THE CHAPELLE, ON.

THE extraordinary preparations, which for many days have been so much talk'd of at this place, for St. Lourdes, have caused in nothing more than a grand dinner, which the count de St. Severin the day gave, and that lasted four hours, at which not only the foreign ministers, but a great number of officers from the garrisons of Lillebourg and Maestricht, and particularly the regiment of Normandy, dined. Every body expected that the front of the house would have been finely illuminated, and that some pipes or wine and beer-heads of bear wood have been given to the populace; but as the people were disappointed, there was nothing of all this; for as for the illumination, it only consisted of about twenty tall candles, artificially enough fixed under the arch of the gate of entrance, which served to give light to the roads, and create peoples沉静, which was the unbroken calm of many that were there. As to the entertainment itself, it was intended, and served in a vast number of silver dishes, the follow'd and fine table of which excited the admiration of all that were present, there were moreover about 50 Swiss soldiers, which his excellency had caused to be brought, as well to carry the dishes, as to keep good order. The fest passed over very joyfully, and ended with a sort of ball, to which every body of fashion was well received. There only wanted one thing to render this great day illustrious and never to be forgotten, which was the publication of the peace, which of there was not to match by a single word spoken; and this last that it is not much better than the exorcism of the conquer'd places. There were some people however weak enough to lay wagers, that after dinner was over, all the plenipotentiaries would return to the town, in order to confer there for some small time, and that afterwards the voice would be establish'd upon the beating of kettle, drums and sounding of trumpets. The counts Bourg and St. Severin live here in the most perfect intimacy, and continue as heretofore to have secret and mysterious interviews and conversations with each other, and with the plenipotentiaries, and still this has nothing to do with the original cause of their meeting.

Paris, Apr. 16. According to letters from France, on the 10th instant, the decree which induced the Duke of Richelieu to concur in the release of the Austrian officers, who were prisoners of war in that city, at the request of General Necker, was the first result of granting the same license to the four legations of the republic, who have been so long confined at Milan, notwithstanding the pressing occasion they are under of returning home for the recovery of their health.

These letters add, that the correspondence between Italy and Lombardy remains still suspended. The ceremony of crowning the Doge has been performed, these wide days usual solemnity. The government of Milan fit to receive three regiments in its service, but in such a manner that all the private men have been incorporated into other battalions, which were very much weakened. The advice from Specchia, that the Austrians were by little and little quitting the dominions of the republic, and that the English general, who had retired during the troubles to Leghorn, was preparing to return to Genoa, where the public tranquility is now perfectly restored.

Two ordinances of the king have been lately published, relative to the reform of the troops, the first of which reduces to four companies the regiment of Royal Cantabrians, which consisted of six; the rest of that ordinance contains the same forces with respect to the officers and the soldiers, that was inserted in those formerly made publick.

The second reduces to twelve companies each, all the following regiments, &c. that of the Commissary general, Royal Poland, Dampierre, Penthièvre, Châtillon, Grammont, La Vieville, Marigny, La Rochechouart, Crillon, Tocque, Dampierre, and Belcarz de Seze.

The municipality, who has been ever since Monday last at Châlons, will return this evening to Versailles, and will be succeeded by the

Paris, Apr. 16. The reform of the troops begins to be put in execution, for tenmen of each company in the French and Swiss regiments of guards were dismissed yesterday; and two ordinances have been published, said the 11th instant, the one enjoining a battalion in each of the regiments of Lillebourg, Bourg, Segur, Royal Voluntaries, and La Couronne to be dism'd; and the other, said the same day, ordering that the light arm'd troops of the Guards, which consist together of 1500 men, should be reduced to 1200, of whom 800 are to be foot, and the rest as horse. The foreign regiments of Geichtry, of 1200 men, will also be reform'd, and 600 of them are to serve as foot, and the rest as horse. The Hussar corps of Fleischer will likewise be reduced to 300 men, of whom 200 are to be foot, and the rest horse.

Paris, Apr. 16. Notwithstanding it has been said in the public papers, that the Justices of the several counties had reported to the privy council, that the attempt through the horrid battle had entirely failed, we have to inform our readers, by a letter from Baron upon Tress, that the plenipot. has broken out afresh, and wages with as much violence as ever.

LONDON. We hear that within the building a new picture of St. James is drawn, and will be presented to his majesty for his approbation, when he returns to England.

We hear that the crew of 75 men of war will not be paid, and will pay, as all charged, but receive part of payment, in order to keep them in His majesty's service.

They write from Venice, that a Quattron of three weeks has been suspended, resulting from the Lenten occasions, when they are gone from a numerous

number of days, and are now returned to their former stations.

ral other places. The same letters say, that they have an account from Constantinople of the deposition of several great ministers, and that the fermentation among the populace still continues.

Sept. 13. They write from Paris, that several Goldsmiths and Jewellers are employ'd by the court in making up a great variety of rich curiosities, which are to be disposed of in presents at the ensuing marriage of a daughter of France with the prince of Piedmont, and on the arrival here of her sister from Spain in her way to Italy. These letters likewise say, that King Ferdinand is much indispos'd since his return to Lissabon, whether the queen has sent two of her physicians to attend him. The authors of some lampoons, that have been spread upon a very numerous ecclesiastical promotion which his most christian majesty has lately made, have been imprison'd and it is thought will be very severely punish'd. So dangerous a thing is it to have *saints* in a country govern'd by *will*.

The great business of setting at liberty the Dutch prisoners of war in France, is said to be entirely adjust'd, and that they have receiv'd notice to hold themselves in readiness to march at a day's warning. The Abbe de la Ville will return to the Hague, in order to resume the functions of his ministry about the beginning of October, when it is said that a new Dutch ambassador is expected at Paris. The royal lottery lately open'd there goes on but slowly, molt people that have money, chusing rather to employ it in trade, as that begins to become very brisk on the prospect of the approaching peace, and the great demand for French manufactures in different parts of Europe.

