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ETTERS from Barcelona, of the 12th Inftant, relate, that an English Vessel richly laden, called the St. George, Andrew Ives, Master, had been taken cight Days before press Occupied eight Days before, near Oran, in her eight Days before, near Oran, in her Passage from Smyrna to London, by a French Privateer of 24 Guns and 400 Men, called the Bien Aimé. That the Capt. of the above Privateer, Louis Simon, had left on board the Prize no more than four Mariners of her own Crew, viz. the English Mate named Peter Murray, the Boat-fusin, and two Sailors: and had ordered 17 of the English Mars change refer Murray, the Boat-fwain, and two Sailors; and had ordered 17 of his own People, under the Command of one of his own Officers, one Joseph Vidal, to carry her to Marscilles. That on the Night before the Date of those Letters, (the said Vessel being then at about 15 Miles Distance from the Coast of Catalonia) the English Mater observing the French Commander to be fast assessing the French Commander to be fast assessing the Cabbin, had found Means to enter the same, to provide himself there with a Pistol and three Cuttasses, and then to attack and drive away from the Quarter-Deck to the Forcassle, eight French Mariners that were on the Watch, after wounding one of them, who had refused to retire. That upon this the French Commander being awakened by the Noise, came to the Cabbin Door with a Pistol in his Hand, which he endeavoured to Fire on the English Mate, but that his Pistol's not going off, gave the which he endeavoured to Fire on the English Mate, but that his Piffol's not going off, gave the latter an Opportunity of firing his own, with the good Succels of lodging two Balls in the French Commander's Shoulder, and forced him thereby to retire. That at this Time the other three Enghis Mariners were come from below upon the Deck, from whence they forced the eight French, ones before mentioned to go down in the Hold to their Comrades, with Menaces to kill the first who should appear again on the Deck. That in the mean while the English Mate had drawn out of the Cabbin all the Arms, and laid them near himself on the Deck; after which he had taken the Command of the Vessel, and ordered four of the French Mariners to come out of the Hold, and to be stationed between the Forecastle and and to be stationed between the Forecastle and the Main-Mass, with Prohibition, on Pain of Death, of coming nearer the Quarter-Deck, or not executing his Commands for navigating the Vessel. That with these Precautions he had the good Luck to bring the Vessel that Morning to an Anchor in the Port of Barcelona, where he had made immediately his Declaration before the English Consul of the whole Transaction, conformable to what is above related. The same Letters mention the taking, in that Neighbourhood, a French Tartan, bound from Valencia to Marseiller, worth 12,000 Dollars, on the 8th Instant, by les, worth 12,000 Dollars, on the 8th Instant, by a small English Privateer of Gibraltar, called the Revenge, and being a Row-boat of no more than 20 or 30 Men.

From the Head Quarters of the Austrian Army at Munikegratz, July 7: A Spy, who is just arrived here from Randnitz, reports, that on the 3d of this Month there was upon the Road from Lobustz to Welmina, a very sharp Skirmish between a Party of our Troops and a Body of the Enemy; that 300 of the latter were killed, and 350 wounded, these last were fent to Leitmerizz; that a Contibusion of accounted of

wounded, these last were sent to Leitmeritz; that a Contribution of 300,000 Florins is exacted of that City and the Circle, of which it is the Capital, and that they were obliged to furnish the Enemy with \$65 Pioneers.

Progue, July 16. The King of Prussia having called in all those of the County of Glatz who are able to bear Arms, our Troops are in constant Motion to prevent their joining him. There has been several sharp and bloody Skirmishes near the Elbe, in the Neighbourhood of Lowositz, between our Troops and those of Prussia. The

King of Pruffia having been reinforced with a Body of 700 Men from Silefia, is returned towards Lippa, which has caused our Army to advance that Way. Yesterday the Head-Quarters were at Nimes, and the two Armies are so near one another, that they must foon come to an Engagement.

Kloster, July 12. General Nadasti writes, that
Major-General Count Palfy, who is at Tribitsch, having detached Captain Grafenstein towards the Elbe, that Officer found Means to penetrate as far as Tetfchen, where he burnt and funk feveral Vessels laden with Wine, Brandy and Beer, de-fined for Leitmeritz, before the Arrival of a large Detachment fent from thence to convoy this Em-barkation. We have this Moment received the a-greeable News, that General Maguire and Duke d'Aremberg, have taken the important Post of Gabel, where they took four Battalions Prisoners of War, as also General Hacke, the Prince of Holstein, and 105 Hussars, besides four Pieces of Cannon, one hundred, some say four hundred Waggons, loaded with Provisions and Baggage. This News is the more advantageous to the Austrians, as by their being in Possession thereof, they

Cassel, July 16. The Marquis de Contades has demanded, in an amicable Manner, a Passage through this City and Country, for a Body of French Troops that is going through Thuringia into Saxony; and as we are not in a Condition to oppose him, the Regency sent Deputies to the Marquis to regulate every Thing relative to the March of those Troops, and the Provisions and Forage with which they are to be furnished. Accordingly the French came through this Place the 13th and 14th Instant, and are continuing their March through the Landgraviate in feveral Columns, which are all to join upon the Fron-

Whitehall, July 19. This Day an Express arrived here from Ostend, with Advice, that the Commandant of that Town, General Pisa, sent his Adjutant to the English Vice Consul on the 17th Inflant, at Six of the Clock in the Morning, to tell him, That by Orders from his Court all Communication with England was broke off; and defiring the Vice Conful to intimate to the Packet-Boats, and British Shipping at Ostend, Bruges, and Nieuport, to depart in 24 Hours, and not to return into any of the Ports of the Empress Queen, til further Dispositions might be made; which

was accordingly done.

LONDON, July 14.

The Merchants have faved large Sums of Money by there not being above 150,000 l. infused on the Fleet arrived from the Leeward Islands, occasioned, we hear, accidentally, by a French Privateer taking a Dutch Ship that had Letters to convey for the said Purpose.

Extrast of a Letter from Captain William Clark, of the Exeter, dated at Fischamp in Normandy,

July 6, 1757. "I failed on Friday the first of July for London, and on Sunday the third fell in with a French Privateer, a little to the Westward of Beachy-Head, which immediately boarded us; the Confequence of which was, I was made Prisoner; this was in the Morning, just before Day, and as we were close in under the Land, I was in great Hopes of being retaken again by fome of our Cruizers, but to my great Surprize, never faw one all the Day. The fame Evening we were landed at this Place, fix Leagues to the Eastward of Havre-de-Grace, and the next Day we were put in Prison (I and my Men all together) the only one they have in this Place, for Felons and Rogues of all Kinds; and I am forry to fay, that we both live and lie worse than the Hogs do in England; we lie on Flint Pavement, and have but a Pound of lie on Flint Pavement, and have but a Pound of Straw each Man to spread under us, and nothing but the Roof of the House and Heavens to cover us. Our Living is most miserably bad; we have nothing but Bread allowed for Breakfast, and at Dinner a Quarter of a Pound of Beef a Man, boiled all to Pieces for Soup, and some musty Cyder to drink; at Supper we have Bread, Water, and green Caile boiled up together. Do the French Prisoners live so in England? God sorbid! French Prisoners live so in England ? God sorbid!

If our Intelligence concerning Affairs in North-America be well founded, nothing but the utmost Degree of Ill-Fate can, humanly speaking, make us unsuccessful in our Attempts upon the Enemy. No less, we are affured, than forty-four Ships of War, have, for some Time past, been seen in those Seas; and twenty-seven more are at this Time on their Road thither. These Circumstancea bave given Occasion to very considerable Public Edward Treated

Betts, that Quebec and Cape-Breton, are by this Time in the Hands of the English.

The Wound which his Royal Highness the Duke received in his Leg at the Battle of Dettingen is broken out a fresh; and Mr. Ranby, his Majesty's Surgeon, is fent for to attend his Royal

We hear that our Fleets in America and the Bay will shortly be reinforced with such an additional Strength, as that Monfieurs will fland very little Chance of getting fafe into Breft again, for which Purpose we hear it is proposed to borrow the Crews of some Privateers for a limited Time, and to fettle Things on fuch a Foundation as to leave no Room for Distrust or Distatisfaction.

Extract of a Letter from Biddeford, July 12, "The Tygress Privateer is come in from a Cruize, and brought in with her three Veffels; which, with four others fent to Briftol, make up seven Sail, bound from Bourdeaux to St. Domingo. The Tygres took them off Cape-Finesterre, in Company with the Cæfar, Lion, and Phænix Privateers of Briftol. Three of them ftruck to the Tygress before the other Privateers came up. Among the feven, three were Letters of Marque; one had 20 Guns, and 100 Men, another 14 Guns, and the other 6 Guns, besides Swivels; that of 14 Guns engaged the Tygress about two Hours, but as the Tygress was to Leeward, she could not come to so close an Engagement as was intended; the Ship of 20 Guns did not engage at all, having a Merchant and Lady on board, who requested there might be no Engagement, as there was no Probability of escaping. They are three Ships, two Snows, and two Schooners. The Ships are about three hundred Tons each : Their Lading confifts chiefly of Flour, Beef, Powder, &c. It is computed the feven together are worth upwards of 35,000 l.

