BERLIN, February 14.

E hear that the different Parties who assume the Distinction of Confederates of Poland, dare not approach the Confines of the King's Dominions, either on the Side of the Marche or that of Silesia.

COPENHAGEN, Feb. 26. The Affairs of the North begin to take a serious Turn. The Emperor of Russia requires her Allies to furnish her the stipulated Succours either in Men or Money. As our Kingdom is among the Number of her Imperial Majesty's Allies, we are bound to send her 6000 Men, or 60,000 Crowns every Year, during the War. As so large a Sum might disorder our Finances, the Court has resolved to pay her Contingent in Men. His Majesty has therefore ordered Six new Regiments to be raised in Norway, Five of Infantry, and one of Dragoons. The Army in Denmark has also been augmented with 16 Battalions.

Eight Ships of War, and Two Frigates, are ready to sail, and it is thought, that Squadron is also destined for Russia.

LONDON, February 11.

A Letter from Jamaica says, "By the Accounts received here from the Havanna, the late Hurricane there destroyed, on a moderate Calculation, 96 public Edifices; among which are reckoned the great Cathedral, the Custom-House, the great Tobacco Magazine, St. James's Fort, the principal Jail, and the Convent of St. Augustine, besides 4048 Houses. What is very remarkable, not above 110 Persons were buried in the Ruins, though a great Number of Lives have been lost in the Plantations. Sixty-Nine Ships were run on Shore, most of which were entirely beat to Pieces: The Hurricane began on the 15<sup>th</sup> of October last, at the South End of the Island of Cuba, and died away in the North. The Distress of the poor Inhabitants was inexpressible, and the Behaviour of the Archbishop of St. Domingo, and the Bishop of Cuba, highly commendable. These benevolent Men went in the midst of the Storm, encouraging the People, and invoking the Mercy of the Almighty. The rest of the Religious also exerted themselves upon this Occasion in an uncommon Manner. The Convents were open to every one; and the unhappy Sufferers were entertained in them with the greatest Hospitality, 'til their Houses were made habitable."

Several English young Noblemen, and Gentlemen, are preparing, we hear, to embark for Germany, in their Way to Russia, in order to join the Russian Army, as Volunteers, and make a Campaign against the Turks.

Feb. 16. Letters from Leghorn mention, that Three of Paolo's Privateers had fallen into the Hands of the French, in Consequence of the Victory over the Corsicans.

The Writer of a Letter, published this Morning, addressed to the Livery of London, observes, That the Nation is indebted 140 Millions; and that to pay the Interest of this Sum, all the Necessaries of Life are most grievously burthened with Taxes; he therefore advises the Livery to instruct their Members again, and to add this new Article to those in their former Instructions, viz.

"Inquit, says he, on their enquiring by what Right the East-India Company presume to withhold the Asiatic Territories from his Majesty, whose Beneficence is ready to apply them to the Ease of his Subjects, and the reinstating the Power of his Kingdoms, if they are found to be unjustly retained, which I am confident is the Truth; there will then result to Government, the clear annual Revenue of at least Three Millions; and these applied to the raising Money by Annuities, or in what other Method the Legislature shall think fit, will necessarily alleviate a Multitude of the present Taxes in a very short Time, and the whole of them in no long Duration. The Duties on Beer, Coals, Candles, Soap, Salt, Leather, and a Variety of others, which are most oppressive on the Poor, may be speedily removed; the Trade and Manufactures of the Kingdom will be revived, and the Nation empowered to look every Enemy in the Face, with the Consciousness of sufficient Strength to support a War, and to carry their native Bravery into Execution."

March 8. Authentic Advices from France say, that several Thousand Soldiers have been embarked lately from Bourdeaux, and other Ports of that Kingdom, for the French Settlements in the West-Indies, Africa, &c. and that there are more Ships of War at present on the Stocks in France, than at any Time since the Peace of 1763.

March 14. A Correspondent from Stafford informs us, that some Years ago, while the Rector of a Parish in that County was gathering his Tithes at a Farm House, the Farmer having Eleven Children, told him, he ought to take the Eleventh Child, which the Clergyman immediately consented to, and brought it up at his own Expence; and when the Clergyman died, he was inducted into the Living, which he at this Time enjoys, worth, together with the Free-School, 120l. per Ann.

March 20. We hear that before the 13<sup>th</sup> of April next, the Day fixed on for another Election for a great County, a Petition will be presented to a great Personage, by a very considerable Number of the Freeholders

in Behalf of a popular Gentleman; and also relative to some Matters concerning themselves, which are to be urged in the most dutiful Manner possible.

March 21. Parties run so high in Sweden, that they are sending Expresses to the different Courts of Europe to recal all the Members of their different Assemblies, against the approaching Dyet: Last Week one of their Members was sent for from Bath on that Occasion, and was allowed but a very few Hours before he set out for Stockholm.

March 24. On Wednesday Night the Fifteen Persons who had been taken up for behaving in a riotous Manner at St. James's, were examined before the Board of Green-Cloth; when Ten of them were discharged, and Five committed to Tothill-Fields Bridewell.

Extract of a Letter from Vienna.

"By the Affiduity of Lord St., the English Ambassador here, your British Politics may take a more favourable Turn than could ever have been expected. Notwithstanding the Dauphin of France is contracted to one of the Archduchesses, yet are we joined with Prussia to recover Lorraine and Alsace against that very incroaching and ambitious Enemy: Should this Country be ever again united to Austria, France would soon become a very pitiful Power, compared to what she now is. An Attack on Alsace will be a most favourable Diversion on the Part of Great-Britain, whether by Accident or Design. The French, believe me, will find Business enough on their Hands to defend this Country of theirs, even though filled with such Fortresses as seem impregnable."

To the Gentlemen, Clergy, and Freeholders of the County of MIDDLESEX.

GENTLEMEN,

I had not experienced your unwearied Zeal for Liberty, and the Defence of the fundamental Rights of the Subject, I should feel some Uneasiness in being now obliged, by a Third Expulsion, to beg the Favour of you to attend so soon again at Brentford, to support your former Choice. But I know you have the Cause of your Country at Heart, and that you glory in every Opportunity of convincing the World, that you will never give up your Title to a free Election. If you tamely suffer this most valuable Right of chusing your own Representative in Parliament to be taken from you, or rendered of no Effect, you must not expect that the Enjoyment of any manner, or more inconsiderable Franchise, will be long permitted. The Spirit of every Englishman revolts at the very Idea, and the Freeholders of Middlesex have always firmly stood foremost in the Day of Trial, however severe and perilous.

ST. JAMES'S, March 6.

The following ADDRESS of the Lord-Lieutenant and Nobility, High-Sheriff, Grand-Jury, Gentlemen, and Clergy of the County of Essex, was this Day presented to his Majesty, by Daniel Matthews, Esq; High-Sheriff of the said County, being introduced by the Lord of his Majesty's Bed-Chamber in Waiting; which Address was most graciously received.

To the KING's most excellent MAJESTY,

The humble ADDRESS of the Lord-Lieutenant, and Nobility, High-Sheriff, Grand-Jury, Gentlemen, and Clergy, assembled at the Assizes held at Chelmsford, in, and for the County of Essex, on Thursday the Second Day of March, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-nine.

Most gracious SOVEREIGN,

WHILST we feel the happy Effects, and retain in our Breasts a most grateful Sense of the Mildness and Benignity of your Majesty's Government, we cannot see, without the utmost Abhorrence, the Spirit of Sedition and Licentiousness, which has lately manifested itself in various Shapes, with Design to lessen the Respect and Affection due to your Majesty, to traduce and misrepresent your Parliament, and to draw into Contempt the Authority of the Courts of Justice, which in no Time were more happily, or more eminently supplied.

Every Part of the Conduct of these Disturbers of the public Repose, appears to us as weak and unreasonable, as it is wicked; yet we think such Proceedings, if not timely checked, may operate to subvert the Constitution, and destroy that Liberty, which has been made the specious but false Pretence for committing Outrages of the most dangerous and alarming Kind.—Already the Metropolis hath been frightened from its Security; your Majesty's Repose in the Seat of your Government hath been most insolently invaded, and the lawful Administration of Justice violently obstructed. It therefore becomes our Duty, as Friends to the Constitution, and faithful Subjects to your Majesty, to lay these our Sentiments at the Foot of your Throne, relying, with the firmest Confidence, on your Majesty's Wisdom and Justice, for the Exertion of such prudent and vigorous Measures as may restore Peace and good Order amongst

us. And we do assure your Majesty, that being fully persuaded, that the Preservation of the public Tranquillity, and our own Safety, are inseparable from the Security of your Majesty's Government, we are determined, at the Risk of our Lives and Properties, to support your royal Authority in suppressing and subduing all seditious and riotous Attempts, which threaten Destruction to the State, and disturb the Happiness and Honour of your Reign."

KINGSTON, (JAMAICA) April 6.

By a Vessel which arrived on Monday last from Hispaniola, we have an Account of some very extraordinary Disturbances in that Island. It seems, the Number of regular Troops not being very considerable, the Count d'Estaing, who was lately in the Government, had subjected the Inhabitants to Military Duty, and established such strict Discipline, as rendered it entirely burthensome. Whether the Count acted herein by Orders from his Court, does not appear; but, it is said, that upon an Offer from the Inhabitants of the Sum of Seven Millions of Livres, he undertook to procure from France a sufficient Number of regular Forces, to relieve them from such kind of Service in future; and this Sum was accordingly paid, but whether any Troops arrived in Consequence thereof, we are not informed. It appears, however, that the Inhabitants were relieved for a Time, from the Severity of Military Discipline, 'til the Prince de Mombailfon, the present Governor, lately thought proper to summon the Inhabitants to perform Duty as formerly, which they absolutely refused to do, and upon the Prince's endeavouring to compel them by Force, took to Arms in their Defence, and defeated the regular Troops in Two different Engagements, so that when the above Vessel sailed, every Thing was in the utmost Confusion and Disorder.—This is the best Account we have been able to procure of the Matter, but as soon as a more full and perfect Relation shall arrive, we shall lose no Time in laying it before our Readers.

BOSTON, May 4.

It has been reported, that Lieutenant General Sir Jeffery Amherst, Colonel of the 3<sup>d</sup> Regiment of Foot, would be appointed Commander in Chief of his Majesty's Forces in America, and Governor of this Province; it has also been reported, that Lieutenant General Studholme Hodgson, Colonel of the 4<sup>th</sup> Regiment, will be appointed to the said Command, and to the Government; while others report, that his Excellency Thomas Pownall, Esq; formerly Governor of this Province, will again be appointed to this Government; but we do not learn whether there is any Foundation for any of these Reports.

May 8. Last Friday the Freeholders, and other Inhabitants of this Town, legally warned, met at Faneuil-Hall, and there made Choice of the following Gentlemen to represent them in the General Assembly at the approaching Session.—The Number of Voters being 508.

The Hon. JAMES OTIS, Esq; - - - 502

Previous to the above Choice, the following Vote was passed, *Nemine Contradicente, viz.*

Voted, That the Town, before they proceed upon the Business of this Day, do make, or order to be entered upon their Records, the following Declaration of their Rights and Freedom of their Elections, *viz.*

The Select-Men having acquainted the Town, that they had waited on General MACKAY, Commander of his Majesty's Forces quartered here, to Inform him; that the Choice of Persons to represent this Town in the General Assembly was coming on, and to claim in Behalf of the Town the full Right of British Freeholders and Subjects upon so important an Occasion, founded on the Principles of the British Constitution.—The Select-Men having also acquainted the Town, that the General had declared, that it was not in his Power to march the Troops out of the Town upon this Occasion, or any further to comply with their Claim, than by confining the Troops to their Barracks, which he engaged to do.

The Town, tho' they receive this Answer as a Concession of the Rectitude of the Claim, yet as the Measure of confining the Troops to their Barracks, and not removing them out of Town, is by no Means adequate to the Extent of their constitutional Right, they cannot proceed to an Election, without declaring their clear and full Sense, that the Residence of armed Forces in the Town, during an Election of so great Importance, is a high Infringement of their constitutional Rights; protesting, that their proceeding to an Election under such a Circumstance, is wholly from Necessity, and not to be considered as a Precedent at any Time hereafter, or construed as a voluntary receding from the incontestible Rights of British Subjects and Freeholders, on so interesting an Occasion.

May 11. We hear that Capt. Shand's Vessel, that arrived at Providence last Week from London, is fully loaded with Goods; but we are informed, from good Authority, that there is not a single Package on board her for any Merchant in this Town.

His Majesty's Ships Romney and Hussar sailed last Sunday, for Halifax. The Commodore's Broad Pennant is now hoisted on board the Rippon, which is the only King's Ship now in this Harbour.

We hear that the Detachment of the 59<sup>th</sup> Regiment, commanded by Captain Wilson, are to embark for Halifax this Week.

NEW-YORK, May 15.

By Order of the Committee of Merchants in New-York.