They write from Liege, that all the light-arm'd troops of France, in that neighbourhood, are in full march for Avenues, between the Sambre and the Meuse, where they are to be review'd by the inspector-general, and reform'd, pursuant to the instructions that he has already receiv'd from the French court. It is believ'd, that a great part of them will be pick'd up by the German officers that are recruiting in those parts for different powers, and those that do not enter into foreign service are to have passports and money given them, in order to return to the places of their former abode.

Several merchants at Amsterdam have receiv'd advice, that the new company form'd at Venice, for promoting the trade of the north, have resolv'd to prosecute that scheme with the utmost vigour; and that, besides a large ship freighted for Peterburgh, which has already rais'd the found, they are actually equipping four others, that will speedily sail for Hambourg, Danzick, Copenhagen, and Stockholm, with all sorts of rich commodities and manufactures from Naples, Florence, Leghorn, and other parts of Italy, and large quantities of goods from the Levant. Our letters from the Hague, by the last mail, are not so favourable as formerly, with respect to the speedy signing of the peace, but, on the contrary, suggest that as a resolution has been taken to leave nothing to be adjust'd in a future congress, this will necessarily occasion a considerable delay in discussing a great variety of important points, that were not formerly judged requisite to be adjust'd by the definitive treaty. These writers likewise say, that it is thought not a little strange there, to see so many magistrates from different courts residing at Aix-la-Chapelle, while at present there is no talk of a minister plenipotentiary from that of Berlin, and they likewise observe, that the inhabitants from Vienna say, that the count de Podewils is gone to meet his master in Silesia, and that the departure of Auguste Charlotte, for Berlin, is a thing as yet not absolutely settled.

On Friday last a man, for a trifling wager, undertook to ride a quart of a mile, as an Alshouse in Puckthorpe in Northamptonshire, in a quarter of a mile; he dash'd his without seeming to be affect'd with it, but whilst he was drinking the leaven, he fell down, was taken speechless, and continued so till five o'clock the next afternoon, and then died, leaving a wife and children behind him.

A few days since the following aff. of barbarity was committed in St. George's-hall: A young woman, servant to Mr. Hollis, a hop-merchant in Tonley-street, having had leave from her mistress to go and see some friends in Holbown, in her return home was met by three scoundrels, about nine in the evening, who ravished her; and one of them propos'd ransoming her to prevent discovery, which however was taken by the other two, dispossess'd from her, but, in return, remov'd the most indecent and unclean of indecencies. This unfortunate young woman lay in this condition above an hour before she was discover'd, when she was carried home, and the next day sent to St. Thomas's Hospital, where she died of her wounds. Before

she gave the above account on oath. Two of the above villains are taken up, and committed to the new jail; and the third, who is a clerk to a brewer, is since absconded; but it is hoped that he will be taken, and brought to condign punishment.

On Saturday night last, just before eight o'clock, as Mr. Fletcher, jun. a vinegar-merchant in Goodman's-fields, was coming up the road to Whitechapel, he was knock'd near th' mount by three fellows dress'd like sailors, who knock'd him down, beat and wound him in a very barbarous manner, and rob'd him of his gold watch and a sum of money.

Yesterday a fellow went into the road and threw an Millbank, Westminster, and stolc wet linen out of the garden; he was immediately pursued, taken, and carried to a coffee house in bridges-street, where he endeavour'd to escape by jumping out of a window; but he was again re-taken, and carried before Thomas Ellis, Esq; and committed to the Gaol-house. He prov'd to be one Cartwright, a stone lawyer.

Extract of a Letter from Brofles.

I take this opportunity of sending you a melancholy account of the mischiefs done here by the locusts, which has been carefully collected, and upon the truth of which in every respect you may very safely depend.

On the 20th of August an incredible multitude arrived at Lampersdorff, in the Bernthaus; there they formed in a column, and taking flight about noon, continued their passage for four hours over the forest of Minchen. These insects having pass'd the Oder, settled about the country of Ohlau; and after eating up every thing that was to be found at Röthland and Beckeren, they continued their passage again to Leisch.

On the 23d another swarm of these devouring creatures came from Patzschkan to Ober Schrebenhof, where they fell upon two gardens, and ruin'd every thing that was in them. As they were a little straitened in their quarters, they lay one upon another in heaps, to the height of one's knee; and being driven from thence, they eat up all the grafts in the meadows, and even all the rushes and reeds about the village of Deutsch Jackel: And from thence they continued their flight to Hoben Giersdorf, where they destroy'd several fields of buck wheat. As yet we have no farther account of the excursions of this body.

A third prodigious swarm pass'd in the evening of the 22d by Zinckel. On the 23d they fell about Losdorff; on the 24th they pass'd by Schonbrun, Prien, and Sickenhause, and at length took up their quarters in the village of Datendorf, where they lay one upon another a full quarter of a yard high, taking up a quarter of a league in length, and about half that space in breadth. All the fruits of the earth that are not got in, as well as the grafts, reeds, and in short every green thing, is totally devor'd. They tried at first to drive them away with poles, but to no purpose. At length somebody very luckily thought of heating a drum, upon which they immediately took flight, but settled soon after upon the trees in the forest, from whence they were driven by the same means.

They made their retreat by Münsterberg, and then pass'd thro' the county of Glatz into Bohemia, where they had committed dreadful devastations on the lands of count Wallis. These insects are about the length of one's finger, and of all colours, grey, green, yellow, black, red and brown. Some people pretend to lay, that each of these birds has a captain of a molt enormous size; this is certain, that they leave behind them an intolerable stench. Some of the inhabitants of the county have observed, that they make holes in dry earth, about the depth of one's finger, where they lay their eggs, which the peasants are endeavouring to destroy, by double plowing their land.

