The Doctor then informed the Public, that the Medicine he had made Use of, was the Turpeth Mineral.

Some Time after the Experiments were made public by Sir Hans in the Philosophical Transactions, Dr. Desault's Dissertation on the Hydrophobia fell into the Hands of Dr. James; from this he had the Satisfaction to learn, as he expresses himself, "That Mercurial Unctions were effectual in preventing and even curing this terrible Species of Madness," and from thence he concludes, "That Mercury, however disguised or prepared, would always have the same salutary Effects."

The Method proposed by Desault, and his Instances brought in Support of the Success, are really so justly striking, that I could wish them a Place in your Paper, and more especially at this Time, when several late deplorable Examples of this dreaded Malady are still recent, and more still to be apprehended.

The Benevolent Dr. James concludes his Observations on the several Methods of Cure, and more particularly on a red Powder brought from Tonguin in the East-Indies, and administered both there and in England with surprizing good Success; upon Examination, those Powders proved to be native and factitious Cinnabar, and it is well known that Cinnabar is made of about three Parts of Mercury to one of Sulphur, so that this seems very strongly to prove the great Efficacy of Mercury in this Distemper.

The Receipt as follows:

Take of native and factitious Cinnabar, of each 24 Grains, Musk 16 Grains, powdered and mixed well together.

It remains that I now give the precise Method, says Dr. James, which I would make Use of, if I should be called to a Person bitten by a Mad Dog.

"First, I would rub into the Place wounded, as soon as possible, a Drachm of Mercurial Ointment, made of 3 Parts of Hog's Lard to one of Mercury, recommended by Desault. I would then give Turpeth Mineral, by Way of Vomit, in a Dose proportioned to the Age and Constitution of the Patient, and this I would repeat more than once at Intervals, which would secure it from raising a Salivation, always remembering to rub the Wound once a Day or oftener, with the Mercurial Ointment; neither should I omit to direct Cinnabar and Musk, in the Manner directed above. Then (I apprehend the Doctor means as soon as it can be done with Security after using the Mercurial Medicines) let the Patient go into cold Water every Morning for a Month, but when, thro' Neglect, any Symptoms of approaching Madness should appear, I would increase the Quantity of Mercurial Ointment, and give Mercury in some Form or other internally in as large Doses, and those as often repeated, as could be done without hazarding a Salivation too precipitate. In both Cases I would recommend the Cold Bath, as a Thing of great Consequence, as soon as ever the Patient can make Use of it without Danger. But in this Case, as in all others, many accidental Circumstances will occur, for which it is impossible to lay down universal Rules; it must therefore be left to the Prudence of a Physician, to guard against and remedy Inconveniences arising from particular Accidents."

I cannot forbear hinting in this Place, altho' I own I have had no Experience to warrant it, but from considering the History and Nature of this Malady, as delivered by Boerhaave, that it is very probable, the present applied Mercurial and antiphlogistic Method now so successfully made Use of in the SMALL-POX, would be attended with the like salutary Effects in this most fatal Disorder. LONDON, May 28.

IN the Warsaw Gazette, of the 23rd is the following Relation: "One Margaret Krasnowska died lately in the Village of Konins, aged 108, being born February 12, 1655. At the Age of 94 she married for her third Husband Gaspard Raykou, of the Village of Ciwoosfin, then aged 104. During the 24 Years which they lived together they had two Boys and one Girl, and what is very remarkable, these three Children bear evident Marks of the old Age of their Father and Mother. Their Hair is already grey, and they have a Vacuity in their Gums, like that which appears after the Loss of Teeth, though they never had any Teeth. They have not Strength enough to live on solid Food, but live on Bread and Vegetables. They are of a proper Size for their Ages, but their Backs are bent, their Complexions are fallow, and they have all the other Symptoms of Decrepitude. Their Father is still alive. These Particulars are certified by the Parish Registers. The Village of Ciwoosfin is in the District of Stenzick, in the Palatinate of Sandomir."

Just 4. We hear the King of Portugal hath settled an Annuity of 2000 Moldores a Month on the Count de Lippe, for his eminent Services to that Kingdom during the War.

Letters from Berlin advise that the Ministry are almost wholly taken up in settling Plans of Oeconomy, to enable the King to keep always on Foot a large Army; and that the raising of Recruits to complete the Companies will not, for the future, be left to the Captains; but that the Recruits will be furnished by the King.

Private Letters from Germany by the last Mail inform us, that the Elector of Mentz's Death was hourly expected; and that the Letters from Turin remark, that the King of Sardinia was still bad; but that his Physicians hoped he would get the better of his Disorder.

Letters by Yesterday's French Mail bring Advice, that a large Ship from Domingo to Bourdeaux, almost loaded with Indigo, and said to be worth 700,000 Livres, is entirely lost. It is said she had on board 150,000 lb. of Indigo.

They write from Hanover, that they had received an Account of the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick's Arrival at Aix-la-Chapelle on the 19th; and these Letters say, that after making Use of the Waters of that Place his Serene Highness would return to Brunswick, his Voyage to England being put off till September.

Jan 6. It is said a Lady of Quality was dressed at the Duke of Richmond's Masquerade, in such a Manner, that which ever Way she turned or moved, she represented a House at the Corner of a Street. [She might have stuck up an Advertisement too, TO BE LET.]

Most of the Nobility, who were at Court on Saturday, were dressed in English Manufactures, as were also their Majesties, and all the Royal Family.

The Illuminations and Fire-Works at the Mansion-House were very grand. The Six Pillars which support the Portico were illuminated with upwards of 4000 Lamps. The Whole was conducted with the greatest Order, and though a vast Concourse of People assembled, we hear of no Mischief being done.

Saturday Evening last, immediately after the Exhibition of the Fire-Works on Tower-Hill was over, the People crowding in great Multitudes thro' Postern-Row, to get home, the Rails, by the extraordinary Pressure, gave Way, and several Persons were pushed down into the Place where the Water runs. Thirteen were taken up dead (besides several much bruised) seven of whom were carried to their respective Homes, and six lay Yesterday at Noon in the Watch-House, in Order to be owned. Among the Number killed were two Women big with Child.

Some Gentlemen of Billingsgate and Bridge Wards, illuminated the Monument at their own Expence. The following Motto appeared in transparent Capitals round the Iron Rails, DIGNITY TO THE CROWN; LIBERTY TO THE SUBJECT. The Gentlemen spent the Evening at the Swan Tavern with many loyal Toasts.

