OBSERVATIONS on the Accounts of the PAY-MASTER-GENERAL.

W HY were Lord Holland's Accounts, as Paymafter-General, for the Years 1757, 1758, and 1759, not delivered to the Auditors, before the Year 1768?

ANSWER. HE Paymaster-General's Officers being best acquainted with Army Accounts, are employed in making up the Account of the preceding Paymafters. The Accounts of the Earls of Chatham, Darlington and Kinnoul, and Mr. Potter, were made up by them, and regularly, and in due Course, delivered to the Auditors.

Great as the Army and its Expences were, during the last War, beyond all former Example, dispersed in all Quarters of the World; and difficult, as it evidently must have been, to keep the Accounts in any tolerable Order; it will be found upon Examination, that the Accounts of Lord Holland, as Paymaiter-General, are not further back than those of his Predecessors, and that his Lordship's Accounts are not kept back, as has been suggested, from Inclinati-

on but Necessity.

The late Mr. Winnington's Accounts, for Two Years and a Half, from December 1743 to the 24th of June 1746, were declared the 15th of May 1760. The Earl of Chatham's Accounts, for Nine Years and an Half, from the 25th of June 1746, to the 24th of December 1755, are not yet declared. The Earls of Darlington and Kinnoul for the Year 1756, and the Earl of Kinnoul's and Mr. Potter's, for Six Months, to the 24th of June 1757, are now before the Auditors. The Accounts of Lord Holland, for the Years 1757, 1758, and 1759; likewise the Accounts of his Deputies, attending the Army in Germany, from the Commence-ment to the End of the late War, are also before the Auditors for their Examination; and his Lordship's Account for the Year 1760, is almost ready to be deli-

vered to them. From the Nature and Extention of Army Accounts, it is most evident, to those that are best acquainted with them, that it is tedious and difficult to bring even Regimental Accounts to a final Adjustment other Parts of the Accounts are more fo. Lord Holland, in the Course of the Years 1759, 1760, 1761, 1762, 1763, and 1764, has paid to Regiments and Independent Companies, 320,391 l. 98. 11 d. whose Accounts are, at this Time, unadjusted, for Want of proper Authorities; and 'tit those Authorities are obtained, the Audior will not allow one Shilling of said Sum, in his Lordship's Accounts; to obtain those Authorities, his Lordship has often repeated his Solitations.

W HAT is the Balance of Cash in Lord Holland's Hands ?

ANSWER. HE Meaning of this Question can be no other than, what Savings are in Lord Hollands Hands? in other Words, how much has the Expence, in any Cafe. fallen short of the Sum voted ?

As to the Savings :- So far as the Pay Office has been enabled to state the Army Accounts, they have

been given into Parliament.

From Services that have fallen short of the Sums voted, and from Monies paid in by Army Accountants, Lord Holland directed Accounts to be made up and laid before the House of Commons; and accordingly (out of these Savings in Lord Holland's Hands) Parliament from Time to Time availed itself of the following Sums, viz.

His Lordship could by no other Means afcertain and give into Parliament the Savings on the Votes for the Army, but by the final Adjustment of Army Accounts; what further Savings may be, is very uncertain, as they cannot be known before the Services are absolutely determined and closed.

His Lordship is very forry to fay it, that in the Years 1759, 1760, 1761. 1762, 1763, and 1764, there are not less than Fifty fix Regiments and Companies now standing open and unadjusted, for Want of Authorities; and in his Ledgers there are Accounts to a

thorities; and in his Ledgers there are Accounts to a much greater Extent, as the Pay of Staff Officers, &c. It may be feen here, that though Mr. Winnington died in April 1746, and his Executor, Mr. Ingram, used all possible Industry to close his Accounts, they could not be closed 'til 1760; Fourteen Years. The Earl of Chatham went out in December 1755, yet were not his Accounts closed 'til 1768; Thirteen Years. The Earl of Kinnoul's are not closed yet, though he has been out of the Office Eleven Years. Lord Holland has been out Three Years and a Half: Where is land has been out Three Years and a Half: Where is the Wonder his are not closed?

May it please your Lordsbips BEG Leave to inform your Lordships that a Pro-cess is in the Hands of the Sheriffs of Middlesex against me, to account to his Majesty for the Monies impressed to me as Paymaster-General of his Majesty's

I most humbly apprehend that the regular ordinary Course of accounting in the Exchequer was calculated (when established) for Transactions at home, which are easily and readily to be collected and made up at fhort Periods of Time.