WHEREAS in August last an Agreement was made not to import any Goods from Great-Britain (a few Articles excepted) that should be shipped after the First of November, until an Act of Parliament laying Duties on Paper, Glass, &c. for raising a Revenue here should be repealed, and that, if any Goods should come on Consignment, or other Ways, contrary to the Agreement, they should be put into a public Store, there to lie until Goods were generally imported; and further, that if any selfish Person among us, or Strangers, should come and import Goods, and not comply with the Agreements, such Person and Persons should be deemed Enemies to this Country. And as several Vessels have lately arrived and brought some small Parcels of Goods, most of which on Examination, appear to have been sent contrary to Orders, and those to whom they are consigned, have generally ordered them into a public Store; but there is One or Two Persons, whose Names it may be needful hereafter to mention, if they persist, who as yet refuse to order their Goods into the said Store. And it is now hoped that all Persons whatever, the LADIES in particular, whose Conduct may have great Influence, will route and show their public Spirit and Virtue, in maintaining the Agreement entered into for the Public Good by not having any Connection with any such selfish People; and that they will not buy from them, or any others who may purchase from him or them, any Goods that they have now imported, or have on Hand, but deem them obnoxious, and hold them in the Contempt they deserve, let their Station in Life be what it will.

I do hereby give this public Notice to those who are prepossessed with such a Notion, that they will find, by that Deed, made to the Creditors, that the Deed of Trust is taken Notice of in it, and I shall send up to the said Office, a Copy of the Deed made by the Trustees to the same Gentlemen, of all their Right and Title to the Estate made over to them, after the Deed of Trust was executed by them. 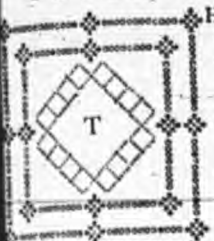

PETERSBURGH, February 24.

THE Court has received Advice, that the Tartars, having attempted to invade the Province of this Empire in Two different Places, had been repulsed with Loss.

HAGUE, March 19. A Letter from Constantinople, from very good Hands, assures again, that the Divan would have assented to the Representations made by several of the foreign Ministers for a Reconciliation with Russia, if they did not fear an Insurrection of the People, who call out loudly for beginning the Operations of War.

CASAL, March 2. It is reported that there has been a fresh Engagement in Corsica, much more bloody than that of the 14th of last Month, and that the Malecontents had re-taken Barbaggio and Patrimonio from the French.

STOCKHOLM, March 14. The 9th of this Month the Royal Family were inoculated for the Small-Pox, upon the English Plan.

PARIS, March 24. It is certain, that a Treaty of Alliance, offensive and defensive, was signed a few Days ago by our Monarch, with the Queen of Hungary, the King of Spain, and the King of Prussia.

L O N D O N,

March 27. On Lieutenant Colonel Luttrell's publishing his Intentions of standing for the County of Middlesex at the ensuing Election, an Express was immediately dispatched to the Hon. Sir John Danvers, Bart. at his Seat in Leicestershire, to acquaint him that a great many Gentlemen of very considerable Property in the County of Middlesex, whose Party Principles seemed, 'til within these few Days, utterly irreconcilable, were now, by mutual Agreement, actually forming themselves into a *joint Coalition*: that they requested his Assent to their putting him in Nomination for the County, as a Gentleman eminently qualified for so important a trust, and against whose public or private Character, neither Party could make any real Objection. The Return of the Express is hourly expected, when proper Measures, it is judged, will be taken by the *joint Coalition*, to accommodate all the Freeholders in the Interest of Sir John Danvers, with Saddle Horses, &c. on the Day of Election.

We hear that most of the Gentlemen, Merchants, and Citizens of London, who waited on his Majesty with their Address on Wednesday last, who are Freeholders of the County of Middlesex, have promised to give their Votes for Col. Luttrell, on the Day of Election at Brentford.

It is reported that a Gentleman possessed of near a Thousand Pounds a Year, was taken as a Rioter last Wednesday, and has been refused Bail, tho' many People of Credit and Fortune have offered to enter into Recognizance for his Appearance for very large Sums.

Friday died, at Hammer Smith, the Right Hon. James Oswald, one of his Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council.

Extra of a Letter from Copenhagen, Feb. 15.

Our amiable Sovereign, since his Return to his Dominions, has determined to increase the Fleet and Army of Denmark. Many Ships of the Line are equipping with the utmost Expedition, and very considerable Levies are making in every Part of the Danish Territories. The Fortifications of Cronenburg, near Elsinore, about 20 Miles from Copenhagen, will soon be rendered impregnable. Twelve Hundred Men are daily employed upon the Works of that important Fortress which commands the Pass of the Sound. A treble Battery, forming Three Lines of the largest Pieces of Brass Ordnance, is now erecting to the Sea Side; the lowest Battery consisting of Sixty Cannon, each carrying a Ball of 48 Pounds, commands a Fire just above the Level of the Water. The Men fire under Cover, the Embrasures being lined with Cafemates on the Inside. It is said, these immense Batteries, with a certain Disposition of Ten Ships of the Line, will not only render the Pass of the Sound impracticable for any Fleet, but must, from the incessant Stream of firing upon a single Point, instantly sink any Man of War that may attempt it. We are told these great Military Preparations are occasioned by the French being determined to send a Fleet into the Baltic, with Twenty-four Battalions, to assist their Ally of Sweden, for the Establishment of arbitrary Government in that Country: A political Weed, which the Ministers of France love to cultivate and transplant, though neither the Soil nor Climate of the North is fit for it. Such an Exotic will require much forcing upon the Banks of the Baltic; and this Species of French Gardening we trust will be nipt in the Bud by the Keenness of our Conduct and Climate. Military Government is natural to the martial Disposition of the Northern Nations; but arbitrary Government, contrary to Justice, Nature, and Humanity, we trust is confined to that Indolence, Supineness, and Servility, which are the spontaneous Growth of a Southern Climate."

They write from Warsaw, that a Division having arisen between Two Chiefs of the Confederates, who each commanded about Three Hundred Men, they

attacked each other with so much Fury, that scarce Twelve Persons were left alive. Thus this little League was destroyed by its own Hands. *Amsterdam Gazette.*

Some Letters from Lisbon mention, that an Account has been received that the Portuguese Forts of Mazagan in Africa had been taken by the Moors.

The Olive Branch, Tingley, from New-York, is arrived at Plymouth.

A very extraordinary Number of Sailors have this Season been employed by the Government, the East-India, the Baltic, Quebec and Newfoundland Fleets, besides the Particular single Ships; so that the Masters and Commanders of Vessels, not completely manned, find a great Difficulty and Expence in procuring Mariners, who are extremely reluctant in quitting their amorous Retreats about the Purlicus of Wapping.

About a Fortnight since, the Sum of 70,000l. in Guineas newly coined, was sent from the Mint to the Bank. They continue coining of Gold; and in a few Days there will be (what is called) another Delivery of the like Sum. Silver Bullion is 4d Halfpenny per oz. too high a Price for the Government to afford to Coin at, to which the present Scarcity is owing.

March 28. Last Night Lord Temple arrived in Town, being sent for in order to assist in forming a new Ministry, in Conjunction with Lord Chatham.

March 29. We hear that on the 4th of next Month the Budget will be opened in the proper Place, which it is said, will disclose several curious Particulars for the Speculation of the political World, demonstrating the great Abilities of a certain Financier.

It is now confidently said that there will be no new Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland appointed, but that the present Viceroy will remain there Three Years longer.

It is said, that the M——y are greatly embarrassed by the spirited Behaviour of the Freeholders of Middlesex on a late Occasion, and cannot resolve what Measure to pursue, since their Views were frustrated by the Failure in the Attempt made by their doughty Tool on the 16th Instant.

The Gentleman who is now the Person fixed on by the M——y to oppose Mr. Wilkes on the Election of a Member for Middlesex, is a young Man of great Courage and Sense. The former of those excellent Qualities he fully proved himself possessed of, during the late War in Portugal: And every Day Evinces his having a superior Share of the other. His Friends are at a loss what to attribute his consent to the above Measure to; and regret much that he should undertake an Affair so generally disgusting to the People of this Country: And which, if he was to succeed, would only dim that Lustre of Character which his Merit alone has hitherto so justly preserved.

Those who seem to know most of Politics, are unanimous in thinking that the next Election for Middlesex will be the last for some Time; as the Ministry are now absolutely fixed to get some Candidate to oppose the Patriot; so that in Case he should be again returned, the other will have it at his Option to Petition, which will wrest the Cause from the Freeholders, and make it entirely an Object of P——y enquiry.

It is said that both Houses of Parliament will break up the First Week in May.

We hear that Addresses from all the different Shires in Scotland are preparing to be sent to his Majesty.

Notwithstanding the King of Prussia is so great a Prince, and his Territories are so extensive, we are told that the Government of Neuchatel, which is not esteemed worth above 800l. per Ann. is the most lucrative Employment under that Monarch's Gift.

It is reported that some News is expected to be brought, by the First Ship that arrives here from a certain Quarter, that will strangely effect the Affairs of a very great Body of People in this City.

The French have determined to send Fourteen more Battalions to conquer Corsica, which, when effected, it is said, is to be given the Spanish Court, in Lieu of several large Sums of Money, which the French owe to the Spaniards.

Great Discoveries have lately been made respecting the Bounty-Money granted on the Importation of American Tar, and the Frauds daily committed in that Branch of Trade, are now preparing to be laid before the Board of Trade.

Letters from Batia in Corsica, dated Feb. 9, say, "A few Days ago Two English Noblemen, One of whom is Lord Stafford, embarked for their Native Country. The Troops of General Paoli have lately been reviewed, and Amount to upwards of 7000 disciplined Men, who are daily joined by great Numbers, full of Zeal for the Welfare of their Country."

March 31. We hear that on Wednesday the Earl of Chatham and Earl Temple had the Honour of a private Conference with his Majesty at St. James's, for near Two Hours.

We hear that a popular Patriot has expressed to several of his Friends, that he wishes no Gentleman whatever, will be a Candidate at an ensuing Election in support of his Interest, as he is determined to stand, or fall alone.

We hear Captain Roach intends offering himself a Candidate for the County of Middlesex this ensuing Election, in Opposition to Colonel Luttrell.

Lieutenant Colonel Luttrell, now a Candidate for Middlesex, served early in the last War as a Volunteer in America; was an Ensign at the Siege of Louisburg, in 1758. In August 59, he raised a Troop of Light Dragoons, consisting of a 100 Men, in the Regiment now the Queen's. In 63, was Deputy Adjutant-Gen-

ral in Portugal, with the Rank of Lieutenant-Colonel in that Country, and Major here. It is said he had the Command of the Portuguese Infantry at Valencia d'Alcantara, when that Town was attack'd by General Burgoyne. He is now Lieutenant-Colonel in the first Regiment of Horse (in Ireland) which Commission he obtained his Majesty's Leave to purchase in January 1765.

We hear that the lately divorced Lady of a noble D——, who has been since married to a noble Lord, has had, on her Divorcement, her whole Fortune returned to her, which, as she was an only Daughter, amounted to above 80,000l.

We are informed, that a certain N——n would have forfeited the Sum of 70,000l. to a certain Lady, had he not married her upon a late particular Event taking Place.

Extra of a Letter from Florence, March 11.

"The King of Prussia has sent a Present of a Medal of his own Person to General Paoli, with an Elogium in which he makes that General greater than all the Heroes of Antiquity."

"When the Marquis de Marbœuf took Mr. Colonna Prisoner, with Two Hundred and Twelve Men, on the 14th of February, at Barbaggio, as a Compliment to that Officer, he said to him, that he supposed General Paoli would sustain a great Loss in him: To this the brave Corsican replied, that every Town, and every Village in his Country, contained Men of superior Courage and Abilities to himself; and that Mr. Marbœuf would very soon be convinced of it. This Loss will, however, be a great one to Paoli, who cannot afford to lose one Corsican to Ten Frenchmen; yet, if those brave Men are determined to remain on the Defensive, they will be invincible. At present they continue to strengthen the Fortifications of Bologna, as it is supposed that Spot will be the Theatre of the ensuing Campaign, and Cape Corso is already, except Oletta, entirely in the Hands of the Corsicans."

The French are already so suspicious of Designs against Alsace, Lorraine, and Bar, that all the old Regiments on the Barrier are marching towards the Rhine, and the Bishopricks of Metz, Douai, &c. are arming their Militia; the Duke de Deuxponts has increased his Regiment to Three Battalions.

A late Letter from Paris mentions, that tho' there are many Candidates in Nomination for the Royal Chair, none bid so fair as Cardinal York; the principal Objection that has been made to him is his Youth, but the natural Gravity, and evenness of Temper, with which he has conducted himself in all political Disputes, have endeared him so much to the French Court, and others, that it is thought it will be no Barrier to his Exaltation.