A noble Lord in this City advertised for a Taylor that would undertake to make a Suit of Cloaths out of Two and a Quarter Yards of Broad Cloth, for which a handsome Premium was offer'd; the Advertisement pass'd unnoticed for a considerable Time, and at Length a Journeyman Taylor presented himself to his Lordship, with a Recommendation of being an honest faithful Workman, and desired to undertake the Task, upon which his Lordship furnished the Cloth; and in a few Days the Taylor presented the Coat, completely finished, which fitted his Lordship extremely well; he then cut the Waistcoat out of the Coat and presented that, which also fitted; and then cut the Breeches out of the Waistcoat and presented them, which likewise fitted; his Lordship then asked for his Coat and Waistcoat; upon which the Taylor delivered the Fragments of the Coat and Waistcoat, said that he had made the Suit according to Agreement, and presented his Bill for Payment, which his Lordship discharged without the least Hesitation, to the no small Satisfaction of the Taylor, and Diversion of a Number of Gentlemen who were present on the Occasion. [Query. Which of the Two deserved most to be Laugh'd at, His Lordship or His Taylorship?]

BOSTON, August 12.

We hear from Marblehead, that on Wednesday, the 3d Instant, the House of the Rev. Mr. Barnard was struck with Lightning: It came down the Side of the Chimney, tearing some of the Shingles off the Roof, and ran into the lower Room, ripped up the Wainscotting near the Fire-place, where was a Sconce Glass, and several Brass Knobs, which very evidently diverted the Course of the Lightning; it proceeded to a Closet, and broke some China Ware therein, then went out of the House, just ripping up the upper Part of the Cellar Door. A Bowl which stood in the Closet had a Hole through, the Signess of a Knitting-needle, occasioned by the Lightning. At the same Time a Cooper's Shop was struck in the same Town, the Chimney was beat in close to the Roof; providentially the Workmen just before went out of the Shop, whereby they escaped being hurt.

A more melancholy Effect of the Lightning the same Day was at Reading Precinct: One Mr. Frye of that Place, being in the Room with his Wife, who was standing near the Fire-Place, the Lightning came down the Chimney, which drove the Ashes in such a Manner that it filled the Room. Mr. Frye with Difficulty got to the Hearth, and pulled his Wife out, but found that she was instantly killed.

A few Days ago the House of the Rev. Mr. Weld, of Attleborough, was struck with Lightning; the Fire, resembling a large Ball, came down the Chimney into the lower Room, and made a considerable Explosion: There were a Number of Persons in several Parts of the House, a young Woman, who was in the lower Room, went up to see if any Damage had accrued, but found none, excepting a Quantity of Tow, which lay spread on the upper Chamber Floor, being in Blaze, she taking a Blanket, threw it over the Fire, and extinguished it, and thereby preserved the House from burning.

NEW-YORK, August 22.

GOSHEN, (about 70 or 80 Miles from New-York) August 5. Last Week the following Accident happened in this Place. Several Men having been out upon the Hills, hunting for Deer, in their Return met with a Flock of Partridges, at which 4 Guns were discharged, three of them pretty quick after each other; this being an uncommon Accident in the Place, was mistaken by some of the Inhabitants of the Wall Kill, for the Firing of Indians. Immediately Alarm Guns were fired, and spread over the whole Place, which produced an amazing Panic and Confusion among the People, near 500 Families; some for Haste cut the Harrows of their Horses from their Plows and Carts, and rode off with what they were most concerned to preserve. Some who had no Vessels to cross the River, plunged thro', carrying their Wives and Children on their Backs; some, we have already heard, proceeded as far as New-England, spreading the Alarm as they went, and how far they may go is uncertain.

The Men who were the innocent Cause of the Alarm, informed as many as they could meet with of the Truth of the Case; but they were far from being able to quiet the Disturbance they had raised. Hence it is hoped People will be cautioned, not to be frightened before they are certain of Danger.

About six o'Clock last Wednesday Evening, in a Squall, one of Mr. Watton's Ferry Boats overlet, near Robin's Reef, about three Miles from Staten Island; she immediately sunk down, and every Person on board (being nine in Number) but the Ferry Man, who swam to the Shore, were drowned. Their Names are, Mr. Robert Kennedy, a Scotch Gentleman, and Mr. De Loge, both lately from Saratoga; Mr.

James Anderson, a Scotch Gentleman also, lately from
Medeira; Mr. David Gamel, and one Mr. Morrison,
(both Scotch Gentlemen likewise, the former having resided
here many Years, but the latter only a few Months) Mr.
Chapman, a young Gentleman from Philadelphia, who but
a few Months since inherited an Estate of £. 20,000; Mrs.
Henderson, and Mrs. Reynolds, Wife of Capt. Reynolds
now at Sea; And a Negro Boy belonging to Mr. De Loge.
None of the Bodies of the above-mentioned unfortunate
Persons are yet found, tho' a sharp Look Out has been for
some Days past kept in the Bay for that Purpose; and 'tis
something remarkable, that tho' there were many Boats in
the Bay at the Time the Squall came up, not one of them
received the least Damage, tho' several of them were to
Windward of Mr. Watson's Boat when the overlet.

PHILADELPHIA, August 25.

Extract of a Letter from Lancaster, August 23.

"Just as I had closed my Letter to you, John Hart, an
Indian Trader, arrived here from Pittsburgh, and brings the
following Account, which you may depend upon; That on the
5th and 6th Colonel Bouquet was attacked by the Indi-
ans, and lost and had wounded 120 Men: On the 8th he
arrived at Pittsburgh. The Officers killed are Captain Gra-
ham, and Lieutenant Campbell; Lieutenant Dow wounded.
Mr. Hart declares, the Indians never had so severe a Drub-
bing since they knew the Use of Powder, &c. 20 of their
Great Warriors were found dead, besides a great Number
wounded, and dragged away by their Fellows."

Another Letter, from the same Place, mentions "Colonel
Bouquet's getting to Pittsburgh, with all his Provisions;
and that he had been able to carry all the Wounded with
him to the Fort."

And a Third, "That the Hearing of the Colonel's Arri-
val at Pittsburgh, was as agreeable News to them, as any
they had heard the last War."

Mr. Hart left Pittsburgh the Fifteenth Instant.

Extract of a Letter from Niagara, July 25, 1763.

