


A year ago when NEMACOLIN went to press, we were concerned about the Russian Sputnik and the American Satellite. Even then we in America were much in agreement that we should continue an education which meets a broad range of needs of our country and our people, including science, mathematics, and the humanities.


Today, school systems are concerning themselves about a balanced curriculum to care for all the children of all the people, including the atypical child. Guidance is receiving much attention not only as it relates to the responsibility of all the teachers but also as to its function in effecting a plan whereby more students skilled in mathematics, science, and languages actually pursue higher mathematics, advanced science, and four years of language.

Here, today, at State the curriculum has been advanced in the past year to include graduate work leading to a Master of Education degree. Summer school, both undergraduate and graduate, began in the summer of 1958. The student body currently represents every county on the Western Shore. A study is being made of the curriculum and buildings needed for the next ten years to serve Western Maryland where more and more students are taking advantage of higher education.

The Faculty and I congratulate NEMACOLIN Staff and their Adviser upon their careful guidance in publishing this yearbook. Your classmates, too, join in this expression of appreciation for this record of history and of their activities to which they will look with joy and pride in the years ahead.


Wednesday arrived . . . Freshmen were acquainted with the madness called Registration. The evening reception in the President's home proved to be interesting.

"Son, what ARE the winters like here?"












### WE ARE HERE AT LAST! COLLEGE . . .



Chappell's record smashing jump of 6'2" was performed before an awe-stricken crowd at Towson. Chappell might have gone higher but stopped his leaping to aid the squad in other events. Also contributing to the facility-stricken track picture was the performance turned in by Bill Preston in the mile and two-mile events. Bill is a capable distance man having lost but once last season to James Keedy at Fairmont in a photo finish.




... growth ... kind growth
