UPON perusing your News Paper, of
the 5th of April, I found a Paragraph,
urg'd by a Person, who subscribes
George Meanwell; and what he said,
is in favour of our Inspection Law:
The Gentleman may justly subscribe himself Mean-
well, for aught I know; but I am sure he is far
from speaking well: He is been very candid in
giving his Opinion upon an Inspection Law, shew-
ing, that it has been of great Advantage to this
Province; but my Sentiments on that Head, will
not allow me to join with him in his Opinion, for
I am certain that the Inspection Law has been of
no general Advantage to the Country. As he
says, he insinuates he is a Well wisher to his Coun-
try, but I think he is not one; because no Man,
in my Opinion, is a Well wisher to his Country,
who pleads in Behalf of the Inspection Law: For
what Experience we have already had of such a
Law, plainly appears, that it has not been of an
Advantage to the Country; and I am afraid it
never will, should it continue ever such a Term of
Years. We see daily, by the Accounts of Sales
for Tobacco, which has been shipp'd for these last
two or three Years, has not been higher than what
we used to have before the Inspection Law was
made, and in the Time of War also, when Freight
was at sixteen Pounds per Ton, which was at that
Time a great Disadvantage to the Accounts for
Tobacco: The Accounts of Sales must make it
appear, whether the Law has been of an Advan-
tage, or not. As to my own Accounts, they are
not so good now, as they were before the Law
was made; and by what Information I have from
many Gentlemen Planters, their Accounts are as
low; which, if true, where is the Fruits of the
Inspection Law? Why, I will answer, it was lost
the first Year of it's being in Force, but not the
Charges with it; no, the Charges still continues,
and many of my poor Brother Planters feels it:
And should the Law be revived, we must labour
under many Charges, or more than we now do:
But I hope the Legislative Power will ease us of
our Burden, by throwing down a Law that has
been only for the Interest of a few.

I must now take upon me to answer Mr. Mean-
well, in a few Points, which he has given the
Public, in regard to the Inspection Law. The
Gentleman says, that the Expence of the new Law
is overcome, and the Hardships is removed: In
that Point, I must beg Leave to say, he is wrong
in his Assertion; for the Expence which attends
the Law, will never be at an End, while the Law
continues, which is evident: We are at the Charge
of Inspecting our Tobacco; we are also at the
Charge of repairing the Houses, Scales, and Weights,
&c. and how can Mr. Meanwell be right in his
Assertion, by saying, the Burden is overcome. Mr.
Meanwell also says, what must become of the poor
industrious Planter, who has a Family to Support,
in case the Law should fail? Indeed my Sentiments
on that Point, tells me, he will do much better
without the Law, than with it: For every reason-
ing Man must allow, it's a Hardship on poor Ten-
ants, who gives seven or eight hundred Pounds
of Tobacco per Year, for their Rent, and will not
perhaps make near that Quantity good, so as to
pass Inspection (for we cannot make our Tobacco
Good as we please), and if the poor Tenant's
Tobacco should not pass, what must be the Conse-
quence? Why, it is thus, he will have no Tobac-
co to pay his Landlord, neither will he have any
to Support himself or Family in any Shape: This
indeed we must say is a Hardship: But when there
is no Inspection Law, if the poor Tenant's Tobac-
co should not be so good as to please his Landlord,
he may dispose of it to some other; and if he
should get but a small Price for it, it's much better

than having it destroyed: So that I must affirm,
that the poor Planters is in a much worse Con-
dition under the Law, than if there was no In-
spection Law at all. Mr. Meanwell says, that
before the Law, Merchants oblige the Planters to
carry their Tobacco to such Places, where they
kept Scales and Weights; but I find the Officers
could not do the same. As for my Part, I never
paid the Merchants, by carrying my Tobacco, to
their Bye Places of Inspection, as I may so call it.
I am sure it is not in the Merchants Power to com-
pel their Debtors to do so; there is no Law to sup-
port them in doing so: If the Merchants had a
Right, Why did not the Clergy, Sheriffs, and
other Officers, do the same? Because there is no
Law to support them. It is needless for me to
answer Mr. Meanwell in all his Points, because
too many of them are not worthy of Notice. I
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more at present, but shall wait another Opportunity.

'tis said, is to be employed in Trade, and the rest
in War, for what we know.

Leghorn, Feb. 16. The Corsicans have publish-
ed a Manifesto in Vindication of their late Violences,
importing, "That they entertain the sincerest
Sentiments of Regard and Submission to the King
of France; but that they are persuaded his Majesty
is kept in the Dark with relation to their Affairs,
and the Conditions on which they delivered their
tenable Poils to the Marquis de Cursay;" of whose
Recall they complain bitterly.

The Delineations of Mr. de Cursay's Conduct
while he commanded in Corsica, differ greatly.
At Genoa they represent him as a Man of a tur-
bulent Ambition, who would act as Master, and
suffer no Equal. At Paris, his Enemies give out,
that to his Pride and Obstinacy the ill Success of
the Affairs of Corsica is owing; and that his not
acting in Concert with the Genoese Commissaries,
overturned the Measures of the Court, and hindered
the Submission of the Corsicans. But his
Friends, perhaps with more Truth, throw all the
Blame on the rigid and cruel Policy of the Repub-
licans. The Marquis, they say, is a Man of ex-
cellent Sense, and perfectly acquainted with the
Genius of the People with whom he had to do.
He knew that the fierce and haughty Maxims of
the Genoese were very improper to prevail with
Minds by Nature Enemies to Dependence and Sla-
very, sowed by the ill Treatment they had fre-
quently received, and filled with Aversion for Mas-
ters whom they considered as Tyrants, and Inva-
ders of their Liberties. The Marquis, knowing
that moderate Measures alone could prove effectual,
and that he behoved to refine their Manners, and
make them lay aside their Roughness and Intracta-
bility, after the Example of the wisest Legislators
called in the Assistance of the Arts and Sciences to
civilize these Islanders, and by inspiring them with
Politeness to teach them Submission. But this
System, too moderate and gentle in the Eyes of
the Republic of Genoa, and too much for the
Honour of the Gentleman who planned and fol-
lowed it, stirred up the Jealousy of the Commissary
Grimaldi, and though him, the Distrust of the
Genoese. A Scheme for effecting his Disgrace
was immediately formed. They practised every
Art to set the Ministry of Versailles against him.
Every Plan of Conduct which he laid down, was
represented as a Conspiracy and Scheme to promote
his boundless Ambition. All his seemingly ambi-
guous Steps, were brought together to form a real
and incontestable Crime. The Truth of these
Suggestions of his Friends is evident from the Or-

ders given by the King for his Release from the
Castle of Antibes. And this first Step towards
Liberty is an Earnest of his speedy Enjoyment of
it entire. It gives him an Opportunity of display-
ing his Innocence in the best Light, of stopping
the Mouths of his Enemies, and covering them
with Confusion. In short, the Question is now,
how to make him proper Reparation: And it will
be done. The Genoese conspired his Ruin, and
wanted to incense his Prince against him. But
Lewis, before he struck, regarded on whom the
Blow was to fall. He saw at his Feet Innocence
and Merit, whom they endeavoured to oppress;
and instead of crushing, stretched out his Arm to
raise them. The King is just, the Marquis inno-
cent, and the Genoese odious at Versailles.

ly put into Commission four Men of War, one of
30, and three of 20 Guns.

his Prussian Majesty. Their Imperial Majesties
interest themselves very much in the Affair, and

attended with any bad Consequences.

his Troops upon the same Footing as they were be-
fore the Reduction of them, which was made the
Year after the Peace at Aix la Chapelle, has given
Orders to augment the Infantry with 9000 Men,
and the Cavalry with 3000. This Court has caused
Representations to be made to that of London,
concerning the Behaviour of Admiral Knowles to
the Spanish Privateers which were stop'd by the Ships
belonging to his Squadron, it appearing to this
Court to have been too arbitrary; but the British
Court has given for Answer, that great Care was
taken to prevent these Complaints, by ordering
Admiral Knowles to proceed in these Affairs with
the greatest Circumspection, and to treat as Pyrates,
such Ships only as made an ill Use of the Spanish
Flag, and for that Reason deserved no Indulgence.