The Accounts of the Army when employed abroad particularly, must unavoidably be much in arrear from the Nature of the Service. The Army Payments are necessarily in arrear; and Articles from Accidents inevitable, are obliged often to remain open a very long.

Time before they can finally be closed.

The Accounts of the last War are voluminous and difficult beyond Example. The great Variety of Operations, and the very great Distance of the Troops, made, and must make, the Correspondence and adjusting those Accounts with the Paymasters and Accountants attending them, very slow and tedious to puting those Accounts with the Paymasters and Accountants attending them, very slow and tedious; these therefore will require longer Time to make up, both from their Bulk and Difficulty.

During the Course of a War, the Troops constantly changing and moving, and the Service in the utmost Hurry, it cannot then be done with the Order and Regularity absolutely necessary.

Since the War, the utmost Diligence has been used in them. The great intricate Article of foreign Expence (viz. the German) has been got together for the whole Time (which, after the former War, was several Years about) and one Year and an Half's general Account is now made out, and ready to be laid before the Auditors; the rest will regularly be laid before them as fast as it is possible to make them up. Though I have been Two Years out of Employment, the Payments for my Time are not as yet compleated-

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

A CHARACTER, WILKES, Efq;



F all political Adventurers Mr. Pitt has been the most fuccefsful, according to the venal Ideas of modern Statefmen. Pulteney fold the People only for a barren Title. The mercenary Pitt disposed of his Popularity like an Exchange-Broker. Befides the fame Title with the other Apostate,

Pitt secured from the Crown a large Family Pension, and the sucrative Sinecure of the Privy Seal, which he held for a few Years. His Retreat into the House of Lords was a political Demife. He paffed away, but is not yet quite forgotten. His Treachery to the Caufe of the People fill loads his Memory with Curfes.

He raifed himself to the greatest Offices of the State the rare Talent of Command in a popular Affemy. He was indeed born an Orator, and from Nature possessed every outward requisite to bespeak Respect, and even Awe. A manly Figure, with the Eagle Face of the samous Condé, fixed your Attention, and almost commanded Reverence, the Moment he appeared; and the keen Lightnings of his Eye spoke the haughty, siery Soul, before his Lips had pronounced a Syllable. His Tongue dropped Venom. There was a Kind of Fascination in his Look, when he eyed any one askance. Nothing could withstand the Force of that Contagion. The fluent Murray has faultered, and even Fox shrunk back, appalled from an Adversary fraught with Fire unquenchable, if I may borrow the Expression of our great Milton. He always cultivated the Art of Speaking with the most intense Care and Application. He has passed his Life in the Culling of offessed every outward requisite to bespeak Respect, Application. He has paffed his Life in the Culling of Words, the Arrangement of Phrases, and Choice of Metaphors, yet his theatrical Manner did more than all, for his Speeches could not be read. There was neither found Reasoning nor Accuracy of Expression in them. He had not the Power of Argument, nor the Correctness of Language, so striking in the great Reman Orator, but he had the Verba Ardentia, the bold, glowing Words. This Marie was confined to his glowing Words. This Merit was confined to his Speeches; for his Writings were always cold, lifeless, and incorrect, totally void of Elegance and Energy, fometimes even offending against the plainest Rules of Construction. In the Pursuit of Eloquence he was indefatigable. He dedicated all his Powers and Faculties, and he facrificed every. Pleasure of focial Life, even in Youth, to the fingle Point of talking well,

Multa tulit fecitque puer ; sudavit et alsit Abflinuit venere et vino,

to a greater Degree than almost any Man of his Age. He acknowledged, that when he was young, he al-ways came late into Company, and left it early. He affected at first, a fovereign Contempt of Money, and when he was Paymafter, made a Parade of Two or Three very public Acts of Difinterestedness. When he had effectually duped his credulous Friends, as well as a timid Ministry, and obtained enormous Legacies, Pensions, and finecure Places, the Mask dropped off. Private Interest afterwards appeared to be the only Idol to which he facrificed. The old Duke of Newcassle used to say, that Mr. Pitt's Talents awould not have get him Forty Pounds a-Year in any Country but this.

