



Spotlight on Collections by Chris Kidd

As many of our members know, the past is a fascinating place that can be studied, recalled and examined in great detail through a wide array of sources. From epic battles to emerging business tycoons, the past is full of events that shaped the world as we know it. While the events themselves are the usual draw in historical discussion, they would not have happened if it were not for the ambitious and motivated people striving to achieve all they could. One such source available in the Nabb Research Center that focuses upon important individuals in the state of Maryland is The Book of Maryland, located in the Wicomico Historical Society Collection. Published in 1920, The Book of Maryland is filled with prominent

individuals involved in politics and businesses within the state of Maryland from the late 1800s to the early 1900s.


According to the book's forward, it was "designed as a book of real utility to the newspaper, the artist and those interested in Maryland affairs ... It also becomes valuable historically in keeping future generations advised as to the representative men of Baltimore and the State of Maryland, their accomplishments, as well as giving data of the successful institutions."

The individuals covered in the book range from Daniel Willard, president of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company, to Albert C. Ritchie who was elected governor on November 4, 1919, to Douglas Gordon Hanson, manager of the Baltimore offices of the Cunard Steamship Company, Ltd. In addition to successful businessmen and politicians, the book also covers "successful institutions." Examples of these include the Maryland Plant of Bethlehem Steel Company in Sparrows Point and the U.S. Industrial Alcohol Company.

The Book of Maryland provides a glimpse into the who's who of Maryland in years gone by. As this historic election year continues to unfurl, it is worth examining examine the movers and shakers of earlier eras, which is exactly what *The Book of Maryland* provides.

New Monument Dedicated

On Wednesday, July 16, the State of Delaware officially recognized the contributions its citizens made as soldiers in America's fight for independence with the dedication of a new monument on Court Street in Dover, DE. Delaware was the last of the 13 original colonies to create such a monument. The statue unveiled in front of Legislative Hall in the capital depicts three soldiers from the Delaware Continentals. The three soldiers represent each of Delaware's counties. The statue was created by noted historical military sculptor Ron Tunison of Cairo, NY, whose work includes other notable monuments at battlefields such as Gettysburg. Nabb Center member Dick Carter oversaw the commission to create the statue and planned the ceremony. The dedication was a fitting tribute to the brave soldiers of Delaware who fought in the Revolution.

We recently received a letter from Ms. Bonnie B. Barnidge informing us of an error in our June 2008 *Shoreline*. The photo of Priscilla Burton on page 32 is dated incorrectly. Identified as 1885, the date should read 1864. In 1864, Priscilla's first husband, Salathiel Baker, had died and their daughter, Hester (Hettie) Jane Baker, married John A. Lingo in November of 1864. Pictures of the bride, groom and others, along with a marriage certificate, were found in the back of the Lingo family Bible. Priscilla Burton, mother of the bride, was one of these
