

LONDON, December 6. PROCEESS of the march of the PRIMES of HESSE, COMMANDER IN CHIEF OF THE DANISH AUXILLARY FORCES IN SWEDEN.

We are particularly happy in laying thus early before the public, the following official letter from his roy-al highnefs the prince of Heffe, to the minister of the war department at Copenhagen. It contains the whole progress of his operations, and is the only an-thentic document which has been yet published on the fubject.

Although there are later advices from the army, this letter is not the lefs material, as it explains the infiractions under which the prince of Heffe acted, and that his defign was to attack the Swedes, at the bridge of Quiftrom, provided they had offered to difpute his paffage.

commanded mylell. On the 23d in the afternoon I repaired to Ide, by the way of Frederickfhald, in company with his royal highnels the prince of Denmark. The main army ar-rived there the following night, and the next day marched towards Orebakke: at midnight they embarked in 29 boats, and arrived at Krogstrand at fix the next morning. I immediately took pofferfion of all the heights and other advantageous pofts, without meeting the leaft opposition. I determined the next morning to march towards Skee with four battalions, the dragoons, and a company of rangers. I ordered colonel Stricker to follow me with three more battalions. I there understood that colenel Tranefeld (the Swedish tommander) was in march with 400 men and four cannon ;---that on the zzd they had paffed through Stromitradt, and on the z4th arrived at Swinefund.--My debarkation at Krogstrand was the more unexpected to the Swedes, as no military detachment had ever before paffed the river there, on account of its danger,

My debarkation, however, at Krogftrand, reached the knowledge of colonel Transfeld, as my march from thence was confiderably impeded by hard mins, which prevented the coming up of the troops, fo that colonel Transfeld had time to retire in hafte towards Stromftradt, after deftroying all the paffages and bridges in his way. On hearing that he was poffed before that place, near a bridge called Wetland, I repaired thi-ther, and on my arrival, perceived a very extended line of troops, but only one deep, with artillery, and a large number of different carriages. The bridge was broken down and the river deep. However we advanced, and found another river with the bridge likewife broken down. We were bufy in getting it together again, when an officer, accompanied with a drum, advanced towards me, and afked me in the name of colonel Tranefeld, what was the defign of our army? I poffed at about 1500 paces from the Swedifh army, and covered the troops behind fome eminences, placing myfelf on a battery, fituated on a rock in a very advantageous polition. Once more I was complimented by a meffage from colonel Trane-feld, delivered by an officer of artillery, requiring fome explanation of my manifefto. I immediately fent him for anfwer, that the king of Denmark was not at war with the king of Sweden ; but that in virtue of his alliance with the empress of Ruffia, he found himfelf obliged to furnish her with a body of auxiliaries, and that I was under the necessity, though the much smith and the second the Swedish though much against my will, to attack the Swedish toops wherever I found them; that nevertheless it de-pended on him to retire, that gtherwife I should march

fition of attack. I profited of this interval to reconnoitre the right wing of the Swedish army posted along the river. At fome distance on the banks of it, oppofite to me, I perceived a troop of rangers; an officer approached and cried out to me, Friend! I begged of him to hear me, and afked where colonel Transfeld

was, adding, " that I fhould receive much fatisfaction on feeing him before we began." The colonel came, and alighted from his horfe, de-fired to know my final purpoles. I refused him at once this request, on which he retired, and took the module the starting to be a starting of the s road in the night time from Quiftrom to Uddewalla. In the morning I continued my march, and detached two battalions to the help of count Schmettau to repair the bridges which lay in his road. I ordered the battalion of Sudenfeld to take poffeffion of Stromstradt and of the royal magazine there. The troops found in it 1700 tuns of wheat and 1500 gallons of fpirits. I established the hospital there.

The prince royal is with me, I defign to march on to Quiftrom, where I am told the Swedes are posted. The troops are in high spirits, notwithstanding the continual rains, and the fatigue of daily marches. I am myfelf with the advanced guard, nine miles from Stromstradt, and defign to affemble the greater part of the army near Quiftrom.

Manifefto of the prince of Heffe. Charles landgrave and prince of Heffe, &c. &c. &c. field marshal and commander in chief of his Danish

majefty's troops, makes known, " That his majefty the king of Denmark being under engagements with Ruffia, and in order to fulfil the treaty with that power, on the requisition of the em-prefs, finds himfelf obliged to allot a part of his forces by fea and land to her fervice, as auxiliary troops against We have the following ANECDOTE of an old gentleman, Sweden :.

" It is his majefty's fupreme will that these auxiliatroops observe the firictest order and discipline, and that they commit no diforder whatever to any one who does not oppose them hostilely.—On the contrary, that the property of every Swedish subject should be rather protected and placed in safety; and in case that in defiance of every endeavour, any one dare thieve, pil-lage or exercise any violence, he shall be punished with every rigour of the law, as it is his majesty's earnest defire to alleviate, as far as circumftances will permit, the burthen of the war, and to contribute at the fame time to establish peace on a fure and lasting basis.

His majefty affures himfelf in confequence, that in confideration of this mode of proceeding, his troops will experience, in an equal degree, a fair treatment in Sweden, particularly that the inhabitants, whether burghers of town or inhabiting the open country, will not oppose them by open violence, or attack them hoftilely ; in which cafe, all those found under arms contrary to the cuftom of war, will draw on themfelves infallibly the most rigorous treatment, and all the ru-inous confequences refulting from it."

#### NASSAU (N. Providence) February 14.

W by W. about five leagues diffant; and the faid deponents John Cork and Luke Dixon for themfelves feverally lay, that about feven o'clock in the evening of the fame day, being on the quarter-deck of the faid veffel, (the faid John Harvey being below) they difco-vered a very large whale on the flarboard-beam fpouting, which continued to approach the veffel till it ar-rived to close along fide, that a negro man on board, one of the failors, took up a billet of wood in order to ftrike and frighten it from the veffel; that before the went down near the flarboard-quarter, and rifing fruck the vefiel under that quarter, hove her all a back in the the veliel under that quarter, hove her all a back in the wind, and went down again, and immediately after-wards coming up, made a most violent firoke with its tail, which however missed the vessel; but the faid vessel received fo much damage from the first stroke, was then finking. And all the faid deponents fay,

