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Long Manuscript Requires Funding

Thousands upon thousands of persons descend from Samuel Long (c. 1645-1695), father of 11 children, eight of whom had issue. Edwin "Jack" Long of Richmond generously donated \$2,500 so that the Nabb Research Center could hire graduate student Kathleen Fichtel to work with volunteer Polly Batchelder on the late Dr. Matthew M. Wise's lengthy manuscript chronicling the Long family of the Delmarva Peninsula. Wise spent some 25 years researching the family, and at his death, his widow Nancy donated the unfinished manuscript and notes to the Nabb Research Center. Mrs. Batchelder has been editing the manuscript for several years.

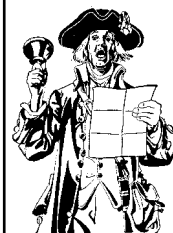

We're History . . . For the 25th Year!

Back in 1981, SU History Department professors Sylvia Bradley and G. Ray Thompson conceived the idea of having an archive which gathered original historical materials not just from Maryland but from Virginia and Delaware as well. A regional historical research center: What a novel idea! There were no others in the U.S. at that time nor for at least a decade later. From a file drawer in Mrs. Bradley's office, the research center has grown over the years into 6,000 feet of operational space today. By 1995, the board of directors of the fledgling archives hired Director Becky Miller. In 1997, the William E. Donner Foundation created an endowment in the memory of Wilcomb E. Washburn, Ph.D. The following year, Dorchester County attorney and philanthropist Edward H. Nabb established a \$500,000 endowment to support the mission of the center and the research facility became the Edward H. Nabb Research Center for Delmarva History and Culture at Salisbury University. 🍀
