3 GREAT RACES 3

AT SALISBURY FAIR GROUNDS

SALISBURY, MD.

On Tuesday, October 17th

FIRST—A race between two champion two-year-old trotting colts, Dock C. (by Dry Dock; record of 2:23½; owned by D. C. Armstrong, Princess Anne, Md.), and A. S. P. (by Byrne Dean; record of 2:24½; owned by Phillip Weisenborn, of Salem, N. J.). These two colts are evenly matched, and owners have staked a purse of \$500 each in the hands of Joseph P. Shinn, of the Kein Supply Co., of Philadelphia, the winner to take the stakes. This race will be for blood, as the owner of each colt wishes to break the world's record for two-year-old trotters on half-mile track, which is 2:19½, this record being made by a two-year-old colt since Dock C. made the record at Easton, Md., on August 25th.

SECOND—A Special Mixed Race for 2.30 Class Trotters and Pacers, in which there will be at least five starters. Each of the five horses are expected to win the race. Somerset Boy, owned by Page Jackson, and Good Friday, owned by Howard Anderson, both of Somerset County, will be competitors in this race. To see these horses alone would be well worth the admission fee, as each of these horses have a number of friends in Somerset County that believe their horse to be the best, and have long wished for an opportunity to see it tested. Also in this race will be three very prominent horses of this county: Harry R. Wood, owned by S. H. Richardson; Judge Case, owned by Mitchell & Goetz; the third name unknown. The owner of each of the above-named horses claims to have the best horse in the county. There will be others in this race, this class not being closed.

THIRD—Farmers' Race, which has been so popular at our Fair Grounds in the past. Horses eligible to this race must be owned by a farmer of Wicomico County thirty days prior to date of race, and driven in race by a farmer. Horses with a record will be barred from this race. There will be several starters in this race.

TABLET TO EX-GOVERNOR

Jackson At M. E. Church, South, Entitled
"The Guardian Angel."

A tablet, unique in its construction and possessing rare qualities in design and color, is one which has just been placed in the M. E. Church, South, of Salisbury, Md., in memory of Ex-Governor Jackson.

The tablet is mosaic in character, and was made by the Tiffany Studios of New York. It was executed in Tiffany's Favrile Glass; each piece being laid in a solid background of cement.

The memorial is entitled "The Guardian Angel," and shows a little child, who having roamed aimlessly about, has sat down beside a stream to dream and rest. Nearby is seen the Guardian Angel, majestic in appearance, holding in its upraised hand a star of unusual brilliancy.

The general color effect throughout is soft blue and green.

The dedicatory inscription, which is also in mosaic, is placed just below the large panel and reads as follows:

CITY COUNCIL

Proceedings—Work Disposed Of By The Council Last Monday Evening.

Monday night the City Council had a very busy session. A communication was received from Mrs. L. D. Collier thanking the Mayor and Council for their aid in helping to clean up the city. Mrs. Collier said there was need of a permanent garbage system for the city and suggested that the law should be enforced against bicycles that are not equipped with lamps and bells.

Building permits were granted to John H. Farlow for a new dwelling on East Church Street and to Marion A. Carey for barn and stables on Waller Street.

Surveyor Shookley was instructed to lay out and straighten Fitzwater street and make a plat of same to be approved by Mayor and Council before a commission is placed on said street.

The tax rate for 1911 was fixed by resolution of the Council. The rate of 10 cents on the \$100 was fixed for general expenses and 10 cents for street purposes, making a total of 10 cents on the \$100 as the rate for 1911. This one of the lowest city rates in the State where there has been as much public improvements as has been made in Salisbury.

The Mayor and Council has given notice by advertisement that they will pass a city ordinance to take effect January 1st, 1912, prohibiting the raising of horses within the city limits. We understand that the Mayor and Council will ask the people of the city to vote in a special election sometime in December on this question and find out just what the sentiment is regarding same. The reason for inserting the notice that they propose to pass this ordinance is to give the people ample time to think over the matter and not to purchase swine for next year's raising until this much mooted question has been settled by a vote of the people.

Death of Mr. Samuel H. Wimbrow After Severe Affliction.

For the third time in six weeks, Death's Angel has called at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel H. Wimbrow, of Wango.

On Saturday morning last, Mr. Samuel H. Wimbrow, the husband and father, answered to the call. Mr. Wimbrow was honored and loved by all who knew him. It can be said with truthfulness that he was a devoted Christian. He was for many years one of the heads of Wango Church, near which he resided. If ever a man was missed from his accustomed place, it will be Brother Wimbrow.

It may be said he goes from us in his prime, just when his usefulness and influence were at the greatest, his words most respected and his services most highly prized.

From the zenith of attainment and the top of action he passes to render his account to the Master whom he served. For several years he has been bowing more and more under the weight of years and labors and sorrows. When his son, Harry, died six weeks ago, the blow struck him from his accustomed place as leader and settled him in his pew, where he sat in silence, not without tears. "His journey ends in welcome to the weary."

And Heaven, this heart's true home, is reached at last. And now when all is over we hear a great voice falling from the sky about his record as brother, husband, father, friend and neighbor, and the voice says: "Servant of God, well done."

Funeral services were conducted by Rev. G. P. Jones, D. D., assisted by Rev. George E. Sterling, his pastor. Interment was made in the adjoining cemetery.

Mr. Wimbrow is survived by a widow and six children.

MATCH RACE HERE

After World's Round—A Full Day's Sport.

Arrangements have been signed this week to give Salisbury one of the greatest races ever trotted on the track of the Wicomico Fair Association. It is a race to break the World's record for two year olds of 2:19½ on a half mile track.

The race will be between Mr. D. C. Armstrong's colt, "Doc O," record 2:23½ and "A. S. P." owned by Mr. Phillip Weisenborn, of Salem, N. J. The race is for \$500 a side and a part of the gate receipts. These colts are about the same age and are most evenly matched, so it is expected the race will be a very exciting one. The date for the race will be Tuesday, October 17th. The Fair Association will likely arrange for some special trains and it is expected that a big crowd will witness the contest. Mr. Armstrong's colt is one of the finest specimens in this section of the country.

Other races have been arranged for the same day, one of them being a special mixed race. Two horses expected to start in this race are Somerset Boy, owned by Page Johnson, and Good Friday, owned by Howard Anderson. There has been considerable rivalry between these two horses and each has many backers.

The Farmers race, open to all horses in Wicomico County, will be another race that will greatly interest our local people, as there are a number of good horses owned here all of which are anxious to have the honor of winning this race.

AVIATOR DIXON KILLED

Flew Here During Fair—Just Won Laurels in Crossing Rockies.

Cromwell Dixon, the youngest aviator of the world, was killed this week while making a flight on the Montana State Fair Grounds. Young Dixon will be remembered here as the daring bird-man who made the successful flights on the Fair Grounds during the Fair this year. The day previous to his accident, Dixon broke the world's record, being the first aviator to successfully appear over the Rocky Mountains.

The feat was made on Dixon's last flight at the Montana State Fair, and he was presented on his return with a purse of \$10,000.

Dixon covered a total distance of more than fifty miles on the round trip and was gone from the ground just one hour and fifty minutes.

He crossed the Rockies at Malign Pass, the elevation of which is 6900 feet. To escape the treacherous winds he made the cross-country flight at an altitude of 7100 feet.

All three of the above mentioned firms have many out of town contracts and will be kept busy all the year.

MAYOR SETS TRAP

And Catches Would Be Briber—Detectives Hidden in Closet Get Evidence.

Mayor Lewis P. Kniffen, of Wilkes-Barre, Pa., on Thursday caused the arrest as the result of a trap, of William B. McGuire, a former deputy city treasurer, whom he charges with attempting to bribe him with \$4000 in cash and \$25,000 in the bonds of the Wilkes-Barre Light Company, to sign an ordinance granting the company a twenty five year franchise.

The trap was set in the private office of the Mayor by having city Detective D. C. Schneider and George W. Williams, a newspaper man, being hidden in a closet in the office. There they heard, both Thursday morning and afternoon, the conversation of the Mayor and McGuire and upon the given signal, when the money and bonds were placed on the Mayor's desk, they sprang out and seized McGuire.

A short time after, the Wilkes-Barre Light Company secured from the City Council an ordinance granting it a franchise for seventy five years in the city. This ordinance was sent to the Mayor for his signature.

Pressure on Mayor.

A few days ago it became known that the city's chief executive would return it to the Common Council with a veto. Since then the Mayor said he has been approached in many ways to influence him and he soon saw that an effort would be made to bribe him. He then resolved to lay the trap, and Thursday morning when he had an appointment with McGuire he hid Detectives Schneider and Williams.

Mayor Kniffen was more anxious to catch some official of the company, if implicated, or some one more prominently interested in promoting it than McGuire, if possible, and he proposed that some one high in authority in the company make any offer that was to be made. McGuire insisted, however, the Mayor says, in doing it all himself, claiming he would get \$2500 if he secured the Mayor's signature.