that upon the first shock of the stroke, the faid John that upon the first shock of the troke, the fall joint Harvey, the mate, with the mafter, came on deck, and finding the veffel going down, ordered the gripes of the boat to be immediately cut, but the veffel fink-ing from the boat, the topenlift got hold of it, and carried it down together with the deponent John black and the set of the Harvey, who foon role again with it, the reft of the people in the mean time fwimming about and fapport-ing themfelves with fuch fpars and lumber as came to hand; that the violence of the ftroke of the whale had drove both pumps out of their places, and finding them floating, the deponents and the reft of the crew got them lashed across the gunwales of the boat, (which was full of water) with fome fennett or finial plate, that was luckily fastened round one of the faid pumps, that the weather being moderate, and the wind at E. the deponents and the other perfons who were on board, fupported themfelves on the faid boat and pumps, and by the affiftance of an oar, they kept the boat before the wind and fea, and at day light next morning, to wit, Wednefday the 4th inftant, they faw land at about five miles diftant. That the aforefaid Daniel Smith, the late mafter, and a negro man named Will Harvey, being exaufted and not able to fupport themfelves on the boat or pumps, were drowned about one o'clock in the afternoon : And the deponents and the furvivors of the crew, at about two belock in the afternoon of the fame day, got to land in a very weak and exhausted condition, on the east end of Elenthera, near a fettlement called Palmetto Point ; where they experienced the most hospitable treatment from the inhabitants. That the deponents got a paifage from thence, and arrived in the town of Naffau, yefterday the 9th inft. That the faid eargo, fpecie, and every thing on board, were totally loft."

#### BENNINGTON, (Vermont) February 23.

The young debauchees immediately ordered fixteen bottles of wine, drank them, and broke the bottles against the chimneyback ;---the old gentleman (who partook with them) called in his bottle and broke it likewife :---- The young fellows ftill determined to oblige the old man to quit his post and leave them masters of the ground, agreed that fome one of the company fhould make propofals, and execute them himfelt first, and that if any perfon in the room refused to follow he should pay five pounds ; to which all agreed :- The first was, to burn all their hats-the fecond, their coats-the third, their waiftcoats-and fourth, their boots; which was accordingly executed by them, and the old man followed er which, he fays, gentlemen, now it is my turn to make propofals-to which I demand your compliance under the fame penalty as before; to which they readily confented :---- The landlord was called, and a furgeon ordered with his inftruments-when the old man proposed that every one of the company should have all the teeth in their heads extracted, fet himself down accordingly, and ordered the furgeon to proceed, but to their altonifhment, the old man had but one fump left to gratify their curiofity, which was however, facrificed to execute the propofal; the young gentlemen foon difcovered that they were out generalled; and rather than part with their teeth, fettled a truce with the old hero, paid him five pounds each; paid the landlord his bill for the wine, &c. and had only the confolation to go home naked, and tell their friends, as the paddy told general Washington when he had made prifoners of five dragoons, that one old veteran rake from Vermont, had iurrounded them.

#### PHILADELPHIA, March 23.

# Extract of a letter from a gentleman at Marietta, (Muf-kingum) dated January 26.

" The Indian treaty closed the 9th inftant, and the greater part of the Indians have fince returned to their towns, peaceably difpoled, and pleafed with their treatment while here.-They have all agreed to abide by the treaties that have been heretofore made between them and the United States, and have figned deeds which give to the United States a great part of the Weltern territory."

#### Extract of a letter from a gentleman at Marietta, to his friend in Newbury-Port, January 17.

" So far as I am capable of forming an opinion of the foil and climate, at this fealon of the year, I think the country on this fide the mountains far preferrable to that on the eastern fide; and I believe, in a century, it will be of as much confequence.

" We fuffered exceedingly on our paffage down the river from Pittiburgh, owing to the extreme coldness of the weather, and the great quantities of ice-There is now about fix inches deep of fnow, and the weather in general cold, though we have now and then a fpringlike day. We arrived at this city on the fifth inftant, and attended the treaty with the Indians, and congratulate my countrymen on its being very favourably clofed on the 12th when the treaties were exchanged. On this occasion, an elagant entertainment was provided, partly at the expence of the Ohio company. The Indian chiefs behaved with very great decorum, and an admirable harmony prevailed throughout the day .--After dinner, we were ferved with good wine,-and Complanter, one of the first chiefs of the Five Nations, and a very great warrior, took up his glafs, and faid, "I thank the Great Spirit for this opportunity of fmoaking the pipe of friendship and love.-May we plant our own vines-be the fathers of our own children, and maintain them."

The following is a copy of the invitation fent to the Indian chiefs:

To Meffrs. Williams, Nicholfon, and La Chapelle, Indian linguisters at Fort Harmar.

" You are requested to inform the Wyandots, Delawares, Chippawas, Ottowas, Munnes, Pautauattimas, and Socks, with the Sennecas, and fuch of the Five Nations as are prefent, that we are defirous of cele-brating the good work, which the Great Spirit has drour father the governor, with our brother general Butler, and their fachems and chiefs fo happily to accomplish; for which purpose we will prepare an entertainment on Monday next at two o'clock; and our brothers, the fachems and chiefs, to whom we now fend tokens, are requefted to attend at that time; that we may in friendfhip, and as true brothers, eat and drink together, and fmoke the pipe of everlafting peace, and evidence to the whole world how bright and firong is that chain which the Thirteen United States hold faft at one end, and the Wyandots, &c. at the other-We are very forry that we cannot entertain all our brethren, together with their wives and children ; but as we have come into this country a very long ten; but as we have come into this country a very long way (fome of us 40 or 50 days journey towards the rifing fun) and could not bring much provision along with us, it is now out of our power. We truth the Great Spirit will permit us to plant and gather our corn, and increase our flores, and their children and children's children may be told, how much we shall all rejoice, to make glad their hearts when they come to fee us."

000,000; from the great men of the empire, 250, 000,000; from the two grand favourites of the emperor, f. 400,000,000; and, from the effates of the mi-nifiers and favourites of the Great Mogul, who were put to death at the defire of Thamas Kouli Kan, the whole amounting to f. 2775,000,000; more riches than the greatell part of this were brought from the city of Delly alone; people would with difficulty be-lieve, what is above related, was it not that the riches of Indoffan were well known, and that its manufactures and produce, brought in every year valt fums, both from Afia and Europe, which icarce ever go out again. Thamas Kouli Kan has likewife impoted on the Great Mogul an annual tribute of L. 75,000,000 and has fettled the annual expence of the court of that prince at f. 110,000,600.

The government of the empire of the Great Mogul, has been the occasion of this judden revolution, fuch a one as no hiftory can produce. The people groaned under the opprefiion of the granders. The emperor, a prince of a weak mind, and wholly taken up in the purfuit of his pleafures, and left the care of the empire to two favourites, who aimed at nothing fo much as the amaffing of treasure. The dominions were naked of troops, because the general, whole bufiness it was to have kept them on foot, appropriated the iums defigned for that purpose to their own use. Some rebels of the neighbourhood of Malabar and Coromandel penetrated even into Indoltan, and the little refiftance that they met with, discovered how easy it would be to invade this empire. While Thamas Kouli Kan extended his conqueits with an army of 80,000 horic and 20,000 foot, well armed and disciplined, with 250 pieces of cannon, the Mogul was in a flate of fecurity at Delly, imagining he had done enough in gathering together an army of 200,000 horie and 500,000 foot, with 5000 armed elephants, and 8000 pieces of can-non, which was railed in a hurry, and all military ftores wanting.