Hague, March 9. The Dispositions, which,
Letters from several Quarters tell us, the French
are making on the Side of Lorraine, Alsace, Lan-
guedoc, and Provence, serve to confirm the Advi-
ces we lately gave. According to those Letters,
the Intention of assembling a Body of Troops on
the Moselle, and on the Rhine, is to make the E-
lector of Mentz consider what he is about, since
they will be at hand to make him repent it, if he
should act contrary to the Pleasure of the Court of
Versailles: As if that Court had the Superinten-
dence of the Empire, and the Arch Chancellor be-
hoved to wait for the Permission to discharge the
Function of his Office. The Affair in Question is
the convoking an Electoral Dyet for the Dispatch
of Business relating to the Germanic Body. For
this the Permission of the Emperor alone is requi-
site: And if that Prince should resent it, he is en-
gaged by his Capitulation not to resent their pro-
ceeding to Business without his Permission. But
say they, the French King, by the Treaty of West-
phalia, is Guarantee of the Tranquillity of the Em-
pire, and bound to see its Constitutions observed.
True; but what Commotions are there in the Em-
pire? Which of its Constitutions is infringed? On
the contrary, the Convocation has for its Object
the Observation of its Constitutions. Besides this,
has the Gaurantee a Right to enter the Empire with
an armed Force before he be applied to for his As-
sistance?

As to the Camps to be formed in Provence and
Languedoc; the Troops are to be sent thither, first,
to ease the inland Provinces of the Kingdom, in
which Subfistence for them doth not abound. Se-
condly, on Account of the Affairs in Corsica;
where, some People say, the French Troops will
be continued, in Retribution of the Behaviour of
the Islanders, in driving them by Force from the
Poils

The Affair in Question is the convoking an Electoral Dyet for the Dispatch of Business relating to the Germanic Body. For this the Permission of the Emperor alone is requisite: And if that Prince should resent it, he is engaged by his Capitulation not to resent their proceeding to Business without his Permission. But say they, the French King, by the Treaty of Westphalia, is Guarantee of the Tranquility of the Empire, and bound to see its Constitutions observed. True; but what Commotions are there in the Empire? Which of its Constitutions is infringed? On the contrary, the Convocation has for its Object the Observation of its Constitutions. Besides this, has the Guarantee a Right to enter the Empire with an armed Force before he be applied to for his Assistance?

As to the Camps to be formed in Provence and Languedoc; the Troops are to be sent thither, first, to ease the inland Provinces of the Kingdom; in which Subfistence for them doth not abound. Secondly, on Account of the Affairs in Corsica; where, some People say, the French Troops will be continued, in Resentment of the Behaviour of the Islanders, in driving them by Force from the Ports

Posts that had been put into their Hands. The French Court is also afraid lest some other Power should find its Advantage in protecting the Malecontents, who perhaps would dispose of themselves to the first Bidder, rather than return under the tyrannic Yoke of the Genoese, for such it certainly was.

Upon the Whole: Those who are acquainted with the miserable Condition of the Inland Provinces of France; the threatening Symptoms of a Schism in the Church, of an Insurrection of the People incensed against the Clergy, and with the Commotions in Britany, occasioned by the Banishment of the principal Noblesse, are persuaded, these different Circumstances will confirm the King and his Ministry in the pacific Sentiments they have hitherto discovered: Besides Madame the Duchess is for Peace; and the Controller General of the Finances will not, it is probable, advise a War.

Edinburg, Feb. 15. The Post Boy with the London Mail, in his Way from Edinburgh to Had dington, fell into a snow Wreath, where he almost perished. The Mail did not arrive from London 'til late last Night, the Roads being almost impassable for Snow: The Post Boy from Linlithgow with the Glasgow Mail, lost his Horse in the Snow, and with much Difficulty saved himself and the Mail.

Glasgow, Feb. 7. The River Clyde rose here, last Night, higher than has been known these 40 Years, occasioned by the Rains melting the great Falls of Snow, and happening at the Full of the Moon, and a strong Wind from South, all the lower Part of the City was overflow'd.

Much Mischief has happened in many Parts of the North of England, from the late Snows, and the succeeding heavy Rains; particularly at Doncaster, where 4 Men were lost in crossing the River, which was swell'd to a surprizing Degree, and their Post was detained by the Floods, near a Day and a half.

L O N D O N, March 26.

There is an Account from Africa, that two Men of War, and several small Sloops were on the Coast of Guiney to protect the British Trade in those Parts.

They write from Cadiz, of the 8th Instant, that the Night before, and all that Day, they had a violent Storm, which forced several Ships to Sea, and others ashore; and the Gale continued when the Advices came away.

Capt. Nathaniel Pierce, of the Brigantine called the Portsmouth, belonging to Mr. Robert Odborne, Merchant of Piscataqua, in N. w. England, left that Port about the 22d of November, 1752, bound to Louisburg, with a Cargo chiefly of Lumber. The Crew, besides the Commander, consisting of the following Persons, viz. Nathaniel Barnes, Mate; David Brown, William Langdon, Timothy Cotton, Longford, a Negro Man, all Residents of Piscataqua; besides William Williams of Liverpool; Thomas Chambers, of some Part of the North of England, and John Oilson, a Dutchman; in all nine in Number.

They proceeded on their intended Voyage with favourable Winds, and made the Coast of Cape Breton, at about 10 Leagues to the Westward, the first of December. There came that Day a Gale of Wind Easterly, with a Storm of Snow, and exceeding cold. The Crew being much fatigued with it, pressed the Captain to make the best of his Way to the Southward, which was immediately done by general Consent; the Cargo which was on board being proper for the West India Market. The Wind the 2d of December was more moderate, and not blowing over hard, until the 4th in the Night, when a Storm arose at W. N. W. and they continued before the Wind the remaining Part of the Night. The next Day the Storm continuing, about four in the Afternoon, the Pump was suck'd; about five the Captain and Crew found they had sprung a Leak, and required both Pumps, which were set to Work directly; but notwithstanding all they could do, it continued gaining upon them; and about 8 in the Evening they found the Vessel to be full of Water, and Pumping to be of no Manner of Service. They had all this Time no Sail set, excepting the Foresail, which they secured as soon as possible; and got the Fore Yard close down, the Vessel then remaining to the Mercy of the Seas and full of Water. The Crew had then no Thoughts in this dismal Situation, but to secure what Provision and Water they could, and get some salt Pork and Beef from out of the Steerage, and likewise two small Cheeses. The Meat they secured by making a Hole, and then putting a Rope through it, with which they tied it to the Quarter Deck, which was the only Part that remained out of the Water. The Negro Man, Longford by Name, and Cook, were both lost that Night.