Sept. 3. On Wednesday last arrived at English Harbour from Barbados his Majesty's Ship the Amazon, Capt. Norton: In her Passage she took a French Privateer Snow of 16 Guns, and 120 Men: The Snow being much damaged could not keep up with the Man of War, and was the next Day retaken; upon the first Intelligence of which Captain Codrington in the Antigua Brig of War, went out after her, and last Night brought her safe into English Harbour. The Amazon also went out, fo that it was impossible the Snow could escape.

B O S T O N, September 19. Last Monday was brought into this Port, by Captain William Barry, a French Prize Snow, of about 140 Tons, taken by the Privateer Ship Hertford, Thomas Lewis late Commander, on the 12th of July last, which was 15 Days after the Privateer left this Port : The faid Snow was bound from Cayenne (the Capital of the French Settlements in South-America, bounded on the North by Surinam) to Nantz, in France, laden with Cotton, Coffee, Cocoa, Rocoa, and Sugar, Guilliamme Rainboult, Commander; which Prize Captain Lewis carried into Fyal, one of the Azores, or Western Islands, where he arrived in 12 Days, and gave the Command to Captain Barry, who, with the Hertford, left Fyal the 2d of August last .--- On the 7th of the same Month, Captain Lewis died on board his Ship; and the First Lieutenant, Captain Coppinger, took the Com-mand of her -On the 10th the Hertford parted from her Prize, and stood to the Westward in Pursuit of a Ship that just hove in Sight.

Captain Barry left in Fyal a French Privateer Ship, called the Gloria Plame, of Bourdeaux, commanded by Captain Rodrigue, mounting 16 fix Pounders, and 11 Swivels, with 120 Men; by which Privateer Captain Barry had been taken ne ad of May laft, in the Ship-William and Rlizabeth, on his Voyage from Port-Royal in South-Carolina to the Orkneys, being in Lat. 46 and 30, and Long. about 34 from London.—
The fame French Privateer had also taken a Schooner, Captain Carter, bound from Cape-Fear for Briftol, and two fifthing Veffels. We are likewife informed, by Captain Barry,

that on the 8th or 9th of July laft, between nine and ten o'Clock, in the Evening, they had a violent Shock of an Earthquake in the Western Islands (the Shock felt in this Town, in the same Month, was on the 8th Day) but no confiderable Damage done in any of them, as he could learn,

except at St. George's, where about 100 Dwelling-Houles were deftroyed, and great Numbers of People in them loft their Lives; among whom was the Governor, who was buried in the Ruins of his own House.

By a Letter from Lifbon, dated the 16th of July laft, we are informed that they had been informed there, that a most terrible Earthquake had happen-ed in China, and other Parts of the East Indies; that many Places were subverted, and Goa totally

Saturday last Captain Sharrard arrived here in fix Weeks from Jamaica, and informs, That on the 14th ult. he met with the Affistance Man of War, of 50 Guns, who then had with her a French Privateer Sloop of 10 Guns, and a Ship which the Sloop, in Confort with a Brig, had retaken from the English: That after the Assistance had taken the above Prize, she gave Chace to the Brig, and run her ashore on Cape-Corantus, the S. W. Part of the Island of Cuba, when the Captain blew her up, together with all the Crew, except 15 or 20, which got ashore: That the Assistance then sent her Boat ashore, and brought off the Prisoners, who inform'd them, that she was a Privateer Brig of 16 Carriage Guns, and about 180 Men; and that the Captain faid before he fail'd, that if he was like to be taken, he would blow her up. They faw a great Number of Heads, Arms, Legs, &c. on the Shore.

We have an Account from Fort-Cumberland, that the French Troops were encamped a few Miles from that Fort, to the Number of 4 or 5000; that Col. Lawrence with the Troops were

arrived and entrenched there.

Tuesday in the Afternoon, John Childs, who had given public Notice of his Intention to fly from the Steeple of Dr. Cutler's Church, performed it to the Satisfaction of a great Number of Spectators; and on Wednesday in the Afternoon he again performed it twice; the last Time he set off with two Pistols loaded, one of which he discharged in his Descent, the other missing Fire, cock'd and fnapt again before he reached the Place prepared to receive him. It is supposed from the Steeple to the Place where the Rope was fixed, was about 700 Feet upon a Slope, and that he was about 16 or 18 Seconds performing it each Time. As these Performances led many People from their Bufiness, he is forbid flying any more in the Town. The faid Childs fays he has flown from the highest Steeples in England, and off the Monument, by the Dake of Cumberland's Defire.

Saturday last Capt. Majeroy arrived at Salem in three Days from Halifax, and by a Gentleman who came Passenger we learn, that the Cruizer Sloop of War, Capt. Hartwell, was arrived there in five Weeks from Plymouth, and informed that 12,000 Troops were encamped on the Isle of Wight .- That 19 Sail of Capital Ships, under the Command of Admirals, Hawke, Knowles and Broderick, were to fail the 15th of August on a fecret Expedition. That Admiral Bofcawen had refigned his Flag and Seat in the Admiralty.—That the June Fleet from the English Islands were all safe arrived in the Downs.

N E W - Y O R K, September 26. By several Letters received from Albany since our last, we learn, that Major Rogers fet out from that Place on Saturday the 17th Instant, with 500 Rangers, and about 100 Voluntiers from different Regiments; and we hear that all the Voluntiers now in the Army are to act under him for fome Time, before they can expect to be provided for in the military Way.

Monday last in the Afternoon, the Massachusetts

Provincial Ship, King George, Capt. Hollowell, arrived at Sandy-Hook from Boston, with a confiderable Sum of Money, for the Use of his Majesty's Forces in this Province, &c. The Experiment Man of War of 40 Guns, brought the above Specie from England to Boston, as men-

tioned in our laft.

Saturday Morning last Captain Thomas Barns arrived here in nine Days from Halifax, and by feveral Letters that came in him to Gentlemen in this City, we learn, That Admiral Holbourne, being joined by his Majesty's Ships the Eagle and Somerset, both of the Line, failed from Halifax on Sunday the 11th Inftant, with 18 Line of Battle Ships; that a few Miles from the Harbour he was joined by the Devonshire and Prince Frederick, of 70 Guns each, directly from England, and that three more of the Line also were hourly expected; that Governor Lawrence was fafe arrived at Chignecto, with two Regiments, where all Things were quiet, and that they were not in the leaft apprehensive of a Visit there from the

French, as was currently reported; that a fmall Schooner was returned to Halifax, after looking into the Harbour of Louisburg, where the Master counted 14 large Ships, with three Flags, and feveral small ones; many Tenta on Shore, and some new Works.

Capt. Barns informs us, that a Veffel was juff arrived at Halifax from England, who fome Time before had been fent Express, by Admiral Hol-bourne, but brought no late News; and that the Vessel fent in there by the Men of War, faid to be a large Store Ship, was not above 150 Tons, her Lading chiefly Salt, Nails, &c. PHILADELPHIA, September 20.

Since our last an Express came to Town from Hanover Township, in Lancaster County, and brought Advice, that on the 19th Instant three Men, of the Name of M'Clure, were killed and scalped there by the Indians ; that one William Campbell was dangeroully wounded; and that John Campbell, who was with the others when attacked, escaped, and informed, that the Number of the Farm ber of the Enemy was about thirty.

By a Letter from Carinie, dated the Twenty-first Instant, we learn, that on the Eighteenth two Children were carried off by the Enemy from M'Cormick's Fort, near Shippensburgh: That on the Nineteenth, two Men were killed and scalped in Conococheague, about Nine o'Clock in the Morning; one named Robert Rust, the other Mackron: And that the same Day, and much about the same Time, six Indians went to the House of one George Miller, and carried the House of one George Miller, and carried away his Wife, and four of his Children; they were feen going into the House by a Daughter of Miller's, who was in the Garden, by which the escaped.

On Sunday a small Prize Schooner came up here. She was taken by two Rhode Island Privateers, one from Jamaica, and one from Bermuda, and bound to Rhode Island, we hear, from the Miffiffippi, as a Flag of Truce, having feven English Prisoners on board; but the Privateers finding Melasses, and other Goods, made a Prize

of her.

The same Day the Captains Rankin and Blackburn arrived here from Halifax, and confirm the Account of our Fleet being failed again to cruize off Louisburg: That a small Ship from France, bound to Cape-Breton, laden with Flour, Wine, &c. was taken, and fent in by a Schooner in the King's Service. And that a Sloop had also been fent in by another Veffel in the Service, which on board, nor no Papers to be found.