The battle of the 22d of February, 1739, which coft the lives of 100,000 men, and part of the emperor's family, at once determined the fate of that prince, and fecured the empire to Thamas Kouli Kan, who reftored it to the Mogul by treaty. During the conti-nuance of Thamas Kouli Kan at Delly, he cauled money to be coined there, with the following infeription-" Schack Nadir was born to be emperor of the whole world."

#### GEORGE - TOWN, March 19.

Copy of a letter from governor Sevier to the privy council of the new flate of Franklin, dated at Buffaloe-Creek, January 12, 1789.

" It is with the utmost pleasure I inform your honours, that the arms of Franklin gained a complete victory over the combined forces of the Creek and Cherokees, on the 10th inftant; fince my laft I received information that the enemy were collecting in a confiderable body, near Flint-Creek, within twenty-five miles of my head quarters, with an intention to attack me; to improve this favourable opportunity, I immediately marched my corps towards the fpot, and arrived after enduring great hardfhips by the immenfe quantity of fnow and the piercing cold. On the morning of the 10th inftant, we were within a mile of the enemy; we foon difcovered the fituation of their encampment by the fmoke of the fires, which we found extended along the foot of the Apalachian mountain. I called a council of war of all the officers, in which it was agreed to attack the enemy without lofs of time, and in order to furround them, I ordered general M'Carter, with the bloody rangers and the tomahawk men, to take poffeffion of the mountain, the only pais I knew that the Indians could retreat by ; whillt I with the reft of the corps formed a line, nearly extending from the right to the left of their

wings. " The arrival of general M'Carter on the mountain, and the fignal for the attack was to be announced by the difcharge of a grasshopper, which was a cord-ingly given and the attack began. Our artillery foon routed the Indians from their huts, and finding themfelves pretty near furrounded on all fides, they only tried to fave themfelves by flight, from which they were prevented by our riflemen posted behind the trees; their cafe being thus defperate they made fome refistance, and killed the people who were ferving our artillery. Our ammunition being much damaged by the fnow on our march, and the enemy's in good or-der, I found it neceffary to abandon that mode of fight, and truft the event to the fword and tomahawk : accordingly gave orders to that purpose ; colonel Loid, with 100 horfemen, charged the Indians with fword in hand, and the reft of the corps followed with their tomahawks. The battle foon became general, by general M'Carter coming down the mountain, to our affiftance; death prefented itfelf on all fides in fhock-ing fcenes, and in lefs than half an hour the enemy ceased making refistance and left us in possession of the bloody field. The lofs the enemy fuftained in this action, is very confiderable; we have buried 145 of their dead, and by the blood we have traced for miles, all over the woods, it is supposed the greatest part of them retreated with wounds—our loss is very incon-fiderable, it confists of g dead and 16 wounded, amongsit the latter is the brave general M\*Carter, who, whilf taking off the fcalp of an Indian, was toma-hawked by another, whom he afterwards killed with his own hand; I am in hopes this good and brave man will furvive. I have marched the army back to my former cantonment, at Buffaloe-Greek, where I muft remain until I receive fome fupplies for the troops, which I hope will be fent foon-we fuffer most for the want of whifkey.





every day; fo that, from the duration of fome minutes it amounted to half an hour, two hours, three hours, and laftly to 23 hours, yet without order.

Such was his condition upwards of half a year. At laft the return of his speech kept so constant and regular an order, that now, for 14 years together, he cannot speak but from noon, during the space of an entire hour, to the precife moment of one o'clock. Every time he lofes his fpeech, he feels fomething rife from his ftomach to his throat. He cannot be deceived by the transposition of hours, because he observes always and very exactly the term from twelve to one, though no bell rings nor clock firikes. Excepting this lofs of fpeech, he makes no complaint of the diforder of any animal function. Both his internal and external fenfes are found; he hears always very exactly, and answers by geftures or writing to the queftions proposed to him. He eats and drinks heartily, and is very handy and active in doing the business of the family. At his time of speaking his discourse is discreet and fensible, for a perfon of his education; and if defired to read, which he fome times does of himfelf, he is fure to flop fhort always in filence the moment that one o'clock the afternoon locks up the power of his tongue.

There cannot be a more extraordinary cafe than this, nor one fo much deferving the attention of the curious. How to account for it, mult be extreme difficult. Perhaps fomething he eat at fupper, when he was first taken ill, has ever fince remained undigested in his ftomach or inteffines; and as he used to feel fomething rifing from thence towards his throat, it probably caufed the extinction of his voice, which he did not recover till it again fubfided.

#### WINCHESTER, March 18.

#### WESTERN INTELLIGENCE.

Since our last feveral gentlemen have arrived in this town from Kentucky, by whom we have been inform-ed, that a general and uninterrupted trade has taken place between the inhabitants of that country and those of the Spanish fettlement at New-Orleans; feveral boats loaded with goods to a very confiderable amount, having arrived before our informants came away ; that in return they took large quantities of tobacco, beef, corn, &c. and that from every appearance this traffic was likely to be continued and carried on with the greateft alacrity, which cannot fail proving of the moft infinite mutual advantage. We were further informed, that moft of the fettle-

ments in the quarter of Kentucky are now undiffurbed by the favages, no hoftilities having for fome time past been committed by them except at the Little Miami, where, about five weeks fince, a Shawanefe chief called Black-Fifh, and one of the Wyandot chiefs, with a number of warriors, took three white people who were out furveying, and brought them in, under guard, to the garriion flation at the mouth of the Little Miami .- Their pretenfions were to fettle a treaty with the garrifon, which our informants fay was completed on good terms by captain Mac Geath and others. The Shawanefe chief was fo fond of captain Mac Geath, that he offered to take him through the Indian country. These chiefs and warriors afterwards had it in their power to deftroy three crews and their effects, but they proved friendly, furnished them with provisions, and treated them kindly.

The Shawanele and Wyandots had feveral times before taken prifoners and brought them into the garrifon, with profeffions of friendship; but it was suspected their only intentions were to make their observations and get liquors, but from the above pacific conduct the white inhabitants begin to put fome confidence in them, and pleafe themfelves with the hope of enjoying a peaceable fummer.