The second Day after this proved moderate, when they broke open the Forecastle, by which Means two Casks of Water, and a Barrel and Half of Apples, floated to the Scuttle, which they got upon the Quarter Deck, and there secured them. The 9th of December, about the Dusk of the Evening, in a very severe Squall, the Vessel fell on her Star-board Broadside, when the Crew all got in the best Manner they could, on the Broadside to Windward, the Sea making a Breach over them, and very cold. The Squall continued Half an Hour, and then abated: In the Squall William Langdon, and John Oilson were lost; and on looking after what Provision they had secured, found the Water, Apples, and Cheese all gone, and nothing but the Pork and Beef remaining, and the Vessel's upper Deck broke up, not any Thing remaining in it; from this Time they had never a drop of Water, but what the Heavens at Times afforded them, and no other Sustainance but the Salt Pork. Either the 12th or 13th David Brown proved delirious, often asking for Beer, Cyder, and other Liquors, and was in the Night lost. From this to the 15th they had some light Showers of Hail, but could save but a small Quantity, which each as soon as they had got it eagerly devoured, and gave them small Relief. The 16th Nathaniel Barnes, the Mate, died upon the Deck with Hunger and Cold, and was thrown into the Sea. The 17th the Lumber that was between Decks, was chiefly washed away, and the Remainder of the Crew thought it best, if by any Means they could, to cut away their Main-mast. There were Carpenters and other Tools in the Steerage, which was then full of Water, and no Possibility of getting them but by diving, which Capt. Pierce himself did, and recovered an Iron Crow, and a Carpenter's Axe, by the Help of which they cut away the Main-mast. The Day after this Timothy Cotton proved delirious, jump'd overboard, and was drowned. Capt. Pierce, with the two remaining Men, were now in the greatest Distress, and on the 19th Thomas Chambers, and Williams were both delirious, having frequently drank their own Urine. There was then a hard Gale of Wind, and the Sea broke very much over them, on which Day the two last mentioned Men were washed overboard. Capt. Pierce from this Day, the 19th, to the 24th, remained alone, expecting every Moment to be his last, but was happily delivered by the Elizabeth, Capt. Martin, bound from Halifax in Nova Scotia, to Oporto. They had no Bread from the Day they were wreck'd, and had no Liquor but that aforementioned.

March 12. On Friday Night last was married the Rt. Hon. the Lord BALTIMORE, to the Lady DIANA EGERTON, youngest Daughter to the Duke of Bridgewater, at her Grace's House in Cavendish Square.

March 13. Yesterday the Rt. Hon. the Lord BALTIMORE and his new married Lady, were at St. James's to wait on his Majesty, and were most graciously received.

March 17. His Majesty has been pleased to approve of HORATIO SHARPE, Esq; to be Governor of Maryland, upon the Appointment of the Rt. Hon. FREDERICK Lord Baltimore, Lord and Proprietary of that Province.

B O S T O N, May 1.

Extract of a Letter from Halifax, dated April 1753.

"Last Sunday arrived here two Men in an Indian Canoe, who tell the following Story: That about three Months ago, they with two more went from hence in a small Schooner to trade with the French this Side Louisburg; that they put into a Place called Torbay 7 Leagues this Side Canfo, in the Morning they were attack'd by three Indian Canoes; they having but one Musket on board struck to them; and as soon as they got them on Shore, kill'd two, out of the four, and made these two Servants to the chief Indians, and loaded them very hard in Burthens up the Country to their Governor, as they call'd him: In this Service, and cutting Wood, they continued about six Weeks; and on the Sunday before last in the Morning, four Indians went on board the Schooner to get more Stores, and left these two Men in a Wigwam, with a Squaw, and a Boy of about 12 Years of Age; they then came to a Resolution to kill them, which they did, and three Dogs; then took their two Guns and loaded them afresh, with two Balls each, and lay in Ambush for the four Indians coming on Shore, and just as they came on Shore they shot two of them, and with their Hatchets closed with the other two, and kill'd them, altho' they were arm'd: They have brought six Scalps with them, and all their Household Furniture and Furs. They call themselves the Cape Breton Indians, and were determin'd to attack the Mickmacks for making the Peace.—The two Men report, that there

is a New England Sloop on Shore in the same Place, and all the Men lie dead on the Beach.

P H I L A D E L P H I A.

May 18. On the 26th ult. at a Court of Oyer and Terminer held at York, one John Sawant was indicted, and found guilty, of the Murder of John Reily, and received Sentence of Death.

And on the Monday following Catharine Reynolds was tried at Lancaster, for the Murder of her Bastard Child; which being clearly prov'd against her, she likewise received Sentence of Death. And Weston Rakes, and ——— Boyd, were indicted for the Murder of Catharine Shreiner; when Boyd was acquitted, and Rakes found guilty of Manslaughter, for which he was burnt in the Hand.

Tuesday last Capt. William Hasleton arrived here from Jamaica; in his Passage he took up, and brought in with him, Part of the Crew of the Ship Two Brothers, Capt. Coates, of London, who was cast away (homeward bound) in the Gulf of Florida, on the 27th of last Month; the rest of the People were taken up by Capt. Bellamy, designed for London.

May 7. From Burlington we have Advice, that one John Shores was tried, at the Supreme Court held there, for stealing a Cow, of which he was convicted, and burnt in the Hand.

Extract of a Letter from Reading, May 13.

"Last Week the House and Barn of Nicholas Warner, a Farmer, about three Miles from this Town, were burnt down; 'tis not known how it happened. And the Week before a House and Barn, about five Miles off, were burnt down by Fire, which had spread far and wide, upon burning the Woods, an unlawful and dangerous Practice, by which some Plantations have suffered much in this County, and several Houses have been destroyed in Lancaster County, this Spring. On Friday last a Person was committed to Goal here, for attempting to pass a Counterfeit Coin, in Imitation of a German Caroline."

A N N A P O L I S.

We hear from Somerset County, that at a Special Court of Oyer and Terminer, held there a few Days ago, for the Trial of some of the Heads of the Blacks, concerned in the late intended Insurrection; one free Mulatto was sentenced to be whipp'd and pillory'd, and one Negro to suffer Death.

One Day last Week, a Sea Turtle, which weigh'd upwards of Ninety Pounds, was caught with a Hook and Line, as high up our Bay as the Mouth of Chester.

Within a few Days have arrived from London, the Captains Seller, Cooper, Hooper, Stupart, Hall, Richardson, and Askew.

Capt. Richardson, who left London the 16th of April, brings Word, That Capt. Cockson, with whom our Governor is to come, would certainly sail in a Week after him, so that he may now be every Day expected.

a Friend to the Inspection-Law,
to the Brother Planter who is
a Well-wisher for no Inspection-
Law, Greeting.

DEAR SIR,

LOOK upon myself to be under the great-
est Obligation to you, for the Honour you
have done me, in bestowing some of your
precious Moments in observing upon a trifling
Performance of mine, lately published. Not-
withstanding the Censure you set out with, of my
being far from speaking well, &c. yet the Con-
cession you make afterwards, viz. *he is been very
candid in giving his Opinion upon an Inspection Law,*
is an Instance of your great Candour and Human-
ity, and does me great Honour, which I shall ever
acknowledge with the deepest Sense of Gratitude;
and full sorry am I, that your Sentiments on that
Head will not allow you to join with me in my
Opinion, and much more so, for your Conclusion,
which I humbly conceive is a little too severe;
which, to prevent Mistakes, I will set down in
your own inimitable Words: *As he says, he in-
fermes that he is a Well-wisher to his Country, but
I think he is not one; because no Man in my Opinion
is a Well-wisher to his Country, who pleads in Be-
half of the Inspection Law.* Here is a decisive
Sentence with a Witness; they are all Fools or
Enemies to their Country, who plead in Behalf of
an Inspection Law. Is not this Sentence (humbly
begging Pardon for the Freedom of the Expression)
a little too rash? Does it not need some Apology?
That it is capable of some Apology, I am satisfied,
and the great Deference I have for your Judgment,
and the Veneration I have for your Person, induce
me to attempt one, which you will, no doubt,
render quite perfect another Opportunity. What
has misled you, I suppose, was too attentive a
Perusal of a celebrated Piece, that was published
some Years ago on the same Subject, by a late
eminent Author, Mr. Q. IN A CORNER,
whose immature Death was occasioned by too in-
tense an Application in composing that extraordi-
nary Piece; a Death which cannot be enough la-
mented, and which would have been an irrepara-
ble Loss to the Public, if he had not before, or at
the Instant of his Departure, kindly and gener-
ously infused his noble Spirit into you (which
you'd not have been better placed), and which he
would hardly have done, if you had not had the
Honour of being nearly allied to him, or been
very much in his Confidence. Some of the Beau-
ties of that admirable Piece, shine in yours so very
conspicuously, that they cannot escape the Notice
of a Reader of any Penetration, who has ever read
the Piece itself. But permit me to say, that your
Veneration for the Memory of your deceased Patron
and Benefactor, has carried you a little too far;
as you have attempted to pass his Decisions on the
Public, as equal to self evident Propositions, which
need no Proofs or Reasons to support them, which
I'm afraid some Men will be so refractory and ob-
stinate as not to submit to. I wish this were all,
but, alas! it is far from being so, for your Re-
gard to the Memory of that inestimable Man has
carried you to an excessive Fondness of every
Thing that was his. This Fondness induced you
to take Possession of his Corner (as the fittest Scene
to display his noble Talents in), to confine yourself
closely to it, secluded from the Conversation of
Men, and the Observation of what pass'd abroad.
Hence by the Help of a lively Imagination (which
happens frequently to over studious learned Men),
you made Gentlemen Planters of the Stools or o-
ther Seats that were in the beloved Corner, and
fancied they gave you Informations of what pass'd
abroad, agreeably to your own Sentiments. Had
you, dear Sir, conversed with real Men, instead

