Second Semester Starts Feb. 1

According to figures released by the President's Office, State Teachers College anticipates an increased enrollment in both fulland part-time students during the second semester. The enrollment now stands at 375, the second highest enrollment in the history of the College, and it is expected to go higher with additional registrations for night classes.

Enrollment statistics for the current year reveal 154 students in teacher education, 113 in the junior college division, and 108 special students.

New enrollees indicate attendance from Maryland, Virginia, Delaware, New York and Connecticut.

Within the past year represen- | college faculties have held six tatives of the Maryland Teachers meetings under the sponsorship of the State Department of Education for the purpose of considering several recommended changes in the curricula of the five teachers colleges. These meetings were hld on March 4, June 11, 12, and 13, July 20, October 16 and 31, 1953, and on January 8 of 1954. The June 11, 12, 13 and October 31 meetings were workshops and

were attended by more than 100 faculty members representing all of the colleges. A third workshop meeting of the faculties is scheduled for April 3 at the State Teachers College at Towson.

At the Steering Committee meeting of January 8, reports were given by representatives of each college concerning the thinking of the faculties on the types of courses which should be required in general education and in professional education. Four of the colleges reported general but not unanimous agreement that the work in general education could be completed in 65 semester hours, and that 35 hours of professional education would probably be sufficient. This plan would allow all regular students of the four-year course to choose 28 hours of elective courses. A majority of the colleges seem to favor increasing the number of hours of electives over the number allowed at present. 



Comfortable Sitting Richard Ward Martin

To many people a chair is merely a chair, nothing more, nothing less. However, to that unfortunate portion of the population whose posterior is lacking in sufficient padding, chairs take on individuality and sitting in them becomes a highly specialized art.

Starting at the South end of STC and working North, let us take a look at the seating facilities from a viewpoint of comfortable sitting. Our first stop is the Boys' Dormitory. In this building there are three types of chairs. Type One is the study chair, a straight-backed green metal monstrosity with insufficient padding and a crosspiece calculated to grind unmercifully into the two protruding bones in the back of a slim student. 