FROM THE VISTULA, January 3.

If we may credit accounts received by private let-ters, fome Ruffian troops are affembling in the environs of Polofk, near the frontiers of Lithuania. General Elmpt is at Riga, and general Soltikow is going to Peterfburgh.

We have advices from Ruffia, that in confequence of fome movements among the Swedifh troops, general Muschin Puschin is going to quit Petersburgh, and return to Finland as foon as poffible.

UTRECHT, January 22.

By letters from Peterfburgh we learn, that all ranks of people are overjoyed at the fuccefs of prince Potemkin, in making himfelf mafter of Oczakow, which gives our troops the opportunity of doing what they pleafe in the Crimea and Black Sea; but people, on the contrary, are not fo well fatisfied with the fufpenfion of arms entered into between the imperialists and Turks.

From Stockholm we hear, that all the preparations making there feem to indicate the continuation of the war. The king has accepted the offer of the provinces of Wermeland, Nerike and Medelplad, to furnish 5000 volunteers, to ferve at their own expence, and the command of this corps is given to general Arm-feld, which will put him at the head of between 8000 and 9000 men, including the Dalecarlians, whom he commands at this time.

### LONDON, February 1.

The difpatches from lord Torrington at Bruffels are faid to contain a narrative of the proceedings of the Brabantines, in confequence of the edict of the emperor, which has raifed fuch commotions in Auftrian Flanders as it will be very difficult indeed to fettle, unless fome very lenient measures are adopt-

Letters from Bengal dated in April, 1788, bring advices, that the governor-general had refolved not to continue the permifiion granted to individuals during the last feafon of fending home goods on freight in the company's chartered fhips. This circumftance will probably take a great effect in raifing the prices of Bengal goods, as a great proportion of the company's imports laft year were fhipped on the account of private individuals, which supply will in future be cut off by this refolution of the governor-general. Not above one third of the company's inveftment of Dac-ca goods came down to Calcutta laft feason in time to be ihrpped.

A letter from Hamburgh, dated December 26, fays, " It is faid, and perhaps with fome foundation, that the offenfive and defenfive alliance, frequently mentioned as nearly concluded, between England, Holland, Pruffia and Sweden, is meant folely to re-effablish tranquillity in Europe, and balance the power of the north."

The court of Lifbon have at length concluded their long depending treaty of commerce with the American flates, by virtue of which the Portuguese are to take corn, &c. from the American veffels, for which the Americans are to receive the produce of Portugal in exchange; the Portuguele having reftricted by a particular article of the treaty, the American veffels from carrying away any of the gold or filver current coin of the kingdom of Portugal, as gold and filver in bars, or in any other shape than that of plate in fer-vices, utenfils, wearables and jewellery, &c. on pain of confifcation of the fhips, cargo, &c. where fuch gold or filver may be difcovered; as alfo the mafter and officers of the fhips to be imprifoned in fuch cafes, to answer before a tribunal at Lifbon or Oporto, the charges for any fuch breach of the treaty. Thus America is placed under greater refirictions than other nations. A plain proof of the Portuguele jealoufy. A letter from La Flotte, dated January 12, fays, "On the 8th inft. an uncommon and difaitrous event happened here at half paft one at noon : the rigorous froft for fome days preceding had frozen the fea quite to all the places of anchorage in this port ; and a fudden breeze arifing from the fouth, the whole fheet of ice extending three leagues, gave way all together, with a terrible crafh, and carried away with it near 40 veffels, the whole of which loft their anchors and cables. Many are fafe, but many are miffing ftill.faved ; the Postillion, of Dunkirk, with herrings, is funk, and a number of foreign veffels for Bourdeaux have anchored here, with more or lefs damage." All the letters from the north agree, that the cold has been more fevere this winter than at any one period fince the year 1709. At Oczakow it was fo in-tenfe, that one night in particular 40 foldiers were frozen to death in their entrenchments during the fiege

It moved only by night ; and it appeared at times, but lefs frequently, the following fummer, after which the phenomenon ceafed.

It may probably arife, as the editor of Camden conjectures, from a local cafualty, fuch as the fall of a flight of locusts in that spot, as really did in the sea near Aberdeen ; which growing corrupt, might by the blowing of the wind a certain period from one point, direct the peft to a certain fpot, while others lefs remote might, for the fame reafon, efcape the dreadful effects.

Monflet gives an account of a plague in Lombardy in the year 591, which arole from theefall of a cloud of locusts, which corrupted the air to fuch a degree, that eighty thousand men and cattle perished.

A cale not lefs important than curious has lately been agitated by the lawyers, at Berlin, on the question-Whether a Jew, who embraces the Chriftian religion, has thereby renounced the Jewish ? It feems, that one Mofes Ifaac, a rich Jew of Berlin, left at his death a confiderable fum of money to be divided among his children, with a provifo, that if any of them renounced the Jewifh religion they fhould be excluded. Two of his daughters, who became profelytes to Chriftiani-ty, brought an action before one of the courts of Berlin, and recovered by their judgment their refpective dividends; as it was argued that Christianity, being only an improvement of Judaifm, to embrace the former was not to renounce the latter. However, the caufe being carried before a fuperior court, they reverfed the decree; and the latter fenteace was confirmed by the king, who is there the ne plus ultra in all cafes of importance.

HOUSE OF LORDS. IMPORTANT DEBATE.

SATURDAY, January 31.

The lord chancellor being indifpofed, earl Bathurft prefided.

At four o'clock the house entered upon bufiness; thanks were voted to the bifhop of Lincoln for his fermon of yesterday.

EARL CAMDEN reported the answer of his royal highness the prince of Wales to the address of the two houses yesterday, praying him to undertake the regency under certain reftrictions. The answer was to the following effect :

" The prince returned his thanks to the lords and commons for the communication of their refolutions ; and notwithstanding the great difficulties incumbent upon the fituation, he was induced for the honour of his fovereign, and the fafety and welfare of his iubjects, to take the government under his care during his majefty's illnefs. In the performance of this arduous tafk, his mind was much relieved, when he looked forward to the fupport which he fhould receive from the lords and commons, and from the known zeal and attachment of the British nation to the house of Brunfwick. The fituation was new and unprecedented ; but, he observed, that the restrictions were evidently formed upon a well-grounded hope that his majefty's illnefs would be of fhort duration, an event which he, of all his majefty's fubjects, most earnestly wished to fee accomplished. Under these circumstances, he hoped to discharge the duties of his fituation with honour to his fovereign, with fatisfaction to himfelf, and with

appinels to the nation." When the speech was finished, a murmur of applause ran through the house.

