

A Century of Commitment

From an opening day enrollment of 57 students, Frostburg State University has grown to a present-day enrollment of over 5,000 students. Its physical plant, once limited to a single building, Old Main, which housed classrooms, a library, a gymnasium-auditorium, and a modern chemical laboratory, has also grown to over 30 facilities including classroom buildings, residence halls, the Lewis J. Ort Library, the Physical Education Center, the Lane Center, and the Performing Arts Center, situated on 255 beautiful acres.

Opened in 1902 as State Normal School No. 2, the University owes its existence to the tenacity of J. Benson Oder, editor of the *Frostburg Mining Journal*, and the citizens of Frostburg and surrounding communities who, in spite of political barriers, raised funds and purchased the site on which the University is located.


Principal Edmund Dandridge Murdaugh and three faculty instructed the first Normal School class; in addition, the other faculty taught 151 children in the Model School. The Normal School students, who were high school students having to meet no requirements other than age (girls, 16; boys, 17), had but one two-year course of study, elementary education. The curriculum consisted of Latin, mathematics, history, rhetoric and literature, natural and physical sciences, drawing, music, calisthenics, psychology, philosophy of education, philosophy of school management, Pedagogy, Observation, Practice Work and Primary Manual Training.

Over the years, the name of the institution has reflected the changes in the scope of its educational mission. In 1934, The State Normal School No. 2 became the State Teachers College at Frostburg, a four-year college which offered a Bachelor of Science in Elementary Education. In 1963, the name became Frostburg State College, and finally in 1987, with the strong support of the local civic and business community, became Frostburg State University, an indication of its growing resources, diversity and excellence in educational opportunities for the region and the state.

In 1988, FSU became a constituent institution of the University System of Maryland, comprising 11 of the state's 13 public institutions. Expanding to meet the educational needs of the region, the FSU Center in Hagerstown was also established in 1988 to offer upper-level bachelor's degree coursework and graduate programs. The University also opened, in 1990, a permanent location for the Frederick MBA program.

Throughout its growth, the University has emphasized excellence in teaching. Over 80% of the full-time faculty hold Ph.D.'s or terminal degrees from institutions that are among the most prestigious in the nation. Faculty scholarship has led to scholarly books, manuals and journals, as well as numerous articles and reviews. This excellence in faculty has resulted in superior results for students. FSU was ranked first among its peers for the number of doctorates per 100 baccalaureate degrees awarded. In the same study, FSU was ranked second in the percentage of national, prestigious awards received by faculty. These have included Fulbrights and significant grants from the National Endowment for the Humanities, the National Endowment for the Arts and other national associations.

At the same time, the University has developed comparable excellence in academic programs, research, consulting, cultural and athletic events, and facilities. In recent years the campus has



consistently received a superior rating, the highest state award given for facilities and maintenance. In addition, FSU was also recently ranked the safest campus in Maryland in a report from an industrial research firm.

Today, the University's mission and services have expanded significantly. Over 400 full-time administrators and support staff, and more than 200 full-time faculty serve the educational needs of students who come not only from throughout the United States, but also the world. These students have a choice of 34 major programs of study leading to the Bachelor of Art, Bachelor of Science, and Bachelor of Fine Arts degrees as well as graduate degrees in applied ecology and conservation biology, business administration, counseling psychology, education, wildlife/fisheries biology, human performance, modern humanities, and park and recreation resource management. In addition, 12 pre-professional programs are offered.

Frostburg State University continues in its pursuit of excellence as we celebrate our 100th anniversary. It is a tradition of excellence and commitment, which spans a century, that is FSU's legacy - as well as its future.

Academic Regalia

Academic regalia is a visible reminder that the process of intellectual pursuits has historic and honorable antecedents. The dignity of scholarship in the past remains vital in the present.

