I R E L A N D.

A succinct Account of a Set of Miscreants in the Counties of Waterford, Cork, Limerick, and Tipperary, called Boughbeelen Barvians (i. e. White Boys) the Children of Sive Oultaugh (i. e. Sarah Ulster) being an Extract of a Letter from a Gentleman residing in Youghall, to his Son in London.

THEIR first Rise was in October last, and they have ever since been increasing; they then, and all along, pretended their assembling was to do Justice to the Poor, by restoring the ancient Commons, and redressing other Grievances; for which Purpose they always assembled in the Night, with their Shirts over their Cloaths, which caused them to be called White Boys; their Number in the County of Waterford, is computed to 6 or 700. They have done infinite Damage in the County, levelling Ditches, and Stone Walls, rooting up Orchards, &c.

On the 11th ult. I saw several Ditches they had levelled, Part of an Orchard destroyed, and two Graves they had dug, on the Road between Clonmell and Coppoguin; the Graves were to hold those that did not comply with their Orders. Some Time before this, they came by Night into the Town (a large Village) of Coppoguin, where is a Horse Barrack, drew up in the Green near the Barrack, fired several Shot, and marched by the Centry with their Piper playing, The Lad with the white Cockade.

The 13th I saw a Bier, near Aftane Church, which they had caufed two Days before to be made, to carry People alive, and bury them in those Graves. An Esquire at Coppoguin, when a Bachelor, agreed with a Peasant for the Use of his Daughter, for which he paid the Peasant his Bond for 100 l. but on the Esquire's entering the matrimonial State, he was compelled to take up his Bond; Sive wrote to the Peasant to refund the Money, upon Pain of having his Tongue drawn thro' his under Jaw, and fastened with a Skewer.

On the 14th they assembled at Lismore (between Coppoguin and Tallow) posted an Advertisement on the Door of the Post Office, requiring the Inhabitants to have their Houses illuminated, and a certain Number of Horses bridled and saddled ready for them to mount against next Night, which was complied with. On the Night of the 15th they mounted, went to Tallow-Bridge (near Tallow) where they levelled the Ditches of several fine Parks, and cut down a Number of full-grown Ash-trees (Knee high, to save them the Trouble of Roofing) belonging to Mr. K—y, of the said Place; they then proceeded to Tallow; the Horse marched to the West Bridge, the Commander called out, Halt; to the Right about; and then proceeded into the Market-place in a smart Trot. They broke open the Marshalls, discharged the Debtors, sent an Advertisement to D—y F—s, the Justice, to take several Copies, and see them posted up; that a Pot or Waine of Turf should be sold for 6d. (Half the usual Price) 20 Ounces of fresh Butter, 4d. Potatoes, 2s. 8d. Halfpenny per Barrel, &c. They also sent a Letter to him, to send for the Man who built a Cock-pit for him 12 Months ago, to pay him Part of the Money he withheld from him, and also a Guinea he promised him for Expedition; all which he tamely complied with, though a Troop and an Half of Dragoons were quartered very near him.

On the 22d they came to the Ferry-point, opposite this Town, levelled the Ditches of a small Park opposite the back Window of my Parlour, and a Musket Shot off the Town; they made a large Fire, dug a Grave, and erected a Gallows over it, fired several Shot, and at each Discharge huzza'd; sent several threatening Letters to the Inhabitants of this Town, in particular to M—w P—r, an active Justice, that they would pull

down his House, and tear him to Pieces; that on the 25th they would pull down a very handsome House (within a Mile of this Town) which they said was built on Commons.

The Militia Arms were delivered to the Protestant Inhabitants, who being joined by two Companies of Foot from the Barracks, marched through the Town, and made a handsome Appearance; 70 Men mounted Guard that Night, a Party of which patrolled every two Hours to the said House: No Attempt was made. One D—s C—r, of Tallow, a Comber, came here and endeavoured to enlist another of the same Trade under Sive's Banner: He was apprehended and lodged in the Barracks, and on the 26th he was sent in the Revenue cruising Boat to Cork, to prevent a Rescue by Land; on the 27th P—k R—h, formerly a Smith to a Troop of Horse, who lived near Coppoguin, was apprehended here, supposed to have made Part of their Levelling-tools; at the same Time he gave Information against several to M—w P—r, Esq; he was sent to Cork by the same Conveyance as C—r.

The 29th, the Ditches of Tirkelling and Bally-daniel, near Tallow, belonging to M—P—, were levelled; 500 Men in a Day would not repair the Damage.

The 30th, 4 Pieces of Iron Cannon, taken out of our Fort, were placed at the North and South Gates, charged with Cartridge Shot.

The 31st, several Alarms.

April the 1st, between 7 and 8 in the Evening the Alarm was beat; after that, to Arms, a false Alarm being given, that the White Boys were within Half a Mile of the North Gate; the Town in an Uproar; by 9 all quiet; about one in the Morning the Mayor, Mr. —, and several other Gentlemen, in Number 41, well mounted and accoutred, with each a Soldier behind him, went from this to Tallow, 8 Miles distant, and before Sun-rise seized 11 White Boys, whom they brought to this Town.

The 2d, they marched them through it in their Uniforms, with Drums beating, Pipes playing, &c.

The 3d, two Brothers of the Town of Tallow, by Name K—, Shoemakers and Protestants, gave Information, upon which the Inhabitants, together with the Collector, and several Revenue Officers, equipped as before, went to Tallow, and Places adjacent, and brought to Town 13 White Boys, and lodged a Lieutenant Colonel in Tallow Barracks; his Name is Ob—n. It is said he has been some Time in the French Service. There was another Party with the Army from Cork, met at Youghall, and had seized about 25 at Lismore and Places adjacent; the Cork Informations were from P—R—, called Adjutant to the White Boys.

A Copy of the Oath taken by all Persons who enter into Sive Oultaugh's Society.

"I do hereby solemnly and sincerely swear, that I will not make known any Secret now given me, or hereafter may be given, to any one in the World, except to a sworn Person belonging to the Society called White Boys, or otherwise Sive Oultaugh's Children.

"Furthermore I swear that I will be ready at an Hour's warning (if possible) being properly summoned by any of the Officers, Sergeants, or Corporals belonging to my Company.

"Furthermore I swear I will not wrong any of the Company I belong to, of the Value of one Shilling, nor suffer it to be done by others, without acquainting them thereof.

"Furthermore I swear I will not make known in any Shape whatsoever, to any Person that does not belong to us, the Name or Names of any of our Fraternity, but particularly the Names of our respective Officers.

Lastly, I swear that I will not drink of any Liquor whatsoever, whilst on Duty, without the Consent of one or other of the Officers, Sergeants

or Corporals, and that we will be loyal one to the other as far as in our Power lies."

Cork, April 8. We are informed amidst the Ringleaders taken, is the Chief of the White Boys, or Levellers in Ireland. This desperate Person was once a Franciscan Friar, who had abjured his Religion to gain Possession of a small Estate; which having dissipated, he became a Tool of the French Ministry. It is asserted, that by the apprehending of him, the Rising will be entirely quelled.

The Rioters who have appeared for some Days past in this Country, are entirely quelled; and 27 of them, who have been most active, are committed to our Goals. We expect a special Commission speedily from England, in order to proceed to the trying of them.

A Declaration has been published in the riotous Counties, importing, that all Natives hereafter found in Arms, or assembling themselves in a riotous Manner, upon any Pretext whatever, would be looked upon, and treated as Rebels, and that no Quarter should be given them.

Since our last about 50 of the Levellers, or White Boys, have been taken in and about Lismore and Coppoguin, and are sent to Waterford Goal. Among this Number is one of their Chiefs, who assumed the Character of *Queen Sive*. On Sunday Night last a Party of the Army and Militia of Youghall made another Expedition into the Country, and took 12 Prisoners, whom they have confined in the Barrack of that Town, where there are now 23 of the Queen's Children in Durance.

Dublin, April 13. By Letters of good Authority from the Counties of Waterford, Cork, and Tipperary, we have certain Intelligence, that a Merchant at Dungarven disbursed the Sum of 15000 l. to a Person now in Custody, who was styled Muster-master and Paymaster General to the White Boys, and who from Time to Time distributed the above Sum amongst them. And it further appears, that two other Persons now in Custody have French Commissions, one as Lieutenant Colonel, and the other as Adjutant. All the Accounts from Munster agree, that the Designs of these Miscreants were of a much more dangerous Nature than we were at first taught to believe they were.

Clonmell, April 14. Last Monday eight of the White Boys were taken in a Cave near Cloghen, by a Party of Lord Drogheda's Light Horse. This Cave went a great Way under Ground, down into which they went by a Ladder, and then took the Ladder away. One of the Light Horse suspecting, from the Appearance of this Place, that some of the Levellers might have been below, insisted upon his being let down by a Rope, with a Case of Pistols in his Hand; and upon his landing below, he most undauntedly unkenneled eight of those Wretches, who instantly surrendered Prisoners.

Extract of a Letter from Ennis, dated April 11.

"As to the Levellers, or White Boys, the Goals of Limerick, Clonmell, Youghall and Waterford, are crowded with them. Lord Drogheda's Light Horse are the best Troops ever known for ridding a Country of such Vermin. We this Day received the News, that Lady Shelagh Miskell is taken, and turns out to be a brawny Priest, whose Name is Kelly. They are the most wicked Set I ever heard of, and hope to have the Pleasure of seeing a Number of them hanged. It is thought they had other Views, beside houghing and levelling. They expected (as has passed among them) a Person from abroad to head them; and if that had happened, he would, I fear, be in as bad a Way."

And to express that Satisfaction which we feel, at the pleasing Hope, that this just and necessary Augmentation should take Place during the Administration of a Chief Governor, whose many great and amiable Qualities, who's wife and happy Administration in the Government of this Kingdom, have universally endeared him to the People of Ireland.

Copy of the Address of the Lord Lieutenant to the House of Commons, February 27, 1762.

I SHALL take the first Opportunity of laying before his Majesty the Sense of the House of Commons contained in this Address. I enter fully into the truly liberal Motives, which have influenced your Conduct in this unanimous Resolution. That you are solicitous not only to support his Majesty's Government, but to support it with becoming Grandeur and Magnificence, reflects the highest Honour on yourself; that you have chosen the Time of my Administration, that you have distinguished my Person as the Object of your Favour, reflects the highest Credit on me; and I must ever consider this Event as one of the most fortunate and honourable Circumstances of my Life. Whatever Merit you ascribe to me in the Government of this Kingdom, in Reality arises from your own Conduct, though your Partiality would transfer it to mine. Your Unanimity has first created this Merit, and your Liberality would now reward it.

I am sensible of the Obligation you confer: And I can in no way properly demonstrate my Sense of it, but by being as I am, indifferently determined to improve his Majesty, that I may be permitted to enjoy it pure and unmixed with the lucrative Advantage you propose should attend it. This affectionate Address is intended as an Honour to me: That Imputation has on your part been fully answered; to make it truly honourable, something is still necessary on mine. It becomes me to vie with the Generosity of Parliament, and to kindle up an Emulation of Sentiment. It has been my Duty, in the Course of this Session, to propose large Plans of public Expense, and to promise an Attention to public Obedience; and I could not without Pain submit that the Establishment, already burthened at my Recommendation, should be further charged, for my own particular Profit.

But while I consider myself at Liberty to sacrifice my private Interests to my private Feelings, I must consider myself as bound likewise to consult, in Compliance with your enlarged and liberal Sentiments, the future Support of the Nation in which I am placed, to the Dignity of which, the Emoluments due, as you represent them, inadequate. I shall therefore, therefore, the Sense of the House of Commons, that the Augmentation which your Generosity has proposed, may it his Majesty shall think fit, be made to the Establishment of my Successor, when he shall enter on the Government of this Kingdom, and when it is probable, the Circumstances of this Country may be better able to support such additional Burthen. But while I must decline accepting any Part of the Profits, I rejoice to charge myself with the whole of the Obligation: Abundantly happy, if, when I shall hereafter be removed from this high, and thro' your Favour delectable Situation, I should leave it, thro' your Liberality, augmented in it's Emoluments, and by my Inability not diminished in it's Reputation.

L O N D O N,

April 15. A Letter from on board his Majesty's Ship Republic, dated off the Isle of Grenada, February 1, 1762, says: "Last Wednesday being at Anchor in one of the Bays of this Island, our Commander, Capt. Allen, sent on Shore 12 Men to cut Wood for the Ship's Use, which they did that Day without being molested, or giving any Offence to the People of the Island; but finding the same Number of Men a second Time, immediately on the Boat's landing, a Volley of small Arms was fired upon our People from among the Bushes, which killed or wounded the greatest Part of them, who had not Time to take to their Arms before about 40 French rushed upon them, and notwithstanding their surrendering and asking Quarter, it was refused, the French continuing to cut and hack them in a most barbarous Manner, particularly our Midshipman, who commanded the Boat, and had received a Shot in the Body, and who was begging for Mercy on his Knees, when one of the Villains struck him on the Face with a Cutlass, and cut one of his Cheeks almost off, and instantly another fired his Piece at him, and the Ball of it went through his Hat; but this not doing the Business intended, he received a most violent Blow on the Stomach with the Butt End of a Mallet. The rest of our Boats had now reached the Shore, and the French made off into the Woods.

