II. A well trained faculty.


- A. Approximately 40% of college instructors at STC have doctors' degrees.

 3. Junior High School majors in Art, English, Mathematics, Music, Science, Social Studies, and Physical Education.


- B. A two-year transfer curriculum.
 1. Students have transferred to Dickinson, Drexel, Haverford, Western Maryland, Virginia, Missouri, etc.
 2. Satisfactory completion enables students to transfer with junior standing in Arts and Science, Dentistry, Education, Journalism, Law, and Medicine, Agriculture, Business Administration, Home Economics, Industrial Arts and Nursing.

- C. A one semester Curriculum of nurses.
 1. In cooperation with Peninsula General Hospital.
 2. Includes courses in Anatomy, Micro-biology, General Chemistry, Massage, Psychology and Sociology.
- V. Activity program under direction of Student Government Association.
 - A. Athletic, Christian, Men's and Women's Day Associations.
 - B. Assembly, Camera, Chorus, Debate, Dramatic organizations, and Publications Staff.
- VI. A comparatively low annual cost per student.
 - A. Board and room -- \$216
 - B. Fees-activity, athletic, and breakage ----- \$25
 - C. Tuition, required of transfer students, only, \$100. Total: For prospective teachers, \$241; transfer, \$341, plus text books.

STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION


President — James Clark

The Athletic Association sponsor the athletic activities of the school. Its two branches are the Men's Athletic Association and the Women's Athletic Association.




A VIEW OF AUDITORIUM LOOKING TOWARD THE STAGE
