VIENNA, July 5.



FEW Days ago a Woman was arrested here, charged with having killed above one Hundred Children. Her Employment was to nurse, at her own House, the Children of Women who were themselves Nurses in great Families, and also the Infants of such Mothers as did not chuse to own them. It was her Custom to get some Months Board paid her in Advance, and in a short Time after she came to tell the Mother of the Death of her Child. It is certain that during 17 Months, near 90 Children have been carried from her House to the Grave. Such a Number of successive Deaths must naturally render her, if not altogether culpable, at least very much suspected. It is said she hath already confessed her Crime, and discovered several Accomplices.

L O N D O N.

July 10. It is reported that the Earl of Chatham will be soon created Duke of Kent. It is said that a great Personage, hearing that a certain chief Magistrate had taken Umbrage at a late Reception at St. James's, has given it in express Orders, that that Gentleman should be informed, that the seeming Coldness with which his Visit was attended, arose from the great Personage's not being previously acquainted with the Mode intended to be used; and not from any other Slight whatsoever.

July 11. Advices from Petersburg say, that a powerful Russian Navy is now fitting out, to watch the Motions of a certain Northern Power, to be commanded by Vice Admiral Kennedy.

The last Letters from Paris mention, that large Bodies of French Troops had lately been ordered down to the Sea Coasts.

July 16. A Letter from Exeter gives an Account of the ill Treatment of the D. of B. there, and adds, that the Mob not only hissed his Grace, but threw Dirt at him, as he was going into the Cathedral to be installed as Lord Lieutenant, and endeavoured to press him down; that his Grace was shoved down on his Hands, and the Chancellor quite down; and that if his Grace had not been conveyed by a private Door to the Bishop's Palace, it is thought he would have been trampled to Death.

The above Letter says, "the Gentlemen of Devonshire have had a Meeting at Exeter, to consider of a Petition: Another Meeting is to be held the 5th of October. Devonshire will be followed by Somerset and Cornwall. Sir Richard Bamfylde, in the Riot last Tuesday, had the Misfortune to lose a Joint of one of his Fingers. I cannot conclude without mentioning a remarkable Declaration made to his Grace by a well dressed Man, who was coming from Guildhall: The red in your Grace's Face, is died with the Ruin of your Country."

July 17. By the latest Accounts arrived from the Philippine Islands it appears, that the Spaniards have actually Forty Ships of the Line there.

And by Letters received from the Havannah we hear, that the Spaniards have Sixteen Ships of the Line there, besides Fourteen Thousand Land Forces.

We are told, that the Town of Genoa is to be made a free Imperial City, and that the other Territories, now belonging to the Genoeze, are to be divided between the Infant Duke of Parma and his Sardinian Majesty.

It is now imagined from the Delay of the Russian and Turkish Armies in coming to action, that the present Campaign will not end the War, as was supposed some little Time ago, when a decisive Stroke was expected soon to happen; but the Difficulty of collecting an Army on the Side of the Porte, prevents their making any vigorous Effort, and the Event of Magazines, or Means of conveying Stores on the Side of the Carina, prevents her advancing towards Constantinople.

It is likewise supposed to be now too late for the Swedes to make any Attempt on the Russian Territory. The Slowness of the Progress of the Turkish Army, and the Danish Fleet intimidating the Transportation of Troops across the Gulph of Bothnia, has checked that Design, in spite of all Endeavours of the French to incite the Execution of it.

The same Letters declare, that the Prince of Conde, with a grand Retinue, is also soon expected at the Emperor's Court, in order to conclude a Treaty of Marriage between the Archduchess Antonietta and the Dauphin of France.

A great Personage expressed himself the other Day to this Effect: "That every Thing relative to the Colonies would be settled to their Satisfaction."

It is positively said, that a great Personage, willing to take every Step for the Good of the People, is determined to lay the several Petitions that have been presented to him before a certain Honourable House, on their first Opening. This Step, it is added, he looks upon to be the most Constitutional, as well as the most Effectual in the present Situation of Affairs, to collect the candid Opinions of the People. So that from their Resolutions on this Subject, he will be able to determine whether their Grievances really exist or not. We can assure our Readers, upon the best Grounds, that all the Reports of the Earl of C—th—m having de-

clared, in a certain high Place, that he approves, and will support the Measures of the present Administration, are totally destitute of Truth, and propagated in order to mislead the Public; by an Artifice equally mean, and unavailing; nothing being more certain, than that the above noble Earl has the justest Sense of the fatal Mischief in which the Errors of Administration have involved both King and People; and that this noble Peer truly reverences and loves the whole Frame of our wise Constitution, whereof the transcendent and sacred Right to free and independent Elections, is the only sure Basis.

They write from Vienna, that the most outrageous Disorder reigns in the Turkish Dominions, from which the most melancholy Consequences are expected with Regard to Poland, and perhaps all Europe.

Aug. 1. A great Lady has for some Time been so very anxious to have a certain popular Prisoner pardoned, that a Message has been sent to him this Week, that his Pardon should shortly be granted; on which he observed, that unless it was free and unconditional, he would not accept it.

By the compendious View of the British Ships and Seamen employed in the Trade between Great-Britain and her Colonies on the Continent of America, of the Value of Goods exported from Great-Britain to these Colonies, and of their Produce exported to Great-Britain and elsewhere, the Account stands thus:

By Letters from various Parts of the Country, we are informed, that there are the finest Crops of Corn on the Ground ever known.

It is reported that the Prime Minister at the Court of Lisbon, by the spirited Remonstrances from Home, has been obliged to drop his monopolising Scheme for raising the Price of Port Wines upon our Merchants and Factors; and many other commercial Advantages are soon expected to be obtained.

Some private Letters from Paris mention, that a Treaty of Marriage is on the Carpet, between the eldest Son of the late Pretender, and a Female Branch of the House of Bourbon.

Aug. 3. A Morning Paper says, that a certain great Person disapproves of all the ministerial Steps, relative to a certain Election, taken during his Residence abroad, and has made some Advances to a great Patriot, which have been rejected with that noble Indignation peculiar to him.

Letters from Rome advise, that the Son of the late Chevalier de St. George has increased the Number of his Domestics, set up a splendid Equipage, and receives Visits from the first Nobility in that City.

Yesterday died at Peterborough House, on Parsons Green, near Fulham, in the 81st Year of his Age, the Right Hon. Daniel Finch, Earl of Winchelsea and Nottingham, Viscount Maidstone, an elder Brother of the Trinity House, Knight of the Garter, and one of the Lords of his Majesty's most Hon. Privy-Council. He is succeeded in Title by a Son of Lady Charlotte Finch, now a Minor.

It has been remarked, that, in the last Parliament, the Prerogative Royal, was thought, by the Opposition, to be unconstitutionally extended in preventing the Subjects from being starved. In this, they Petition the King to exert it, to the Annihilation of the Constitution. These Contradictions were adopted with the same View: Creating a popular Discontent with their Sovereign. The former, which he had a Right to exert, was represented as a formidable Act of arbitrary Power, the latter which he cannot grant, will be pronounced as a Refusal of the People's Rights, to redress Grievances. When we see the heavy Artillery drawn out to besiege a Fortress, it is a certain Sign that it is thought too strong and well garrisoned. When I see a Minister most furiously attacked by those who are contending for his Place, I conclude that he is a great Man, and formidable to his Enemies.