"On the Crews of these Boats landing, a most shocking Spectacle presented itself: Six of their Shipmates they found dead on the Beach, barbarously butchered with the Axes that were intended to cut Wood with; and on their going a little further, they found the Midshipman, and three others, dying of their Wounds; the other seven we have no Account of, and it is feared they have suffered the same Fate.

"Such Cruelty from an Enemy whom we have always treated with the greatest Lenity, I hope will not go unpunished."

B O S T O N, June 14.

Last Friday Morning, about One o'Clock, a Fire broke out at the Bake House of Mr. George Bray, at the upper End of William's Court, in Cornhill, which had got to such a Head before it was discovered, that the same, together with his Dwelling-House, all the Furniture, Bedding, Cloaths, &c. with about 150 Barrels of Flour, were wholly consumed; the Family having but just Time to save themselves—the Fire being communicated to most of the Dwelling-Houses, Barns, and Out-Houses, in said Court, with other Buildings contiguous, they were soon in Flames—the Place where the Fire began was confined, and difficult of Access, but the Engines of the Town, together with those of Charlestown and Castle William, which kindly assisted, being in excellent Order for playing, and the Fire Officers and Inhabitants, encouraged by his Excellency the Governor, exerting themselves to a great Degree, a Stop was put, thro' the Favour of Divine Providence, to the Progress of the devouring

Flames much sooner than our Fears suggested; as it is, much Substante has been lost, and several Families turned out of their Dwellings, but no Lives were lost.—It is melancholy to observe what a considerable Part of this Metropolis has been destroyed, and how many new Objects of Charity have been created by these repeated Disasters; this being the third considerable Fire, besides the great one, which happened in the Town within the short Space of three Years.

The following Families, who lived in the Court, are by this terrible Accident now burnt out, viz. Mr. George Bray, Mr. John Popkins, Widow Salter, Mrs. Jane Day, Capt. Arthur Noble, Mr. Samuel Hornbrook, Mr. Eph. Gooden, Jun. Mr. Benjamin Loring, Widow Gould, Mr. John Barker, and Mr. John Barker.

We hear from London that the Petition of the Sufferers in the Great Fire to his Majesty, has been graciously received, and we still flatter ourselves that they may in proper Time be recommended for Parliamentary Relief.

N E W - Y O R K, June 21.

Wednesday last the Harriot Snow Packet Boat, Captain Bonelli, left this Port with the Mail for Falmouth.

The same Day eleven Sail of Transports arrived here from Martinique, in 20 Days Passage, having the Sails and Wounded Officers and Soldiers on board; viz. the True Briton, Black Prince, Elizabeth and Mary, Mary the Second, Two Brothers, Rachel, Ship James, Brig James, Hope, and the Family. Since which two others arrived here.

Another Fleet of Men of War and Transports are preparing for Sea, the Men embarking as fast as possible, but where bound is not yet publicly known.

Thursday Night last Capt. Mitchell arrived here from Jamaica; 27 Days before he came in, he met with, off Baracoa, the 1st Fleet under the Command of Admiral Pocock, who a few Days before was joined by that under the Command of Sir James Douglas, from Jamaica, having on board 2000 Negro Soldiers; and from the Course they steered, he was pretty certain they were bound to the Havannah, from which Place, when he left them, he supposed them to be about 150 Leagues.

By Letters from South-Carolina we learn, that 30 Days ago War was not declared at Augustine against England; although they were very busy in fitting out Privateers to cruise against the English, no less than one Polacca, three Sloops, and two Schooners, being almost ready for the Sea; and that 2 Sloops and a Men of War, having 3000 Land Forces on board, lately arrived there from the Havannah.

P H I L A D E L P H I A, June 24.

Yesterday was launched by Messieurs Thomas and James Pennock, the Privateer H E R O, a Ship of 95 Feet Keel, and 32 Feet Beam, and mounts Twenty-four Nine-pounders on one Deck. She has been on the Stocks only Seventy-three Days, and is reckoned the finest Vessel, for that Purpose, that ever was built in America.

An Extract of a Letter from St. Pierre, in Martinique, dated May 14, 1762.

"We had a most terrible Earthquake last Night, tho' no Damage has been done; it consisted of three Shocks, each less severe than the others, and at about Half an Hour's Distance—I did not quit my Bed, though almost thrown out of it by the first Shock, which awoke me, and was very terrible, on Account of the strange rumbling Noise which accompanied it; the Earth trembled violently for five Minutes after it, while the Noise gradually died away: All the French quit their Houses. I do not exaggerate, when I compare the first Shock of my House to a Chair being pushed violently from you, and as violently drawn back; every Beam in it cracked; but as the House is of Wood, I thought it safer to be still, and depend on the Bed-posts, than to endeavour at an Escape, for I had no Hopes that the Houses would not fall."

The Brigantine Little Bob, from Maryland for Cork, was lost on the Irish Coast.

On Monday last Captain Green (late Commander of a Ship from London to Boston) came to Town from Virginia. He sailed in Company with the London Ships that lately arrived here, but was taken, off the Banks of Newfoundland, by a French Frigate from Brest, said to be designed for this Coast. The Day after Capt. Green was taken a light Snow for Virginia was also taken by the same Frigate, and reformed for Three Hundred Pounds Sterling, into which the Prisoners were put, and the Vessel proceeded for Virginia. Captain Green's Cargo was said to be worth Thirty Thousand Pounds Sterling.

Yesterday arrived here Captain Long from New-Province, by whom there is no particular Account of Admiral Pocock's Fleet; but that it was generally thought it was before the Havannah.

A N N A P O L I S, July 1.

Tuesday last, after a long Drought, we had several very refreshing Showers of Rain: In the Afternoon it was accompanied with a high Wind, Lightning and Thunder. The Lightning struck a tall Sycamore Tree near a Gentleman's House in Town, and split out a small piece from the Top to the Root.

Several Vessels are arrived here from the West-Indies since our last; but none of them bring us any Advice from Cuba.

The Chesterfield Man of War was not arrived in Hampton Road about Five Days ago.

Munster, April 21. This Moment we hear, that the Castle of Arensburg was taken the 19th at 2 o'Clock in the Afternoon. The following is the Account we have received of what passed on that Occasion. Our Batteries were first mounted on the 18th Instant at 11 o'Clock in the Forenoon; upon which the French Commandant, M. Muret, offered to capitulate, on Condition to march out of the Place on the 21st with all the Military Honours, in case he was not relieved during that Interval of Time. As it was known that the French Troops were in Motion, this Delay could not be granted him on the Part of his Serene Highness. The Night between the 18th and 19th every thing was quiet on both Sides; but on the 19th, at 6 o'Clock, the Morning, our Batteries began to play. At 9 o'Clock, before any Part of the Place was set on Fire, the Hereditary Prince ordered an Offer to be made to the Commandant, to march out with all the Military Honours, and two Pieces of Cannon; but M. Muret having haughtily declined this, we began to redouble our Fire; and about Noon the Castle was in flames, and the Town likewise, which increased in a short Time to that Degree, that M. Muret cried out for Mercy; and getting over the Walls of the Castle with his Garrison, surrendered at Discretion, to the Number of 9 Officers, and 231 private Men, and 26 Pieces of Cannon. The Enemy had not one single Man killed, nor we neither; but a Captain of the British Legion has had his Legs shot off.

Hamburg, April 20. We have received Advice, that a Cession of Arms, for two Months, was signed the 7th Instant at Ribnitz, in the Duchy of Mecklenburgh Schwerin, by the Prince of Wertheimburg on the Part of his Prussian Majesty, and by Lieut. Gen. Eusebiuswerdt on that of the King of Sweden. A separate Convention was likewise agreed upon the same Day at Ribnitz, for the free Intercourse of Commerce, both by Sea and Land, which was signed by the Prussian Lieutenant-Colonel L. Homme de Courbierre, and by the Swedish Adjutant-General de Gievenhagen, and the first Auditor Fischer.

The Danish Army keeps the same Position near Lubeck; and the Head-Quarters are still at Morie.

Hague, April 25. The French Troops along the Rhine, have been for some Days past in Alarm, upon an Excursion made by the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick, the Detail of which is not yet come in: We are informed, however, in the mean while, that his Serene Highness had attacked the Castle of Arensburg on the 19th; after some Firing, he offered the Honours of War to Muret, the Commanding Officer, and his Garrison, which he refused; and the Firing being renewed, he was in a few Hours afterwards obliged to surrender at Discretion. The French looked upon this Post as very important for their Communication between Wesel and Düsseldorf; and the Loss of it will be very inconvenient to them, whilst they are preparing to open the Campaign.

Hamburg, April 13. The Head-Quarters of the Count de St. Germain, Commander in Chief of the Danish Troops, are now at Morie, about Half a German Mile from Lubeck.

Hague, April 16. The Light Troops of his Majesty's Army in Westphalia have been lately very successful in several Skirmishes with the Enemy. The Hereditary Prince of Brunswick was marching from Munster, as we hear by the last Letters, upon some Expedition.

Ratisbon, April 15. Letters from Vienna, and other Places, advise, that the two Armies which the Empress Queen will have in the Field before the End of this Month, will be composed of 125,000 Men; that the Principal will be in Saxony, where they will join the 12,000 commanded by Prince Xavier, and the Army of the Empire, which, at most, will consist of 6000 Men. This makes 133,000 Men at the Disposal of the Court of Vienna, which will be augmented by some new Corps furnished by Hungary, and the Hereditary Countries belonging to the House of Austria, which will serve to supply the Losses which are the inseparable Consequences of every Campaign. The Prussian Forces consist in all of 122,000 Men.

Cadix, April 1. We have just received Advice, that the Court of Lisbon has at length given a definitive Answer to that of Madrid. We have not yet learned the Particulars of it; but it is certain that the Spanish Minister at Lisbon has left that Court without taking Leave; from which it is easy to know the Side which the Most Excellent Majesty has taken.

LONDON, April 20.

Yesterday there was an Express from the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, which, we are well assured, brings Advice, that the Rioters there are quite dispersed, that near 100 of them were taken, and the Whole afraid of each other; that those who assumed any Command amongst them, will be immediately tried, and, if proved guilty, be executed; and the others disposed of in such Manner as will best secure the Tranquillity of that Kingdom.

A special Commission is absolutely gone to Dublin for the Trials of the Rioters, among whom are a Franciscan Friar, and six or seven Priests.

The Embarcations and Tools of the French and Spaniards, are very assiduous in asserting that they intended an Invasion of some Part of his Majesty's Dominions; this seems to be only like the last Efforts of a desperate Gamester; but that they will ever be able to effect it, seems highly improbable. The French have no more than 9 Ships of the Line, and two Frigates at Rochfort, which are watched by Lord Howe, and as they have no other Fleet to cover an Embarkation, their flat-bottomed Boats without one would only come to certain Destruction. The greatest Danger seems from the Spaniards; but when it is considered that by their own Accounts they have only 10 or 12 Men of War at Ferrol, and those not well manned, that Force is but trifling, compared with our own in the Channel. And Admiral Saunders will doubtless look after those at Cadix, where is said to be their chief Force in Europe, and prevent any others from joining them at any distant Ports.

We are assured, that his Majesty has received very agreeable News from the Court of Denmark, and that, in all Probability, his good Offices will prevent a Rupture between that Court and Russia; in Consequence of which, we may hope for a speedy Peace in Germany, as it will be Madness in the Empress Queen to attempt to carry on the War against the King of Prussia, now he has got 70,000 Men extraordinary to join that Army which alone kept all her Troops at Bay last Campaign.

April 22. The Amsterdam Gazette informs us, that all the Officers of the Neapolitan Troops were ordered to join their Troops in three Days, on Pain of being cashiered; that several Regiments were to be sent to Sicily; and that the Batteries erected to defend the Coast of Naples are finished, and planted with Cannon.

Private Letters from Lisbon advise, that the King of Portugal has 10 Sail of Men of War of the Line in the Tagus; and 40,000 Men marching towards the Frontiers of Spain; and notwithstanding which, a general Opinion prevailed that a Neutrality would soon take place between the Spaniards and Portuguese.

The Troops designed for Portugal are in Readiness for Embarkation, from which Time they are to be paid by the King of Portugal, after the same Rate as the English Establishment.

According to some Accounts from Spain, the Land Forces of that Monarchy amounted to 30,000 Men at the present of that Monarchy to the Throne, but now consist of 140,000. The last Letters from Breslau assert, that the King of Prussia was in perfect Health, and appeared daily upon the Parade, having recruited his Army in an extraordinary Manner. These Letters add, that he was casting Cannon, &c. all the Winter: And that it was expected he would open the Campaign the Beginning of this Month with as fine an Army as ever.

April 24. By Advices from the Hague we learn, that the Differences between Denmark and Russia were nearly adjusted, and that under the Mediation of Great-Britain and Prussia; and that a Negotiation is in great Forwardness for an Alliance, in Consequence of which Denmark is to furnish England with 12 Ships of the Line and Frigates, and to put into British Pay 25,000 Danes, who are to join the Allied Army; that England is to pay Denmark Fifteen Millions of Florins (about 1,250,000 l. Sterling) which Money will be paid again by Denmark to the Emperor of Russia, who is willing to give up his Claim to Holstein in Consideration of a certain Sum of Money, the Remainder of which is to be paid at the Terms settled in the Treaty now on the Carpet.