At his Entrance into Parliament, he attacked Sir Robert Walkele with independs a continued

Robert Walpole with indecent Acrimony, and continued the Perfecution to the last Moment of that Minister's Life. He afterwards paid fervile and fulfome Compliments to his Memory, not from Conviction, as appeared from many other Particulars, but to get over a tew Walpelians, He had no fixed Principle, but that of his own Advancement. He declared for and against continental Connections, for and against German Wars, for and against Hanoverian Subsidies, &c. &c. still preserving an unblushing, unembarrassed Countenance, and was the most perfect Contradiction of a Man to himself which the World ever saw. If his speeches in Parliament had been faithfully published to the English, soon after they were delivered, as those of Demossbenes and Cicero were to the Greeks and Romans, he would have been very early detected, and utterly cast off by his Countrymen. cast off by his Countrymen.

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From the Frontiers of TURKEY, June 28. THE Ottoman Grand Army is in full march, by the Route it has taken, the Vifir feems to intend penetrating into the Ruffian Ukraine, by the Way of

Prince Gallitzin's Army is obliged to act on the Defensive. His Light Troops sometimes advance into Podolia, and towards the Niester, but are not able to keep their Ground. Several Detachments of Turkish Troops have lately made Incursions beyond the Niester, and we have just heard that one of these Corps from Choczim, has had a fmart Skirmish, near Kamintec, with a Body of Prince Proforowski's Troops, who were obliged to retire with considerable Loss. The Turks carried off with them Thirty-fix Podolian Peafants, but the Pacha of Choczim has ordered them imme-

diately to be fet at Liberty.

The Confederates of Barnhold have their Head-Quarters near Bambiena, and intended to penetrate into the Heart of Poland, as foon as they are joined by an Army of 20,000 Turks, which, it is faid by fome, have been detached from the Army of the Grand Vifir, for that Purpose; though others think that this Body of Men will not be in Motion 'til the Vifir has put it out of the Power of Prince Gallitzin to give him any Apprehensions. The last mentioned General is to be reinforced by all the Infantry under Count Roman-zow, who is encamped at Nieper with Ten Regiments of Dragoons, and 25,000 Cossacks and Calmucks, in order to observe the Motions of the Tartars.

PETERSBURG, July 4. A few Days ago 12 Ships of War, making Part of the Fleet fitting out at Cronstadt, put to Sea. They will be immediately followed by the Reft, to which will be added others now fitting out at Revel. The Destination of these Squadrons is still a

ONDON, July 24. We hear that James Sampson, Esq; whom the King appointed for his Consul at Algiers, in 1766, has lately presented Two Petitions to his Majefty, one from himself, and the other from his Friends, with the Names of 23 Members of the House of Commons, and other respectable Persons, amounting to 100 Signatures: The Petition was wrote on Thirty Sheets of Paper, containing a State of his Case, and the Manner in which he shewed his Zeal, for the Honour of his Majesty and the British Nation, by pro-curing the Algerines to make an Apology for their irregular Conduct, and to comply with the Terms they had refused, when Two of his Majesty's Ships were sent to Algiers upon that Occasion. It is said, if the Particulars of this Affair were to be published, they would lay open a very extraordinary Scene, and that if 10,000l. were given to Mr. Sampson, it would not be a fufficient Compensation for the Injuries he has fustained.

quer the Dutch Provinces or to compel them to enter into a Treaty offerfive and defentive in Favour of the House of Bourbon.

The Duke de Choiseul has long meditated the com-plete Conquest of Holland, as by that Means France

will not only avail herfelf of the immenfe Naval Stores and shipping of that once flourishing Republic, but will also make Great-Britain become an Annual Tributary Power to France, to the yearly Amount of 1,300,000l, that Sum being nearly the Interest annually paid to the Dutch for their principal Money in our Funds; but perhaps the Duke de Choifeul may find himself mistaken in the latter Part of his favourite Plan, and probably may only haften the founging off fo much of the Debt of Great-Britain.

We congratulate our Ministry that they have hitherto withstood the pressing Solicitations of many of the European Powers to enter into a continental War, though by fuch their patriotic Resolution they have given great Umbrage to the most powerful Petentate in the North.

