## STC DELEGATES ATTEND HAGERSTOWN MEETING

On March 18, the Maryland Association of Junior Colleges met for the third annual meeting, in Hagerstown at the Hagerstown Junior College.

The very interesting program began with registration, followed by a general meeting of the entire conference.

The highlight of this meeting was an address by Mr. John Dale Russell, director of the Div. of Higher Education, U. S. Office of Education. A luncheon was served for the delegates after which the business meetings and sectional meetings were held.

The theme of the faculty discussion was "Toward General Education" with such group discussions as administrations, sciences, communications and humanities, and social sciences. The students, in their business meeting, held an election of officers for the next two years and voted on certain constitutional changes. (Each college is allotted two votes at this meeting, but any number of delegates may enter the discussions.) From the business meeting the students dispersed to various sectional meetings, sending a delegate to each group. The five topics for student discussion were, Effective Student Government, Improving the Maryland Association of Junior Colleges, Orientation of New Students, Student Leadership, Athletics and Social Program. In these groups, problems pertaining to the topic were brought up and discussed by the group. In this way colleges can benefit each other by exchanging ideas for the betterment of the schools and school system.

A very delightful tea and dance followed the meetings for the students and faculty members returned to their schools.

## Eastern Shore Music Festival

"In accordance with the philosophy that the activities of the State Teachers Colleges in each area should be closely coordinated with the public schools in their area," the Salisbury State Teachers College is sponsoring an Eastern Shore Music Festival, Saturday, May 6th.

"The purposes of the music festival are (1) to promote the idea that music has an important place in modern education, (2) to provide the opportunity for teachers and students to see what their associates and fellow students in other schools are doing, and (3) to provide a day for fun with music, with all its educational implications."

Each junior and senior high school in the nine Eastern Shore counties has been invited to be represented by any choral groups from their school. Each group will be asked to sing two songs of their own in addition to 'One World' by O'Hara, and 'The Orchestra Song' which will be sung by the mass chorus. Those who will participate are: Wicomico County — Hebron, Mardela, Pittsville and Wicomico High; from Dorchester County — Vienna, Cambridge Junior and Senior High Schools and East New Market; from Caroline County — Federalsburg, Preston, Freensboro and Caroline High; a group from Kent County schools; Crisfield from Somerset, and Snow Hill from Worcester.

Under the capable direction of Mrs. Jessie L. Fleming, director of music for the college, this Music Festival can play an important role in the project of the Principal's Association for the current year, "Developing a Better Program of Music Education in the State of Maryland."

## SGA At Work

The Men's Day Association, which has been unorganized this year, has upon the suggestion of the SGA drawn up a new constitution which will soon be presented before the Executive Board.

Following the recommendation of the SGA, pencil sharpeners have been installed in all classrooms.

## Know Your Executive Board

What influence does the Executive Board of the Student Government Association exercise in the scholastic and social life of the students here at Salisbury? This is a question that should be asked by every student before officers are elected to represent a class, an organization or the entire student body on the Executive Board. If you know the answer to this question you will then be better equipped to vote for the best candidates. This may seem a little far-fetched, but if you sit in on one of the Board meetings the third Tuesday of the month you will better understand the afore mentioned statement.

On these nights, the meeting is called to order by the S.G.A. President; the Secretary calls roll and reads the minutes of the last meeting; and then the Treasurer submits his report (all of these officers have been elected by a majority of student votes.) After these preliminaries, "old business" (for example, as an amendment that has been submitted to Dr. Blackwell) is discussed and voted upon. Then "new business" which may be a Bendix for the men's dormitory, or a candy machine for the girl's dormitory is discussed and voted upon (a plurality is needed for an item to be passed by the Executive Board). From here the issue is put before Dr. Blackwell and the faculty. If this group vetoes the measure it may come up again at a later date.

