lately arrived there from Bermuda, and that the Place bids fair for being, in a short Time, very considerable on Account of Trade; that Governor Seymour has appointed a Council, and the Inhabitants have chose an Assembly, by Virtue of an Order from England; and that several French Sloops have lately been there, but could not dispose of their Cargoes, there being but very few Purchasers. Salt very scarce.

PHILADELPHIA, August 27.

From Bucks County we learn, that one Robert Stewart, having employed a Man to deepen his Well, who, after working some Days, refused to go down again; that on Monday last said Stewart sent one of his Sons down to make a Fire, in order to dry it, who, as soon as he got to the Bottom, fell down speechless; another Son went down to his Assistance, and was taken in the same Manner; then a Third Son went down, who also was taken ill in like Manner; at last the Father went down, and likewise shared the same Fate. In this Dearth of NEWS and POLITICS, if you would insert in your useful Paper the BILL of RIGHTS, it will undoubtedly please many of your Readers, who perhaps would never otherwise see it, and give them the Pleasure of examining a beautiful and strong PILLAR of the English CONSTITUTION, whose Foundation is laid in the Natural Rights of MEN. In some future Paper, I should think you would do well to publish those Parts of MAGNA CHARTA, which relate to the Subject, with my Lord COKE's Explanation of them. In the mean Time, if you please, you may insert the animated Inscription of Dr. AKINSIDE, designed for the PILLAR set up at RUNNEMEDE, in Commemoration of that glorious Event which produced MAGNA CHARTA, and placed ENGLISH GOVERNMENT on the alone just and stable Foundation, NATURAL RIGHT.

The PETITION of RIGHT, which passed the Two Houses, is as follows, viz.

And, by other Laws of this Realm, it is provided, that none should be charged by any Charge or Imposition, called a Benevolence, nor by such like Charges: (3.) By which the Statutes before-mentioned, and other the good Laws and Statutes of this Realm, your Subjects have inherited this Freedom, that they should not be compelled to contribute to any Tax, Tallage, Aid, or other like Charge, nor set by common Consent in Parliament.

II. Yet nevertheless, of late, divers Commissions, directed to sundry Commissioners in several Counties, with Instructions, have issued by Means whereof your People have been in divers Places assembled, and required to lend certain Sums of Money unto your Majesty, and many of them, upon their Refusal so to do, have had an Oath administered unto them, not warrantable by the Laws or Statutes of this Realm, and have been constrained to become bound to make Appearance and give Attendance before your Privy-Council; and, in other Places, and others of them, have been therefor imprisoned, confined, and sundry other Ways molested and disquieted: (1.) And divers other Charges have been laid and levied upon your People, in several Counties, by Lord-Lieutenants, Deputy-Lieutenants, Commissioners for Matters, Justices of Peace, and others, by Command or Direction from your Majesty, or your Privy-Council, against the Laws and free Customs of this Realm.

III. And whereas also, by the Statute, called THE GREAT CHARTER OF THE LIBERTIES OF ENGLAND, it is declared and enacted, That no Freeman may be taken or imprisoned, or be diseized of his Freehold or Liberties, or his free Customs, or be outlawed or exiled, or in Manner destroyed, but by the lawful Judgment of his Peers, or by the Law of the Land.

IV. And, in the Eight and Twentieth Year of the Reign of King EDWARD III, it was declared and enacted, by Authority of Parliament, That no Man, of what Estate or Condition that he be, should be put out of his Land or Tenements, nor taken, nor imprisoned, nor disseized, nor put to Death, without being brought to answer by due Process of Law.

V. Nevertheless, against the Tenor of the said Statutes, and other the good Laws and Statutes of your Realm, to that End provided, divers of your Subjects have of late been imprisoned, without any Cause shewed: (1.) VII. And whereas also, by Authority of Parliament, in the Five and Twentieth Year of the Reign of King EDWARD III, it is declared and enacted, That no Man should be forejudged of Life or Limb, against the Form of the GREAT CHARTER and Law of the Land: (1.) And, by the said GREAT CHARTER, and other the Laws and Statutes of this your Realm, no Man ought to be judged to Death but by the Laws established in this your Realm, either by the Customs of the same Realm, or by Acts of Parliament: (2.) And whereas no Offender, of what kind soever, is exempted from the Proceedings to be used, and Punishments to be inflicted by the Laws and Statutes of this your Realm: Nevertheless, of late, divers Commissions, under your Majesty's Great Seal, have issued forth, by which certain Persons have been assigned and appointed Commissioners, with Power and Authority to proceed within the Land, according to the Justice of Martial Law, against such Soldiers and Mariners, or other dissolute Persons joined with them, as should commit any Murder, Robbery, Felony, Mutiny, or other Outrage or Misdemeanor whatsoever, and by such summary Course and Order as is agreeable to Martial Law, and as is used in Armies in Time of War, to proceed to the Trial and Condemnation of such Offenders, and them to cause to be executed and put to Death according to the Law Martial.

VIII. By Pretence whereof, some of your Majesty's Subjects have been, by some of the said Commissions, put to Death, when and where, if, by the Laws and Statutes of the Land, they had deserved Death; by the same Laws and Statutes, also they might, and by no other ought, to have been judged and executed.

IX. And also sundry grievous Offenders, by Colour thereof, claiming an Exemption, have escaped the Punishments due to them by the Laws and Statutes of this your Realm, by reason that divers of your Officers and Ministers of Justice, have unjustly refused or forbore to proceed against such Offenders, according to the same Laws and Statutes, upon Pretence that the said Offenders were punishable only by Martial Law, and by Authority of such Commissions as aforesaid: (1.) Which Commissions, and all other of like Nature, are wholly and directly contrary to the said Laws and Statutes of this your Realm.

X. They do therefore humbly pray your Most Excellent Majesty, That no Man, hereafter, be compelled to make or yield any Gift, Loan, Benevolence, Tax, or such like Charge, without common Consent, by Act of Parliament: (1.) And that none be called to make Answer, or take such Oath, or to give Attendance, or be confined, or otherwise molested or disquieted, concerning the same, or for Refusal thereof: (2.) And that no Freeman, in any such Manner as is before mentioned, be imprisoned or detained: (3.) And that your Majesty would be pleased to remove the said Soldiers and Mariners, and that your People may not be so burthened in Time to come: (4.) And that the fore-said Commissions, for proceeding by Martial Law, may be revoked and annulled: And that hereafter no Commissions of like Nature may issue forth, to any Person or Persons whatsoever to be executed as aforesaid, led, by Colour of them, any of your Majesty's Subjects be destroyed, or put to Death, contrary to the Laws and Franchise of the Land.