Aug. 5. An Evening Paper says, that the Public have already received some Benefit from the late Petitions; as a late P— is said to have last Week paid into the Treasury a Sum no less than 100,000l.

It is reported, that the late great Failures in Exchange Alley, are for upwards of one Hundred Thousand Pounds; that some of the Gentlemen, already publicly declared Defaulters for very large Sums, hold Offices under the Government; and it is suspected many others of high Rank, were concerned with, and sheltered under the Cover of some of their Names. It is hoped and expected from the spirited Conduct of their Sufferers, that they will be able to discover all the Parties engaged in this very wicked and extraordinary Proceeding. And as they have nobly rejected an Offer of about one Tenth Part for a Compromise, it is not doubted but they will, for the Public Good, make known, in a few Days, the Names of all others that shall not have fulfilled their Engagements.

An ancient Writer, soon after the Reformation in the Reign of King Edward the Sixth, when the Power and Tyranny of the Romish Clergy were abolished, has the following remarkable prophetic Passage: "The Churchmen were, the Lawyers are, and the Soldiers will be, Masters of the Lives and Fortunes of the good People of this Kingdom."

Aug. 8. A Letter from Paris mentions, that a Reduction of the religious Houses will soon take Place

throughout that Kingdom, and Liberty of Conscience in Matters of Religion be allowed to a fuller extent than heretofore.

On Sunday died at his House in Park-Street, near Grosvenor-Square, the Hon. George Townshend, Esq; one of the Admirals in the white Squadron of his Majesty's Navy, and Uncle to George Viscount Townshend, now Lord Lieut. of Ireland.

It is said that a Military Company of Noblemen's Children will soon be established, of which the Prince of Wales will be appointed Colonel.

A political Writer asserts, that "The Disapprobation of the Earl of Chatham, if true, and the Coldness of the Earl of Bute, have not in the least staggered the Ministry, or added any real Force to opposition. The Two Noble Lords did not possess those conciliating Manners that are calculated to carry Influence into Retirement. Rising into Power in the Decline of Life, they left no Hopes of their Return into Office, after their unaccountable Resignations. The interested never worship any setting Sun; and that Pride, Haughtiness, and Reserve, which are the inseparable Companions of astonishing Talents, acquired no Friends to the Two Earls, whose Affection or Attention outlasted their actual Possession of Power. Upon a strict Review of the State of Parties in this Country, there is less Probability of a Change than in Times of much less Opposition. The Enemies of the present Ministry are not Friends among themselves. Though they all open Batteries against the Servants of the Crown, they keep up flank Fires upon one another. If Grenville likes Rockingham better than he does Grafton, it is only for his being less afraid of the Parts of the Former than of the Abilities of the latter. If Chatham is civil to Bute, it is that he wishes his Lordship should, by secret Intrigue, clear the C—t of the present Ministry; and so, once more, open a Field for his own decrepid Ambition."

Advices from Holland mention the Arrival there, from Bengal, of sundry Armenian and other Asiatic Merchants, on their Way to London, with Complaints against the English Company's Governor, and the Gentlemen of the Council at their above-mentioned Settlements, for sundry grievous Oppressions, which Affair has made a great Noise in Holland.

The several Sheets of the Surry Petition will speedily be brought to Town, and, when joined together, presented to his Majesty. It is believed more than 1500 Freeholders have already signed, though it has as yet never appeared in many Parts of the County. The Number that signed what is called the Surry Address, was exactly 335, Half of whom, it is said, were not Freeholders.

It is now currently reported, that the Marquis of Rockingham will speedily be appointed to a considerable Post in Administration.

Extract of a Letter from Madrid, July 17.

"The King, desirous of putting his Marine on a better Footing than it hath hitherto been, hath taken into his Service a great Number of Shipwrights, who work without Intermision in the different Dock-Yards of the Kingdom, in the Construction of Ships, Frigates, &c."

Aug. 10. The Grenvillian Congress still continues to be frequently held, either at Stowe, or at other Houses of the Members of it; and there seems a great Unity of the Two Earls with each other, and of both with the 'Squire. This gives great Hopes and Expectations to their Friends, and to those who wish a Change of Men and Measures.

Extract of a Letter from Bassia, July 4.

"The French Ministry apply all their Care to augment Agriculture and Commerce in this Island. There are already arrived at Corte several Merchants and Traders, which has considerably raised the Rent of Shops and Warehouses. The Ministry also earnestly endeavour at the Advancement of Arts and Sciences, of which the Corsicans, by Means of the Troubles which have agitated their Country for more than 40 Years, have almost lost all the Traces."

TO THE PRINTER OF THE LONDON EVENING POST,

SIR, KINGS-GATE, July 10.

LORD HOLLAND, seeing in your Paper a Letter from Mr Beckford to a Liveryman, of July 15, 1769, and Mr. Woodhouse being at Spa in Germany, sends you an Authentic Copy of the Paper, which he sent by Mr. Woodhouse to Mr. Beckford: He hopes the Perusal of it will convince the Reader, that all is false that can impute any Crime to Lord Holland.

The Reader will see, that some of Lord Holland's Accounts were then before the Auditor; and there are Two Year's Accounts since lodged there.

He will see that Lord Holland's Accounts (voluminous and difficult beyond Example) have not been kept back from Inclination, but Necessity; and not longer than those of his Predecessors.

He will see (and is desirous to observe particularly) that Savings, so far from remaining all in Lord Holland's Hands, had been given in, and voted in Aid of the Public Service, to the amount of 910,541.1. and 43,531.1. 19s. 7d. (upon some Regimental and other Accounts being adjusted this last Winter) have been since paid and voted.

He will read in it, that Lord Holland desired to be shewn how he could proceed faster than he did. If nobody has shewn, or can shew, how that might have

been, or may be done, does he deserve either Punishment or Censure? And had he not a Right to think himself sure, that Mr. Beckford must have been against the Article in the Petition relating to him? Because Mr. Beckford knew, and could have shown the Lord Mayor in Writing, the utter Falseness of what is there insinuated.

Lord Holland prints the Memorial examined by the Treasury, and the Sign Manual it obtained; stopping Process (not Accounts) for Six Months, which neither did, nor could suspend or delay the Paymaster's Accounts an Hour.

OBSERVATIONS on the Accounts of the PAYMASTER-GENERAL.

WHY were Lord Holland's Accounts, as Paymaster-General, for the Years 1757, 1758, and 1759, not delivered to the Auditors, before the Year 1768?

ANSWER.

THE Paymaster-General's Officers being best acquainted with Army Accounts, are employed in making up the Account of the preceding Paymasters. The Accounts of the Earls of Chatham, Darlington and Kinnoul, and Mr. Potter, were made up by them, and regularly, and in due Course, delivered to the Auditors.