It is very remarkable, that the same evening they quitt'd Lampersdorff, three great swarms of winged ants pass'd by the same place, as if they had been in pursuit of them. Some people were foolish enough to endeavour to stop them, but as this drew the whole swarm upon them, they were quickly weary of that sort of diversion.

There is an account that Signor Capello, ambassador from the republic of Venice, with his lady, returning home through Switzerland, was attack'd by near 300 Swiss soldiers, who were desirous from the French army, and ridded of their effects. No hurt was done to their persons, but it is reported his excellency's servants, as they had made some resistance, were kill'd, not having been heard of.

There is advice from Antwerp, that there is great plenty of French goods at that and other islands; that the inhabitants of Marocco are in a starving condition, and that their East India ships have failed for France.

St. JOHN's, Antigua, September 23.

On yesterday arrived his majesty's ship *Centaur*, commanded by Capt. Tyrrell, from a short cruise, having taken, on the 8th instant, to the Northward of Scamberg, a Spanish ship of about 200 tons, bound from the Havanna to St. Thomas, and sent her into St. Kitts. Her loading consists of Indigo, Logwood, Fustick, Tobacco, can'd Hides, and some Tortoise-shell, with about 2000 dollars, which were concealed in a barrel-barrel. This, it is supposed, is one of the last prizes taken this war in the West-Indies; and that by a commander, remarkable for his good conduct and great success in taking the ships of the enemy, during the whole war.

Capt. Elmore, who sailed from this place about six weeks ago, bound to Maryland, was taken a few days after, and recaptured into Porto Rico.

ANNAPOLIS, Sept. 23.

Last Thursday-Night and Friday Morning we had a violent Westerly Wind (which succeeded a great Rain), that has done considerable Damage, especially in the Country, having blown down many Houses, and kill'd several Negroes. In Town it blew off the Roof of a large new Unfinished House, and did other Damage.

We hear from Cecil County, that a malignant Kind of Small-Pox, and Plague, are very rife there, and many die great Numbers.

Paris, Sept. 6. It is reported that marshal Saxe has demanded 35000 men of the king, for an important expedition; which, it is said, will not interest the powers that were heretofore at war.

Vienna, Sept. 7. It is assured that the king of Great Britain has caused representations to be made to this court, tending to engage it to desist from some pretensions, which it laid hinder the signing of the definitive treaty. It is not known what answer the empress queen has given thereto; but every body is persuaded, that her Imperial majesty is well disposed to contribute all she can to accelerate the general pacification.

Chamberry, Sept. 15. The infant Don Philip is making preparations for his departure. Two days after that prince left the castle of Rocketts, it was reduced to ashes by lightning. 'Tis reported that the marriage of the king of Sardinia with the duchess dowager of Guastalla, will soon be accomplished without any ceremony; and that of the duke of Savoy with madam Victoire of France, will be deferred 'till after the peace.

Paris, Sept. 30. According to letters from Genoa, dated the 17th, it appears, that the Piedmontese and Austrians begin to draw off from the frontiers of that state: But the latter, as they retire, redouble their vexations at Parma, Placentia, and Guastalla, for the payment of the exorbitant contributions they have demanded there; which is look'd upon as a sign, that they are soon entirely to quit the country.

According to some late letters from Leghorn, the Genoese mountaineers lately fell upon a party of the French, their professed friends, and had entirely destroyed them all, if a body of Imperial Croats had not flew to the succour of the latter, and fell upon the Highlanders, putting many to the sword, and taking abundance of prisoners.

The last letters from Constantinople inform us, that three foreign powers began in the month of April last, to intrigue in the seraglio and the divan, in order to force the grand seignior to take part with them against the House of Austria and Russia; but having found his highness immovable in the principles he had hitherto acted upon, they spited up the different insurrections which appeared in the months of June and July, the object of which was to dethrone the grand seignior, and place upon the throne one of the sons of his brother.

The Spaniards have already embarked 1400 of their invalids for Barcelona whither it is pretended the rest of their troops will follow successively: except the corps destined to accompany the infant Don Philip into Lombardy.

Warsaw, Sept. 18. Letters from Podolia say, that they have received advice from Constantinople of a great revolution in that capital, on occasion of which the Grand Seignior had been deposed, and his nephew set up in his room. They add, that the Tartars disliking the Cham which the Porte had appointed them, openly refused to acknowledge him, and had elected another among themselves.

Paris, Sept. 27. The young pretender has hired the hotel of St. Paul, on the Théatins key, and will remove into it the first of October; from whence we conjecture, that the British court does not insist upon his being sent out of this kingdom, or else that his majesty has refused to gratify them in this point. It is currently reported, that the king has bought up several English men of war, and is desirous to take into his service all the English seamen that are discharged.

Madrid, Sept. 27. The departure of madam of France, consort to the infant Don Philip, is fixed for the beginning of October.

We have the disagreeable news from Barcelona, that several transports which were bringing out from the island of Majorca, part of the regiment of Ireland have had the misfortune to be taken by three large Barbary pirates. There were on board these transports twenty officers and one hundred soldiers, with their wives and children. The passage between Majorca and Barcelona being so short, the government neglected to order a man of war or frigate to convoy these transports.

