The seniors, being about to enter a new era in the history of their lives, pause for a moment before closing this chapter, look back and recall the yet undimmed past. We recall those first days at State when, as bewildered souls, we roamed the campus, quaked in court before our elders, saluted scowling sophomores, polished shoes, handed out matches, and appeared absolutely ridiculous.

We recall meeting new personalities, those of our fellow students and of the faculty. There was Mr. Dunkle who listened to all our troubles, advised and encouraged, and gave us the push needed to make us loyal to State. And there were the other teachers, Shaffer, Matty, McClellan, Harvey, Hamrick, and Cooper, whose philosophies and methods were frequently strange and hard to grasp.

There were the organizations with their meetings, parties, picnics, and programs; the sailor dances which always carried an element of suspense; the sessions in the day room, arguing, joking, griping, disturbing the faculty, and occasionally cramming for a test.

Sometimes we went to the library where our sense of humor, never asleep anyway, always became very keen. Here we turned the books down in the stacks or signed our names in all the reserved books, hoping that any inspecting faculty member would be bluffed into thinking we did all the work he suggested. At other times we might be found in the dorm, singing in the living room after dinner or loafing an hour away on the campus before remembering the more serious phase of college life.


And as we passed from one class to another, we gained greater responsibilities, greater troubles, and greater loyalties. More teachers were added to the list of people we attempted to understand, among them Diehl, Howard, Gray, Baker, Wellner and a new college president, Miss Compton.

We recall with pleasure the rehearsals for "Athapastusical" and "Patience," trips, assemblies, initiations, dancing in the gym or Matty's room, and fighting for our rights. We remember the ice cream from the corner store, the hot fudge sundaes at the T. and S., Sadie and Gus, the ball games, hayrides, plays, and dinners.

Finally we were seniors; some of our original class had dropped by the wayside, some others had been added to our class. The war was over, the boys were back, and we were student teachers, griping, complaining, acquiring a P. A., and bragging about "our kids." Doc Brown and Miss Shires were added to the list of new friends before the year ended.

Now this last year has disappeared, but when we pick up the 1946 NEMACOLIN, when our names will have passed into oblivion at State, we shall recall it all once again, the studies, the social life, the work on the yearbook which introduced our new friends, Carl and Joe, the faculty, and our friends whom we have not seen for years. And as we read the sentiments written by these friends, and look at their faces again, perhaps then we will do so with eyes much drier than they are now as we make sincere promises not to forget, take our last look, and then cross the campus, no longer as students but as alumni.