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A Description of the Kingdom of BOHEMIA.

HE Kingdom of Bohemia, properly fo called, is bounded on the East by Moravia and Silefia, and on the West by Mifnia and Bavaria; on the North by Lufatia; and on the South by Austria. It is almost entirely encompassed by Mountains, in which there are Mines of Gold, Silver, Copper, Tin, Iron, Lead, Sulphur and Nitre. Carbuncles, Emeralds, Amethytis, Jasper, Saphire, and other precious Stones, abound more here, than in any other Part of the Empire.
Gold Sand is likewise discovered in some of its
Rivers. There are Salt Pits; but the Product not answering the Expence, they are supplied with it from Milnia, and other Places. They make great Quantities of Allum. The Soil produces flore of Saffron. The Gardens and Orchards yield Fruit fufficient for Confumption and Exportation. They do not much cultivate Vineyards, because their Wine does not keep long. They have Beer, both brown and white, which is much valued, and exported. They have Meadows and Pastures in Abundance, with large Cattle and Horses fit for War. The Inhabitants of the Towns are not fond of either Arms, Arts or Trade, but prefer a fupine indolent Life. The Revenue of Bohemia PRACUE, is the capital City, and was formerly

the Refidence of the Kings of Bohemia. The Walls of this Town enclose a larger Tract of Ground than any City in Germany : But confiderable Abatements are to be made for the wide Spaces and Hills encompassed within them. It is fituate upon the Moldau, a large rapid River, which has its Source in the South Part of Bohemia, and being anginented before it comes to Prague; by the River Egra, at last emptids itself into the Elbe. This great Body is divided into three Cities, viz. The Old, the New, and the Leffer

The Old Town is feated on the Buft Side of the Moldau, being the most populous Place of the three, and confiderable for the University, fre-quented by a walt Number of Students, this being the only one of the whole Kingdom, though it is not now comparable to what it has been. If we may believe Lewis du May, therewere, in 1909, when John Huis was Rector, above 40,000 Students. And it is credibly reported among them, that when the Emperor Charles IV. would have tetrenched fome of their Privileges, 24,000 Students left the Town in one Week, and not long after, 16,000 more. This Part of the Town has alfo feveral Colleges and Monasteries, and, among the Reft, the Jelains which is a very handlome

The New Town is of a very large Extent, encompassing the Old Town, together with the River, divided from it by a Ditch, into which they can let the River. The Irish have a Convent of Francistans here, and the Jesuin have likewith

of Franciscans here; and the Jesuita have likewise a noble College.

The Lesser Prague is feated on the West Side of the Moldan. It is far beyond the Old Town in Pleasantness and handsome Structures, being joined to it by a very strong Stone Bridge, of sixteen great Arches. Part of this Town is built upon a rising Ground, on the Top of which stands Horstein or upper Prague, where the Emperor has a Sammer House and a imagnificent Palace. In this Part of the City, is also the Cathedral Church of St. Veit, and most of the Protuse of the Nobility. The Lesser Prague was surprized in the long German War, by the Swedish General Koningsmark, who carried off an incredible Booty.

A Part of Prague being inhabited by Jews,

is thence called the Jews Town. They deal in all Sorts of Commodities, but especially in the precious Stones found in the Bohemian Mines, and the whole Trade of the City is in their Hands.

Extrad of a Letter from M. d'Etnesi's Head-Quar-ters at the Abbey of Corvey, July 13.

is faid, have encamped themselves.
"We shall soon see whether the Duke of Cumberland will make any greater Oppositions to the Motions we are about to make, than he did to our passing the Weser. Indeed we do not at all doubt but his Royal Highness is firmly resolved to defend the Dominions of his August Ancestors to the utmost; but then we are no less determined to enter them; and all the Battalions of Militia which we fucceffively fent to the Army to recruit in Case of Need, the old Regiments, are a Proof of our Good-will and hearty Endeavours.

" In the mean Time, we have the Satisfaction of beholding our Colours flying along the right Hand Shore of the Wefer.

" It is next to impossible to describe the Richacfs and Fertility of this Country, our whole Army being in the Midth of Abundance. Nor have the Inhabitants themselves (excepting the Inconveniencies which are the infeparable Attendants on War) Reason to dread our Arrival; for fure no General ever took fo much Pains to make his Troops observe good Order and Discipline (even in the Country of an Enemy) as M. d'Eures. Witness the following Letter, which he wrote to every one of his general Officers a little before he paffed the Rhine.

"Though Order and Discipline are necessary to be maintained in an Atmy, yet, Sir, they are more peduliarly so in the present Circumstances, wherein his Majetty's Forces are going to march steat the Possessions of the Hollanders, and enter as Friends into the Neutral States of the Empire. This requires the highest Prudence and Precaution, without which it will be impossible to preserve the Troops, or execute the Projects his Majesty has formed of defending appressed Princes, protecting the Liberties of the Empire, and succouring his Allies, pursuant to the Engagements by the Treaty of Wellphalia and that of Versailles.

the most exact Discipline to be observed not only in the abovementioned Circumstances, but even in the Perritories of his Profinn Majesty, on the Preferencion of which Countries, depends the Facility of procuring Subfiltence, and the being furnished with the necessary Transports for exe-

cuting your fablequent Marches.

"It is of the highest importance that you should be extreasily vigilant in seeing the Orders wifely established, for Maintenance of Order and Discipline, princually executed, and in particular to hinder the Officers from going out a Hanting, from playing at prohibited Games and Divertions, from leaving their Quarters and living in other Houses, from filling, them with their Horses and Equipages, and from fending their Domelica foraging without Orders, or out of the Places affigued them for that Purpose, California to any fine start and the starter

" You must also engage them to be very exact and regular in making Appeals, and hinder the Soldiers from going out of the Limits, and keep them in the Camp, by exercifing them often and at different Times.

"Of these Things I beseech you to be particularly careful, and desire to be informed of those who neglect to effential Duties, or disobey the Orders, being refolved to employ every Way pof-fible to have them fully executed; but this cannot be done unless Messirs, the Brigadier Colonels and Commandants, contribute a helping Hand to fee them performed, which I defire you to tell the Officers in the Army, more especially those of your own Division.

" The good Example you are capable of giving, and your being minutely informed of every Thing that passes, will be of the greatest Use to cause the necessary Regulations to be observed agree-

ably to his Majesty's Pleasure.
"Your Zeal for his Service, the Welfare of his Army, and your own Honour, oblige you thereto; and I flatter mylelf, that besides these preffing Motives, your Affection to me will induce you to affift me in discharging my Duty, and in participating the happy Confequences of a Cam-paign, during which I shall eagerly seek for Occations of exerting your Services; and shall study to deserve the Continuation of your Friendship by the most sincere and earnest Endeavours to give you convincing Proofs, that none has the Honour to be more fincerely

Your most Humble and Obedient Servant, D'ETREES."

LONDON, July 26.
The following Advices, dated June 22, were received from Stutgard, the Capital of the Duke of Wirtemberg, a Protestant Prince, the Extent of whose Dominions, (according to Templeman) is to that of Yorkshire, in the Proportion of 3364 to 4684, the Number of Square Miles contained, therein.

" Four Thousand, out of 6000 of the Troops of our most serene Duke, were, on the 24th, delivered to a French Commissary, who immediately reviewed them. Scarce was the Review finished, when the Soldiers began to mutter, and fay aloud, We are fold. Next Morning they deferted at once. The Thing did not ftop here: They were followed by many more. Bands of 20 and 30 forced their Way through the Detachments that guarded the Gates. In the Evening the Mutiny became general. They fired upon the Officers in the Barracks, and even bearded the General; and Field-Officers. Some of them called to the General, that if he did not immediately withdraw from before the Barracks, they would bring him from his Horse with Musket Balls. Mean while, fome Officers having purfued the Deferters, brought back a Part of them Prifoners. The Mutineers, being informed thereof, declared, that if they were not immediately fet at Liberty, they would fet Fire to the Barracks and to the Stadt-House. Left they should carry their Threats into Execution, the Prisoners were released in the Evening. Nevertheless, these licentious young Fellows, fat up all Night, Drinking, making a Noise, and sometimes Firing. This Morning they assembled, and having seized some of their Officers, marched out of Town, 3 or 400 together, with the Music of the Regiments playing before them, the General having begged of them to go away peaceably, in Goo's Name. In this Manner near 3000 of them filed off, and the Remainder have fince been difcharged. Thus our Army has melted away al-most in a Moment."

During the late Siege of Prague, that City received 8535 Bombs, and 93,025 Cannon Balls; and it appears, by Lists taken by the Parish Priests, that 8000 of the Inhabitants were killed, and above 9000 grievously wounded, by the Bombs and by the burning and falling of the Houses.

BOSTON, September 26.