The Mayor agreed and McGuire said it would take until three in the afternoon to raise the money.

Shortly before that hour Williams and Detective Schneider were again hidden in the closet. They remained there until Mayor Kniffen gave the prearranged signal after the money and the bonds had been placed on his desk. This was the signal sentence:—

"This is the first time graft money has ever been on Lew Kniffen's table."

Taken Into Custody.

Williams and Schneider dashed out and McGuire was secured. The Mayor sent for District Attorney W. A. Valentine and his first assistant, W. J. Gillespie, and turned the case over to them.

A warrant was sworn out by Chief of Police Frank Kreis, charging McGuire with attempted bribery. He waived a hearing and gave bail for \$1500 before Alderman John Masterson for trial.

An effort will be made to ascertain if any Councilmen were bribed to vote for the ordinance, who McGuire's principals are, and who put up the \$4000 and where he got the \$25,000 in bonds.

ASSAULTED WITH AXES

Twenty Italian Nurserymen Attack Superintendent Hammond—Life Threatened.

Twenty Italians working in the nurseries of J. G. Harrison & Sons, at Ironsboro, Md., on Saturday afternoon attacked Frank Hammond, one of the superintendents, striking him several blows on the head with grubbing axes.

Hammond succeeded in reaching his home in Berlin, several miles distant, where he is now in a critical condition. Several weeks ago the Italians threatened his life, but he paid no attention to the threat and continued to attend to his duties.

The attack was unexpected and the victim was taken unawares. Constable Jerry Campbell detained a number of the young men of Berlin and with them went to Ironsboro and arrested all the Italians in the camp. They are now in jail at Berlin.

Sixteen of the twenty Italians were held without bail to await the result of Hammond's injuries.

William Smack, who is alleged to have had feeling for Hammond, was also held. It was shown at the trial that Smack and Tony Cernini, who had charge of the Italian camp, were displeased with Hammond because he had been placed in charge of the men.

The pastor of the Division Street Baptist Church will preach his last sermon in Salisbury tomorrow. Mr. Hewitt has accepted a call recently extended to him by the Fourth Baptist Church of Baltimore, and will soon begin his pastorate with that church. His sermon themes for Sunday will be as follows: at 11 A. M., "The Greatness of Jesus"; at 7:30 P. M., "How To Grow Tall."

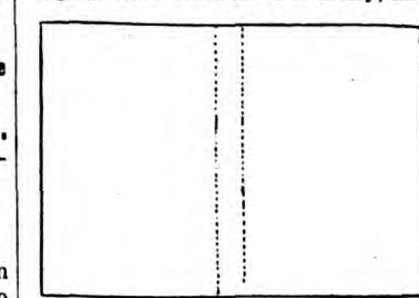

AMATEUR BOOK-BINDING.

Way in Which Magazines May Be Preserved in Permanent Form.

With the aid of a little common sense and some very ordinary tools and materials, such as paste and brush, glue, brown holland or cretonne, or colored linen, or black cloth, some large and long sewing needles, strong thread, sheets of paper and card, very serviceable volumes may be made even of those that have long passed their prime.

Place the cardboard on the table, outer side uppermost, and rule off with a pencil the space that is to be allowed down the center for the back, or hinges, of the volume. This must be done with careful measurement, so that there is an equal space between each line (Diagram 1), and when this is done draw a penknife down the pencilled lines. The knife must only score the card, not cut it through. Procure a strip of linen, or holland, 13 inches deep and two and a half inches wide, and with a mixture of glue and paste, stick this over the scored portion of the card to strengthen the hinge. Let it dry, then turn the superfluous material at each end over into the inside of the cover and paste it down thoroughly. Once more leave it to dry, and



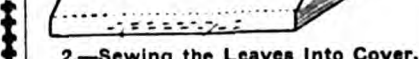
1.—A Cardboard Cover.

In the meantime prepare the magazines or book for the binding.

Next, take two double sheets of plain and moderately thick white paper. They must be folded like sheets of letter-paper, but must be exactly the size of the pages that are to be bound. With a small brush, run a thin coat of glue down the center of one sheet against the first, the other against the last page of the magazine or book to be bound. The use of these fly-leaves will be seen later on.

When all the details are dry and quite set, thread one of the long, large needles with strong cotton or linen thread, and place the center of the middle sheets of the magazine down the exact center of the hinge or back of the inside of the cover, which at this stage will appear as in our second illustration.

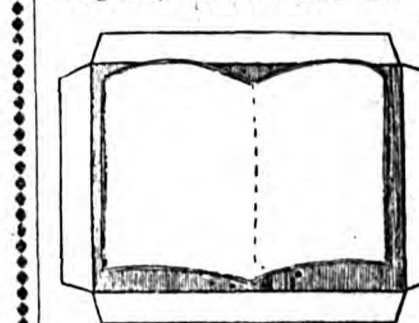
Make neat, strong stitches, not necessarily of very small size, through the middle of all the sheets of the sec-

tion (see diagram 2). See that the needle, after having made the last stitch, is outside the binding. Sew in all the following sheets in the same way, taking them first towards the beginning then towards the end of the pamphlets. (It will be remembered that a beginning was made in the middle of the numbers.)

The material for the ornamental cover may be made ready. It must be cut about two inches larger than the cardboard case in every direction. The best way of measuring is to spread the material out on the table and to lay the book open upon it. The outer surface of the cardboard cover already made should be thinly spread with paste. This cement should be allowed to get partly dry before the linen is laid upon it. This must be thoroughly smoothed down with the hands and left to dry entirely before the raw edges are turned over to the wrong side, where the card must be

spread with glue ready to receive. If the stitches have not been taken too near the top and bottom edges of the cover in sewing the linen sheets into their places the linen can be pushed down behind them at the top and bottom, and therefore will not need to be cut away from the hinge. At the corners the material must be neatly folded in and as much as possible of its superfluous removed in order that it may set flatly and smoothly (Diagram 3).

Lastly, one of the white pages that were added to the magazines before the sewing was done must be fastened down to each cover by way of a lining. It is advisable to spread the paste for this upon the cover, not upon the paper itself.

Averts Awful Tragedy.
Timely advice given Mrs. C. Willoughby, of Marenco, Wis., R. No. 1, prevented a dreadful tragedy and saved two lives. PROCLAMATION

Publication of Proposed Constitutional Amendments.

Whereas, At the January Session of the General Assembly of Maryland, held in the year of our Lord, Nineteen Hundred and Ten, three Acts were passed, one proposing an Amendment to Article 4 of the Constitution, by adding thereto a new Section, to be known as Section 8; one proposing an Amendment to Section 2 of Article 8 of said Constitution, and one proposing an Amendment to Section 4 of Article 8 of said Constitution, said Acts being respectively Chapters 283, 268 and 318 of the Acts of the General Assembly of Maryland of 1910, and which are in the words following, to wit:

CHAPTER 283.

An Act to propose an Amendment to Article 1 of the Constitution of this State by adding thereto a new Section, to be known as Section 8, to follow Section 7 and to provide for the submission of said Amendment to the qualified voters of this State for adoption or rejection.

Enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland (three-fifths of all members of each of the two Houses concurring), that the following section be and the same is hereby proposed as an Amendment to Article 1 of the Constitution of this State, which shall be adopted by the qualified voters of this State, shall stand as an additional section to said Article 1, to be known as Section 8, to follow Section 7, of said Article.

Section 8. All State and municipal elections shall be conducted by the system commonly known as the Australian Ballot System, and it shall be the duty of the General Assembly to provide by law for a form of ballot, uniform throughout the State, for use in all State elections in this State, and provide that on said ballot after the name of each candidate thereon who may have been duly nominated as the candidate of any political party or organization, there shall be printed the legal name of said party or organization; equal representation of the minority party among the judges and clerks of election registers or other officers performing similar functions shall not be abolished by the General Assembly unless by a vote of four-fifths of all members of each of the two Houses.

The right to be registered as a qualified voter and the right to vote at any State or municipal election in this State shall be limited to the following persons: First: Every male white citizen not disqualified by the Second or Third Sections of this Article, possessing the qualifications as to age and residence mentioned in Section 1 of this Article.

Second: Every other male citizen not disqualified by the Second or Third Sections of this Article possessing the qualifications as to age and residence mentioned in Section 1 of this Article, who at the time of his application for registration is the holder of real or personal property, or both, in an amount of not less than five hundred dollars, is assessed therefor on the tax books of the City of Baltimore or of one of the Counties of this State, has been such owner and so assessed for two years next preceding his application for registration, shall have paid and shall produce receipts for the taxes so paid for said two years, and shall at the time of his application make affidavit before the officers of registration that he is the holder of the property so assessed to him and that he has been such owner for two years next preceding his application.