Letters from Berlin say, that General de Lentulus being returned there, from his Government of Neuchatel and Valengin in Switzerland, after confirming that People, by Authority from the King, in their former Rights and Privileges which had been disputed to them; and having acquainted his Majesty that all was now quiet in that Principality, and might have been so from the Beginning of the Commotions that reigned there, had the Sieur Michel, the Vice-Governor, acted with more Consistency and Moderation; the Want of which, besides causing Tumults and Dissatisfaction in the People, had involved his Majesty in a very expensive and needless Law-Suit with them. The King was very much disgusted with the Sieur Michel, who having soon after begged an Audience was flatly refused. The generous Behaviour of General de Lentulus in representing the People of Neuchatel and Valengin as good loyal Subjects, and well affected to their Sovereign, to whom they had the Misfortune of being misrepresented, has reflected on him much Honour, of which he had already, but lately, acquired a large Share, by his mild and conciliating Deportment towards them, when he was in that Country. Hence it was hoped, that the King would see that People in their true Light; and be convinced, that though they would sooner part with their Lives than with their Liberty, yet in all Cases where that is not at Stake, they will never swerve from their true Allegiance.

The Populace at Edinburgh have lately burnt the Duke of H——, Lord Bute, and Mr. Wilkes, in Effigy. April 1. Some People will have it that there is really an Intention of a Change of some Departments in the Ministry, but they cannot as yet fix on the proper Persons.

We are told that the next vacant blue Ribbon is intended for his Grace the Duke of Grafton.

Thursday Sir James Lowther, Bart. arrived in Town from Cocker mouth, after being elected Member for that Borough, in the Room of Sir George Macartney.

A Report is confidently circulated that a Gentleman very remarkable for his Attachment to the Cause of a popular Prisoner, lately submitted to a personal Indignity from a Military Character, which has within these few Days become much the Object of public Conversation.

Upon casting up the Accounts of the election Expences of a certain Baronet, we are told that they amounted to 106,000l. 15s. 9d.—and this immense Sum spent without even answering the Intention for which it was lavished!

On Tuesday last was delivered to Mr. Wilkes, at the King's Bench Prison, by a Captain of a Vessel, 45 Hams, 45 Tongues, and 45 Dozen of Ale, being a present from Stockton in Yorkshire.



The same Day was presented to the above Gentleman, a large Sum of Money contained in a Box, being a Present out of the Country.

A Marriage is now talked of, as speedily to take Place, between his Grace the Duke of Grafton and the Hon. Miss Scudamore Fitzroy, a very handsome young Lady, and at present the greatest Fortune in the Kingdom.

Wednesday came on at Warwick, the Election of a Knight of the Shire for that County; when, we hear, Thomas Skipwith, Esq; was elected without Opposition.

From Warsaw we learn, that the New Confederates of Lenczyce have been defeated near Kutno, by the Russians, and that a great Number of their Recruits have been massacred by the Cossacks. On the other Hand, Prince Sapieha has put himself at the Head of a Party of Confederates in Volhynia, and the Tartars have broke the Russian Chain of Communication. These Troops form a Body of 80,000 Men.—All the Places which the Tartars have visited bear the strongest Marks of the savage Temper of those barbarous People; the Houses have all been pillaged and burnt, and the unhappy Inhabitants either murdered or carried into Slavery.

Thursday came on at the East-India Court, a Question respecting the Justness and Propriety of 900,000l. Deductions which had been made from the annual Account 1768, in the private Committee of Accounts, without the Knowledge of the other Directors;—some alleged, that it had been done with a View of keeping down the Dividend; and others, that it had been done only with a View of preventing Government from squeezing the Company: But it was admitted by all, that it might in the End prove of the most dangerous Consequence to the Company. The Question was simply this, Whether the Company ought to take any Credit for their Fortifications, and other Military Expenses, disbursed on Account of the King's Ships and Troops in making the territorial Acquisitions, or not? It was insisted the Company should either take Credit for the Value of those Acquisitions, whatever they might be estimated at, or State at least such Charges laid out in acquiring them, as Government ought to pay in Case they should take the Acquisitions from the Company. Arguments running hard against the Directors, they took an Opportunity of moving the Question of Adjournment, when most of the principal Proprietors were gone to Dinner, which carried 106 to 85.

April 4. This Day the Hon. House of Commons will meet, pursuant to their last Adjournment before Easter.

We hear from Paris, that the French East-India Company are now negotiating for the Sale of their Charter and Trade with several Bankers, &c. among whom are named Foley, Panchand and Co.

The Forces kept up at present in the Electorate of Hanover, we are told, amount to near 30,000 Men, including Garrisons, but exclusive of a very large Body of Militia.

To the Gentlemen, Clergy, and Freeholders of the County of MIDDLESEX.

GENTLEMEN,

THE remarkable Series of important Events, in which you have been of late deeply interested, requires that I should state fully to you the Motives of my Conduct. No private Consideration could induce me thus repeatedly to intreat the Freeholders of this respectable County to submit to the Inconvenience of so frequent Elections. I am actuated by a higher Principle, by Duty to you, and to my native Country. My sole Motive is, the Hope of establishing, by Perseverance, your Title to a free Election, which our Forefathers transmitted to us, as an hereditary Claim, and our Posterity will demand from us, as the Guardians of their Birthright, of their best Inheritance. I find that after ministerial Power has been without Success exerted in every Form of Corruption, Division, and Intimidation, to defeat your Rights, another Plan is at length adopted, and the vain Hope of our Enemies now is, that you will be tired out by the Contest, by the increasing Expence to which you are compelled. You will however, I am sure, continue to prove to the World, that you are superior to this mean, wretched Attempt, undaunted by Corruption, undivided by Artifice, and undaunted by every Apprehension of future Vengeance.

I cannot conceive any Thing of greater Importance to the Preservation of public Liberty, than the Event of the present Struggle. The Question is, whether the People have an inherent Right to be represented in Parliament by the Man of their free Choice, not disqualified by the Law of the Land. This Question is now again agitated in an enlightened Age, under a Prince of the Brunswick Line, to whom the Exercise of this very Right gave the Sceptre, in Consequence of the glorious Revolution. It is a right Coeval with our Constitution, and stands among the first Principles of our Form of Government, which reserves to the People a Third Part of the legislative Power. It began at the very first faint Dawn of Liberty in our Island, and will survive to the last convulsive Pang of expiring Freedom. It is a Part of the original Compact between the Sovereign of this Nation and the Subject, expressly stated in the BILL of RIGHTS, which declares that in this, as well as in the other Instances enumerated, our Ancestors, as theirs in like Case had usually done, VINDICATED and ASSERTED the true, ANTIENT and INDUBITABLE Rights and Liberties of the People of this Kingdom, which they CLAIMED, DEMANDED and INSISTED UPON, and the whole Legislature enacted, shall stand, remain, and be the Law of this Realm FOR EVER. Parliamentary Authority obliges every Sovereign, at the Coronation, to swear to the Observance of that, and all the other Statutes of this Realm, and this excellent Act declares, that all Officers and Ministers whatsoever, shall serve their Majesties, and their SUCCESSORS, according to the same in ALL TIMES to COME. This Right of the People is no less clear by Reason, than by the positive Statute. There can be no Representation, but when the greater Number to be represented have freely chosen a Person who is legally qualified. A Representation without, or against, the Consent of the Parties, is an Insult to common Sense, an Absurdity scarcely to be paralleled, an Injustice and Infidelity not to be forgiven.

In my Case, Gentlemen, the Legislative Power has in no Way interfered. A Resolution of only one Third Part was obtained. The first Expulsion was chiefly grounded on the Pretence of what I had written, relative to the Massacre in these Fields, which I did from the Impression that bloody Scene had made upon me. This I declared afterwards at the Bar of the House of Commons, in pursuance of your Instructions. From thence the first Expulsion avowedly took its rise. I made an Appeal to my Constituents. You approved my Conduct, and unanimously re-elected me. I was then expelled a second Time, and no Reason whatever was assigned. The Day after this re-election, a Resolution was taken that I was and am incapable of being elected a Member, to serve in this present Parliament, and that the late Election of a Knight of the Shire for the County of Middlesex, is a void Election, but you, Gentlemen, determined for yourselves, and would not surrender your Right of Choice. I still proceeded, Gentlemen, to appeal again to you, and by your Favour, my third Re-election was as unanimous as the former. I was the next Day expelled, with a similar Declaration, that no other Candidate was proposed, and that no Elector gave or tendered his Vote for any other Person. In this last Instance both the Election and Return are declared null and void.

This Contest is now become of the most interesting Nature. It is between the present Administration and all the Electors of Great-Britain. There is nothing personal in it. The Cause is national, and of the first Magnitude. On this Public Ground I will stand firm. No Danger shall deter me from my Duty, and while I continue to be entrusted by you in this important Concern, I shall rely on your Protection and Support. In me you shall find Obedience to your Instructions, Fidelity and indefatigable Zeal for the Maintenance of every Right of this free and brave Nation.

The General Assembly of this Province, which stood prorogued to Tuesday the 27th Day of June, was, on Friday last, by his Excellency the Governor in Council, further prorogued to Thursday the 27th Day of July next.

On Monday Afternoon arrived here in good Health, in the Ship LORD BALTIMORE, Capt. MITCHEL, his Excellency ROBERT EDEN, Esq; our Governor, with his Lady and Family; on the Ship's coming to an Anchor, off the City, she fired Seven Guns, which were returned by an equal Number, but on his Excellency's coming on Shore, in the Evening, he was met by all the Members of the Council then in Town, and a great Number of other Gentlemen, under a Discharge of all the Cannon on the Battery.—And, on Tuesday Morning about 10 o'Clock, his Excellency went up to the Council-House, attended by his Lordship's Honourable Council, where his Excellency's Commission was opened and published, after which, he was pleased to issue the following Proclamation.

ROBERT EDEN, ESQUIRE,

Governor and Commander in Chief in and over the Province of MARYLAND.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS FREDERICK, absolute Lord and Proprietary of the Provinces of Maryland and Avalon, Lord Baron of Baltimore, by his Commission under his Great Seal at Arms, bearing Date at London, the First Day of August, Anno Domini, 1768, has, with the Approbation of his most sacred Majesty, been pleased to constitute and appoint me the said ROBERT EDEN, Governor and Commander in Chief in and over this his Lordship's Province of Maryland; which Commission was this Day published in the Presence and Hearing of the Members of his Lordship's Honourable Council, and others the King's Subjects, his Lordship's Tenants, in this Province, at the City of Annapolis. I have, therefore, by and with the Advice of his Lordship's Council of State, thought fit to issue this my Proclamation, notifying the same to all Sheriffs, Magistrates, and others his Lordship's Officers in this Province; and I do further will and direct, that all Officers, both Civil and Military, execute and discharge the several Trusts and Duties, in them reposed and enjoined by the present respective Commissions, to them granted, until such Time as my further Pleasure and Directions shall be signified therein. And I do hereby strictly charge and require the several Sheriffs of this Province, to make this my Proclamation public in their Counties in the usual Manner, as they will answer the contrary at their Peril.

GIVEN at the City of Annapolis, this 6th Day of June, in the 9th Year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lord GEORGE the Third, of Great-Britain, &c. King; and in the 19th Year of his Lordship's Dominion, Anno Domini, 1769.

MURATO, February 17.

N the 13<sup>th</sup> of this Month we had Advice, that the Regiment de la Mark, quartered on the Lands of Barbaggio, seemed to pass their Time with little Attention. Accordingly, at Four in the Evening, the General detached 400 Men, in order to surprize that Post the same Night, but our People were prevented executing their Project as premised, by Reason that the Enemy had been advised, by a Spy, of our Motions, and were on their Guard. Our People were therefore obliged to attack them, and endeavour to overcome them by Force, in which they last succeeded, after a vigorous Resistance from the French, 100 of whom, who were in the Houses in the Heights, were made Prisoners; 160 more which were in the Houses below, after an obstinate Resistance, surrendered by Capitulation, in Consequence of which they were conducted to San Fiorenzo, obliging themselves not to serve during one Year. During this Engagement one of our Detachments, which was to have fortified themselves at the Passage of Tigeme, not having Time to do it, was attacked the 15<sup>th</sup> with great Violence by the French, who obliged them to quit the Eminences which they had taken Post on. Other French Detachments cut off the Retreat of our people, those who had conquered at Barbaggio, not knowing that the Passage of the Mountain was possessed by the Enemy, who poured down from thence, and surrounding our People, attacked them briskly with four Pieces of Cannon and Two Howitzers. Our People at Barbaggio resisted the First and Second Day with great Resolution, but seeing no Possibility of holding out for Want of Provisions and Ammunition, on the 14<sup>th</sup> in the Evening they surrendered by Capitulation, in Consequence of which they were conducted to Balsa, there to remain, and the Officers to have the Town for their Prison. Our Loss, killed, wounded, and Prisoners, does not amount to 200 Men, that of the Enemy is of no small Consequence, especially, the killed and wounded.

Corsican Gazette.

WARSAW, March 4. This Moment a Courier is arrived with the News, that the Confederacy of the Palatinate of Lencizia has been destroyed by the Russians; and that of the Palatinate of Plock has also met with the same Fate: So that there now only remain the Confederacies of Great-Poland and that of Bar.

HAMBURG, March 27. Letters from Petersburg advise, that the Land Forces which the Empress of Russia actually has on Foot, including the Militia, amount to about 600,000 Men.