"Since my last, a Man of the New-Jersey Provincials,
belonging to this Garrison, was scalped within a Mile and a
Half of the Fort, as he was going Express to Fort Schloffer,
a Place about 18 Miles from hence, and where they embark,
after having crossed the Portage. Two Sailors, belonging to
Commodore Loring, have also shared the same Fate, at the
Mouth of Lake Erie, where they had gone to embark for
Detroit."

In a Letter from Carlisle, dated the 13th Instant, it is said,
that some Indians (single) have been lately seen in Shear-
man's Valley; and that on the 13th the Tracks of a Party
were found there, supposed to consist of eight or ten, com-
ing through Shearman's Valley, towards Carlisle, about
twelve Miles upwards.

In another Letter from the same Place, of August 17,
mention is made, that one John Martin, in the Great Cove,
seeing an Indian coming up to a House where he was, fired
at him; upon which the Indian raised a Yell, and took to a
Tree: That Martin imagining there might be more Indians
near him, ran to a Company at Work, and told what had
happened, when they went to the Place, and found some
Blood and Excrements; from which they concluded he was
shot through the Bowels. They followed his Track down to
a Bottom, where they saw the Tracks of six or seven
more; but being a small Party, pursued no further. In the
same Letter it is also said, that a young Man, at a Planta-
tion about nine Miles from Carlisle, near the Foot of the
Mountain, saw an Indian, and fired at him, at about 50
Yards Distance, but was not sure that he hit him; the
Indian took to a Tree, and the Lad went back a little Way,
in order to load again, but on his Return could not find the
Indian. He then alarmed the Neighbourhood; and the Sol-
diers being all out in Parties, covering the People gathering
in their Grain, upwards of Twenty young Men turned out
immediately from Carlisle, to scour the Woods.

From Berks County we have Advice, that on the 16th
Instant, they had Intelligence at Captain Kern's Post, on
the North Branch of Schuylkill, above the Blue Mountain,
of some Indians being seen about eight Miles from thence;
on which a Party was sent out, who found their Tracks,
but could not come up with them: That the same Day they
received further Intelligence that the Enemy were about a
Mile off, when a Party pursued, came up with, fired on
them, and wounded one Indian, who was seen to fall three
times; but there happening to be a severe Gait, they escaped:
That soon after the Indians came within 20 Perches of the
Guard, and carried off some Horses: And that a reconnoi-
tering Party was fired on by them from a Swamp, when our
Men immediately rushed into it, but the Pines and Laurels
were so thick, that they could not find them.

Extract of a Letter from Fort Cumberland, dated August 9.

"I have just received Advice by Express, that this Day
the Savages killed one Captain Staunton, and another Man,
of the Virginia Militia, and wounded three others danger-
ously, at a Fort above Pearlfall's, on the South Branch, but
scaped none. There were eleven Men in the Fort; the
Party of Indians was between Thirty and Forty, three of
whom are thought to be killed. Colonel Stephens will be
here To-morrow with 140 or 50 Men. As he has the
Command of the Militia of several Counties, he has promised
to assist all in his Power, by protecting Bedford and this
Garrison."

By a Person from Fort Augusta, we learn that our People
were all well there, about fourteen Days ago; but that the
Indians, who used to live on the Big Island, on the West
Branch of Susquehanna, were all gone off, excepting one
old Man, and his two Sons, and are supposed to have joined
the other Indians in the War against us.

ANNAPOLIS, September 1.

About a Month or Five Weeks ago, the Wife
of John McKay, a poor Man in Charles County,
near Pamfret, was Delivered of Four Children,
Three Boys alive, and One Girl dead; the least
of which was Eighteen Inches long; but they all
died within a Day after their Birth. It is said
she was not come to her full Time; but met with
some Accident, which brought on a premature
Birth.

Last Night, between IX and XI o'Clock, we
had an Appearance of the Aurora Borealis.

PHILADELPHIA, September 1.

Extra of a Letter from Fort Pitt, August 12.

The Troops, under Col. Bouquet, arrived here the Day before Yesterday. They were briskly attacked by about 400 Savages for Part of two Days, about 25 Miles from this Place, on a long Ridge, where there was not a Drop of Water to be had; you may judge then the Condition our poor People were in: Notwithstanding which, and many other Disadvantages, our Men bravely beat them off, and in the last Push totally routed the vile Miscreants; but as you will probably have the Accounts of these Engagements from the Gentlemen that were in them, I shall say no more than this, that it is the general Opinion, the Troops behaved with the utmost Intrepidity, and the Indians were never known to behave so fiercely. You may be sure the Sight of the Troops was very agreeable to our poor Garrison, being penned up in the Fort from the 29th of May to the 9th Instant, and the Barrack Rooms crammed with Men, Women and Children, tho' providentially no other Disorder ensued than the Small-pox. From the 16th of June to the 28th of July, we were pestered with the Enemy; sometimes with their Flags, demanding Conferences; at other Times threatening, then soothing, and offering their cordial Advice, for us to evacuate the Place; for that they, the Delawares, tho' our dear Friends and Brothers, could no longer protect us from the Fury of Legions of other Nations, that were coming from the Lakes, &c. to destroy us. But finding that neither had any Effect on us, they mustered their whole Force, in Number about 400, and began a most furious Fire from all Quarters on the Fort, which they continued for four Days, and great Part of the Nights, viz. from the 28th of July to the 1st. Our Commander was wounded by an Arrow in the Leg, and no other Person, of any Note, hurt, tho' the Balls were whistling very thick about our Ears. Nine Rank and File wounded, and one Hurling having his Leg broke, was the whole of our Loss during this hot Firing; tho' we have Reason to think that we killed several of our loving Brethren, notwithstanding their Alertness in skulking behind the Banks of the Rivers, &c. These Gentry, seeing they could not take the Fort, shied off, and we heard no more of them till the Account of the above Engagements came to hand, when we were convinced that our good Brothers did us this second Act of Friendship. What they intend next God knows, but am afraid they will disperse in small Parties, among the Inhabitants, & not well defended. We have no late Accounts from Detroit, but hope soon to hear of an important Blow being struck by the Troops lately sent there. The most of the Troops lately come up, are to set out this Day for Ligonier, to escort Artillery, Stores, &c. from thence here. We expect more Troops from your Parts soon. Nothing can be undertaken to annoy the Savages till they come."

Extract of another Letter from Fort Pitt, of the same Date with the above.