All the Advices received from the Westward, fince the Surrender of Fort William-Henry, agree in this, That the Loss of that Fortress is likely to prove as fatal as the Lois of Ofwego the last Year; the Enemy having taken all our Whale-Boats, Battoes, and several larger Vessels, built for the transporting our Troops, Stores, Cannon, &c. on Lake-George; together with Cannon, Mortars, and a large Quantity of Powder; as also Provisions sufficient to support 9000 Men for upwards of two Months; a lucky Seizure for them, as we hear their Army were without any Thing of the Meat Kind till ours fell into their Hands. It is true that all the Troops made a brave Defence, and the Regulars are not backward to do Justice to the Merit of our Provincials; but notwithstanding this, as no Attempt was made to raise the Siege (however imprudent it might have been to have done it) and no one offensive Operation has been profecuted fince General Braddock's Difaster, the Indians now entertain to contemptible an Opinion of our Management, however unjustly, that we are in great Danger of lofing the few of the Six Nations who have hitherto remained fix'd in our Interest; as alfo the powerful Assistance the Southern Governments had Affurance of receiving from the Warlike Tribes of the Cherokees, Catawbas, &c .-My L-d L-n is happily arrived at N. York; he received the News of the Attack and Surrender of Fort William-Henry to General Montealm, on his Passage to New-York: By the best Accounts, Montcalm had upwards of 2000 Regulars, the reft were Savages and Canadians; and as foon as he had removed the Provisions, Warlike Stores, &c. very justly apprehending that the Militia of the feveral Governments were coming down upon him, he burnt the Fort, and retired with great Precipi-

By the Advices received from Halifax, all our Men of War and Transports were arrived by the oth of July; we had then about 30 Sail of King's Ships, Sloops and Bomb Ships, 16 of which were of the Line; and in the Camps and Barracks, about 13,000 Men; and never were a Fleet and

Army in better Health, or more plentifully provided with fresh Provisions, and all Necessaries, the fix Weeks they lay in Harbour.—The last Accounts are, that 4 Schooners had returned, having look'd into Louisburg Harbour, and all agree, that we had greatly magnified the Number of the Enemy's Ships; they could count but 16 Sail, 12 of which were supposed to be of the Line: It is also said that the Reports of Chapereaus Bay and all the Shore, being lined with Troops, is without any Foundation; the Shore abounds with large Stones, these being viewed in a foggy Scason, have the Appearance of Men. Admiral Holbourne having been very lately joined with 4 Sail of Ships, his Fleet at present consists of 20 Sail of the Line, besides smaller Ships; and is probably now before Louisburg, as he sailed from Halifax the 11th Instant.—But whether the French will now endeavour to meet him with their 12 Ships of the Line and 4 Frigates, Time only must determine.

N E W - Y O R K, Osober 3.

On Monday Afternoon last arrived here the Privateer Snow Royal Hester, of 14 Guns, Solomon Davis, Commander, of this Port, and brought in with him two rich Prizes, a Ship and Snow, which he took on the 11th and 12th of September laft, in Lat. 34, 10, on their Passage from Porto-Prince, in Hispaniola, to Bourdeaux, chiefly loaded with Indico, fome Coffee, and Sugar. The Ship is about 300 Tons Burthen, called Levebonnere, mounting 14 fix and four Pounders, had 46 Men, and was commanded by Monf. Ballon. The Snow is about 260 Tons Burthen, called Le Leger, mounting 14 four Pounders, had 66 Men, and was commanded by Monf. Trenchere. Captain Davis first descried them about 7 in the Morning of the 11th, fleering N. N. E. the Wind large. About 11 o'Clock he made them to be two deep loaded Merchantmen, they still keeping their Course; soon after which he tacked, and they hauled their Wind and viewed him, shewing fix large Stink-Pots, one at each of their Jib-boom Ends, and one at each Starboard and Larboard Fore-yard Arm. In that Manner they bore down on the Hester, and each gave her a Broad side, which was returned with three Cheers only, as they kept the Weather Gage. At Half after 12, A. M. by the Conduct of Capt. Davis, the Priva-teer became the Windward Vessel, and then the Engagement began, which continued very warm on both Sides for some Time, the Hester receiving the Fire of both Ship and Snow, when Davis, being before prepared for boarding, bore down on the latter, she seeming then and before, by her Behaviour, to be the strongest Vessel, and best manned; and as he was about making his Grap-pling faft, poured his Broad-file into her, and boarded. This Dispute lasted full Half an Hour, when having killed out-right Eleven of the French Sailors, and wounded Thirty odd more, the rest called for Quarters, and Capt. Davis ordered her Colours to be flruck, the French Captain refufing to strike at any Rate, although he had his Right Leg and Left Arm shot off, and was then near expiring. During this, Capt. Davis observing the Ship bearing down to affift the Snow, was obliged to cut his Grappling, nor had he Time sufficient to take his Men out of the Prize, and resolutely engaged the Ship for two Hours and a Half, with only Twenty-five Hands, Officers included, when he was obliged to sheer off and refit, having all his Rigging cut to Pieces, infomuch that he had but one Shroud standing to a Mast, the Ship in the mean Time making sail, and endeavouring to es-cape. About Half after Six in the Evening, Captain Davis got the chief of his Men from on board the Prize Snow, and gave the commanding Officer of her repeated Orders to keep his Company all Night: But in the Morning of the 12th (Sept.) finding the Prize had left him, and he still in Sight of the Ship, he gave Chace, and engaged her a-fresh for Three Half Hours, during which she fprung her Luff three different Times, and fired a Broad-fide, when the Hefter bearing down to board her, the struck, having 3 killed, and feven These two Prizes are esteemed the richest bro't

These two Prizes are esteemed the richest bro't into America this War, being valued at upwards of 80,000 l. and by all Accounts the best fought for, considering the Disparity of Force; the Commander in Chief, and other Officers of the ROY-AL HESTER who returned with her, have therefore only to hope that others might meet with the like Success in reducing the mercantile Interest of France, we being well assured that the Courage and Conduct of the former, and his great Perseverance in a Cruize of Eight Months, will restee no Dishonour on the latter, or any of the Men, their Parallels being sew (if any) since May 1756.

There were four Men killed on board the Privateer, viz. William Simmonds, Cornelius Vanderhoof, Peter Thorp, and a Negro Man belonging to Capt. Davis, and near 30 wounded, two of them dangerous, Thomas Grimes and Charles Sprainger.

It feems Monfieur Trenchere, Master of the Snow, had taken the Sacrament at Porto Prince, in full Assurance not to strike to the English if attacked on the Voyage, which he strictly adhered to; for while Quarters were offering him, he was so invenom'd, that suddenly grasping a Pole-Axe that lay near him, he hove it with such Vengeance at the abovementioned Charles Sprainger, that the Blow stactur'd his Skull, and the poor Man has been trepan'd for it twice since his Arrival. The French Merchant also refused Quarters, altho' badly wounded, and hardly able to make Resistance, yet attempting it, he was shot through with a Brace of Balls by one of the Hester's Men.

The Prisoners taken in the above Prizes, inform, that the Day before they engaged the Hester, they beat off a Dogger and Schooner Privateers, belonging to New-York, the latter of which, thought to be Capt. Arent King, they suppose to have sunk, as after the first Broad-side the French Snow gave her, she fell off, and did not answer any of the false Fires made by the Dogger the greatest Part of the following Night.

Saturday last arrived here, a Prize Brig, called the Mentor, of Bourdeaux, Mons. Jack Millyou, Master, taken on the 23d of August last, by the Privateers George, Goldfinch, and Fox, of this Port, in Company with the Privateer Stanwix, of Philadelphia, the Thurloe of St. Christophers, and Sloop Thomas of Antigua. She was bound from Cape-Breton to Cape-Francois, was a Letter of Marque, mounting 10 Guns; had taken on her Passage, the Ship Happy Return, of and for Londonderry from Philadelphia, and ransomed her for 1000 l. Sterling. The Brig made no Resistance, is loaded with Fish and Cordage, but notwithstanding, thought to be a Packet-Boat.

On Sunday the 4th of September, a Week before Capt. Davis came a-thwart his Prizes, in the Latitude of Bermuda, he met with a heavy Gale of Wind, or rather Hurricane, which obliged him to throw over board two of his Carriage Guns, and had his Main mast carried away below the Hounds; so that he engaged with 12 Guns only, under a Jury-Mast.

PHILADELPHIA, October 6.
The Sloop Fancy, of this Port, taken some
Time ago by Capt. Firret, in a French Privateer,
is retaken, and sent into North-Carolina.

By Capt. Arthur, from Jamaica, we are informed, that the Snow Unity, Capt. Bell, of this Place, bound to that Island, was taken and carried into Leoganne; and that the Captain died on board a Flag of Truce from thence for Jamaica.