EARL WALDEGRAVE next reported her majefty's answer, which was briefly, " That her majefty would undertake the charge with zeal and alacrity. She was happy that the wifdom of parliament had affigned her a council for the better ordering and management of the truft. With their united efforts, fhe hoped to difcharge her duty to her much honoured fovereign, with fatisfaction to herfelf, and, what fhe valued beyond all other confiderations, with honour to the British nation and people, from whom fhe had received fuch continued marks of loyalty and fincere affection."

The answers being read by the clerk, were, upon the motion of lord Walfingham, ordered to be printed. The houfe then went into a committee upon the flate



This age affords no example of fo fevere a froft as there was in many places on the 17th inftant; in the morning of that day Farenheit's thermometer, at Leipfic, was 27 degrees below 0, which is from five to han it was in the famolal winters of 1739 and 1740. In the fouth part of Germany the cold has not been fo fevere ; the Rhine is froze over at Cologne, and in many places waggons and heavy car-riages pais over it loaded.

" The Algerines fill infeft our feas, and have lately made fome valuable captures, amongit which, we are informed, is a French corvette, from Marfeilles, to a market, 300 quintals burthen, with a sich carno; like-wife two fhips loaded with corn, driet fith and oil, bound to Civita Vecchia; the two latter were taken by a corfair of 36 guns, in fight of one of the pope's men-of war, and what is more remarkable, the infidels had the infolence to hoift a flag of defiance daring her to combat."

Feb. 1. Letters from France mention the continuance of the great fcarcity of grain there. As a proof of it, the following bounties are to be allowed in the importation of the following articles, for four months from the 15th of February:-15 fols per quintal of wheat; 20 fols per quintal of flour, and 12 fols per quintal of rye. And, as a further encouragement, the tunnage duty of 12 fols per tun on the veffels in which grain is imported, is discontinued for the fame time.

This awoke major Jenkins and Ranform-the Indians rufhed in with the knife and tomahawk: but Jenkins, by an inftantaneous effort of bravery, caught hold of an axe and knocked down two Indians-afterwards Ranfom affiited and they beat the Indians off, and took each of them guis, tomahawks, &c. Jenkins and his furviving companion lodged that night in faid cabin with the dead and wounded-next day returned with Earl to Geneva, (the name of a town on the Lakes.) A fcout was immediately fent after the faid Indians-when the party arrived at the cabin they found the Indians had been back and taken off all their provisions, their object in this blody attack. Four Indians are fent in queit of the villains, and nave pledged their honour they will not return without their bodies or fcalps-God preferve their honour."

### Extract of a letter from Liverpool, dated January 4.

" The melancholy fituation of the king, together with the minister's ambition in curbing the prince, as regent, and the almost fudden death of the speaker of the house of commons, are very affecting, and shew the uncertainty of happinels, and the enjoyment of this world. 

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

CONSTANTINOPLE, Odober 3. HE king of France has given up, in favour. of liberty, two of the moft dangerous prerogatives of the crown, namely, lettres de catchet and the power of raifing the revenue without the confent of the flates. No lettres de catchet (or general warrants) are in future to be iffued without fpecial reafons, and thefe reasons are to be set forth in the warrant, and the legality to be alcertained and tried by judges.

### LONDON, January 14.

The oblequies of the late Spanish monarch, Charles the third, as celebrated in the Spanish ambassador's chapel, in York-ftreet, St. James's, on Wednefday laft, exhibited the moft awful and firiking fcene of ferious folemnity we can recollect. The walls, from the ceiling to the ground, the pillars and the balluf trade of the galleries, were hung with black. In the middle of the chapel was erected a pompous canopy of flate, under which lay a bier, covered with black velvet. A crown, made after the form of that worn by the Spanish monarchs, was placed on a cushion at the foot of the bier; and at its head a large atchievement or eleutcheon, on which were painted the arms of Spain. A numerous variety of fmaller efcutcheons were hung around the chapel, blazoned with the armsof the different kingdoms and provinces to which Spain has laid claim fince the foundation of that monarchy, and adorned with emblems allufive to the revolutions it underwent fince its conquefts by the Goths down to our days. The glittering efcutcheons, interchangeably mixed with blazing wax tapers, darting their light on the fable hangings in a place from which, in open day, the rays of the fun were excluded, gave the chapel the appearance of a fumptuous maufoleum, where burning lamps furround the tombs of breathlefs monarchs, or rather of a ftarry firmament on a dark and ferene night. At twelve o'clock (when the office of the dead was concluded) high mais was celebrated with all the pomp and folemnity prefcribed by the Romifh ritual. The Spanish ambaffador and foreign ministers, with a concourse of ladies and gentlemen of various religious deferiptions, attracted by curiofity, heightened the luitre of the fcene. The deep-toned organ mingling its found with the melodious voices of a numerous and wellchoicn choir, finging the folemn dirge in lucubrous accents fuited to the occafion, the paraments of clergy, the fume of the incenfe afcending in odoriferous clouds, with the feveral other circumftances attending thefe folemn funeral rites, transported for a time, the living into the regions of the dead.

The fingular event of having prayers offered up in the fame chapel, in the fpace of a few weeks, for the recovery of one monarch, and the departed foul of another, fhould naturally remind us of the vanity ofall human grandeur.

THE LORDS PROTEST ON THE REGENCY. The order of the day being read, for taking into confideration the report from the committee of the whole houle, appointed to take into confideration the flate of the nation, and the refolutions of the commons relative to his majefty's indisposition, and the means of fupplying the defect of the perional exercise of the royal authority arifing therefrom, delivered at a conference on the 23d December ultimo, which were referred thereto; and the report of faid refolutions being read by the clerk,

and conftitutionally reprefenting the nation, have defined those powers. And we cannot but regard with" the utmoft apprehenfion any propofal to overftep those boundaries, when the confequence of fuch usurpation is fo fatally marked in the hiftory of our country.

4thly. Becaufe it was confeffed in the debate, that the powers of the commiffion were not to be confidered folcly to the act of appointing a regent ; to what other purposes they may extend were not explained .---State necessity, the avowed ground of the measure may ferve as the pretext to any diminution of the just pre-rogative of the crown, and of the liberties of the people, that best fuits the defigns of ambition. Fatal experience had fhewn to our anceftors the boundless mifchief of power thus usurped under plaufible appearances : and it is particularly the duty of the houle of peers to check the renewal of a practice to affume the name, without the fubftance of the royal authority, by which this houfe was once annihilated, the monarchy

overthrown, and the liberties of the people fubdued. sthly. Becaufe thefe dangerous and alarming confequences of the measure adopted would have been obviated by the amendment rejected. It propoled to fubflitute a measure conformable to the practice of our anceftors at the glorious æra of the revolution. They feized not upon public necessity as a convenience for the usurpation of new powers, but proceeded in a plain and explicit form to the revival of the royal authority with full efficacy, before they entered upon the exercife of their legiflative function. Purfuing a fimilar courfe, the amendment proposed the immediate nomination of the natural representative of the king, the heir apparent of the crown, to whom alone it was univerfally admitted the eyes and hearts of all men, during the prefent unhappy conjuncture, were turned : that with a perfect and efficient legislature, such future provisions might be enacted as the prefervation of the full and undiminished authority of the crown and the liberties of the people may require.