XI. All which they most humbly pray of your Most Excellent Majesty, as their Rights and Liberties, according to the Laws and Statutes of this Realm: And that your Majesty would also vouchsafe to declare, That the Awards, Doings, and Proceedings, to the Prejudice of your People, in any of the Premises, shall not be drawn hereafter into Consequence or Example: (1.) And that your Majesty would be also graciously pleased, for the further Comfort and Safety of your People, to declare your Royal Will and Pleasure, That, in the Things aforesaid, all your Officers and Ministers shall serve you according to the Laws and Statutes of this Realm, as they tender the Honour of your Majesty, and the Prosperity of this Kingdom. Stat. 17. Car. cap. 14.

In Answer to which the KING made the following Declaration.

"The King willeth, that Right be done according to the Laws and Customs of the Realm; and that the Statutes be put in due Execution; that his Subjects may have no cause to complain of any Wrong or Oppression, contrary to their just Rights and Liberties, to the Preservation whereof he holds himself in Conscience as much obliged, as of his own Prerogative."

And when, for their Deliverance, they were brought before Justice, by your Majesty's Writs of Habeas Corpus, there to undergo and receive, as the Court should order, and their Keepers commanded to certify the Cause of their Detainer, no Cause was certified, but that they

were detained by your Majesty's special Command, signified by the Lords of your Privy-Council, and yet were returned back to several Prisons, without being charged with any Thing to which they might make Answer according to the Law.

VI. And whereas, of late great Companies of Soldiers and Mariners have been dispersed into divers Counties of the Realm, and the Inhabitants, against their Wills, have been compelled to receive them into their Houses, and there to suffer them to sojourn, against the Laws and Customs of this Realm, and to the great Grievance and Vexation of the People.

VII. And whereas also, by Authority of Parliament, in the Five and Twentieth Year of the Reign of King EDWARD III. it is declared and enacted, That no Man should be forejudged of Life or Limb, against the Form of the GREAT CHARTER and Law of the Land: (1.) And, by the said GREAT CHARTER, and other the Laws and Statutes of this your Realm, no Man ought to be judged to Death but by the Laws established in this your Realm, either by the Customs of the same Realm, or by Acts of Parliament: (2.) And whereas no Offender, of what kind soever, is exempted from the Proceedings to be used, and Punishments to be inflicted by the Laws and Statutes of this your Realm: Nevertheless, of late, divers Commissions, under your Majesty's Great Seal, have issued forth, by which certain Persons have been assigned and appointed Commissioners, with Power and Authority to proceed within the Land, according to the Justice of Martial Law, against such Soldiers and Mariners, or other dissolute Persons joined with them, as should commit any Murders, Robbery, Felony, Mutiny, or other Outrage or Misdemeanor whatsoever, and by such summary Course and Order as is agreeable to Martial Law, and as is used in Armies in Time of War, to proceed to the Trial and Condemnation of such Offenders, and them to cause to be executed and put to Death according to the Law Martial.

VIII. By Pretext whereof, some of your Majesty's Subjects have been, by some of the said Commissions, put to Death, when and where, if, by the Laws and Statutes of the Land, they had deserved Death; by the same Laws and Statutes, also they might, and by no other ought, to have been judged and executed.

IX. And also sundry grievous Offenders, by Colour thereof, claiming an Exemption, have escaped the Punishments due to them by the Laws and Statutes of this your Realm, by reason that divers of your Officers and Ministers of Justice, have unjustly refused or forbore to proceed against such Offenders, according to the same Laws and Statutes, upon Pretence that the said Offenders were punishable only by Martial Law, and by Authority of such Commissions as aforesaid: (1.) Which Commissions, and all other of like Nature, are wholly and directly contrary to the said Laws and Statutes of this your Realm.

X. They do therefore humbly pray your Most Excellent Majesty, That no Man, hereafter, be compelled to make or yield any Gift, Loan, Benevolence, Tax, or such like Charge, without common Consent, by Act of Parliament: (1.) And that none be called to make Answer, or take such Oath, or to give Attendance, or be confined, or otherwise molested or disquieted, concerning the same, or for Refusal thereof: (2.) And that no Freeman, in any such Manner as is before mentioned, be imprisoned or detained: (3.) And that your Majesty would be pleased to remove the said Soldiers and Mariners, and that your People may not be so burthened in Time to come: (4.) And that the foresaid Commissions, for proceeding by Martial Law, may be revoked and annulled; And that, hereafter no Commissions of like Nature may issue forth, to any Person or Persons whatsoever to be executed as aforesaid, left, by Colour of them, any of your Majesty's Subjects be destroyed, or put to Death, contrary to the Laws and Franchise of the Land.

XI. All which they most humbly pray of your Most Excellent Majesty, as their Rights and Liberties, according to the Laws and Statutes of this Realm: And that your Majesty would also vouchsafe to declare, That the Awards, Doings, and Proceedings, to the Prejudice of your People, in any of the Premises, shall not be drawn hereafter into Consequence or Example: (1.) And that your Majesty would be also graciously pleased, for the further Comfort and Safety of your People, to declare your Royal Will and Pleasure, That, in the Things aforesaid, all your Officers and Ministers shall serve you according to the Laws and Statutes of this Realm, as they tender the Honour of your Majesty, and the Prosperity of this Kingdom. Stat. 17. Car. cap. 14.

In Answer to which the KING made the following Declaration,

"The King willeth, that Right be done according to the Laws and Customs of the Realm, and that the Statutes be put in due Execution; that his Subjects may have no cause to complain of any Wrong or Oppression, contrary to their just Rights and Liberties, to the Preservation whereof he holds himself in Conscience as much obliged, as of his own Prerogative."

INSCRIPTION on a COLUMN at RUNNEMEDE, by Dr. AKINSIDE.

THOU, who the verdant Plain dost traverse here, While THAMES, among his Willows, from thy View Retires; O Stranger! stay thee, and the Scene Around contemplate well: This is the Place Where ENGLAND's ancient Barons, clad in Arms, And stern in Conquest, from their Tyrant King (Then render'd tame) did challenge and secure The Charter of thy Freedom. Pals not on Till thou have blest their Memory, and paid Those Thanks which God appointed the Reward Of public Virtue; and, if Chance, thy Home Salute thee with a Father's honour'd Name, Go call thy Sons! instruct them what a Debt They owe their Ancestors, and make them swear To pay it, by transmitting down entire Those sacred Rights, to which themselves were born.

C A D I Z, MAY 5.

THE last Advices from Gibraltar, and those from Larache of the 19th ult. inform, that a Corsair of the King of Morocco, commanded by the Rais Omar, a Portuguese Renegade, hath taken a French Brigantine on its Voyage from Marseilles for one of the French Ports of Ponent, laden with Oil, Cotton, Soap, &c. This Act of Hostility, at a Time when the Two States are at Peace, alarms the Merchants. It is possible that the Rais may be ignorant of the Treaty having been signed. However that may be, there is no Doubt but the Marquis de Breugnot, Ambassador from France to the King of Morocco, will make strong Complaints thereof, and reclaim the Ship and Cargo.