of those wooden Ones, the Creatures of your own
Imagination, they, or some of them, would have
informed you, that Tobacco had been sold for a
much better Price, in Bills of Exchange, Cash, and
Goods, in the Country, since the Inspection Law,
than before, and acquainted you with Instances
enough to put the Fact out of Dispute. They, or
some of them, would have informed you, that the
People found their Account in carrying their Crops
in their Pockets, and by that Means, having it in
their Choice with whom to deal, and an Oppor-
tunity to furnish themselves with such Goods, as
they liked best, and most wanted. They, or some
of them, would have informed you, that the Peo-
ple found some Advantage in paying 300 lb. To-
bacco in Inspectors Notes, with a Discount of 10
per Cent, which reduced it to 270 lb. instead of
400 lb. at home. They, or some of them, would
have convinced you, that if the Rats and Mice,
were kept away from the Scales and Weights, they
would last a great while; that nailing on a few
Boards now and then would not cost much, and
that the Proprietors of many of the Inspection
Houses must be at this Cost. They, or some of
them, would have informed you, that nothing can
so effectually secure the Reputation and Credit of
Tobacco, or any other Commodity abroad, as the
preventing Frauds at home, by a careful Inspecti-
on or Examination. They, or some of them,
would have informed you, that the Virginians
(who were formerly as averse to an Inspection Law
as you can be), are now fond of their Law, think
it the best they have, and with for nothing more
than that we may be so stupid and blind to our
own Interest, as to drop ours. They, or some of
them, would have convinced you, that our losing
the Benefit of the Law the first Year, but not the
Charge, is a Contradiction. These, and many
other important Particulars, relating to this Sub-
ject, they, or some of them, would have acquaint-
ed you of; and if you had been truly informed, I
am sure you have too much Honour and Candour
either to endeavour to conceal, or not to have
mentioned Circumstances of so much Consequence
to your Country. For want of this Information,
you concluded it was needless for you to answer
Mr. Meanwell in all his Points, because too many
of them (not all it seems) are not worthy of Notice.
Some indeed have been so ill natured as to suggest,
that you could not answer the Points, which you
have declared are not worthy of Notice. And
others have even insinuated, that either you are,
or some near and dear Friend of yours, whose In-
terest you consider as your own, is really a Tobac-
co Buyer, and with there may be no Inspection-
Law, that you or he may buy the cheaper. But
for my own Part, I have too high an Opinion of
your Honesty and Justice, to entertain the least
Suspicion of your having any other but generous
and public spirited Views; and, therefore, will do
by you, as People do sometimes by the Pope,
that is, appeal from your own Judgment, founded
upon Misinformation, to your Judgment, upon
your being better informed, and having maturely
considered the Merits of the Cause.

HANOVER, March 24.

MR. Langsmidt, the Prussian Resident here,
has delivered a Letter to our Regency, in
which the King formally declares, that all the Re-
ports of any Invasion intended by him on the Domini-
ons of our Sovereign, are the false Contrivances of
Incendiaries; to dissolve the Harmony and good Un-
derstanding which he is for cultivating by the best
Means in his Power: That nothing is farther from
his Thoughts than any Pretension to the Hanoverian

Territories; and that the Encampment of his Troops
mean no more than to exercise them; that they are
to last but eight or ten Days, when the Corps are
to return to Quarters.

L O N D O N.

March 3. Our Letters from Frankfort intimate,
that the Prussian Officers who are recruiting there
and in the Neighbourhood, are all vanished, in
Consequence of the Orders they have received, to
join their respective Corps. In the Palatinate all
imaginable Vigour is used in carrying on their mi-
litary Preparations, under Pretence of a general Re-
view which is to take Place early in the Spring;
and in Alsace, Magazines are already forming for a
Camp, which will consist chiefly of Cavalry.

According to private Letters from Marseilles and
Toulon, repeated Orders have been received to
have all the Vessels building and repairing, at the
last mentioned Port, ready to put to Sea by the first
of May, which occasions Variety of Speculations,
more especially considering the great Affiduity with
which the Spaniards are arming and fortifying in
Catalonia, and the Pains they have taken to render
Barcelona the strongest Place in all the Mediterra-
nean. A Camp is also to be formed under its Can-
non in the Spring.

Letters from Geneva tell us, that the Son of a
Person of Distinction in England, who, upon his
Travels, flabb'd a Drawer at a Tavern, was tried
and hanged within three Days.

It is reported, that the great Affair on the Car-
pet, which for this Week past has been the Subject
of political Conversation, is adjusted.

March 9. It is said, that in Case his Prussian
Majesty makes no Abatement in his Demands, but
persist in stopping the whole Sum claimed in his
Exposition of Motives, England's Guaranty of Si-
lesia will be declared null and void.

March 10. Last Wednesday a Cart load of new
Buffs, Pouches, &c. were brought into the Store
Room of the Savoy, which, it is said, are for ten
Men in a Company that are soon to be augmented
to the Guards.

It is reported, that the Right Hon. Lord Balti-
more intends to offer himself a Candidate at the next
general Election, for the County of Surry.

Councils are held every Night at the Cockpit,
on Affairs of very great Importance.

According to Letters from Barcelona, of the 14 h
past, Orders have been sent there, and to the o-
ther Ports of Spain, to get the Men of War ready
to put to Sea, and form a Fleet next May.

March 14. It is said the Owners of the Money
that was on board the Prince Frederick Packet
Boat, taken by the Algerines in March 1750, in-
tend to Petition the Parliament for some Indemni-
fications. As the Infidels Pretence for condemning
her, was, that she had no Mediterranean Pass; the
Question is, by whose Neglect did this happen?

We hear a very extraordinary Memorial has late-
ly been presented by the French Ambassador, de-
manding Satisfaction for a Ship and Cargo taken
and condemned in 1743. The Ship in Question is
the Phoenix, belonging to Sieurs Peyrac, condem-
ned by the Court of Admiralty at St. Christopher's
the 18th of October, 1743, and ordered, by Sen-
tence of the Court of Appeal in England of the 18th
of January last, to be restored, with her Cargo, or
the Value thereof; but the Owner of said Ship not
being satisfied with this Sentence, because it
says nothing of Costs of Suit, Damages, and In-
terest for that illegal Capture, and as there lies no
Appeal from the said Sentence of the 18th of Ja-
nuary, he has had no Recourse to the French Am-
bassador; the 28th Article of the Treaty of Com-
merce and Navigation concluded at Utrecht, im-
porting that bare Restitution, in such Cases, is not
sufficient Satisfaction, but that the Captors must
make good all Damages, with Interest, &c.