BRUSSELS, April 6. According to Advices from the frontiers of Turkey, the Tartars have penetrated into New-Servia, and committed horrible Ravages there. We are assured that they have burnt almost every Village in that Province, that they have carried off 14,000 Families, and more than 100,000 Cattle of different Kinds. These Advices, however, which are dated the Middle of March, make no Mention of a Battle, which, according to some Gazettes, hath been fought between the Russians and Tartars, wherein the latter are said to have obtained a complete Victory, cut to Pieces near 30,000 Russians, and made 20,000 Prisoners; but neither Time or Place of this Engagement is mentioned.

L O N D O N,

March 14. It is said that the Armaments making in Spain, as well by Land as by Sea, take their Rise partly from the Expulsion of the Spanish Governor and his Retinue, and Troops from New-Orleans, and the ceded Territory in Louisiana, on the Mississippi; and partly from the eager Forwardness of the French to gain the entire Dominion of Corfica. The Settlements on the Mississippi were made over by the French to the Crown of Spain, in Consideration of the Part of Hispaniola which they held; and it cannot be imagined, that the Rebellion of the French at New-Orleans, against their new Sovereign, and the driving away his Officers and Forces, was brought about without some extraordinary Connivance or Intigation. For how could a small Colony dare to take such Measures, without Hopes of finding Protection from some higher Power; and if such a Collusion has been practised, it cannot but give Umbrage to the Spanish Court, and dispose it to seek Redress. The entire Possession of Corfica, which affects the Interest of the Neapolitan State, as well as that of all the other Italian Powers, is not an indifferent Matter to Spain; and we need not wonder to see her putting herself in a Condition to support the Italian League, if Occasion should require it.

Extra of a Letter from Leghorn, Feb. 17.

The English Frigate the *Bohus* is just failed from this Port with Two English Merchantships of the same Nation. These Three Vessels have on board 63 Bullocks, a Quantity of Biscuits, about 300 Chests of Fuel, Ammunition, Gunpowder, and a large Sum of Money. At their Departure they said they were going to Port Mahon; we have no Doubt, however, but that the whole is destined for Corfica, being Succours sent by some English Gentlemen to General Paoli. We are assured, that he has also received a handsome Sum of Money from Rome.

According to the last Advices from Corfica, the Inhabitants, who are subject to the French, complain greatly of some new Taxes imposed on them; and Ge-

neral Paoli, to avail himself of this Circumstance, hath signified to them to unite themselves with the rest of the Nation, otherwise their Possessions shall be confiscated.

Extra of another Letter from Leghorn, March 2.

An English Vessel, commanded by Capt. Drummond, has anchored in this Port on her Passage from the Isle of Cyprus. The Crew relate, that in the Latitude of Corfica, they saw Five Ships of War of the same Nation. Other Advices inform, that 4000 Troops belonging to a certain Power, had landed in that Island, in order to join Paoli, and that the said Chief having resolved to attack the French with Vigour, had ordered all the Inhabitants, of every Degree whatsoever, to range themselves immediately under his Banners.

April 3. Some People will have it, that there is really an Intention of a Change in some Departments of the Ministry, but that they cannot as yet fix on the proper Persons.

A Letter from Paris, dated March 27, says, "The Sieur de Bourgainville lately returned to St. Malo, on board of one of the Frigates which he commanded, and is since arrived here. He says he has discovered an Island in the South Sea hitherto unknown, but very extensive, fertile, and populous. He has brought home one of the Inhabitants, who is said to be a Person of Understanding, and to have some Knowledge of Astronomy."

We hear from Leghorn, that a great Number of Sardinian Soldiers had deserted, and found Means to join General Paoli, who was meditating a grand Blow against the French.

April 4. We are informed that the quadruple Treaty of Alliance, lately signed by the Kings of Prussia, France, and Spain, and the Queen of Hungary, contains Nothing prejudicial to the Interests of Great-Britain.

April 5. It is confidently reported, that the Right Hon. the Lord Chief Justice Mansfield is shortly to resign, and that Sir Fletcher Norton, as present Chief Justice in Eyre, will be appointed Lord Chief Justice of the King's Bench, in his Stead.

Yesterday Morning several Agents for the Colonies attended the Levee of the Earl of Rochford, on Affairs relative to the commercial Interests of Great-Britain and North-America.

Orders are dispatched to the Commanders of the Men of War on the American Station, particularly to the Northward, to keep a sharp Lookout, against the smuggling of foreign European Goods; great Carriages of which are said to be shipped in France on board their Fishermen, to be sold to the English on the Coast of Newfoundland, Nova-Scotia, and Cape Breton.

By Letters from Leghorn, we learn, that Gen. Paoli has lately received a large Supply of Ammunition and Money, by some Dutch Ships from the Subjects of a certain Power, which has not hitherto appeared inclined to interest itself in the Behalf of those brave Islanders; and that the Corsican Troops, with the Sardinian and Italian Deserters, amount to 11,000 effective Men.

April 8. Yesterday Bets amongst the Quality at the West End of the Town, were 500 l. to 400 l. that Mr. Wilkes will have a free Pardon before the Expiration of this Month.

It is currently reported among the Household, &c. that their Majesties will visit their German Dominions this Summer; but that their Stay will be of short Duration.

A Rumour again prevails at the West End of the Town, that a speedy Pardon will be granted to a popular Gentleman, in whose Behalf many powerful Intercessions are now making.

April 11. Saturday the Bets at the West End of the Town, were 300 Guineas to 200, that Mr. Wilkes, upon the Close of the Poll, will be 200 a-Head of the Two other Candidates; and that Capt. Roche will be 100 a-Head of Col. Luttrell this ensuing Election at Brentford; and that he will be the sitting Member.

A Captain of a Government Sloop has informed the Ministry, that, while he was in the Bay of Cadiz, a French Ship in Distress came in, to repair, which had got no less than 900 Soldiers on board, none of whom the Commander permitted to go on Shore. Their Destination was not known, neither was their Design to be learned. The above Officer left the Port before the Frenchman was refitted, and, after having failed a few Leagues to the North-West, he fell in with Three other French Vessels, whom he found to be Consorts of the other, and which had the like Number of Soldiers on board; he hailed them, and enquired whether they were bound, but received no Answer. Respecting this Intelligence, it is said, the Ministry are somewhat perplexed; and that they have referred it to the Consideration of a certain Board, the Result of which Deliberation will soon be disclosed.

The Earl of Chatham mends in Health every Day. It is said that he has declared his Sentiments on the Case of the County of Middlesex, which, he says, is the Cause of the whole Nation, and the most constitutional Point that has yet been agitated.

It is rumoured, that a British Squadron will soon appear in the Baltic.

According to Letters from the Hague, the Dutch are now fitting out a Number of Ships of the Line.

The Brussels Gazette of April 6, received this Day, has the following Article, dated Paris, March 31. A Report prevails, that the English Ministry propose to

deliver up Canada to France, for the Sum of Twenty-Millions.

April 13. Monday last a Party of the Guards marched from their Quarters at Brentford to Town, on Account of the Election coming on this Day.

This Morning came on the Election of a Knight of the Shire for the County of Middlesex, when the Voice of the Freeholders were so strenuous for John Wilkes, Esq; that we are since informed he was almost unanimously re-elected.

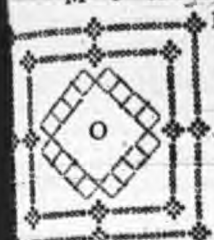

## MARYLAND GAZETTE.

## M U R A T O, February 17.

N the 13th of this Month we had Advice, that the Regiment de la Mark, quartered on the Lands of Barbaggio, seemed to pass their Time with little Attention. Accordingly, at Four in the Evening, the General detached 400 Men, in order to surprize that Post the same Night, but our People were prevented executing their Project as premeditated, by Reason that the Enemy had been advised, by a Spy, of our Motions, and were on their Guard. Our People were therefore obliged to attack them, and endeavour to overcome them by Force, in which they last succeeded, after a vigorous Resistance from the French, 100 of whom, who were in the Houses in the Heights, were made Prisoners; 160 more which were in the Houses below, after an obstinate Resistance, surrendered by Capitulation, in Consequence of which they were conducted to San Fiorenzo, obliging themselves not to serve during one Year. During this Engagement one of our Detachments, which was to have fortified themselves at the Passage of Tigeme, not having Time to do it, was attacked the 15th with great Violence by the French, who obliged them to quit the Eminences which they had taken Post on. Other French Detachments cut off the Retreat of our People, those who had conquered at Barbaggio, not knowing that the Passage of the Mountain was possessed by the Enemy, who poured down from thence, and surrounding our People, attacked them briskly with four Pieces of Cannon and Two Howbits. Our People at Barbaggio resisted the First and Second Day with great Resolution, but seeing no Possibility of holding out for Want of Provisions and Ammunition, on the 16th in the Evening they surrendered by Capitulation, in Consequence of which they were conducted to Balz, there to remain, and the Officers to have the Town for their Prison. Our Loss, killed, wounded, and Prisoners, does not amount to 200 Men, that of the Enemy is of no small Consequence, especially, the killed and wounded.

Corfican Gazette.

WARSAW, March 4. This Moment a Courier is arrived with the News, that the Confederacy of the Palatinate of Lencizia has been destroyed by the Russians; and that of the Palatinate of Plock has also met with the same Fate: So that there now only remain the Confederacies of Great-Poland and that of Bar.

HAMBURG, March 27. Letters from Petersburg divide, that the Land Forces which the Empress of Russia actually has on Foot, including the Militia, amount to about 600,000 Men.

BRUSSELS, April 6. According to Advices from the Frontiers of Turkey, the Tartars have penetrated into New-Servia, and committed horrible Ravages there. We are assured that they have burnt almost every Village in that Province, that they have carried off 14,000 Families, and more than 100,000 Cattle of different Kinds. These Advices, however, which are dated the Middle of March, make no Mention of a Battle, which, according to some Gazettes, hath been fought between the Russians and Tartars, wherein the latter are said to have obtained a complete Victory, cut to Pieces near 30,000 Russians, and made 20,000 Prisoners; but neither Time or Place of this Engagement is mentioned.

## L O N D O N,

March 14. It is said that the Armaments making in Spain, as well by Land as by Sea, take their Rise partly from the Expulsion of the Spanish Governor and his Retinue, and Troops from New-Orleans, and the ceded Territory in Louisiana, on the Mississippi; and partly from the eager Forwardness of the French to gain the entire Dominion of Corsica. The Settlements on the Mississippi were made over by the French to the Crown of Spain, in Consideration of the Part of Hispaniola which they held; and it cannot be imagined, that the Rebellion of the French at New-Orleans, against their new Sovereign, and the driving away his Officers and Forces, was brought about without some extraordinary Connivance or Intigation. For how could a small Colony dare to take such Measures, without Hopes of finding Protection from some higher Power; and if such a Collusion has been practised, it cannot but give Umbrage to the Spanish Court, and dispose it to seek Redress. The entire Possession of Corsica, which affects the Interest of the Neapolitan State, as well as that of all the other Italian Powers, is not an indifferent Matter to Spain; and we need not wonder to see her putting herself in a Condition to support the Italian League, if Occasion should require it.

Extra of a Letter from Leghorn, Feb. 17.

The English Frigate the *Æolus* is just sailed from this Port with Two English Merchantships of the same Nation. These Three Vessels have on board 63 Bullocks, a Quantity of Biscuits, about 300 Chefts of Flour, Ammunition, Gunpowder, and a large Sum of Money. At their Departure they said they were going to Port Mahon; we have no Doubt, however, but that the whole is destined for Corsica, being Succours sent by some English Gentlemen to General Paoli. We are assured, that he has also received a handsome Sum of Money from Rome.

According to the last Advices from Corsica, the Inhabitants, who are subject to the French, complain of some new Taxes imposed on them; and Ge-

neral Paoli, to avail himself of this Circumstance, hath signified to them to unite themselves with the rest of the Nation, otherwise their Possessions shall be confiscated."

Extra of another Letter from Leghorn, March 2.

"An English Vessel, commanded by Capt. Drummond, has anchored in this Port on her Passage from the Isle of Cyprus. The Crew relate, that in the Latitude of Corsica, they saw Five Ships of War of the same Nation. Other Advices inform, that 4000 Troops belonging to a certain Power, had landed in that Island, in order to join Paoli, and that the said Chief having resolved to attack the French with Vigour, had ordered all the Inhabitants, of every Degree whatsoever, to range themselves immediately under his Banners."

April 3. Some People will have it, that there is really an Intention of a Change in some Departments of the Ministry, but that they cannot as yet fix on the proper Persons.

A Letter from Paris, dated March 27, says, "The Sieur de Bourgainville lately returned to St. Malo, on board of one of the Frigates which he commanded, and is since arrived here. He says he has discovered an Island in the South Sea hitherto unknown, but very extensive, fertile, and populous. He has brought home one of the Inhabitants, who is said to be a Person of Understanding, and to have some Knowledge of Astronomy."

We hear from Leghorn, that a great Number of Sardinian Soldiers had deserted, and found Means to join General Paoli, who was meditating a grand Blow against the French.

April 4. We are informed that the quadruple Treaty of Alliance, lately signed by the Kings of Prussia, France, and Spain, and the Queen of Hungary, contains Nothing prejudicial to the Interests of Great-Britain.