### NEW-YORK, April 7:

Yesterday the honourable the congrets of the United States, having a quorum of both houses, proceeded to bufincis.

The fenate having chofen his excellency John Langdon, Efquire, of New-Hampshire, prefident, f.r the purpole of opening and counting the votes for prefident and vice-prefident of the United States, agrecably to the conflitution, the house of representatives attended in the fenate chamber, when his excellency opened and examined the ballots of the electors of the respective ftates.

The illustrious GEORGE WASHINGTON, Efquire, was then announced prefident of the United States of America, and his excellency JOHN ADAMS, Efquire, vice-prefident.

April 9. Yefterday the honourable the fenate of the congress of the United States appointed Sanuel Asten Otis, Elq; (late member of congress from Mialiachufetts) to the honorary place of fecretary to that honourable body.

James Mathers was alfo appointed door-keeper, and Cornelius Maxwell, meffenger.

On Tuesday last the committee of both houss of the legislature of New-York (appointed r r the purp te at the late feffion) began to canvals and eitimate the votes for reprefentatives from this liate to the congreis of the United States, at the lecretary's office .- This committee, last evening, had finished counting the ballots from three diffricts.

By this estimation it appeared, that William Floyd, Esquire, had 894 votes, and was elected by the district composed of Long and Staten Islands.

That John Lawrence, Efquire, had 2251 votes in the city and county of New-York, and 201 in Weftchefter, and was elected by the diffrict of New-York and the fouthern part of Weitcheiter.

That Egbert Benfon, Efquire, had 584 votes in the district of Ducnels county, and the northern part of Westchester, and was elected.

Theodorus Bally, Equire, had 574 votes, as competitor to Mr. Beafon.

The honourable John Lawrence yesterday took his feat in the house of representatives-and we are informed that Egbert Benfon, Equire, will take his leat in that honourable body this day.

Yesterday the doors of the nouse of representatives of the United States were thrown open, for the admiffion of the citizens.

We learn, that the navigation of the North river is no longer interrupted by the floating ice.

Many, fays a correspondent, have fought, written and harrangued, for the weliare and glory of the United States ; yet it must be confessed that a true patriot is a character not eafily to be found. As long as our country feels a fingle grievance, which prudence might foon banifh, the triumph of policy must be acknowledged to be incomplete .- As an indulgence in a fingle vice mult prevent a man from being deemed really virtuous, fo ought a perfeverance in a line of conduct, detrimental to national happinels, to preclude him from the name of a patriot. When we fee a citizen, who has frequently exposed his life in the cause of treedom, dreffed in the manufactures of foreign nations, have we not reason to suppose, that he either does not underitand the welfare of his country or that he totally difregards it ? After liftening for hours to speeches, replete with all the graces of oratory, in which we are frequently reminded of our duty to our country, what muft be our opinion of the orator, when we behold him contradicting his arguments by his practices ? Almott every article which he wears is repugnant to his words; and we are induced to think that we are attending to the declamations of fophiftry, inftead of the maxims of patriotifm. How glorious will be the triumph of free America, when we shall behold the guardians of the union apparelled in the produce and labour of their country ! Eloquence will then be fomething more than founds ; wildom will derive true honour from fimplicity of drefs; and every citizen, eager to emulate the bright example, will contribute his affiftance towards the completion of American independence.

" The furveys of the 8, 3 acre and city lots being completed, we concurred in an order to extend 4 town lines from the 7th to the 12th range, which is 24 miles weft of the city. The first line paffes over the river hills. The land, though hilly, is good, and inter-fperfed with rich bottoms, but perhaps not of fo great prefent utility as the lands further north. On this line was found excellent iron ore, which, being burnt and ulverifed, nearly 7-8ths was attracted by the magnet. It appears to be in great plenty. The line com-mencing 6 miles north of the 7th range nearly terminates the river hills, and, after paffing 4 miles weft of the Mufkingum, exhibits a most beautiful and excellent champaign country, very fertile, and well water-

" A meeting of the agents and proprietors of fhares has been held, agreeably to the advertifements in the public papers last fummer, for the purpose of granting certain quantity of land for the encouragement of fettlers who are non-proprietors; at which 957 fhares were reprefented. Mr. Madifon faid, that in bringing forward this motion, he had availed himfeit of the propositions made by the late congreis, in 1783-and had taken from the enumeration of articles, on which duties might be properly imposed. He would not, however, go deeply into the bufinels at prefent, but having thrown out his ideas for the confideration of the committee, fhould fubmit the matter to their difcretion.

Mr. Boudinot (of New-Jerfey) expressed his approbation of the motion, urged the neceffity of proceeding without delay in this important bufinefs; and moved that the blanks in the resolution he filled up with the fame fums as expressed in the act of Congress of 1783. He moved for these fums he faid, becaule at the time they were agitated, they appeared to be agreeable to the citizens of the United States. It was prefumable therefore that they would give fatisfaction now. Under this imprefiion he grounded his motion.

Mr. White (of Virginia) withed that the motion brought forward fhould only be confidered as the bafis of a bill, in fome future ftage of which it would be proper to fill up the blanks. In the mean time it was probable gentlemen might poffets themfelves of more information on the subject.

Mr. Madifon then obferved, that as he did not fup-pofe the committee to be prepared to proceed in the bufinefs, moved that they fhould rife, report progrefs, and alk leave to fit again.

This was agreed to, and the house adjourned.



" An unfortune event has lately taken place in this part of the world, which probably may break the late eitablished harmony between the Spaniards and our flates. You have no doubt been informed of the port of New-Orleans being opened to our countrymen fettled on the Weltern waters; in confequence of which the Miffifippi has been covered with fleets of boats from Cumberland, Kentucky, &c. floating down great quantities of provision, flour, plank, &c. which, on account of the distreffed fituation the inhabitants were reduced to, by the late fire, has been difpofed of to great advantage.

"The laft transport (as we are informed here) ar-rived from the Cumberland fettlements, at the Natches (a fort faill in poffession of the Spaniards on the Missifiis nort that in policition of the Spaniards on the Miffif-fippi, within the limits of Georgia) about a week ago, owned by colonel Armftrong, confifting of fix large boats, manned by 30 hands. 