The Reason for the Earl of Bute's unexpected Return at this Time is that his Lordship might have a Conference with his noble Friend Lord Holland, before this Nobleman goes abroad, to which Conference his Grace of Grafton is admitted, as both Lord Bute and Lord Holland cannot be well fpared out of the Kingdom again together. Great Things are expected at the Well End of the Town to refult from the Conference

of this great Trium-virate.

July 31. A Nobleman of great Confequence offered a Bet of 1000 Guineas, with a Nobleman out of Administration, that Lord Bute would lay down and adhere to such a conciliating and patriotic Plan as, in the Space of a Year from the Day of his late Return, to become as much the Favourite of the People as ever his Lordship was supposed to be of his Sovereign; and fo fanguine was the Peer of the full Completion of his Prophecy that he even offered to leave the Decision of the Bet, on that Day Twelvemonth, to the Opinion of any one Gentleman of either Party, whether in or out of Administration, whom his Antagonist should now think proper to name. Whether from Conviction that the Noble Traveller had now learned a more falutary System of Politics, or from what other Cause, we know not; but this really generous and candid Bet

was declined being accepted.

A Motion was lately made, in a private Assembly, for entirely submitting the Formation of a new Ministry to the Earl of Chatham; but this Motion was directly

over-ruled, by Two great Officers.

In the North Briton, of July the 15th, an Account is given that in a public Office, the Deputy Clerk, foon after his coming into Office, found in a Painter's Bill of 1031. made out by the Overfeer of the Works, an Overcharge of 601. 103. 6d. in a Plaisterer's Bill of 441. 198. 7d. an Overcharge of 221. 188. 4d. He positively refused his Certificate to these Bills, but he was obliged by his Superior in that Office to do it. ST. JOHN's (in ANTIGUA) August 13, 1769.

Last Thursday, about Three in the Afternoon, a most dreadful Fire broke out at the North-East Part of this Town, occasioned (it is reported) by a Negro throwing into an Oven (when heating) some Staves of a Pitch Barrel, which immediately flamed up to the Roof of the Kitchen, and set the same into a Blaze; the Fire instantly communicated itself to the neighbouring Buildings, with the most raging Fury. The Alarm Bell was rung, and Multitudes affembled to extinguish the Fire, and pulled down several Houses to the West, in Hopes of stopping its destructive Progress; but all was in Vain, the Wind blowing very fresh from East North-East, carried the fiery Shingles along with it, and scattered them on the Roofs of several Houses; in about the Minutes the Store of Messeys Hay and in about 15 Minutes the Store of Messieurs Hay and Kingfley, to the North of the Parade, became an en-tire Flame, and fet all the Buildings on the Parade, and Stores on the Wharfs, in the fame dreadful Con-flagration. Having thus deftroyed every Thing to the West, down to the Sea, it turned its Fury to the East, and burnt all the Buildings from the Parade up to the Guard-House, and from the Guard-House, in a direct South Line to Mrs. Martin's House, near the Pasture (the Guard-House and Court-House only excepted) to prevent its farther running Eastward, it was judged necessary to blow up Mrs. Martin's and Mrs. Grice's Houses (two very large Buildings) and several others, which happily checked its Fury, and stopt its Progress in that Quarter; yet it still raged in the Center of the Town with great Violence, threatening the Destruction of the remaining Buildings to the East; to hinder its Progress, the Houses belonging to Mr. George Dalgell Progress, the Houses belonging to Mr. George Dalzell and several others, were blown up, which, with a large Stone Building on the other Side of the Street, through the Mercy of God, set Bounds to its Fury, and prevented its farther Devastations.—Dreadful was the Day and Night! The devouring Flames, the Destruction, Confusion and Distress, and Lamentations of the Poor, destitute and ruined Inhabitants, was a Scene too. Poor, destitute and ruined Inhabitants, was a scene too melancholy to represent .- The Alarm Guns were fired at the Forts, and the Country Gentlemen exerted their Affiliance with their Persons, Carts, and Slaves, to carry what could be saved from the Flames, whilst the Boats in the Harbours, contributed to the same kind Purpose; but the Rapidity of the Fire would not admit Time to get much out of the Stores, so that the Loss was immense. The Custom-House, Arsenal, Jail, and all the Warchouses on the Wharfs, were entirely confumed. The Fire continued with much Violence until Three the next Morning. It is computed that near 300 Houses and Stores are consumed, and that the whole Loss, by the best Computation that can at prewhole Lois, by the best Computation that can at prefent be made, amounts to £. 200,000 Currency. All
our Provisions, Lumber, &c. are destroyed, and our
Distress is truly deplorable. Two white Men, and a
Negro, were killed, and another white Man miserably
mangled by the Explosions. The Magistrates met the
next Morning to give Direction for preventing any farsher. Damage, that might be suffained by the Firether Damage that might be fulfained by the Fire, which still raged in feveral of the Houses that were not