Some of the duties of the Executive Board taken from the revised Handbook are:

1. To elect a Court of Appeals.
2. To receive statements, problems, or suggestions submitted by any group, organization, or individual connected with the college.
3. To accept or reject any proposals or requests for presentation to the Student Government Association.
4. To enforce all decisions made by the Student Government Association.
5. To arrange for the administration of elections.

If at any time you have a personal gripe about existing rules in the constitution of the S.G.A., see room for improvements in the school or on the campus, or have ideas about a possible source of income for the S.G.A. treasury, we wish you to contact one of the members of the Executive Board, and through that person you will be represented at the following Board meeting.

For a more thorough understanding of how this Board functions all students are invited to sit in on any of the meetings.

## S. T. C. Opens Baseball Season Locals Drop Opener To Townson

Now that OldMan Winter has grudgingly withdrawn from these parts, the familiar sound of wood against horsehide is once again ringing around the hallowed walls of STC. With ten regulars back from last year's team and several bright prospects among the new faces, it is hoped that last year's record of five wins and four losses will be improved.

In the infield, Marion Parker at first base, Bill Waterfield at third base and Clarke Cugler at shortstop are all holdovers from last year's regular lineup. Evert Fuller has removed his catching paraphernalia and has moved over to second base, left vacant by Tom Sterling who will do all of his playing for Princess Anne Legionnaires. At present, Phil Slacum and Don Reed, both freshmen, seem to be the only infield substitutes available.

In the outfield, Lloyd Walstrum, Bob Fithian and Hicks Brinsfield give the Maggs men an all-veteran trio. Last year, Walstrum played left field; Fithian, center, and Brinsfield shared part time duty with Norm Moore in right. Dick Holden and some of the pitchers will probably fill in as substitutes in the outer gardens.

A pair of freshmen are the leading candidates for the catcher's mask and mitt. Herman (Bunky) Truitt seems to have the inside edge on the job with Lloyd Harrington also a contender. If these two fail to produce, Evert Fuller or Bob Fithian may be called on to go behind the bat.

Doug Bloodsworth and Bob Travers, who, between them, accounted for all of last year's victories, give Coach Maggs a strong nucleus around which to build his mound staff. Carey Selby and Nick Vitarelli, a couple of freshmen, figure to stick with the team as relief for Travers and Bloodsworth. Roy Esiason, who pitched a little last year may see some service before the season is out.

So the regular lineup as it appears now will be: Parker, 1b.; Fuller, 2b.; Waterfield, 3b.; Cugler, ss.; Walstrum, 1f.; Fithian, cf.; Brinsfield, rf.; Truitt, c; and Travers or Bloodsworth.

STC opened its season against Towson Teachers on April 11 at Memorial Field with a loss. The lack of practice by the locals and the ineffectiveness of pitcher Bloodsworth proved to be the Maggs men's downfall. Towson put together 4 walks, 4 hits, 3 hit batsmen and several errors to send 10 runs across in the first inning. Paced by second sacker, Bill Hottes, who had two home runs, the visitors continued to add to the score. The locals began to solve the Towson pitching in the late innings but the damage had been done. The final score was 21-10. Doug Bloodsworth was the losing pitcher. Bob Travers seemed to be the most effective of the STC hurlers until he was asked to leave the game by umpire Vic Keen. Selby and Vitarelli also saw action. The infield did most of the

hitting with Bill Waterfield collecting 3 hits to lead the team. The team showed its greatest weakness in the field where ten errors were committed.

FLASH! . . . April 19, Memorial Field. Bob Travers pitched seven-hit ball here today to hurl the STC nine to its first win of the season. The final score was 13-6. SPECIAL NOTE . . . Bob Fithian was behind the bat for the Maggs men. (More about this game in the next issue).

FOUL TIPS . . . No one has been selected as captain of the team yet. Cugler served in that capacity last year. Bob Fithian appears to be the team's handy man. He can pitch and play the outfield and now is fooling with the catcher's mitt . . . Cugler, Fithian, Fuller, Travers, Waterfield and Bloodsworth are all playing with various teams in the Central Shore League . . . Congratulations from this column to Clarke Cugler and Alice Fooks, who were selected as the best athletes at STC this year. Both were well deserving of the honor.