Other Letters inform us, that a Treaty of Peace between Russia and Prussia is at length actually signed; that Denmark hath nothing further to apprehend, since the Russian Troops had received Orders to march back immediately against the Coronation, at which Time there were Fears of some Disturbances arising.

It is now reported, that only two British Brigades will be withdrawn from Germany, which are to be sent to Portugal. General Cornwallis's Baggage is put on board a Man of War, and he is speedily to embark for his Government of Gibraltar.

We hear that Dispatches of great Consequence are received from Portugal, which occasioned the Meeting of the Council Yesterday; and it is said, that a Resolution is taken to send thither an additional Body of Troops, which are ordered to be in Readiness to embark. They are to be conveyed thither by Sir Edward Hawke.

Advices from Versailles bring a Confirmation, that a Body of French Troops is to be sent to Spain, and fix it at 7 Regiments, making 13 Battalions.

Yesterday a Number of eight and twelve Inch Mortars, Colours, Handspikes, and divers other Sorts of military Implements, were put on board Barges at the Tower Wharf,

which fell down with the Afternoon Tide, to ship the same on board the Transport Vessels that are under sailing Orders for Gibraltar.

The Friendship, Baird, from Glasgow to Virginia, is taken by the Emerald and Pearl, two French Frigates, and carried into Rochelle.

On the 12th Instant the House of Commons in Ireland ordered, "That a Committee be appointed to enquire into the Causes and Progress of the subsisting Popish Insurrection in the Province of Munster, and to consider of a most effectual Means to prevent the like for the Future."

We hear that by the Treaty lately concluded between our Court and Portugal, the Troops which are going, from hence, for the Defence of that Kingdom, are to remain in the Pay of his Portuguese Majesty for three Years, certain.

The Remainder of the 12,000 Troops going to Portugal, are ordered to be embarked with the utmost Expedition, his Portuguese Majesty having most earnestly requested immediate Assistance from England.

Some Letters from Lisbon assert, that his Portuguese Majesty has openly declared himself in Favour of the English Nation.

The last Letters from Lisbon, dated the 7th, advise, that Lord Tyrrawley was set out from thence, to examine the Fortifications of the Frontier Towns of that Kingdom, and to put them in a proper Posture of Defence.

The Captain, a 70 Gun Ship, and the Princess Mary of 60, are sitting at Chatham with all possible Expedition, to go and lie in Sea-Reach, for the Defence of the River.

April 27. The Leyden Gazette says, the Spanish Troops entered the Kingdom of Portugal the 6th of this Month.

It is now said for certain, that the Allied Army will speedily be reinforced by a very considerable Body of Russians and Prussians, to act as Occasion shall require.

Some Letters from Ratisbon, by this Day's Mail, give an Account, that the Court of Vienna resolving to continue the War, has acceded to the Alliance between France and Spain.

There is Advice from Cadix, that after a Council of War held at that Place, Orders were given for fitting out 12 Fireships.

From Ratisbon they write, that there are no Hopes of an Accommodation between the Empress Queen and the King of Prussia.

The Advices by this Mail seem to confirm, that the Differences between Denmark and Russia will be amicably accommodated.

The Hague Gazette says, that on Wednesday last, the 21st Inst. a Dunkirk Privateer, commanded by Capt. Wilde, of 2 Guns, and 25 Men, with an English Prize in Company, being chased by an English Vessel, ran ashore with her Prize at Schevening, Half a League from the Hague. The English Captain, perceiving that it would be impossible to seize the Privateer, or save the Prize, manned his long Boat, and set Fire to the Privateer, the Crew of which had left her, and gone to the Hague.

Advice has been received that Admiral Cornish had sailed from Madras in August last, with Land Forces on board, to attack the French Islands of Bourbon and Mauritius, in Conjunction with a Fleet and Land Forces from England, under the Command of Commodore Keppel (those which were employed against Belleisle) but on his Arrival off the Isle of Bourbon, not meeting the Reinforcement he expected, he steered to the Cape of Good Hope.

The Shannon Man of War, Captain Brathwaite, met a Ship near the Isle of Wight, bound from Cadiz to Holland, with several English Passengers on board. Capt. Brathwaite took the Passengers on board his own Ship, and brought them to Portsmouth. These Gentlemen say, they sailed from Cadiz the 29th ult. and that a Ship was arrived there from the Havannah, with an Account, that the Distemper, called the black Vomits, raged amongst the Spanish Sailors on board their Fleet, and had carried off great Numbers.

Col. Graham's Regiment of Highlanders is marched for the West of Scotland, in order to embark for Ireland.

In the Night between the 3d and 4th Inst. the Stage Wagon between Cologne and Frankfurt was robbed by a Gang of Banditti well armed, of Money and Jewels to the Amount of 45,000 Florins; 10,000 of which the Elector of Trier was sending to his Troops in the Army of the Empire.

They write from Mamburg, that from the 6th to the 18th of March, upwards of 1200 Persons at Warsaw were carried off by Fevers.

By Letters from Lisbon, dated the 6th Inst. by the Hind Man of War, we have an Account, that his Portuguese Majesty had declared, that he would abide by the Treaties subsisting between him and the Court of Great-Britain, and that Spain might pursue what Means she thought proper; but, if her Designs were to attack him, he would defend himself in the best Manner he was able; the same Letters add, that the Portuguese, have 20,000 Men in Arms (exclusive of those already marched to the Frontiers) which will be encamped in the Heart of the Kingdom, to be ready to act as Occasion shall require.

Letters from Lisbon of the 5th Instant advise, that the Portuguese Court of Admiralty has appointed a great Number of Land Men, to take Possession of the Island of Madeira, which was formerly in the Possession of the French, in order to proceed to Seizure, to all the French Ships, which may be found there.

April 27. The King has given Orders, that his Chaplain, in waiting do attend him, and the Queen (who now begins to understand the English Language) every Evening, to perform Divine Service in their own private Apartments; and it is to be hoped this pious, and very excellent Example will be followed by the Nobility, and those who love to imitate the Great, or have a regard to their own, or Family's present or future Happiness.

We hear a great many Gentlemen are going Volunteers on the Expedition now fitting out, under the Command of Sir Edward Hawke.

It is said Advice is received, that the seven Men of War, which about three Months since suddenly departed from Portsmouth, are arrived off Jamaica, under the Command of Admiral Sir Piercy Brett, who has joined Commodore Fortescue; in that there is now 15 Sail of the Line off there, besides Frigates. These, with those under Admirals Rodney and Pocock, if he joins them, will make 40 Sail of the Line of Battle Ships, besides 15 Frigates, and all within five Days Sail of each other.

Letters from Madrid of the 30th ult. say, that as the Court of Portugal listened to the Insinuations of Lord Tyravley, his Catholic Majesty would be obliged to order his Troops to enter the Portuguese Territories; and that they only waited for the Return of a Messenger, who they expected from Lisbon in 4 or 5 Days from the above Date, with his Most Faithful Majesty's final Answer for whom he will declare.

Letters from France, by the Way of Holland, advise, that the Artificers at Brest are working at double Pay, in preparing a great Number of Boats on a new Construction, quite different from any Plan yet invented; they are to carry 500 Men each, and 12 Guns: They likewise add, that several more are preparing at Dunkirk, Rochfort, &c. and all on different Constructions.

Private Letters from Paris say, that they are very confident there, that the Spaniards will be soon Masters of Portugal; and comfort themselves greatly in supposing, that such Conquest will be so fatal a Blow to our Commerce, and have such an Effect on our public Funds, as will enable us for continuing the War, and compel us to offer such Terms of Peace as their Grand Monarque shall think reasonable.

Extract of a Letter from Pool, dated April 28.
"By a Person lately arrived here from Havre de Grace, we are informed, that the French have in that Port several small bottomed Boats, which are 31 Feet in Breadth, and proportionably in Length, carrying each two 24-Pounders, discharging 3 Feet Water, and rigged in the Dutch Fashion; but it is thought they cannot live at Sea. They were strongly talk of invading England, and their Soldiers are promised great Rewards."

Extract of a Letter from the Hague, April 27.
"The Affairs that both just now depend at Schevening, between a French Privateer, and an English Frigate, make a great Noise at this Place, not only on account of the Frigate of the English to cut in Pieces several of the Inhabitants of Schevening, who were endeavouring to save the Frigate, and other Effects on board the Privateer, when she was set on Fire, but on account of the Insinuation of the Neutrality of this Republic. We daily expect a Memorial in the Part of France, demanding Satisfaction for this Violation of our Neutrality, and an Intimation of the Losses which the French Capt. may have suffered."

"There must be interesting Negotiations in the Capital; for five Men of War of 20 Guns have passed through this Place, going and coming from different Courts. And as a certain Court is labouring to establish a separate Peace, a general Peace will perhaps be concluded before it is little expected. Some People even assert, that a Negotiation is actually set on Foot between France and England, by Means of a Person of Distinction, who was a Prisoner of War at London."

"Mean while they write from Paris, that the Court certainly radiates a Defiant in Scotland; and that for this End they were equipping the necessary Shipping with all possible Speed."

Letters from Offend, of the 13th Instant mention, that a Frigate going out of Dunkirk the 9th, was taken by one of our Cruisers within Sight of that Place, and no Ships would venture out to her Assistance.

His Majesty's Ship the Hind is arrived at Portsmouth from Gibraltar, last from Lisbon, which she left the 10th Instant. She brings an Account, that the Ambassador from Spain had left that Court, and that the Spanish Troops were but four Miles from the Frontiers of Portugal, and that the Portuguese Army was about four Miles from the Boundaries.

The last Advices from Vienna inform us, that all Thoughts of an Accommodation with his Prussian Majesty were, for the present, laid aside, and that the Empress Queen was making the utmost Efforts to have such an Army in the Field this Campaign, as might compensate for the Defection of the Russians and Swedes; and that the Imperial Troops would be joined by a considerable Corps of French Forces.

It is affirmed that there is Advice in Town, which confirms the Account of the Spaniards having entered the Kingdom of Portugal, and consequently declared War; however, it is certain that many People, who have had Orders for different Sorts of Goods, have stopped their Hands, not choosing to send them at such a critical Juncture.

A Peasant lately died in Poland in the 137th Year of his Age. He was in his 50th Year when he married his first Wife, with whom he lived 58 Years, and had by her six Children. He married again within a Year after her Death, and by this Second Wife had seven Children. She died, after living with him 55 Years. Since her Death he has lived 24 Years a Widower. During the whole Course of his long Life he had never been ill, and in the coldest Seasons was always lightly clothed. Till within 12 Years of his Death he constantly worked as a Day Labourer, and his Appetite failed him only Eight Days before he died. A short Illness then put an End to his Life.

Admiralty-Office, April 21. Captain Hotham, of his Majesty's Ship the *Atlas*, in his Letter, dated the 12th Instant at Sea, gives an Account, that on the 7th, being in Company with his Majesty's Ship the *Brilliant*, upon a Cruise to the Westward, they fell in with, and took, the Malouin Privateer of St. Malou, of 12 Guns, and 83 Men: And at the same Time retook the *Elizabeth* and *Anne* of London, W. Gouland, Master, from Maryland, laden with Tobacco, which was a Prize to the above-mentioned Privateer. They have also taken the *Corieux* Privateer, belonging to St. Malou, of 6 Guns, and 33 Men; and have sent them all to Plymouth.

Brigsh, April 24. Last Sunday his Majesty's Frigate the *Polus* arrived at Plymouth from a Cruise, and brought in the Malouin Privateer, of St. Malou, of 12 Guns, and 83

Men; and another Privateer of 6 Guns, and 22 Men; also a Ship from Maryland, Prize to the Malouin, which she retook.

The four Packet Boats that were detained in Spain, are arrived at Falmouth, by Permission of that Court. It is said all the English Ships detained in that Kingdom will soon be released.

By the above Packets there is Advice, that several great Dons have been taken into Custody, for speaking too freely of the War between England and Spain.

Tuesday arrived at Plymouth his Majesty's Ship *Burford*, Capt. Gambier, from a Cruise, and has brought in a Spanish Ship, called *Ignio*, of 250 Tons, from St. Domingo, laden with Sugar, Coffee, and Indigo.

DUBLIN, April 17.

Extract of a Letter from Waterford, April 8.
Last Night 58 Marines made their Escape out of an armed Ship at Passage; this was done about 8 o'clock in the Evening. They broke open the Arms-Chest, and took out Cutlasses and Pistols, and have made their Way towards Carrick. They were seen early this Morning, headed by a desperate White Boy, who was dressed as a Marine, and directed. A Party of the Army went immediately in Pursuit of them. Ten of the White Boys were first seen Yesterday Morning, properly guarded, two of whom had Commisions in their Papers when taken, but cannot learn by whom they were seized. Their Regiment was *Water, faced with Red and Blue*.

Since the above, we hear that the Party of Soldiers who pursued these Fellows had taken a Number of them, and also that the Army are so situated, that not one of the Levellers can possibly escape being taken.

ST. JAGO DE LA VEGA (in JAMAICA) May 15.

We learn that on the 6th Instant, 7 Sail of our Fleet, under the Command of Capt. Hervey, were cruising off Cape Francois, waiting for the coming out of the French Fleet, consisting of 6 Sail of the Line, and three Frigates, which were unmoored, and going to sail, but on a sudden returned to their old Moorings; owing, it is believed, to Intelligence being given them of our Fleet.