quite confumed, and the Council and Assembly met on Monday, Tuesday, and this Day, to consider what Meafures should be taken to alleviate the Distress of the unhappy Sufferers. We hear they have voted their Thanks to the Officers of his Majesty's 68th Regiment, for the Zeal and Activity they exerted to preserve the Town, and have also voted a Sum of Money to the private Soldiers of faid Regiment, as an Acknowledge-ment for their Services on that Occasion.

44 If the Spaniards do not take this Province from us, it will foon become of Confequence,-2d Instant, arrived at New-Orleans, General O'Riely, to take possession of Louisiana for the King of Spain; they write me, he has brought with him 4500 Troops; but from the Number of Transports, I do not suppose they can have brought, with him, 2500 or 3000; and if they had no Intention of employing them any Way elfe, that is too many by 2000.—We have certain Intelligence, that for fome Time past, the Spaniards at the Havanna, have been tampering with fome of the Creek Indian Chiefs, and next Month are to have a Congress with 'them at Apalachicola River .- The Spaniards want Land to make a Settlement there, which if they procure, can make themselves Masters of this Province when they please, and probably will pre-vail on the Indians to go to War with the Neighbouring Provinces. It appears the Spaniards are determined to drive us out of the Province if they can; they are exceedingly Jealous of our being fo near the Coaft of Mexico, and in Case of a War, our being able from the Situation of this Port, to put an entire Stop to their Trade in the Bay of Mexico.—Most of the French at New-Orleans feem determined to leave that Place and come and fettle on this Side the Miffilippi.

We are affured, there are feveral Letters received in this City from New Orleans, by Way of Philadelphia, brought thither by Capt. Moor of this Place, who is arrived there from New Orleans, which advise, that General O'Riely had arrived there from the Havanna, with about 4000 black and white Spanish Troops, to take possession of that Place, which he did very peacea-bly, having made fair Promises to the French People; but before he had been there Three Days, he artfully feized 12 or more of the principal French Merchants, as Heads of the Riot, in which the Spaniards were drove from thence some Time ago, and confined them. The Spanish General received Captain Harris of this Place very kindly, and promifed him his Aid and Protection in his Trade.

pened on the 10th Infant, near Bedford, and for Particulars refer you to the inclosed Depositions. Yesterday Morning, to our great Aftonishment, we had Intelligence that a large Party of armed and disguised Men, were within Ten Miles of this Town, in order to take the Prisoner out of this Jail, alledging that we would fend him to Philadelphia, to take his Trial. Upon this Notice, John Armstrong, and John Mont-gomery, Esquires, and the Reverend Mr. John Steel, rode out to meet them, while fundry of the Magistrates affilted the Sheriff in raifing a Guard to defend the Jail; and accordingly met them, blacked and armed with Rifle Guns, and prevailed with them to stop and

converse on the Subject of their present Intention.

"The Result of the Conversation was, that Two
Persons (who had not blacked themselves yet) and who
came down from the Neighbourhood of the others, should be admitted to see the Prisoner, and bring a Letter fromhis own Hand, flewing whether he those to stand his Trial, or go with them; which Expedient was granted them, only to prevent the Effusion of Blood, together with Assurance, that Smith would receive his Trial in the County. They farther insisted, that Bail should be taken, faying, that feveral of the best Freeholders of that Part of the County would enter his Bail, fwearing, as a few of them did, in an outrageous Manner, that if that Request was not complied with, their Fire Arms should be his Bail. To this it was replied, that the Magistrates here had not that Power, but would reprefent the Matter to the Governor and Chief Justice, provided the Persons they mentioned would request it, and enter for him. Accordingly the Prisoner sent them a candid Letter, declaring his Desire to have a Trial by the Laws of his Country, begging them to return

"Notwithstanding this, they rushed into Town, and coming to the Jail Door, which was properly secured, by a Guard within, and armed Men in sundry private Houses: The Prisoner extended his Hands as far as he could through the Windows, and begged them, in a folema Manner, to return, and to fied no innocent Blood; which, together with the Exertion of the Magistrates, prevailed with them to go off. As we expected, they tarried near the Town all Night, and appeared to fet off about Day-break; but finding their Numbers increasing, it is thought they design a vigorous Attack. They have Spies on every Road, and we look for them every Moment, being affured, that as foon as they think themselves strong enough, they will return.