If any person other than those herein mentioned or he or become legally entitled to be registered as voters at State Elections in this State, then this section shall be null and void and the General Assembly shall possess the same powers as if this section had never been adopted, and the law of this State relating to the local laws applicable to certain counties thereof, relating to the form of ballot to be used at elections, in force on the first day of July in the year nineteen hundred and ten, shall revive or continue in force until altered by the General Assembly, notwithstanding any Acts to the contrary which may have been passed while the terms of this section shall have been in force or while the General Assembly shall have believed or assumed the provisions of this section to be valid.

Section 2. And be it further enacted, by the authority aforesaid, that the proposed Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to the legal and qualified voters thereof for their adoption or rejection, in pursuance of the directions contained in Article 14 of the Constitution of this State, and at said General Election the vote on the proposed Amendment shall be by ballot, and upon each ballot shall be printed the words, "For Constitutional Amendment" and "Against Constitutional Amendment," as now provided by law, and immediately after said election the returns shall be made to the Governor of the vote for and against said proposed Amendment, as directed by said Fourteenth Article of the Constitution.

CHAPTER 268.

An Act to amend Section 2 of Article 3, title, "Legislative Department," of the Constitution of this State, and to provide for the submission of said Amendment to the qualified voters of this State for adoption or rejection.

Enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland (three-fifths of all members of each of the two Houses concurring), that the following section be and the same is hereby proposed as an Amendment to Section 2 of Article 3, title, "Legislative Department," of the Constitution of this State, and if adopted by the legal and qualified voters thereof, as hereinafter provided, said section shall supersede and stand in the place of the section of Section 2 of Article 3 of the Constitution of Maryland.

2. The City of Baltimore shall be divided into four Legislative Districts as near as may be of equal population and of contiguous territory, and each of said Legislative Districts of Baltimore City, as they exist from time to time be laid out, in conformity with the provisions hereof, and

PAPER BAG COOKING.

A New Method For Preparing Almost All Dishes.

Discovery Will Do Away With Much Drudgery of the Household, as Pots and Pans Will Be Discarded.

M. Soyer, the famous chef of the Brook club in London and one time master of the kitchen of the dowager Duchess of Newcastle, makes his bow to the housewives of Europe and America and delivers to them this message:

"Throw away your pots and pans, discard your broilers and roasting dishes and do your cooking in paper bags. Do not hesitate. Do not marvel. Do all of your cooking except maybe the brewing of your tea and the boiling of your soups in paper bags. Believe me," so M. Soyer concludes his call for the enfranchisement of all cooks, "it can be done."

M. Soyer says triumphantly that for fifteen years he himself has been experimenting with the cooking of viands in paper, and now the secret is revealed in all its completeness and practicability.

Here is the incident in the kitchen of the dowager duchess that led the present chef of the Brook club on his Columbian voyage of discovery:

"One day, having covered a piece of fish with foolscap, I instructed the kitchen maid to add the sauce. She put in too much. By and by the paper vessel began to bubble up, and before I could interfere it exploded with a bang. When I came to examine the fish I found it was beautifully tender. This gave me an idea. I wonder whether I could cook by steam? I said to myself. Without a moment's hesitation I put some meat, vegetables and a little water into an envelope and laid it on an iron stove in the oven. The inevitable happened. The paper got burnt and soon afterward exploded."

Nothing daunted by this first failure, but brimming with the idea that somehow he could overcome the difficulties of cooking in paper, the dowager duchess' chef continued to try experiments with the dowager's supplies and at his own home. Sometimes, as he says in his little book, he used to get out of bed at 2 o'clock in the morning to put in a little concoction, enveloped in paper, in an oven.

He did overcome the tendency toward explosions, but not for years could he rid his dishes of the savor of paper which was their inevitable portion. He even challenged a German chef who had invented a special oven for cooking by indirect heat to a test before the National School of Cookery in London. The German used his new oven, and M. Soyer used only his simple paper bags. The judges awarded the palm to him, even though all of the dishes he turned out had the unpleasant taste of paper. Not until very recently did the experimenting chef find reward for his labors when a firm of paper manufacturers turned out for him a special paper bag which was tasteless and chemically pure. Now with this bag M. Soyer is doing marvels and setting the way for the accomplishment of like marvels by others.

Here are the directions for cooking:

Select a bag that fits the food intended to be cooked.

Grease slightly the inside of the bag except in case of vegetables or when water is added. Butter, lard or drippings may be used.

When the food has been prepared for the bag place the same on the table and lift the uppermost edge of the bag while you insert the contents.

Fold the mouth of the bag two or three times and fasten with a clip.

It is desirable to fold the corners of the bag so as to secure as near as possible a hermetical closing.

Any oven will do for paper bag cooking. There is little difference whether the oven be heated by coal, gas or electricity. To find out when the food in the bag is cooked all one has to do is to make a little hole in the paper and look in. In the case of many articles a slight touch on the bag will instruct the experienced cook as to the condition of the cooking food within.

In order to facilitate the work of the housewife unaccustomed to the use of the paper bag the Brook club's chef gives freely of his store of culinary knowledge. In his book M. Soyer sets forth a long list of recipes.

For instance, here is a paper bag recipe whose catchline will appeal to any housewife:

Tough Old Fowl.—This can be sent tender to the table if treated as follows: Clean, trim and stuff according to taste. Put five spoonfuls of dripping or butter upon the breast. Place in the paper bag. Allow one hour and forty-five minutes to two hours and a half, according to the size of the bird in question, in a moderate oven. The old rooster will appear on the table like a spring chicken, more serviceable than has ever been known in the history of cooking.

The Piece Bag.

Here is a sensible method of tending the contents of a piece bag. On the outside of the bag fasten the largest purchasable safety pin. When the piece of the dressmaker is over attach samples to this pin from every remnant that goes into the bag. You will be delighted at the amount of time and patience saved by this simple device, for you can see at a glance just what the bag contains.

GORMAN IN THE RIGHT

In Demanding Speedy Re-Count In Baltimore—Strengthens His Candidacy.

Whether Democrat or Republican, every man who desires an honest count in elections must commend the act of Hon. Arthur P. Gorman, the Democratic candidate for Governor, as pertaining to the alleged election irregularities in certain wards in Baltimore City.

Mr. Gorman's interview on this subject has the right ring, and rings out as that of a strong, just man, who had rather be in the right than be Governor. He says:

"As I have said before, I want every Democratic ballot cast in the primary recounted. I do not believe that there have been wholesale frauds throughout the city, but the only way it can be found out if there have been any frauds outside of the Eighth precincts of the Twenty-third ward is by a re-count of the vote of every precinct."

"I want the recount made as expeditiously as possible. I hope that the jury will adopt every method possible to hasten the work so that the truth can be ascertained."

"I have said from the beginning and I repeat now with all possible emphasis at my command, that if I have not been honestly and fairly nominated for Governor I do not want the nomination, and moreover, I will not have it. I do not want there to be the slightest suspicion that I profited by any fraud in the count of the ballots. I hope that my position in this matter is fully understood by the people of the City and State."

Mr. Gorman's words are thoroughly characteristic of the man, and cause no surprise to those who have known him well and who have realized from their intercourse with him the large force of reserve strength he possesses in his moral and intellectual makeup. His closest friends also know that he went into this contest with the greatest reluctance, and only after he had been strongly importuned to do so by hosts of friends from all parts of the State. When he did enter the fight, he did it with all his force and vigor, and he is exhibiting the same force and vigor as well as the strongest sense of justice and right, in his determination to have this primary investigation pushed to the utmost limit. His sense of duty to the public has governed him in this matter, and has given him an additional opportunity to show some of his most marked characteristics.

This certainly makes good his often repeated statement that he would not have a nomination that was in any way tainted. It would be well to remember the suspected election officials are not all Democrats, but an equal number of them are Republicans, recommended by the Republican organization in Baltimore, and accepted by the Republican Supervisor of Elections.

Ex-Governor Frank Brown, sometimes a contrary Democrat, but always an honest Democrat, says, concerning Mr. Gorman's attitude: "Senator Gorman's attitude from the start has been the right one. He has said he does not want and will not have a nomination for Governor which he believes tainted with fraud, and he has declared that he wants every vote in the city recounted, expressing his willingness to adopt any feasible means by which this can be secured."

Governor Crothers, when interviewed, said: "Senator Gorman's stand is an admirable one, and one for which he is to be commended. If there was fraud in the primary, it should be brought to light and all Democrats should help."

"The present investigation is right and proper, and should be pushed. It is the only thing to be done under the circumstances."

Half a million dollars will be raised as a prize for the composer of a song that shall stir into patriotism the blood of the nation, if the plans of Dr. J. B. Moralists and those who have delved
deep into the mysteries of life,
tell us that honesty is not only—
retrospectively speaking—the right and
proper thing, but that it is the best
policy, speaking from a merely selfish
and material standpoint, as well. If
this be true then it ought to be equally
as applicable to politics as to other
phases of life.