WARSAW, May 27. The Prince Primate, in his Answer to the Deputies sent by the Confederation of Thorn, when they had their Audience, spoke as follows:

"We take in very good Part the Deputation sent us by our Brethren, fellow Patriots, and fellow Citizens incorporated, and declare it welcome. As First Senator, I wish your Proposal, and the Resolution of the Three Orders of the Kingdom, may agree together; and, as First Pastor of the Kingdom, I treat you to regard Concord as the principal Object."

VIENNA, May 30. The last Letters from Constantinople, which are dated the 2d Instant, advise, that the Plague is broke out again in some Parts of the City; but, that the Suburb of Pera is not afflicted with that terrible Distemper: That the Grand Signor has caused some Persons, guilty of Perjury, to be strangled, and has hanged an Armenian Merchant, who used to countenance these People, and even lodge them in his House: That the Mufti, who is the Head of Religion and Law, has been dismissed by the Grand Signor, for amassing Riches by Means inconsistent with his Character; and his Place supplied by Axaffade Veli Effendi, who has Twice before been in that high Station.

GENOA, May 30. We have received Information, that the contrary Winds have obliged the Genoese Vessels to abandon the Coast of Capraia, and to put into Porto Ferrajo. Three Pinkes continue nevertheless to cruise between Macinaggio and Capraia; but the Success of their Operations is rendered very doubtful; the Sieur Ortoni, Commandant of the Fort of Capraia, having given his Word to surrender the Place, if he was not relieved within Three Days, which Term is elapsed.

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L O N D O N, June 9.

Letters from Chatham mention, that Orders are received at that Yard, to take his Majesty's Ship Monmouth, of 64 Guns, to Pieces, being judged unfit for further Service. This Ship was esteemed the best Sailer in the whole Navy, had a principal Share in the Actions fought by the Admirals Anson and Hawke, against the French in the Bay of Biscay, when commanded by that brave Officer, the late Admiral Harrison, in the War preceding the last; was in the late War in several Actions, commanded by the Captains Gardiner and Harvey, the former of whom was killed on board, when engaged singly with the Foudroyant of 80 Guns. She never gave Chase to any Ship she did not come up with.

June 11. Letters received at Constantinople from Cairo advise, That on the 3d of March last, being the second Feast of the Bairam, the Day on which all the Beys and other Officers of the City repair to the Castle, to compliment Hamsey Pacha, Governor of Egypt, about 60 Persons, most of whom belonged to Grandees, who have been some Time in Exile, having formed a Design of assassinating several of the Beys now in Post, got into the Pacha's Hall of Audience, disguised, and well armed: But the Emir Hatch, or Conductor of the Mecca Caravan, having observed among them some suspicious Movements, he signified the same to the other Beys; one of whom, on his taking Leave of the Pacha, received a Pistol-Shot, which tore away Part of his Jaw. On this all the Beys had recourse to their Sabres, fought their Way through, and destroyed the Conspirators. One Bey remained dead on the Spot, others were dangerously wounded, as were also several Principal Officers. After this bloody Scene, wherein many Lives were lost, the Government ordered the Pacha to be deposed, which was done the same Day; and those of his Officers who were suspected to have favoured this Plot, were banished. The Janissary Aga has ordered many of the Grandees of Cairo, who were discovered to be Accomplices therein, to be punished.

Last Week, at a Christening at Widaker, near Whitehaven, of the 21st Child of Mr. Wright, by the same Woman, the Company came from 21 Parishes, and the Entertainment consisted of 21 Pieces of Beef, 21 Legs of Mutton and Lamb, 21 Gallons of Brandy, Three Times 21 Gallons of strong Ale, Three Times 21 Fowls roasted and boiled, 21 Pies, besides several Hams, a great Number of Puddings, &c. &c.

June 18. In the Vienna Gazette, the Portrait of the late Empress-Consort, is drawn in the following Terms: "Meek, pious, compassionate, affable, obliging. She was never known to swerve a Moment from the Principles which those united Qualities had deeply engrained in her Heart. Those who had the Honour to be attached to her, had in her a Mistress whom they served more through Inclination than Duty. The Poor always found in her a Mother ready to relieve their Distresses, and the World constantly beheld in her an Example of Virtue. She has endured, with a Courage and Resignation, worthy of the Greatness of her Soul and of her Piety, the terrible Malady which has brought her to the Tomb; and, during the whole Course of it, has given Proofs, equally admirable and moving, of that heroic Tranquillity, which Religion only can inspire."

T O T H E P R I N T E R O F T H E M A R Y L A N D G A Z E T T E.

I T being lately asserted in your Paper on one Side, and denied on the other, that Mrs. BLAKE's Family got their late Disorder (of which Fourteen of about Sixty in Family, died) from a Convict Ship, and at last it is fix'd on Me, as having been the Means of so much Calamity, by purchasing a Servant from the Ship. For the Sake of Truth, and that the PUBLIC may not be farther imposed on in this Matter, I request the Favour of you to publish the following Declaration in your next GAZETTE.

I BENNETT SEEDERS, of Kent-Island, declare, and am ready to make Oath, if called on, That I bought a Convict Servant Man, from a Ship, at Annapolis, some Time about the First of November last, and carried him home to my Family, and there he now remains in perfect Health, and has not, to my Knowledge, had one Day's Sickness; and, am sure he never has lost one Day's Work by Sickness since I bought him, nor has one of my Family, except myself, been sick since I bought him, unless with the Flux, which my Wife was ill of, and some others of my Family, when I bought him, and she died with it about Three or Four Days after I carried him home, and the Rest of my Family all recovered, being almost well before the Servant came home.

THAT about a Fortnight after I brought my Servant home, I went to my Brother JOHN SEE-

DER's, at the Head of Wye, in perfect Health, to see him and my Mother, when there was a white Woman sick there, whose Husband was a Servant to my Brother; she came there sick to see her Husband, and stay'd all Night at my Brother's, and, about Five or Six Weeks after that, I went again to my Brother's, to help him build a House, when I found Three or Four of my Brother's Family sick, and the white Woman still sick, and my Brother told me, he thought it was the long Fever the white Woman had had, and that his Family had taken it from her; I went from thence to my Mother's, who lived near, and stay'd Two Days, and the building of the House was put off by my Brother a Fortnight longer, I went home to my Family, well myself, and all my Family well: At the Fortnight's End, I returned to my Brother's again, to help him build the House, when I still found those of his Family sick that were sick before, amongst which was a Negro Woman that was Wife to a Negro Man of Mrs. BLAKE's, but that Wench recovered, and is alive and well now. I went to work in building the House, (which was but a small logged Smoke-House) and worked about Four Days with my Brother, and a Negro, and had got the Logs up, and were putting up the Rafters, when I was taken with an Ague, and went to Bed; and, after the Ague a Fever came on, and a Pain in my right Side. I sent next Day for the Doctor; when he came, he said I had a bastard Plurisy, bled me, and gave me a Vomit, and I lay ill above Ten or Twelve Days, before my Fever left me; and the Pain in my Side, and Soreness, continued some Weeks afterwards, before I was able to ride home. When I got home, I found all my Family well, and so they have continued ever since: That both myself and my Brother thought my Disorder different from that his Family had; that my Brother's Family all got well again, but an old Negro Wench, that had been past Labour several Years, and was supposed to be upwards of Seventy Years old.