"We have Accounts of a large Number coming from Potowmack, and look for no other Terms from them, than to deliver up the Prisoner, or have the Town, at least some Houses near the Prison, burnt to Ashes. We are in great Confusion, but yet determined to defend the Jail to the last Extremity, and no Measures have been left unimproved; nor can we think of any, farther than that of admitting Bail, which we can by no Means do, only thus represent the Situation we are in.

"Sundry People have joined the Rioters (not black-ed) but whether to influence their return, or other-wife, we cannot yet learn. We have no other Method of hiring the Prison Guard, purchasing Ammunision, or paying Expresses, but on the Credit of a few Per-fons, which Expence will, but too probably, be re-quisite for a considerable Time, of which we hope to be relieved by the Honourable the House of Assembly.

"We are greatly affifted by fundry Gentlemen in Town, and a Number of the good Inhabitants, who exert themselves in a spirited and becoming Manner. We just now learn that the Rioters are about Six Miles from hence, apparently moving homewards, which we have some Expectations they will do, unless reinforced by a confiderable Number.

Since receiving the above, we are affured, from good Information, that the Number of the Rioters having increased to 150, they had returned within a few Miles of Carlifle; but hearing of the Reception they were likely to meet with, from the Inhabitants being well prepared for them, and the Persuasion of some well disposed Persons, they went off.

Allowing that, eventual-ly, there is no Difference between these Things, the one is a much more open and undifguifed Oppression than the other; and there is a Degree to which any People will bear Hardship without Complaint; but Opprefion, beyond a certain Degree, will make even a wife Man mad. Such Powers as, from their Nature, must necessarily be lodged in one of the Parts of the whole Empire, the Colonists will never object to in Great-Britain. The most absolute Jurisdiction of this kind they would never complete and provided Kind they would never complain of; and, provided the Effects of it were not greatly Oppreffive, they would never think of nicely fetting Bounds to it. It may perhaps be impossible (if the Subject be Metaphyfically considered) to fix precise Boundaries to the Authority of Great-Britain over the Colonies, but the Extremes, in a Thousand Cases of great Importance (as in all Questions concerning Morals, Virtue and (as in all Questions concerning Morals, Virtue and Vice) may be obvious, when the exact Medium cannot be ascertained; and, in this Case, Moderation on both Sides would make that very easy in Practice, which is ever so difficult in Theory.

ge. What can the North Americans plead for an Exemption from Taxes imposed by the British Parliament; but fuch Charters as our Kings have usually given to Corporations, which are all of them liable to be regulated, or fet aside by all the Three Estates of

Anf. Admitting that the Privileges of the Colonifts had no other Origin, yet the Continuance of this Esta-blishment such a Number of Years, and the fatal Con-sequence of revoking it, which is nothing less than the absolute Slavery of a whole People, ought to make their Rights to be considered in a very different Light from that of the Charters of common Corporations. from that of the Charters of common Corporations, the Members of which are generally benefited by their Abrogation. A corporate Town generally bears a very small Proportion to the whole State; whereas all our North-American Colonies bear a very great Pro-portion to the whole, and, in all Probability, will, at no great diffance of Time, be equal to all the reft put together. And it ought not to be forgotten, that it is the good of the whole Empire, confidered as one, which should be the Object of Government, and not the Aggrandizement of any particular Part. If other Maxims orevail, one Part of the Empire will be the Seat of Despotism, and all the other Subjects will be Slaves.

Though Grest Britain be the stronger of the Two, she should let Peason be the Judge between them, and not take Advantage of more stronger, to oppress those who are not able to resist her unjust Decrees. Land is so cheap, that every Man is Ambitious of acquiring Property in it. Few Hands, therefore, being at Liberty to apply to Labour or Manusactures, their Work is so dear, that it will always be for their Interest to purchase of us, rather than supply themselves, 'til the whole Country be sully peopled, which is a Period too remote for Attention.