Crazeu, Augst. 30. Public prayers have been put up in all the public churches of this diocese, to beg of heaven a deliverance from the dreadful plague of locusts; and many of our people, both rich and poor, are already vowed that they will go in pilgrimage to our lady of Loretto, and St. James of Compostella, if nothing else will rid us of those insects; nay, we are making intercessions with the whole host of Heaven, both ancient and modern saints, being resolved not to lose our suit for want of mediators and intercessors. We hear from Zamora, that a great swarm of those insects having approached that town, they set all the bells a ringing, and made a great noise in all the adjacent fields with frying-pans, salt-boxes,

butter-tubs, and firing pistols, &c., by which means they soon frightened them away: But soon after a larger swarm appearing, the same method was tried in vain; the locusts divided into two bands, one of which continued their flight towards Vilencie; but the other despising the noise, would not stir, 'till they had laid some fields quite bare; and the next morning they followed the first division. This second swarm has been followed by a third much more numerous, having taken up above three hours in flying by the town.

L O N D O N

Sep. 7. The Saltee rovers, and indeed most of the galleys belonging to the pyratical states in Barbary, have taken advantage of the decline of the French marine, to make prizes upon their coasts of Spanish and Italian vessels, two of which they were lately so hardy as to cut out of the road of St. Tropez; upon which two frigates are fitting out at Marseilles, which are to cruise upon those coasts, in order to oblige the corsairs to keep their distance, in pursuance of treaties, by which they stipulate not to come within ten leagues of the shore. It is whisper'd at Marseilles, that as soon as the peace is concluded, satisfaction will be demanded for those insults.

The conduct of the prince stadholder at Amsterdam has been so equal and judicious, that neither party have had the least cause to complain, his highness having entered that city without guards, to shew his confidence in the good affections of the burghers; and having obliged them, during the time their dispute with the magistrates was in hearing, to pay them all the respects due to their quality and offices, which gave them the highest satisfaction: Nor were there any changes made in the regency, 'till each of the members had made a free resignation, and declared himself willing to submit to any regulation that his serene highness in his great wisdom should be pleased to make, pursuant to the full powers granted him for that purpose, by their noble mightiness the states of Holland and West Friesland.

Sep. 8. It is generally expected, that in the ensuing session of parliament, a very strict enquiry will be made into the conduct of the governors of some of our colonies, in order to discover the true source of that spirit of dissatisfaction and disaffection, with which they have been disturbed of late years, to the no small detriment of the affairs of their mother country, as well as their own. Such an enquiry will probably correct all past mistakes; or at least produce a law, prescribing such rules as may prevent them for the future; and thereby hinder English planters from removing to Surinam, or any of the French islands.

Several grave politicians think, that our ministers are too forward in lessening our strength both by sea and land; but as to the return of the Russians, it is as much owing to the representations of the king of Prussia, as to those of his most Christian majesty; the former having declared, that if the French attempt to draw any advantage from this step, he will immediately join the Allies with double the number of his own troops. And this is the true reason why the Prussians are every where in motion.

We learn from Stockholm, that the health of his Swedish majesty continuing still in a state of great uncertainty and fluctuation, the commission has been renewed, which enables three senators, who are in constant attendance, to sign all papers of state in his majesty's name, which are likewise countersigned by the secretary.

Letters from Paris, of the 15th instant, N. S. assure us, that the marriage of the prince of Piedmont with the French king's third daughter, will be shortly declared at court; and that whatever becomes of the definitive general treaty, they depend upon a peace with the court of Paris.

They write from Bruges, that troops daily pass through that city, all taking the route of Dunkirk, Calais.

An Extract of a Letter from Stockport, in Cheshire, dated

"On the 23d of July we had here a most prodigious storm of thunder and lightning, with the most violent rain ever seen, occasioned by a cloud bursting, which in two hours time raised our river fifteen or twenty yards perpendicular, which has done incredible damage, at least to 1000, by which several families are ruin'd: It has destroyed almost all the corn on the river, from Waley bridge for several miles downwards; and not only ruined the corn and grain, but the land for ever. Several people lost their lives; several houses, out-houses, mills, and other buildings, were taken down: Abundance of fine timber was carried down the river, hay, and a great many sheep. Two women who were washers were drowned in a little rivulet, in which ordinarily there does not run more water than would drown

drown a kitten. At Headfield, a parish church about four miles above us, it washed the church-yard bare to the rock, and took several people out of their graves; so there were found next day hung in bushes and trees a corpse in one place, a coffin in another, & strewed in another. It has took down several houses, county, and other bridges, with all the walls and fences, for miles, and made a dismal desolation. We have had very bad harvest weather hitherto, by which a deal of corn is damaged; but now we have good weather."

BOSTON, November 28.

We hear from Annapolis-Royal, that on the 28th past, capt. Gorham, with 10 men and paddles, went to the east of the harbour in St. John's river, and capt. Prebble and capt. Davis, commander of the Warren, with 5 oars-men, went to the westward of the harbour, to make discoveries; and going ashore, were fired upon by the Indians, and one of capt. Prebble's men shot thro' the body, who died three days after; two of capt. Gorham's men were also kill'd, and three wounded. Capt. Prebble also narrowly escaped with his life; for seeing one of the Indians presenting his gun at him, at about 80 yards distance, he step'd behind a small tree, in the center of which the ball lodg'd direct; against his body. He immediately return'd the fire with a brace of balls, as did capt. Davis, which he hopes did execution. After which they retreated safely to the boat, and returned to the vessels. They took two of the enemy, and brought them with them; one of whom is said to be son to one of the chiefs, who afterwards made his escape.

ANNAPOLIS.

Ezekiel Giller, one of the Gentlemen in the Commission of the Peace for this County, in which Capacity, as well as that of a Husband, Father, Master, Friend, and Neighbour, he acted as became a Christian.

We have had a very severe Spell of cold Weather for almost a Fortnight past, which has quite froze up all our Rivers, and fill'd the Bay to full of Ice, that the like has not been seen since the hard Winter eight Years ago.