It is time for all parties to recog-
nize that it is useless to pretend to
overlook, to attempt to excuse, or to
strive to condone the mistakes and
blunders made by them. Let them
be frankly admitted and a willingness
be shown to correct them. Those who
frankly admit their mistakes and then
make a determined effort to rectify
and correct the errors are more worthy
of trust than those who deny or at-
tempt to evade.

If members of our party have com-
mitted crimes as well as made mis-
takes, it is futile for us to conceal or
deny the fact. Let us with sorrow
acknowledge the disgrace, but at the
same time, with righteous indigna-
tion at their betrayal of our trust,
repudiate alike the criminals and their
crimes.

While not attempting in the slight-
est degree to either condone or excuse
the offenses of our own party, let us
insist that while we are cleansing our
house that our political opponents do
likewise. In the recent primary elec-
tion held in Baltimore City, some of
the election judges of the Democratic
party committed a heinous crime when
they failed to properly count and re-
turn the votes cast in that contest. It
is the sincere desire of the Democrats
of this State that these men be hauled
before the bar of justice and there re-
ceive the punishment which they de-
serve for their despicable acts.

Mr. Gorman in his scathing de-
nunciation of the men, in his indig-
nant repudiation of their acts is but
speaking for his party whose senti-
ments he gives vent to and but ex-
presses their wish when he demands
a searching and rigid investigation.

Admitting the guilt of some of the
Democratic election officials in Balti-
more City, let us likewise frankly ad-
mit that Mr. Gorman, himself, has
made mistakes in the past; that his
public record is not all it should be;
that his attitude on legislative ex-
penditures, direct primaries, and the Public
Utility Bill are not in accord with the
progressive spirit of today. Man is
fallible and the man who never
makes a wrong move, never accom-
plishes anything. Mr. Gorman made
mistakes, he himself admits it, but
he is every reason for believing

that he now views these matters in a
different light. Whatever Mr. Gor-
man may or may not have done, he
has never yet been accused of a lack
of manly courage; his fights have all
been made in the open; his position
on any public question has never
been in doubt. This courage of his,
this frankness, this openness of pur-
pose should inspire the people with
confidence in the sincerity of his pre-
sent pledges for economy, direct pri-
maries and the proper regulation of our
public service corporations; in this
promise to give to the people of the
State a business administration which
while being sane, safe and conserva-
tive will also be in keeping with the
progressive spirit of the day.

Though his well known traits of
character are sufficient to justify con-
fidence, yet it must not be overlooked
that he is a candidate for higher po-
litical honors after his term of gover-
nor expires which of itself makes it
highly improbable that he would fail
in carrying out his promised program.
He is frankly a politician—proposes
to make politics his life's work—and
if he is to win must keep faith with
the people. His political future will
largely depend upon his course while
governor. The close result of the last
primary will have convinced him, if
he had any delusions before, that the
people now hold there in and propose
hereafter to do their own driving; if
he fails to keep faith with them it
would not be in the power of any or-
ganization—no matter how well en-
trenched—to save him from their
wrath. Mr. Gorman is as well aware
of this as is any man, and can be de-
pendent upon "to out his cards accord-
ingly."

Favored with enough of this world's
goods to lift him above the slightest
suspicion of monetary gain; blessed
with an open manly heart endowed
with a capacity far above the average
possessed of courage to fight his own
battles; ripened by experience; and
filled with a sincere desire to serve
the people, Mr. Gorman will make a
governor that future generations can
point to with pride.

AT SALISBURY FAIR GROUNDS

SALISBURY, MD.

On Tuesday, October 17th

FIRST—A race between two champion two-year-old trotting colts, Dock C. (by Dry Dock; record of 2:34) owned by D. C. Armstrong, Princess Anne, Md., and A. S. P. (by Byrne Dean; record of 2:41; owned by Phillip Weisenborn, of Salem, N. J.). These two colts are evenly matched, and owners have staked a purse of \$500 each in the hands of Joseph P. Shinn, of the Kein Supply Co., of Philadelphia, the winner to take the stakes. This race will be for blood, as the owner of each colt wishes to break the world's record for two-year-old trotters on half-mile track, which is 2:19, this record being made by a two-year-old colt since Dock C. made the record at Easton, Md., on August 25th.

SECOND—A Special Mixed Race for 2:30 Class Trotters and Pacers, in which there will be at least five starters. Each of the five horses are expected to win the race. Somerset Boy, owned by Page Jackson, and Good Friday, owned by Howard Anderson, both of Somerset County, will be competitors in this race. Jamaica Ginger Now A Beverage In Sussex.

Hereafter the thirty stranger in Sussex County must complain of violent pains in his stomach before he can purchase any Jamaica ginger, according to far-reaching decision made by Judges Rice and Woolley, sitting at Georgetown. The decision was given in the case of Levin Hastings, of Delmar, who has eight separate indictments against him for the sale of ginger.

According to the argument of Hastings, counsel, ginger is a drug and does not come within the local option law which forbids the sale of spirituous liquor. The Court thought otherwise and decided that where a man sold more than one bottle in one day to the same man, thus showing that it was not sold as a medicine but as a beverage, the sale of ginger was unlawful.

The decision will affect hundreds of druggists who have been selling large quantities of ginger ever since Sussex county went dry. Under the decision a number of druggists and storekeepers will be indicted. A number of the merchants got together and decided to appeal the case, claiming that the United States Government puts Jamaica ginger on the approved list of drugs and compels no payment of a license for the sale.

THE CHRIST TOUCH

By Rev. WILLIAM S. JACKSON, Pastor Prospect Avenue M. E. Church, Brooklyn.

The sin, the sorrow, the suffering, the needs of this world, are an up-pointed finger toward a God who can supply. God's answer to that mute appeal is a curing, forgiving touch. What wonderful power there is in the human touch! This world needs more of that sympathetic touch of the human hand. But, oh, how men need the touch of God on their lives! One of the most tender undercurrents of thought in the gospel narrative is the impulsive way the distressed and diseased of the day came to God's Son, as though drawn by some irresistible instinct. Over and over again it is said that Jesus touched the afflicted, and the distresses departed, the eyes were opened or the fever was cured.

You recall that after Jesus had preached that message, which was so great that it has always been called the Sermon on the Mount, as he came down to the plain there hurried up to him a leper, who, breaking all sanitary laws, kneeled down before him and cried, "Lord, if thou wilt thou canst make me clean." There was no doubt in the mind of the poor fellow that a prophet who could do such things and preach such sermons could cure leprosy. The doubt, if any there was, was concerned only Christ's willingness. Instantly Jesus dismissed all his fears by gently laying his hand on the poor wretch and saying tenderly: "I will. Be thou clean." And the cure was immediate and complete.

On one of the Lord's long journeys he had reached a point far beyond the limits of Jewish territory where it might be expected his fame had not gone, but the people brought to Christ one who was deaf and afflicted in speech. This man was led aside from the multitude to Jesus, who, placing his fingers to the man's ears and touching his tongue, brought power to those useless organs. The hardest noises must have been symphonies to these ears long closed, and I can imagine that loosened tongue never tired of telling of the wonderful Saviour. The divine cannot come into contact with the human without profound results. If God has touched your life the whole world will know it. All profound changes in the world are through contact—the contact of that which is dead with that which is full of life. Our dead, inert, fruitless lives cannot come into contact with the life of God without there being most profound transformations.

Oh, what faith we come to have in the power of Christ's hand! We are like the ruler who came and said with confident faith, "My daughter is even now dead, but come and lay thy hand upon her and she shall live." Oh, for a faith like that! There was only one result possible. Jesus went to the house and room where the lifeless maiden lay, took her by the hand, and she arose. The power of God is unbounded. At his word the dead shall live. Not in our time or in our way, but at his good pleasure, our lost ones will be restored. "I am the resurrection and the life. He that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live." The touch of Christ sets in motion all the activities of a Christian life.

We need the touch of Christ upon our lives not only in the great crises to cleanse the stain of sin, relieve our sorrow and sustain life, but we need that hand upon us in everyday life when we are fearful and overcome with anxiety.

One of the most beautiful touches in all the gospel narrative is one that few have noticed. When the Master was transfigured on the mountain it is related that his face and garments shone like the noonday sun, that Moses and Elijah appeared and held conversation with Jesus and that the approving voice of God was heard from heaven. No wonder, then, that the three disciples were so terrified that they fell to the ground and buried their faces in the earth. It is added that Jesus came and touched them, saying, "Arise and be not afraid." He was not so deeply concerned in the great experience, in the conversation with Moses and Elijah or in listening to the voice of God that he forgot his disciples for even one moment. No; Christ is not so lost in the splendors and interests of heaven that he forgets us, surrounded with our cares, perplexities and anxieties. He comes to us with a touch and a soothing word and bids us to do our best, leaving results in his hand. Now we need to lift our heads once again when that hand is laid upon us!