May 22. Since our last arrived at Port Royal, the French Sloop of War, from a Cruise off Cuba; the brings Advice, that the Spaniards are strongly fortifying every defensive Part of the Island, having some Time ago had Information of the Design against the Havannah; they bring that they will defend that Island much longer, than their Confederates the French did Martinico.

Arrived at Port Royal, the Penzance Man of War; she sailed with Commodore Douglass, but the Deck falling in, by Means of some of her Beams giving Way, rendered her unfit for the Service.

BOSTON, June 21.

Extract of a Letter from a Gentleman at Lisbon, dated April 28, 1762.

"The Spaniards Behaviour to this Country, which must now become a Principal in the War, and the Demands made by France and Spain upon this Court, not being submitted to, their Ambassadors are therefore retired; and we expect daily that War will be declared, and Hostilities begin upon the Frontiers, where the Portuguese have collected 40,000 Men for their Defence; to help them wherein the English must of Course be at the Expence of lending their Assistance; to which End a Body of Forces is soon expected from England and Ireland. As the Cause is so just, we may venture to place our Confidence in the Protection of Heaven, and to flatter ourselves that our Enemies will be baffled in their iniquitous Schemes.—It is a disagreeable Circumstance to be situated so near a Seat of War; but there is no Remedy but to submit patiently to our Fate, and to hope that as few bad Consequences as possible will result from it. Under all Circumstances and Situations, I shall ever remain, with much Truth, &c."

Capt. Sooms, in whom the above Letter came, left Lisbon the fourth of May, and informs, that six Sail of Transports, with British Troops on board, were already arrived there, and that others were daily expected.—That it was reported Admiral Saunders, with his Fleet, had blocked up the Port of Cadix, and that they expected soon to hear he was in Possession of that Place.

NEW-YORK, June 24.

Yesterday arrived here in 27 Days from Jamaica, the Brig *Pompey*, Captain Goodwin; the Brig *—*, Capt. Webb; the Sloop *—*, Captain Kerleed; and the Sloop *—*, Capt. Dobson: They came under Convoy of the Britannia Privateer, Captain M'Pherson of Philadelphia. Capt. Goodwin fell in with these Vessels off Cape Nicholas, where he also spoke with the Deptford Man of War, about the 3d Instant, who informed him of the Junction and Destination of the Fleets under Sir George Pocock, and Sir James Douglass, which united make 211 Sail, of which 29 are Ships of the Line, and 15 Frigates, having on board 12,000 Regular Forces, &c. Commodore Douglass also carried with him from Jamaica 2500 Slaves, and 150 free Negroes, as Buth Cutters, Rangers, &c. the whole bound to the Havannah; an English Cutter was stationed in the Old Straits, where she was to ply, and advise the Admiral if any Fleet appeared.

By Letters from Jamaica, we learn that the French Squadron which sailed from Brest the 23d of January last, consisting of 7 Ships of the Line, and 4 Frigates, are now blocked up by an English Squadron off Cape Francois.

WILLIAMSBURG, June 25.

We are informed, from undoubted Authority, that the Report of the *Chesterfield* being gone to the West-Indies is altogether groundless; Nothing new having happened to contradict the Purport of Captain Scaife's Letter, as published in our Paper of the 4th Instant.

PHILADELPHIA, July 1.

From Charles-Town, in South-Carolina, we learn, that Captain Oliver, in a Privateer belonging to Providence, brought Advice, that the Richmond Frigate, with all the Bahamian Pilots on board, that were carried to Jamaica by the Bonetta, had been reconnoitring and surveying the Old Straits of Bahama, and the whole Track, quite to the Havannah, and was returned to join Sir George Pocock, on the Coast of Hispaniola, where a prodigious Armament was assembling: That all the Shipping in Cuba were embargoed: And that there was Reason to believe an Embargo was likewise laid on all the Ports of Hispaniola about the Middle of May.

From Barbados there is Advice, that the Renown, Captain Nelson, from Liverpool, had arrived at that Island, and carried in with him a French Snow, from Bourdeaux for the Cape, laden with Wine and Bale Goods.

Captain Tucker, from South-Carolina, off of the Capes of Virginia, met with a Sloop that had sunk, but could not discover to what Port she belonged.

Captain Dewar, from Jamaica, arrived here on Tuesday last—Seventeen Days before his Arrival, he spoke with the Portsmouth Man of War, Captain Kingman, off of Cape-Nichola, who informed him, that Admiral Pocock, with 33 Sail of the Line, and about 170 Transports had then been some Time before the Havannah.

Saturday last arrived here the Britannia Privateer, Captain M'Pherson, from a Cruise, and brought up with him two Prize Sloops, laden with Sugar, Coffee and Indigo, bound to St. Eustatius and Coracoa, from Hispaniola.—They are supposed to be valuable Vessels.

Captain M'Pherson was informed of the following Particulars, relating to the Engagement he had lately with a very large Spanish Ship, off of Lagaira, by a Vessel that was there when the Spaniard arrived, viz. That she was from Spain, said to be very rich, and mounted 24 Nine-pounders: That 16 of her Men were killed in the Action: That her Captain lost his Right arm: That many others lost their Legs and Arms: And that as the Ship had had a very narrow Escape, Twenty Maf-fes had been laid on the Occasion.

Saturday last the Ship *Anne*, Capt. Fortin, arrived here from Bristol, which he left the 5th of May. He sailed under Convoy of His Majesty's Ship *Loo*, of 32 Guns, Taylor Penny, Esq; Commander, in Company with 19 Sail of other Merchantmen, for different Ports; among which were Captain Cleague for this Port; Taylor and Lewis for New-York; Kennedy and Davis for Boston; and Dixon and Watkins for Virginia. On the 12th ult. the *Loo* gave Chase to, came up with, and after a short Engagement took, the Jupiter Privateer of Bayonne, of 22 Guns, out 14 Days, but had taken nothing. The Captain of the Privateer informed Captain Penny, that having Notice of the Time the Bristol Fleet intended to sail, he and six others (one of which mounted 32 Guns) failed to intercept them, and being in great Hopes of Success, were provided with Men and spare Officers, of which the Jupiter had four Captains, ten Lieutenants, and many Cadets on board.—This Privateer has been very successful, having taken, it is said, 63 Prizes this War; and had been often chased by our Men of War, but being a remarkable fast Sailer, always escaped.

On the 14th of May Captain Penny spoke with a Vessel from Lisbon for Cork, the Master of which informed him, that the Spanish Ambassador had left the Court of Portugal; that War was expected daily to be declared betwixt the two Courts; and that the Ferrol Fleet had failed.

ANNAPOLIS, July 8.

Friday last, CHARLES GOLDSBOROUGH, Esq; one of the Representatives for Dorchester County, was sworn in one of his Lordship's Honourable Council of State in this Province, and took his Seat at the Board accordingly.

Early Yesterday Morning, a Fire broke out in a Dwelling-House belonging to Michael Macazani.

Esq; which has discovered, that No Body lived in bak'd in the D taken Fire from Inhabitants, and was prevented. Yesterday the Belt, arrived at Libon

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Esq; which had got to such a Head before it was discovered, that it entirely consumed the same. No Body lived in it, but as the Oven had been bak'd in the Day before, it is supposed to have taken Fire from thence. By the Vigilance of the Inhabitants, and Assistance of the Fire-Engine, it was prevented from spreading any further.

Yesterday the Ship *Dragon*, Captain Middleton, arrived here in Six Weeks from Lisbon.

Extract of a Letter from an English Gentleman at Lisbon, to his Correspondent here:

Lisbon, 19th May, 1762.

As to Public Affairs of this Kingdom, we, as well as most others, flattered ourselves that the Spaniards never would so very unjustly, and without the least Shadow of Reason, attack a Neutral Nation that had never given them Offence; but were greatly disappointed in our Expectations; for the 27th of last Month both the Spanish and French Ministers left this Court, and the 11th Instant the Spaniards entered the Frontiers in an hostile Manner, on the North, near to Miranda. Since that several Expresses have come to Town, and we hear they have not yet begun to attack the Place. Two of our Regiments are arrived from Ireland, and 5000 Men more are daily expected from Belleisle, which, when united to 45,000 Men the Portuguese have in the Field, we hope will be able to frustrate the Designs of the Spaniards. What ever Progress they may make towards the North, we don't apprehend they will ever be able to interrupt the Commerce of this Metropolis.

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OXFORD, April 30.

YESTERDAY BENJAMIN FRANKLIN, Esq; of
Pennsylvania, eminent for his many extraordinary
Improvements in Electrical Experiments, was presented by

At the same Time his Son, who has also distinguished
himself in the same Branch of natural Knowledge, was
presented to the Honorary Degree of Master of Arts.

BOSTON, June 23.

Yesterday arrived here Captain Morton, in 31 Days from
Figueras, in Portugal, and informs that the Spaniards had
commenced Hostilities against the Portuguese, and had taken
two or three of their unguarded Towns, though War had not
been declared on either Side: That most of the Troops ex-
pected from England were arrived at Lisbon, and were pre-
paring to march against the Spaniards: And that the Day
after he sailed, he was chased by a Man-of-War for 36
Hours, which at last came up with him, and proved to be
English, who informed him, That they had Advice that the
Spaniards had a Design to attack Oporto, and that he,
with 5 other Men of War, were bound to its Assistance.

Extract of a Letter from Figueras, May 27.

"The Spaniards have finally taken off the Mask, and
have actually begun Hostilities, without a formal Declara-
tion of War, and have taken some of the Frontier Places,
that were without Defence; however all this is of little Con-
sequence."

NEW-YORK, July 1.

Yesterday Afternoon sailed from the Hook his Majesty's
Ships Enterprise, Captain Molton of 40 Guns, Lizard, Capt.
Banks, 30 Guns, and the Porcupine Sloop of 14 Guns,
Captain Fairwood,—with 7 Transports, on board which
are the 58th Regiment, under the Command of Col. Agnew.

On Saturday the 26th of June, arrived at Marblehead
from Gibraltar, in 40 Days Passage, Capt. Cole. He in-
forms, That Admiral Saunders was there with nineteen Sail
of the Line, besides a Number of Frigates, that were con-
stantly cruising thereabouts; that the French and Spanish
Fleets were at Carthage, the Garrison of Gibraltar in good
Health, and high Spirits, being under no Apprehensions of
any Attack from the Enemy.

Capt. Cole in Lat. 39. 33. Long. 57. on the 14th Instant
was taken and ranfomed by two French Men of War from
Cape Francois to Brest, one of which was a 60 Gun Ship,
called the Partie, the other a Frigate, which Ships had be-
fore taken a Schooner with Gen. Monckton's Servants and
Baggage on board, and also Capt. Hall, in a Vessel from
Boston, bound to Barbados, which last Vessel they also ran-
fomed, and put the General's Servants on board, to be put
ashore at the first Port she arrived at.

The above-mentioned French Men of War, we hear, were
dispatched from the Cape for France, to carry an Account of
the Operations of our Fleet and Army in the West-Indies.

PHILADELPHIA, July 8.

On Tuesday Night arrived here the Brig Sulanna, Capt.
Sutton, in 25 Days from Jamaica. He came through the
Gulph, and on the 25th of June was off the Havannah,
when he could plainly see the Smoke, and hear the Report of
the Guns of our Army and Enemy, firing at one another.—
On the 26th he spoke with a Carolina Privateer, who had
seen Captain Rivers, of this Place, and by him was inform-
ed, that our Army had landed safely at the Havannah, and
were in Possession of a high Hill, which commands the
Moore Castle and Town, where they had erected their Bat-
teries, and began to play on the Place the Fifteenth of June.
—Captain Sutton did not see our Fleet.—The Number of
Spanish Ships of War at the Havannah, said to be 20, 14 of
which of the Line.—He sailed in Company with the Convoy
that had the Negro Soldiers for the Havannah, under their
Care.

Captain Washington, in a Privateer belonging to Jamaica,
has taken and carried in there a Spanish Snow, with a great
Deal of Cocoa on board, supposed to be very valuable; also
a Dutch Sloop.

By Captain Lightburne, from Turke-Island, there is Ad-
vice, that Capt. Simpson, from Antigua, and Capt. Frazer,
from St. Martins, for this Port, a Liverpool Brig, and a
Schooner for Maryland, who sailed with the St. Christophers
Fleet,

Next, were all taken by a Spanish Privateer, and retaken by Capt. Scull, in a Privateer belonging to St. Christophers; but another Spanish Privateer afterwards fell in with, and retaken Captain Fraser, and sent him to St. Thomas's; also the Maryland Schooner, and gave her to the Privateers. Captain Atherly, in a Bermudian Sloop, from Turkey-Island to this Place, is also taken.

ANNAPOLIS, July 15.

Since our last, the Fleet for Virginia and Maryland, are all arrived safe. They left Portsmouth the 6th of May, and bring no material News later than what we had before. They were Conveyed by the *Gespport*, of 40 Guns, Capt. Jarvis, whose extraordinary Care of his Charge, on their long Passage, is mentioned by every Body, greatly to his Honour.

Tuesday Night last, a violent Attack was made on the Paper Office, by some Person or Persons in Want of Cash: They broke away the Bricks in three or four Places, wrenched the Iron Bars of several Windows, broke one, and got the outside Shutter to Pieces, and broke the Glass; but all their Attempts proved abortive, and they went off as poor Rogues as they came. Since which the Commissioners have added so much Strength to the Office, that no Body can now break into it, except they take away bodily either a Gable End or a Side of the House.