Capt. Arthur (who failed with a Fleet, under Convoy of some Ships of War) in his Passage spoke with two Men of War, that had been cruizing for some Time off of Port Antonio (one of them the Assistance) and had taken a French Privateer Sloop, and a Brig, for Cape-Breton from Hispaniola; and re-taken a Ship belonging to Boston, bound to London: That the former Captain of her was going Home Passenger with Capt. Goodwin, of New-York, but seeing his Vessel, knew her, and applied to the Captains of the King's Ships for her, who immediately gave him Possession of his Ship, and ordered him to proceed on his Voyage.

Extra@ of a Letter from Virginia, dated Sept. 29.

"It is certainly true, that a Number of the Inhabitants (I was told Thirty-four) were killed and carried off lately from Cedar and Stony Creeks; and that some of the Murders were committed within thirteen Miles of Lord Fairfax's House."

We learn from Albany, that a Soldier of the New-York Regiment, who was taken last July in Colonel Parker's unhappy Affair, had got in there from Ticonderoga, which Place he had been from about twenty Days, and informed, that the French had about 2000 Regulars there, but no Canadians on Indians; and that General Montcalm was at Montreal. That three French Deferters were also come to Albany from Ticonderoga; and fay, that Berry's Regiment, consisting of two Battalions, each 500 Men, arrived at Quebec in July Last: And that they were very busy strengthening Ticonderoga by additional Works. In a Letter from Carlille, dated the 27th ult. it is faid, that at M'Clure's Gap, about seven Miles from that Place, the Wise of one Samuel Wisson

In a Letter from Carlifle, dated the 27th ultit is faid, that at M'Clure's Gap, about feven Miles from that Place, the Wife of one Samuel Wilson was killed the Saturday before by the Indians.

And in another Letter from Harria's Ferry, wrote the 27th of September, there is Advice,

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October 7,
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We learn from Fort Littleton, that two of our Soldiers, who were taken last Year in Fort Granville, had come in there, having made their Escape from Fort Duquesne, and inform, that the Garri-fon of that Place did not exceed 200 Men; and that a Party of Indians had fet out a few Days before they left it, to annoy Virginia and Maryland.

We hear from Lebanon, in Lancaster County, that last Friday four Children were carried off by the Indians.

From Reading, in Berks County, there is Advice, that on Thursday and Friday last some People were murdered in Bern Township by the Indians, and others carried off.

By certain Accounts received from Redruth, we find, that the vast Piece of Machinery, the Fire-Engine, at North-Down was inflantable. the Fire Engine, at North-Down, was inflantane-oully flopped by the Violence of the Shock: We hear allo, that it was felt at Grampound, Truro, Tregony, Redruth, Helltone, Penzance, and al-most in every Part of the Country, but the farther West the more violent, many Persons being unable to fland on their Feet through the Violence of the Miners under Ground, many of them being in Danger of being buried alive in the Mines where they wrought.—A Person just now informs me, that the Noise he heard in the Bowels of the Earth near Penyance, was more loud than that of 1900 Coaches drove at once over the Plain. Extract of a Letter from the valiant James Con-ner, Captain of the Hawk Privateer, of 20 Six Pounders, and 150 Men, belonging to Bristol,

dated in Bayonne Prifon. "On the 1 oth of June, about Three in the Af-ternoon, the Man at the Mast-Head cipy de Sail about two Points upon the Weather Bow, the Wind then at E. N. E. Immediately hauled up for her, and cleared Ship in Readiness; at Half past Four we came very close, and hoisted our propast Four we came very close, and hosted our proper Colours, which were foon answered by their hosting French Ones, and bearing away (having the Weather-Gage) in order to rake us, which I avoided by doing the like: We then, almost Board and Board, gave them three Cheers, they answering us with the like; we took the Opportunity, and begun the Scene by a Discharge of our Larboard Cannon, Swivels and Mulquetry, which were soon discharged on both Sides. We lay by each other for about two Hours very close, in each other for about two Hours very close, in which Time we had several wounded, and some killed. The Wounded, to get to the Cockpit, were obliged to unlay the Atter-gratings; many were obliged to unlay the After-gratings; many of our People took that Opportunity of quitting their Quarters, and our chief Havock being upon the Quarter-Dock, the greatest Part slipt from that Place. I dispatched the Master with a Cutlass to drive them up, the Lieutenants being all busy; when an unlucky Accident happened, of some Ioole Powder getting Fire, which caused a sudden Explosion: Upon which, I heard a general Cry for to strike, that the Fire had got to the Magazine, and many of our People blown up; and in this Consulin Somebody struck the Ensign: The Enemy, greatly encouraged at this Disaster, play-Enemy, greatly encouraged at this Difaster, play-ed upon us a considerable Time after, so that we ed upon us a confiderable Time after, so that we did not expect any Quarters. If it had not been for this Minfortune, it would have been a very bloody Engagement. We have lost 24 Men killed, wounded and blown up, the most of which in so terrible a Manner, that there are very little Hopes of their Recovery. When we went on board the Conqueror, we found her to be the Eagle of Bayonne, mounting 26 Nine-pounders on one Deck, 260 Men, and but three Days out of Port, when we unfortunately met them. We shot the Captain's Right Hand off, and also this sered his Right Thigh Bone to Pieces, so that it is feared he will less his laste, great Numbers of their Men lost Limbs, and many otherwise wounders.

Sunday last a very extraordinary Affair happen-ed at St. Albans. Extract of a Letter from our Correspondent, at Aberdeen, dated June 4, 1757.

"The Grampus Sloop of War went past this Place last Week with the Iceland Trade passes.

Place last Week with the Iceland Trade under her Convoy, and to the Northward of this Place, the Duke d'Aumont Privateer, bore down upon them and attacked the Grampus, and endeavour'd to board her, but was bear off; they continued the Engagement for about three Quarters of an Hour, when the Privateer flruck, having four Men killed and ten wounded, and the Grampus had three Men wounded; the Prize mounts fixteen Guns and ninety four Men. The Grampus left her Prize at the Orkneys to refit, having loft her Bowsprit and Fore-top-mast, and arrived here Yesterday with forty-nine of the Priloners who are now in our Tolbooth. There are fome of them talk good English. I heard one of them say they cargood English. I heard one of them say they carried fixteen Ransomers to France last Cruize, and had been out nine Days, but had got nothing, when they were taken. The Grampus is to go back for her Prize and the Rest of the Prisoners."

Yesterday arrived here in Six Weeks from Liverpool, Captain George Watt, in the Snow Christian ; by whom we are favoured with the Liverpool Public Prints, to the 26th of August; from which we have taken the following Articles, which are all that we can find room for this Week.

WHITEHALL, August 11, 1757.

On Tuesday last a Messenger arrived from his Royal Highness the Duke's Camp on the Weser; and bro't the following Relation of what pass'd between his Royal Highnesi's Army and the French, from the 24th to the 26th paft, inclusively. Sunday, July 24.

HE Enemy marching in three Columns, with Artillery, towards the Village of Latford, Major-General Furstenberg, who command. ed the Out-posts in the Village, and in the Woods, feat an Officer to inform his Royal Highness of it; who immediately reinforced those Posts with a Body of Troops under the Command of Lieutenant-General Sporcke. His Royal Highness found it impossible to support the Village, as it was commanded by the Heighths opposite to it, that were possessed by the Enemy; and withdrew his Post from Latford, having it always in his Power to retake it, from it's Situation in a Bottom between

two Hills.

The Enemy made two Attacks, one at the Point of the Wood, the other higher up in the same Wood, opposite to the Grenadiers commanded by Major-General Hardenberg. They failed in both; and the' the Fire of their Artillery was very Imart, they were obliged to retire. The French Army encamping on the Heighths opposite to the Dake of Cumberland's Posts, together with the Accounts he had received; that M. d'Etrees had affembled all his Troops, and had with him a very confiderable Train of Artillery, left his Royal Highness no room to doubt of his Intentions of attacking-him; his Royal Highness therefore determined to change his Situation, and take a more advantageous one, by drawing up his Army on the Heighth between the Wefer and the Woods, leaving the Hamelen River on his right, the Village of Haften-beck in his Front, and his left close to the Wood; at the Point of which his Royal Highness had a Battery of 12 Pounders and Haubitzers. There was a hollow Way from the Left of the Village to the Battery, and a continual Morafs on the other