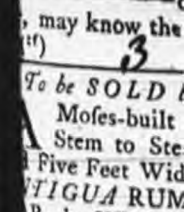

C O R T E, (in CORSE) June 1.

AN Express and several Officers are arrived here from Capraia, with Advice, that the Fortrefs capitulated on the 29th past, at Evening, and next Morning was put into the Hands of the Besiegers. Leave was given to Commissary Bernard Ottone, who commanded therein chief, to embark with the Garrison to Genoa, or any other Part of the Genoese Territories. The Enemy's Officers have been treated with Politeness, and dined at Table with those of Corsica. M. Ottone immediately wrote a Letter to the Senator Pinelli, acquainting him with the Capitulation, and desiring him to send a Vessel to take the Garrison on board. In consequence of this, a Pink arrived on the 31st, and M. Ottone, with some Attendants, embarked. As soon as they were on board, a Gale of Wind arose, and the Ship was obliged to put to Sea: The rest of the Garrison are still on Shore, waiting for another Vessel.

The Fortrefs has been defended for 102 Days, with no other Sustainance for 80 People than Bread and Water. There were found in it Eleven Pieces of Brass, besides other Ordnance, Two Barrels of Cartouches for the Musketry, Two Barrels of Powder, several Small Arms, and a great Number of Bullets.

Two Hundred of the Corsican Troops are coming home, 300 being left to keep the Garrison.

BRUSSELS, June 27. An Edict of the Empress Queen has just made its Appearance here, prohibiting the Admission into this Country of any of the Jesuits expelled from Spain, or exiled from France; it matters not whether they are Subjects, by Birth, of her Imperial Majesty, or whether or not they wear the Habit of their Order.

We have received Advice, that a Ship belonging to the Religion of Malta lately attacked a Turkish Vessel off the Island of Rhodes, the Commander of which, after an obstinate Engagement, which lasted Nine Hours, finding it was not in his Power to hold out any longer, blew up his Ship with his own Hand.

MADRID, June 12. Orders having been given to expel all the Jesuits in his Majesty's Dominions, both in America and Asia, it is reported, that his Majesty proposes to send thither 3000 other Monks, from the different Orders established in this Kingdom.

L O N D O N, June 20.

We are credibly informed, that his Excellency the Earl of Rochfort, his Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary to the Court of France, is daily expected in Town from Paris. Some say he comes to transact private Business of his own; others say his Lordship was sent for, in order to be appointed one of his Majesty's principal Secretaries of State.

They write from Barbados, that the Prince de Rohan, Commander in chief of the French Islands, had fitted out several Frigates of War to cruise against all Merchant Ships of his own Nation, who shall attempt to trade to any of the adjacent English Settlements.

We hear that Meir Jaffier, who lately died in the East-Indies, has left to Lord Clive, Rupees to the Value of 120,000 l. Sterling; on which his Lordship summoned a Council for their Opinion, whether that Money properly belonged to the Company or himself; when they determined, that it was his Lordship's sole Right; whereupon his Lordship took Possession of it, but immediately after generously settled the whole of it on the Widows and Orphans of those Officers and Soldiers who lost their Lives in the Service.

By Accounts lately arrived in the Prince Frederick Store-Ship, we are credibly informed, that the new Islands near the Straights of Magellan, were, last Summer, very fruitful in Pease, Beans, Turnips, Potatoes, &c. &c. the Seed of which had been given by the Gentlemen of the Men of War stationed at Port Egmont, which was discerned by the Dolphin in her last Voyage, and said to be as commodious and safe a Harbour as any in the World. That the Corn was in the Ear when they left that Place, which was in January last, answering to our July, the Island lying in nearly the same Parallel with London, in the southern Hemisphere. The Land being without Trees, Care had been taken to get a large Quantity transported from the Straights, so that with proper Management and Industry, it is hoped they will one Day turn out of the utmost Use. Those are the Islands which some have represented to be so sterile, as not to produce any Kind of Vegetables!—Had Commodore Anson, in his Voyage round Cape Horn, known of this Port, there is not the least Doubt but his whole Fleet might have gone into the South-Sea in good Condition.

It is said that all Teas, seized and condemned for being illegally imported, not be sold for home Consumption as usual, but exported to Ireland and the Colonies; and 'tis further said, such Exports will be allowed in smaller Quantities than heretofore.

June 24. The Bill for granting certain Duties on foreign Linens imported, and for establishing a Fund to encourage the raising Hemp and Flax.

The Bill for establishing an Agreement for a limited Time for the Payment of an annual Sum by the East-India Company.

The Bill to restrain the Governor, Council, and Assembly, of New-York, from passing any Act of Assembly 'til Provision is made for furnishing his Majesty's Troops with the Necessaries required by Law.

And to some other Public and Private Bills.

The following is his MAJESTY'S Most Gracious SPEECH, made on Friday, the 4th of July, to both Houses of PARLIAMENT.

My Lords and Gentlemen,
THE advanced Season of the Year, joined to the Consideration of the Inconvenience you must all have felt from so long an Absence from your several Countries, calls upon me to put an End to the present Session of Parliament; which I cannot do, without returning you my Thanks for your diligent Application to the Public Business, and the Proofs you have given of your Affection for me, for my Family, and for my Government; And though the Nature and Extensiveness of the several Objects under your Consideration, it could not be expected that all the great Commercial Interests should be completely adjusted and regulated in the Course of this Session, yet I am persuaded, that, by the Progress you have made, a solid Foundation is laid for securing the most considerable and essential Benefits to this Nation.

"As no material Alteration has happened in the State of Foreign Affairs, since your first Meeting, I have nothing to communicate to you on that Subject. The fixed Objects of all my Measures are, to preserve the Peace, and, at the same Time, to assert and maintain the Honour of my Crown, and the just Rights of my Subjects."

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,
I thank you for the necessary Supplies which you have so cheerfully granted for the Public Service; and my particular Acknowledgments are due to you, for the Provision you have enabled me to make for the more honourable Support and Maintenance of my Family."

My Lords and Gentlemen,

"The great Attention which you have shewn to the particular Purpose for which I called you so early together, and the very wholesome Laws passed for relieving my Subjects from the immediate Distress which the great Scarcity of Corn threatened to bring upon them, give me the most sensible Pleasure. I rely upon you for the Extension of your utmost Endeavours to convince my People, that no Care has been wanting to procure for them every Relief which has been possible; and, that their grateful Sense of Provisions, so wisely made for

their Happiness, and lasting Prosperity, cannot be so fully expressed, as by a strict Observance of that Order and Regularity, which are equally necessary to the Security of all good Government, as well as to their own real Welfare."