Nottingham, on Patuxent, July 8, 1762.

"We had here last Night the severest Gout of Thunder, Lightning and Rain, that I have ever seen. It continued from 8 to 11 o'Clock, almost incessantly Lightning, with very frequent and hard Claps of Thunder. My House was struck by the Lightning about 9 o'Clock, when I experienced the most surprizing Delivery perhaps you have ever heard of. I was at that Instant sitting writing at a Desk and Book Case, which stood with its Back to the middle Wall or Partition of the House, and its End close to that Gable End of the House which was struck: The Folding Door of the Book Case was open, and that Leaf next the Gable lean'd against the Wainscoting close by my Head: As I sat writing on the Desk Leaf, there is no describing the Shock which I felt, when the Lightning struck the Chimney, by the Side of which it descended, and seem'd to get Vent at the very Place where I sat, for it burst in the Wainscoting, which fell upon me with a dreadful Crash. I was a little stunned, but presently recovered, and got up from among the Rubbish unhurt, which fell upon the Desk, and put out the Candle; and the Violence of the Shock, or the Burling of the Wainscoting, shattered the Book-Case very much; and that Leaf of it's Door, which was next the Gable, was entirely torn away. I found it behind me on the Floor all in Splinters. It also tore away the outside Planks or Weather Boarding, opposite to me, from Top to Bottom. When I got up, I felt a strong sulphureous Smell, which made me apprehend that the Lightning had set the House on Fire; but was soon relieved from that Fear, and the sulphureous Smell went off gradually."

FROM A LATE PUBLIC PAPER.

An extraordinary Instance of Avarice and Peculation has lately been discovered in France. Monsieur Focue, one of the Farmers General of the Province of Languedoc, who had amassed a considerable Wealth by grinding the Faces of the Poor within his Province, and every other Means, however low, base, or cruel, by which he rendered himself universally hated, was one Day ordered by the Government to raise a considerable Sum: Upon which, as an Excuse for not complying with the Demand, he pleaded extreme Poverty; but fearing lest some of the Inhabitants of Languedoc should give Information to the contrary, and his House should be searched, he resolved on hiding his Treasure in such a manner, as to escape the most strict Examination. He dug a kind of a Cave in his Wine Cellar, which he made so large and deep, that he used to go down to it with a Ladder; at the Entrance was a Door with a Spring Lock on it, which on shutting would fall on itself. Very lately Monsieur Focue was missing; diligent Search was made after him in every Place; the Ponds were drawn, and every Method, which human Imagination could suggest, was taken for finding him, but all in vain. In a short Time after his House was sold, and the Purchaser beginning either to rebuild it, or make some Alterations in it, the Workmen discovered a Door in the Cellar, with a Key in the Lock, which he ordered to be opened, and on going down they found Monsieur Focue lying dead on the Ground, with a Candlestick near him, but no Candle in it, which he had cut; and on searching farther, they found the vast Wealth that he had amassed. It is supposed that when Monsieur Focue went into his Cave, the Door by some Accident shut after him, and being out of the Call of any Person, he perished for want of Food. He had gnawed the Flesh off both his Arms, as is supposed for Subsistence. [Thus did this Miser die miserably, in a Pit of his own digging, in the midst of his Treasure, to the Scandal of himself, and the Prejudice of the State.]

CHARLES-TOWN, South-Carolina, June 26.
The serious Attention that has been given to Indian Affairs; the scrupulous Adherence to the most material and preliminary Article of the Treaty with the Cherokees, as far as this Government could interpose; and the Precaution taken to station Rangers on the Frontiers, have, in all Probability, convinced those Indians, that we were in Earnest to be at Peace, yet resolute and upon our Guard; and we may once again congratulate the Public upon the promising Aspect which Matters now wear in that Quarter. About a Month since, the Lower Towns Cherokees gave the strongest Evidence they possibly could of their sincere Desire to end all Differences with us, by a voluntary unsolicited Offer to go over the Hills, to collect and bring down all the white and Negro Prisoners then in the Nation, and to deliver them up to Captain Mackintosh, at Fort Mifflin-George; in Expectation that they should immediately after obtain a Trade from hence, and their Prisoners, which Captain Mackintosh had Authority to promise. Tiftowih, of Keeshowee, the Old or Good Warrior of Estatowih (Father to Serowih, commonly called the Young Warrior) with about 20 others of the Lower Towns, accordingly set out on that Business the 28th of May, declaring that they would not return without all the Prisoners. On the 12th Instant they returned with seventeen, thirteen Whites, and four Blacks, which they say are all, except a Negro Wench that got away from them at Tiliquoah, and two white Lads at New Hywasih, whether they had not Time or Provisions to go (for they were it seems obliged to go from Town to Town for them, the Over-Hills People never having given themselves the Trouble to collect them together at Chetoh, as they repeatedly promised) but even these they had sent for, and likewise engaged to deliver up in a few Days. On the 13th the Young Warrior of Estatowih likewise delivered up a Dutch Woman that was his Prisoner, according to Promise, whenever the others should be brought in. One Soldier and two Women, at New Hywasih, were delivered up a little while before, to some Virginia Traders. Captain Mackintosh, with the Prisoners and Indians, was to set out the 15th for Ninety-six, where they were expected the 20th; and there the Indians intend to hunt till they hear from Charles-Town. The natural Inference to be drawn from our getting the Prisoners in the Way we have, is, that the Wants of Indians are the best Pledges for their Performance of any Covenant. Had the Lower Towns been equally well supplied with the Upper, they never would have made it their Business to collect and deliver the Prisoners. If this Reasoning is just, how necessary is it for the several Provinces to act in Concert in Indian Matters, in order to avail themselves, upon other Occasions, of the Means which has produced such good Effects on this? If a partial Restraint of the Trade from one Province could thus operate, would not a general Restraint in all, check the Inference, or stop the Outrages of Savages, almost as soon as the March of Armies? and save both the Crown and the Province an enormous Expence, &c. &c.

Two Talks and a String of white Beads are brought down from the Lower Towns. One of the Talks, we hear, is from Tiftowih, of Keeshowih, and dated the 13th Instant; the other from said Tiftowih, the Old and the Young Warrior of Estatowih, and the Wolf of Keeshowee, audited the 14th; and both as favourable as we can wish. In them,

their Distress, for want of Ammunition and Provisions, is strongly painted: They beg most earnestly for a Trade, and also for the speedy Restoration of the Prisoners we have here; and that when these are obtained, no one shall dare to give a bad Talk in the Nation; and express a great Desire to see the Governor, if his Excellency will be pleased to permit them to come to Charles-Town. Measures are accordingly taking, to send up the Cherokee Prisoners from this Town to Ninety-six, as soon as possible, of which Notice is already sent to the Indians; and a Trade is to be forthwith opened with them, not by private Persons, but by this Government, agreeable to a late Act of Assembly, under the Direction of five Gentlemen, whose Names alone are sufficient to give us an Idea of the Manner in which it will be carried on. The present Directors (named in the Act) are Gabriel Manigault, Thomas Lamboll, John Savage, Thomas Shubrick, and Thomas Smith (of Broad-street) Esquires.

We are well informed, that Captain Alleck's Account of the Lower Creek Indians not having made Peace with the Spaniards, but projected an Expedition against Fort Mofa, near St. Augustine, which was to have been carried into Execution about the 23d ult. was true; but that it was suspended, by the artful Management of the Young Lieutenant of the Cowetas (a most zealous Adherent to the French) who arrived in his Nation from the Cherokees just as it was on the Point of taking Place, and having heard of the Rupture between Great-Britain and Spain, took that Opportunity, in a public Talk, to tell them, that "if we were at War with the Spaniards, we should certainly soon take St. Augustine; that if this Event should happen, and we should also conquer Louisiana, we would then no longer hesitate to demand Satisfaction for the Murders committed in the Creek Nation, who, having no Friends left on either Side, would be obliged to submit to all our Demands, or to have the numerous Nation of Chactahs set upon to exterminate them." In fine, he expostulated much with them, upon the Expediency of their making a Peace with the Spaniards, and the Spanish and French Indians, and offered to go himself to negotiate it at St. Augustine, whither he accordingly went. Though this Talk staggered our Friends a good deal, and strengthened the French Party, yet we have some Reason to believe, that their Expedition against the Spaniards is suspended until their grand Boke is over. The Confirmation of Alleck's Intelligence is not come through the Channel of Augusta, or white Men, whose Veracity is questionable, but from considerable Indians themselves.

From the Creek Nation, we have a certain Account of the Arrival of some Troops from France at New-Orleans, with a Ship of War and two Store Ships (probably those that escaped Capt. Arbutnot on the 3d of March last.) that escaped Capt. Arbutnot on the 3d of March last.) that arrived there directly from France for five Years past; that a Boat Load of the Goods brought in said Store Ships was on its Way to the Albahma Fort, the Whole whereof was promised to be distributed amongst the Creek Indians; and that the Creeks had received an Invitation from the Spaniards to go to Pensacola, to receive Presents from them likewise.

A Spanish Snow, loaded with Salt, is just come in, which, with a Brigantine, was cut out of a Harbour in the Bay of Campechy, in the Night of the 25th of May last, from under the Guns of a Fort, by the Privateer Sloop Hope of Jamaica, of 12 Carriage and 16 Swivel Guns, and 100 Men, commanded by Capt. John Stuart; which said Privateer, a few Days before, surprised and plundered a Town in the said Bay, where they got considerable Booty.

BARTHELEMY, in St. CHRISTOPHERS, June 9.
By the Snow-Betty, Capt. Michie, that arrived from Serolon in 4 Weeks, we have Advice that the Privateer Brig belonging to Martinique, called the Thamas Koulican, commanded by Capt. Tangee, had taken at the Island of Delos, about the Middle of April, the Ships following, belonging to England, viz. the Thetis, Capt. Peirce; Venus, Capt. Hamilton; Snapper, Capt. Breathwater; Sally, Captain McGill; Duke, Capt. Hendell; Catharine, Capt. Kenny; Kitty, Capt. Thornborough; Prince George, Capt. Peck; Anna Maria, Capt. How; Fanny, Capt. Waterman. The above Ships had on board about 660 Slaves. And about the same Time a French Frigate took, at Cape Mount, five English Ships, their Names unknown, and also the Frigate's Name.

Upon the 11th Inst. his Majesty's Ship Amazon, Bald Keith, Esq; Commander, arrived in the Road of Baiterrev, and brought the Brigantine Sainte Claire, Francis Foulfere, Master, bound to St. Domingo from Bourdeaux, and loaded with Wine, Flour, Soap, Butter, Hams, and dry Goods.

Boston, July 1.
We hear from Rhode-Island, that on Friday last a Number of Persons were mowing Grass in the Town of Portsmouth on that Island, a Thunder Shower came up, whereupon they betook themselves to a Tree for Shelter, one of the Men hung his Scythe on a Limb over his Head, when a Stream of Lightning came down the Tree, took its Course along the Blade of the Scythe, and from thence went off the Point on the Head of one Mr. Fish, and a Lad named Murphy, and killed them both instantaneously. The other Persons that stood under the Tree received no Hurt. We hope some Observations on this Occurrence, and on the Nature and Utility of Electrical Points, will be made by some Gentlemen.

As it is a very common Practice in Thunder-Gusts for Persons in the Country to take Shelter under a Tree, the publishing the following at this Season may not be unserviceable.—Extract from Mr. B. FRANKLIN'S Letters on Electricity.

As electrical Clouds (says he) pass over the Country, high Hills and high Trees, lofty Towers, Spires, Masts of Ships, Chimneys, &c. as so many Prominences, draw the electrical Fire, and the whole Cloud discharges there; dangerous it is to take Shelter under a Tree during a Thunder-Gust; it has been fatal to many, both Men and Beasts. It is safer to be in the open Field for another Reason: When the Cloaths are wet, if a Flash in its Way to the Ground should strike your Head, it would run in the Water over the Surface of your Body, whereas if your Cloaths are dry, it would go through your Body. Hence a wet Rat cannot be killed by the exploding electrical Bottle, when a dry Rat may."

We hear from New-London, that on Thursday last night died there, Mr. Ebenezer Bolles of that Town, Trader, esteemed a very honest and hospitable Man. He has left one Child, a Daughter of about 17 Years of Age; and an Estate of about 5000 l. lawful Money.—The Occasion of his Death was as follows;—a few Days before he had been cutting some Vines or Bushes which were of a noxious Quality, whereby he was poisoned, and his Body swelled to a great Degree; but being of the Sect, called by the Name of Rogues, who forbid the Use of Meats in Sickness, he would neither allow a Physician to be near him, or the most simple Medicine administered: Just before he departed this Life, when in great Pain, he seemed desirous of some Help, but the Brethren and Sisters of the same Profession, would not allow it, lest he should deny his Faith.

July 5. This Morning Captain Stanton arrived here in 37 Days from Lisbon, and informs that the Portuguese had declared a Defensive War against all the Spaniards they should find in the Territories of Portugal.

We have Advice that Captain Ayres, in a Snow belonging to this Place, is arrived at London in a short Passage from South-Carolina.

