SALE OF REAL ESTATE.—On Saturday last, Mr. William Breckhead, Trustee, sold the farm belonging to Nah Hearn, situated about 2 1/2 miles from Salisbury and containing 93 acres, for \$130,000.

PROTRACTED MEETING.—A protracted meeting has been in progress at the Methodist Church at Forktown for a few days past, and, we are informed, the prospect for a considerable revival of religion is very encouraging.

SOMERSET COUNTY.

DINNER AND FESTIVAL.—The ladies of the Princess Anne Presbyterian Church served up a dinner and festival in the old Somerset Hotel on the 14th instant for the benefit of that Church. The tables were loaded with all the choicest delicacies of the season and guests were waited on by the fairest of fair hands. There were present at this festive gathering of people from all parts of Somerset county, and a tolerable sprinkling of persons from the adjoining counties. The affair was a decided success, it is to be presumed, financially as well as socially. The oyster season is now thoroughly active, and Crisfield is as lively as a busy little city.

The Court held *sub curia* the decision on the case tried this week relative to the iron master at Crisfield.

They have been having lively times at Court, political meetings, festivals, champagne &c. &c., it is to be imagined that excitement, bustle, hilarity and pleasure, such as rarely ever visit the beautiful but sleepy town, held high carnival there. Well, long may they wave!

GREAT POLITICAL MEETING.—On the 18th inst. at 3 P. M., a very large concourse of people assembled in the Court Room, at Princess Anne, to hear the great questions of the campaign discussed by eminent speakers previously announced to be present on the occasion. There were quite a number of distinguished gentlemen present, among whom may be mentioned Hon. Wm. T. Hamilton, U. S. Senator from Washington county; Dr. S. S. Smith, U. S. Senator from Somerset county; Hon. Isaac D. Jones, Hon. Levin Woodford, Col. E. C. Wilson, Hon. John W. Crisfield, Hon. James U. Dennis, Hon. L. L. Waters, John H. Bandy, Esq., and many other gentlemen well known in Maryland politics.

The meeting was formerly organized by calling Hon. James U. Dennis to the chair. Mr. Dennis made a few appropriate remarks upon assuming the chair, and then introduced Col. Wilson, who went forward and exhorted the audience to the support of the Union, the land-grading outrages, the evils of protecting monopolies, the baneful results of National Banks, and wound up with an exhortation to support Horace Greeley as the only means to break down the tyranny at Washington and to redeem the purity of the ballot box.

Col. Wilson's speech was listened to with attentive consideration, and was often interrupted by outbursts of applause.

The Hon. Wm. T. Hamilton was next introduced. Mr. Hamilton, who is in Congress and ought to know something about the doings at Washington, gave the people an insight into the enormity and nature of the corruption at that paradise for politicians, and came down on Grant's Administration with an earnestness and power for which the Senator is famous. Throughout the entire meeting the enthusiasm of the people was constantly manifested by frequent applause, and the meeting may be characterized as a success in every respect.

WORCESTER COUNTY.

The campaign in Worcester county is rather active. Col. Wilson, accompanied by other speakers, is canvassing the county pretty thoroughly, and the prospects are bright for a rousing majority.

Judge Spence delivered a speech at Newtown on Wednesday night, 11th inst. The oyster season on the Sympetex bay had opened, and oystermen are reaping a golden harvest. It is feared that the oysters in this bay will not hold out much longer.

Messrs. Payne, Jarman & Co., of Snow Hill, have moved into their splendid new store house on Pearl street.

OYSTER BOAST.—On Wednesday evening a great number of people gathered together at Rattlesnake Island, near Snow Hill, for the purpose of participating in a political meeting and an oyster roast. Col. E. C. Wilson was present and opened the ball with a telling speech, which was received with great enthusiasm by the audience. T. Howard Moore, Esq., next addressed the meeting in a happy and eloquent manner, and several other speakers, whose names we have been unable to learn, entertained the people for a considerable time with pungent, witty speeches. The Snow Hill Brass Band was present and discoursed sweet music. Then followed oysters—oysters such as might serve to tempt the satiated palate of the most fastidious epicure in Christendom—were served up roasted, and washed down with a goodly medium of the ancient. All was feasting, joviality and good cheer, and at a late hour in the night the merry party dispersed to their homes feeling that they had all had a rattling time on Rattlesnake Island. Agricultural.