Then the Lord Chancellor, by his Majesty's Command, prorogued this Parliament to Monday the 31st of August next.

Advice is received that the Britannia East-India-man, Capt. Rous, from Bengal, with Lord Clive on board, was spoken with by the Lord Cambden, going into the Cape, the latter End of March last, on her Way to England.

July 5. The great Talk of a Change in the Ministry, will end, in the Opinion of many of our Politicians, in NOTHING, but TALK.

On the other Hand, it is too notorious to be contradicted, that there has been a violent Agitation among the Members of the Administration, within this Week past. Whatever latent Cause may have put them into such a manifest troubled Motion, a few Days, we think, will determine, whether a TOTAL and LASTING CALM is to succeed or not.

AN Express and several Officers are arrived here from Capraia, with Advice, that the Forts capitulated on the 29th past, at Evening, and next Morning was put into the Hands of the Besiegers. Leave was given to Commissary Bernard Ottone, who commanded therein chief, to embark with the Garrison to Genoa, or any other Part of the Genoese Territories. The Enemy's Officers have been treated with Politeness, and dined at Table with those of Corsica. M. Ottone immediately wrote a Letter to the Senator Pinelli, acquainting him with the Capitulation, and desiring him to send a Vessel to take the Garrison on board. In consequence of this, a Pink arrived on the 31st, and M. Ottone, with some Attendants, embarked. As soon as they were on board, a Gale of Wind arose, and the Ship was obliged to put to Sea: The rest of the Garrison are still on Shore, waiting for another Vessel.

The Forts has been defended for 102 Days, with no other Sustainance for 80 People than Bread and Water. There were found in it Eleven Pieces of Brads, besides other Ordnance, Two Barrels of Cartouches for the Musketry, Two Barrels of Powder, several Small Arms, and a great Number of Bullets.

Two Hundred of the Corsican Troops are coming home, 300 being left to keep the Garrison.

BRUSSELS, June 27. An Edict of the Empress Queen has just made its Appearance here, prohibiting the Admission into this Country of any of the Jesuits expelled from Spain, or exiled from France; it matters not whether they are Subjects, by Birth, of her Imperial Majesty, or whether or not they wear the Habit of their Order.

Some Politicians begin to think, that in case the Courts of Vienna, Paris, and Madrid, should pay any Regard to the Application of the See of Rome against the Dissidents in Poland, a general War in Poland will probably take Place, as the Five great Powers who have already declared in their Favour, as Guarantees of the Treaty of Oliva, would exert their Force in Favour of such Declarations.

June 25. The Reports of a Change in the Ministry continue, and the last were,

That Mr. Conway was to return to the Army;

Lord Bristol to be Secretary of State;

The Duke of Grafton to go to Ireland; and

Mr. Charles Townshend, to be both first Lord of the Treasury, and Chancellor of the Exchequer.

They write from Rochfort, that the Dauphin, a second Rate Ship of War, pierced to mount 90 Guns, would be ready to launch there by the Middle of September next.

July 1. His Majesty went this Day to the House of Peers, and gave the Royal Assent to the following Bills, viz.

The Bill granting to his Majesty a certain Sum out of the Sinking Fund, and for applying certain Sums therein mentioned for the Service of 1767; and for empowering his Majesty to permit the Importation of Corn or Grain, Duty free, for a longer Time than is permitted by any Act of this Session of Parliament.

The Bill for taking off the inland Duty of One Shilling per Pound on all black and Single Tea; and for granting a Drawback on the Exportation of Teas to Ireland and America.

The Bill for granting certain Duties on foreign Linens imported, and for establishing a Fund to encourage the raising Hemp and Flax.

The Bill for establishing an Agreement for a limited Time for the Payment of an annual Sum by the East-India Company.

The Bill to restrain the Governor, Council, and Assembly, of New-York, from passing any Act of Assembly 'til Provision is made for furnishing his Majesty's Troops with the Necessaries required by Law.

And to some other Public and Private Bills.

The following is his MAJESTY'S Most Gracious SPEECH, made on Friday, the 4th of July, to both Houses of PARLIAMENT.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

THE advanced Season of the Year, joined to the Consideration of the Inconvenience you must all have felt from so long an Absence from your several Countries, calls upon me to put an End to the present Session of Parliament; which I cannot do, without returning you my Thanks for your diligent Application to the Public Business, and the Proofs you have given of your Affection for me, for my Family, and for my Government: And tho' from the Nature and Extensiveness of the several Objects under your Consideration, it could not be expected that all the great Commercial Interests should be completely adjusted and regulated in the Course of this Session, yet I am persuaded, that, by the Progress you have made, a solid Foundation is laid for securing the most considerable and essential Benefits to this Nation.

As no material Alteration has happened in the State of Foreign Affairs, since your first Meeting, I have nothing to communicate to you on that Subject. The fixed Objects of all my Measures are, to preserve the Peace, and, at the same Time, to assert and maintain the Honour of my Crown, and the just Rights of my Subjects."

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

"I thank you for the necessary Supplies which you have so cheerfully granted for the Public Service; and my particular Acknowledgments are due to you, for the Provision you have enabled me to make for the more honourable Support and Maintenance of my Family."

My Lords and Gentlemen,

"The great Attention which you have shewn to the particular Purpose for which I called you so early together, and the very wholesome Laws passed for relieving my Subjects from the immediate Distress which the great Scarcity of Corn threatened to bring upon them, give me the most sensible Pleasure. I rely upon you for the Exertion of your utmost Endeavours to convince my People, that no Care has been wanting to procure for them every Relief which has been possible; and, that their grateful Sense of Provisions, so wisely made for

their Happiness, and lasting Prosperity, cannot be so fully expressed, as by a strict Observance of that Order and Regularity, which are equally necessary to the Security of all good Government, as well as to their own real Welfare."

Then the Lord Chancellor, by his Majesty's Command, prorogued this Parliament to Monday the 31st of August next.

Letters from Rome, dated June 10, after mentioning the Earthquake which happened there on the 4th, add, "The same Shock was felt at Spoleto, near 20 Leagues distant from this City, where it threw down several Houses, and some Persons were buried in the Ruins."

July 3. Yesterday there was a very great Council at St. James's, to which, it is said, no less than One Hundred and Six Members of the Privy Council were summoned to attend.

July 4. We are credibly informed, that Orders are given for proper Lifts to be made out, against next Session of Parliament, of all the Papists, or those that are reputed as such in the respective Dioceses throughout the Kingdom.

We hear the late Regulations in the Trade of the Isle of Man, will benefit his Majesty's Revenue little short of 12,000 l. Sterling per Annum.

Advice is received that the Britannia East-Indiaman, Capt. Rous, from Bengal, with Lord Clive on board, was spoken with by the Lord Cambden, going into the Cape, the latter End of March last, on her Way to England.

