Death of Professor Morse

The telegraph announces the death, s

graph Samuel Finley Breese Morse, the inventor of the electric telegraph, was born in Charlestown, Massachusetts, April 27, 1791, and was educated at Yale College, where he graduated in 1810. Having from an early age determined to be a painter, he sailed for England with Washington Allston, arrived in London in August, 1811, where he formed an intimacy with C. R. Leslie, and the first portraits by these artists painted in London were likenesses of each other. Mr. Morse, who made ra-pid progress in his profession, exhibited to the Royal Academy, in 1813, his pic-ture, "The Dying Hercules," of colossal size, the plaster model which he made of the same subject, to assist him in his picture, received the prize in sculpture the

same year.
On his return to the United States having settled in Boston, he met with so lit-tle encouragement that he removed to New Hampshire, where he found employ-ment in painting portraits at fifteen dol-lars per head. He afterwards went to Charleston, South Carolina where he found more profitable employment, and about 1822 took up his residence in New York. Under a commission from the corporation he painted a full-length portrait of General Lafavette, then on a visit to this coun-

try. In 1829 he paid a second visit to Europe, and remained abroad three years. On his return to the United States in the packet-ship Sully, in 1832, a fellow-coun-tryman, Professor Jackson, was describing the experiments that had just been made the experiments that had just been made in Paris with the electro-magnet, when, a question arose as to the time occupied by the electric fluid in passing through the wire. The reply being made that it was instantaneous, Jackson, recalling the experiments of Franklin. suggested that it might be carried to any distance, and that the electric spark might be made the means of conveying and recording intelligence. This suggestion took deep hold of Morse, who proposed to develope the idea thus originated, and before the end of the voyage he had drawn out the general plan of the system known by his name. On his return to New York he resumed his profession, but he devoted all of his spare time to the perfection of his invention. After much difficulty and discouragement, in 1835, he demonstrated the practicability of his invention, by completing and putting in operation a model of his "Recording Electric Telegraph," the greater part of the apparatus having been made by himself. In 1837





CRISFIELD OYSTER TRADE.

The following relative to the oyster business of Crisfield is taken from the

The Oyster trade of Crisfield is unqueslarge amounts of capital, and employing nearsix hundred sailing vessels, with crews averaging in the aggregate near three thousand men, and handling millions of bushels of oysters per annum. Scarcely a morning but there can be seen from two to three hundred vessels moored at our wharves, or lying at anchor at this place, costing from \$1,000 to \$10,000 each, ranging from the smallest craft to the rope in search of the celebrated Crisfield bivalve, costs two or three times the latter sum, and indications point to the prob-ability of a regular line between this port and London, England, freighted ex-clusively with oysters and passengers.

HOW THEY ARE DISPOSED OF. The Oyster season commences about the first of September. By this time the various boats are overhauled, and the wear and tear of the previous season fully repaired. The crafts are trimmed up and repainted, until they are "as fine as a fiddle"—to use a sailor's expression—and being manned, as above mentioned, are sent the extensive "oyster rocks" or where nature-not man-has planted them for cargoes which are brought in every afternoon or evening and disposed of. Many are "laid out" in shallow water for future purposes, others are transferred to vessels enroute for Baltimore, Philadelphia, or New York; but by far the greater part are sold to the numerous and extensive packers here, and to speculators, buying for Northern, Eastern and Western mar-Apart from this we must file objections to kets. The season usually closes pretty

No license shall be granted to sell spirituous or fermented liquous or lager beer in quantities not less than apiut, for the sum of \$18.00 unless the person applying therefore shall also obtain a license to sell goods, chattels, wares and merchaudise, paying therefore the sum hereinbefore prescribed, according to the amount of stock in trade.

Oyster and Buting Houses.

The amount of license to be paid by keepers of syster and eating houses is \$50.60 throughout the



Our First War Steamer.

At the beginning of the present century, the navy of the young nation just rising on this continent was possessed of some of the best vessels in the world. Among them was the famous Constitution, which vessel is still in the service, having been stationed at the Naval Academy as a school-ship for the last ten years.

About this date the steam-engine was

dle-wheels. To whom really belongs the honor of applying steam as a motor for ships is a disputed point, into the discussion of which it is not desirable to enter; it is, however, pretty well settled that Fulton was the first builder of a steamboat intended for traffic. The success of this vessel was followed by great improvements in that line, and rendered possible the grand system of internal commerce for which this country is so well adapted. In 1814 the same Fulton proposed to build a floating battery for the defence of New York Hartery for the defence of New York Harbor, the vessel to be propelled by steam,
with a central paddle-wheel. This is
the first known proposition to use the
new motive power for war purposes.
This vessel was to carry twenty guns on
her gun-deck, and to make a speed of
four miles per hour. In addition to her
armament on deck, it was intended that
she should carry two submarine. Curs she should carry two submarine guns on each bow, so as to strike an enemy below the water-line; besides this, pro-vision was made for throwing a large vision was made for throwing a large body of water upon an enemy at close quarters. The ship was launched in November, 1814, in a little more than four months from the laying of the keel; by June, 1815, her machinery was in place, and a trial trip took place in New York Bay, which was a great success. At a later period she made a trip to sea, about twenty-six miles from New York, with all her coal and armament on board attaining a speed of nearly six knots.
This formidable craft was named by her
projector the Demologos, but after his
death she was called the Fulton; she was used as a receiving-ship at the New York Navy-yard after her completion until 1829, when she was accidentally blown up by the explosion of the pow-der in her magazine. Such was the first venture of our government toward war teamers. - Harper's Magazine for