"Our little Army, encumbered with a very large Convoy, was furiously attacked on the 5th and 6th Instant, by the main Body of the Indians, at a Place near Bushy Run, very advantageously chosen by a savage Enemy, being surrounded on every Side by rising Grounds, excepting one, and on that by a Morass; but, by the Intrepidity and Coolness of our Men, they were put to Flight, but not without great Loss on both Sides. We formed a Circle round our Convoy and Wounded; upon which the Savages collected themselves, and continued hooping and popping at us all the Evening. Next Morning, having mustered all their Force, they began the War-hoop, attacking us in Front, when the Colonel feigned a Retreat, which encouraged the Indians to an eager Pursuit, while the Light Infantry and Grenadiers rushed out on their Right and Left Flanks, attacking them where they little expected it; by which Means a great Number of them were killed; and among the rest Keekyskung, a Delaware Chief, who the Night before, and that Morning, had been Blackguarding us in English. We lost one Man in the Rear, on our March the Day after."

In other Letters from Fort Pitt, it is mentioned that, to a Man, they were resolved to defend the Garrison (if the Troops had not arrived) as long as any Ammunition, and Provision to support them, was left; and that then they would have fought their Way through, or died in the Attempt, rather than have been made Prisoners by such perfidious, cruel and Blood-thirsty Hell-hounds. Some of the Women in the Fort, it is said helped to defend the Place. Many Expresses, going to and from the Garrison, have been killed.

From Fort Bedford we have Advice, that a scouting Party of Col. Stevens's Volunteers on the Virginia Frontier, towards Winchester, lately fell in with a Party of Indians on Patowmack, about 25 Miles from Fort Cumberland, and routed them, killing and scalping One, wounding several and recovering two Prisoners, and three Scaps, taken four Days before; they took from the Enemy four Rifles, as many Horses as were reckoned worth One Hundred Pounds, and a great Deal of other Plunder; and all without having a Man killed or wounded. We also learn from Bedford, that almost all the Grain, within ten Miles of that Place was reaped and stacked.

ANNAPOLIS, September 8.

On Tuesday the 30th of last Month, Died, to the great Grief of her numerous Relations and Acquaintance, Mrs. ANNA MARIA LLOYD, the virtuous and amiable Consort of ROBERT LLOYD, Esq; and one of the Daughters of the late Honourable RICHARD TILGHMAN, Esq; a Gentlewoman endow'd with every Qualification which could adorn the human Mind, and in every Station in Life an exemplary Pattern to her Sex.

We are informed, by a Letter from Philadelphia, that a Party of 100 Men on their Frontiers, lately met with a Number of Indians, with whom they had a smart Skirmish, and kill'd Ten of them, with the Loss of Four kill'd, and Four wounded.

Monday last Five Men were in Town, who were very flush with [false] Virginia Paper Money: Some Pounds of which they pass'd off here, and in the Neighbourhood. Upon the Discovery of the Cheat, they were pursued, and Yesterday

Morning about 2 or 3 o'Clock, four of them who had taken the Road towards Frederick-Town, the other having gone the Road towards Baltimore, were discovered at a House about 18 Miles off, but when they found that they were follow'd, they made off with the greatest Precipitation, and got into the Woods, two of them leaving their Hats and Indian Stockings behind them, and all four their Horses and Saddles. One of them is a large Roan, branded on the near Buttock with MF join'd in one; another a small bright Bay, branded on the off Buttock A, and on the off Shoulder I, and has some white Hairs on his near Buttock; both with bob Tails: The other Two, are, a large roan Stallion, and a small grey Mare. The Counterfeit Bills which they pass'd, were of Five Pounds, Forty Shillings, and Twenty Shillings, and but very indifferently executed.

Mr. GREEN,



HAVE of late accidentally fallen into several Companies, where the Subject of a Paper Currency has been warmly Debated, and have been Witnesses to the different Opinions which prevail in regard to the Necessity of a new Emission in this Province. As it is an Affair of the utmost Importance to the general Welfare of the Inhabitants, and highly worthy of the most serious Attention, I have taken the Freedom of submitting, through the Channel of your Paper, the few following Queries to the Consideration of your Readers, in which, as I am far from pretending to much acquaintance with the Subject, if I should unfortunately differ in Opinion with any Gentleman of superior Knowledge, I shall, upon conviction of my Error, very readily retract what I may seem to have in Effect advanced, being swayed by no other Motives, than the Love of Truth, and a sincere Regard for the Welfare and Prosperity of the Province.

Query 1st. Is it not a Maxim adopted by the most judicious of our Commercial Writers, that the course of Exchange is the most general and ascertaining Rule, whereby to distinguish whether the Balance of Trade be for, or against, a Country?

2^d. If the Exchange be above the Par, or intrinsic Value of the Money of a Country we Trade with, is it not a plain Argument that the Balance of Trade is on their Side, and that if we cannot repay them by Bills of Exchange on some other Place where the Balance is in our Favor, that it must be remitted them in Bullion, or Specie; as on the contrary, where the Balance of Trade with a Country is in our Favor, that no Man will export Gold or Silver thither, as the Exchange will be a more favorable Remittance than the Coin?

3^d. These Principles being once admitted, Will it not follow, that the large Exportations of Gold and Silver which of late Years have been made from this Province to London, and which, from the present Scarcity of Bills of Exchange are likely still to continue, demonstratively prove, that the Balance of Trade with our Mother Country, not only has been, but is at present, greatly against us; and that we Import more of her Manufactures and other Merchandize, than what the Produce of our Commodities sent there is sufficient to pay for?

4th. As this Balance against us is not likely in future to suffer any Diminution, Must not so continual a Drain of our Specie, supposing the Quantity of Gold and Silver amongst us even Ten Times the Sum it really is, without adequate Supplies from other Branches of our Commerce, occasion soon such a general Scarcity, as to leave us without a Sufficiency for the Exigencies of Trade, and the common Business of the Country? From what other Branches then shall We draw Gold and Silver enough to replace what we thus Export? Will any one undertake to prove from Facts, that our Trades to the *W^{est}-Indies*, *New-York*, *Pennsylvania*, or any other Places, are sufficient to answer this Purpose? If then we are to have no future Emission of Paper Currency, must not this Province either suffer almost a total Stagnation in her Commerce for want of a circulating Medium, or be obliged to increase her Debt to the Merchants in *Great-Britain*, by drawing Bills on them to our Neighbours the *Pennsylvanians*, in Exchange for their Money; and could even this Method be long continued (which would not be the case) must it not in the End bring her to a State of National Bankruptcy?