July 5. The great Talk of a Change in the Ministry, will end, in the Opinion of many of our Politicians, in NOTHING, but TALK.

On the other Hand, it is too notorious to be contradicted, that there has been a violent Agitation among the Members of the Administration, within this Week past. Whatever latent Cause may have put them into such a manifest troubled Motion, a few Days, we think, will determine, whether a TOTAL and LASTING CALM is to succeed or not.

July 7. It is now confidently said, that his Grace the Duke of Richmond will be appointed Lord Lieutenant of Ireland.

Saturday last, Two Companies of the Train of Artillery, lying at Woolwich, embarked on board the Transports for North-America, and will sail the first fair Wind.

The Earl of Shelburne does not go to Ireland.

The Right Hon. Augustus Hervey, Secretary to his Brother, Lord Bristol, has resigned that Post.

Letters from Lisbon, of the 2d Ult. confirm the Account of the Inhabitants of Tercera having revolted against the new Governor; and add, that some Ships are equipping and arming, to take Troops on board, in order to quell the Insurgents.

It has been thought, and still is supposed by many, that a new Parliament will precede the next Sessions; but, we hear the contrary is determined upon.

Yesterday Morning, at a Quarter before Nine o'Clock, their Royal and Serene Highnesses, the Prince and Princess of Brunswick, set out in one of his Majesty's Coaches for Dover, on their Return to Germany. The young Prince of Brunswick set out some Time before them.

July 8. According to some Letters from Leghorn, the French General, Count de Marbeuf, had prevailed upon the General of the Corsicans to put a Stop to any farther Hostilities against the Genoese; until the Success of a fresh Negotiation should be experienced, at the Court of Versailles, for effecting a Peace between these Islanders and the Republic.

The Genoese are in great Fear that Paoli will lay Siege to Bonifaccio, the only Place left them in the Island of Corsica.

By a Letter, dated the First of December last, from a Gentleman who was on board the Fal-mouth East-Indiaman when she was struck with Lightning, we are informed, that they were afterwards wrecked in the Mouth of the Ganges; and of 360 Men, which they carried from England, there are only about 160 now alive at Calcutta, the rest being either killed by the Lightning, burnt in the Ship, drowned, devoured by Tygers, when they got ashore, or died of Fatigue.

It is said that an Offer has been made to some of the Principals of the Opposition, to compose the new A——n, but that they would not accept but upon Terms that could not be complied with, which Terms are not yet certainly known; but it seems one of them is, that they insist upon bringing in their Friends along with them.

Extract of a Letter from Italy, dated May 20.

"I forgot to mention to you, that the Pretender, a few Days before we left Rome, renounced his regal Pretensions, and consented to receive Company as a private Person, and had a numerous Conversation for the first Time."

By a Gentleman just arrived from Scotland, we are informed, that at Edinburgh, and other Places, they are at present greatly agitated by the near Approach of the Determination of the Douglas great Cause, and Betts are near on an Equality; that several Short-hand Gentlemen are arrived from London, to take down the Debates, for which they are to be paid from 300 to 500 Guineas each Person; and that most of the Nobility and Persons of Distinction in that Kingdom, were come to Edinburgh, to be present at the Debates.

Sept. 7. Besides many Public and Private Bills, his Majesty gave the Royal Assent to the following, relative to America, &c. the 2d Day of July last.

An Act for granting certain Duties in the British Colonies and Plantations in America; for allowing a Drawback of the Duties of Customs upon the Exportation from this Kingdom of Coffee and Cocoa Nuts, of the Produce of the said Colonies or Plantations; for discontinuing the Drawbacks payable on China and Earthen-Ware exported to America; and for more effectually preventing the clandestine Running of Goods in the said Colonies and Plantations.

An Act for discontinuing the Duties of Logwood exported.

An Act for amending certain Laws, relating to the Revenue of the Post-Office; and for granting Rates of Postage, for the Conveyance of Letters and Packets between Great-Britain and the Isle of Man, and within that Island.

An Act for regulating the Proceedings of certain Public Companies and Corporations, carrying on Trade and Dealings with Joint Stocks, in respect to the declaring of Dividends; and for further regulating the Qualifications of Members, for voting in their respective General Courts.

An Act for regulating certain Proceedings of the General Courts of the United Company of Merchants of England, trading to the East-Indies.

An Act to enable his Majesty to put the Customs and other Duties in the British Dominions in America, and the Execution of the Laws relating to Trade there, under the Management of Commissioners, to be appointed for that Purpose, and to be resident in the said Dominions.

An Act to continue several Laws therein mentioned, relating to the clandestine Running of uncustomed Goods, and preventing Frauds relating to the Customs; to prevent the clandestine Running of Goods, and the Danger of Infection thereby; to the granting Liberty to carry Rice from His Majesty's Provinces of Carolina and Georgia, in America, directly to any Part of Europe, Southward of Cape-Finisterre, in Ships built and navigated according to Law; and to the prohibiting the Importation of Books re-printed abroad, and first composed, written, and printed, in Great-Britain.

An Act to prevent the Importation and wearing of French Lawns.

An Act for further continuing an Act of the last Session of Parliament, entitled, An Act to amend, and render more effectual, in his Majesty's Dominions in America, an Act passed in this present Session of Parliament, entitled, An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters.

ANNAPOLIS, SEPTEMBER 17.
We hear that the EIGHT DOLLAR Bills of Credit of this Province, has been lately attempted to be counterfeited by a Person now in Charles County Jail, who will probably stand a Chance of being exalted for his Ingenuity, at the next Assize-Court, which begins there on Monday the 21st Instant.

The Beginning of this Week, the Captains M'DOUGALL and CRAYMER, set out on their Voyage for Home.

Tuesday last, a Negro Man, belonging to Mr. JOHN HAMMOND, near this City, was found dead on his Master's Plantation.—The Jury brought in their Verdict, Natural Death, he having been sickly some Time before.

Under the New-York Head, dated September 3, we are informed by Capt. Lawton, lately arrived there, of a Brig, belonging to Mr. Malbone, bound to Rhode-Island, being set on Fire by the Carelessness of a Boy in drawing Rum, by which Accident the Vessel was entirely consumed, and Five Female Passengers perished in the Flames.—A full Account of which will be inserted in our next.

CIVITA VECCHIA, June 20.

LAST Sunday a fresh Cargo of 100 Jesuits arrived here, which immediately failed for Genoa, not having been able to disembark at Corsica, as General Paoli had excited himself to the Commander of the French Troops from procuring the necessary Subsistence for those Fathers, on account of the Scarcity of Provisions. It is believed that the Republic will settle these Jesuits in the Maritime Places; at least, if some Letters from Genoa may be credited, which inform, that if the Republic should fail in its Engagement with the King of Spain, by refusing to receive the above Fathers expelled from his Kingdom, his Most Christian Majesty will withdraw his Troops from Corsica.