April 5. It is confidently reported, that the Right Hon. the Lord Chief Justice Mansfield is shortly to resign, and that Sir Fletcher Norton, as present Chief Justice in Eyre, will be appointed Lord Chief Justice of the King's Bench, in his Stead.

Yesterday Morning several Agents for the Colonies attended the Levee of the Earl of Rochford, on Affairs relative to the commercial Interests of Great-Britain and North-America.

Orders are dispatched to the Commanders of the Men of War on the American Station, particularly to the Northward, to keep a sharp Lookout against the smuggling of foreign European Goods; great Carriages of which are said to be shipped in France on board their Fishermen, to be sold to the English on the Coast of Newfoundland, Nova-Scotia, and Cape Breton.

By Letters from Leghorn, we learn, that Gen. Paoli has lately received a large Supply of Ammunition and Money, by some Dutch Ships from the Subjects of a certain Power, which has not hitherto appeared inclined to interest itself in the Behalf of those brave Islanders; and that the Corsican Troops, with the Sardinian and Italian Deserters, amount to 11,000 effective Men.

April 8. Yesterday Bets amongst the Quality at the West End of the Town, were 300 l. to 400 l. that Mr. Wilkes will have a free Pardon before the Expiration of this Month.

It is currently reported among the Household, &c. that their Majesties will visit their German Dominions this Summer; but that their Stay will be of short-Duration.

A Rumour again prevails at the West End of the Town, that a speedy Pardon will be granted to a popular Gentleman, in whose Behalf many powerful Intercessions are now making.

April 11. Saturday the Bets at the West End of the Town, were 300 Guineas to 100, that Mr. Wilkes, upon the Clofe of the Poll, will be 400 a-Head of the Two other Candidates; and that Capt. Roche will be 200 a-Head of Col. Luttrell this ensuing Election at Brentford; and that he will be the sitting Member.

A Captain of a Government Sloop has informed the Ministry, that, while he was in the Bay of Cadiz, a French Ship in Distress came in, to repair, which had got no less than 900 Soldiers on board, none of whom the Commander permitted to go on Shore. Their Destination was not known, neither was their Design to be learned. The above Officer left the Port before the Frenchman was refitted, and, after having sailed a few Leagues to the North-West, he fell in with Three other French Vessels, whom he found to be Consorts of the other, and which had the like Number of Soldiers on board; he hailed them, and enquired whether they were bound, but received no Answer. Respecting this Intelligence, it is said, the Ministry are somewhat perplexed; and that they have referred it to the Consideration of a certain Board, the Result of which Deliberation will soon be disclosed.

The Earl of Chatham mends in Health every Day. It is said that he has declared his Sentiments on the Case of the County of Middlesex, which, he says, is the Cause of the whole Nation, and the most constitutional Point that has yet been agitated.

It is rumoured, that a British Squadron will soon appear in the Baltick.

According to Letters from the Hague, the Dutch are now fitting out a Number of Ships of the Line.

The Brussels Gazette of April 6, received this Day, has the following Article, dated Paris, March 31. A Report prevails, that the English Ministry propose to

deliver up Canada to France, for the Sum of Twenty-Millions.

April 13. Monday last a Party of the Guards marched from their Quarters at Brentford to Town, on Account of the Election coming on this Day.

## SHIP NEWS.

Merchant Seamen's Harbour, March 23.

THE Fleet that took shelter here a few Days ago, having refitted, and taken in a large Cargo, consisting of the following Articles, Allspice, Fuller's Earth, Varnish, Wash-Balls, Puffs, cowering Paper, soft Paper, Rattles, musical Clocks, Toys of all kinds, &c. &c. &c. were joined by a great Number of Victuallers and small Craft, failed this Day at one o'Clock, P. M. with fair Wind and fine Weather, under Convoy of the following Ships; viz. the Address, Capt. Boehm; the Omnium, Capt. Van Neck; the Grafton, Capt. Sawmill; and the Contract, Capt. Harley. At Half past Two most of the Fleet put back in a dreadful Condition, having been taken all a-back, with a sudden and violent Gale, which laid most of them on their Beam-Ends; in which Situation they were attacked by the Enemy's Cutters. The best Sailors seeing the Weather look so extremely black, bore away, and ran directly into Port, others haul'd their Wind, and tried to go North about (the best Passage now). The Address, Capt. Boehm, who had the broad Pennant, was attacked by a whole Squadron of the Enemy's Ships; but after firing away all their Ammunition and Stink Pots, the whole Crew quitted her, and went on board a small Transport, and escaped by Mistake: The Engagement had made such an Alteration in their Appearance, that the Enemy mistook them for some of their own People.

The Omnium, Capt. Van Neck, and the Contract, Capt. Harley, were spoke with in great Distress, with the Dead-Lights up, and Signals of Distress under very different Colours than they failed with; but as both Ships were well known, particularly the latter, who neglected her Duty so much when she was Guard-Ship, that no Notice was taken to relieve their Distress. Many others were seen on the Career, refitting, with black Flags and red Crosses at their Mast-Heads.

The Grafton has so many Shot through her Upper Works, that, with the Damage in a late Cruise,

when all her Hands deserted, 'tis thought she can never be made fit for the Sea again, but will be kept for a Hulk or break Water.

## ANNAPOLIS, JUNE 15.

Extra of a Letter from a Gentleman in London, to his Friend in this City, dated April 13.

"Tho' I have but a Moment to write, I can't help saying, we are all in Confusion here: The — of —, notwithstanding *Wilkes* has been Four Times elected for *Middlesex*, refuse to let him sit, and have at length (the 15th Instant) chose a Representative for that County, one Col. *Luttrell*, of the Dragoons: This you may be sure, will not sit easy on the Stomachs of the Freeholders of England, and what will be the Consequence, cannot be told, for there is Fire enough in the Minds of most People, to raise such a Flame, as would not be easily extinguished.—Thank Heaven this — M—y have their Hands so full at home, that they have no Time to think of new Oppressions for poor America.

"There seems to be very little Chance this Session, of a Repeal of the *American Revenue Acts*, but still I would wish you could refrain from Violence, and apply steadily to the Encouragement of Manufactures and Frugality, which, in the End, will, and must ensure Redress."

BASTIA, February 27.



SMART Action happened a few Days ago between the French and Corsicans, which was fought with great Obstinacy on both Sides, and ended with little Advantage on either. It is said that several Chiefs have quitted Paoli, and assembled at Rofino.

ISOLA ROSA, March 3. The 16th ult. Fourteen Battalions embarked from Provence for Corsica. Two of them are Irish Brigades.

PETERSBURGH, March 3. By the Advices from the Army, there have been some sharp Rencontres between the Imperial Troops and the Tartars, always to the Disadvantage of the latter.

The Duke of Courland has written a very affecting Letter to the Empress, in which he says, that being sensible of his approaching End, he embraced that Opportunity to take Leave of her Imperial Majesty, to thank her for all past Favours, and to beg that she will continue her Protection to the Princes his Sons.

PARMA, March 11. The Infant Duke has just suppressed the Office of the Inquisition in his Dominions.

MURATO, (in Corsica,) March 18. The Count de Marbois, who is going to be relieved in the Command of the French Troops by the Count de Vaux, acquainted General Paoli with his intended Departure for France; and at the same Time intimated to him, that if he was inclined to come to an Accommodation, he should now declare himself, that he (Marbois) might have the Honour to communicate to the King, his Sovereign, the Submission of so distinguished a Subject. But it is assured that our General made Answer to the Count de Marbois, that he was perfectly disposed to live in Peace with the French Nation, whenever the Troops of his most Christian Majesty would desist from interfering in the Disputes which subsist between the Corsicans and the Genoese; but that otherwise his Nation and himself were determined to defend themselves, as long as they could carry Arms.

COPENHAGEN, March 21. Our Naval Preparations continue to be carried on without Interruption, but the Object of them is not yet known. It is however supposed, that they are rather intended to assist some Power in Friendship with us, than to make War against any other.

L O N D O N.

March 28. At the Assizes for the County of Cornwall, at Nisiprius Bar, was tried an Action brought by Cummins, Esq; against a Mayor of a Borough in the said County, for bribing Eighteen Voters at the last Election. Judge Willis, in summing up the Evidence to the Jury, shewed how much he abhorred the Crime of Bribery, and said it was got to such a Pitch, that it threatened the utter Ruin of the Nation. He declared to the Jury, that, was it in his Power, he would give the Person who brought the Action the full Penalty incurred, being 3000l. But the Jury brought in only 1000l. Damages. The Judge has gained much Honour and Praise in the County, by his Behaviour on this Occasion.

March 31. Of all the Taxes ever proposed for public Benefit, perhaps a high Duty on Kept-Mistresses would be the most reasonable, and it would produce, if we judge from their Numbers, more Money than any other whatsoever.

April 1. We are told, that if a certain noble Marquis, and his Friends, come again into Office, one of the first Measures will be to establish an equal Land-Tax throughout the Kingdom, and to lop off many Pensions on the Establishment of a neighbouring Country.

It is said that Lord C—m hath declared his Disapprobation of a late Measure, in Terms that will open the Eyes of the present Administration, and which may probably make Proselytes of more than one of them.

We hear from Constantinople, that a large Body of Men, called Captgis, an Asiatic People much inclined to Pillage, who came to join the Turkish Army, having committed several Excesses in a Village near Babadag, were opposed by the Janizaries, who killed above 150 of them on the Spot.

April 4. Saturday about Seven in the Evening, Four empty Waggoners came to the House of the R<sup>t</sup>. Hon. the Earl of Bute, in Town, and carried off the Household Goods, Furniture, &c. which were previously packed up for that Purpose, but to what Part of the Country they are removed is yet unknown.

The present East-India Sale is said to be one of the greatest there ever was since the Establishment of the Company. There are above 33,000 Chefts of Tea, and a very few Years ago 11,000 Chefts were thought a Quantity sufficient to glut the Market; from whence may be easily drawn the amazing Progress of Luxury in this Age, and the growing Importance of the Company.

Extra of a Letter from Paris.

"You may assure my Frinds on your Side of the Water, that One, if not the First Article in the Quadruple Alliance, is to keep the Sword drawn 'til the French are restored all their late Possessions in America. The Im-permanency and frequent Fluctuations of your Councils prevent any Business being done, or certainly One of these Powers might have been bought off. You may depend on it, Hanover will soon be in

French Hands—you will defend it; and fresh Millions will be buried in the old Grave of Germany."

April 6. At a previous Meeting on Monday Night, at the Half-Moon Tavern in Cheapside, to consider of the Address which was expected to be moved for Yesterday at Guildhall, 141 Members of the City Common Council attended. After some Debate, the Question being put, it appeared that 22 were for addressing, and 119 against it. Much Warmth was displayed on this Occasion by some of the Members.

Yesterday a Court of Common Council was held at Guildhall, but no Motion made for an Address to his Majesty. On a Motion made by Mr. Deputy Freeman, it was resolved, that the Thanks of the Court be given to the Right Hon. Samuel Turner, Esq; Lord Mayor, for his able and upright Conduct during the Time he has had the Honour to fill the Chair. At the same Time it was ordered that the said Vote of Thanks should be published in the Papers.

Not more than 15 or 20, out of 200, opposed the Motion of returning Thanks to his Lordship. It is supposed, that the Disgrace with which this ministerial Attempt for an Address, was attended, will effectually prevent any further Applications of the like Kind.

April 8. Yesterday a very great Personage paid a Visit to John Wilkes, Esq; from which Circumstance great Fears are expressed, and great Hopes conceived.

Letters received from Stockholm, dated April 3, advise, that the great Armaments making in Denmark, seem to give Umbrage to the Court of Sweden, on which Account the King had applied to the Senate to have the Diet convened sooner than the Time appointed, but that the Senate would not agree to it.

Extra of a Letter from Casnce, in Corsica, March 6.

"The first of this Month the French attempted, for the Third Time, to surprize Olmetta; but they were again repulsed. Their Loss was not very considerable, but they had the Dissatisfaction of not succeeding in an Enterprize which they appear to have very much at Heart."

It is given out, but we know not on what Authority, that a new Treaty is upon the Tapis, between the Courts of Great-Britain, Russia, Sweden, and Denmark, to which the States General have been also invited.

It is rumoured that a Fleet of Observation is ordered to be fitted out at Portsmouth, but the Destination is not as yet known; and that a great Number of Seamen will soon be wanted.

They write from Hamburgh, that divers foreign Agents are now employed there in buying up vast Quantities of Warlike Stores, Ammunition, and Horses; and that Recruits are also raising for the Prussian Service.

They write from Brest, that the Workmen are busy both there and at Rochfort, in equipping divers Ships of War, and those on the Stocks are ordered to be completed with the greatest Expedition.

April 11. Letters from Campolara in Corsica, of the 6th Ult. mention, that the Chiefs of that Nation have just adopted a Principle contrary to that they have hitherto followed, which is to remain quietly on the Defensive. Not that their Courage is diminished, but good Policy requires that they should not expose themselves more than is necessary.