Great as the Army and its Expenses were, during the last War, beyond all former Example, dispersed in all Quarters of the World; and difficult, as it evidently must have been, to keep the Accounts in any tolerable Order; it will be found upon Examination, that the Accounts of Lord Holland, as Paymaster-General, are not further back than those of his Predecessors, and that his Lordship's Accounts are not kept back, as has been suggested, from Inclination but Necessity.

The late Mr. Winnington's Accounts, for Two Years and a Half, from December 1743 to the 24th of June 1746, were declared the 15th of May 1760. The Earl of Chatham's Accounts, for Nine Years and a Half, from the 25th of June 1746, to the 24th of December 1755, are not yet declared. The Earls of Darlington and Kinnoul for the Year 1756, and the Earl of Kinnoul's and Mr. Potter's, for Six Months, to the 24th of June 1757, are now before the Auditors. The Accounts of Lord Holland, for the Years 1757, 1758, and 1759; likewise the Accounts of his Deputies, attending the Army in Germany, from the Commencement to the End of the late War, are also before the Auditors for their Examination; and his Lordship's Account for the Year 1760, is almost ready to be delivered to them.

From the Nature and Extention of Army Accounts, it is most evident, to those that are best acquainted with them, that it is tedious and difficult to bring even Regimental Accounts to a final Adjustment; other Parts of the Accounts are more so. Lord Holland, in the Course of the Years 1759, 1760, 1761, 1762, 1763, and 1764, has paid to Regiments and Independent Companies, 320,391 l. 9 s. 11 d. whose Accounts are, at this Time, unadjusted, for Want of proper Authorities; and 'til those Authorities are obtained, the Auditor will not allow one Shilling of said Sum, in his Lordship's Accounts; to obtain those Authorities, his Lordship has often repeated his Solicitations.

WHAT is the Balance of Cash in Lord Holland's Hands?

ANSWER.

THE Meaning of this Question can be no other than, what Savings are in Lord Holland's Hands? Or, in other Words, how much has the Expence, in any Case, fallen short of the Sum voted?

As to the Savings:—So far as the Pay Office has been enabled to state the Army Accounts, they have been given into Parliament.

From Services that have fallen short of the Sums voted, and from Monies paid in by Army Accountants, Lord Holland directed Accounts to be made up and laid before the House of Commons; and accordingly (out of these Savings in Lord Holland's Hands) Parliament from Time to Time availed itself of the following Sums, viz.

His Lordship could by no other Means ascertain and give into Parliament the Savings on the Votes for the Army, but by the final Adjustment of Army Accounts; what further Savings may be, is very uncertain, as they cannot be known before the Services are absolutely determined and closed.

His Lordship is very sorry to say it, that in the Years 1759, 1760, 1761, 1762, 1763, and 1764, there are not less than Fifty-six Regiments and Companies now standing open and unadjusted, for Want of Authorities; and in his Ledgers there are Accounts to a much greater Extent, as the Pay of Staff Officers, &c.

It may be seen here, that though Mr. Winnington died in April 1746, and his Executor, Mr. Ingram, used all possible Industry to close his Accounts, they could not be closed 'til 1760; Fourteen Years. The Earl of Chatham went out in December 1755, yet were not his Accounts closed 'til 1768; Thirteen Years. The Earl of Kinnoul's are not closed yet, though he has been out of the Office Eleven Years. Lord Holland has been out Three Years and a Half: Where is the Wonder his are not closed?

If those who complain, will shew Lord Holland how he can proceed faster than he does, he will be very

much obliged to them. Let it be observed, that he has before the Auditors already, Accounts for more than Mr. Winnington or Lord Kinnoul had to account for.

MEMORIAL for LORD HOLLAND to have longer Time to make up his Accounts as late PAYMASTER-GENERAL.

May it please your Lordships

I BEG Leave to inform your Lordships that a Process is in the Hands of the Sheriffs of Middlesex against me, to account to his Majesty for the Monies impressed to me as Paymaster-General of his Majesty's Forces.

I most humbly apprehend that the regular ordinary Course of accounting in the Exchequer was calculated (when established) for Transactions at home, which are easily and readily to be collected and made up at short Periods of Time.

The Accounts of the Army when employed abroad particularly, must unavoidably be much in arrear from the Nature of the Service. The Army Payments are necessarily in arrear; and Articles from Accidents inevitable, are obliged often to remain open a very long Time before they can finally be closed.

The Accounts of the last War are voluminous and difficult beyond Example. The great Variety of Operations, and the very great Distance of the Troops, made, and must make, the Correspondence and adjusting those Accounts with the Paymasters and Accountants attending them, very slow and tedious; these therefore will require longer Time to make up, both from their Bulk and Difficulty.

During the Course of a War, the Troops constantly changing and moving, and the Service in the utmost Hurry, it cannot then be done with the Order and Regularity absolutely necessary.

Since the War, the utmost Diligence has been used in them. The great intricate Article of foreign Expence (viz. the German) has been got together for the whole Time (which, after the former War, was several Years about) and one Year and an Half's general Account is now made out, and ready to be laid before the Auditors; the rest will regularly be laid before them as fast as it is possible to make them up. Though I have been Two Years out of Employment, the Payments for my Time are not as yet completed.

I therefore pray your Lordships will be pleased to obtain his Majesty's Warrant, granting me longer Time for making up my Accounts as Paymaster-General of his Majesty's Forces;

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will not only avail herself of the immense Naval Stores and shipping of that once flourishing Republic, but will also make Great-Britain become an Annual Tributary Power to France, to the yearly Amount of 1,300,000. that Sum being nearly the Interest annually paid to the Dutch for their principal Money in our Funds; but perhaps the Duke de Choiseul may find himself mistaken in the latter Part of his favourite Plan, and probably may only hasten the *spunging off* so much of the Debt of Great-Britain.

We congratulate our Ministry that they have hitherto withstood the pressing Solicitations of many of the European Powers to enter into a continental War, though by such their patriotic Resolution they have given great Umbrage to the most powerful Potentate in the North.

The Reason for the Earl of Bute's unexpected Return at this Time is that his Lordship might have a Conference with his noble Friend Lord Holland, before this Nobleman goes abroad, to which Conference his Grace of Grafton is admitted, as both Lord Bute and Lord Holland cannot be well spared out of the Kingdom again together. Great Things are expected at the West-End of the Town to result from the Conference of this great *Triumvirate*.

July 31. A Nobleman of great Consequence offered a Bet of 1000 Guineas, with a Nobleman out of Administration, that Lord Bute would lay down and adhere to such a conciliating and patriotic Plan as, in the Space of a Year from the Day of his late Return, to become as much the Favourite of the People as ever his Lordship was supposed to be of his Sovereign; and so sanguine was the Peer of the full Completion of his Prophecy that he even offered to leave the Decision of the Bet, on that Day Twelvemonth, to the Opinion of any one Gentleman of either Party, whether in or out of Administration, whom his Antagonist should now think proper to name. Whether from Conviction that the Noble Traveller had now learned a more salutary System of Politics, or from what other Cause, we know not; but this really generous and candid Bet was declined being accepted.

A Motion was lately made, in a private Assembly, for entirely submitting the Formation of a new Ministry to the Earl of Chatham; but this Motion was directly over-ruled, by Two great Officers.

