Nemacolin was an Indian brave who was asked by Colonel Cresap, the first white settler in Western Maryland, to blaze a trail westward from Cumberland. This small trail became the National Road, Route 40, the first major road to connect the East and West. Frostburg State College is located on this highway, the old Nemacolin trail, and the yearbook assumed the Indian name.


Leadership Conference






Judicial Board

Behavioral Science Club





Wesley Club












Sowers Hall








Football

Football this season was both frustrating and exhilarating. The Bobcats' four victories and four defeats in adequately represented their true ability and potential.

















In addition, the team performed during half-time at many of the FSC basketball games.