An Extract of a private Letter from the HAGUE, dated September 13. "It grows more and more impudent, as the time seems to draw nearer, to see the French evacuate our fortresses. It looks as if they would not very soon have an opportunity of coming by them at so cheap a rate; a resolution being taken to keep the troops of the republic always complete, and to use our utmost endeavour, to draw the most experienced officers from all parts into their service. We are very solicitous to know in what manner our barrier is to be settled, which is a point of the highest consequence to the state. In all probability it will be to the full as strong, tho' not so extensive as before, and that care will be taken to secure such a distance to each fortress, as that the revenue arising from it may delay the charge of the garrison; at all events, we shall not charge ourselves as before, with the joint jurisdiction over, or defence of places.

The commissioners in Friesland find themselves a good deal embarrassed, the populace being extremely irritated against their superiors; some of their deputies appearing before the commissioners, and being check'd for proceeding in so rough a manner with their governors; one of them made answer, 'My Lords, granting it to be as you say, tho' upon examination you will find it to be otherwise, we have only treated them for a few weeks as they have treated us for many years; that is, without justice, beauty, or humanity.' The middle sort of people however are more tractable; and provided they are not reduced again under the dominion of their former lords, they seem ready enough to submit to whatever can be reasonably imposed upon them; so that we hope all disputes there will be very quickly composed.

It is beyond all doubt, that after the peace is made, and all things settled here, a calm and impartial enquiry will be made into the management of civil and military affairs, for several years past, in order to discover how the republic came to be loaded with such immense debts, while our fortresses were suffered to run to ruin, our troops were incoherent, and our naval power dwindled quite away; and all this at a time when the private funds of the republic were excessively rich, and more especially those who were concern'd in the great farms, or had the direction in any part of the finances. Some lay that his serene highness, as prince regent, will soon after his return from Amsterdam make a tour to Leeuwarden; so that his journey to Great Britain to be laid aside.

Vienna, September 1. Her Imperial majesty has ratified the sentence pronounced against Baron Treheit, by which he is condemn'd to pay 15,000 florins to the inhabitants of the duchy of Silesia; and all the costs of this tedious and expensive suit, which sommoy will amount to 100,000 florins; besides which he is to forfeit all his honour, and be imprison'd for life, with an allowance of only a ducat per day. The short history of this extraordinary person, who has made so much noise in the world, is this: He is a native of Silesia, and descended from a noble family, to which he has been no great honour. At the age of sixteen he was obliged to leave his country for a murder, and some other little crimes of that sort; upon which he went first into the Polish, and then into the Russian service; where by an impudent course, he raised himself to the rank of a major, which however did not hinder count Lowenstein from casting him to an account for some execrable acts he had committed, and for which he was sentenced to be cashier'd; and that too thro' favour; for if justice had then taken place he had lost his life. When he return'd into Silesia, he put himself in the head of a small body of men, & despatched himself, and with them did a great deal of mischief. Upon the breaking out of the war, he obtained a pension, and entered into a hereditary-majesty's service, in which, to do him justice, he behaved with much valour, and got his just rewards as sensible officers did in every

bravery; but after pillaging without mercy in Silesia, Moravia, Bohemia, and Bavaria, he thought himself at liberty to treat the subjects of his sovereign as he treated her enemies, and committed such a variety of violences as brought complaints from all quarters; so that nothing but her majesty's clemency could have entitl'd him to so mild a sentence as that which he has received. He is said to have amass'd, by these means, a fortune of better than two millions.

However, Sept. 6. His chevalier Offorio, minister from the king of Sardinia, has just received an express from his court, with orders to set out forthwith for Aix la Chapelle; and will be at the pacific conference, in quality of his master plenipotentiary. It is thought his excellency will set out next week, and we hope no far her delays will be thrown in the way, upon presence of waiting for instructions.

Brussels, Sept. 8. The government has received orders from court to reform the new battalions rais'd last year, which have not serv'd this campaign; but no term is fixed in the ordinance published for this reform.

Ouden, Sept. 8. The vessels that were built last year at Rupelmonde, have been sold to a Dutch merchant for 100,000 livres, together with a great quantity of timber, and other materials for ship building.

Ratis, Sept. 6. They have made out at the war-office a list of the regiments that are to be disbanded, pursuant to the convention of the 2d of August, within a month after we shall have received the news of the Russian troops being march'd back to their own country. Hitherto the court has not received any private advices of their returning home, nor have the powers, with whom that convention was concinced, notified to form the return of those troops.

The plan of the definitive treaty, as drawn up at Aix la Chapelle, by our minister and those of the Maritime powers, has been communicated to the duke de Huicar, the Spanish ambassador, who has sent it by an express to Madrid, and we are in great hopes that it will meet with his most Catholic majesty's approbation.

We are assured that the king will visit the frontier of his dominions next spring; which we are not backward to believe,

because if the war continues, he will make the campaign annual;

and if a peace be concluded, 'tis probable he will divert himself during the fine season.

Paris, Sept. 14. An ordinance of the king has been publish'd concerning the militia; and as his majesty is resolv'd to send them back immediately into their respective provinces, and is desirous that this corps, which has render'd him important services, as well in the field, as in garrison, should be kept up. This ordinance contains the several regulations, which are to be observ'd for that purpose, in regard to the manner of their return, the advantages they are to receive in their respective professions, and several rights and privilege, which his majesty has been pleas'd to grant them.

As the court has received the news of the entire evacuation of the duchies of Parma, Placentia, and Guastalla, and of the infant Don Philip's having left the army, in order to go and take possession of those dominions, the king has thought fit to name a part of the lords and ladies who are to go and receive the salute upon our borders, and who are also to accompany that prince into his own dominions.