In the North Briton, of July the 15th, an Account is given that in a public Office, the Deputy Clerk, soon after his coming into Office, found in a Painter's Bill of 103l. made out by the Overseer of the Works, an Overcharge of 60l. 10s. 6d. in a Plasterer's Bill of 44l. 19s. 7d. an Overcharge of 22l. 18s. 4d. He positively refused his Certificate to these Bills, but he was obliged by his Superior in that Office to do it. In the Smith's Bills he found an Overcharge of 10,300l. which the Smith was brought to acknowledge. However, he was continued in the Office, and the Deputy Clerk turned out for his Integrity, which was deemed as Impertinence. If the Public is thus robbed, it is not to be wondered at that it is sinking under the enormous Weight of Taxes! And is it not high Time for the Public, as one Man, to call for a Redress of such Enormities?

ST. JOHN'S (in ANTIGUA) August 23, 1769.

Last Thursday, about Three in the Afternoon, a most dreadful Fire broke out at the North-East Part of this Town, occasioned (it is reported) by a Negro throwing into an Oven (when heating) some Staves of a Pitch Barrel, which immediately flamed up to the Roof of the Kitchen, and set the same into a Blaze; the Fire instantly communicated itself to the neighbouring Buildings, with the most raging Fury. The Alarm Bell was rung, and Multitudes assembled to extinguish the Fire, and pulled down several Houses to the West, in Hopes of stopping its destructive Progress; but all was in Vain, the Wind blowing very fresh from East North-East, carried the fiery Shingles along with it, and scattered them on the Roofs of several Houses; in about 15 Minutes the Store of Messieurs Hay and Kingley, to the North of the Parade, became an entire Flame, and set all the Buildings on the Parade, and Stores on the Wharfs, in the same dreadful Conflagration. Having thus destroyed every Thing to the West, down to the Sea, it turned its Fury to the East, and burnt all the Buildings from the Parade up to the Guard-House, and from the Guard-House, in a direct South Line to Mrs. Martin's House, near the Pasture (the Guard-House and Court-House only excepted) to prevent its farther running Eastward, it was judged necessary to blow up Mrs. Martin's and Mrs. Grice's Houses (two very large Buildings) and several others, which happily checked its Fury, and stopt its Progress in that Quarter; yet it still raged in the Center of the Town with great Violence, threatening the Destruction of the remaining Buildings to the East; to hinder its Progress, the Houses belonging to Mr. George Dalzell and several others, were blown up, which, with a large Stone Building on the other Side of the Street, through the Mercy of God, set Bounds to its Fury, and prevented its farther Devolutions.—Dreadful was the Day and Night! The devouring Flames, the Destruction, Confusion and Distress, and Lamentations of the Poor, destitute and ruined Inhabitants, was a scene too melancholy to represent.—The Alarm Guns were fired at the Forts, and the Country Gentlemen exerted their Assistance with their Persons, Carts, and Slaves, to carry what could be saved from the Flames, whilst the Boats in the Harbours, contributed to the same kind Purpose; but the Rapidity of the Fire would not admit Time to get much out of the Stores, so that the Loss was immense. The Custom-House, Arsenal, Jail, and all the Warehouses on the Wharfs, were entirely consumed. The Fire continued with much Violence until Three the next Morning. It is computed that near 300 Houses and Stores are consumed, and that the whole Loss, by the best Computation that can at present be made, amounts to £. 400,000 Currency. All our Provisions, Lumber, &c. are destroyed, and our Distress is truly deplorable. Two white Men, and a Negro, were killed, and another white Man miserably mangled by the Explosions. The Magistrates met the next Morning to give Direction for preventing any farther Damage that might be sustained by the Fire, which still raged in several of the Houses that were not

quite consumed, and the Council and Assembly met on Monday, Tuesday, and this Day, to consider what Measures should be taken to alleviate the Distress of the unhappy Sufferers. We hear they have voted their Thanks to the Officers of his Majesty's 68th Regiment, for the Zeal and Activity they exerted to preserve the Town, and have also voted a Sum of Money to the private Soldiers of said Regiment, as an Acknowledgement for their Services on that Occasion.

CHARLES-TOWN, (South-Carolina,) August 14.
We hear his Majesty's 21st Regiment will embark next Week for St. Augustine.

Letters received over Land from Mobile, of the 12th Ult. inform us, that the Indians in that Quarter behave with much Insolence since the King's Troops have been withdrawn. The Assembly of West-Florida is broke up, but nothing is done towards regulating the Commerce, with those Indians now in great Disorder.

Aug. 18. We are told the Company of the Royal Regiment of Artillery, now here, under the Command of Capt. Gottling, will embark at the same Time with the 21st Regiment for St. Augustine, the Barracks there being completed.

Aug. 30. On Friday last, the Company of the Royal Regiment of Artillery, under the Command of Capt. Gottling, embarked on board the Schooner Expedition, John Doran, Master, and the next Day sailed for St. Augustine.

QUEBEC, August 31.

Friday Night last, about 11 o'Clock, as a poor Man, his Wife, and Two Children, were departing from this City, in a Canoe, to their Farm up the Country, they unluckily run thwart a Ship's Cable in the River, which immediately overfet the Canoe, when, happily for them, the Man instantly catch'd one of the Children with his Teeth, and got hold of the Cable with his Hands, where, with his Wife hanging round his Body, he supported himself and them 'til taken up by some Boats: The other Child was taken up, at some Distance from them, floating on the Water, borne up only by the Blanket, in which it was lying when the Canoe overfet; so that they were all miraculously sav'd, but lost every Thing they had in the Canoe.

ANNAPOLIS, October 12.

A Gentleman from Philadelphia, reports, that while he was in that City, a Ship arrived from Hull, loaded with British Manufactures, which being shipped directly contrary to the Spirit of the American Associations, were not suffered to be landed there; and, that before he left Philadelphia, the Ship was actually sailed for this Province, where, when she arrives, it is hoped she will meet with the like Reception.

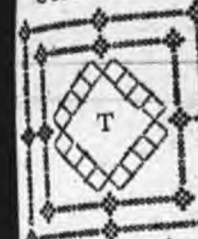

CAMPIGLIA, (in TUSCANY) July 5.

Two little Girls of this Canton, playing together a few Days ago, one of them dropped a Piece of Money; and in searching for it, the biggest of the Two, about Seven Years of Age, lifted up a Board which served as a Cover to a Subterraneous Place, that was dug formerly to lodge Grain in, and fell into it. The Cries of the other brought an Uncle of the former, who went down by Means of a Ladder, and did not appear again, any more than a Ladder. Another Man, who came in the Interim, his Neck. Another Man, who came in the Interim, cried out loudly at the Top of the Pit, and nobody answering, he took Resolution to go down. By this Time other People had successively appeared, who called to the Two Men, but to no Purpose. One of them, a Gentleman's Servant, agreed to be let down by a Rope, but was scarcely descended half Way, when he gave a Shriek; on which he was immediately drawn up, and appeared almost dead. Great Pains, however, were taken to know the Fate of the Two, and after labouring for Twenty-two Hours, they were drawn up by Means of Iron Hooks, but without Life. An Animal was then let down, and brought up dead in a very little Time. This fatal Event has occasioned Enquiry to be made, and it appears that the Cave had been constantly shut for Thirty Years, except a few Moments at different Times, during which, the Refuse of the Vintage had been thrown in.