It is conjectured, however, that his mis-fion respects the affairs of Poland, which are becoming more and more critical. It is now pretty certain, that a Pruffian army will march in the spring to the fron-tion of that remable. tiers of that republic.

Letters from Jaffy of the 10th inftant mention, that detachment from the army, commanded by marfhal Romanzow, had fucceeded in their attempt to diflodge a body of Turks, confifting of 900 men, from Gangura, purfued them to Kainar, and having driven from fance 700 Tartars, proceeded to the attack of Salkutza, and obtained a complete victory. The enemy loft in these several actions 390 men killed, 77 prifoners, four pieces of artillery, and fix colours ; whilft the Ruffians had only one enfigh and four men killed, and 14 wounded.

#### LONDON, January 31.

Extrast of a letter from Paris, December 14. " M. de Suffrein, who died on Tuefday laft, was interred on the Thursday following in the Temple, be-ing a knight of Malta. It is faid his physician order-ed him to be copiously bled five times in one day. He died, alas! under the murderous lancet, that daily opens to many a victim in France a paffage to the other world."

Extract of a letter from Paris, December 17. " In the fireets of Paris, a gentleman was attacked by three robbers, who, according to the cuftom of this country, began by attempting to affafinate him ; a hackney-coachman driving by with an empty coach at the fame time, and feeing what paffed, cried out aloud as if he had a fare, "Gentlemen, alight with your fwords, and refcue a gentleman, whom fome villains are going to murder !" The affaffins alarmed at this ery, immediately took to their heels; the coachman drove to the gentleman, took him in, and conducted him home. In recompence for his affiftance, the gen-tleman gave the poor fellow two Louis d'ors on alighting, and bid the man come next day for a further reward. The poor fellow returned as he was ordered, and found a promife ready written, for a penfion of 400 livres a year, which the gentleman gave him, fay-ing, "Friend, you have faved my life, it is just that I should take care of yours."

Feb. 17. The accounts of the amended flate of the king's health are flattering to a degree. Some of the phyficians, it is faid, go fo far as to declare, that were he a private individual, they fhould pronounce him perfectly recovered. We truft, therefore, that the united wifhes of a loyal and affectionate people will foon be gratified with an affurance that his majefty is capable of conducting the government himfelf. At the fame time that we ardently join in this wifh, which we take to be, with very few exceptions indeed, the common feeling of the public in general, we cannot but applaud the prudence and precaution of those who do not wifh to rifk the difappointment and difplea-fure of the people, by too early a declaration of his majefly's complete recovery. The report of the intention of proroguing parliament yefterday for a fortnight, it feems, by the event, was not true. Indeed, however fpeedily the king may smend, his perfect recovery will hardly happen to foon as to preclude all neceffity of a regency.

During the whole course of his majefty's melancholy indifpofition, we truft, that we have fully approved our credit to our numerous readers and the public at large. We have ever been ready to communicate the pleafing intelligence of any actual amendment in the health of the fovereign, when we have been fatisfied that the reports of fuch a probable chance were well founded. We do, therefore, cheerfully announce, that the exifting fymptoms undoubtedly warrant more par-ticular hopes of a recovery than could have been rea-fonably entertained a week fince: but upon fome points, the diforder has continued invariably obffinate, and thort paroxisms of violence have from time to time recurred. These appearances may lead to a total reftoration of the royal understanding, or they may determine in fixed infanity on the particular points to which we allude. One plain fact is univerfally admitted, namely, that as yet there is no approach to convale-fcence; the abfolute violence is lefs; the flate of quiet, however, as upon the worft, as to the beft effects. It is right to hope for the most favourable iffue from the Divine favour, but interested purposes alone can dictate positive assertions of a subject, on which no human skill can yet pronounce with honest decision, and furely it is the bafest traffic to take advantage of the terrible vicifitudes of fuch a diforder to carry on the abominable speculations of Change Alley.

HOUSE OF LORDS.

This day, at four o'clock, the lord chancellor, at tended by feveral peers, and also by the speaker of the house of commons, and upwards of seventy members, went up with the following address to the caftle, in order to be transmitted into Great-Britain.

### TO HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS GEORGE PRINCE OF WALES. The bumble address of the lords spiritual and temporal, and knights, citizens and burgess, in parliament assem-bled.

" May it pleafe your royal highnefs, " We, his majefty's most dutiful and loyal fubjects, the lords spiritual and temporal, and the commons of Ireland in parliament affembled, beg leave to approach your royal highnels with hearts full of the most loyal and affectionate attachment to the perfon and government of your royal father, to express the deepest and most grateful fenie of the numerous bleffings which we have enjoyed under that illustrious house, whose acceffion to the throne of thefe realms, has established civil and conflitutional liberties upon a basis which we truft will never be fhaken ; and at the fame time to condole with your royal highness upon the grievous malady with which it has pleased Heaven to affligt the best of lovercign

" We have, however, the confolation of reflecting, that this fevere calamity hath not been vifited upon us, until the virtues of your royal highness have been fo matured, as to epublic your highness to discharge the duties of an important truft, for the performance whereof, the eyes of all his majefty's fubjects of both king-doms are directed to your royal highnefs.

returned to Seringapatam, and occupied himfelf entirely in completing his valt preparations for war. He has long been defirous of attacking the Britifh, and only waits for a favourable opportunity of commencing hoftilities. Directly as his fon's marriage, now pend-ing, fhall be accomplifhed, he means to attack the kingdom of Travantore, for which he has made im-menfe preparations; and if the ambaffadors whom he has fent to the court of France should return with an has fent to the court of France should return with an answer agreeable to his wifnes, he is also determined to enter the Carnatic immediately and attack Madras itfelf; after having fupplied Pondicherry with all the flores and provifions it may require. Some flort time ago Tippoo gave particular injunctions to all his aumiloars to collect the balance due from the ryotte to the circar, and ordered all the arrears due to his army to be discharged. He has provided enormous quantities of military flores and provisions, at all the fea ports in his dominions, and to all the ports leading to the Carnatic, particularly at Bargaloore, Sovendroog and Hufour. He added thirty thousand bullocks to the compliment of his artillery, which are now in training. He has a body of five hundred camels each carrying a fmall piece of cannon upon his back, which are exer-cifed every day, and the number is to be sugmented to two thousand. In his flores are a lack of rochoar arrows, and workmen are continually employed in making more.—He is enlifting men in every part of his dominions, but receives only those of high caft and approved bravery. The following is a lift of his army already in the field : Twenty-fix thousand flable hories; fifty three thousand regular infantry; fifty thousand irregular ditto; matchlocks, &c. and thirty thousand Lafcars and artificers. Reports fimilar to this account are every where flying about, and it is thought highly probable that after the Moonfoon, Tippoo will make fome bold attempt. If he molefts the Travancory king, it involves us of courfe, as the latter is included in the offenfive and defenfive treaty of alliance, and for many eminent fervices rendered the company, has a claim on their protection; which I believe has been notified to Tippoo, in due form by this government."