We are assured that in consequence of this evacuation, the summons given out for the reduction of the towns of Macerata and Bergam on Adige; and as the other reductions will be quickly made, the necessary directions have been also given for evacuating the Austrian Low Countries. The conclusion and signing of the definitive treaty is look'd upon as a thing sufficiently settled; so our old to-morrow is not only a vulgar saying, but a true one.

Pacy write from Provence, that the marshal duc de Bellegarde will not leave that country, 'till towards the end of next month or the last of January, in which time he will be in France.

month, and that the army under his command will not leave, 'till the infant don Philip is quietly seated in his new territories.

Naples, Sept. 13. A few days since the king's gallies sail'd on the coast of Sicily, a flotilla private boat which had greatly infested those coasts. Last week the squadron of Maltese gallies anchor'd a second time at Gaeta, and two of them were dispatch'd to Baia, to take on board an hundred criminals, condemn'd to the galley for life, of whom the king has made a present to the grand master of Malta.

Hamburg, Aug. 31. There has been an edict published in Sweden, prohibiting afresh the use of either gold or silver in payment, and enjoining that all Swedish subjects, tho' in foreign countries, be obliged to observe the same ordinance, both with regard to their own persons, and the liberties of their servants.

Aix de Chapelle, Sept. 12. The ministers plenipotentiary continue to have private conferences; but it seems as if nothing definitive would be done 'till the return of the plenipotentiaries of the States General, and the arrival of the count d'Orsier, the Stanian plenipotentiary. Expresses are also still expected from Vienna and Madrid. As there are many points to settle, and the treaties of Westphalia, Breda, Nimeguen, Ryswick, Utrecht, and the quadruple alliance, must be consulted, on the basis of the new treaty, a great deal of time must be spent before all matters are adjusted.

Vienna, Sept. 4. Mr. Keith, whom his Britannic majesty has appointed to succeed sir Thomas Robinson, arrived here from Hanover the 1st instant. Two grand conferences have been held at court, wherein the plan of a new barrier for the republic of the United Provinces was deliberated upon. According to which, it will be formed of the town of Dendermonde, the citadel of Antwerp, of Mechlin, and of the territory which extends from that place along the Dyle, the Leek, and the Old Damer, as far as Maastricht, terminating at the Maeze. In this case, Aarden, Sichem, and Diest, will be forsaken.

Amsterdam, Sept. 4. When the deputies of the merchants and the honour of an audience of the prince stadholder, the chief of the delegation made a very fine speech, testifying their good and affection for his person, and for his royal consort, and all his illustrious family; and recommending to his care and attention the interest of their colonies, the protection of their navigation, and the encouragement of their manufactures, &c.

His serene highness answer'd them with that natural ability and eloquence which charm every body. After having thanked the merchants for the honour they did him (enclosing himself in that gracious manner), he assured them of his inclination and continual attention towards every thing that might tend to advance commerce, which he looked upon as the life and soul of the prosperity of their city, &c. The many important affairs which had required the presence of the stadholder in his city having been happily determined, his serene highness set out this day for the Hague, attended with the acclamations and benedictions of the inhabitants, the air resounding with expressions of sincere acknowledgement. The streets through which his serene highness pass'd were lined with a noble row of burghers under arms, having their captains and other officers at their head; and the prince's coach was preceded by two deputies of each of the six companies of burghers, who march'd four and four abreast.

Wilno, Sept. 7. Advices from Lithuania import, that six miles from the city of Wilna, there have appeared several large swarms of locusts, which have devoured every thing that they found in the fields, and that so large a quantity of them pass'd over the town of Minisk, that during five days together, they appeared like a thick cloud over that city; and it is added, that they have eaten up all the corn and grass as far as Mohilow, and the Drisper, so that the inhabitants are reduced to great want.

Milan, Sept. 9. There is a talk here of an exchange being made between the emperors queen, and the king of pardim, whereby the city of Pavia, and its territory, will be yielded to that prince for the northern part of the Monach, and the piece of land which extends along the left side of the Tag Major and the Taffo. The notion of this exchange is confirmed by the great quantity of ammunition and military implements, which have lately been transported from Pavia to the castle of Main.

Paris, Sept. 16. They write from Madrid, that Alberich has settled a plan for the reform of his troops, but it will not be put in execution 'till the peace is signed; and that the forces which are in Italy will soon return into the kingdom of Spain, they are supposed to be at present in motion, and are to return

from Italy by the way of Languedoc and Rouillon, and from thence into Catalonia.

Petersburg, Sept. 5. It is said the duke de Byron, late duke of Connaught, and his lady, will be set at liberty, and reinstated in his former dignity. Our men of war that were in the Baltic, are ordered to be laid up at Cronstadt.

Genua, Sept. 26. We have been advised from Corsica, that the person called Matra, head of the rebels, having failed in his enterprise against the town of Palodella, had been abandoned by the greater part of his people, and was driven into the Pieve of Valeria, without any appearance of rallying his party; so that it was hoped that the rebellion in Corsica, every day losing strength, would soon be entirely suppressed.

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L O N D O N

Sept. 15. The great business of setting at liberty the Dutch prisoners of war in France, is said to be entirely adjusted, and that they have received notice to hold themselves in readiness to march at a day's warning. The Abbe de la Ville will return to the Hague, in order to resume the functions of his ministry, about the beginning of October, when it is said that a new Dutch ambassador is expected at Paris.

There is certain advice from Santa Cruz, that the plague in the empire of Barbary, hath for some time raged to such a violent degree, that thousands have died thereof.

Sept. 17. The Genoese have sent a minister to the court of Turin, in order to recover the favour and friendship of his Savoyan majesty; and 'tis believed they will send a person of great distinction to the court of Vienna, in quality of ambassador extraordinary to her Imperial majesty, for the like purpose, as soon as the peace shall be concluded.