April 14, 7 o'Clock. We have just learnt, that the Poll ended at Brentford about Five o'Clock, when the Numbers were as follows:

For Mr. Wilkes, - - - - -	1143,
Col. Luttrell, - - - - -	296,
Serjeant Whitaker, - - - - -	5.

Monday Night, at a Coffee-House, not far from St. James's, some Gentlemen were talking about the Instructions just given by the Liverymen of London to their Representatives in Parliament; when one of them declared they were the best he ever read, and that he never saw any that were at once so strong and poignant, and yet so cool and dispassionate; and said, he hoped the Electors of every County and City in the whole Kingdom would Copy after their laudable Example; when another Gentleman immediately replied, that the Instructions were undoubtedly well drawn up, and much to the Purpose; but that he had some Doubts whether the Liverymen of London, or any other Electors in the Nation, had, at this Time, any Right to instruct their Representatives at all; for, said he, our Constitution is totally changed in this important Point; and those who formerly received Wages from their Constituents for the Trouble of serving them in Parliament, now pay large Sums of Money to those who elect them for that Purpose; and, continued he, are not those the Servants who receive Money, and they the Masters who pay it? Wherefore, said he, it is a Doubt with me, whether Members of Parliament are not at this Time the Septennial Masters, instead of Servants, of the People? And can Servants have any Right to instruct their Masters?

April 15. By Letters from Petersburg we learn, that a large Body of Confederates have been defeated near Dubna by Col. de Brink, that he has taken a great Number of Prisoners, with Horses and Ammunition; and that the Son of Marshal Pulawski was killed in the Encounter.

This Morning, as Col. Luttrell, with a small Party, was proceeding on Horseback to Brentford, he was met at Hyde-Park Corner by a Mob, when a Dispute by some Accident arising, several of the People, it is said, were rode over, and that One Person among them, a Gentleman's Servant; was struck by a violent Blow on the Head with a loaded Stick, that 'tis thought he can-

not recover. On the other Side, the People charged the Colonel and his Party, in their Turn, and pelted them so furiously with Dirt, &c. that they drove some of them almost into the River, and put the whole Party in such a Manner to the Rout, that they rode dispersed over the Field, and a few galloped off full Speed for Brentford.

This Morning, about Eight o'Clock, a numerous Cavalcade of Freeholders, in the Interest of Mr. Wilkes, preceded by Music playing and Standards flying on which were printed Magna Charta and the Bills of Rights, went in Procession through the City to Brentford.

The French Ships, with the 900 Soldiers on board which came into the Port of Cadiz, while Capt. W—n was there; and Three others, their Consorts which he saw at Sea, a little Distance from that Place, are now known to be a French Fleet, and their Destination is to the East-Indies. Much Controversy happened at a certain Place concerning the Measures to be taken in Consequence of the above Affair; but nothing final has been determined.

April 15. We are informed, that Accounts have been received here of an Army of 70,000 Turks and Crim Tartars being defeated by 25,000 Russians;—that one Half of the former had been killed or taken, and that the latter did not lose 1000 Men. The Amsterdam Gazette, however, relates the Action in a different Manner;—by Advices from Jassy, the Seat of the Hoipopar of Moldavia, in which, the Russians are said to have had 30,000 Men killed, and 20,000 Prisoners, and that the Tartars had destroyed all New-Servia.

A great Change in the Ministry is hourly expected. The Duke of B—d, Earl G—r, Viscount W—h, and Mr. R—y will resign, and the Rockingham Party will take the Lead in the new Administration.—The Marquis it is said, having engaged to withdraw his Support from a certain popular German Prisoner;—this new Arrangement has been determined upon while the Earl of C—m and his noble Brother were dividing the State between them.

It is also said that a firm Coalition has taken Place between the Grenville and Rockingham Parties.

The News of the Quadruple Alliance of the Courts of Spain, France, Austria and Prussia, was brought over from Paris by the British Envoy, about Five Weeks ago; ever since which Time our Ministry have been concerting proper Measures to avail themselves of so glorious an Opportunity of approving themselves worthy of the Name of Englishmen, and Lords and Masters of the Sea.

We hear that a very great Man has lately, to the very great Satisfaction and Surprize of his Friends, expressed himself very much in Favour of a certain popular Gentleman.

A great House in a great Town is said to have stopped for near 200,000l.

Yesterday the Election and Return of Mr. Wilkes, as Member of Middlesex, was declared void; and this Day that Gentleman again solicited the Votes and Interests of his Friends.

The House of Commons, which was very full Yesterday continued sitting very late, and met again this Day.

We hear that the Debates in a great House last Night were carried on with the greatest Warmth ever known in that respectable Society.

It was this Morning positively asserted, that the Freeholders of a certain County, have resolved on presenting Petitions to each Branch of the L—e next Week, respecting the Member of their Choice, and also what they apprehend to be their own Right.

Many Persons are of the Opinion, that a Petition will not be received by One Branch of the L—e.

This Morning there was a great Report of respectable Gentlemen at the Apartment of John Wilkes, Esq; in the King's-Bench Prison.

From the LONDON EVENING-POST, of Feb. 25.

A Memorial of several Noblemen and Gentlemen of the First Rank and Fortune, presented to the late King in 1752.

The Memorialists represent,

THAT the Education of a Prince of Wales is of the utmost Importance to the whole Nation: That it ought always to be entrusted to Noblemen of the most unblemished Honour, and to Prelates of the most distinguished Virtue, of the most accomplished Learning; and of the most unsuspected Principles with Regard to Government both in Church and State: That the Misfortunes which this Nation suffered, or escaped, under King Charles I. and King Charles II. were owing to the bad Education of those Princes, who were early initiated in the odious Maxims of arbitrary Power: That, for a Faction to engross the Education of the Prince of Wales to themselves, excluding Men of Probity, Property and wholesome Learning, is unwarrantable, dangerous, and illegal: That to place Men about a Prince of Wales, whose Principles are suspected, and whose Belief in the Mytheries of our Faith is doubtful, has the most mischievous Tendency, and ought justly to alarm the Friends of their Country, and of the protestant Succession: That, for Ministers to support low Men, who were originally improper for the high Trust to which they were advanced, after Complaints made of dark, suspicious, and unwarrantable Methods made Use of by such Men, in their Plan of Education, and to protect and countenance such Men in their insolent and unheard of Behaviour to their Superiors, is



Foundation for suspecting the worst Designs in such Ministers, and ought to make all good Men apprehensive of the Ambition of those Ministers; that, it being notorious that Books, inculcating the worst Maxims of Government, and defending the most avowed Tyrannies, have been put into the Hands of the Prince of Wales, it cannot but affect the Memorialists, when they find that the Men who had the Honesty and Resolution to complain of such astonishing Methods of Instruction, are driven away from Court, and the Men who have dared to teach such Doctrines, are continued in Trust and Favour: That the Security of this Government being built upon Whig Principles, is alone supported by Whig Zeal.

That the Establishment of the present Royal Family being settled in the timely overthrow of Queen Anne's last Ministry, it cannot but alarm all true Whigs to hear of Schoolmasters of very contrary Principles being thought of for Preceptors; and to see none but the Friends and Pupils of the late Lord Bollingbroke entrusted to the Education of a Prince, whose Family that Lord endeavoured, by his Measures, to exclude, and by his Writings to excite, from the Throne of these Kingdoms: And there being great Reason to believe, that a noble Lord has accused One of his Preceptors of Jacobitism, it is astonishing that no Notice has been taken of a Complaint of so high a Nature; but that on the contrary, the accused Person continues in the same Trust, without any Enquiry into the Grounds of the Charge, or any Steps taken by the accused, to purge himself of a Crime of so black a Dye: That no Satisfaction being given to the Governor and Preceptor, who, though a Nobleman of the most unblemished Honour, and a Prelate of the most unbiassed Virtue, have both been treated in the grossest Terms of Abuse by a memorial Servant of the Family, is derogatory to his Majesty's Authority, under which they acted; is an Affront to Peerage; and an Outrage to the Dignity of the Church.

That whoever advised the Refusal of an Audience to the Bishop of Norwich, who was so justly alarmed at the wrong Methods which he saw taken in the Education of the Prince of Wales, is an Enemy to his Country, and can only mean, at least, to govern by a Faction, or is himself influenced by a more dangerous Faction, who intend to overthrow the Government, and restore the exiled and arbitrary House of Stuart. But that to have a Scotchman of the most disaffected Family, and allied in the nearest Manner to the Pretender's First Minister, consulted in the Education of the Prince of Wales, and intrusted with the most important Secrets of the Government, must tend to alarm and disgust the Friends of the present Royal Family, and to encourage the Hopes and Attempts of the Jacobites. Lastly, the Memorialists cannot help remarking, that Three or Four low, dark, suspected Persons, are the only Men whose Stations are fixed and permanent; but that all the great Offices and Officers are so constantly varied and shuffled about, to the Disgrace of this Country, that the best affected apprehend, that there is a settled Design in those low and suspected Persons to infuse such Jealousies, Caprices, and Fickleness, into the Two Ministers whose Confidence they Engross, as may render this Government ridiculous and contemptible, and facilitate the Revolution which the Memorialists think they have but too much Reason to fear is meditating.

The following is said to be the Copy of a Letter written by a great Man, immediately, on his Divorce, to his Mistress:

"MADAM,

"ON the final Difference I had with my Lady, I connected myself with you, as one, I thought, whose personal and mental Qualifications were such as would, in a great Measure, alleviate my domestic Misfortunes. My Expectations, I must do you the Justice to say, were perfectly answered; and it would be perhaps difficult even for ill-Nature to point out a single Defect in your Truth and unwearied Assiduity to please me; but, as I often told you, (particularly at our first Interview, that I should have nothing in future to charge myself with) that such a Course of Life was unbecomingly both in my moral and political Character, and that nothing but the Necessity could justify the Measure; I am now to tell you (that Obstacle being removed by the Laws) that all our former Ties are, from this Day, at an End.

"I have taken Care, my dear Friend, (for I will now totally throw by the Lover) to make that Establishment for you, as will make you easy in your Circumstances for Life, chargeable only with this Provision, that your Residence be not in these Kingdoms; the rest of Europe lies at your Choice; and you have only to send me Word on your Arrival where you are, and the next Post shall carry you your First quarterly Payment.

"Assure yourself that nothing should induce me to Act in this Manner but the determined Resolution I have taken, now that it is in my Power, of speedily entering into chaster Connexions; and that I am, and ever shall be, with great Esteem and Friendship,

B O S T O N, June 1.

Yesterday being the Anniversary of the Day appointed by the Royal Charter for the Election of Counsellors for this Province, the Great and General Court of Assembly met at the Court-House in this Town at 9 o'Clock in the Morning; when the usual Oaths were administered to the Gentlemen who were returned to serve as Members of the Honourable House of Re-

presentatives, and also subscribed to the Declaration.

Immediately after the House of Representatives had taken the Oaths, &c. required by Act of Parliament, they appointed a Committee to wait on his Excellency the Governor, who waited on his Excellency accordingly, with the following Message.

May it please your Excellency,

THE Great and General Court of Assembly of this Province, being once more convened, by Virtue of the Authority vested in you by his Majesty, and according to the Royal Charter: The House of Representatives, think it their indispensable Duty, under the present Aspect of Affairs in the Province, on their Part, to claim that constitutional Freedom, which is the Right of this Assembly, and is of equal Importance with its Existence.

We take this Opportunity to assure your Excellency, that it is the firm Resolution of this House, to promote to the utmost of their Power, the Welfare of the Subject, and to support his Majesty's Government with in this Jurisdiction: To make a thorough Enquiry into the Grievances of the People, and have them redressed: To amend, strengthen and preserve the Laws of the Land: To reform illegal Proceedings in Administration, and support the Public Liberty. These are the great Ends for which this Court is assembled.

A Resolution so important demands a Parliamentary Freedom in the Debates of this Assembly: We are therefore constrained, thus early to remonstrate to your Excellency, that an Armament by Sea and Land investing this Metropolis, and a Military Guard, with Cannon pointed at the very Door of the State-House where this Assembly is held, is inconsistent with that Dignity, as well as that Freedom with which we have a Right to deliberate, consult and determine.

The Experience of Ages is sufficient to convince, that the Military Power is very dangerous, and subversive of a free Constitution.

The History of our own Nation affords Instances of Parliaments, which have been led into mean and destructive Compliances, even to the surrendering their Share in the supreme Legislative, through the Awe of Standing Armies.

His Majesty's Council of this Province have publicly declared, that the Military Aid is unnecessary for the Support of civil Authority in the Colony: Nor can we conceive that his Majesty's Service requires a Fleet and Army here, in this Time of the most profound Peace.

We have a Right to expect, that your Excellency will, as his Majesty's Representative, give the necessary and effectual Orders, for the Removal of the above-mentioned Forces, by Sea and Land, out of this Port, and the Gate of the City, during the Session of the said Assembly.

The Committee reported that his Excellency did not think proper to consider this Message, 'til the House should make Choice and present to him their Speaker, after which he should consider the Message as coming from the House. Whereupon the Motion was made and the House came into the following Resolutions and Proteft.

In the House of Representatives, May 31, 1769.

