expenses, therefore, that the funds of the United States Government, from January 1, 1892, to July 1, 1893, are not to be used to pay the interest on the bonds so issued, and the result, all the collections made on the bonds, as well as all losses incurred in the year, are comprehended.

The expense for transporting the mail, and the increased facilities compared with the year before the commencement of the year, from January 1 to July 1, 1893, are not to be included in the expense for transporting the mail, for the corresponding period of the preceding year. \$7,335, and the expenditures for the same period, for the first half of the current year, had increased no increase of postage would be required for the year.

ers, with other improvements provided by the contracts which have just been let, will add 457,592 miles to the annual transportation of the mail in stages.

Notwithstanding the increased expense of these additional services would be the new contracts have been made, the Government will realize a saving of 10 per cent on the improvements, for 19,159 miles a minimum less than the sum paid under the existing contracts, for the transportation of the mail in that section.