Side of Hastenbeck to his right. In the Evening his Royal Highness withdrew all his Out-posts; and in this Position the Army lay upon their Arms all Night. Major-General Schulenberg, with the Chasseurs and two Battalions of Grenadiers, with fome Cannon, was posted in the Corner of the Wood upon the Left of the Battery. His Royal Highness ordered the Village of Hastenbeck to be cleared to his Front, that it might not be in the Power of the Enemy to keep Possession of it; and the Communications we had made use of during our Encampment there, to be made impracticable. On the 25th in the Morning, the Enemy appeared marching in Columns as if they intended to attack, and began to cannonade us very feverely, which lasted almost the whole Day. They marched and countermarched continually, and shewed as if they meant three Attacks, on our Right, Left, and Center. In the Evening their Artillery appeared much superior to ours. The Army lay on their Arms all Night. His Royal Highness ordered the Battery at the Point of the Wood to be repaired; and reinforced Count Schulenberg's Command with a Battalion of Grenadiers, and two Pieces of 12 Pounders; and supported it by four more Battalions of Grenadiers, under Major-General Hardenberg. His Royal Highness ordered a Battery to be made of 12 and 6 Pounders (the first of which were fent for from Hamelen) behind the Village of Haftenbeck, and took all the Precautions he could think of to give the Enemy a good Recepti-As foon as it was Day-light, his Royal Highness got on Horseback to reconnoitre the Position of the Enemy, and found them in the same Situation as the Day before. At a little after Five a very fmart Cannonading began upon our Battery, behind the Village that was supported by the Hef-fian Infantry and Cavalry. Their Countenance and Steadiness, in so severe a Fire, is hardly to be expressed or equalled. Between Seven and Eight the Firing of Small-Arms began on our Left, when his Royal Highness ordered Major-General Behr, with three Battalions of Brunswick, to sustain the Grenadiers in the Wood, if wanted. The Cannonading went on all the Time, rather augmenting than decreasing; but it did not create the least Dif-order in the Troops. There never was seen so much Firmness, though it lasted above fix Hours, from first to last. The Fire of the Small-Arms on the Lest increased, and the Enemy seemed to gain Ground on us. His Royal Highness detached Colonels Dachenhausen and Bredenbach, with three Hanoverian Battalions and fix Squadrons, round the Wood by Afferde. The Grenadiers in the Wood, apprehensive of being surrounded, from the great Force of the Enemy that appeared there, and were marching round on that Side, tho' they repulsed every Thing that appeared in their Front, thought it advisable to retire nearer the Lest of the Army, which gave the Enemy an Opportunity of possessing themselves of our Battery, without any Opposition. Here it was that the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick distinguished himself at the Head of a Battalion of Wolfenbuttle Guards, and a Hanoverian Battalion, by attacking and repulling, with his Bayonets, a superior Force of the Enemy, and retaking the Battery. The Enemy being in Pof-fession of a Heighth, that commanded and flanked both our Lines of Infantry, and our Battery, which Attack they could support under the Cover of a Hill, and his Royal Highness could not dispute, without exposing his Flank, both to their Artillery and Musquetry; he ordered the Army to retreat, which was done in the greatest Order, and with the greatest Reluctancy, the common Soldiers defiring to be led on to revenge the cruel unparallel-led Treatment of their Masters and Countrymen. His Royal Highness retreated to Hamelen, where he halted some Time, and then continued his March to Lhune. The Enemy did not shew themfelves in any Shape, during our Retreat. Whether it was owing to what they had suffered, or to the good Countenance of the Troops, we will not pretend to fay. Col. Bredenbach attacked four Brigades very strongly posted with a Battery of 14 Pieces of Cannon; charged the Enemy with h Bayonets, repulfed and drove them down a Precipice, with a confiderable Lofs; took all their Artillery, Ammunition, &c. but, preferring the Care of his Wounded, to the carrying away of the Cannon, he only brought off fix, nailing up and destroying the fest.

Col. Dachenhausen, on his Side, drove several

Squadrons of the Enemy as far as their Army, who never gave him an Opportunity of charging them. This Attack was late in the Day, and at such a Distance, that his Royal Highness was nor informed of it, till some Time after his Retreat.

People, has made Representations to Marshal Daun about his cruel Behaviour towards Zittau, which ought to have been secured from a Bombardment, as it belonged to the Saxon Dominions: In Anfwer to which the Austrian General has intimated, that he is as much concerned at it as the Queen; that the Prussians obstinately persisted in defending Zittau, tho' they had been summoned several Times to deliver it up; and as it was of the greatest Importance to him to take it, and to deprive them of the Resource they should find in the Preservation of the Magazines, he was obliged, though much against his Inclination, to dome to the Extremities

From the Head Quarters of Maribat Lebonald, at Vellan in Profin, August 4. Col. Malachowski, Commander of a Regiment of Hussars, having received Advice the lift Inflant, that the Coffscks were ordered out to fight them, but at their Ap-proach the main Body of Coffices had retired to a Village z Leagues from thence, and our Huffars found before the Village of Kummelen only a Party of Horse Grenadiers, and a Detachment of Cos-sacks, who were ranged in Order of Battle, they waited for our Troops with a firm Countenance in Appearance, they even advanced 200 Paces and fired fome Volleys. Col. Malachowski fell upon them with 70 Horse, routed and pursued them bewithout the Loss of a fingle Man on his Side, having only 5 wounded, and 1 Horse killed. The Enemy left dead on the Spot 2 Lieutenants and 73 Soldiers. We toole 26 Prifoners, and according to their Deposition the Russian Party confided of 160 Horse Grenadiers, and 100 Cossacks commanded by Major la Rue. They carried away

with them thro' Kautenau feven Waggons filled with wounded Men, and among whom was another Major who is fince dead:

In this Encounter Col. Malachowski shewed as much Valour as Conduct in the Measures he purfued. Major de Beuft, Lieurenant d'Isedom, and Cornet Hopka, distinguished themselves in this Action, as well as the Lieutenants de Zedmar and de Collas, and Cornet de Berg. The common Soldiers shewed great Bravery and discharged their Carabines but once, the reft was effected Sabre in Hand. Marshal Apraxin's Army, according to the last Advices, continued in its former Position, as fome Diffance from the Fromlers of Proffia;

Langen Zuleza, Saxon, August 4. T a Time when we are pouring our Troops into Germany, to the Affiftance of the Empress-Queen, the Public are here alarmed with an intended Invasion on the Part of the English, who, it is affured, are making great Preparations for attacking us on the Side of Normandy, Britany, &c. their Plan being, as it is faid, to attempt the Demolition of Brest, Orient, and other Places, along the Coast; taking the Opportunity of the Absence of the greatest Part of our Marine Force, now in America. The Court however does not appear ready to make any Alteration in its main Delign, contenting itself with ordering a competent

Number of Troops for the Security of the Coast.

Paris, July 29. On the Receipt of the News
of a new English Squadron appearing off Toulon, a great Council was held at Court; and a Courier dispatched to Madrid the next Morning. In the mean Time we learn, that a Matter of momentous Concern is at prefent on the Tapis between this Court and that of Spain. Some will have it that the whole System of Spanish Politics is inverted, and that a new and extraordinary Collision is likely to be the Effect of the close Connexion between France and Vienna. There are others, however, who as warmly affert, the Period is at Hand for finking an effectual Blow to that Sovereignty over the Seas fo long usurped by the English.

Paris, August 1. Count de Contians is speedily

to fail from Breft with 18 Ships of the Line and 4 Frigates, with which he is to observe that which is fitting out in England for a fecret Expedition, or he will perhaps, on his Side, execute an Enterprize

to be likewife guessed at.

Paris, August 12. The List sent to the Court of the Killed and Wounded on our Side, in the Batfle of Hastenbeck, is as follows :

Killed 17 Officers, | Wounded rr8 Officers. 1038 Soldiers, The unfortunate City of Frankfort, August 7. The unfortunate City of Zinau has fallen the Victim of a War in which it was no ways concerned, few Houses remain but what are greatly damaged, and several Hundreds of the Inhabitants perified in the Midft of the Flames. The Befieged cry out against the Fury and Impatience of the Befregers, and they in their Turn lay the Blame on the Obstinacy of the Befieged, and the Imprudence of the Inhabitants. However, if we may believe the Auffrians, they got into the Town Time enough to fave 6000

Drefden, August 4. According to the Particulars we have received concerning Ziran, the Inhabitants of that Place, in the Midd of the Showers of Bombs and red hor Balls that bear down their Hon fes, or fet them on Fire, whed their atmost Endeavours to fave at least Part of their Effects. They reckoned, that as foon as their Town should be taken, they should feel the Effects of the Victor's Merey; and indeed the Austrian Generals intended to spare them: But among the Troops that took Possession of the Town, there were Pandours, Sclavonians, and fuch like Irregulars, who, making no Distinction between the Inhabitants and the Profhans, took but little Thoughts about relieving the former, and imagined, that whatever they could pick up was lawful Booty. The Warehouses, fill-ed with various Goods, especially Linens, in which Zittau traded largely, were almost entirely burne down, or plundered. Those wretched Inhabitants, deprived of the Succour they expected, and fiript of almost every Thing, were drove to Despair, and a great Number had no other Course to take but to feek Refuge among the Pruffrans. The Prince of Pruffia, feeing them come in Crowds to the Corps he commanded, afforded them what Relief was in his Power. The Queen of Poland, fensibly affected with the deplorable tate of those

People, has made Representations to Marshal Dann about his cruel Behaviour towards Zittau, which ought to have been fecured from a Bombardment, as it belonged to the Saxon Dominions: In Answer to which the Austrian General has intimated, that he is as much concerned at it as the Queen; that the Profians obstinately perfished in defending Zittau, tho' they had been fummoned feveral Times to deliver it up; and as it was of the greatest Importance to him to take it, and to deprive them of the Resource they should find in the Preservation of the Magazines, he was obliged, though much against his Inclination, to dome to the Extremities

Paris, August 9. Notwithstanding the great Rejoicings made here on Account of the Victory obtained over the Duke of Cumberland, it is certain the Court, and in particular the King himfelf, is not highly pleased therewith, as from the great Superiority of our Army there was great Reason to expect a total Defeat of the Hanoverians. The strange Conduct also of the Commanders of some Battalious, who fo far miftook the Enemy as to fire on each other, is highly cenfured; and as we learn from good Hands, that two of our Regiments, of which one was Swifs, were almost entirely deflrayed by the Fierceness of the Fire, before the Mistake was discovered.