WHEREAS their late Majesties King WILLIAM and Queen MARY, in the Third Year of their Reign, did by their Royal Charter ordain and grant, for themselves, their Heirs and Successors, That on the last Wednesday in the Month of May every Year, there should be convened, held and kept by the Governor of this Province for the Time being, a Great and General Court of Assembly, for such important Purposes, as in the said Royal Charter are expressly mentioned.

And in the said Charter it is particularly established and ordained, That yearly once in every Year for ever thereafter, the Number of Eight and Twenty Counsellors or Assistants, shall be, by the Great and General Court of Assembly, newly chosen: Which Election of Counsellors or Assistants by the General Assembly, as well as the Elections of a Speaker and a Clerk of the House of Representatives, by the said House, have always been made on the said last Wednesday of May, annually.

And whereas the said Great and General Court or Assembly is now convened by the Authority of his Majesty, according to the said Royal Charter:

RESOLVED, That this House, as one Branch of the same, in Duty and Loyalty to his Majesty, as well as in Regard to their own just Rights and Privileges, will to the utmost of their Power, support and maintain a Constitutional Freedom in their Elections, Debates and Determinations.

RESOLVED, As the Opinion of this House, That the keeping an armed Force by Sea and Land, in this Metropolis, and within the Harbour of the same, while the General Assembly, by his Majesty's Command, is here convened, is a Breach of Privilege, and inconsistent with that Dignity and Freedom, which they have a Right to deliberate, consult and determine.

RESOLVED, That this House proceed to take their Parts in the Elections of the Day, from Necessity, and in strict Conformity to the Royal Charter: Having before claimed their Constitutional Freedom, and now protesting, That their thus proceeding, while the above-said Forces are suffered to remain in the Metropolis, where the General Assembly is convened, is not to be considered as a Precedent in any Time hereafter, or construed as a voluntary Proceeding of this House from their Constitutional Claim.

Then the House made Choice of Mr. SAMUEL ADAMS for their Clerk, and afterwards they chose the Hon. THOMAS CUSHING, Esq; their Speaker, who being presented to the Governor and approved, when his Excellency sent the following Answer:

GENTLEMEN,

I HAVE no Authority over his Majesty's Ships in this Port, or his Troops within this Town; nor can I give any Orders for their Removal.

The SPEECH of his EXCELLENCY Sir FRANCIS BERNARD, Baronet, Captain-General and Governor in Chief, in and over his Majesty's Province of the Massachusetts-Bay in New-England, and Vice-Admiral of the same. To the Great General Court, or Assembly, of said Province, convened at Boston, May 31, 1769.

Gentlemen of the Council, and Gentlemen of the House of Representatives,

AS I have Nothing in immediate Command from his Majesty to lay before you, I shall at present only recommend to you to give your earliest Attention to the Business of the Province: This is got into such an Arrear, that it will require the utmost Diligence to get it done within the usual Time generally allotted to this Session. What I shall have to point out to you will be communicated by separate Messages.

I shall be ready to concur with you in all Measures proposed for the Good of the People, that are consistent with the invariable Rule I have laid down, of not departing from the Duty I owe to the King. The Service of the Crown, and the Interest of the People, are Objects very compatible with each other; they must be so under a Monarch, who makes the general Welfare of all his Subjects the sole End of his Government. It shall not be my Fault, if this Coalition of Duties is not as apparent as it is real.

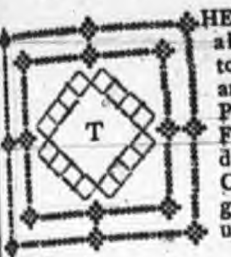

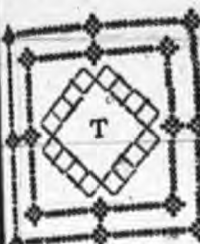

HEY advise from Leghorn, that a large Dutch Transport, bound to Corfica with Ammunition and Stores for the Use of Gen. Paoli, has been taken by a French Frigate, the Commander of which unloaded the Cargo, dismissed the Ship, and gave the Dutch Captain Bills upon Paris to the whole A-

mount. Letters from Paris now speak of the Treaty, offensive and defensive, said to have been concluded between their Court and those of Vienna, Madrid, and Berlin, as a Report that stands in Need of as much Confirmation as that of the English Ministry having offered to restore Canada to France.

April 18. The Four City Members were all of one Opinion on a late Occasion.

Yesterday Morning the Freeholders of Middlesex met at the Mile-End Assembly-Room, according to the Advertisement for that Purpose. The Room was as full as it could be crowded, and it is computed to hold about 1500. All the Avenues to the House were thronged, and above 5000 People were assembled in the Road before it. At 12, John Sawbridge, Esq; Member for Keith in Kent, was called to the Chair, and declared the Intention of the Meeting. James Townsend, Esq; Member for Westlone in Cornwall, in a very elegant and animated Speech, deplored the Necessity of seeking out some new Remedy for a new Grievance: A Grievance, which, 'til this Period, no King, no Minister, no Enemy, no Power on Earth ever laid upon this Kingdom, since it received the Name of England.

With the greatest Force and Conviction from Law, History, and the natural Rights of Mankind, he asserted the Privilege of Representation to the People. He declared himself ready to run every Risk and to undergo every Suffering to preserve this invaluable Blessing to his Countrymen, and that he would never tamely submit to offer up his Liberty at the Shrine of any Minister or earthly Potentate or Power. He concluded with a Wish, that some Freeholders would propose a Plan that might serve to confirm to us the Rights (if there are any) that still remain unviolated, and to recover those which have been violently and unjustly taken from us, especially that important leading Right on which all others depend—the Right of Election.

The Reyd. Mr. Horne then made a Motion, That a Committee of Grievances and Apprehensions be appointed to take the same into Consideration, particularly the present alarming Attack made on the Right of Election, and at the next general Meeting to propose the proper constitutional Measures to be taken for Redress.

He supported his Motion by many strong and convincing Arguments, and it was carried *Nem. Con.* The Chairman in putting the Question declaring his entire Approbation of it.

James Adair, Esq; George Bellas, Esq; and many others, spoke in support of the following Motions, which were likewise carried *Nem. Con.*

I. That the Committee consist of 100 Freeholders.

II. That Walpole Eyre, Esq; be Chairman of the said Committee.

IV. That George Bellas, Esq; be Deputy-Chairman.

V. That the future Meeting of the Committee of the County, be called by Advertisement in the public Papers signed by the Chairman, or Deputy-Chairman. A Gentleman well versed in the Changes of the Weather says, that, in all Probability, the ensuing will be a very hot Summer, and that great Numbers will be carried off.

A certain spirited Gentleman, we are told, Yesterday at Mile-End, declared, that he was determined, on his Part, and hoped that it was the Intention of the whole Company to exert himself in making decent and proper Remonstrances against the oppressive Measures, as he termed them, that had been lately practised; but that if such Applications had not Effect, he was determined, he said, to oppose them, if he died his black Coat red.

The H. of C. have agreed to the Amendments made to the Bill for an Agreement with the East-India Company.

The H. of C. which was very full Yesterday continued sitting very late, and met again this Day.

Yesterday the House had under their Consideration, the return of the Writ for the County of Middlesex, and adhered to their former Resolution finding Mr. Wilkes incapable of being Chosen a Member of that House; a Motion was made to delay the further Consideration of this Affair 'til Monday, but on a Division 207 to 115, it was carried to proceed To-morrow.

April 20. Yesterday in the Afternoon Col. Luttrell took the Oaths, and his Seat in the House of Commons as Knight of the Shire for the County of Middlesex.

It is said that Lord Irnham (an Irish Lord, and Father of Lieut. Col. Luttrell, the new made Member for Middlesex) will be created an English Peer; and that his Son will be appointed Colonel of the First vacant Regiment, a Promotion that will not vacate his Seat in Parliament.

The favourite Toast of the Day is, "May the Freeholders of this Kingdom hold their Tenures as long as

their Lives, and transmit them unimpaired to their latest Posterity!"

The Militia of this Kingdom was made perpetual on the 12th Current. It is remarkable the M—t—y were all for it.

An incendiary Letter, it is said, was Yesterday sent to a Right Honourable Person in a high Station, enumerating many Encroachments pretended to have been made on the Liberties of the Subject for these Three or Four Years past, and advising more Circumspection for the Future, or in all probability another G—l R—n would happen.

About 7000 Troops are now laying in Disguise, like Mr. Bayes's, in the Environs of London: All the Difference is, that the Inn-Keepers were his Friends; it is imagined the present Landlords are not so to the above Troops.

It is now said with certainty, that a Naval Promotion will take Place in July next, when the following Number of Officers of each Rank will be made, viz. Six Admirals, Twelve Post Captains, Twelve Masters and Commanders, and Eighteen Lieutenants.

We hear that a Lady of great Consequence lost the Sum of 25,000l. a few Nights ago at the Game of Hazard.

April 25. The Appointment of a Bishop in America, is, we hear, settled; the Person, as yet, unknown; the Residence, Albany.

We hear that a considerable Pension will be settled on a certain Governor in America, as a Reward for his faithful Services.

A Gentleman near Cavendish-Square whose Name is Gilbert, has invented a Carriage, it is said, which has a Power to run at the Rate of Twenty Miles or upwards in an Hour, for a Constancy, without Horses, on a different Construction to any hitherto known, and will go with equal Swiftmess backward or forward with Ease, and stop at Command. A heavy Carriage, built on this Principal, will carry an unlimited Number of Tons Weight, without any Labour to keep it going, and may be of the same Utility by Water.

We hear from Quebec, that the Canadian Inhabitants have lately shewn a very discontented Spirit, which is said to have arisen from the Influence of the Jesuits, a great Number of whom are now in that Part of the World.

April 26. The Petition intended to be presented, it is said, is likely to meet with a warm Reception, as the Friends to Ad—n have industriously propagated a Report that they are all prepared come when they will.

The following Bill was stuck up on Sunday Morning last, on one of the Pillars of the Portico of St. Martins Church in the Fields. The Prayers of this Congregation are earnestly desired to implore the Divine Mercy to send us Peace and Safety through these Realms, to confound the Measures of the weak and the wicked Ministers, to shorten their Days of Power and to turn the Hearts of an obdurate—

April 27. Last Week as Colonel Henry Lawes Luttrell was riding in Hyde-Park, he was suddenly surrounded by a flying Party of the Mobility, in Number about 40 or 50 Persons; but having the Presence of Mind to throw among them a Handful or Two of Silver, and clapping Spurs to his Horse, had the good Fortune, for this one Time, to escape the Vengeance of an enraged and implacable Populace.

April 28. It is reported that the Reason of Mr. Wilkes not having publicly addressed the Freeholders since his being declared (the last Time) incapable of sitting during this Parliament, is, that the Freeholders having resolved to enquire into, and legally assert their own Rights, it was no longer his Cause, but theirs.

We hear that his Majesty will go to the House of Peers on Tuesday next, and put an End to this Session of Parliament by a most gracious Speech from the Throne.

Bets in the City were Yesterday Seven to Three, that Mr. Wilkes would receive a Pardon before the Expiration of next Week.

Just as this Paper was going to Press, we received the following Account of the Mile-End Meeting from the Committee.

At a Meeting of the Freeholders of Middlesex Yesterday, at the Mile-End Assembly-Room, James Adair, Esq; in the Chair, a Petition was proposed from the Committee of Grievances and Apprehensions, and read by George Bellas, Esq; Deputy Chairman of the Committee, it was received with universal Applause, and agreed to, without one dissenting Voice. John Sawbridge and James Townsend, Esqrs. were the only Gentlemen who spoke to it. Several short Hand Writers were observed in the Room, on which Mr. Townsend declared, that he was neither ashamed nor afraid of speaking the Truth in any Place, but thought it improper that this Petition should be given to the Public before it had been presented to his Majesty, and therefore desired that no Person would write it down; He made an Apology for Mr. Glynn's Absence, owing to the Gout; but informed them, that Mr. Glynn had been present at the Committee, and had expressed at the same Time, his Approbation of the Petition, and his Willingness to convey it to his Majesty, if the Freeholders should think proper to honour him with their Commands for that Purpose. The Thanks of the Meeting were given to Walpole Eyre, Esq; Chairman, and George Bellas, Esq; Deputy Chairman of the Committee; to John Sawbridge, and James Townsend, Esqrs. for the Part they had taken in this Business,

and to Mr. Horne, for his great Trouble, Care, and Judgment, in drawing up, and preparing the Petition, and to the rest of the Committee.—It was then resolved, that John Glynn, Esq; Walpole Eyre, Esq; George Bellas, Esq; James Adair, Esq; John Sawbridge, Esq; James Townsend, Esq; the Rev. Dr. Willon, George Prescott, Esq; Arnold Wallinger, Esq; and Francis Ayscough, Esq; be desired to wait upon his Majesty, with the said Petition. Mr. Townsend desired that it might be understood, that no other Freeholder should attend the delivering of this Petition, because it might give a Pretence to Administration, to play their old Game, and misrepresent to his Majesty, an Act of their innocent Curiosity, as Tumult, Insurrection, and open Rebellion. The Petition was signed by upwards of Five Hundred Freeholders; many others finding it difficult to get to the Table, reserved themselves to another Opportunity of signing it.