LISBON, June 10. A Vessel of War, and Three Transports, are sailed from the Tagus, for the Azores, with Troops on board, for appeasing a dangerous Tumult in the Isle of Terceira, which is imputed to the Intrigues of the Jesuits.

WARSAW, June 21. We are informed from Radom, that the Election of a Marshal-General of the Confederacy, is to come on there To-morrow. This Confederacy, the like of which was never known before, actually consists of 75,000 Gentlemen, and the Number is daily increasing.

NAPLES, June 9. A Turkish Galley, coming from the Coast of Africa, and laden with Tributes for the Grand Signior, lately attacked a small Corsican Vessel; the Crew of which, being resolved to defend themselves to the last Extremity, boarded the Turk, and gave such Proofs of their Valour as are almost incredible; but were almost overcome by the great Number of their Antagonists, when a Maltese Galley, commanded by the Chevalier Rosellini, came up to their Assistance, and boarding likewise the Turkish Galley, they soon made themselves Masters of it. The Corsicans had for their Share of the Prize some Pieces of Cannon, several Fire-Arms, a great Quantity of Ammunition, and 16,000 Pieces of Silver Money.

FLORENCE, June 20. Letters from Rome say, that the Cardinals are greatly divided in their Opinions with respect to the Manner in which the Pope ought to treat the Jesuits.

GENOA, June 27. They write from Leghorn, that the Corsicans have fitted out a large Felucca in the Gulph of St. Lawrence, to cruise against the Genoese Ships. Letters from Bastia advise, that there are but 150 Corsicans left in the Island of Capraia. The sieur Barbizzi, who is appointed Governor of that Island, has sent to Corsica all the Brass Cannon in that Fort, and supplied the Place with Iron Guns. He hath also ordered all the Entrenchments, made during the late Siege, to be destroyed, and Three small Forts to be built for the Defence of the Island. In the last Assembly of the Malecontents held at Corte, it was resolved to tax all the Inhabitants of the Island, One Thousandth Part of their Estates, where they exceed the Value of One Thousand Livres. The Produce of this Tax is to defray the Expence of the Siege of Capraia, and of the Subsistence of the Garrison of that Place.

L O N D O N, July 11.

Private Advices from Lisbon mention, that Orders were lately issued for raising Ten Additional Regiments of Foot, which occasioned much Speculation as to the Motive of such a Measure in Time of a profound Peace.

A Letter from Versailles, dated July 1, says, "An Officer is arrived here from Morocco, sent by the Count de Breugnon, the King's Ambassador there, with Advice of a Peace having been concluded with the Emperor Muley Mahomet. This Treaty was signed the 30th of May last, when all the French Slaves, without Exception, were set at Liberty, and the Three Ships which were taken by the Moors, during the Time that this Negotiation was carrying on, were restored."

Extract of a Letter from Stockholm, June 30.

"The Subsidy-Treaty, which is on the tapis between this Kingdom and Great-Britain, seems to be on the Point of Maturity, and there is no Doubt of its speedy Conclusion. It is however certain, that many Persons who have some Share in the Management of Affairs, have declared it as their Opinion, that it would be better for us to renew our Engagements of this Sort with France."

Extract of a Letter from Dantzick, June 22.

"The State of Affairs in this Kingdom becomes every Day more critical. The Facility with which the numerous Confederacies are formed, has no Example in History. The chief Causes of these Leagues appears to be the Law made in the present Reign, by which the Power of the Two great Generals is very much limited, tho' the Alteration affects not those who are at present involved with

those eminent Charges. The great Authority granted to the Board of Treasury, has also given Disgust to many, though it was really necessary to the Public Weal. But, after all, if the last Dyet had been more favourably disposed to the Dissidents, the last Declarations of the Court of Petersburg, and Berlin, would not have appeared, and consequently we should not have seen all those Confederacies which now seem to endanger the Public Tranquillity."

Extract of a Letter from Lisbon, July 4.

"The Expedition, consisting of Four Men of War and Transports, has been fitted out with greater Dispatch than was ever usual in this Place, and is sailed. These Ships are to take in Two Regiments that are quartered in the Province of Algarve, and are to be embarked from the Ports of Saint Uval and Tavira. General Bohm, a German Officer in this Service, is Commander-in-Chief. The certain Destination of this Armament, however, still remains a profound Secret; for, though some People had thought it was to join the Spaniards against the Settlements of the Jesuits in Paraguay; others, to quell an Insurrection in the Island of Terceira; and others again, to put their Islands in some Posture of Defence, from an Apprehension of the Court of England, on Account of Differences, it is now thought to be for a Matter of far greater Consequence. Many of the People of Rio de Janeiro, complaining of the ill Treatment of their Governor, and the destructive Schemes with which their Trade has been oppressed of late Years, had quitted that Settlement, it is said, and had retired into the Woods, where others had joined them."

"When Measures, contrary to the Inclination and Interest of the People, are carried on, it is not surprising their Discontents should be frequently breaking out; neither can it be expected, that those Measures will be observed any longer, than while the reigning Government has Power to enforce Obedience."

Lord Rochfort, we hear, is sent for from Paris, being destined, as supposed, for some considerable Post in the ensuing new Administration.

It was this Morning reported, that the Earl of Rochfort will be appointed to succeed the Right Hon. Mr. Conway, as one of his Majesty's Secretaries of State. Some Dispatches were forwarded to his Lordship Yesterday.

July 18. Letters from Spa, in Germany, give an Account of the Arrival of the Prince and Princess of Brunswick, at that Place, in perfect Health.

Extract of a Letter from Bengal.

"All is Peace in this Country, and is likely to continue so. Lord Clive has displayed great Capacity and Abilities in the judicious Plan he has established for preserving the Company's valuable Possessions here. Many of his last Appointments and Regulations have given such general Satisfaction, that Clamour and Discontent are absorbed in Admiration of his many great and shining Virtues."

Lord Clive landed at Portsmouth on Tuesday Evening, in perfect Health, from on board the Britannia, and his Lordship arrived in Town Yesterday.

Yesterday Lord Clive and Col. Carnac waited on his Majesty, at St. James's, and were graciously received.

After Lord Clive had waited on his Majesty at St. James's Yesterday, his Lordship went and paid his Compliments to the Court of Directors at the East-India House, who were sitting, and received his Lordship in the most cordial and polite Manner. His Lordship, with his late Acquisitions, is now worth 80,000 l. per Annum, which is more than any other Man possesses in England.

This Morning the Right Hon. Lord Clive had a numerous Levée of the Nobility and Gentry, at his House in Berkeley-Square, to compliment his Lordship on his Arrival from the East-Indies. It is said that his Lordship has brought over some valuable Presents for his Majesty.

It is talked that a great Post in the Administration will be offered to Lord Clive.

'Tis said, that as the Government is now interested in the Affairs of the East-India Company, the Services of Lord Clive will be honoured with a Ducal Coronet.