Glad to see Dick David, local athlete, back to school following his appendectomy. Here's hoping he can don a uniform before the season ends . . . oCach Maggs has not released his complete schedule yet.

## Track Meet

A hastily gathered group of STC men with little experience and not practice did their best to give the Towson track team some competition on April 11. However, the Towson boys took practically every track event which helped them overcome their deficit in the field events and they won 19 - 41. A second by Jack Payne in the two-mile, a third by Bill Adkins in the 220-yard dash, and a third by Ned Forsythe in the 100-yard dash gave STC five points in track with Towson taking 49 points.

However, paced by Warren Steere, (15 points), Curt McDowell, Paul Liedlich and Fred Baker STC took the visitors in the field events 36-18. Others who participated in the meet included Don Reed, Howard Cheek, Bruce Trott, Mits Sassajima, Alan Robinson and Bill Whaley. Mr. Focht was in charge of the squad for the day.

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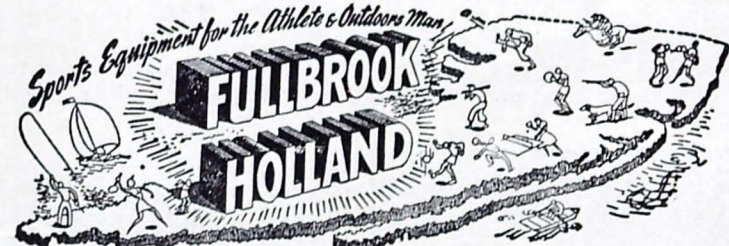

### May Queen

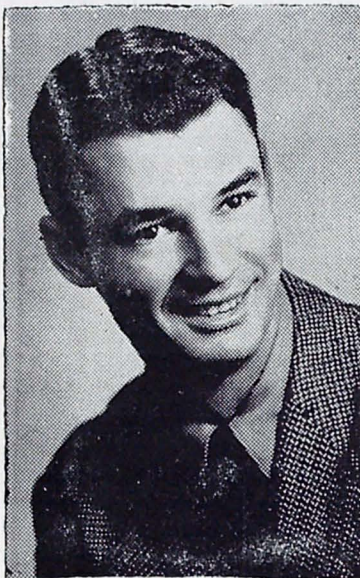

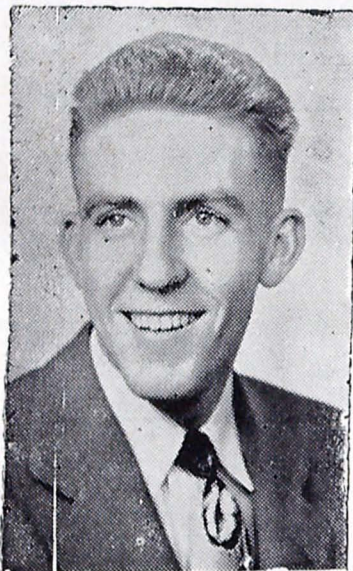

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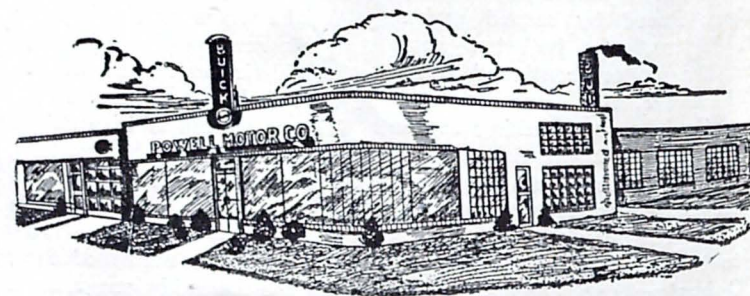