2s. What seems to be the best, the most equitable, and advantageous Maxims to be observed by Great-Britain, with Respect to our Colonies!

Ans. The most equitable Maxims, as well as the best

Policy, in our Conduct to the Americans, is to lay aside all Jealously of them, not to indulge the Idea of Superiority, and to consult the Good of the whole, as of one united Empire, each Part of which has the fame natural Right to Liberty and Happiness with the other; to encourage Agriculture among them, and Manuface natural Right to Liberty and Happiness with the other; to encourage Agriculture among them, and Manufactures among ourselves, and by no Means interfere in their inferior Government, so far as to lay any Tax upon them, either for the Purpose of raising a Revenue, or for any other Purpose whatever. The Benefits arising spontaneously from our extensive and increasing Commerce with them, will infinitely overbalance all that we shall be able to extort from them by Way of Tax. Thus shall we be mutually the Source of Strength and Opulence to each other, and nothing of Strength and Opulence to each other, and nothing in the ordinary Courfe of Divine Providence, but a wrong-headed and tyrannical Administration, can hinder our being the most flourishing, and the happiest State upon the Face of the Earth.

The most absolute Jurisdiction of this Kind they would never complain of; and, provided the Effects of it were not greatly Opprefive, they would never think of nicely fetting Bounds to it. Qu. But will not the Colonists chuse to manufacture

for themselves? Anf. It is far from being their Interest to commence Manufacturers, and nothing but Necessity can drive them to it. Land is so cheap, that every Man is Am-bitious of acquiring Property in it. Few Hands, therefore, being at Liberty to apply to Labour or Manufac-tures, their Work is fo dear, that it will always be for their Interest to purchase of us, rather than supply themselves, 'til the whole Country be fully peopled, which is a Period too remote for Attention.

Britain, with Respect to our Colonies?

Ans. The most equitable Maxims, as well as the best Policy, in our Conduct to the Americans, is to lay aside all Jealously of them, not to indulge the Idea of Superiority, and to consult the Good of the whole, as of one united Empire, each Part of which has the same pateral Right to Liberty and Happiness with the other: natural Right to Liberty and Happiness with the other; to encourage Agriculture among them, and Manufactures among ourfelves, and by no Means interfere in their inferior Government, so far as to lay any Tax upon them, either for the Purpose of raising a Re-venue, or for any other Purpose whatever. The Benefits arising spontaneously from our extensive and in-creasing Commerce with them, will infinitely overba-lance all that we shall be able to extort from them by Way of Tax. Thus shall we be mutually the Source of Strength and Opulence to each other, and nothing in the ordinary Course of Divine Providence, but a wrong-headed and tyrannical Administration, can hin-der our being the most flourishing, and the happiest State upon the Face of the Earth.

It was also unanimously voted, that the Hon. Thomas Cushing, Efq. Mr. Samuel Adams, John Adams, Efq. the Hon. James Otis, Efq. Dr. Joseph Warren, Richard Dana, Efq; Joshua Henshaw, Esq; Joseph Jackare appointed a Committee to confider what Measures are proper to be taken, to vindicate the Character of the Town from the faile and injurious Representations contained in the Letters and Memorials aforefaid, and report at the Adjournment of this Meeting.

After which, upon a Motion made, the following Vote was unanimously passed:

HE Merchants, not only of this Metropolis, but through the Continent, have nobly preferred the public Good to their own private Emolument : And with a View to obtain a Redress of the Grievances so loudly and juftly complained of, having almost unanimoully engaged to suspend their Importations from Great-Britain: A Measure approved by all Orders, as legal, peaceable and most likely of all others to effect the falutary Defign in View; and which will be regarded by Pofterity with Veneration, for the difinterested and truly public Spirit appearing in it : The Town cannot but express their Astonishment and Indignation, that any of the Citizens should be so lost to the Feelings of Patriotism and the common Interest, and fo thoroughly and infamoufly felfish, as to obstruct this very Measure, by continuing their Importation. Be it therefore folemnly voted, that the Names of those Persons-few indeed, to the Honour of the Town, viz. John Bernard, Nathaniel Rogers, Theophilus Lillie, James McMafters and Company, John Mein, Thomas Hutchinfon, jun. and Elifha Hutchinfon,—be entered on the Records of this Town, that Pofterity may know, who these Persons were that preferred their lit tle private Advantage to the common Interest of all the Colonies in a Point of the greatest Importance; who not only deferted, but opposed their Country, in a Struggle for the Rights of the Constitution, that must ever do it Honour; and who, with a Defign to enrich themselves, basely took Advantage of the generous Self-Denial of their Fellow Citizens for the common

Ordered, That the foregoing Votes be printed in the feveral public News-Papers.