5th. But admitting, for Argument's Sake, that we should still have Credit in *England* whereon to draw Bills for such Paper Currency as we might be under the Necessity of taking from our Neighbours abovementioned; will any thinking Man seriously recommend so impolitic a Measure? Did not the Want of a sufficient quantity of our own Currency for the Commerce of the Province in the Year 1759, occasion the drawing down upon us an Inundation of their Money, at an Exchange of 50 and 52 $\frac{1}{2}$ per Cent, and has not

great Part thereof been returned to them at 70 and 72 $\frac{1}{2}$, by which has not this Province suffered a clear Loss of 20 l. Currency, for every 100 l. Bill negotiated, as aforesaid, with them, and in the whole to the amount of many Thousand Pounds? Should the Want therefore of a Paper Currency of our own be suffered still to exist, so as to put us under the like Necessity of making use of their Money as a future Medium of Commerce, may it not happen, after we have again bought up large Quantities at an Exchange of 72 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 75, that particular Circumstances in that Province may so govern, as to require new and greater Emissions, so as to raise their Exchange to 100, or even 150, at which last Rates too would not their Money in all probability be return'd to them? Must not then the Price of Gold and Silver rise with them in proportion? What Security have we that such an Event would not happen? But should there exist only a Possibility of it's happening, ought we not in Prudence strictly to guard against every Measure which may, in it's Consequences, be productive of so much Evil to the Province? Would it not be rendering the Welfare of the Province extremely precarious by suffering it to depend so much on the Conduct of our wife and politic Neighbours, and putting it in their Power to exact a most exorbitant Tribute from us whenever they should think fit? Or, is it moreover consistent with sound Policy, thus to support the Wealth and Credit of a Rival Province in Commerce, when it's Inhabitants, from their great Skill and Dexterity in the Management of their Trade and Money, can so easily turn them to their own Interest, and our Ruin?

6th. In such a Scarcity of Gold and Silver as may very justly be apprehended from the general Balance of Trade continuing greatly to our Disadvantage, are not the Difficulties which may arise in Paying the Clergy, Officers, and Public Dues, agreeable to the Inspection Law, deserving of Consideration, as *Pennsylvania* Money will not be taken in such Payments?

7th. Is not the Want of Gold and Silver amongst us, even at this Time, an Evil universally felt and complained of, and have not several Gentlemen remarkable for Lending out large Sums at Interest, been heard to declare the *Demands for Specie were so great that they could not by any means supply them*? Has not moreover the Want of small Money for Exchange in the general course of Business, even when we had much greater Quantities of Gold and Silver than are at present amongst us, been attended with the greatest Inconveniences to the People? If therefore it is good Policy in every Government, to render the Circulation of Property as easy and convenient as may be, by taking every prudent Step for that Purpose, Will it not be thought necessary, that a Proposal for the Substitution of some other Mode for remedying the latter Evil, even supposing that of the former unnecessary, should be laid before the Public for their Approbation, by such Gentlemen who are of Opinion the Province will be in no Want of a future Emission of Paper Currency?

8th. Upon the Whole, if the Maxim is well founded, that Gold and Silver cannot long remain in any Country where the general Balance of Trade is to her Disadvantage, Ought it not fully and satisfactorily to appear to the Legislature of this Province, that the general Balance of Trade is in our Favor, before so Dangerous an Experiment is adopted, as the leaving the Province without a proper Medium to support her Commerce, and to carry on the other necessary Business of the Country?

NEW-YORK, September 5.

A Letter from DETROIT, August 8, 1763.

THE 25th of July, we landed at Sandusky (where the Fort formerly stood) about Break of Day; and instantly marched 2 Sergeants, and 160 Men, with 5 Subalterns, for an Indian Town, that lay about 6 Miles off from the Lake; Capt. Dalsell, and myself, was in this Detachment; I commanded an advanced Guard of Light Infantry, leaving Capt. Grant, of the 80th, to secure our Boats and

Retreat. We came to the Town about 3 o'Clock in the Morning, and directly surrounded it, but could find none of the Enemy there; all that we could do was to burn their Huts, which were made of Bark and bring off some Peltry that the Enemy had hid there; we likewise cut up some Corn, but it is of so small Value, that it is hardly worth mentioning. We returned to our Boats about 8 o'Clock the same Day; and that Night rowed about 5 Miles to an Island, and there encamped. The 27th, in the Morning the Wind blew fair at South to carry us across by the Islands to the Mouth of the River Detroit; and, with a fair Wind, and good Sails, we came to it at 3 o'Clock in the Afternoon, having Distance from Sandusky about 50 Miles. When we came there, I put into Leeward of a small Island, and waited for the Rear; the whole arrived very soon. Capt. Dalsell ordered us to proceed; we got undisturbed to the Horenges Villages, where the Savages fired on both Sides at us, just at the Dawn of Day; but we kept the Center of the River, which is about 600 Yards across. The Indians wounded 2 Men slightly, but killed none; we arrived at the Fort about Sun-rise the Morning of the 28th.