Academic costume consists of gowns, hoods and caps. Traditionally made from black silk, gowns increasingly are the color of the institution granting the degree. The bachelor's gown falls in straight lines and has long pointed sleeves, while the sleeves for the master's gown are closed with slits for the arms at the wrist. The doctor's gown has a velvet facing and three velvet bars on bell-shaped sleeves. The velvet is either black or of the color stipulated for the degree held.

The colorful hoods designate the degree of the wearer, the subject in -which the degree is held, and the institution which awarded the degree. The colors of the velvet bands on each hood and robe represent the scholar's field of learning while the official colors of the school awarding the degree are always shown in the lining of the hood. Frostburg State University's colors are red, black and white.

The black mortarboard type of cap is most commonly worn and it is usually made of the same material as the gown. Doctor's caps may be made of velvet and may have tassels of gold or in the color of the wearer's degree. Tassels of different colors are also used to indicate academic honors.

The Mace

In the Middle Ages, the mace was a weapon used against armored warriors. It evolved through the years into an ornamental staff which served as a symbol of the authority of the ruler. Colleges and universities have adopted the mace as a decorative staff or baton which is carried by the grand marshal of the institution in all formal academic processions. The mace is also displayed at other significant events.

The Frostburg State University mace was crafted from mountain walnut which was milled in nearby Flintstone, Maryland in 1945. The grain pattern of the quarter-sawn wood was enhanced by laminating side sections to a central shaft which was then turned, point-to-point, on a wood lathe. To obtain a high-gloss finish, ten coats of trewax were applied while mace was turned at high speed on the lathe. The fine detail work around the medallions and the final coating of wax were done by hand.

The design of the Frostburg State University mace is based upon the recorder, a woodwind musical instrument. Two die-struck replicas of the University seal are affixed to the top.

The mace was designed and crafted in 1986 by Dustin Davis of the Frostburg State University Department of Visual Arts.



The Medallion

The Frostburg State University medallion is a replica of the seal of the University and is worn by the President at all formal academic convocations as a symbol of leadership and responsibility vested in that office.

The Presidential medallion is die-struck metal with a highly polished gold finish. The design depicts a torch and shield encircled by the name Frostburg State University, and its location, Frostburg, Maryland. The torch symbolizes the enlightenment of higher education, while banners on each side proclaim the dual mission of the University: Leadership and Scholarship. Appearing on the shield are mountains which represent not only the location of the University, but timelessness and endurance; a bobcat, the mascot of FSU, representing strength and courage; an open book and a candle representing learning; and the founding date of the University, 1898.

The Grand Marshal

Dr. Edward L. Root is the Coordinator of the Administration/ Supervision Program for the FSU Educational Professions Department. He served as the Dean of the School of Education from 1987 to 1995. Prior to this appointment, he was the chair of the Education Department and Coordinator of Field Experiences.

Dr. Root received both his bachelor's and master's degrees from Frostburg State College in 1962 and 1966 respectively. He earned his doctorate from the University of Maryland in 1970.

Commencement Speakers

Patricia H. Kelley

In FSU's centennial year, history major Patricia Kelley would like to challenge her fellow graduates to think about the opportunities they enjoy as a result of the endless sacrifices of their predecessors.



Patty, a non-traditional student from Addison, Pennsylvania, has achieved a 4.0 grade point average while maintaining home, family and employment.

She is a member of Phi Alpha Theta and Sigma Tau Delta national honor societies, served as a presenter at the 1996 and 1998 English Colloquiums and participated in travel abroad programs to Greece, Germany, England, Scotland and Ireland.

Through an independent study and research project with the Allegany County Historical Society and the Thrasher Carriage Museum, Patty gained valuable experience in museum operations and had several research articles published.

As this commencement marks the closing of the FSU's celebration of 100 years of local heritage, Patty's professors believe that she exemplifies the institution's legacy.

"Patricia Kelley represents the finest of this heritage — a non-traditional student who overcame doubts about herself to achieve high academic honors and one who has already made her mark as a scholar on Western Maryland," one professor writes.