Joseph H. B., —Ship Benning, Thomas Bradford Master, owned by Paul March, and Company, of Portsmouth, in Piscataqua, for 3000 Dollars, five Months.

At the particular Request of some of the above unhappy Sufferers, we have inserted this List: And we hope this public Method will have some good Effect towards redeeming these unfortunate People from a cruel Captivity, and restore them to the Liberty which they voluntarily sacrificed for the Interest of their Owners.

NEW-YORK, July 8.
Last Tuesday arrived here the Brig Boon, Captain Munds, in 6 Days from South-Carolina, and on his Passage from thence spoke with a Vessel from Jamaica, who informed him, that a few Days before he took a small Vessel from the Havannah, and that about five Leagues from the Havannah, he heard a heavy firing, but as it is surrounded by Mountains, he could not discern any Ships, but supposed that it was the English besieging it;—whom GOD grant Success to in all their Undertakings.

Yesterday between 3 and 4 o'Clock in the Afternoon, came up a violent Gust of Wind and Rain, accompanied with uncommon Thunder and Lightning, during which the Steeple of Trinity Church, in this City, was struck with the Lightning, and took Fire, but was, by the timely and usual Vigilance of the Inhabitants, happily extinguished, with little Damage.—The Steeple was under Repair, and one of the Gentlemen who had the Care of it, being below, was (together with two of his Lads) struck down, but received no Hurt, otherwise than remaining feeble for a short Space. Mr. Calloe's House in Wall-street, was struck much about the same Time, but sustained little or no Damage, unless it be the shivering of a Settee, &c. It is said that the Mast of a Boat in the Harbour was shivered by the Lightning, and several Creatures in the Hold killed, but no Person hurt. We also learn from Rushwyke, on Long-Island, that a Barn was burnt there by the Lightning; it is feared that we shall receive similar Accounts from the adjacent Parts.

The last Division of the Garrison of Fort Detroit and Michillimackinack (brought to this Town last Year by Major Rogers) embarked Yesterday for Boston, in order to join the Men of War that convey the Mail Ships to England, from whence they are to be transported to France according to Capulation.

July 12. A N extraordinary Influence of Avarice and Accumulation has lately been discovered in France. Monsr. Foscue, one of the Farmers General of the Province of Languedoc, who had amassed a considerable Wealth by grinding the Faces of the Poor within his Province, and every other Means, however low, base, or cruel, by which he rendered himself universally hated, was one Day ordered by the Government to raise a considerable Sum : Upon which, as an Excuse for not complying with the Demand, he pleaded extreme Poverty ; but fearing lest some of the Inhabitants of Languedoc should give Information to the contrary, and his House should be searched, he resolved on hiding his Treasure in such a manner, as to escape the most strict Examination. He dug a kind of a Cave in his Wine Cellar, which he made so large and deep, that he used to go down to it with a Ladder ; at the Entrance was a Door with a Spring Lock on it, which on shutting would fasten of itself. Very lately Monsr. Foscue was missing ; diligent Search was made after him in every Place ; the Ponds were drawn, and every Method, which human Imagination could suggest, was taken for finding him, but all in vain. In a short Time after his House was sold, and the Purchaser beginning either to rebuild it, or make some Alterations in it, the Workmen discovered a Door in the Cellar, with a Key in the Lock, which he ordered to be opened, and on going down they found Monsr. Foscue lying dead on the Ground, with a Candlestick near him, but no Candle in it, which he had cut ; and on searching farther, they found the vast Wealth that he had amassed. It is supposed that when Monsr. Foscue went into his Cave, the Door by some Accident shut after him ; and being out of the Call of any Person, he perished for want of Food. He had gnawed the Flesh off both his Arms, as is supposed for Subsistence. [*Thus did this Miser Die miserable, in a Pit of his own digging, in the midst of his Treasure, to the Scandal of himself, and the Prejudice of the State.*]

CHARLES-TOWN, South-Carolina, June 26.

CHARLES TOWN, 1794. The serious Attention that has been given to Indian Affairs; the scrupulous Adherence to the most material and preliminary Article of the Treaty with the Cherokees, as far as this Government could interpolate; and the Precaution taken to station Rangers on the Frontiers, have, in all Probability, convinced those Indians, that we were in Earnest to be at Peace, yet, resolute and upon our Guard; and we may once again congratulate the Public upon the promising Aspect which Matters now wear in that Quarter.—About a Month since, the Lower Towns Cherokees gave the strongest Evidence they possibly could of their sincere Desire to end all Differences with us, by a voluntary unsolicited Offer to go over the Hills, to collect and bring down all the white and Negro Prisoners then in the Nation, and to deliver them up to Captain Mackintosh, at Fort Prince-George; in Expectation that they should immediately after obtain a Trade from hence, and their Prisoners, which Captain Mackintosh had Authority to promise. Tustowih, of Keehowee, the Old or Good Warrior of Ehattowih (Father to Serowih, commonly called the Young Warrior) with about 20 others of the Lower Towns, accordingly set out on that Business the 23d of May, declaring that they would not return without all the Prisoners. On the 12th Instant they returned with seventeen, thirteen Whites, and four Blacks, which they say are all, except a Negro Wench that got away from them at Tilliquoh, and two white Lady at New Hywafsh, whither they had not Time or Provisions to go (for they were it seems obliged to go from Town to Town for them, the Over-Hills People never having given themselves the Trouble to collect them together at Chotah, as they repeatedly promised) but even these they had sent for, and likewise engaged to deliver up in a few Days. On the 13th the Young Warrior of Ehattowih likewise delivered up a Dutch Woman that was his Prisoner, according to Promise, whenever the others should be brought in. One Soldier and two Women, at New Hywafsh, were delivered up a little while before, to some Virginia Traders. Capt. Mackintosh, with the Prisoners and Indians, was to set out the 25th for Ninety-six, where they were expected the 20th; and there the Indians intend to hunt till they hear from Charles Town.—The natural Inference to be drawn from our getting the Prisoners in the Way we have, is, that the Wants of Indians are the best Pledges for their Performance of any Covenant. Had the Lower Towns been equally well supplied with the Upper, they never would have made it their Business to collect and deliver the Prisoners. If this Reasoning is just, how necessary is it for the several Provinces to act in Concert in Indian Matters, in order to avail themselves, upon other Occasions, of the Means which has produced such good Effects on this? If a partial Restraint of the Trade from one Province could thus operate, would not a general Restraint in all, check the Infolence, or stop the Outrages of Savages, almost as soon as the March of Armies? and save both the Crown and the Province an enormous Expence, &c. &c.

Two Talks and a String of white Beads are brought down from the Lower Towns. One of the Talks, we hear, is from Tiftowih, of Keehowih, and dated the 17th Instant; the other from said Tiftowih, the Old and the Young Warrior of Effatowih, and the Wolt of Keehowee, and dated the 14th; and both as favourable as we can wish. In them,

their Distress, for want of Ammunition and Provisions, is strongly painted: They beg most earnestly for a Trade, and also for the speedy Restoration of the Prisoners we have here; say, that when these are obtained, no one shall dare to give a bad Talk in the Nation; and express a great Desire to see the Governor, if his Excellency will be pleased to permit them to come to Charles-Town.—Measures are accordingly taking, to send up the Cherokee Prisoners from this Town to Ninety-six, as soon as possible, of which Notice is already sent to the Indians; and a Trade is to be forthwith opened with them, not by private Persons, but by this Government, agreeable to a late Act of Assembly, under the Direction of five Gentlemen, whose Names alone are sufficient to give us an Idea of the Manner in which it will be carried on. The present Directors (named in the Act) are Gabriel Manigault, Thomas Lamboll, John Savage, Thomas Shubrick, and Thomas Smith (of Broad-street) Esquires.

Thomas Smith (of Broad-street) Enquired.

We are well informed, that Captain Alleck's Account of the Lower Creek Indians not having made Peace with the Spaniards, but projected an Expedition against Fort Moolah, near St. Augustine, which was to have been carried into Execution about the 23d ult. was true; but that it was suspended, by the artful Management of the Young Lieutenant of the Cowetas (a most zealous Adherent to the French) who arrived in his Nation from the Cherokees just as it was on the Point of taking Place, and having heard of the Rupture between Great-Britain and Spain, took that Opportunity, in a public Talk, to tell them, that " if we were at War
" with the Spaniards, we should certainly soon take St. Augu-
" stine; that if this Event should happen, and we should
" also conquer Louisiana, we would then no longer hesitate
" to demand Satisfaction for the Murders committed in the
" Creek Nation, who, having no Friends left on either Side,
" would be obliged to submit to all our Demands, or to have
" the numerous Nation of Chactahs set upon to exterminate
" them." In fine, he expostulated much with them, upon the Expediency of their making a Peace with the Spaniards, and the Spanish and French Indians, and offered to go him- self to negotiate it at St. Augustine, whither he accordingly went. Though this Talk staggered our Friends a good deal, and strengthened the French Party, yet we have some Reason to believe, that their Expedition against the Spaniards is suspended only till their grand Busk is over. The Confirmation of Alleck's Intelligence is not come through the Channel of Augusta, or white Men, whose Veracity is questionable, but from considerable Indians themselves.

From the Creek Nation, we have a certain Account of the Arrival of some Troops from France at New-Orleans, with a Ship of War and two Store Ships (probably those that escaped Capt. Arbuthnot on the 3d of March last.) Our Advices add, that these were the only Ships that had arrived there directly from France for five Years past; that a Boat Load of the Goods brought in said Store Ships was on its Way to the Albahma Fort, the Whole whereof was promised to be distributed amongst the Creek Indians; and that the Creeks had received an Invitation from the Spaniards to go to Pensacola, to receive Presents from them likewise.

A Spanish Snow, loaded with Salt, is just come in, which, with a Brigantine, was cut out of a Harbour in the Bay of Campeachy, in the Night of the 25th of May last, from under the Guns of a Fort, by the Privateer Sloop Hope of Jamaica, of 12 Carriage and 16 Swivel Guns; and 100 Men, commanded by Capt. John Stuart; which said Privateer, a few Days before, surprized and plundered a Town in the said Bay, where they got considerable Booty.

Tangee, had taken at the Head of Delos, about the Middle of April, the Ships following, belonging to England, viz. the Thetis, Capt. Peirce; Venus, Capt. Hamilton; Snapper, Capt. Breathwaite; Sally, Captain M'Gill; Duke, Capt. Hendell; Catharine, Capt. Kenny; Kitty, Capt. Thornborough; Prince George, Capt. Peck; Anna Maria, Capt. How; Fanny, Capt. Waterman. The above Ships had on board about 660 Slaves. And about the same Time a French Frigate took, at Cape Mount, five English Ships, their Names unknown, and also the Frigate's Name.

June 16. Upon the 11th Inst. his Majesty's Ship Amazon, Babi Keith, Esq; Commander, arrived in the Road of Baileterre, and brought the Brigantine Sainte Claire, Francis Fonfrede, Master, bound to St. Domingo from Bourdeaux, and loaded with Wine, Flour, Soap, Butter, Hams, and dry Goods.

B O S T O N, *27 July* 1861.

We hear from Rhode-Island, That on Friday last as a Number of Persons were mowing Grass in the Town of Portsmouth on that Island, a Thunder Shower came up, whereupon they betook themselves to a Tree for Shelter, one of the Men hung his Scythe on a Limb over his Head, when a Stream of Lightning came down the Tree, took its Course along the Blade of the Scythe, and from thence went off the Point on the Head of one Mr. Fish, and a Lad named Murphy, and killed them both instantaneously. The other Persons that stood under the Tree received no Hurt. We hope some Observations on this Occurrence, and on the Nature and Utility of Electrical Points, will be made by some Gentlemen.

*As it is a very common Practice in Thunder-Gusts for Persons in the Country to take Shelter under a Tree, the publishing the following at this Season may not be unserviceable:—*Extract from Mr. B. FRANKLIN's Letters on Electricity.

From Mr. B. FRANKLIN'S *Lectures on Electricity*.
 "As electrical Clouds (says he) pass over the Country,
 high Hills and high Trees, lofty Towers, Spires, Masts of
 Ships, Chimneys, &c. as so many Prominences, draw the
 electrical Fire, and the whole Cloud discharges there;
 dangerous it is to take Shelter under a Tree during a Thunder-
 burst-Gust; it has been fatal to many, both Men and
 Beasts. It is safer to be in the open Field for another
 Reason: When the Cloaths are wet, if a Flash in its Way
 to the Ground should strike your Head, it would run in the
 Water over the Surface of your Body, whereas if your
 Cloaths are dry, it would go through your Body. Hence a
 wet Rat cannot be killed by the exploding electrical Bottle,
 when a dry Rat may." —

We hear from New-*London*, that on Thursday *ten*'t night died there, *Mr. Ebenezer Bolles* of that *Town*, *Trader*, esteemed a very honest and hospitable Man. He has left one Child, a Daughter of about 17 Years of Age; and an Estate of about 5000 *l.* lawful Money. — The Occasion of his Death was as follows; — a few Days before he had been cutting some Vines or Bushes which were of a noxious Quality, whereby he was poisoned, and his Body swelled to a great Degree; but being of the Sect, called by the Name of *Rogues*, who forbid the Use of Means in Sickness, he would neither allow a Physician to be near him, or the most simple Medicine admitted: Just before he departed this Life, when in great Pain, he seemed desirous of some Help, but the Brethren and Sisters of the same Profession, would not allow it, lest he should deny his Faith.