We hear some great Personages are so alarmed at the News of a certain celebrated Exile's writing the New History of England, that some shrewd Politicians begin to think, with no small Degree of Confidence, that they will procure a Pardon for him, on Condition of his not continuing the said History further than the Reign of his late Majesty King George II. Others are of opinion, that if he does not obtain a Pardon, he will certainly receive a very considerable Sum of Money, on the same Con-

dition.—So great is their Fear of having their Fame transmitted to Posterity, by a Writer, whose Parts and Abilities will insure Immortality to his Work.

Last Week the First Volume in Manuscript of Mr. Wilkes's History of England, was sold to a Bookseller at the Court-End of the Town, for Six Hundred Guineas.

On Monday Evening Two Persons made their Appearance at Vauxhall, the one assuming the Title of a Nobleman, and the other that of a Baronet, attended by French-Horns, &c. but their Behaviour not agreeing with the Titles they had taken, gave Umbrage to some Gentlemen present, and a general Uproar began, when the Constables, with proper Assistants, were obliged to take them into Custody. His Lordship, on Enquiry, appeared to be no less than a Master-Taylor, and the other a Carpenter.

The New-York Mail of last Saturday was detained by Orders from Above, and was not dispatched Yesterday in the Evening.

This Morning an Express was sent off to Falmouth, to be put on board the Packet Boat for New-York, said to contain some extraordinary Dispatches for Sir Henry Moore.

It is with Pleasure we can inform the Public, that the Legislature of the Province of New-York has voluntarily passed the Mutiny-Bill, conformable to the Act of Parliament, induced by a Sense of the Justice and Propriety of that Law, without any previous Knowledge of the late Steps taken here to enforce a Compliance. A clear Demonstration of the Wisdom of the Measures pursued, which were rather calculated for allowing Time to the Colonies to return to Reason and their Duty, than for proceeding with Violence against them.

July 9. In the Course of last Session of Parliament, 209 Bills received the Royal Assent, 93 Public, and 114 Private, which is the greatest Number that has received the Royal Assent in one Session for several Years.

There are now living at Pontefract, in Yorkshire, a labouring Man and his Wife, whose Ages together make 217; he being 110, and she 107.

Extract of a Letter from Edinburgh, July 11.

"On Tuesday came on, before the Court, the Decision of the Douglas Cause: The Opinions of the Judges upon which, stand as follows:

For Hamilton, spoke on Tuesday, Lord President. Thursday, Barjarg, Alemore, and Ellick. Friday, Stonefield. This Day, Kennet, and Halls.

For Douglas, spoke on Tuesday, Lord Strichen. Wednesday, Kaims, Auchinleck, and Coaliton. Friday, Pitfour. This Day, Gardenston.

There remains only Justice Clerk and Monboddie to speak on Tuesday, one of whom, it is certain, will be for Hamilton, and the other Douglas, whereby there is an Equality, and resolving upon the President's Casting Vote, the Hamilton Family carries it here. It is needless to mention what a Consternation this Affair makes in Edinburgh.

By the final Decision of the great Douglas Cause, not only the Title, but a very considerable Fortune, we hear, comes to the Hamilton Family."

Edinburgh, July 11. We are told that Two En-

gineers, accompanied by several Gentlemen, are now surveying the Grounds between the Friths of Forth and Clyde, in order to fix upon the most proper Tract to carry the large Canal, which is proposed to join the Two Friths. And we are also told, that a narrow Canal is projecting between Perth and Forfar, for the Purpose of Inland Navigation, which, if carried into Execution, will be productive of the greatest Advantages to that Place.

N E W P O R T, August 31.

The following is a particular and authentic Account of the melancholy Accident which happened on board the Brig Dolphin, commanded by Capt. John Malbone, of this Town, viz. Last Wednesday Night she arrived off Point Judith, from Jamaica, and when within about Five Miles from the Land, at half after Ten o'Clock, the same Night, a Negro Boy went down between Decks, amongst the Rum, where there stood several Puncheons of Water, and (as he says) with an Intention to draw some Water, but mistook, and broached a Cask of Rum; at the same Time the Door of the Lanthorn, in which he carried the Candle, being open, and the Candle falling into the Rum, set it on Fire: This so affrighted the Boy, that he neglected to stop the running of the Rum, and in less than half a Minute the Head of the Cask flew out, and the Flames were immediately communicated to Fifteen Casks more, all between Decks, so that all possible Means used to extinguish it proved intirely ineffectual:—The Vessel was all in Flames in a very few Minutes, and consequently reduced Twenty-six Persons, being the Number of People, including Passengers on board, to a Distress and Horror that must be left to the Reader's Imagination:—Amon

many of them subsisted the tender and endearing Connections of Husband and Wife, Parent and Child, Brother and Sister, &c. between whom the merciless Flames were now effecting a cruel and inevitable Separation; and it was with the utmost Difficulty that a Soul on board saved his Life.— There were Eleven Passengers, viz. Mr. John Henry, Mr. William Brooks Simlon, Mr. Nathaniel Green, Mrs. Storer, Mrs. Henry, Miss Ann Storer, Miss Frances Storer, Miss Maria Storer, Miss Sarah Storer, and Mr. Henry's Two Children; One 16, the other 4 Months old; Five of whom perished in the following Manner, viz. Mrs. Storer, Miss Sarah Storer, and Mr. Henry's Two Children, being in the Cabin, were suffocated with the Smoke before the Two small Boats could be got out, they being thrown over with the utmost Difficulty, not having any Thing ready for to hoist them: Mrs. Henry was upon Deck, with her Sisters, and might have been saved with them, but, overcome with maternal Love and Affection, on hearing her Mother cry out, *The Children,—O the Children*, she ran and threw herself headlong down the Companion, into the Flames, and was there instantly consumed.— The Remainder of the People, to the Number of Twenty-one, got ashore, with Difficulty, in the Two small Boats, not without being wet in landing; some of them, the same Night, with Trouble and Fatigue, got up to the House of Mr. Silas Niles, who received them with great Humanity, and afforded them all the Assistance in his Power, as did also the Rest of the Neighbours.—The Vessel burnt till Eight o'Clock the next Day, when she sunk.

The above Brig belonged to Messrs. Evan and Francis Malbone of this Town, was upwards of 300 Tons Burthen, was allowed to be the best Vessel belonging to the Colony, and was returning from her first Voyage, with a rich and valuable Cargo, and had got within Three or Four Hours Sail of this Harbour when the above Misfortune happened. The Vessel and Cargo were valued at Four Thousand Pounds Sterling, and the Effects of the Passengers at Two Thousand Pounds Sterling.

Last Saturday a Collection was made at the Sabatarian Church, and Yesterday, at the other Churches in Town, for the Relief of the unfortunate Passengers, who are all Strangers in this Place, and entirely dependent on the Inhabitants.