Then the Meeting was adjourned to Wednesday the

Tuefday Morning last arrived here, the Brig Wolf, Capt. Bryant, from London, which he lest the 28th of July last. In the Brig came Passengers, Samuel Venner, Esq. late Secretary to the Board of Commissioners, Capt. Lyde, Capt. Coppinger, Mr. Patrick Smith, a Merchant from London, and several others, among whom were one or Two Hatters and Jewellers.

On the Arrival of the above Vessel, a Meeting of the Merchants was immediately called, and the fol-lowing Transactions voted to be published.

HE Merchants of this Town, met at Faneuil-Hall, on the Third of October Inftant, and being informed that Mr. Patrick Smith, a Stranger from London, had imported a Quantity of Goods in the Bri-London, had imported a Quantity of Goods in the Brigantine Wolf, John' Bryant, Master, and considering that in case Strangers might import Goods, while the Merchants were obligated not to import any, it would have a direct Tendency to frustrate the Design of their Agreement, and so be attended with satal Consequences, they appointed a Committee to apply to Mr. Smith, and desire his Attendance, who accordingly attended and signed an Agreement to reship his Goods for London, a Copy of which is hereafter inserted: Capt. Nathaniel Byseld Lyde, and Mr. Colburn Barrell, also appeared at the Meeting and signed similar Agreements, which are also inserted below.

And at a Meeting of the Merchants the Fourth Inft a Gentleman appeared, and at the Request of Thomas and Elifha Hutchinson, informed the Merchants that they were ready to treat with them with Respect to the Goods they had imported; upon which a Committee was appointed to hear their Propofals : The Committee accordingly had a Conference with them, and reported that they had acceded to every Article of the Agreement of the Merchants, and had engaged to deliver up the Eighteen Chefts of Tea, they imported in Captain Bryant; as also any other Goods that they might receive by any other Vessel. The Committee also re-ported, that Mr. Theophilus Lillie met them, and acceded to the Agreement, and entered into fimilar En-

gagements.

Which Report was accepted.

The Merchants fent a Meffage to Nathaniel Rogers,
John Bernard and James McMasters, requesting their
Attendance at the Meeting at Half after Three o'Clock -Their feveral Answers were highly insolent, and justly deferving of Cenfure, particularly the An-fwer received from James M'Masters, who refused to attend, and told Mr. Gore and Mr. Freeman, that the Merchants might do as they pleased, that he found they intended to make a Riot, which he should be glad to fee!

Voted unanimoufly, That these several Persons by continuing their Importations from Time to Time, contrary to the Sense of the Trade, notwithstanding the Pains that has been taken to prevail with them to accede to the Agreement, have discovered a base Attachment to their own little private Interests and a total difregard to that of the Public: It appears they have had a fettled Defign to counteract and defeat the generous Efforts of the Merchants, and have acted altogether unbecoming the Character of good Citizens, and therefore are not only unworthy of the Countenance and Favour of the Public in any Respect, but, by this their Conduct, have rendered themselves justly obnoxious to all who have any Regard for the Welfare of their Country.

Voted, That the Committee of Inspection be, and hereby are defired to make strict Enquiry after such Persons as may hereaster purchase Goods of those who continue to import from Great-Britain, contrary to the Agreement of the Merchants, and publish their Names in the News-Papers.

Foted unanimously, That the Conduct of the standing Committee is highly worthy of our Approbation, and we accordingly approve of it in every Instance, especially in the fair, just and impartial Account which they published the a8th of August last, relative to such Goods as have been imported from Great-Britain since the Agreement of Non-importation has taken Place, in Answer to the fallacious and scandalous Assertions of one John Mein, in his many scurrilous and abusive Publications.