In the Morning of the 30th, a Detachment was ordered to march under the Command of Capt. Dalsell, of 140 Men, with Gray of the 55th, Major Rogers, Capt. Grant of the 80th, Lieuts. Brown, Luke, and Northlow of the 55th, with Lieuts. Bain and Cuyler of the Queen's Rangers, Lieut. M'Dougall, and Ensigns Pauly and Anderson, of the Royal-Americans, Ensigns Anderson and Fisher, with Lieut. Gatchel, of the 55th, with a proper Proportion of Sergeants, Corporals and Drummers, and 8 Volunteers from the Traders, with Monsr. Pabce and Martine, on whose Intelligence we depended. We marched up the River Side, along the Road that led to the Indian Encampment, having on our left Fields of Wheat, and Orchards, and on our Right a sandy Beach to the Water Side, with no other Cover to the Detachment than two Battos, with Swivels in their Bows. In this Manner we marched about a Mile two deep, with an advanced Guard of 25 Men, under the Command of Lieut. Brown, about 20 Yards ahead. We continued our March with fixed Bayonets; the advanced Guard got about the Center of a Bridge we had to cross, and the Main Body just entering of it, we received a Fire from the Houses (of which there were many there) and Hedges in Front, which killed and wounded the greatest Part of the advanced Guard; the Fire we returned in Platoons, and soon after received a Fire from our left Flank; but we marched over the Bridge, and beat the Enemy from the Hedges, &c. by the Assistance of the Boats aforementioned, where we halted the Detachment for some Time, to get the Dead and Wounded on board the Boats, the Indians in the mean Time got between us and the Fort; in this Situation the Detachment was ordered to face to the Right about, and fall in two deep, and retreat slowly, Capt. Dalsell in the Rear with the Light Infantry; in this Manner we retreated, followed by a heavy Fire from the Hedges, Orchards, Houses, &c. keeping close to the Fences that divided the Inhabitants Fields from the Road, and once in a while sent out a Party to beat them back a little; when we had marched Half a Mile, the Enemy came close upon our Right, and attacked us with a heavy Fire; upon which, Capt. Gray was ordered out with his Company, to beat them back, and myself ordered with another Detachment, to take Possession of a House the Enemy had got into, opposite the Center of the Detachment. I took Possession of the House, with some Loss, and Capt. Gray drove the Enemy back from the Fence, but with Loss, himself being wounded. About this Time Capt. Dalsell was killed, and Lieut. Brown wounded; Capt. Gray was brought to the House, and the Rear came up; the Boats fired with their Round and Grape Shot, which by the Help of our Musketry from the House, drove the Enemy to some Distance, and gave me an Opportunity to put Capt. Gray, Lieut. Brown, and several other wounded Men, on board the Boats; which Delay caused the Front and Rear to be divided, by Reason of the Front's marching forward, on which I sent a Messenger to Capt. Grant, to desire him to halt in the Front (as I was then the Commanding Officer of the Party) and marched up with the Rear, followed closely by the Savages, which continued coming closer and closer, in so much that I was obliged to take Possession of another House, which I did with Lieut. Northlow, and Ensign Anderson, and about 30 Men, which was the only Way I could think of to secure the Retreat.

I went forward to acquaint Capt. Grant, that he might secure the Retreat in the same Manner, or as he thought best; which he did, by taking Possession of the Houses; also at this House the whole of the Enemy fell upon me, thinking to force the House, the Boats having gone down to the Fort with the Wounded, and to return directly with a fresh Supply of Men and Ammunition. Here I found them about two Hours, with only the Loss of two Men; they were in Number 200 at least; and they kept up a very brisk Fire through the Windows of the House, which were very large; but I fortified them with Beaver Skins, as there were many in the House, as also the Chamber, beating the Boards off the Roof, and making a Breast-Work with them and Skins. About 8 o'Clock the two Row-Boats came up, one with a 3 Pounder in her Bow; she immediately threw in a Shower of Round and Grape to the Right and Left of the House, to a Barn and some Dens which were there, and drove the Enemy back, with the Help of our Small-arms. This gave us an Opportunity of making our Retreat to the Fort, where we arrived at Half past 5. Capt. Dalsell, our Sergeant, one Corporal, and 19 Men, of this Detachment were killed; Capt. Gray shot through the Body and Wight Arm, Lieut. Brown through the Thigh, Lieut. Luke in the Leg, and 48 Men wounded. Since the above we have had several Skirmishes, but none of any Consequence, having no Men either killed or wounded.

Pindick, who is the Indian Chief, and calls himself King from the Rising of the Sun to the Setting, is encamped 4 Miles above the Fort, where he is well entrenched, and declares he will never leave that Ground till he has got Possession of the Fort."

Another Letter from Detroit, dated August 2, 1763. SINCE my last, from Presque-Isle, I can with more Certainty inform you of the Block-house having been burnt by the Indians; and not only finding the Saps they had made to approach it, and set it on Fire with Torches and Fire Arrows, but we found going along several of their Camps, where they had trimmed and cut our Soldiers Hair. Mr. Christie, who commanded at Presque-Isle, is now here; as likewise Mr. Pauly, of Sandusky; Mr. Slover, of St. Joseph's, and his Garrison.

The 26th we arrived at Sandusky, and the 27th, early in the Morning, we went to attack a little Village about 4 Miles from the Place, where our Block-house used to stand, on the Road to Fort-Pitt; but finding the Indians had left it some Time before, we burnt and destroyed their Huts or Log-houses, ten in Number, and their Corn Fields, found a few Packs of Beaver and Raccoons, to the Value of about 40 Pounds, York Currency, which we carried off, for the Benefit of the Soldiers; as likewise some Bear's Oil, and Indian Corn.

The 28th we came to the River at Detroit, and proceeded up the same in the Night; and a little past the first Inhabitants upon the West Shore, we were fired at by some Indians, in coming by a thick Fog too near the Shore: We fired at them with 4 Swivels till Daylight; and then proceeded in the Middle of the River, they firing from both Sides till near the Fort; we had 30 Privates and 1 Gunner wounded, 1 of them died since, and six more hurt, but got soon better.

The 31st Capt. Dalsell went with a Party of about 450 Men, in hopes to surprise a Party of Indians, who were encamped about 3 Miles up the West Side of the River, wherefore we left the Fort about 2 o'Clock in the Morning, so as to be in their Camp about Day-break; two Boats, in each of them were a Patararo fixed, the size of Three Pounders, were to cover our Front and Rear; but the Party marching too fast, without waiting for the intended Use of the Boats, found themselves fired upon by (as the Canadians say) about 300 Indians, about a Mile and a Half from the Fort, behind a sort of Lines they had made of Cord Wood, belonging to the Inhabitants; not expecting the Enemy so near, and being dark, made our Soldiers consider a little, but being encouraged by Capt. Dalsell, who then got a Wound in his Thigh, after a second Discharge of the Enemy, pushed over a Bridge, upon the other Side of which the Enemy lay, and drove them from their Post; but being dark, Capt. Dalsell halted a little for to see Day Light, and after sending off one of the arm'd Boats with the Dead and Wounded, I am told, ordered to retreat; being foggy the Indians had a great Advantage, in going towards our Rear, and other Posts, or some Piles of Wood, our People were obliged to drive them from. Capt. Dalsell at this Time received another Wound, and a little after another, it is said through his Body, made him fall, and was left with seven more Soldiers in the Field; at the same Time, Capt. Gray of the 55th, was wounded through his Arm and Belly, Lieut. Brown through his right Thigh, and Lieut. Luke through his left Calf of the Leg. The enclosed is a List of the Party, when they went out, and likewise the Killed and Wounded.

We are unlucky in our Parties being always discovered, and the Enemy knowing every Thing we are doing in the Fort.