Yesterday came Advice, that the Hunter, Ogil-
vy, from Barbadoes to London, on the 14 h last,
in a thick Fog she struck on the Lizard, and there
being no Hope of doing any Thing for the Service

of the Ship, the Commander and Crew swam ashore; some little Time after the Ship broke to Pieces, and a great many Chests, belonging to the People, came ashore; on which the Cannibals of the Country came down and seized every Thing they could; and the unhappy Sufferers earnestly requested to have some Cloaths restored to them, they insolently denied it. Among other Things they got Possession of a Pocket Book that belonged to the Captain, containing some Papers of Consequence to him, and a Bill of Exchange for 200 l. with which they would not part unless he would give them Salvage.—What can be Punishment enough for such Cruelty? Not even the Rack.

We hear the Debts of the Navy, on the 31st of December last, amounted to 944,931 l.

The Justices of the City and Liberty of Westminster, have sent strict Orders to the Publicans, not to suffer any Sort of Gaming in their Houses.

It is expected that the Bill for making Perjury capital, will pass this Session.

The Lords of the Admiralty, in the late Promotion to the Yards preferred every Person according to their Seniority, which Rules, we hear, they are resolved to follow on all Performers for the Future.

March 20. By a Ship from Guiney we have an Account, that the French have been entirely driven from the Coast of Anamaboa, and disappointed in their Attempt to bring over on their Sides a second Son of the Prince of Anamaboa, in order to improve their own Trade, to the Detriment of ours.

Letters from the Hague, of the 8th of this Month, mention, that the States were assembled, upon reconciling the Differences between certain Members of Holland and West Friesland touching the present Administration.

Two Men of War, one of 40, the other of 20 Guns, are ordered to be got ready for Sea Service, and several small Vessels are fitting out for Channel Service.

It is said that Orders have been given to the Officers of his Majesty's Dock Yards, not to suffer any Foreigners to walk in or inspect any Buildings in the said Yards for the future.

March 21. It is said that there will be a Lottery this Year for 400,000 l. of which 50,000 will be appropriated to purchase Sir Hans Sloane's Collection of Curiosities, and to build a noble Room for them and the Cotton Library, &c.

There is Advice from the Coast of Guiney, that a great Number of Men are employed to repair the several Forts on that Coast belonging to the English.

March 22. We have an Account that the 12 following Ships of War, of 60 Guns each, viz. *Glorioso, Benedict, Guennoze, Sobanano, Caio, Oriente, Agyton, Magnanime, Neptuno, Galindo, Brillante, Hektor.* These Ships are all 144 Feet in Length, and 49 in Breadth: These same Accounts add, that there are sixteen thousand Men employed at the Dock in Ferrol.

It is said the Affair on which several Cabinet Councils have been lately held, will this Day be laid before the House of Peers; and we hear that Orders are given that no Strangers are to be admitted.

March 27. Letters from Berlin and Frankfort advise, that a Negotiation is on Foot between the Courts of Berlin and Hesse-Cassel for taking 6000 Hessians into the Pay of his Prussian Majesty.

The same Letters advise, that the French Ambassador had not as yet been able to obtain Restriction of the Privileges which the French formerly enjoyed in Spain.

According to some Letters from Berlin, we shall soon see a Reply to the British Court's Answer to his Prussian Majesty's Motives for stopping the Remainder of the Silesia Loan; the said Answer, as they insinuate, not being satisfactory in the main Point.

Letters from Marseilles advise, that they are busy Night and Day, in that and other Ports of Provence, baking Biscuits, salting Beef and Pork, and getting other Sea Provisions in Readiness; from whence they conjecture that a Squadron is to be fitted out for the Mediterranean this Summer.

We have the Pleasure to inform the Public, that 45 Sail of Ships are now fitting out in the River for the Greenland Fishery; a Branch of Trade of the greatest Importance to the Welfare, as well as the Naval Force, of this Kingdom, and may be justly called a Darling Sister to the British Fishery.

March 24. The Lords of the Admiralty have ordered two Ships of 70 Guns, two of 50, and three of 20, to be fitted for Sea with all Expedition. And,

Their Lordships also gave Orders for taking in an additional Number of Artificers into Woolwich Yard, to fit out several other Ships for Service.

March 31. They write from Paris, that the

Negotiation which has been so long carrying on there between the English and French Commissioners, for reconciling the Pretensions of the respective Courts to some Islands in America, has met fresh Obstructions, which were entirely unforeseen, and will, probably, retard the Completion of that Negotiation.

Extract of a Letter from Hamburg, dated March 16.

"Since it has been insinuated in some Letters from Berlin, that a Reply is intended to the British Court's Answer to his Prussian Majesty's Exposition of Motives, some of our wou'd-be-thought Wits and Politicians have been mustering up all their little Stock of Learning and Paris, to guess at the Heads of that intended Reply, and after considering the Case in every Light, they seem to be positive, that no Reply can be made, unless the Law of Nations is left out of the Question; or, to speak more to the Purpose, that while the Law of Nations is appealed to in Disputes between Courts, they may answer, reply and rejoin eternally, without giving the Bulk of Mankind any clear Notions of the Affair.

The Law of Nations, as those Critics observe, is either such Rules and Customs as Kingdoms and Republics have agreed to observe in their Dealings together, whether in Peace or War, or else such as the Strong have imposed upon the Weak, and which by long Prescription have acquired the Force of Law: And this Law, though founded upon Justice, Equity, Convenience, and the Reason of Things, may be varied, or derogated from by mutual Agreement between any Powers; whereby it seems, that though it is good in general, yet in particular Cases it may sometimes be unjust, inconvenient, or unreasonable, otherwise we should never hear of derogatory Treaties. If then any two Powers may lawfully depart from the Law of Nations, why may not all States do the same? Undoubtedly they might, if unanimous in the Point; but if the Strong find their Account in it more than the Weak, it is in vain to think of it.

The Law of Nations, they further observe, is in some Respects like the Occult Qualities, invented to conceal the Ignorance of ancient Philosophers. In their superlative Doltishness and vain Curiosity they want to know, when this Law of Nations began to take Place in the World? In what Century, and among what Nations did it first appear? Whether it was all at once received, or only gradually obtained, and arrived in a Series of Ages at its present Perfection? And to spare themselves the Trouble of turning over ancient Historians and modern Civilians, as Solomon says that much Study is a Weariness of the Flesh, they foolishly recur to the Gospel, and imagine that Christian Kingdoms and States might do their Business well enough without the Law of Nations, if they would only follow the Advice of One infinitely wiser than Grotius, Selden, Puffendorf; *All things whatsoever that ye would that Men should do to you, do ye even so to them:* Which may be very good Doctrine in Utopia, but does not so well answer the Purposes of Christian Politicians."

BERLIN, March 26.

THE Imperial Minister has lately had several Conferences with the Cabinet Ministers. It is taken for granted that they turned on the Means for an amicable Adjustment of the Dispute concerning the Silesian Loan. That Affair, as it is now thought, will take a better Turn than was at first apprehended, and that the Reply to the British Answer will be discontinued, or at least not made public, as it may only widen the Breach, and all the Reasons for the Detention have been clearly set forth in the Exposition. The Return of some Couriers will give a farther Light into the Means for terminating this Dispute, which we ardently wish, that no Inconveniency may befall our Infant Commerce.

Venice, March 17. It is confirmed that a large Body of Turkish Troops is rendezvousing near Persia.

Paris, March 23. The King has ordered his Ministers at foreign Courts to contradict the Conjectures of the public Talk on some supposed military Dispositions in his Dominions.