BERLIN, July 15. Yesterday Evening Prince Henry of Prussia, was married to the Princess Frederica Louisa, of Hesse Darmstadt. After the Ceremony, at which the King, Queen and all the Royal Family, the foreign Ministers and the principal Nobility were present; the whole Court supped at Seven Tables, all served with Gold Plate.

KALUS, July 18. Almost all the Troops which form that Part of the Russian Army commanded by Prince Gallitzin, are at present on the Territories of the Turks, whose Consternation has been very great ever since the Affair of the 13th.—The Seraskier's Army, which was 60,000 strong, is entirely dispersed. In the Place where it had encamped, the Russians made Yesterday several Discharges of Cannon and Musquetry in Sign of Victory. At present it is universally believed, that the Fortrefs of Choczim, in which there is a numerous Garrison, will soon ask to capitulate. The Grand Visir, with his Army, has taken the Rout of Bender, and it is probable that the Russians will follow it.

WARSAW, July 26. The Defeat of the Turks near Choczim is confirmed. The Seraskier, who commanded the Army, retired before the Battle was over, and such of his Troops as had entered the Camp, were driven out from thence and obliged to enter Choczim, to the Number of 13,000 Men. On the 13th the Russians began to batter the Fortrefs. The 13th the Turks made Two Sallies, but were driven back with Loss. If we may believe Letters from Podolia, dated the 17th, the Place was then taken, as the Russians had made a general Discharge in their Camp, in Token of Victory.

The greatest Vigilance has been exerted by the M—y, to prevent the Freeholders of the County of Kent from assembling to consider of the Petition at the present Juncture; but we hear it is universally determined to approach the Throne with their Complaints.

July 22. We are informed that a Petition is now preparing, and will shortly be presented at St. James's, signed by the principal Electors of Westminster, among whom, it is supposed, there are upwards of 400 Members of Parliament, Inhabitants of the City and Liberties thereof, and a very numerous Body of the most respectable Tradefmen; and, 'tis reported, the said Petition will be presented by several Members of Parliament.

July 24. By the last Intelligence it appears, that Matters are in such a critical Footing in the Carnatic, as must lead immediately either to a Peace with Hyder Ally and the Company, or a decisive Action, that must produce very momentous Consequences to one of the Parties.

We hear, that the Loss, which a Northern Baronet sustained at the settling of Differences, last Tuesday, amounts to betwixt Thirty and Forty Thousand Pounds; as he purchased One Hundred Thousand Pounds capital Stock, at Two Hundred and Sixty, to be delivered on that Day; at which Time the Price was fallen to Two Hundred and Thirty-five.

July 26. We hear that the Spirit of Enquiry, which is raised on account of an Article in the Petition of the Livery of London, regarding the Paymaster, will occasion many other Examinations of a similar Nature.

Among the other Enquiries into the long detaining public Money in the Hands of private Persons, the very long and unaccountable Delay of the Payment of the Havannah Prize-Money, will be one.

It is also hoped by many, that an Enquiry into the Profuse, and, as is believed, in many Particulars, unnecessary Expences made by the Board of Works, will be likewise made an Object of Enquiry, in order that the Civil List may not be again brought in Arrear.

Aug. 1. It is most certain, that a ministerial Negotiation is now carrying on, and that it is on a Basis which strongly Promotes the utmost Permanency, being greatly different from, and infinitely more extensive and conciliating than any proposed Administration hitherto in Agitation.

Aug. 3. When the Auditing the Paymaster's Accounts was judged a reasonable Circumstance to be mentioned in an august Assembly, on a past Occasion, a noble Lord, who has of late been much the Subject of public Conversation, was pleased to lament the Delay of Auditing, of which he declared himself most solicitous. He observed, that the Nature and Extension of his Engagements were such as rendered the Preparation of his Accounts the Work of Years, and he begged that it might be remembered, that even at a Time when our Connexions were limited, it was only by slow Degrees such a Work was capable of Accomplishment; that at former Periods, Europe alone was the Object of Attention, but it was to the Four Corners of the World, that his Care is now branched out, nevertheless, it was not his Fault, but the Auditor's, that the Day of settling had not arrived; it was for him to be ready, and ready he had been, and did then declare himself, consequently it rested wholly in the Auditor to give him and his Country the desired Satisfaction. The Result of this Harangue was, that Mr. A—, the Auditor, who was then present, instantly rose up in his own Vindication. He began with protesting his Astonishment at what he had heard: "Can it be possible said he; (or Words to such Effect) for Mr. F— to speak a Language so utterly incompatible with Facts, and so open to Detection? Does not he recollect that I am present, and have no Terms to keep with him? The Auditorship is beyond his Regulation, it is a Patent Place, and though the Salary does not amount to more than a few Pounds a Year, it has nevertheless some very eligible Emoluments; the Emoluments of the Auditorship are not unknown to the Right Honourable Gentleman: Sixpence upon every Pound of the Sums I audit are mine. To the good Sense of this House I therefore Appeal: He has confessed that many Millions are yet unaccounted for; should I die before these Accounts are passed, my Perquisites die with me; and who will believe that perhaps Forty Millions of Sixpences can be an undesirable Acquisition for my Family? I am sorry to be compelled to fight against any Man with such keen Weapons; Facts cut deep; but where Facts are so daringly challenged, Compassion would cease to be a Virtue—nor can it be concealed that it was Mr. F—'s Interest to avoid, what it was my Interest to bring to an Issue. The Fatigues of the Paymaster are very considerable, his Salary very trifling; 4000l. a Year is the Whole of his Stipend; if we except the 100,000l. allowed at all Times by the Wisdom of Government to remain in his Hands, as a necessary Appendix to his Employment, the Produce of which, on the most simple and legal Plan, is an additional 3000l. Annually. From this just State of the Case, which will the judicious Part of Mankind be inclined to blame, the Auditor, or the Paymaster? Will they suppose the Auditor indolent out of Compliment to the Paymaster, or the Paymaster remiss from the Apprehension of being troublesome to the Auditor? The Tale tells ill. Mr. F— frequently complains of the Difficulty, the Length of Time requisite to obtain proper Testimony of his Disbursements; but whence this Difficulty? Might not his Deputies be multiplied in Proportion to the Necessity? Might not a due Balance be struck at the coming of every Period, and such Peripatuity observed, as would obviate all Impediments. Government is too considerate to lay the labouring Oar on his Shoulders, but if he denies himself, for wise Purposes, the Assistance it generously grants him, he should, at least, be politically silent.

To the Right Honourable Lord HOLLAND.
My Lord,

YOUR Lordship's kind Publication of the Paper, which Mr. Woodhouse delivered to Mr. Beckford, has thrown some light on the Question, whether your Lordship is the public Defaulter intended by the Livery: But unhappily for your Lordship, neither the Public, nor Mr. Beckford, are convinced of your Innocence. For the present I will suppose that the Paper you have published, is an authentic Copy of that which

Mr. Beckford received; and under that Supposition presume to ask your Lordship a few Questions.