We have twice since endeavoured to ambush them, but miscarried as yet, though all possible Precaution was taken in going out, and in ordering the Parties, without the Knowledge of the Inhabitants.

The Savages, who, since this Affair, have been reinforced, continue in their former Encampment; but can make no Impression on the Fort, as the Garrison have ample Supplies of all Kinds.

Great Part of the Reinforcements that are ordered to the Detroit, must be well advanced by this Time; and, we trust, we shall soon have the Pleasure of giving the Public an Account not only of their Arrival, but of their Success in clearing the Country of the Barbarians, as well as punishing them so severely, that they shall never dare to attack any of our Settlements hereafter.

Yesterday the Marlborough Transport, with a Number of Officers, belonging to the different Regiments now in America, sailed for London.

Saturday last the Sloop Cornwallis, Capt. Ramsay, arrived here in 23 Days from Halifax: He says the Indians are very peaceable in that Quarter; and that the Reports we lately had from thence of their beginning to be troublesome, was no more than a Contest that happened between an Inhabitant of the Township of Cornwallis, and two or three Indians that had shot a Goose belonging to the former; and he for Satisfaction killed one of their Dogs. But the Matter was soon amicably adjusted.

PHILADELPHIA, September 3.

Extract of a Letter from Fort Cumberland, dated August 29. "I now transmit you an Account of our most material Occurrences with the Enemy since my last, in which I mentioned an Attack the Indians made at one Kuykendall's Fort, on the South Branch of Patowmack, from which they were beat off. They then immediately divided themselves into three Parties; one of which, a few Days after, killed one Person, and took two others Prisoners, on the Waters of Cape Canby; an Account of which was brought to Capt. Crawford, who, with 28 Volunteers, was marching to this Place from the South Branch; upon which he and his Par-

ty returned, took the Tracks of the Enemy, pursued them about 60 Miles, overtook them, killed and scalped one Indian, retook two Prisoners, one of which wounded, and got eleven Horses, and considerable other Plunder; all which he brought to this Place. Two Days after Capt. Crawford's Return, there was Advice brought of eleven Indians being in the Parts, when one Capt. McCullough, then here, with about 30 Volunteers, went out on a Scout, to the second Crossings of Youghioughanna, where they fell in with three Indians, whom they fired upon, killed one, and released a Justice of Peace they had made Prisoner, and got several Horses, and other Plunder. These were two of the Parties into which the Enemy had divided themselves, after they left Kuykendall's Fort; the third Party went down within eight Miles of Winchester, where they took ten Prisoners, and killed several Persons; and, by one of the Prisoners, who made his Escape from them about Twenty Miles above this, and came in, we are informed, that they had taken one more Person, and killed another, from Parterson's Creek, on their Way out, and had with them Twenty-one Horses, all heavily loaded. A Party from the South Branch is after them."

In a Letter from Fort Bedford, about the same Date with the above, it is said, that the Indians were much quieter then than they had been for some Time before; and that it was thought they began to dread the Consequences of the horrid Cruelties they had been guilty of.

Extract of a Letter from a Gentleman, who went out with a Party of Volunteers from Lancaster County, for the Great Island, on the West Branch of Susquehanna, dated Sept. 1.

"Last Friday, at Five o'Clock in the Afternoon, we had the Happiness of meeting a large Party of the Great Island Warriors at Munley Creek Hill, on their Way to the Frontiers of this Province. They had the first fire on our Advance Party, which was forced back on our Front, and, pursuing, engaged us briskly for some Time; but as we disposed of the Party so much to their Disadvantage, after Half an Hour's hot Firing, they were obliged to run, with considerable Loss. I killed two myself, and saw several others fall, by the good Behaviour of our Men. John Clemons, Alexander Scott, James Chambers, and James M'Laschan, were killed in the Engagement, and four others wounded, whom we brought in with us. We hid the Killed, so that the Indians did not get one Scalp. We brought in four Scalps, and killed at least six more of the Enemy, but did not think it prudent to follow and scalp them, for fear of some of the Indians falling in with our wounded Men. We lost several Horses."

In other Letters from Lancaster County it is said, That the Indians were seen dragging off several of their Dead and Wounded, but that it was thought not proper to follow them too far, being in the Enemy's Country: That the next Day our Party was attacked twice by the Indians, but beat off without any Loss: That some of our Men came to a Fire, where there were three Indians, whom they killed and scalped; they had some Indian Goods with them: That they brought in some Rifles, and other Plunder, and were in high Spirits, having beat 50 Indian Warriors, notwithstanding they had the first Fire at them: That if they met with proper Encouragement, they would immediately go out again against the Enemy, who, it was thought, might return to revenge their Loss, having at least ten or fifteen of their Men killed: And that the Preventing that Party coming down at that Time on the Frontiers, must have been a Service of the utmost Consequence to the Province; as thereby a great Deal of Blood, in all probability, was prevented from being shed, and some Hundreds of Families kept on their Places, which otherwise must have been drove off. It is said the Indians fought all naked, and were painted black. Our Party, we hear, consisted of 120 Men.

ANNAPOLIS, September 15. Last Week in Baltimore Town, as two athletic young Men were trying their Strength and Skill in Wrestling, for a Dollar, they both fell together; but it prov'd a very dolorous and fatal Fall to one of them, Mr. James Sollers, for the Bone of one of his Arms split, and came quite thro' his Flesh and Cloaths: It was afterwards cut off near the Shoulder, but a Mortification ensued, and he Died soon after.

We hear from Frederick-Town, in Frederick County, that an Orphan Lad there, being out with a Gun a few Days ago after Pigeons, it accidentally went off and kill'd him on the Spot.

On the 25th of August last, Mrs. PRISCILLA FENDALL, (Wife of BENJAMIN FENDALL, Esq: of Charles County,) departed this Life, aged 49 Years; her Death is greatly lamented by all who had any Acquaintance with her; as a Parent she was loving, and tender to her own Issue, and affectionately so as a Mother-in-Law; as a Wife amiable and endearing to her several Husbands; as a Mistress void of Severity and harsh Usage; as a Neighbour ready on all Occasions to perform all benevolent Offices to the utmost of her Power; and as a Christian strictly observant of her Religious Duties, and charitably disposed to relieve the Poor and Distressed.

PROVIDENCE, September 3.

A Gentleman lately arrived from Surinam, informs us, That the Insurrection of the Negroes at the Dutch Settlement at Berbice, was intirely quelled, and every Thing would soon be restored to its former State; great Numbers of the rebellious Negroes have been put to Death, for the future Security of that Place.