" To convince you that the above alarming news is well-founded, I hereby fend you the fubilance of other intelligence, which has been received expreis from Madras."-" General Sir Archibald Campbell, not having received any fatisfactory answer respecting Tippoo's formidable armaments, has iffued orders from the troops to be encamped immediately after the Moonfoon, and that ten thousand men be constantly in readinefs, as a detachment, to watch the motions of Tippoo's army."

### NEW-YORK, April 16.

The Algerines are faid to be making preparations to render themfelves very formidable against Spain in the enfuing fpring; but a more powerful opponent is to be expected in his prefent majefty, than they experienced in the late king. The long mental imbecility of his late Spanifh majefty communicated a dulnefs to the court, which operated as a check to the encouragement both of literature and the polite arts; the Spaniards are not deflitute of genius, but they are negligent from want of excitement; the prefent fovereign, as a man of tafte and a friend of literature, will do honour to the throne.

" The alliance between this court and that of Verfailles, fince the mediation relative to the Turkifh war, feems to become ftronger. Yesterday another courier arrived from Paris and one from Peterfburgh.

" It is reported here, that the empreis of Ruffia was just putting the finishing stroke to a plan for a peace with the Porte, and going to fend it to our court and that of Paris, when the news arrived of the taking of Oczakow, which occafioned an alteration of the plan, and the keeping of Oczakow was made a preliminary article.

" The general talk here is of the preparations made by government to put the provinces bordering upon Poland into the beft fire of defence poffible, upon the appontion of that kingdom becoming a theatre of as inveterate a war as that between the two empires and the Porte. However premature these conjectures may be, there seems but too much reason to fear they may prove in the end well founded."

"We therefore beg leave humbly to requeft, that your royal highnefs will pleafe to take upon you the government of this realm, during the continuance of his majefty's prefent indifposition, and no longer; and under the ftyle and title of prince regent of Ireland, in the name and on the behalf of his majefty, to exercise and administer, according to the laws and conftitution of this kingdom, all regal powers, jurifdictions and prerogatives, to the crown and government thereof be-

"The lords being returned, and the lord chancellor having taken his feat on the woolfack, he informed the house that having waited upon his excellency the mar-quis of Buckingham with the address to his royal highnefs the prince of Wales, agreed to by both houfes, his excellency declined to take charge of the fame, and as anfwer delivered the following words from a written

duty, and of the oath I have taken as chief governor of Ireland, I am obliged to decline transmitting this address into Great-Britain; for I cannot confider myfelf warranted to lay before the prince of Wales an ad-drefs, purporting to inveft his royal highnefs with

powers to take upon him the government of this realm before he shall be enabled by law fo to do." The duke of Leinster moved, that the house do ad-journ till to-morrow, which was agreed to nem, em. and the house adjourned accordingly.

At 3 o'clock his excellency fat down to an elegant entertainment at the City-Tavern, prepared for him by the citizens of Philadel-phia. His excellency having travelled with great expedition from Mount-Vernon, proposes to fet off early this morning for New-York, where he will receive that power, which is infinitely preferable to an hereditary crown, inafmuch as it is conferred upon merit, by the unanimous and free fuffrages of the reprefentatives of near three millions of affectionate and grateful people.

#### WINCHESTER, April 15.

# ST. JOHN'S COLLEGE.

"HE vifitors and governors of St. John's College having, on the 10th of May, 1786, authorifed Samuel Chafe, Nicholas Carroll and Alexander Contee Hanfon, or any two of them, to appoint a perfon to collect the money, then or thereafter to be fab-fcribed : we, the faid Nicholas Carroll and Alexander Contee Hanfon, did accordingly, foon after, appoint Archibald Golder, of the city of Annapolis. Of this appointment the public was duly notified. The col-lector advertifed times and places for his attendance in feveral counties. He attended agreeably to his notice, and moreover made perfonal application to many of the fubfcribers. But, although the flipulated periods of payment have long fince elapfed, not more than

We have this day renewed our agreement with the We have this day renewed our agreement with the collector. Subferibers who have not yet paid their first third, are requested, without delay, to pay the fame, and fuch further part, as they shall think pro-per, to the faid Archibald Golder, or to Benjamin Harwood, treasurer. They will be called on, within a reasonable time, to make the fecond and third pay-ments, the last of which was due on the 1st of June, 1287, All level methods of compution would be as 1787.—All legal methods of compulsion would be as difagreeable to the vifitors as difgraceful to fubicribers. But it is the indifpenfable duty of truffees to adopt fuch modes of exacting payment, as shall be found necesfa-

ry, or expedient. The building of the college was projected, and begun on a plan, in fome measure, proportioned to its nominal funds. For a confiderable length of time, it has been fulpended, for want of money .- The gentle-men who fubfcribed liberally, and paid with punctua-lity, had a right to expect, in the courfe of four years, that the work would be complete, and the feminary beginning to flourish. They cannot but remember the generous patriotic ardor, with which the inftitution was commenced. They have fuftained an injury from all thole whole neglect or failure has retarded its progrefs; and, for their fatisfaction, as well as for other purpofes, a lift of fubfcribers names, with the fums fub-fcribed, and the fums paid, will probably be publifh-ed as foon as conveniently may be, after the 12th day of May next.

As the repeated difappointments of those who have repaired to Annapolis, at their own expence, for the fole purpose of meeting the vifitors, may perhaps, without fome par-ticular notice, prevent their attendance, at the next regular flated meeting, we take the liberty of most carneilly entreating every gentleman, who has accepted the truft of a vifitor and governor of St. John's College, to attend on the fecond Tuefday of May next. As the general court will be held on that day, we prefume no time more convenient can be mentioned.

It is perhaps proper to inform the public, that the number of vintors cannot exceed twenty-four, that not lefs than nine can form the corporation; that it has ne-ver exceeded eleven; that by death it is reduced to ten; that not lefs than feven have authority to act; and that only two, at this time, refide at Annapolis. It is almost needless to add, that matters of the greatest im-portance await their confideration. It is much to be wifhed, that the number were completed or increafed. Whether this object may not be attained, provided nine fhall be convened, will be debated at their next meeting; and we hope that, if any gentleman be difpofed to refign, he will at least beflow his endeavours, that the body may be first enabled to supply his place.