Turin, August 3. We hear that on the 12th of last Month there was an Engagement in the Bay of Cagliari between Capt. Gwynn, Commander of his Britannic Majesty's Ship the Ambuscade, and the Captain of a French Privateer called the Invincible; after firing at each other for above an Hour, the Privateer, who lost about 30 Men, struck. There were only three Men killed on board the Ambuscade; and on the 13th streaming with her Prize at Cagliari.

Warfano, July 16. A Conrier arrived here Ye-flerday Morning with an Account of Memel's hav-ing surrendered. The Terms of the Capitulation were, that the Garrison should go out with all the Honours of War, but should engage not to serve against the Empress, nor any of her Allies, for the Space of one Year. Marshal Apraxin's Army has certainly passed the Niemen, and is advancing flowly towards Pruffia.

Berlin, Angust 6. The King occupies with his Army in Lufatia the most advantageous Situation that the present Circumstances and the Face of the Country will allow; his Right extends to the Elbe, and his Left to the Sprey, having Bautzen on his Center, Drefden behind, and advanced Posts on the Frontier of Bohemia. The Court has just publifted the following Relation of the Encounter which happened lately on the Borders of Prussia, between a Detachment of Ruffian Grenadiers and Coffices, and a Body of Profian Huffars.

From the Head Quarters of Marshal Lebwald, at Vellan in Proffin, August 4. Col. Malachowski, Commander of a Regiment of Hussars, having received Advice the 1st Instant, that the Cossacks had made an incursion at Niebudzen, 200 Hotse were ordered out to fight them, but at their Approach the main Body of Coffacks had retired to a Village 2 Leagues from thence, and our Huffars found before the Village of Kummelen only a Party of Horse Grenadiers, and a Detachment of Cosfacks, who were ranged in Order of Battle, they waited for our Troops with a firm Countenance in Appearance, they even advanced 200 Paces and fired some Volleys. Col. Malachowski fell upon them with 70 Horse, routed and pursued them beyond Mikutelen, a little Way from Koutenau, without the Loss of a fingle Man on his Side, having only 5 wounded, and 1 Horse killed. The Enemy of dead on the Spot 2 Lieutenants and 73 Soldiers. We took 26 Prisoners, and according to their Deposition the Russian Party consisted of 160 Horse Grenadiers, and roo Cossacks com-manded by Major la Rue. They carried away

with them thro' Kautenau feven Waggons filled with wounded Men, and among whom was another Major who is fince dead:

In this Encounter Col. Malachowski shewed as much Valour as Conduct in the Measures he purfued. Major de Beuft, Lieutenant d'Isedom, and Cornet Hopka, distinguished themselves in this Action, as well as the Lieutenants de Zedmar and de Collas, and Cornet de Berg. The common Soldiers shewed great Bravery and discharged their Carabines but once, the rest was effected Sabre in Hand. Marshal Apraxin's Army, according to the last Advices, continued in its former Position, at fome Distance from the Frontiers of Prussia:

Langen Zaltza, Saxony, August 4. On the 1st of this Month a Detachment of French Hustars reach. ed this Place, where, after having pulled down the Prufian Proclamations and Advertisements, they took out of the Money Chest belonging to the Finances to the Value of 12000 Rix Dollars, which Money they put into the Hands of a Saxon Officer, with Orders for him to deliver it to the Queen of Poland at Drefden, obliging feveral of the Saxon Gentry to engage for that Delivery, or to repay the Money to the Producer of a Billet, they were obliged to fign. This done, they affured us Marshal Richelieu, with 80,000 Men, would be in Saxony in a few Days. After mature Confiderathe Money along with them, and retired in all Hafte into the Principality of Heffe.

Nienbourg upon the Weser, Angust 6. The Duke of Cumberland continues encamped in the Neighbourhood of Hoya, inclining towards Verden, in order to answer his Purpose of covering Bremen and Verden, and fecuring the Communication with Staden; where the Archives and the most valuable Effects of the Electorate of Hanover have been carried, and from whence the Dake may most conveniently receive the Succours which shall be sent him by the Elbe, and in this Situation he is alfe Master of the Lower Weser, quite to its Mouth.

Paris, August 5. There is at prefent a great Disgust arisen in the Public against the Spaniards, who are faid to have behaved extremely ill to feveral of our Cruizers in the Mediterranean, those Cruizers having been refused both at Barcelona and Carthagena foch Necessaries and Affistance which are rarely denied to Ships of any Christian Nation, much less to those of France, whose Interefts are fo intimately connected to that of Spain itielf. Among thefe Complaints, the Affair of M. de Caillan, Commander of the Nymph, feems to merit Regard; it is faid that this Frigate, being purfued by two English Men of War, ran under the Cannon of Cape Pedro, in the Hand of Majorca, but that defiring Protection of the Governor of the Castle, it was resulted; so that the Captain was obliged to fet Fire to the Ship to prevent her falling into the Hands of the English; himself and the Crew faving themselves on Shore, where they were treated in a very inhospitable Manner, as

well by the Governor as the People of the Country.

Paris, Angust 8. A very rich and most magnificent Present is preparing to be sent to a certain Nabob in India, who has promised to assist our Settlements with any Number of his Troops, in case of any hostile Attempts being made on them by the English; and also to join with our Forces in any Expedition which our Governor-General may propote to put in Execution against them. The Value of this Prefent is computed at 3,000,000 of

Paris, August 9. The Prince de Soubize was the primary Cause of the Marshal d'Etrees being recalled. It is hoped that his Successor, Marshaf-de Richelien, the Vanquisher of the English at Minorca, and the Defender of Genoa, will equally diflinguish himself in Germany: But it is never-theless certain that the Marshal d'Etrees is greatly regretted.

Amfterdam

Amflerdam, August 9. According to good Advices from both the French and Hanoverians, the Battle of Haftenbeck was neither general nor bloody. Marthal d'Etrees Dispositions for the Attack were excellent, and well executed. He had already repulsed the Enemy's Infantry that occupied the Woods, and was going to charge their Cavalry in the Plain, when Advice was brought him, that the Enemy appeared on his Right and Left, and were going to flank him. This Advice, which came from different Persons, to whom he could not refuse Credit, induced him to make a retrograde Motion, which gave the Enemy Time to retire, and to cross the Rivulet of Hamel. The French took a Battery of large Cannon, but they have no other Fruits of their Victory: Nor have they had any General Officer killed or wounded; which is very furprizing, confidering how they fwarm in their Armies. The Duke of Cumberland maintains that he had at most but 1000 killed and wounded, and that the French had 3000.

Lipftadt, August 9. Marshal Richelieu has taken the Command of the Army from Marshal d'Etrees,

who fet out Yesterday for Paris.

Paris, August 10. Orders are given for several Men of War to cruize on the Coast of Flanders, and Normandy, to prevent the Defigns of the English, who, according to all Accounts here, were preparing for a grand Expedition by Sea and

Land.

Modena, July 27. According to the last Letters from Florence, two Expresses were arrived there from Leghorn, to inform the Regency, that Admiral Osborne was in the Road of that Port with fix English Men of War, and that he had demanded Flour and fresh Meat, and Permission to go athore with his Officers; and that the Councils of Provision and Health assembled immediately to confider of the Demand; the Refult of which was to permit them to go afhore, after seven Days Quarentine. But we just now hear by Letters from Leghorn, that, without waiting till the Expiration of the Time, the English Admiral and his Officers went ashore there, and met with an honourable

Legborn, July 28. Admiral Ofborne, who is come hither to take in some Provisions, has left Admiral Saunders, with some Men of War, in the Mediterranean, to cruize off the Coasts of France, and intercept the Vessels laden with Provisions for

Minorca.