1. You admit you were appointed Paymaster in 1757, and that 'til 1768 you had not delivered any Part of your Account. Was it not reasonable, after Ten Years, to compel you to begin to account? And yet you obtained a Sign-Manual to stay the Course of public Justice; and this at a Time when you will not deny that you had received more than Forty Millions of the public Money.

2. Doth your Paper State or Account for how much Money you had received, or even mention the Balance of any one Year's Account? How then could Mr. Beckford know that the Charge of your being a public Defaulter was false; or will you say that you paid back to the Treasury the Balances which the Accounts you have produced to be audited admit to be in your Hands?

3. Have you given Mr. Beckford, or the Public any Account capable of Examination, or will you pretend that the 910,541l. 18s. 3d. of which you say Parliament has, from Time to Time, availed itself, and Part of which you detained 'til 1768, is the full Balance of the Accounts you have delivered to be audited?

4. You obtained the Sign-Manual on a Suggestion that your last Account was not completed—was that a good Reason why your first Account ought not to have been begun? And ought not you, from Time to Time, to have been compelled immediately to pay back what your Account admitted to be due?

5. Has not the Exchequer Process been stayed by more Mandates than you have published; and is a Suppression of Truth a Proof of Innocence?

6. Can you declare, upon your Honour, that you are not, at this Time, possessed of Balances to a very great Amount? This is a Satisfaction which your Lordship can immediately give; and if you do not, your Lordship must, for the present, content yourself with being thought the public Defaulter.

7. Has your Lordship kept your Promise, made when his Majesty granted you the first stop to the Process of the Law? And have you laid before the Auditors your Accounts as fast as it was possible to make them up? And if you have not, are you not more to blame than a public Defaulter?

8. Have not the Public a Right to complain, if they have just Reason to believe that they are paying to your Lordship Interest for their own Money?

When your Lordship has fully answered these Queries, the Public will be better able to judge; at present they are of Opinion, that it was not possible for so sensible a Man as Mr. Beckford to be convinced by so evasive a Paper as that which you have published.

A LIVERYMAN.

Aug. 10. Tuesday a Courier from Petersburg, arrived at his Excellency the Russian Ambassador's, in Soho-Square, with the Confirmation and Particulars, it is said, of the late Victory gained by the Russians over the Turks.

We hear that the Livery of London have been well advised to summon a Common Council to meet on the 25th of this Month, at the Half-Moon Tavern, in Case the Grievances specified in their Petition be not redressed, on, or before the 28th Current: The 40 Days allowed by Magna Charta, for the Redress of Grievances on Petition, being fully complete, and ended on the 24th Day of August. So that the Design our Ministry had proposed to themselves, for carrying over the Hearing of the City Petition 'til the Opening of the next Parliament, may probably prove abortive.

We hear that the late Tour of a great Person to the West, was to learn the Temper of the People in that Part of the Country; several other great Persons are in other Counties, it is supposed on a like Errand.

It is apprehended by a certain Nobleman, and imagined now by all his Friends, that it will not be long ere he is cited to appear before a certain Assembly in the City, to answer some Charges of a very peculiar and weighty Nature, respecting his former Conduct, in the Use of the great Power entrusted with him.

To show the vast Increase of the East-India Trade, within so short a Time as 20 Years ago, there were not above 16 Ships in the Company's Service, and now they have between 60 and 70 Sail.

The Company's Territories in the East-Indies, at present, are computed to be 1000 Miles in Length, and about 600 wide.

We hear his Majesty's Third Son will be created Duke of York.

In the Year 1742, the British Ministry having insisted on the French Court's sending the young Pretender out of its Dominions, otherwise they would not send any Ambassador whilst he remained there, the Demand was complied with, and the Pretender was even taken out of the Box at the Play-House, and banished: In Return for which, the French, it is said, have now insisted on our Court's not harbouring or permitting Paoli, the Corsican Chief, to come to England, or they will recall their Ambassador. Which is reported to be the true Reason of Paoli's not coming.

A Letter from Bengal in February last, to a Gentleman here, says, "We have had great Alarms on the Coast, occasioned by the Advance of a Body of Troops under Hyder Ally, who has taken Two or Three

Ports, some Pieces of Cannon, and several Prisoners from us; which Success has so greatly elated him, as to make him enter on further Enterprises. The above Occurrence, for the present, occasions the utmost Confusion on all Parts of the Coast."

Aug. 12. Letters from Italy, of the latest Date, intimate, that General Paoli's Flight from Corsica, is to be ascribed to political Motives, and not those of absolute Necessity; and that it is the strong Opinion of the Italian Politicians, that as soon as the brave General has negotiated the important Affairs which brought him to the Continent, he will return to Corsica, collect his scattered Forces and Companions, join M. de Abatucci, and rise, like a Phoenix, from her Ashes, with a renewed and double Vigour.

By a Person arrived in Town, from Bombay, who came home in the Asia Indiaman, we are informed, that a considerable Quantity of Treasure, in Gold and Silver, with very antique Inscriptions thereon, had, some Time before the Ship sailed from that Place, been dug up in a Cave within a few Miles of Bombay, supposed to have been deposited there long before any European Settlement had been made on that Coast.

The last Letters from Gibraltar mention, that a Moorish Admiral had just entered the Mediterranean, with 9 Sail of stout Corsairs, fitted out, by Order of the Emperor of Morocco, to cruise against the small European Powers, with which that Prince is at War.

BRISTOL, Aug. 12. Last Wednesday was held a Meeting of the Freeholders of the County of Worcester, at the County-Hall in that City, in order to consider of, and sign a Petition, for a Redress of their violated Rights of Election, which was agreed to without one dissenting Voice. At this Meeting were present, Mr. Dowdeswell, and a very considerable Number of Freeholders.

We hear the City of Worcester intends following the same Example next Week.

It is expected that the Meeting of the Freeholders of the County of Wilts, on Wednesday next at Devizes, will be the largest ever known on any Occasion, as all Parts of the County seem zealously determined to exert their utmost to promote a Petition to the Throne (or to the Three Estates of the Realm, King, Lords and Commons) to obtain a Redress of their several Grievances, and to the Support of their Right of free Election.

QUEBEC, September 7.

We hear from Montreal, that on Monday the 4th Instant, about 7 o'Clock in the Morning, there was felt there a Shock of an Earthquake, attended with a rumbling Noise like Thunder, which shook all the Houses in Town, but it is hoped has not done any Damage.

NEW-YORK, October 5.

Extra of a Letter from Pensacola, dated August 19, 1769.