Yesterday, upwards of Thirty Gentlemen of the Livery, waited on the Right Honourable the Lord Mayor, with a Paper signed by them, signifying that they apprehended the Liberties of the Freeholders of the County of Middlesex have been violated by a Rejection of their Member to Parliament, who has been repeatedly and legally chosen by a great Majority; and also mentioning other Grievances they sustain and apprehend: Therefore they request his Lordship would be pleased to issue out his Precept for a Common-Hall, that they may take the Sense of the Livery of London on these Matters, and to consider what Measures are necessary to be pursued under the present Circumstances of public Affairs. His Lordship received them very politely, and expressed a very great Respect for the Livery; but requested, that as this was a Matter of very great Importance, that they would allow him a short Time to consider of an Answer, in which he would consult those Persons who may be called the Guardians of this City.

Saturday is the Day, on which the Time limited for presenting any Petition against the Election of Colonel Luttrell for Middlesex will expire.

Yesterday it was currently reported in Town, that a Manifesto was arrived from the King of Prussia, insisting upon a very large Sum of Money being immediately paid him by this Government, for Arrears due upon the Conclusion of the last War, and in case of Refusal to march Forty Thousand Men directly to take Possession of Hanover.

The House being so near breaking up is said to be the Reason that a certain Gentleman did not apply for his Discharge, on making the usual Submission.

It is said that a certain patriotic Gentleman, who has, with a true patriotic Spirit, exerted himself in the Cause of Liberty, and who is possessed of a very considerable Estate in the County of Middlesex, in, and about Tottenham, has resolved to sell it, giving, as a Reason, "That he cannot think of holding an Estate in any County, where his Voice, as a Freeholder, in the Choice of a Representative is set at naught."

It was the Whisper of Yesterday Morning, amongst some political Connoisseurs, at the West-End of the Town, that in Consequence of some spirited Negotiations, lately dispatched to a certain Northern Court, that Monarch has absolutely marched no less a Body than 30,000 Men into a certain Electorate.

Some Letters from Paris mention, that the Court had just received private Intimations concerning the true Intent and Destination of the great Naval Armaments at present fitting out in Denmark, which have given them some Disgust.

It is rumoured that the Mischance and Illness of a very great and most amiable Personage, was occasioned by a Fright, at the Time of certain tumultuous Proceedings.

On Friday, when his Majesty was returning from the House, as soon as the State Coach came from under the Horse-Guards, it was surrounded by a very great Mob, who ran up to St. James's, by each Side of it, and, among some other high Indignities shewn by them, exclaimed, in his Hearing, "Wilkes for ever! No Luttrell!" and continued doing so, 'til his Majesty got out at the Palace.

When the House of Commons took under Consideration the Election for the County of Middlesex, George Onslow, Esq; moved, that the Sheriff's ought to have returned H. L. Luttrell, Esq; and not John Wilkes, Esq; which Motion was seconded by Sir A. Gilmour, Lord Clare, Cha. Jenkinson, Attorney-General, Sir Fletcher Norton, S. Fox, Lord North, J. Dyson, Couns. Thurlow, Col. Onslow, Hans Stanley.

They were opposed by Ald. Beckford, Col. Barre, T. Townshend, C. W. Cornwall, Serjeant Glynn, John Aubrey, Ja. Townsend, E. Burke, Esq; G. Grenville, Esq; Sir W. Meridith, Sir George Saville, Const. Phipps, Esq; Sir Joseph Mawbey, John Sawbridge, Esq; W. Dowdeswell, Esq;

April 29. It is said that a great Personage has declared that unless a certain Petition, now depending, is signed by a Majority of the whole Freeholders, that it will not be regarded, as it cannot be said to be the Voice of the County.

We are told that it is an invariable Principle of the present Administration, to meddle with no Connexions on the Continent, as the Blood and Treasures of Great-Britain, have been long prodigally lavished in fighting the Battles of others.

Patents are said to be making out for Nine new Peerages, Five on the other Side the Water, and Four in England.



B O S T O N, June 8.

By Capt. Hall we hear that there were very great Commotions all over England; in London it is said that no less than 110,000 were assembled at one Time on Account of Mr. Wilkes's Place being assumed by Col. Luttrell: The whole County of Middlesex are about presenting a Petition to his Majesty, in which our Americans are particularly noticed. It is said much depends upon the Success of this Petition.

We hear that Orders have been received by the Packet for the 64th and 65th Regiments, with the Train of Artillery, to be removed from this Place to Halifax, and that they are to embark in about Ten Days.—'Tis also said that the 14th Regiment is soon to go to New-York, and that the 29th will be stationed at the Castle.

The Public may be assured that the following Intelligence comes from Gentlemen of Distinction (our Friends) on the other Side the Water, by the last Vessels from London, viz.

THEY write, That the Parliament remain fix'd in their Resolution not to repeal the Duty Acts this Session, and will rise the First of May.

We learn from the best Authority, that Orders were issued from Lord Hillsborough's Office, on or about the 10th of April, to Governor Bernard, directing him immediately to repair to London.

A N N A P O L I S, June 29.

Several of the Counties having before entered into Resolutions of Non-Importation of British Superfluities, and the Province, in general, being invited by the People of Anne-Arundel County, to request some Gentlemen from each County, to meet at this Place, on the 20th Instant, in order that a general Resolution of Non-Importation might be formed.—There was accordingly a very full Meeting, at which, the following Resolutions were entered into; and it was agreed, that Twelve Copies should be printed and transmitted to each County, to be signed by the People, which, it is expected, will be done with great Readiness throughout the Province.

WE, the Subscribers, his Majesty's loyal and dutiful Subjects, the Merchants, Traders, Freeholders, Mechanics, and other Inhabitants of the Province of Maryland, seriously considering the present State and Condition of the Province, and being sensible, that there is a Necessity to agree upon such Measures, as may tend to discourage, and as much as may, prevent the Use of foreign Luxuries and Superfluities, in the Consumption of which, we have heretofore too much indulged ourselves, to the great Detriment of our private Fortunes, and, in some Instances, to the Ruin of Families; and, to this End, to practice ourselves, and as much as possible, to promote, countenance, and encourage in others, a Habit of Temperance, Frugality, Economy, and Industry; and considering also, that Measures of this Nature are more particularly necessary at this Time, as the Parliament of Great-Britain, by imposing Taxes upon many Articles imported hither from thence, and from other Parts beyond Sea, has left it less in our Power, than in Time past, to purchase and pay for the Manufactures of the Mother-Country; which Taxes, especially those imposed by a late Act of Parliament, laying Duties on Tea, Paper, Glass, &c. we are clearly convinced have been imposed contrary to the Spirit of our Constitution, and have a direct and manifest Tendency to deprive us, in the End, of all political Freedom, and reduce us to a State of Dependence, inconsistent with that Liberty we have rightfully enjoyed under the Government of his present most Sacred Majesty, (to whom we owe, acknowledge, and will always joyfully pay all due Obedience and Allegiance) and of his royal Predecessors, ever since the first Settlement of the Province, until of very late Time; have thought it necessary to unite, as nearly as our Circumstances will admit, with our Sister Colonies, in Resolutions for the Purpose aforesaid; and therefore, do hereby agree, and bind ourselves to, and with each other, by all the Ties and Obligations of Honour and Reputation; that we will strictly and faithfully observe, and conform to the following Resolutions:

FIRST, That we will not, at any Time hereafter, directly, or indirectly, import, or cause to be imported, any Manner of Goods, Merchandise, or Manufactures, which are, or shall hereafter be taxed by Act of Parliament, for the Purpose of raising a Revenue in America, (except Paper not exceeding Six Shillings per Ream, and except such Articles only, as Orders have been already sent for) but, that we will always consider such Taxation, in every Respect, as an absolute Prohibition to the Articles that are, or may be taxed.

SECONDLY, That we will not hereafter, directly or indirectly, during the Continuance of the aforesaid Act of Parliament, import, or cause to be imported, from Great-Britain, or any other Part of Europe, (except such Articles of the Produce, or Manufacture of Ireland, as may be immediately and legally brought from thence, and also, except all such Goods as Orders have been already sent for) any of the Goods herein after enumerated, to wit, Horses, Spirits, Wine, Cyder, Perry, Beer, Ale, Malt, Barley, Pease, Beef, Pork, Fish, Butter, Cheese, Tallow, Candles, Oil, except Salad-Oil, Fruit, Pickles, Confectionary, British refined Sugar, Mustard, Coffee, Pewter, Tin-Ware of all Kinds, whether plain or painted, Waiters, and all Kind of Japan-Ware, wrought Copper, wrought and cast Brass, and Bell-Metal, Watches, Clocks, Plate, and all other Gold and Silver-Smiths Work, Trinkets, and Jewellery of

all Kinds, Gold and Silver Lace, Joiners and Cabinet Work of all Sorts, Looking-Glasses, Upholstery of all Kinds, Carriages of all Kinds, Ribbons and Millinery of all Kinds, except Wig-Ribbons, Lace, Cambric, Lawn, Muslin, Kenting, Gauze of all Kinds, except Boulting-Clothes, Silks of all Kinds, except raw and sewing Silk, and Wig-Cauls, Velvets, Chintzes, and Calicoes of all Sorts, of more than Twenty Pence per Yard, East-India Goods of every Kind, except Saltpetre, Black Pepper, and Spices, printed Linens, and printed Cottons, striped Linens, and Cottons, Check Linens, and Cotton Checks of all Kinds, Handkerchiefs of all Kinds, at more than Ten Shillings per Dozen, Cotton Velvets, and all Kind of Cotton, or Cotton and Linen Stuffs, Bed-Bunts, and Bed-Ticking of all Sorts, Cotton Counterpanes and Coverlids, British manufactured Linens of all Kinds, except Sail-Cloth, Irish and all foreign Linens, above One Shilling and Six Pence per Yard, Woollen Cloth, above Five Quarters wide, of more than Five Shillings per Yard, narrow Cloths of all Sorts, of more than Three Shillings per Yard, Worsted Stuffs of all Sorts, above Thirteen Pence per Yard, Silk and Worsted, Silk and Cotton, Silk and Hair, and Hair and Worsted Stuffs of all Kinds, Worsted and Hair Shags, Mourning of all and every Kind, Stockings, Caps, Waistcoat and Breeches Patterns of all Kinds, Rugs of all Sorts, above Eight Shillings, Blankets, above Five Shillings per Blanket, Mens and Womens ready made Cloaths, and wearing Apparel of all Kinds, Hats of all Kinds, of more than Two Shillings per Hat, Wigs, Gloves, and Mitts of all Kinds, Stays and Bodices of all Sorts, Boots, Saddles, and all Manufactures of Leather and Skins of all Kinds, except Mens and Womens Shoes, of not more than Four Shillings per Pair, Whips, Brushes, and Brooms of all Sorts, Gilt, and Hair Trunks, Paintings, Carpets of all Sorts, Snuff-Boxes, Snuff, and other manufactured Tobacco, Soap, Starch, playing Cards, Dice, English China, English Ware, in Imitation of China, Delph, and Stone Ware of all Sorts, except Milk-Pans, Stone Bottles, Jugs, Pitchers, and Chamber-Pots, Marble and wrought Stone of any Kind, except Scythe-Stones, Mill-Stones, and Grind-Stones, Iron Castings, Ironmongery of all Sorts, except Nails, Hoes, Steel, Handicraft and Manufacturers Tools, Locks, Fryng-Pans, Scythes and Sickles, Cutlery of all Sorts, except Knives and Forks, not exceeding Three Shillings per Dozen, Knives, Scissors, Sheep-Shears, Needles, Pins and Thimbles, Razors, Chirurgical Instruments, and Spectacles, Cordage, or tarr'd Rope of all Sorts, Seams, Ships Colours ready made, Ivory, Horn, and Bone Ware of all Sorts, except Combs.

THIRDLY, That we will not, during the Time aforesaid, import any Wines, of any Kind whatever, or purchase the same from any Person whatever, except such Wines as are already imported, or for which Orders are already sent.

FOURTHLY, That we will not kill, or suffer to be killed, or sell, or dispose to any Person, whom we have Reason to believe intends to kill, any Ewe Lamb that shall be yearned before the First Day of May in any Year, during the Time aforesaid.

FIFTHLY, That we will not, directly, or indirectly, during the Time aforesaid, purchase, take up, or receive, on any Terms, or Conditions whatever, any of the Goods enumerated in the Second Resolution, that shall, or may be imported into this Province, contrary to the Intent and Design of these Resolutions, by any Person whatever, or consigned to any Factor, Agent, Manager, or Storekeeper here, by any Person residing in Great-Britain, or elsewhere; and if any such Goods shall be imported, we will not, upon any Consideration whatever, rent, or sell to, or permit any Way to be made Use of by any such Importer, his Agent, Factor, Manager, or Storekeeper, or any Person, on his, or their Behalf, any Store-House, or other House, or any Kind of Place whatever, belonging to us, respectively, for exposing to Sale, or even securing any such Goods, nor will we suffer any such to be put on Shore on our respective Properties.
