Honored Guests Visit STC Campus

During their recent visit to Salsbury, Maryland, the Right Honorable Alfred E. Batt, Mayor of Salisbury, England, and his wife, the Mayoress, were honored at the assembly on September 23 at STC. Dr. Wilbur Devilbiss presided at the assembly.

Following the singing of "God Save the Queen" and "The Star Spangled Banner" the College Chorus, under the direction of Dr. Jessie L. Fleming, sang "To Thee, 0 Country" by Eichberg. Following this selection our President Councilor formally welcomed Batt. Mr. Batt, in a brief reply, expressed his delight in being here and emphasized the walkingtogetherness of the great English speaking people of the world.

Dr. Willis, on behalf of the College faculty, presented a scroll to the Lord Mayor.

Mayoress Batt was then escorted to the platform by William Livingston and presented, along with her husband, tokens of remembrance from Henry Hausdorff on behalf of the student body. Mrs. Batt received a corsage and Mr. the college seal.

The assembly closed with the singing of "America, the Beautiful."

A luncheon given by the College faculty took place immediately after the assembly.

President's Message To Students Delivered In Annual Assembly

On Tuesday, September 17, 1957, Dr. Wilbur Devilbiss spoke at the Annual President's Assembly here at State Teachers College. The speech, which he entitled "Today and Tomorrow," was especially poignant for it excluded none in its challenge to make tomorrow better by today's decisions.

Dr. Devilbiss expressed vividly in his message the importance of an education, with an appreciative attitude for the doors of personal success and reward which college brings within reach. Just as tomorrow cannot be until today is yesterday, so the future cannot bring a fulfillment of the present's dreams and desires unless one does today the things that will eventually bring about a more satisfying tomorrow.

STC Enrollment Data Released by Registrar

STC's enrollment for this year totals 327 full-time students studying under the teacher education and junior college curricula. Two hundred and sixty-six students are enrolled in teacher education.

The women slightly outnumber the men; there are 182 women and 145 men. The enrollment of men for the first semester of last year is exactly the same as it is this year. The freshmen have the largest class, numbering 134; sophomores, 76; juniors, 58; and seniors, 59.

Of this group, 266 are studying for the B.S. degree at this college, and the remaining 61 are in the transfer program.

DR. WILSON H. ELKINS WILL ADDRESS STUDENTS

On Monday, October 7 at 1:45 P.M., Dr. Wilson H. Elkins, President of the University of Maryland, wil' deliver the fall convocation address to the student body. This address, entitled "Price of Excellence," will inaugurate a new type of program at State Teachers College.

Each class will sit in assembly as a body, with those in the senior class proceeding first, and the faculty will be attired in academic robes for the occasion. Dr. Wilbur Devilbiss, President of State Teachers College, will preside and the Student Christian Association will select a student to deliver the invocation. The College Chorus will provide appropriate music.

Dr. Elkins received his primary and secondary education in the public schools at San Antonio, Texas. He received a B.A. degree and M.A. degree from the University of Texas and B. Litt. and Ph.D. from Oxford University where he studied as a Rhodes (Continued on Page 2)