There is just one further thought that I would bring you, a closing thought, but I believe the most important truth. There was not a single case where Christ laid his hand upon an individual that there was not some definite result. My Christian friend it is vain for you to say that Christ has touched your life unless you are a changed individual. If this world's Saviour has laid his hand upon you old things have passed away. You are a new creature in Christ Jesus. The old habits no longer hold sway; the old appetites have been removed; the selfish tongue has been changed; the idle, lifeless hands have become busy for him. Oh, my friend, let Christ put a new hold on you this day. Oh, I pray that in time to come it may be said of the congregation that "he laid his hands on every one of them and blessed them."

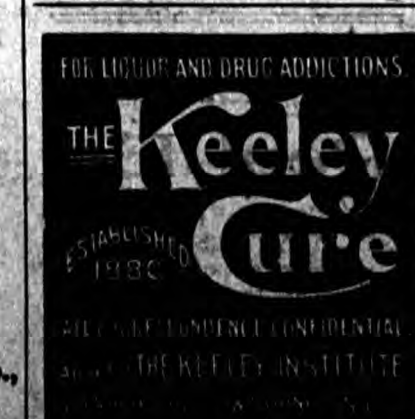

Both Candidates For Governor Declare For Local Option.

The Anti-Saloon League announces that it has received written pledges from Messrs. Goldsborough and Gorman, Republican and Democratic candidates for Governor, that if elected they will sign the local option bill if passed and will not interfere with its passage. They also declare their belief that the people have a right to vote upon all such questions. This takes the local option question out of the Governorship contest, and leaves the League free to center upon the Legislature and force the fight against the corrupt Malion liquor gang of Baltimore which has killed the local option bill twice, and, not content with robbing the people of the right to vote on the liquor question, has stolen votes actually cast on other questions.

The League does not endorse or support either candidate for Governor, but leaves every voter in its constituency free to vote in accordance with his own judgment as to his responsibility as a Christian citizen to secure clean government and promote political righteousness. This handling of the case relieves the League from any charge of partisan unfairness.

Questions will be sent to the Legislative candidates this week and the declaration in favor of self government by the heads of both tickets will practically force the legislative candidates to do the same in self-defense. —Anti Saloon League.

The services last Sunday in the Baptist Church were simply great. They began in the afternoon by a sermon delivered by the pastor, Rev. B. G. Parker, and this was followed by Fraternal Greetings by Rev. A. A. Harriman. The meetings were largely attended, and will be continued on Sunday morning at 10.30 and at night, Dr. Fristoe doing the preaching. There seems to be a very kindly feeling between the churches in this community, and this is just as it ought to be. Mr. Parker has preached several times for Mr. Harriman in Marcella Springs and Mr. Harriman stands ready to return the compliment. The new M. E. Church at Athol is being erected. The carpenters are now busy, the frame work is up, and the work will be pushed from now on.

Peter B. Hall, of Meriden, Conn., has sued Miss Theresa Atchler to recover \$12.58, which he said he spent while in her company from June 7 to 22, 1910. The bill of particulars contains entries for trolley fares, ranging from a nickel to a quarter. Other entries include these: Ice cream, ten cents; supper, 45 cents; meal at New Haven, 62 cents; trolley to Savin Rock and from New Haven, 10 cents; shore dinners \$1.; hiring horse and wagon, \$1.; chocolate, 85 cents; hiring horse at Wilmamto, \$1.50; supper at Hartford, 60 cents; tip to waiter, 25 cents. Hall, who is a painter has retained counsel in his suit.

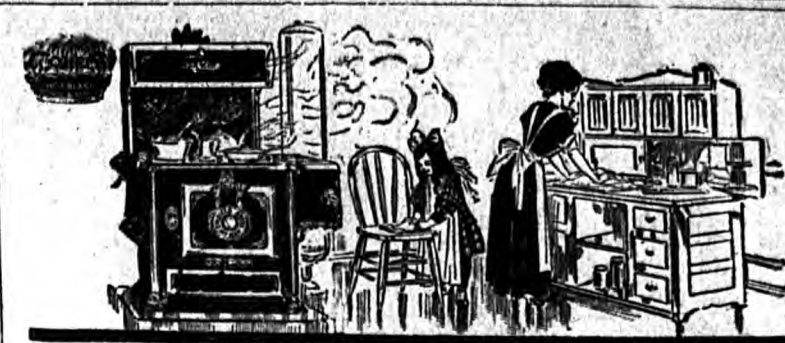

CITY COUNCIL

Proceedings—Work Disposed Of By The Council Last Monday Evening.

Monday night's session of the City Council was a prolonged one, there being much business of importance before the Council for action. It was nearly eleven o'clock when the Council adjourned.

Mayor Bonde was instructed by the Council to assume charge of putting in wells on Isabella, William and East Church Streets, and to expedite the work as much as possible. There is considerable work of this kind to be done and the Council is anxious to have it completed before the bad weather sets in.

The treasurer was ordered to pay the following bills: P. S. Shockley, surveying, \$150.15; Wm. A. Crow, \$800 on account of curbing and guttering Isabella Street.

Merrill Morris was granted a permit to erect a store house on South Division Street.

The Council decided by unanimous vote to accept the recommendation of Engineer Shockley relative to the improvements on Fitzwater Street. His plan is to run the said street straight from Main Street extended to the B. T. White property, thence straight to the intersection of First Street with Fitzwater Street. The said street is to be forty feet wide with five and one half foot sidewalks on both sides. Engineer Shockley's report established the paving grade. The report having been accepted, the improvement will now be proceeded with.

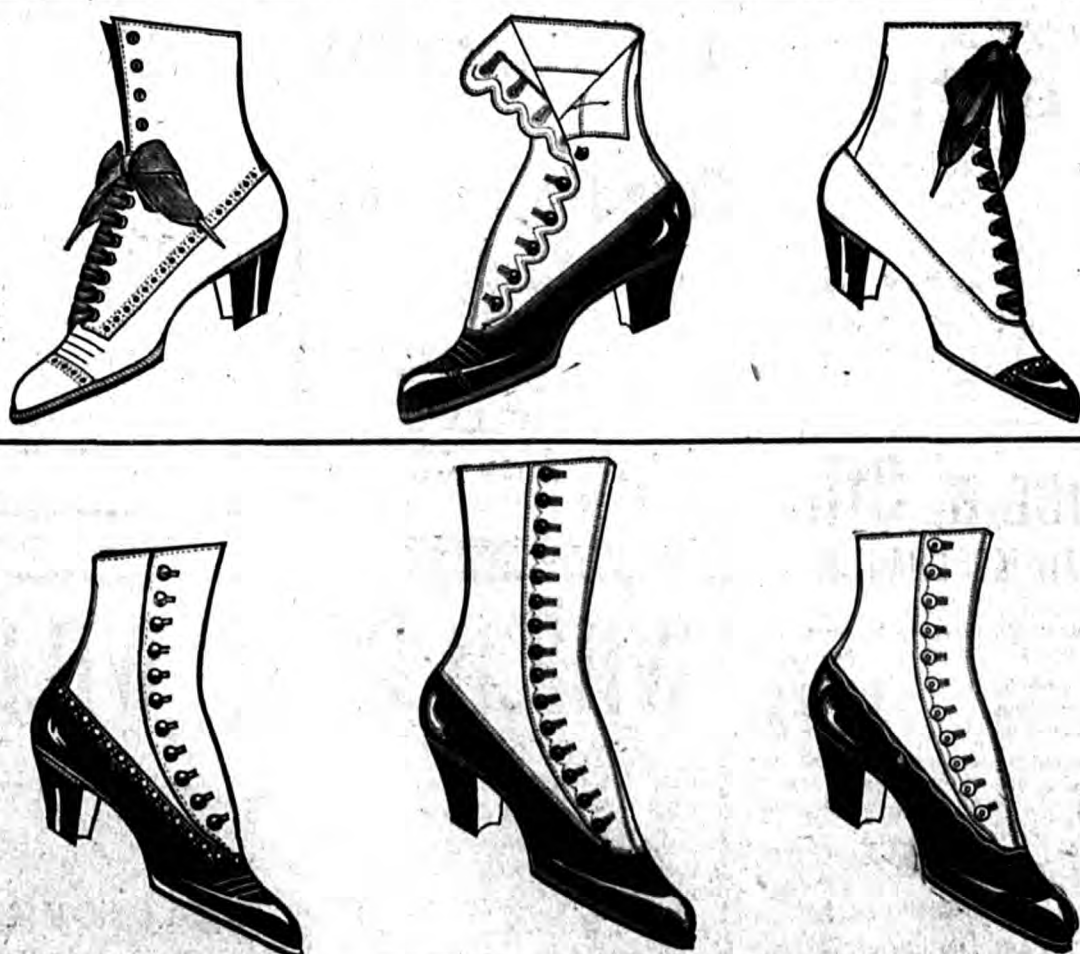

Gillis, meat market on Dock Street; to Glen Perdue, dwelling on Lake Street. It is seldom that the Council has so many building applications on a single night. The permit granted to E. G. Mills is for the erection of a two-story brick building on lot recently purchased from Mitchell German. It will make a big improvement on that corner.