Sept. 22. Letters from the Low Countries take notice, that the generals of the Allies and the French have entered into concert with each other, upon exterminating several bands of thieves and vagabonds, defectors from both armies, which infect the intersecting countries.

They write from Vienna, that on the 8th instant, N. S. in the evening, her Imperial majesty was delivered of a prince, which died soon after it was baptiz'd.

The master of a Swedish ship arrived at Leghorn from Algiers, reports, that four Portuguese ships, laden with sugar, &c. were carried into that place by their corsairs, and that the crews consisted of 100 men.

Yesterday the board of ordnance order'd 14 new pieces of cannon to be sent to Langoust fort, near Maastricht, which has been repaired for that purpose. They write from the Hague, that it is hoped the new power granted to the stadholder, for charging the magistrates in the several towns of the provinces of Holland, will have all the good effects which were hoped for from them; and that the public tranquillity, being once restored, proper measures will be taken to remove any errors that may have crept into the government, and redressing any grievances that may have happened in it's administration.

We hear that the right honourable the earl of Holderness will go ambassador to the States General.

A new man of war of 60 guns, is to be launched this day at Deptford, and is ordered to be immediately rigged, victualled, and manned for sea service.

Sept. 26. Yesterday at noon a waggon, very heavily laden with chins and bars of money, came to the bank from Deal, guarded by a company of marines, for the use of the merchants of this city. The money came in the shape of a man of war from Lisbon.

The Merlin fleet of war is order'd to be fitted out, and dispatched with fresh orders to the governor of Cape Breton. We are assured that an embassy arrived at London, with the consent of a plan for a general pacification, & was intituled to some of the new papers in but that there was an account given to a foreign minister, to-morrah Thursday, was the day appointed for the signing the treaty of peace.

They write from Naples, that orders have been received there, for furnishing hay for the horses of the cavalry, during the winter season, that cold & severe it is going to be; and that the condition of that country is bad.

They write from Madrid, that subjects from different parts of the empire continue to affirm, that the subject of the emperor's

emperor's journey into Bohemia is the execution of an arrangement by which the signing of King will be transferred to his Imperial nephew, leaving him without the last prejudice to the dispositions established by the Pragmatic Sanction.

Letters from Palermo mention a frightful sea-monster, which had been discovered floating near the coast, so large that six men, pair of oars, had been employed to draw it upon land.

I have been able to do a good deal of work at
the "Greenwich Journal," Greenwich November 22, 1862, regular 25c.
and have written up a new one, enough to do two or three
or four, but not a lot more. To the editor, and blow off now?
Offering in your last Paper the history of the Battle of the English
and Spanish Armies, which I engaged, off the Hispaniola,
(which is pretty full) and that you will publish it, as an
exact account of that Action to give the Public; In order
to supply that difficulty in your next, I leave you the
following.

Arrived Kinsale with the ships, viz. (the Cornwall, Tilbury, Canterbury, Stratford, and Oxford), having been cruising for that time between the Taurig's head and Cape Caravon, in order to intercept the pirates; and that coming from La Vega, hove to the bayhorse, was joined on the 28th of September, at night, by the Warwick (whom when we first chased her, we took, had, and took nine of them); and on the 30th about noon the London and the convoy join'd us. Capt. Holmes informed the admiral of his being chased the day before by eight fall of Spanish men of war (though the bye they proved but seven), who took one of his crew, and might easily have taken him and all the rest, had they not been poitroons: Upon this intelligence, the admiral made a signal directly for all captains; and informing them, I suppose, of the news, we were ordered to get all our ships clear, and prepare for battle.

In the evening the admiral crowded over for the Captain shore, and by day-light next morning fell in with them; a signal flag was made for the line of battle, which we dressed very expeditiously, and then jacked and stood after them.

The dogs at first bore down upon us; but after shaking us plain, ran away as fast as they could; but we tracked after them with all the skill we could; so lucky it was for old Lenox she met with us, or she and all her convoy would have been gone). By noon our headmost shins got sore by now, and within random shot of the enemy, but we were obliged to stop for our sternmost to come up; and when this fell along calm, and proved but little wind the rest of the afternoon.

At three o' clock, or thereabouts, the Spanish vice-admiral hoisted a Spanish flag at his main top mast head, and began to engage the *Stratford* and *Tisbury*, so did the two ships ahead of him (one of which was a rear-admiral); but our admiral thinking us too far off (as indeed we were, for both our shot and theirs fell short), made the signal to come on a closer engagement, and bore down upon them; and held at bay himself, without firing a gun; till all the *Seymour*, Spanish ships kept pelting at him. When he got near and began, the *Cornwall* look'd like H—l, for she vomited nothing but fire and smoke: In about an hour and a half she beat the vice-admiral out of the line, and set him a-trembling; but the *Stratford* and she had made one of the ships strike to them before (this prize we have taken), but like a rascal, he hoisted his colours again, because no boat went on board him.

Next the admiral followed the Lenox, then the Warwick and Canterbury, agreeable to the line, who took up the figure of hips as they came up with them : The Oxford the admiral turned out of the line, and sent her to assist the Tilbury & suppose, because he saw the Spanish admiral turn that dog Garriacoches, who has done so much mischief out of their line : tho' he fired at the Stratford, and Cornwall too, but ran away like a thief when his admiral ran, as indeed they all did but what vexed me most, was to see that rogue Mr. Monk Fazetier get clear off, for we wanted which we have hang'd him

Just as the Spaniards began to run, our admiral and his main top-mast shot by the cap, and his fore-top-sail yard had been shot down some time before, and the yard hung like a Welchman's dagger; so that the Cornwall could not perform

When our admiral lost his top masts, and could not follow the fleet, he bore down to the Langue d'oc, as the say him a word, and we all thought he was going to board her, and cut the bows to pieces, for taking their convoy again; but he only fired a broadside or two at her when he got close to her. Then the French ship flew, and cry'd out for quarter, but it's pity they had any. At last the prize crew, who were to get up him, coming to help him, but the horn-well gave her such a stroke he turn'd upon her, and run'd her down, and ran for it as fast he could.