Stockholm, March 10. According to the Account of Electrical Experiments, published by our Royal Academy of Sciences they surpass all those of other Countries; the Deaf are restored to their Hearing, the Dumb to their Speech, the Lame and the Paralytic bring their Crutches and their Beds into the Market Places, to make Bonfires, in Honour of this wonder working Machine.

Dantzick, March 12. The Flame of ecclesiastical Civil Wars, begin to blaze in the Heart of Poland. The Palatine of Culm, having been non-suited before the Nuncio, in a Process, which a Prelate of the Kingdom accounted to appertain to an ecclesiastical Judge, in Contempt of that Power, has summoned his Adversary before a secular Court; this Step is cried out against by the Clergy, as contrary to its Prerogative, and tending to Irreligion; threatening all Judges who shall countenance this prophane Palatine, with the most tremendous Punishments. The Public is already deluged with Writings, serious and comical, from both Parties; and the Conflagration grows so violent, that it is thought it will cost the Court a Journey into Poland to extinguish it.

Geneva, March 23. The late Earthquake, among other Places, was felt at Mount Lenis, where the Shock was so violent as to cause a Chasm, out of which issued a vast Quantity of Water.

LONDON.

March 12. M. Hop Envoy Extraordinary from the States General, hath presented a Memorial to the Duke of Newcastle, setting forth, "That three Dutch Ships, named the Groenlandia, and the Bruynvis, and the Vrouw Leonora, were sent, the beginning of last Year, upon the Greenland Whale Fishery, where they were frozen up, on the 21st of August; that the Crews thereupon did return to Holland, after having secured the said Ships, by their Anchors in the best Manner they could, in hopes of finding them again this Year; that three Ships are now ordered to be fitted out to sail for Greenland, in Search of the said Vessels; but the Owners and Freighters being under some Apprehensions, lest the said Ships should be carried away by Persons who have no Right to them, made Application to the States General, praying that all Persons might be forbid to intermeddle with the said Ships and their Cargoes, except those authorized to go and look after them; and the States General having complied therewith, the aforementioned Envoy Extraordinary begged that the like Orders might be given with Regard to his Britannic Majesty's Subjects." Upon which his Majesty has been pleased, with the Advice of his Privy Council, to order, that none of his Subjects take away, or molest the aforementioned Dutch Ships, or their Cargoes, or otherwise to intermeddle there-

with, without the Consent of the Owners thereof, or such as shall be authorized to take Care of the same.

March 17. Letters from Paris inform us, that Assurances have been given in the last Dispatches sent from Versailles to Berlin, of a punctual Performance of all Treaties and Engagements relative to the Guaranty of Silesia, in case the present Difference between the British and Prussian Courts should be attended with any bad Consequences.

March 24. Having mentioned in our Paper, the Trial and Conviction of the Captain and Lieutenant of a Spanish Schooner, called Le Cua da Yamma, for taking an English Vessel on the High Seas, under Pretence of being a Spanish Guarda Costa, it may be necessary to relate an Affair of a similar Kind which happened when the late Sir Chaloner Ogle was Commodore at Jamaica.

As soon as he arrived to take upon him the Command of the Squadron there, the Merchants represented to him the great Difficulties they laboured under in their Trade, in having their Ships at first plundered, under Pretence of having Pieces of Eight and Logwood on board, and afterwards condemned by the Spaniards as legal Prizes. That every Method had been tried with the Spanish Governor to get them restored, but all proved ineffectual; they pleading the King of Spain's Orders for such Proceedings. Upon this, Sir Chaloner ordered a Frigate out to cruise for one of their Guarda Costas, in which they were so lucky as to succeed, and in a few Days returned to Jamaica with a small one, with 37 Men on board. On their Arrival, Sir Chaloner demanded the Captain's Commission, which was signed by one of the neighbouring Governors, and appeared to him so extraordinary, that he had great Reason to doubt the Goodness of it. He then ordered the Frigate to go with a Notary and proper Witnesses to that Governor, to shew him the Commission, and know whether that was his Firm. The Governor, knowing he had exceeded his Orders in granting it, denied his Writing; and the Persons employed, returned to Jamaica. Upon this a Court of Admiralty was called, and the Spanish Governor's denying of the Commission being proved, the whole Ships Crew were condemn'd as Pirates. Before Sentence, the Captain gave the following Account; That the Ship belonged to the Governor, who had half the Captures, as is customary in Privateers, that the Commission was signed by him, and that if he had Time allowed him, he could prove it to the Satisfaction of the Commodore and the rest of the Court.

This Account of the Captain's was taken into Consideration, but as the Island of Jamaica had suffered so much by these Captures, which had been always supposed to be illegal, and now so plainly proved, it was thought the only Method of preventing the Continuance of them was by passing Sentence; and the Prisoners were executed accordingly. When this came to be known in the Spanish Settlements, no Person would accept a Commission; so that during the Continuance of Sir Chaloner in the West Indies, which was four Years, not one Ship was taken by the Spaniards. After he was recalled, they renewed their Depredations, which at last brought on the late War.

The following Extract of a Letter from Commodore Cotes, Commander of his Majesty's Ships at Jamaica, to Mr. Cleveland, Secretary to the Lords of the Admiralty, dated the 15th of January, 1753, is published by Authority.

"I have had no Complaints from the Merchants of any Ships taken since my Arrival."

We hear, that the Bill for permitting Irish Wool and Woollen, or Bay Yarn, to be imported into any Port in Great Britain, has passed the House of Commons.

They write from Dublin, that several Artificers in the different Branches of the Woollen Trade have lately disappeared, with Intent (as is suspected) of removing to Spain. This Suspicion seems to be the better grounded, as it is well known that

the Emigrants of that Nation have, for some Time past been very active in procuring Hands; and that, in order to carry on their Design with the greater Security and Success, they having appeared under various Disguises; one, in particular, had so soon seduced a considerable Number on board, than he immediately threw off his assumed Dress of a Journeyman Weaver, and appeared in laced Clothes and the proper Habit of a Gentleman.

This Morning the most noble the Marquis of Carnarvon was married to Miss Margaret Nicholl, Daughter of John Nicholl, Esq; late of Southgate in Middlesex; a Lady of great Beauty, Merit, and a Fortune of 130,000l.

April 2. Some Letters from Paris intimate, that there is but very little Probability of their giving Ear to any Representations about the Neutral Islands in America, 'till the Affair of the French Ships taken by the English during the Spanish War, without sufficient Causes, be adjusted, and full Satisfaction given to the Sufferers, some of whom claim several thousand Pounds Sterling, for Costs, Damages, and Interest, besides Restitution of Ships and Cargoes: In the mean while the said Islands may be kept as a Security for the Payment of such Demands as they may be able to prove just and legal.

My GOD, be pleased to guide me by Thy Wisdom, rule me by Thy Justice, comfort me by Thy Mercies, and keep me by Thy Power. To Thee I dedicate all my Thoughts, my Words, my Actions, and Sufferings, that henceforth I may think of Thee, speak of Thee, act according to Thy Will, and suffer for Thy Sake. Grant that I may be prepared for Death; that I may fear Thy Judgment; avoid Hell; obtain Paradise through our LORD and SAVIOUR JESUS CHRIST.

NEW YORK.

May 21. Capt. White, of the Snow Unicorn, of this Port, who arrived here on Wednesday Night last, in 31 Days from the Bay of Honduras, informs us, That three Days before he sailed from thence, 15 Craft, belonging to the Baymen, were taken by the Spaniards in the New River, and after they had stripped the Men, set them ashore on a margin Key.

On Friday Morning last was observed floating in the North River, and soon after brought ashore at the Foot of Warren Street, the Corps of a Boy supposed to be about 12 Years old, and to have lain in the Water about 10 Days or a Fortnight, as it was much putrified: It is not as yet known whose Child it is, but appears to have been horribly mangled, having his Right Arm cut off a few Inches below the Shoulder, and the Left Hand a little above the Wrist, with the Right Leg cut off a small Distance below the Knee; had its Belly ripped open from the Navel to its private Parts, and afterwards sewed up; with a large Gash cut upon the Left Thigh, which the Operators likewise sewed up; had a large Hole at the back Part of its Head, and also had its Throat cut.