Mr. H. L. Brewington was before the Council and asked that some changes be made in the sewer and well on Walnut Street, so that they will carry off the water more rapidly after a big rain. The Council promised to give the matter their early attention.

Lewis Morgan was awarded a contract to lay a ten-inch sewer on West Philadelphia Avenue from North Division Street, to the property of B. N. Brittingham or further if required, his bid being sixty cents per foot.

Miles faction of the party. The Republicans have put up no local ticket and it is expected that many of them will support the anti Miles ticket. Now, it is alleged the Democratic members of the Board of Election Supervisors have threatened to make up a trick ballot for the election that will give a great advantage to the Miles faction and which many of the Lee people will be unable to vote correctly.

The fight in Somerset is very hot. There is only one automobile in the county for hire, and that has been taken by the Miles people as \$250 for the campaign. The Lee people have sent to Richmond for a motor car with which to campaign.

Although it was understood that he was contemplating marriage no one in Baltimore knew that the ceremony had been performed in Salisbury on Monday until Mr. Hewitt arrived in Baltimore.

DEATH OF JOHN P. OWENS

Was A Member Of The Purnell Legion In The Civil War.

After an illness of several weeks from a complication of diseases, Mr. John Purnell Owens died at his home on North Division Street shortly before eleven o'clock Monday morning. Deceased was born in Salisbury, his parents being the late Ebenezer and Martha Owens. Had he lived until December the 20th, next, he would have reached his 70th year.

At the outbreak of the Civil War young Owens enlisted in Purnell Legion, which was organized in Snow Hill, and fought for the preservation of the Union. He was in company of which the late Col. Samuel A. Graham was Captain, and at the battle of Antietam, while serving as Sergeant, lost a leg from the bursting of a shell, the horse which he was riding being killed. Sergeant Owens returned to his home in Salisbury soon after this famous battle, where he resided until his death.

He served two terms as a member of the City Council and was a member of that body at the time of the big fire in 1886, and took a prominent part in the passage of ordinances designed to improve the city while rebuilding was going on.

Deceased was a staunch Republican and was for many years one of the leaders of his party in this County. He was postmaster of Salisbury for four years under the Harrison administration.

He is survived by a widow and two children, Mr. H. Winter Owens, Assistant Postmaster, and Mrs. Edward C. Fulton. Funeral services took place on Wednesday afternoon, from his late home, Rev. Dr. Martindale officiating. Interment was in Parsons Cemetery.

SEEKS ORIGIN OF LIFE

Dr. Kessel Who Would Unravel Great Mystery, Is Here—Hopes for Ultimate Reward.

"No man dares say that the secret of the origin of life will be discovered, yet scientists are working hopelessly toward the unraveling of the great mystery."

This has been the comment upon the problem of science, since history began, by Dr. Albrecht Kessel, professor of physiology and director of the Physiological Institute of Heidelberg University, who arrived in Baltimore to deliver the Hexter lectures at Johns Hopkins Medical School. Professor and Mrs. Kessel are stopping at the home of Dr. J. Whitridge Williams, 1128 Cathedral Street.

With the modesty of a man great in the world of science, Professor Kessel discussed his research work in biochemistry, for which he was awarded the Nobel Medical prize in 1910. This work, in the last few years, has been chiefly in studying the chemical constituents of proteins, as applied to biology. Considering carefully the question as to the application of his discoveries to the living tissues of the human body, he hesitated long enough to translate his thoughts into English, then answered with the cautious exactness of the man of science.

Proteins, then tissues. "Proteins," he said slowly, "enter largely into the composition of the tissues of animal organisms, and if we learn all that can be learned in regard to them we will have built up a stepping stone toward the ultimate problem. Whether the mind of man will ever be big enough to grasp that, I do not know. That is of the future. But still, I do not say that it is an impossibility."

The patience implied in his words and manner was that of the scholar who is content to work constructively without demanding to see the end of his endeavor.

How His Work Began. "At first," he continued, "I began my research work into the chemical constituents of the cells of tissues, both animal and vegetable. This gradually narrowed down to the study of proteins, a study which has been made by scientists for more than a century. In about the seventies there was a pause and the work dropped off; then, in the nineties, the program was resumed, and with the knowledge gained from the scientists of the past we have been able to make a wonderful advance."

"We know already about twenty chemical compounds going to make up various proteins, but the different proteins have different constituents, so there is more yet to learn."

Although this is Professor Kessel's first visit to America, his fame has preceded him, and many scientists of this country are conversant with the discoveries which have brought him general recognition in his home land. He has been connected with Heidelberg, he said, for the last decade or more, and it's here, he added parenthetically, that he met Dr. Williams. Knows Hopkins Record. "I arrived in this country," he said "on August the 21st and will sail for Germany on October the 24th. Yes, it is my first visit, but I am well acquainted with the record of Johns Hopkins and, as are most of us at Heidelberg, with that of Dr. William H. Welch."

"Since my arrival I have been most impressed with the advance of science in this country and the standing of your universities. I hardly expected it," he added naively.

Praises United States Cities. Professor Kessel, who is a man still in the prime of life, was enthusiastic in his praise of New York and Washington. The capital he compared with Berlin and Vienna, commenting upon its beauty. He has not made the acquaintance of Baltimore, but hopes to see the principal points of interest in that city before he sails.

EX-GOV. E. E. JACKSON.

The placing of a tablet in the Tri-
city M. E. Church, South, of this city,
in honor of the memory of Ex-Governor
E. E. Jackson, is a fitting tribute
to the memory of a man who during
his lifetime was such a faithful mem-
ber of that church and who did so
much for it. It is also well for the
people of Salisbury and Wicomico
County, as well as the state at large
to keep fresh in their minds the mem-
ory of a man who did so much for
City, County and State. Few com-
munities have been blessed with men of
the generosity displayed by both Ex-
Governor Jackson and his brother, Ex-
Congressman W. H. Jackson, and it is
eminently fitting that the deeds of
both should be remembered, one by
keeping fresh his memory, and the
other by appreciation while living.

INDEPENDENCE IN PARTY.

Many believe that the time has
about come when the people have de-
termined to take the affairs of their
own party in their own hands and no
longer regard the "word sent down
the line" either in regard to party
principles, issues or men to be nomi-

who is who and the why and where-

"This doesn't mean that you are
going to get rid of party organizations
or politicians, but that you are going
to make them serve the people instead
of serving themselves or the special
interests.

DEMOCRATIC SUCCESS.

As the campaign progresses, it can
be seen that the tide which to some
extent, had been running against the
Democrats in the coming State elec-
tion has turned and that very rapidly.

One of the best indications of this
fact can be found in the tremendous
meeting held in the Lyric in Balti-
more on Thursday of this week. This
meeting had been looked forward to
with great interest by both parties and
was generally regarded as a good op-
portunity for judging the sentiment

to the coming election. If this is to
be taken on its face as a true indica-
tion of the feeling in that city, then
the fight is practically won by the
Democrats, and the only thing left to

ity Mr. Gorman will have. Mr.
Gorman's wise and honest course in
denouncing the frauds committed in
the primary contest of Baltimore City
together with his strong demand that
every ballot box be examined and the
public be made acquainted with the
true facts has done much to counteract
the bad effect of the revelations of
fraud in connection with this contest.

More than this it has given the
people much more confidence in the
honesty and sincerity of the Democrat-

The Principle of Popular Government at Stake

When Shakespeare spoke of the "scurvy politician" he had in mind the politician who makes a promise to the people, gets elected on that promise and after he is elected betrays those who trusted him.

In New York the Democratic party got possession of the Legislature by promising to enact a State wide direct primary law. Last fall Democratic Assemblymen were elected in twenty Republican districts "up State" on the specific promise that a direct primary law would be enacted.

In the meantime it is folly for the "scurvy politician" who breaks his promise, to resist this great reform, for it is bound to come, and those who get in the way of it will be run over. The system of nominating candidates by conventions grew up, but was not adopted for nearly a half century after the formation of the government. When it was accepted generally it was amidst conditions that do not exist now. There were then no big cities with their bosses and "organizations" to send their agents to select men for the people to vote for. In late years the representative idea in the convention has been lost and the delegates represent not the people but the party organization or some local boss. The system has become thoroughly discredited, and the people all over the land have determined to abolish it utterly. The politicians may retard the great reform of direct nominations, but they can only retard it. The contention that the body of the people are not competent to select their own candidates is not sound. If it is sound, then the theory of popular government is unsound and a failure.