Patty hopes to obtain a position combining past business experience with her degree in history and minor in English.

Cherina Lehman's graduation today represents one more achievement in her impressive academic career. After transferring to FSU from Hagerstown Junior College, Cherina continued her record of academic excellence by



earning a perfect 4.0 grade point average in her three majors of social work, sociology and foreign languages and literature.

In recognition of her academic success, she has been inducted into the Phi Theta Kappa, Phi Alpha, Sigma Delta Pi and Pinnacle honor societies. Her professors feel her achievements are well-deserved.

"Cherina has been a quiet presence. She is observant, insightful and disciplined. She is someone who exemplifies excellence in academic achievement," says one of her professors from the Department of Social Work.

In addition to her academic studies, Cherina has traveled throughout Europe, the United States and Latin America. With her family, she has participated in missionary trips abroad with the Mennonite Church, working to address social problems associated with poverty.

She has just completed a social work field placement with a migrant child development program in Pennsylvania and hopes to continue working to aid the social development in the Hispanic community following her graduation.

Ronald Geatz

As publications director for The Nature Conservancy and editorin-chief of *Nature Conservancy* Magazine, Ronald Geatz, Class of '76, travels the vast regions of the world. Ron's journey to his

present position began while he was a student at Frostburg State. "Even in college I knew I wanted to get on my soap box by writing and communicating," he stated.

Following graduation, Ron worked as a media specialist at the campus library. His interest in public programs led him to employment with the Association of Advancement for Retired Persons, the American Film Institute and the Smithsonian. He has held various positions at The Nature Conservancy over the past eleven years.

Ron has recently been part of an official delegation to China where The Nature Conservancy is working with the central and local governments to establish the Great Rivers National Park in the Himalayan foothills.

In honor of his many professional accomplishments, Ron was presented with the Frostburg State University Alumni Achievement Award in 1985.

Dr. Catherine R. Gira

Dr. Catherine R. Gira became the President of Frostburg State University on September 1, 1991. Prior to that, she served for nine years as Provost at the University of Baltimore. She also



previously held the positions of Professor of English and Acting Dean of the College of Liberal Arts at that institution.

Dr. Gira has held leadership positions in numerous national and state professional associations, including the American Association of University Administrators (President, 1988-90); Federation of State Humanities Councils (Vice-Chair, 1993-94; National Secretary, 1991-93; and member of the Board of Directors, 1991-94); Commission on Higher Education; Middle States Association Commissioner (1994-present) and member of the Executive Committee (1997-present); American Council on Education Leadership Commission (1994-1996); Maryland Humanities Council (Chair, 1989-91, member, 1983-95); Maryland Association of Higher Education (President, 1986-87). She currently serves on several regional and national boards, including those of the Western Maryland Health System, the Rocky Gap Foundation, the Regional Education Service Agency, the Cumberland Theatre, and the Maryland Symphony Orchestra.

Dr. Gira earned a B.S. from California State College (PA), an M.Ed. and a Master's in Liberal Arts from The Johns Hopkins University, and a Ph.D. in Literature from the American University. She has been recognized as Woman of the Year by the Maryland Legislature (1993), as one of Maryland's Top 100 Women (1996), and in 1997 was inducted into the Maryland Women's Hall of Fame. She has also been formally honored for her role in regional economic development by the regional Tourism Association Board and by local media. She has published numerous articles on Shakespeare, Renaissance art and literature, and issues in higher education. She has also authored a bibliographic and critical study of Shakespeare's Henry IV, published by Garland Publishing Company in 1994.

Candidates for Degrees

At this Commencement, degrees are conferred upon persons who completed requirements in August and December, 1998. As final action cannot always be taken by the time this program is printed, the list of candidates here is tentative only. The transcript of the University, signed and sealed by its proper officer, remains the official testimony to the possession of a degree. The designation of honors is based on the grade point average at the end of the summer semester. The final grade point average will determine honor ranking.