The next day we met a Spaniard from Santa Fe, who told us of the general's curse; he said, "I curse him for coming in our way; for we should have gone and taken all the balloons up, and been as rich as possible." I'm sure we deserve'd it; for we liv'd at short allowance all the time, and but two quarts of water a day to make it hold out, in boxes of meat, & them (but short allowance of grog was work of all); and now we have brought this prize here, we are told, the will be given up to the Spaniards again; so we have fought them for nothing.

Indeed we took a polacco from Cattingen, with some money on board; but this is but a bad campaign to what we expect.

The Spaniards compute their loss at about 1,000 men killed and near as many more wounded; while ours do not exceed 100: And they had the superiority by 10,000, and 1,000 men.

TH E letters from Gloucest^r of the 24th instant, import, that as he the suspension of arms has been published in Cork on the 20th ult., with the rebels, and that is not more for six months. And that the republic hath sent thicker superior troops, with power under the king's auspices, to make force and accommodation : it is presumed those Hibernians, not to expose themselves to the king's retribution, at a time when his might will have it in his power to crush them at once, will at last submit to their obedience. It only to be wished their submission were more sincere and determined, of which we cannot easily assure ourselves.

N E W - Y O R K .

According to some letters, every thing continues in a state of perfect tranquillity; except that the republic herself is a good deal uneasy. The salary of 550,000 livres a month, which was granted her by France, is largely called; whereas the French favored themselves in this account would have continued to the end of the year. Affairs are at present in such a situation, there being nothing to fear from enemies, that it was thought the payment of this sum might very well be dispensed with for the time being. The British ambassador of St. George are still 20 per cent discounted.

Paris, August 6.—The British minister here has informed

England with eleven men of war; and had left rear admiral Parker with the men-of-war to collect in the Mediterranean before he finally disembarked; because of want of ships enough to carry 30,000 men of the King's troops to Sardinia, in order to give sufficient Don Philip full marks of his affection, his general and four regiments to recruit the Duke of Parma, Piacenza and Guastalla, which a million of dollars, to defray the expenses of his army, plus those thereto continuing him grand vizier of Spain, and his all his consequences; and Augt 21, 1793, about 1000 hours, the British ambassador began his recall.

B O T H I N D Y.

September 7.—On Thursday the British offices of the Regency met at the Cockpit, Whitehall, and took into consideration

the number of foreign troops proper to be disbanded at this juncture, the determination of which point his royal highness the Duke of Cumberland is to carry with him to Flanders.

We are informed, that the principal occasion of his royal highness the Duke of Cumberland's coming over, was to consult the lords of the regency, for dispersing some regiments; and we hear, that seniority will not be regarded, but those who behaved with the greatest valour will be kept on foot. They have received advice from General in Wallbridge, that some of the Locums have made their appearance in that part of the country; but we hear of no damage they have done in the northern counties.

On Friday a farmer's cart coming to Town, with several persons in it, by some accident overturn'd at Highgate, which had such an effect on the lad who drove the cart, whose mother was in it, that he cried out, "They kill'd my mother!" and died immediately of the fright. The persons in the cart received no hurt.

Yesterday orders were given for taking into pay several officers, who have been lately discharged from his majesty's yards, to fit out with all expedition some ships that were paid off. The same day the Medall of 50 pds., and the New and Month of Ge. mons., were put in commission. We had seen the private letters from some parts of Italy say, that a new treaty is on foot between the courts of France and Spain, and the Republic of Genoa, for maintaining the latter in a state of independence, for the security of which subsidies are to be granted to that State, which may enable her to perfect the fortresses which are already begun in different parts of her dominions, and to keep on foot a body of 10,000 regular troops in time of peace. It is also said, that some other Italian states will be induced to accede to this alliance.

On Thursday there was a report, that all the officers were ordered to their posts in Great Britain and Ireland; and those orders were given in consequence of some advices received from the court of Madrid.

Sept. 17.—It is said, that the reason why the court of Spain has delayed the signing of the peace, is on account of a Spanish register ship of great value, which was cut out of a harbour in Portugal some time since, and carried to New England, which they insist on having restored, or the value.

Extract of a Letter from Paris, Sept. 16.

"Some millions have been paid to count Maurepas, to be employed in subduing certain of the rebels; whose remonstrances are daily expected from Holland to pay the Dutch prisoners debts, and the officers are afterwards to obtain salaries to return home."

Extract of a Letter from Hanover, Sept. 8.

"We have in account from Hanover, that the emperor has accepted the neutrality of Silesia, by which the chief obstacles are removed which related to the passes into and out of Prussia."

Sept. 21.—According to letters from Vienna by yesterday's mail, it is decided that the Russian emperor shall pass the winter in Bohemia, and that they are to be quarter'd in the cities of Prague, Olmütz, and Linz; for which, 'till the return of the spring equinox, enables them to continue their march.

It is confidently believed, that the definitive treaty is signed, and that it will speedily be made public.

December 5.—We are inform'd from New-Jersey, that one of the heads of the rioters, having been committed to jail at Newark, a number of these people came to the jail on Monday night last, and let him out; and he afterwards made his escape, through the window, by breaking the door off the hinges, and he walked out of prison as Paul and Silas did.