NEW-YORK, September 12.

By an Express arrived on Saturday last, we learn, that Fort Detroit still held out strongly against the Savages; and that they were no Ways likely to succeed in their Attempt, notwithstanding they came well provided for the Attack.

By Letters from London we learn, that an unexceptionable Coalition of Parties would soon take Place there; and that all former Heats and Animosities on either Side would be buried in Oblivion.

PHILADELPHIA, September 15.

On Monday last an Express arrived from Reading in Berks County, with the following Intelligence, viz.

"That on Thursday last, about two o'Clock in the Afternoon, eight Indians came armed to the House of John Fincher (one of the People called Quakers) about a Mile distant from a Party of Capt. Kern's, consisting of Six Men, commanded by Ensign Sheffer, and about 24 Miles from Reading, over the Blue Mountains: That said Fincher, his Wife, two Sons, and Daughter, immediately went to the Door, and asked them if they would eat any Thing, hoped they were come as Friends, and entreated them to spare their Lives: That, however, after some Deliberation, they killed Fincher, his Wife, and two Sons, the Daughter said to be missing; but as she was heard screaming by some of the Neighbours, and crying Murder, it is feared she is likewise killed: That a little Boy made his Escape from the Savages, and came to the Ensign, who immediately went to the Place with his Party, but the Indians were gone, and finding, by their Tracks, which Way they went, pursued them to the House of one Nicholas Miller, where he found four Children murdered, the Enemy having carried off two others with them; but that said Miller, and his Wife, being at Work in a Field, saved their Lives by Flight, the Man being pursued near a Mile by one of the Indians, who fired at him twice: That our Party still pursued, and soon came up with the Enemy, and fired on them, which they returned; but the Soldiers rushed on them so furiously, that they quickly ran off, and left behind them two Prisoners, two Tomahawks, one Hanger, and a Saddle; three of their Number being badly wounded: That the two Prisoners recovered, were two of the above-mentioned Miller's Children, which they had tied together, and drove them before them: That the Persons murdered were all scalped, except a Child about two Weeks old, which they, in the most cruel Manner, dashed to Pieces against the Wall: That the Number killed over the Mountains was eight, and two missing: And that the Inhabitants had all come on this Side, and were in the utmost Distress.

"That as the Express was setting off from Reading, certain Information was brought there, that the House of Frantz Hubler, in Bern Township, about 18 Miles from Reading, was attacked on Friday last, by the Indians, when Frantz himself was wounded; his Wife, and three Children, carried off; and three others of his Children scalped alive, two of whom are since dead."

Since our last arrived here an Express from Fort Bedford, which he left the Seventh instant. By him there is Advice, that all was well at Pittsburgh: That Capt. Hay, with the Convoy from Ligonier, had got safe there: That there had been no Disturbance from the Indians in that Quarter, since Col. BOUQUET's Victory over them: And that every thing was likewise very quiet in Cumberland County, where there seemed to be a noble Spirit, many brave Men being ready to go out in the Service of their King and Country, if properly encouraged.

Extra of a Letter from Fort Cumberland, Sept. 3.

One Henry Adams informs me, that he was Yesterday at John Forman's Fort, about 30 Miles from this Place, on the South Branch, when an Express arrived there from Fort Pleasant, who informed, that Capt. Luke Collins, with some Men,

had followed a Party of Indians to Cheat River, one of the main Branches of the Monongahela, where he overtook them, and killed six of their Number; took 11 Guns, 14 Shot Pouches, several Horses, and a large Quantity of other Plunder, to the Amount of One Hundred Pounds, or more, exclusive of the Horses: He also released a Son of Capt. John Walton's from the Enemy. It is remarkable, that not one of the Guns taken from the Indians was loaded, and, when attacked, they were barbecuing a Buffalo, not thinking of Danger. It appears that their Party did not consist of above Eleven, some of the Shot Pouches being taken from the Inhabitants."

ANNAPOLIS, September 22.

The General Assembly of this Province is to meet here on the first Day of next Month.

Last Week there was found stuff'd in the Pad of one of the Saddles left by those Men (formerly mentioned) who pass'd off so much of the Counterfeit Virginia Money, upwards of Forty false Forty Shilling Bills, dated MDCCCLXII.

Extra of a Letter from Col. Adam Stephen, dated the 30th of last Month, to Henry Lee, Esq; County-Lieutenant of Prince-William, in Virginia.

"I am sorry to acquaint you, that we are constantly harra's'd with Parties of Indians amongst us, either in Hampshire or Frederick. I am just returned from an Expedition towards the Allegany, and round all the Frontiers of Hampshire, in which we have taken two Scalps, recovered three Prisoners carried off by the Savages, and, according to their Information, and our own Opinion, kill'd five more Indians that we could not scalp. I am obliged to apply to you, Sir, for a Detachment of your Militia, consisting at least of one Captain, one Lieutenant, one Ensign, and five Sergeants, and Sixty Rank and File; and I must request you to have them well appointed with Arms and Ammunition, and dispatch them to Winchester with the greatest Expedition, where I shall wait to give them further Orders."

The Earl of Halifax Packet, Capt. Jeffery, failed from hence Yesterday, with the Mail for Fal-mouth.

We hear from Albany, That about the Beginning of this Month, Sir William Johnson was greatly engaged in a Congress with the Five Friendly Tribes; who signified their hearty Inclinations to the English, assuring him of their Endeavours to reconcile the distant Tribes to the same Interest.

Extract of a Letter from the Havana, dated Aug. 7. "The Spaniards are busy in fortifying this Place, 3000 Negroes are employed daily in clearing the high Ground near the Moro; where they intend to build a strong Fort: Most of the Deserters from our Army came here a few Days after General Kepple failed; they hoped to have been Time enough to be pardoned, but were too late, and are now in the most wretched Way, being despised even by the Spaniards, who deny them the common Necessaries of Life; for my Part I own I never was so much moved as when some I knew, told me of their Misery and Repentance; it is said they will be sent to the Mines, and there employed during the Remainder of Life: What a Pity it is, so many brave Men should bring eternal ruin on themselves."

PHILADELPHIA, September 22.

On the 15th Instant put into this Port, in Distress, the Snow Saville, John Shield, Master, belonging to Hull, where she was bound with a Loading of Naval Stores from Cape-Fear, which Place she left the 31st ult. It is thought she must be all unloaded, to come at, and stop, her Leaks.