June 4. Capt. Lavarance, in three Weeks from Barbadoes, informs us, That his Excellency Governor GREENVILLE, was call'd Home, and was to depart the Island in a Merchantman, two Days after he sail'd, having received the Addresses of the Legislature, and others from the Inhabitants of the Island, acknowledging, and returning him Thanks for his long and just Administration, wishing him a safe and prosperous Voyage home, and a happy Return to the Government of that Island, to which they ardently wish'd his Re-appointment.

Capt. Troy who arrived here on Tuesday last in 7 Weeks from Londonderry, informs us, that he was obliged to put into Loch Dale, in Scot'nd, at which Place he says there was a Report, that 25 000 Stand of Arms were actually landed in the North Highlands from France, and that eight Men of War, and three Regiments, were gone round from England in Pursuit of them. A Letter in Town from Loch Dale, also mentions it as a Report.

June 11. Thursday last arrived here the Brig Katy, Capt. Bayne, in 22 Days from Jamaica. By him we learn, that his Excellency Admiral Knowles, Governor of that Place, since his having been in the Administration of Affairs there, has not suffered the Men of War to be idle in the Ports, but ordered such out on a Cruise as chanc'd to be in them, there being now an English 20 Gun Ship a cruising down on the Main: That several Turtles and other Vessels, fitted out from the Island, had received Orders from his Excellency not to resist, or endeavour an Escape from, the Attacks of the Spanish Guarda Costas, or other Vessels, that should attempt to take them, each of the Commanders having Letters from his Excellency to deliver to the several Governors of the Ports into which the Captors should carry them; the Contents of which were, that unless the Vessels taken, with their Cargoes, or the Value of them, were immediately returned to their proper Owners, he (his Excellency) would as immediately order such Reprisals to be made on their Subjects, as would sufficiently reimburse the same, together with the Damages that either of the English Vessels should sustain during the Engagement, if any such should happen; and likewise, that the Crews of such Spanish Vessels of Force as should be taken by any of his Britannic Majesty's Subjects, and brought into that Island, he would look upon as Pyrates, and hang them accordingly: And, that his Excellency had acquainted the other English Governors in the West Indies of the above Resolution, and it was not doubted but that they would all resolve to act agreeable to the Example he had set them.

Capt. Rolland, who arrived here the same Day from Leith in North Britain, in nine Weeks, informs us, That he read in the Edinburgh Courant just before he sail'd, a Paragraph which contain'd, as a Report, the Substance of what is mentioned above, brought by Capt. Troy from Loch Dale.

ANNAPOLIS.

Yesterday his Honour the President, in Council, was pleas'd further to prorogue the General Assembly of this Province (which stood prorogued to the 3d of July) to Tuesday the 7th Day of August next.

The two Articles in this Paper, under New York, relating to the Landing 25,000 Stand of Arms, in the Highlands, we have great Reason to think, were only Reports, and have no real Foundation; as Capt. Dobbins, who has now been but a little more than seven Weeks from London, heard nothing of it there. [From all Sedition, privy Conspiracy, and Rebellion.—Good Lord deliver us.]

Tuesday last arrived in Patuxent, from Guiney, but left from St. Kitt's, the Ship Kouli Kan, Capt.

Henry Bonham, with a very large Cargo of choice Slaves, consign'd to Messrs Russell and Dick, Merchants; which will be exposed to Sale at Nottingham, on the second of July. It is said there was scarcely a healthier and likelier Parcel of Slaves ever imported.

The Public Levy, as settled by the Lower House the last Session, payable in Inspected Tobacco,

If the Chancellor's, Secretary's, Commissary's, and Clerks Fees, should be calculated to more than they amount to, which may possibly be the Case, as the Amount of them can only be guessed at, it is to be observed that there are considerable Deductions in the Land Office, Sheriffs, and (I believe) Surveyors Fees; which 'tis supposed will amply make up for the Excess in the others, if there be any. Upon this Calculation there is a Saving to the People in one Year only 2315562 Weight of Tobacco, which comes to 2315 Hogheads of 1000 Nett each Hoghead, which at 5 l. Sterling per Hoghead is 11565 l.

It is no small Advantage to the Planter who buys Necessaries, to carry his Crop in his Pocket, to what Store he pleases, where there can be no Disputes about false Tare, or false Packing.

These are but some of the Advantages; to which may be added, that by a Continuance of the Inspection-Law, our Staple will be upon an Equality with that of our Neighbours of Virginia; whereas, were we to drop it, the Consequence would be, that we should be reduced to the same melancholy Condition we were in before we had one. The principal Disadvantage I have heard of, has been the Charge of Inspection. If this be too great, as perhaps it may be, it is easily remedied; and it ought to be considered that a great Part of this Expence is borne by those who purchase Transfer Tobacco, or those to whom it is paid.

It has been alleged by some (as I have heard), that People, who used to false pack Tobacco, or impose Trash, instead of merchantable Tobacco, upon their Creditors, have not under the Inspection-Law, an Opportunity of continuing the same wicked Practices; to put an End to which, was one very great End of the Law.

Some others allege, that sometimes People had an Opportunity of selling their Trash publicly and fairly, and that it would be hard to deprive them of that Advantage; to which I answer, that that hardly ever happen'd but when there was a great Scarcity; and in plentiful Seasons, that for every Penny that was got that Way by some Individuals, was more than threefold lost to the Community; as the carrying Trash in any considerable Quantity to foreign Markets (and thither it must be carried), must infallibly depreciate the Value of all the good Tobacco, carried from the same Country; besides bringing the Commodity under a lasting Disreputation abroad, than which, nothing can be of worse Consequence, and therefore ought, by all Means, to be prevented.

L O N D O N, Feb. 15.

AMONG the Papers read this Day at the Royal Society, was a very curious Account of a most extraordinary Thunder Storm, that happened last December in Cornwall; one of the Flashes of Lightning which discharged itself on a Hill, bored several Holes thro' Banks, and into the Ground, cut several Channels, like Plough Furrows, along the Hill, and shattered several Parts of a Rock, as if blown to Pieces with Gunpowder: Another Flash discharged itself on a Farm House, beat down a large Chimney of about 4 Feet Square, and moved it a considerable Distance from the House, made several Fractures in the Partitions and Windows of the Upper Rooms, besides rending the Roof to Pieces, broke into the Kitchen, where the Farmer and his Family then were, and struck down and stunned most of the Persons present. The Farmer's Son, who had just before retired by his Father's Direction, from a Window, to a Seat in one Corner of the Kitchen, was killed, his Cloaths almost rent to Shivers, his Shoes very much scorched, and one of his Toes cut so nearly off, as to hang by a bit of Skin; also his Dog, which lay between his Feet, was struck dead: What was most remarkable, the Son continued in the Position he was before the Stroke, and his Countenance not in the least altered; neither the Man nor Dog stirred on the Shock; One Person in another Room was thrown 12 Feet from her Place. The Gentleman, who sent this Account, went to the House and examined every Particular himself, and has given a most circumstantial Relation of the extraordinary Havock caused by this Flash, which for the Variety of Ways wherein it acted, is perhaps as considerable as were ever remarked before, in any of the most tremendous Thunder Storms.

K I N G S T O N (in Jamaica), May 3.