July 5. This Morning Captain Stanton arrived here in 37 Days from Lisbon, and informs that the Portuguese had declared a Defensive War against all the Spaniards they should find in the Territories of Portugal.

We have Advice that Captain Ayres, in a Snow belonging to this Place, is arrived at London in a short Passage from South-Carolina.

NEW-YORK, July 8.
Last Tuesday arrived here the Brig Boon, Captain Munds, in 6 Days from South-Carolina, and on his Passage from thence spoke with a Vessel from Jamaica, who informed him, that a few Days before she took a small Vessel from the Havannah, and that about five Leagues from the Havannah, he heard a heavy firing, but as it is surrounded by Mountains, he could not discern any Ships, but supposed that it was the English besieging it;—whom GOD grant Success in all their Undertakings.

Yesterday between 3 and 4 o'Clock in the Afternoon, came up a violent Gust of Wind and Rain, accompanied with uncommon Thunder and Lightning, during which the Steeple of Trinity Church, in this City, was struck with the Lightning, and took Fire, but was, by the timely and usual Vigilance of the Inhabitants, happily extinguished, with little Damage.—The Steeple was under Repair, and one of the Gentlemen who had the Care of it, being below, was (together with two of his Lads) struck down, but received no Hurt, otherwise than remaining feeble for a short Space. Mr. Calloe's House in Wall-street, was struck much about the same Time, but sustained little or no Damage, unless it be the shivering of a Settee, &c. It is said that the Mast of a Boat in the Harbour was shivered by the Lightning, and several Creatures in the Hold killed, but no Person hurt. We also learn from Bushwyke, on Long-Island, that a Barn was burnt there by the Lightning: It is feared that we shall receive similar Accounts from the adjacent Parts.

The last Division of the Garrisons of Fort Detroit and Michillimackinack (brought to this Town last Year by Major Rogers) embarked Yesterday for Boston, in order to join the Men of War that convey the Mail Ships to England, from whence they are to be transported to France according to Consolation.

July 12. Thursday Evening a Fire broke out at the Printing Office on the New-Dock, which did very considerable Damage to that, and the House adjoining, &c the Violence of the Flames could possibly be abated—Notwithstanding the well-known Vigilance of the Cruise & on these melancholy Occasions, to great was the Blessing, occasioned by the vast Quantities of Paper on Fire, that, the whole Neighborhood was cleared of the same.

hourhood was in the utmost Danger of being reduced to Ashes; which nothing less than the extraordinary Efforts of the Persons present, could have prevented.—The Loss of the unhappy Sufferers is great, but as yet uncertain, and the real Cause of this terrible Disaster not known.—The unavoidable Confusion into which Mr. FANNEY's printing Materials are thrown, renders it impossible for him to publish the AMERICAN CHRONICLE till Thursday next.

Friday Evening Capt. Rolles arrived here from Virginia, in 3 Days, with 175 Recruits, for his Majesty's 60th, or Royal American Regiment.

This Week, the Privateer Brig General Monckton, Captain Sennott; and the Schooner Harlequin, Captain Wright, sails on a Cruise against the Enemies of Great-Britain.

PHILADELPHIA, July 15.

Extract of a Letter from Lisbon, dated May 22, 1762.

"The Spaniards and Portuguese are on the Point of a Repulse; but as yet there is no public Declaration of War, so that the Storm may blow over; but, be it as it will, we are not under the least Fear of their coming near us.—It is strongly reported that the Swedes and Dutch are to join the English; if so, it may be productive of an honorable Peace."

On Tuesday last arrived here the Schooner Betsey, Capt. Jackson, from Providence, by whom we are informed, That on the 27th ult. one of these Privateers came in in three Days from the Havannah, who was 24 Hours under Admiral Pownall's Stern; during which Time the Captain learnt, that our Army had been lately landed; that they had taken three of the Enemy's Batteries; were in Possession of the Ground round the Havannah, and of all the Hills that command the City and Moore Castle; that they had destroyed four Sail of Spanish Ships of the Line in the Harbour; and that they hoped to be Masters of the Place in about twelve Days after he left the Fleet.

A French Privateer Brig, of 12 Guns, from the Mississippi, is taken, and carried into Providence, by the Captains Kemp and Roberts, in the Speedwell and Rover Privateers of that Place.—The Frenchman, it is said, had taken two Prizes, and sent them to the Havannah.—The Speedwell and Rover had also taken, and sent in, a large Spanish Polacco Ship, from the Havannah.

The Captains Beale and Brickland, likewise in two Providence Privateers, had carried in there a large French Schooner, laden with White Sugar, from the Cape for Old France.

On Saturday last arrived here a Prize Sloop, loaded with Sugar and Coffee, taken by the Privateer New Grace, Capt. Taylor, of this Port.—He has likewise taken a French Schooner Privateer, of two Six-Pounders, six Two-Pounders and 17 Swivels, and sent her to Providence. Also two Petrels, with Sugar, &c.

ANNAPOLIS, July 22.

We mentioned last Week, the safe Arrival of all our Fleet: Since which we have received a Letter from one of the Commanders, wherein he mentions some Particulars, relating to their Passage, and the good Commodore, which we cannot so well express, as in his own Words:

"Patuxent, July 12th, 1762.

"You will here receive an Account of the Arrival of the Virginia and Maryland Fleets, 15 Sail for Virginia, and 21 for Maryland, not a Ship having parted Company by the unparalleled Vigilance and Conduct of our Commodore, JOHN JARVIS, Esq; of his Majesty's Ship Gosport, of 40 Guns. As to the Occurrences of our Passage, we sailed from Spithead the 6th of May, in Company with about 50 Sail of Ships for the West Indies, under Convoy of his Majesty's Ship the Danae, of 40 Guns, Capt. Martin, and 7 Sail of East-Indiamen, under Convoy of the Superbe of 74 Guns, Capt. Rowley, a worthy Son of the brave Admiral of that Name, and by Orders of the Admiralty were to keep Company as long as possible. We had a Report at Portsmouth, that a French Squadron was waiting for us: This we found true; for on the 11th of May, the Gosport being somewhat astern, discovered 4 Sail of Enemy's Ships standing for us, and made Signals; which the Commodore not seeing, for the Crowd of Ships about him, Capt. Rowley desired me to make Sail, and inform him of it, which I did about 10 o'Clock that Night. On the Morning of the 12th, Capt. Rowley made the Signal to Chace, which was immediately done by himself, the Gosport, and Anne, till about 4 o'Clock in the Afternoon, when he discovered the Enemy's Ships to be, one of 74, one of 64, and two Frigates of 36 Guns each. Capt. Rowley being then almost within Reach, fired several Shot at the French Commodore, to endeavour to bring him to Action, and fur'd his Courses to shew him he had no Intention to run. The French crowding all the Sail they could, our Men of War bore away, and join'd the Fleet, and the Enemy on this followed them. Capt. Rowley then ordered one of the Indiamen to hoist the Lights, and lead the Fleet, whilst himself and the Men of War lay too. The French apprehending by this Manoeuvre, that they should be brought to Action, whether they would or not, if they continued to follow us, haul'd their Wind. After it was dark, and they could not be seen, our Men of War made Sail, and join'd the Fleet, and we saw no more of the Enemy; and thus, by this Finesse, the cowardly Dogs lost a fine Opportunity of making their Fortunes,

the 7 Indiamen being not worth less than One Hundred Thousand Pounds each, and the Gosport having that Sum in Specie on board, to reimburse the American Colonies their Expence during the War; and here I wish I could congratulate the Province of Maryland on their Share. Captain Jarvis intends sailing from York in Virginia, with the Fleet, the 20th of September. I cannot conclude without saying something more in Praise of our Commodore. It is doing him barely Justice to say, he has acquired that happy Facility of uniting in himself the polite Gentleman, the easy Companion, and the brave and diligent Officer; and I think we have every Thing to expect, from his Behaviour, Homeward bound, that our Wishes can suggest. He is going now out on a Cruise, in which, if that Jilt Madam Fortune, be as propitious to him, as my Wishes are sanguine, he will meet with a Galleon or Two, to make Prize of: Certain it is, if she would once break her old Custom, and bestow Riches on Merit, no one has a better Title to her Favours: It is in short sufficient to say, that he is every way worthy, and does Credit to the Judgment of the brave, the humane, the good, Admiral Sir Charles Saunders, whose First Lieutenant he was on the Expedition to Quebec, and by him first promoted to a Command."

PRAGUE, April 24.

AFFAIRS in Silesia begin to be serious. The Enemy have already quitted their Quarters. Their Troops are also encamping. The advanced Posts of the two Armies are only Half a League distant. We hourly expect to hear of a general Engagement. We on our Part, desire to put a glorious End to this tedious ruinous War: And it is the Interest of the King of Prussia to prevent an Augmentation of the Austrian Troops in Silesia. Our Troops in that Dutchy amount already to 100,000 Men; and when all the Reinforcements arrive, the Number of fighting Men cannot be less than 140,000, full of Courage and Good-will. The Hungarians have offered the Empress Queen an Army of 30,000 Insurgents.

Verfailles, April 25. The Count d'Heroville de Claye will have the Command of 45,000 French, which are assembling near Dunkirk. Five Lieutenant-Generals, and eleven Major-Generals are to command under him. He set out the 24th for the general Rendezvous.

Bautzen, April 21. Silesia will still continue the Theatre of War, where 100,000 Austrians will take the Field this Campaign, in Opposition to 96 or 97,000 Prussians. The Prudence of Marshal Daun, and the Activity of General Laudohn, will engage with the rapid and fruitful Genius of the King of Prussia.

Extract of a Letter from Brest, April 19.

"Our Men here work double Tides, and have done so for six Weeks past, in preparing a great Number of flat bottomed Boats, which are now almost finished. They are designed for a grand Expedition, but to what Part is kept a profound Secret, though believed to be somewhat near, as they will not bear much Weather."

LONDON, May 6.

By a Letter from Paris we are informed, that on the Arrival of the Marquis de Vaudreuil in France,

from his late Government of Canada, he was sent for immediately to Court, in order to give an Account of his Conduct in that Department, when several Officers appearing against him, and charging him with bad Management, &c. in his Proceedings against the English, he was committed Prisoner to the Bastille, where he now lies. The Bishop d'Autun, first Almoner to the King, interceded for him, and spoke strongly in his Favour, saying, that he had acted with Spirit in the Service of his Country; and, if it did not meet with that Success he meant, it was not his Fault: Adding that the Marquis had Enemies, who were much more deserving of being sent to the Bastille. This Freedom, however, was so far from being of Service to the Marquis, that, according to these Letters, the good Bishop himself got severely reprimanded, and has been ordered to quit the Court, and confine himself entirely to his own Diocese.

By a Letter from Rome, received by the last Mail, we are informed, that an English Gentleman having been lately introduced to the Pope, his Holiness was pleased, among other Things, to say, "That if the Intelligence he had received of the taking of Martinico had not been unquestionable, he would not have believed we had been able to make so difficult a Conquest; and that the Glory of the English Nation was now arrived to so great a Height, that he should have thought it an Honour to have been an Englishman."

By a Gentleman just arrived from the Jersey we are informed, that at Bayonne, as fast as the Privateers come in from their Cruizes, the Men are immediately pressed, and sent to Brest by Land; and that the same Orders are observed in many other Ports of France.

The King of Prussia hath ordered all the Austrian Prisoners from Silesia, Magdebourg, and other Places in the Electorate of Brandenburg, to be transported to the Pillau, and Memel, in Prussia, 6000 of them are already upon the Road from Silesia; in the same Manner, the Empress Queen has ordered the Prussian Prisoners to Tyrol and Hungary, the extreme Parts of her Dominions.

By Order of the Parliament of Paris, the Effects of the Jesuits in the College of Lewis le Grand, even the Church Ornaments, have been sold by Auction.

Letters from Eimbeck say, that the Allies are tracing a Camp under the Town; and that the Troops under the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick, to whom the Castle of Arensberg surrendered, are 12,000 strong.

All the Prussian Troops have evacuated the Dutchy of Mecklenburg, except 15,000 Foot, and 4 or 500 Horse, who are left there to collect the Arrears of the Contributions; the rest of them under Prince Eugene of Wurtemberg, are marched for Saxony.

May 8. Our Letters from all Parts of the Kingdom bring Accounts of the present prevailing Epidemic Disorder, which in some Places has proved fatal, and has been so general as to seize on People of all Ages and Constitutions.

It is now so sickly at Chatham, that the like has not been known in the Memory of the oldest Man living.

The present Disorder which at this Time

so alarms all Ranks of People in this Metropolis, is thought to be owing to a noxious Quality in the Air; and when not carefully attended to at the very Beginning, has, in a great Number of Instances, proved fatal in the Space of 48 Hours. —We are informed that several Horses have also lately been seized with it, and died.

On Saturday an Experiment was made near Highgate, on the Temperature of the Air, by tying a Piece of fresh Meat at the Tail of a Kite, and then flying it for a considerable Time, when, upon drawing the Kite down again, the Meat appeared quite tainted, and so discoloured, that it was plain some noxious Quality must at present prevail in the Air, to have had such an amazing Effect over it.

Yesterday it was currently reported, that the Courts of France and Spain had presented a Memorial to the States General, equally as insolent as that sent to the Court of Portugal.