"If the Spaniards do not take this Province from us, it will soon become of Consequence.—On the 2d Instant, arrived at New-Orleans, General O'Reilly, to take possession of Louisiana for the King of Spain; they write me, he has brought with him 4500 Troops; but from the Number of Transports, I do not suppose they can have brought, with him, 2500 or 3000; and if they had no Intention of employing them any Way else, that is too many by 2000.—We have certain Intelligence, that for some Time past, the Spaniards at the Havanna, have been tampering with some of the Creek Indian Chiefs, and next Month are to have a Congress with them at Apalachicola River.—The Spaniards want Land to make a Settlement there, which if they procure, can make themselves Masters of this Province when they please, and probably will prevail on the Indians to go to War with the Neighbouring Provinces.—It appears the Spaniards are determined to drive us out of the Province if they can; they are exceedingly jealous of our being so near the Coast of Mexico, and in Case of a War, our being able from the Situation of this Port, to put an entire Stop to their Trade in the Bay of Mexico.—Most of the French at New-Orleans seem determined to leave that Place and come and settle on this Side the Mississippi.

We are assured, there are several Letters received in this City from New Orleans, by Way of Philadelphia, brought thither by Capt. Moor of this Place, who is arrived there from New Orleans, which advise, that General O'Reilly had arrived there from the Havanna, with about 4000 black and white Spanish Troops, to take possession of that Place, which he did very peaceably, having made fair Promises to the French People; but before he had been there Three Days, he artfully seized 12 or more of the principal French Merchants, as Heads of the Riot, in which the Spaniards were drove from thence some Time ago, and confined them. The Spanish General received Captain Harris of this Place very kindly, and promised him his Aid and Protection in his Trade.

PHILADELPHIA,

October 5. On Saturday last arrived here from Hull, the Brig Friends Good Will, William Spicer, Master, and brought a considerable Quantity of British Merchandise, shipped by some Traders in England on their own Account and Risk, and consigned to sundry Persons in this City. As these Goods were shipped contrary to the Agreements entered into by our Merchants and Traders, and after the same was known in England, the Persons to whom they are consigned, do not receive them, as the Committee, in this Case, cannot store them; they are therefore, we hear, to be carried back. This firm, determined and peaceable Conduct, may convince the World, that as our Merchants and Traders entered into their Agreements with Deliberation, so they are resolved inviolably to adhere to them; at the same Time it is hoped that this Instance of their Resolution, will discourage any farther Attempts to violate, or take Advantage of their Agreements.

Extra of a Letter from Carlisle, dated September 24, 1769.

"On the 22d Instant James Smith, an Inhabitant of the upper Part of this County, was committed to Jail, for the Murder of a certain John Johnston, which hap-

pened on the 10th Instant, near Bedford, and for Particulars refer you to the inclosed Depositions. Yesterday Morning, to our great Astonishment, we had Intelligence that a large Party of armed and disguised Men, were within Ten Miles of this Town, in order to take the Prisoner out of this Jail, alledging that we would send him to Philadelphia, to take his Trial. Upon this Notice, John Armstrong, and John Montgomery, Esquires, and the Reverend Mr. John Steel, rode out to meet them, while sundry of the Magistrates assisted the Sheriff in raising a Guard to defend the Jail; and accordingly met them, blacked and armed with Rifle Guns, and prevailed with them to stop and converse on the Subject of their present Intention.

"The Result of the Conversation was, that Two Persons (who had not blacked themselves yet) and who came down from the Neighbourhood of the others, should be admitted to see the Prisoner, and bring a Letter from his own Hand, shewing whether he chose to stand his Trial, or go with them; which Expedient was granted them, only to prevent the Effusion of Blood, together with Assurance, that Smith would receive his Trial in the County. They farther insisted, that Bail should be taken, saying, that several of the best Freeholders of that Part of the County would enter his Bail, swearing, as a few of them did, in an outrageous Manner, that if that Request was not complied with, their Fire Arms should be his Bail. To this it was replied, that the Magistrates here had not that Power, but would represent the Matter to the Governor and Chief Justice, provided the Persons they mentioned would request it, and enter for him. Accordingly the Prisoner sent them a candid Letter, declaring his Desire to have a Trial by the Laws of his Country, begging them to return Home, &c.

"Notwithstanding this, they rushed into Town, and coming to the Jail Door, which was properly secured, by a Guard within, and armed Men in sundry private Houses: The Prisoner extended his Hands as far as he could through the Windows, and begged them, in a solemn Manner, to return, and to shed no innocent Blood; which, together with the Exertion of the Magistrates, prevailed with them to go off. As we expected, they tarried near the Town all Night, and appeared to set off about Day-break; but finding their Numbers increasing, it is thought they design a vigorous Attack. They have Spies on every Road, and we look for them every Moment, being assured, that as soon as they think themselves strong enough, they will return.

"We have Accounts of a large Number coming from Potowmack, and look for no other Terms from them, than to deliver up the Prisoner, or have the Town, at least some Houses near the Prison, burnt to Ashes. We are in great Confusion, but yet determined to defend the Jail to the last Extremity, and no Measures have been left unimproved; nor can we think of any, farther than that of admitting Bail, which we can by no Means do, only thus represent the Situation we are in.

"Sundry People have joined the Rioters (not blacked) but whether to influence their return, or otherwise, we cannot yet learn. We have no other Method of hiring the Prison Guard, purchasing Ammunition, or paying Expreses, but on the Credit of a few Persons, which Expence will, but too probably, be requisite for a considerable Time, of which we hope to be relieved by the Honourable the House of Assembly.

"We are greatly assisted by sundry Gentlemen in Town, and a Number of the good Inhabitants, who exert themselves in a spirited and becoming Manner. We just now learn that the Rioters are about Six Miles from hence, apparently moving homewards, which we have some Expectations they will do, unless reinforced by a considerable Number."

Since receiving the above, we are assured, from good Information, that the Number of the Rioters having increased to 150, they had returned within a few Miles of Carlisle; but hearing of the Reception they were likely to meet with, from the Inhabitants being well prepared for them, and the Persuasion of some well disposed Persons, they went off.

ANNAPOLIS, October 19.

We hear from Frederick-Town, Frederick County, that some Waggons arrived there the 10th Inst. from Philadelphia and Baltimore-Town, in which were Two or Three Hundred Pounds Currency worth of Goods, not accompanied with proper Certificates; the Gentlemen to whom they were sent, immediately on their being unloaded, gave them up to be stored at their Risk and Cost: The Goods are stored accordingly.

On Tuesday Morning died, greatly lamented, at his Seat near Queen-Anne, Prince-George's County, William Murdock, Esq; for many Years a Representative of that County, in the General Assembly. He was a Gentleman of strict Integrity and solid Judgment, and in him, it may truly be said, the Public have lost a valuable Member of the Community.

It is expected there will be good Deversion here next Week, during the Races, as 15 Horses are already named to start for the several Purse.

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Extra of another Letter, dated New-York, Sept. 24.

"On Tuesday last Mr. T. R.—son mounted the Roftrum, facing Liberty Pole in the Fields, and made his public Acknowledgment.—He is a Jeweller from England, with about 300 l. Sterling in Trinkets, &c. but he hath been obliged to consent to store them under the Care of the Committee.

"It is reported here, that all Intercourse with Rhode-Island is nearly shut up, as if the Plague was there, as we will neither sell to them, or ship them any Goods, nor receive any from thence, nor suffer them to sell any in this Province."