By a Sloop from Hispaniola, belonging to Rhode Island, we are informed, that there were lately taken, and brought into the Cayes, 14 Sail of Rhode Island and Connecticut Men, that were trading there, upon which one of the English Masters, on Promise of Restoration of his own Effects, turned Informer on the Vessels, Cargoes, &c. which were only condemned, but the Crews every one confined, as well as the Informer, who they have no Pity for: This Informer likewise accused every Merchant there who had encouraged that Trade; as also the Captain of one of their Guarda Costas, who are likewise all confined, their Goods confiscated, and 'tis thought, will be sent to the Gallies in Old France.

March 12. We hear the French Commandant at Hispaniola has laid an Embargo on all Shipping in their Ports, and will not suffer one to sail without a Convoy, which is soon expected there.

We are assured from Coracos, that they fitted out lately two Privateers to protect their Trade there, and that being lately on a Cruise off that Place, they met two Guarda Costas, which they attacked and sunk, and that in their Passage home, they met a Snow, which the Privateers had taken and put Men on board; they also boarded her, took out her Lading, and set her on Fire, while the Spaniards made the best of their Way overboard. The Dutch are now fitting out two more for the same Purpose.

B O S T O N.

May 7. At an Adjournment of a Court of General Sessions of the Peace held here for the County of Suffolk on Monday last, Hannah Dilley, Wife of Thomas Dilley, of Bolton, Felt maker, being presented, "for that she, on the twenty first Day of January last, and at divers Times before and afterwards, at her Husband's Dwelling House, situate in a certain Street in said Bolton, called Cold Lane, held and kept, and often made Entertainments for Lethery and Fornication, and permitted Men, and other suspected Persons not of good Behaviour or Fame, to resort to her said Husband's House, and carnally to lie with Whores, which the said Hannah then and there procured for them, to the great Detriment of all the People of our Sovereign Lord the King, there near dwelling, to the Destruction of the Manners, Health and Fortune of the Persons so there resorting, and evil Example of all others, against the Peace of our said Lord the King, his Crown and Dignity," appeared and pleaded Not Guilty; whereupon several Witnesses were sworn on Behalf of the King, and examined; after which the said Hannah moved that she might have Liberty to withdraw her Plea of Not Guilty, and plead Guilty, which the Court allow'd, and then the said Hannah pleaded Guilty; and the Court having consider'd of her Offence, ordered, That the said Hannah Dilley stand upon a Stool, at least five Feet in Height, below the Court House in King Street, for the Space of one Hour, with a Paper fixed on her Breast, signifying

her Crime, to be wrote in Capital Letters, and that she also pay a Fine of Ten Pounds to the King and find two Sureties to be bound in Ten Pounds each for her good Behaviour to the Sessions of this Court in July next, and pay Costs of Prosecution, standing committed until this Sentence be performed. [This notable Bawd, or Procureess, is said to be upwards of sixty Years old, and has followed the Business for a long Time past.]

May 28. By a Vessel from Louisburg, we have the following melancholy Account, viz. That a Vessel from Providence (in New England) bound to Louisburg, was, some Time since, cast away on Cape Sable Shore, but the Men saved their Lives, and were afterwards taken up by Capt. Pennetters, in a Schooner belonging to Annapolis Royal, who put into St. Peter's on Cape Breton, and while he lay there, was boarded by a Number of Indians, who killed him and all the People, except the Pilot, who was a Frenchman. After this, the Indians carried the Scalps in Triumph to Louisburg, 12 in Number.

N E W Y O R K.

June 4. Friday last arrived here in 32 Days from the Bay of Honduras, the Sloop Dolphin, Capt. Ramsay, who informs us, That the Spanish Run-aways, and other such like Fellows inhabiting divers Parts of the Bay, have at length become sole Masters of the New River, inasmuch that no Englishman's Craft dare to venture up, they having lately taken a Number of 'em, and after plundering, discharged them all save one, which the Crew soon after embraced an Opportunity to run off with, and which so exasperated the Spaniards, that they have since determin'd to destroy all they meet with: And, That from the above pyritical Possession of the New River, and there being no Logwood in the Old, it was not known when the Number of English Vessels now there would get loaded, there being two Snows from Boston, two Brigs from Rhode Island, Capt. Spurrier from Philadelphia, and the Captains Wayman, Brown, Furlong, Lawrence, Dickenson, and Davis of this Port, and two European Vessels.

They daily expected at the Bay, the two Spanish Brigs, that formerly us'd to trouble it.

Capt. Dickenson, in 25 Days from Coracos, informs us, That the Day before he sailed from that Island, three Dutch Traders arrived there from the Main, who reported, that they, in Company with another Sloop, were attack'd off Porto Cavalley, by Spanish Xebec, Brig, and Galley, and having spent great Part of their Ammunition, were obliged to make the best of their Way, with the Loss of their Consort, of 8 Carriage and 10 Swivel Guns, who sunk before their Eyes; and the Crew, consisting of 45, all perish'd: The three others, after receiving a small Supply of Ammunition, &c. sailed upon another Cruise.

By a Letter from Holland (via Rhode Island,) we learn, That a Brig loaded with Logwood, from some Part of America, is cast away on that Coast; Vessel and Cargo entirely lost; and as none of the Crew had appeared, 'twas thought they all must have perished.

Captain French of the Sloop Mary of this Port, who sailed from hence for Newfoundland about the Middle of April last, writes to his Owners, That being within 20 Leagues of St. Peter's, he met with such prodigious Mountains of Ice, that render'd it impossible for him to make his destin'd Port, and after many Trials, but in vain, was at last obliged to bear away for Cape Breton, where he arrived safe in a few Days after. Capt. French writes farther, that he saw a Brig in great Distress in the Midst of the Ice, and believed she must have been lost.

We hear from Southole, on Long Island, That about three Weeks ago, the Reyd, Mr. John Paine of that Place, was unfortunately shot dead by one Richard Howell, as he fired a Gun across the Road, and, as he thought, at a Deer.

Extra of a Letter from Middletown, in New Jersey, dated May 28, 1753.

As the following Account has not been in any of the public Papers yet, I think it ought to be taken Notice of: It is really Truth, however improbable it may appear, and was discovered but a very few Days ago.

"A Farmer in this Neighbourhood had two Servant Lads, one aged about 11 Years, the other 17, who were commonly sent out to work in the Fields: One Night on their coming home, the Boy was observed to look poorly, and on his being asked what was the Matter, answered, he durst not tell, or it would be the worse for him; but some of the House observing Blood about him, he was strip, and discovered to be in a most deplorable Condition, having the lower Region of his Belly all round his Privities cut and skind off, together

with the Foreskin, and the Whole cover'd over with Athes and Fat to prevent the Bleeding: On his Examination he said, the other lad done it, threatening to kill him if he discover'd the least Hint of it; that he had frequently us'd him very barbarously, and kept him in continual Terror; that when he went to ease himself, the Eldest would force his Excrements down his Throat, and when it caus'd him to vomit, he urined in his Hat, and made him drink it; with other such shocking and astonishing Accounts as were inconceivable and unheard of. On a Surgeon's being sent for, his Life was declared to be in Danger, when the other was committed to Jail, where he now lies, in order to receive his Demerits, if such can be possible. We don't learn that the little One ever gave him any Provocation for such Usage, but that it proceeded from his own wicked Heart."

P H I L A D E L P H I A.

Extra of a Letter from York Town, dated

June 4, 1753.

Last Saturday, near four o'Clock, P. M. the unhappy John Swales was executed, pursuant to his Sentence [for the Murder of John Kelly, mentioned in this Paper, No. 422.] on the Town Land, in the Presence of a large Assembly. He behaved with surprizing Stupidity, and to all Appearance died hardened, impenitent, and dissatisfied with all concerned about his Trial; his Body, after hanging about twelve Minutes, was delivered to his Friends, who carried it to his late Dwelling Place, and there buried it. He made no Confession at the Gallows of any Crimes he might have perpetrated in the Course of his Life, save such as were publicly known before; nor could he be prevailed upon at the Gallows to much as to say the Lord's Prayer.