Letters from Genoa inform us, that his most Catholic Majesty, in Answer to the Lord Tyravley's Threat of being at Madrid, at the Head of his Troops, soon after Whitfuntide, had sent Word to the King of Portugal, that for the Sake of avoiding all further Expence in Couriers, he should come and settle Matters with him himself at the Gates of Lisbon.

It is said, that Sir Edward Hawke is to join the Portuguese Squadron, in order to go in Concert upon some Expedition against the Enemy.

They write from Bonifacio, in the Island of Corfica, that early in the Morning of the 8th of April, the Garrison of Corti made a Sally on the Genoese Troops which are besieging that Place, of whom they killed and wounded many, took others Prisoners, and nailed up ten Pieces of Cannon; after which they set Fire to their Garrisons, and retired in good Order back to the Town, having had but two Men killed, and 7 wounded.

There is a great Scarcity of Provision and Forage in the Austrian Army in Silesia, notwithstanding it is pretended that such great Quantities have been transported from Bohemia and Hungary.

Sailed from Yarmouth and Hurst Roads, the Syren and Gramont Men of War, with Ships under Convoy for Quebec, Newfoundland, &c.

Yesterday Afternoon the Alderney Sloop, Capt. Hughes, arrived at Spithead from the East-Indies. —She came out the fourth of December, and has touched at Ireland.

The Atlantic, Green, from Piscataqua for London, is arrived at Dover, after being taken and ransomed for 1100 Pounds.

May 11. The Preparations of the French for an Invasion of England or Ireland are immense, and their Troops are in Motion from all Quarters, for Dunkirk, Havre, and Brest.

By Accounts from Turin we learn, that his Sardinian Majesty has rejected all the Offers made by the Courts of France and Spain, and is resolved to fulfil all his Engagements with the Court of Great-Britain, in a Manner becoming the Dignity of a Monarch.

On Sunday arrived at Cowes the Atlantic, Green, from New-England for London, who was taken by a French Privateer, and ransomed, and afterwards met with a Spanish Privateer, who had taken the Brayton, of Whitehaven, John Harrison Master, on the 26th of April, off Cape Clear, but treated him very civilly, and put him on board the Atlantic; he is safe arrived, and his Mate also. This was one of the Ships that came out of Carolina, under Convoy of the Dolphin Man of War.

By a Letter from Belleisle we have Advice, that the Prince of Wales, Curling, from South-Carolina to London, which was taken a few Weeks ago, and carried to Vigaro, near Corsica, by a French Privateer, had, by the Mate, with the Assistance of some Dutchmen, been cut out of the above Post, and brought into the Bay of Belleisle.

Belleisle. We hear that the Owners have agreed to give to the Mate an eighth Part of her Value, for his Bravery.

The Enterprize Sloop, who was cruising in the Gut of Gibraltar, is taken by a Privateer, and carried into Cadiz.

A Letter from a Merchant at Lisbon to a Gentleman in Town says, that the Subjects of his Portuguese Majesty, who live on the Borders of that Kingdom next to Spain, are beginning to remove their best Effects to Places of more Safety; and that many Families have already deserted their Dwellings, and carried every Thing away along with them: So that in some Places, for many Miles round, neither Man nor Beast is to be seen, except where the Troops are stationed, who are drawing together in large Bodies, as fast as they can towards the Frontiers, in order to oppose the Operations of the Spaniards, who, on their Side, are getting together their Artillery, to besiege the Garrison of Elvas, which has been lately reinforced with 2000 Infantry, and 1500 Troopers.

Besides the Troops already ordered from hence, and from Belleisle and Ireland, to Portugal, 14,000 more Infantry are, we are told, to be sent thither; eight Battalions of which are to come from Germany, whose Place is to be supplied with Prussians, and the King of Prussia is to be reinforced with a large Body of Russians, some say, 50,000 Horse and Foot, in British Pay, in Consideration of which no Subsidy is to be paid to Prussia.

This Day the Lion and Hind Men of War, with the Transports and Troops for Lisbon, were to sail from Portsmouth. Two Troops of Light Horse embarked there Yesterday.

By the last Letters from Brest it appears, there were but five Men of War in that Harbour, three of which were preparing for Sea with great Expedition, and on board of them a considerable Number of Land Forces were ordered to embark, the Destination of which was supposed to be for St. Domingo.

BOSTON, July 8.

Extract of a Letter from Lisbon, May 25, 1762.

All Intercourse with France and Spain is prohibited, and War has been declared here against these two Powers. The Spaniards have committed Hostilities on the Northern Frontiers, taking Possession of some Places in the Portuguese Territories. The Attack made in that Quarter has given a great Alarm to the Inhabitants of Porto; but as that Country is by Nature very difficult of Access, it will be obstructed the Enemy's Proceedings as to give Time for sending proper Succours to protect that Province, or at least to secure the City from any Danger. Two English Regiments are arrived here, and a further considerable Reinforcement is daily expected, which, added to the Portuguese Army (which already is upwards of 40,000 Men) it is hoped will be sufficient to baffle the Attempts which Spain may make upon this Country, which will act only on the Defensive; and in so just a Cause we may reasonably hope to have Success. The Bourbon Family have forced this Kingdom into the War, without the least Shadow of Equity for such a Proceeding, having no other Pretence for this Rupture than a Demand that Portugal should join in their offensive Alliance against England.

The Master of a Fishing Vessel arrived here Yesterday from Cape Ann says, That on the 20th of June, on Bank Verrill's Lark, he spoke with a Brig in Company with another Brig and Schooner, all full of Men, Women and Children, who said that on the 20th they had been driven off their Settlement in the Bay of Bulls, near St. John's in Newfoundland, by three Spanish Men of War of the Line, from 80 to 90 Guns, and one Frigate, who landed and destroyed their Cattle; that they escaped to another Harbour, and got on board their Vessel. That the Spanish Ship had drove on Shore a Brig from Ireland, with about 100 Soldiers, who got to the Land, but the Brig was taken. That a Fishing Vessel had got to St. John's, the Master of which said, he saw the Spaniards sink 20 Fishing Vessels on the Great Bank. That there were other Spanish Ships off Force on the Banks before the mentioned Vessels. That they expected to be attacked at St. John's.

Capt. Samuel Dogget, of the Ship Swallow, arrived here Yesterday in 8 Days from Halifax, and says, That on the 21st of June he heard that the Syren Frigate was arrived there with Advice, that a Fishing Schooner had come into St. John's, who said, that on the Banks he met with a large Ship and a Frigate, who fired one Shot at him, and several Volley of Small Arms, but he escaped in a Fog. That the Syren in her Passage met with 6 Transports for Quebec, one of which, a large Ship, said, that they had fired at a Schooner to bring her to, the Day mentioned by the Schooner aforesaid.

The Syren arrived at Halifax last Thursday Morning, and after staying there a short Time, sailed again for ***** Lord Colville, in the Northumberland Man of War of 24 Guns, is now at Halifax.

NEW-YORK, July 10.

On Tuesday last arrived here the Ship Swallow, from

in 30 Days from Jamaica; but last from the Havannah in 12 Days. By him we learn, that 17 Days ago, 3 Leagues off the Havannah, he was boarded by an English Officer of his Majesty's Ship the Alcide, who informed him, that the Troops under the Command of the Earl of Albemarle, landed at the Havannah without Opposition; but that the Spaniards gave them a warm Reception as soon as they made their Approaches; that they had sunk three of their Ships in the Entrance of the Harbour, to prevent the English Fleet from getting in; that a Party of Sailors belonging to an English Frigate, going on Shore in Search of fresh Provisions, were surrounded by the Enemy, and 13 of them cut to Pieces, in a very inhuman Manner; and that a Lieutenant of the Rangers had his Nose and Ears cut off, and was otherwise used very ungenerously by the Spaniards, and sent to the English Camp by Way of Derision; which Intelligence incensed the Earl of Albemarle so much, that he sent Word to the Governor of the Havannah, that he should neither give nor take Quarters, and desired him to kill every English Prisoner he should take, for he would do the same by all the Spaniards he met with. [This may be doubted.]

About a Week before Captain Tosh left Jamaica, some English Prisoners arrived there from St. Jago on the Island of Cuba, who had been taken and carried in there by a French Privateer. They assured, That the Spaniards at that Place had not received any Account of War being declared; that no Privateers were fitted out there; and that only two Men of War were in that Harbour, with their Top-masts and Yards all struck.

Extract of a Letter from a Gentleman at New-Port, in Rhode-Island, to his Friend in this City, dated July 13.

Last Evening arrived here from St. Michael's, one of the Western Islands, Capt. James Clark, who brings an Account of one of our Men of War taking a Spanish Gallion worth 37 Millions of Dollars on board, and carried her to England; she was taken near the Western Islands in her Way to Spain. There were five of them, not in Company, which were to sail from after this, and that there were two large Gallions cruising off the Island to meet them, to furnish them with Men, which they had on board for that Purpose. Capt. Clark informs further, that he spoke with the Supreme Man of War, who informed him that he and two more Men of War were stationed off the Island to watch for the other Gallions; and that there were four French Men of War cruising likewise to meet with the Gallions, to destroy them before they could get to Port. That one Day the English Men of War saw the five French to the Windward of some high rocks, but did not fire to let them down, and that some of our Men of War took a very rich Spanish Ship, loaded with Money and Hides from Cuba, in the Brazil, and carried her to Madras; he says that the above News was credited in the Island. [There is doubtless a Mistake in the above huge Account of Dollars, told to be taken, of at least 2 or 3 Centuries; so enormous a Quantity as 37,000,000, would be a Weight of 977 Tons, 2 C. 2 qrs. and 20 lbs. and is more than ever Noah's Ark would carry. The Sum is gone to the East-Indies.]

PHILADELPHIA, July 25. We have Advice from the West-Indies, that his Majesty's Frigate the Huiar was lost off Melph, on a Reef of Rocks near Cape Francois, the People saved. That an English Privateer Brig was lost near Port Plate, on Hispaniola: That the Spanish Privateers had taken a English Vessel off Cape Francois, and carried them into the Mount: And that the French Fleet of Men of War were in the Cape the latter End of last Month.

The Ship William and Mary, Capt. Nicholson, and Brig Grace, Capt. Ritchie, are arrived here from Gibraltar. These Vessels were two of those detained in Spain since the Beginning of the Spanish War, and released by Order of that Court. By a Gentleman who came Passenger, we are favoured with the following Intelligence, viz. That a Dutch Man of War arrived at Malaga about the first of May, and informed, that 12 Ships of the Line, and 4 Frigates, were preparing for the Sea at Toulon with the utmost Expedition, and it was thought would be ready to sail for Carthage about the latter End of May: That there were 12 Ships of the Line at Cadix, besides Frigates, and 4 of the large Ships were actually taken into the Bay, manned and ready for Sea: That the Spanish Army going against Portugal consisted of 40,000 Men, and was encamped at Zamora; General Soria, who commanded it, is said to be recalled, and the Conde Miranda, Minister at the Court of Poland, is ordered to the Command thereof: That there was some Discontent among the Spanish Troops and many more would follow as Opportunity offered: That the Portuguese Frontier Garrisons are well posted, and that their Army amounted to 30,000 Feet: That about the 20th of May they heard at Gibraltar, that two new-raised Regiments were arrived at Lisbon from Ireland, and more daily expected, and a fine Train of Artillery, and a Camp was marked out for the English Troops a few Miles from Lisbon: That there were 8 Sail of Portuguese Men of War of the Line ready for Sea: That the King of Spain had issued an Edict, forbidding all Trade by Sea for three Years, from War lasted to 1763: That the Spanish Nation was much distressed with the War: That 25 Sail of the Line, with 6 Frigates, and 3 Bombs, were at Gibraltar under the Command of Admiral Saunders, and Commodore Brett and Amherst, who keep a good Look-out for the Carthagena and Toulon Squadrons, which were expected down: That it was said two whole Regiments had left the Spanish Army, and joined the Portuguese: That the former were in much Want of the Necessaries for an Army; and that a French Privateer of 22 Guns was sent into Gibraltar.

ANNAPOLIS, July 29.

We are informed by a Gentleman from the Northward, who left New-York on Thursday last, and Philadelphia on Sunday, that a flying Squadron of Spanish Men of War, consisting of 3 large Ships and 2 Frigates, have landed a Detachment of Troops at St. John's on Newfoundland, and done much mischief to our Fishermen on the Banks: In Consequence of which Report, General Amherst immediately dispatched the Packet Home. The General Man of War, which brought 17,000 from England, last from Virginia, is also sailed, as was supposed, to the Har-

bour; and Two Vessels from Ireland, with Provisions, which came no higher to New-York than Sandy-Hook, are conjectured to have proceeded to the same Place.

A Vessel just arrived from Jamaica at Philadelphia, after a short Passage, about a Month ago passed near enough to the Havannah, to distinguish the Report of the Guns, and discover the Bombs flying. The Master observed a First Rate towed out of the Harbour without her Foremast; and thinks they were carrying on very Hot Work. He spoke with Two Frigates off the North End of the Island waiting for the Transports from New-York.

Two of the Enemies Privateers, a Sloop and a Schooner, are cruising off the Mouth of Delaware: Betwixt which, and Sandy-Hook, a large Brig, with a green Stern and white Bottom, lies aground, and two Tents are standing on the Shore.