How to Kill Weeds.—By attending to the following directions, weeds may be completely exterminated.

1. Study their habits. Without this, you are working in the dark. You are shooting without taking aim, and are more likely to miss than to hit.

2. Have faith that weeds can be killed.

3. Should you for the first year or two, see little benefit from your labor, do not relax your efforts. You will certainly triumph in the end. This is the experience of all gardeners, and a firm conviction of this truth is one of the strongest incentives to perseverance.

4. Be forewarned with your work. That is exceedingly important. It is so not merely because weeds can be killed easily just as they begin to grow, but it often happens that many weeds actually go to seed before they get large enough to attract attention. Chickweed (*Stellaria*) is quite a pest in many gardens. We have known it seed and grow again in the spring, in efforts to keep this little plant in check, but in vain, because the work was not commenced early enough in the spring and continued late enough in the autumn.

5. The plant would flower in the snow, and tens of thousands of seeds were matured before the ground was cultivated in the spring. The garden was worked over and hoed repeatedly during the summer, and the weed raked off (after they had gone to seed), but during the wet weather, thousands of little plants would spring up, but were not thought to be injurious, and were suffered to remain to grow all winter and seed the land again early in the spring. The gardener declared it was impossible to get rid of chickweed. And so it is with many other weeds. We could get rid of them if our labor was direct knowledge of the habits of the plants, and was applied at the right time.

Many think it impossible to free the land of couch or quick grass (*triticum repens*), and their experience tends to them to justify the opinion. But it will be found that they are not foreboded in their work. They apply labor enough, but it is late. They let the plants grow until the ground is covered with leaves of the couch, and then they hoe and cultivate, and maybe fork out as many roots as possible. But they cannot get out the whole.

The roots are broken into small pieces, and each piece produces a new plant, which soon pushes out its roots in all directions in the loose and mellow soil.

Had the work been commenced before the couch plants pushed out their leaves, and been kept up so vigorously and continuously that the young shoots could not get to the surface and the soil constantly cultivated during the hot, dry summer months, every couch plant would be destroyed. We have tried the plan, and know that couch can be effectually got rid of in this way.

But no half-way measures will succeed with it.

Burn all the thistle heads and other weeds that are cleaned out of the garden.

Many seem to think the best place to put these weeds is in the road.

The man that does it should be indicted for a nuisance.

He forgets that these weed seeds will stick to the feet of horses and other animals. Another plan is to feed these seeds to the fowls. All that are not digested will grow. If there is so much grain among the weed seeds that you do not like to bury them, but before feeding.

4. Look to the manure. This is a fruitful source of weeds, if the crops are fed the manure will certainly be full of weed seeds.

Remembering the manure will not kill these weeds unless the seeds themselves are decomposed, which is seldom the case.

5. The better plan is to pile the manure, turn it, and get it thoroughly rotted, and then apply it as a top-dressing.—London Farmer.

PEAR.—A farmer wants to know how he can grow peas free from "bugs." The only way is to sow them in the week has disappeared, which is generally about the 10th of June; at least peas sown after that time are seldom attacked when early peas are most injured.

The best peas to sow with oats for fodder is the black-eye marrowfat, or some other peas with large vines; this variety should be sown early.

Bees consume large quantities of water when building, comb and raising brood. Want of water is one of the causes of dry rot among bees. A bucket or trough filled with water, with a few pieces of old comb or sticks for the bees to alight upon and drink in safety, should be kept near the hive.

BRAN and corn-meal are comparatively cheap. A good corn should have all the food the can eat, digest, and turn into milk, and if she gains in flesh in this season it will not hurt her.