MUST KEEP AWAKE

Democratic Party in Maryland—Dangers That Threaten From Republican Administration.

In the course of a highly optimistic editorial in respect to the decidedly encouraging prospects of the Republican party in the pending political campaign in Maryland, the Baltimore American says:

Republican success at the coming election means the restoration of an honest electoral system and good government to the State of Maryland and the city of Baltimore. It is the one and the only route of salvation. If Philip Lee Goldborough is elected governor of this State, and if there is a Republican Legislature to sustain him, every statute under which election crookedness has been accomplished will be wiped from the books, and there will be enacted laws which favor no particular party, but under which the will of the people will be fairly indicated in the balloting and the counting will be honest.

If the people of Maryland could be brought to believe this confident assertion this beautiful promise of benefits to come, the Republican victory at the election in that State next month would be merely a question of the size of the majority. They could not be stopped from electing a complete Republican administration if they could be convinced that it would be an absolute assurance of honest elections and good government.

But there is no such assurance. The Republican nominations in Maryland were dictated by boss rule and the party organization is held in the control of a Federal officeholder. Should the people elect a Republican administration, that administration would be directed by the collector of the port of Baltimore in the manner which, in his opinion, would confer the largest benefit upon the Republican organization of which he is the head.

The people of Maryland know that the chief object of a Republican administration would be to qualify the entire negro vote of the State in such manner as would make it easiest for the Republican party to poll that vote for its candidates for office at all succeeding elections. That is what "honest election laws" mean, to the average Republican politician of that State. Good administration would be of secondary importance to making negro suffrage ample in Maryland.

Nor was the experience of four years of Republican administration in Maryland, satisfactory to the people of that State. The record of the Republican party in this respect is as called as bitterly as the Republicans are now assailing the present Democratic administration. Certainly it was not so good that the people cared to continue living under it.

While no great amount of praise may be visited upon Democratic administrations in Maryland, it may with truth be said of them that they have proved better than the Republican administrations.

Despite the handicap of gross frauds at the primaries in Baltimore—which, however, cast their evil shadow over the Republican, as well as the Democratic organization—there is no reason to believe that the people of Maryland, at the election next month, will enter upon the doubtful experiment of a Republican State administration dictated by a Federal officeholder in Baltimore City. Apples and Nuts Glut The Market.

Two of the greatest crops in Hagerstown section this year are apples and chestnuts and owing to the superabundance of both prices are far below the usual figure. This is especially true of chestnuts, which are selling as low as three cents a quart.

Apples are being retailed throughout Washington county at from 50 to 40 cents a bushel. The size and appearance of the fruit are attributed to the systematic process of spraying. The barrel factories in Hagerstown are working overtime to supply the demand for barrels and boxes.

The chestnut crop is larger this year than probably has ever been known. The trees are loaded with nuts and they are being gathered without the necessity of "breast" the trees. Bushels of nuts can be gathered from the ground, which is literally covered with them.

100,000 APPLE TREES

On One Farm. Gigantic Project Mapped Out By Delaware Apple Co.

One hundred thousand apple trees are to be planted on one farm, near Bridgeville, this State. The farm is the one which has been purchased by the Delaware Apple Co., the officers of which at a meeting held on Saturday, in the office of Hon. David T. Marvel, in the du Pont Building reached the above decision.

When Mr. Marvel who is an officer of the company, was spoken to on the subject by a reporter of Every Evening said the object of the meeting was to select the varieties of apples to be grown on the company's farm and the number of trees to be planted. After selecting the best and most readily marketable varieties, it was decided to set out, this fall, starting next month, 48,000 trees, all of select varieties, to be arranged in blocks of early fruit, late fruit etc. In the spring the company will set out 100,000 more trees and next fall the planting will bring the total number up to 100,000.

The farm has been cleared and is ready for the planting and when the work is completed it will be practically one unbroken orchard of 100,000 trees set out in blocks as outlined above.

DEMOCRATIC SUCCESS MEANS PRIMARY REFORMS.

Although we boast of living in a pure Democracy, the government of this country for the past few decades has been a government more of party than of the people themselves. More attention has been given to the political affiliations of the men elected to office than to their intrinsic worth. Our legislative and executive positions have been filled with men elected solely as representatives of a party and as such are expected to conform with the wishes of their party on any public question of sufficient importance to justify a party stand. In order that there be no doubt or uncertainty as to the course any member of our legislative bodies is expected to take, a caucus which determines the policy of the party and whose mandates every member affiliated with it is expected to obey, is called.

The man bold enough to refuse to sink his own views in that of his party is called a renegade and a traitor to his cause; false alike to his party and those who elected him. Independence in action and thought has been largely out of fashion in political office holders. This state of affairs may be far removed from our idea of the kind of government a true Republic should adopt, but this is the actual condition as it exists today and it is folly to close our eyes to the fact.

Political parties have been called "necessary evils," this they may be, but of two things we may be certain; first, they are here and it looks as though they are here to stay; second, this country is now governed by them and probably will be for a long time. It does not necessarily follow that because we have party government, we have bad government. Whether it proves a blessing or a curse, will depend upon the wisdom of the party in power.

The greatest menace today lies in the fact that parties have got in the clothes of designing men actuated by selfish or corrupt motives and who are using their power to further selfish schemes. Since we are to have government by party it is imperative that we place the control of our parties in the hands of men who will place public interests first. It is necessary that our parties nominate for office men of capacity, men of attainments, men of experience. There is but one way to do this and that is in our party primaries.

There is but one way to do this in our primaries, and that is to see to it that laws are passed which will place the power of selecting our party leaders and our party nominees in the hands of the people. How to do this

is the biggest question before the American people today. Experience has taught us that our plan of making nominations by convention is a miserable failure, since these have proven easy prey for those who make the game of politics a means of livelihood or regard them in the light of "practical" business.

Direct primaries are regarded by many as the best method offered to keep the control in the only logical place for it to be reeled—the hands of the people. The Democratic party has placed upon our statute books a direct primary law. This law, though better than the one it replaced, needs many changes in order to make it as effective as it ought to be. The Democratic party in its platform promises to make these changes. The present law is cumbersome and hard to interpret, it is to be made simple and easy to vote. It permits of marking tickets on the outside; a secret ballot is pledged. It makes it possible for a Republican to participate in a Democratic primary or vice versa; a new registration is promised in which party affiliation must be stated then making it certain that none but those affiliated with a party will have the right to participate in that party's primaries. The party further promises an amendment that will insure a fair count; also that proper measure will be taken to guard against corruption and bribery.

The Republican party on the other hand is not generally accredited with a very great love for direct primaries. Mr. Goldborough is no doubt sincere in his promise for the right kind of a direct primary law, but can he control his party?

It is safer to trust the Democrats with this. The platform promises it, Mr. Gorman pledges himself to it, and what is of equal or greater force, the sentiment in the Democratic party is undeniably stronger in favor of it. The voters of Maryland should carefully consider this question—it is the most important issue in this campaign.

To sum up:
If this country is to be governed by parties—and this fact is so plain all must see it—it is imperative to have our parties controlled by the right motives and led by the right men. To do this the people themselves must hold tight to the reins. For them to do this their right in the primaries must be protected and guarded; a primary law must be passed, simple and easy to vote and at the same time effective; it must provide for a secret ballot, a fair count and guard against bribery, intimidation and corruption. To which party shall we turn in order to best assure ourselves of getting this? The inevitable answer to this must be—The Democrats.

Elect Mr. Gorman and give the Democratic control of the legislature if you want a better primary law.

Old School Baptists Meet

The 129th annual meeting of the Salisbury Old School Baptist Association convened in Delmar, Wednesday and continued three days. Each of these churches was well represented and hundreds of people enjoyed the hospitality of the Delmar Church during the annual meeting. Several other associations were represented by messengers and minutes the correspondence extending from Georgia to Maine and Canada.

Elder A. B. Francis was chosen moderator, and J. H. Truitt and G. W. Adkins, clerks. The introductory sermon was preached by Elder J. G. Eubanks, of Newark, Del. The afternoon discourses were delivered by Elders B. F. Coulter and J. M. Fenton, of Philadelphia. Elder H. H. Lefters, of Leesburg, Va., preached in the evening.

In addition to the above named, there were present Elders S. H. Durand and Southampton, Pa., F. A. Chick of Hopewell, N. J., John McConnell of New York City, H. C. Ker of Middletown, N. Y., J. T. CITY COUNCIL

Proceedings—Work Disposed Of By The Council Last Monday Evening.

The Council Monday evening granted four building permits, as follows: to Joseph E. Davis, dwelling on Naylor Street; to Uriah W. Dickerson, garage on Isabella Street; to Wm. R. Arvey, dwelling on East Vine Street; to Henry E. Colours, dwelling on Cooper Avenue.