It is said, that at Philadelphia, they propose to have no Intercourse in Trade with Rhode-Island.

At a Meeting of the Freeholders and other Inhabitants of the Town of Boston, legally assembled at Faneuil-Hall, on Wednesday the 24th of October, 1769.

The Hon. Thomas Cushing, Esq; Moderator.

AGREABLE to the Notification of the Select-Men, it was ordered, that the authentic Copies of the several Letters, Memorials, &c. wrote by Governor Bernard, Commodore Hood, the Commissioners of the Customs, and others, to the Ministry, which were laid before the Parliament, and transmitted to the Select-Men by William Bolland, Esq; be read, so far as they relate to this Town: And they were read accordingly.

A Motion was thereupon made, and it was unanimously voted, that the Thanks of the Town be, and hereby are given to William Bolland, Esq; for his generous Care in transmitting to the Select-Men, authentic Copies of Letters wrote to his Majesty's Ministers of State, by Governor Bernard, General Gage, Commodore Hood and others, and also of several Memorials of the Commissioners of the Customs in America—in which Letters and Memorials, the Disposition and Conduct of the Inhabitants of the Town have been grossly misrepresented to our Sovereign, in Consequence whereof they have been sensibly affected with the Marks of his Majesty's Displeasure—and that the Moderator be directed to transmit this Vote of Thanks to Mr. Bolland, for so seasonable and important a Service.

It was also unanimously voted, that the Hon. Thomas Cushing, Esq; Mr. Samuel Adams, John Adams, Esq; the Hon. James Otis, Esq; Dr. Joseph Warren, Richard Dana, Esq; Joshua Henthaw, Esq; Joseph Jackson, Esq; and Benjamin Kent, Esq; be, and hereby are appointed a Committee to consider what Measures are proper to be taken, to vindicate the Character of the Town from the false and injurious Representations contained in the Letters and Memorials aforesaid, and report at the Adjournment of this Meeting.

After which, upon a Motion made, the following Vote was unanimously passed:

THE Merchants, not only of this Metropolis, but through the Continent, have nobly preferred the public Good to their own private Emolument: And with a View to obtain a Redress of the Grievances so loudly and justly complained of, having almost unanimously engaged to suspend their Importations from Great-Britain: A Measure approved by all Orders, as legal, peaceable and most likely of all others to effect the salutary Design in View; and which will be regarded by Posterity with Veneration, for the disinterested and truly public Spirit appearing in it: The Town cannot but express their Astonishment and Indignation, that any of the Citizens should be so lost to the Feelings of Patriotism and the common Interest, and so thoroughly and infamously selfish, as to obstruct this very Measure, by continuing their Importation. Be it therefore solemnly voted, that the Names of those Persons—few indeed, to the Honour of the Town, viz. John Bernard, Nathaniel Rogers, Theophilus Lillie, James M'Masters and Company, John Mein, Thomas Hutchinson, jun. and Eliza Hutchinson,—be entered on the Records of this Town, that Posterity may know, who these Persons were that preferred their little private Advantage to the common Interest of all the Colonies in a Point of the greatest Importance; who not only deserted, but opposed their Country, in a Struggle for the Rights of the Constitution, that must ever do it Honour; and who, with a Design to enrich themselves, basely took Advantage of the generous Self-Denial of their Fellow Citizens for the common Good.

Ordered, That the foregoing Votes be printed in the several public News-Papers.

Then the Meeting was adjourned to Wednesday the 28th Instant, at 10 o'Clock in the Forenoon.

Notwithstanding the above Meeting was so full a one, the Merchants of the Town, were, during the whole Time, at the Representatives Chamber, on Business of Importance which concerned the general Cause.

Tuesday Morning last arrived here, the Brig Wolf, Capt. Bryant, from London, which he left the 28th of July last. In the Brig came Passengers, Samuel Verner, Esq; late Secretary to the Board of Commissioners, Capt. Lyde, Capt. Coppinger, Mr. Patrick Smith, a Merchant from London, and several others, among whom were one or Two Hatters and Jewellers.

On the Arrival of the above Vessel, a Meeting of the Merchants was immediately called, and the following Transactions voted to be published.

THE Merchants of this Town, met at Faneuil-Hall, on the Third of October Instant, and being informed that Mr. Patrick Smith, a Stranger from London, had imported a Quantity of Goods in the Brigantine Wolf, John Bryant, Master, and considering that in case Strangers might import Goods, while the Merchants were obligated not to import any, it would have a direct Tendency to frustrate the Design of their Agreement, and so be attended with fatal Consequences, they appointed a Committee to apply to Mr. Smith, and desire his Attendance, who accordingly attended and signed an Agreement to reship his Goods for London, a Copy of which is hereafter inserted: Capt. Nathaniel Byfield Lyde, and Mr. Colburn Barrel, also appeared at the Meeting and signed similar Agreements, which are also inserted below.

And at a Meeting of the Merchants the Fourth Instant a Gentleman appeared, and at the Request of Thomas and Eliza Hutchinson, informed the Merchants that they were ready to treat with them with Respect to the Goods they had imported; upon which a Committee was appointed to hear their Proposals: The Committee accordingly had a Conference with them, and reported that they had acceded to every Article of the Agreement of the Merchants, and had engaged to deliver up the Eighteen Chests of Tea, they imported in Captain Bryant; as also any other Goods that they might receive by any other Vessel.—The Committee also reported, that Mr. Theophilus Lillie met them, and acceded to the Agreement, and entered into similar Engagements.

Which Report was accepted.

The Merchants sent a Message to Nathaniel Rogers, John Bernard and James M'Masters, requesting their Attendance at the Meeting at Half after Three o'Clock P. M.—Their several Answers were highly insolent, and justly deserving of Censure, particularly the Answer received from James M'Masters, who refused to attend, and told Mr. Gore and Mr. Freeman, that the Merchants might do as they pleased, that he found they intended to make a Riot, which he should be glad to see!

Voted unanimously, That these several Persons by continuing their Importations from Time to Time, contrary to the Sense of the Trade, notwithstanding the Pains that has been taken to prevail with them to accede to the Agreement, have discovered a base Attachment to their own little private Interests and a total disregard to that of the Public: It appears they have had a settled Design to counteract and defeat the generous Efforts of the Merchants, and have acted altogether unbecomingly the Character of good Citizens, and therefore are not only unworthy of the Countenance and Favour of the Public in any Respect, but, by this their Conduct, have rendered themselves justly obnoxious to all who have any Regard for the Welfare of their Country.

Voted, That the Committee of Inspection be, and hereby are desired to make strict Enquiry after such Persons as may hereafter purchase Goods of those who continue to import from Great-Britain, contrary to the Agreement of the Merchants, and publish their Names in the News-Papers.

Voted unanimously, That the Conduct of the standing Committee is highly worthy of our Approbation, and we accordingly approve of it in every Instance, especially in the fair, just and impartial Account which they published the 28th of August last, relative to such Goods as have been imported from Great-Britain since the Agreement of Non-importation has taken Place, in Answer to the fallacious and scandalous Assertions of one John Mein, in his many scurrilous and abusive Publications.