Engineer Shockley was instructed to prepare plans and specifications for a sewer, running from Water Street, across the property of the Salisbury Realty Company to the east fork of the Wicomico River.

Mayor Boudie submitted the name of George T. Jenkins for assistant policeman who was promptly confirmed by the Council. The new officer will assume his duties November the 1st, at a salary of \$40 a month.

The ordinance providing for pavement on East Church Street from the N. Y. P. and N. R. B. tracks to the Eastern city limits was passed by the Council and approved by the Mayor. The ordinance provides for concrete sidewalks to conform to the new grade.

The City Solicitor was instructed to notify the N. Y. P. and N. R. B. Company to put down a crossing on Naylor Street extended so as to connect with North Division Street.

Engineer Shockley was instructed to lay out and establish a paving grade on Poplar Hill Avenue from Elizabeth Street to Isabella Street.

Unveiling The Beautiful Mosaic Tablet.

Large congregations attended Trinity M. E. Church, South, last Sunday, morning and evening, the occasion being the unveiling of the beautiful mosaic tablet to the memory of ex-Governor Elihu Emory Jackson, which came from the Tiffany Studio in New York. The subject of this tablet is the "Guardian Angel," and its beauties were the admiration of the great crowd present. Three visiting ministers were present on this occasion. Bishop E. E. Hoss, of Tennessee, Rev. T. N. Potts, D. D., of Norfolk, and Rev. James Cannon, D. D., of Richmond, each taking part in the services. At the morning service Bishop Hoss preached one of the most forceful and eloquent sermons ever delivered in Salisbury, his text being "For God So Loved The World That He Gave His Only Begotten Son."

At night, Dr. Potts, a former pastor of Trinity, was greeted by an audience which filled the church and he preached with unusual vigor holding the closest attention of his audience for forty five minutes. He was followed by Dr. Cannon, who spoke for a short time referring to the pioneers of Southern Methodism in Salisbury—the men who had done so much for the church here in years past, but who had gone to their reward. He paid a beautiful tribute to these men, among the number being ex-Governor Jackson, whose generosity and love for his church made it possible for the congregation of Trinity Church to worship in such a beautiful edifice.

Dr. Cannon also addressed the Sunday School in the morning in the interest of a special work he has taken up—the raising of funds for the erection of a model Sunday School building in North Carolina, where teachers can be trained for Sunday School work. Dr. Cannon plans to raise \$30,000 for this object and says he is meeting with great success. A special collection for this purpose was taken in the Sunday School.

The musical program was of a high order. At the night service the E. K. Jackson Barbers Class attended in a body, seats having been reserved for them.

The Three Romeos.

The "Three Romeos," a new American musical comedy, will be the attraction at the new Academy of Music Baltimore, the week commencing Monday night with the usual Wednesday and Saturday matinees.

The play received the initial production in Washington recently, where it scored an instantaneous success, the press of the National Capital being unanimous in its praise, pronouncing it one of the best of its kind seen there in recent years. The comedy is said to be clean and refreshing, without a single suggestive feature.

CHAPTER 353

AN ACT to propose an Amendment to Article 1 of the Constitution of this State for adding thereto a new Section, to be known as Section 4, to follow Section 3 and to provide for the submission of said Amendments to the qualified voters of this State for adoption or rejection.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland (three-fifths of all members of each of the two houses concurring), that the following section be and the same is hereby proposed as an Amendment to Article 1 of the Constitution of this State, which said section, if adopted by the qualified voters of this State, shall stand as an additional section to said Article 1, to be known as Section 4, to follow Section 3, of said Article.

SECTION 2. All State and municipal elections shall be conducted by the system commonly known as the Australian Ballot System, and it shall be the duty of the General Assembly to provide by law for a form of ballot, uniform throughout the State, for use at all State elections in this State, and provide that on said ballot after the name of each candidate thereon who may have been duly nominated as the candidate of any political party or organization, shall be printed the legal name of said party or organization; equal representation of the minority party among the judges and clerks of election registers or other officers performing similar functions shall not be abolished by the General Assembly unless by a vote of four-fifths of all the members of each house.

The right to be registered as a qualified voter and the right to vote at any State or municipal election in this State shall be limited to the following persons:

First: Every male white citizen not disqualified by the Second or Third Sections of this Article possessing the qualifications as to age and residence mentioned in Section 1 of this Article.

Second: Every other male citizen not disqualified by the Second or Third Sections of this Article who at the time of his application for registration is the bona fide owner of real or personal property, or both, in an amount of not less than five hundred dollars, as assessed thereon on the tax books of the City of Baltimore or of one of the Counties of this State has been such owner and so assessed for two years next preceding his application for registration, and shall at the time of his application make affidavit before the officers of registration that he is the bona fide owner of the property so assessed to him and that he has been such owner for two years next preceding his application.

If any person other than those herein mentioned shall be or become legally entitled to be registered as a qualified voter in this State, then this section shall be null and void and the General Assembly shall possess the same powers as if this section had never been adopted and the laws of this State, including the local laws applicable to certain counties thereof, relating to the form of the ballot to be used at elections, in force on the first day of July in the year nineteen hundred and ten, shall revive or continue in force until altered by the next General Assembly notwithstanding any Act to the contrary which may have been passed while the term of this section shall be in force or while the General Assembly shall have believed or assumed the provisions of this section to be valid.

SECTION 3. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that the aforesaid section hereby proposed as an Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to the next General Election held in this State, submitted to the legal and qualified voters thereof for their adoption or rejection, in pursuance of the directions contained in Article 14 of the Constitution of this State, and at said General Election the vote on the said proposed Amendment to the Constitution shall be by ballot, and upon each ballot shall be printed the words, "For Constitutional Amendment" and "Against Constitutional Amendment," as the voter shall elect, and immediately after said election, due returns shall be made to the Governor of the vote for and against said proposed Amendment, as directed by said Fourteenth Article of the Constitution.

CHAPTER 318.

AN ACT to amend Section 4 of Article 3, title, "Legislative Department," of the Constitution of this State, and to provide for the submission of said Amendment to the qualified voters of this State for adoption or rejection.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, three-fifths of all the members of each of the two houses concurring, that the following section be and the same is hereby proposed as an Amendment to Section 4 of Article 3, title, "Legislative Department," of the Constitution of this State, and if adopted by the legal and qualified voters thereof as herein provided, said section shall supersede and stand in the place instead of Section 4 of said Article 3 of the Constitution of Maryland.

4. As soon as may be after the taking and publishing of the National Census of nineteen hundred and ten, or after the enumeration of the population of this State under the authority thereof, there shall be an apportionment of representation in the House of Delegates, to be made on the following basis, to wit:

Each of the several counties of the State having a population of eighteen thousand souls or less shall be entitled to two Delegates; and every county having a population of over eighteen thousand and less than twenty-eight thousand souls, shall be entitled to three Delegates; and every county having a population of twenty-eight thousand and less than forty thousand souls, shall be entitled to four Delegates; and every county having a population of forty thousand and less than fifty-five thousand souls, shall be entitled to five Delegates; and every county having a population of fifty-five thousand souls and upwards, shall be entitled to six Delegates and no more; and each of the four Legislative Districts of the City of Baltimore shall be entitled to one Delegate for each one-sixth of the population of the largest county in the State; provided, however, that the representation of Baltimore City in the House of Delegates shall never exceed one-third of the membership of the House of Delegates; and the General Assembly shall have the power to provide by law, from time to time, for altering and changing the boundaries of the existing legislative districts of the City of Baltimore, so as to make them as near as may be of equal population, but said districts shall always consist of contiguous territory.

SECTION 2. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid that the said foregoing section hereby proposed as an Amendment to the Constitution, shall at the next election for members of the General Assembly of this State, to be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in the month of November, nineteen hundred and eleven (1911), be submitted to the legal and qualified voters thereof, for their adoption or rejection, in pursuance of the directions contained in Article 14 of the Constitution of this State; and at the said election the vote on the said proposed Amendment to the Constitution shall be by ballot and upon each ballot shall be written or printed the words, "For the Constitutional Amendment" and "Against the Constitutional Amendment," as the voter shall elect, and immediately after said election, due returns shall be made to the Governor of the vote for and against said proposed Amendment, as directed by the said Article 14 of the Constitution.

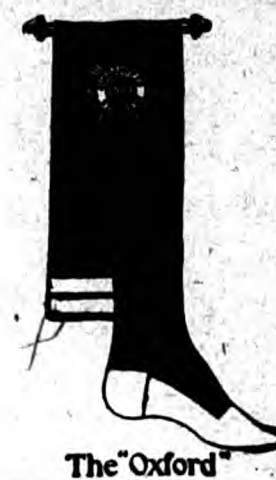