Drejden, August 4. The Advance of the French on the Side of Hanover, has induced his Prussian Majesty to draw a large Body of Troops out of the Garrisons of the several Towns of Brandenbourg, which Troops are ordered to rendezvous and form a Camp near the Dutchy of Magdebourg; fo that notwithstanding his Majesty is beset on all Sides by fuch numerous Enemies, the confummate Prudence, which directs all his Measures, gives us the Confidence that he will prove successful in the Accomplishments of his Designs.

Dantzick (in Poland) July 30. We hear that the King of Prussia has ordered all the Towns in his Dominions to furnish him with every fixth Man, and the Villages with every fourth Man, towards

the Recruiting of his Army.

Paris, August 12. The Court has received some News from Madrid, which is none of the most agreeable.

LONDON.

August 5. On Wednesday last the Assizes ended at Lincoln, when William Atkinson, James Thompson, and Robert Hoya, were convicted for Sheep-stealing, and condemned to die.

Matthew Pullen was indicted for Sheep-stealing; and being deaf and dumb from his Birth, a Jury was impannelled to try, Whether be flood mute by the Ast of Providence, or through Obflinacy; and on the Evidence of his Father-in-Law, and another Person, it being proved he was born so, the Jury brought in their Verdict, that be flood mute by the Ad of God; therefore is left in Goal till next Affizes, that proper Care may be taken of him.

Extract of a Letter from Abingdon, July 31. "I cannot remember, in all my Time, so fine a Prospect in Wheat-Fields as now, nor do any that I meet with who are Twenty Years older than me, and you know I am upwards of Fifty. The Ears are fo fine and large, so full and heavy, and contain such wast Numbers, containing 70 to 75 Kernels in one Ear, aubich I believe is as many as Three contained laft Year."

As the French Privateers have made but few Captures of late, 'tis suspected that many of them are recalled from their Cruizes, in order to take out their Hands for manning the Fleet fitting out

at Brest and Rochefort.

The Peggy, Boyd, and the Britannia, from Virginia for Glasgow, are taken and carried into Morlaix.

August 6. On Thursday the Right Honourable William Pitt, and the Right Honourable Henry Bilson Legge, Esqrs, dined with the worshipful Company of Grocers, when the following Toasts

were drank, viz.

Health, long Life, and perpetual Fame, to the two new Members of this Honourable Company. Success and Glory to Old England in the fecret Expedition. May Rewards and Honours attend only the Brave and the Honest. To the Revival of our good old Constitution in Church and State; and bappy Deliverance from Excises, or Inquisitions on Foreign Merchandize. To the Downfal of Monopolizers and infamous Stockjobbing; and a Halter for those that Humanity and Honour bind not. To the Fighting Commanders, Vernon, Weft, Lockbart, &c.

August 14. The Russian General has fent to Marshal d'Etrees, to inform him, that if he committed any Hostilities in Hanover, he had Orders to withdraw his Troops: And a Treaty of Neutrality is faid to be under Confideration between the King of Pruffia and the Ruffian Court.

Tuesday last died at Tunbridge, after a few Days Illness, the Hon. TEMPLE WEST, Esq;

Vice Admiral of the Blue.

L'Avanturier, --, from St. Domingo for Bourdeaux, is taken by the Cotee Privateer, and carried into Jersey.

It is reported that Fort St. George upon the River Sacrament, at the Back of Alderny, is taken

by the French.

They write from Vigo, that the Peregrine Man of War, stationed off the Coast of Portugal, has, in Company with the Deal-Castle, taken a French Martinico Man worth 6000l. and carried her into that Place.

Extract of a Letter from Portsmouth, August 8. " The three Admirals are just gone on board to muster the Ship's Companies personally, and to give the necessary Orders for fitting all the Men of War with the utmost Expedition. Some Place of Strength must be the Object of Destination, no less than eight or nine three-decked Ships being ordered to go.

August 20. The Prince of Conti Indiaman, said to be worth 200,000 l. now at Plymouth, has obtained Protections for 100 Men to navigate her to the Port of London; and the Owners have advertised a Premium of 5 Guineas for every Man who

shall engage in that Service.

In the Letter which the Marshal d'Etrees received from the King of France, July 30, he informed the Marshal, " That the Circumstance of Affairs were so changed, that it was found necessary to join the Armies of the Duke de Richelieu with that under the Command of the Marshal d'Etrees, and that he should give up the Command to the Duke de Richelieu, as his Senior, and that it would be very agreeable to him to hear that he would continue to serve in the Army under him." This Letter was filled likewise with the greatest Expressions of Kindness towards the Marshal; who notwithstanding has resolved immediately to quit the Army on the Arrival of the Duke de Richelieu, which was about the 6th or 7th of this Month. This Change has greatly aftonished a great Number of Persons of Distinction who served under the Marshal d'Etrees. But the Intrigues of the Court are not easily to be penetrated into at that Distance. Extract of a Letter from Portsmouth, August 18.

" Wednesday Evening arrived at Spithead from Guernsey, bis Majesty's Ships Gibraltar and Happy, with the Guernsey Fleet under their Convoy.

"Thursday Morning sailed out of the Harbour to 'Spithead, the Dunkirk's Prize, Capt. Clarke, fitted out of this Harbour as a Privateer.

" Every Thing for our Expedition feems to be in Readiness, and wait only for the Transports."

The Madam Pompadour, from Martinico for

Bourdeaux, is carried into Lisbon by the Hibernia Privateer of London.

A Snow of 200 Tons, from Martinico, is taken by the Phoenix and Revenge Privateers, and carried into Jersey.

The Buchanan, Lawrance, from Gibraltar for Maryland, was taken by a French Privateer in Lat. 39, 50, Long. 68, 30. and in her Passage to Louisburg was lost on the Island of Sable the 22d of April.

The Biddeford Man of War has taken the Victo-

ry from Port Louis.

A French Privateer of 16 Guns, and 100 Men, is taken by the Litchfield and Centaur Men of War, and carried into the Canaries.

-, the Santo Queen St. El-The Salvador, -

, and another Veffel, Name unknown all loaded with East India Goods from Bilboa for Port l'Orient, are taken by the Harwich Man of War, who also retook the Mellin, Smith, from Liverpool for Barbados, and fent them into Ply. mouth.

The Neilfon, Hubbard, from Virginia for Lon. don, with 504 Hogheads of Tobacco, and 60 Tons of Pig Iron, was taken the 24th ult. by the Admiral Privateer from Bayonne, who had also taken a Schooner, from Cork for Philadelphia, which was retaken afterwards by one of our Men of War: And on the 30th ditto, in Lat. 49, 36, the Neilson was retaken by the Hercules Privates of Briftol, and fent into that Port.

The Effex Man of War has brought into Ply. mouth a French Privateer of 16 Guns. And,

The Eagle Privateer of Briftol has brought into Falmouth two Store-Ships from Bourdeaux to Ca.

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LIVERPOOL, August 5.

Last Saturday English Wheat fold here from 5/3 to 5/b per Bushel of 70 lb. Weight, Foreign Wheat 5/4. Considerable Wagers are offered that English Wheat will be fold for 41. only, before the Month of October comes in.

August 12. Capt. Zachariah Normen, Commander of the Ship Porter, arrived here the 7th Inflant from Petersburg, left the Orkneys July the 30th, and faw the Mills, Burthen about 300 Ton, late M'Cloud, of Hull, from Virginia, in Stromness, who had been taken by a French Privateer from Louisburg off of Nantucket Shoals in October last. The Frenchmen took out the Master and most of the Crew, leaving the Mate, William Lawfon, Second Mate, Carpenter, and Two or Three more Englishmen on board, along with 12 Frenchmen, with an Intent to fend her to Louisburg. By Stress of Weather they were beat off the Coast, and having exhausted all the Provisions, even 'til they were obliged to eat the Cat and Dog, a Shark's Tail that was nailed on the Veffel's Stern, a Horse Hide defigned to preserve the Rigging when gauled, and Fowls Dung fried in Oil, they refigned in December the Ship to the Hands of the English, who carried her into Placentia Harbour in Newfoundland, having then little or no Water left, and in the utmost Distress for all the Necessaries of Life. As soon as they got in (notwithstanding the Frenchmen had resigned the Ship to Mr. Lawfon the Mate, none of them being capable to keep an Account of the Ship's Way) the _v_r took, it into his Head to attempt to secure the Ship, owing to the Infinuations of the French, who pretended to be in Possession of her when they arrived, and would give up their Claim to him; however Mr. Lawfon would not quit his Right, wintered with them, and left Placentia Harbour in June last, with an Intent to proceed for Hull.

August 19. Corn daily arriving here, Bread continues to lower in its Price, and Farmers hereabouts are now getting in a great Harvest, towards which the fine Weather contributes greatly. The Poor may again eat Bread; and furely for these Bleffings we ought not to omit to render Thanks and Praises

to the bountiful and beneficent Donor.

August 26. Yesterday arrived safe here, the Ship Turbett, Burthen about 200 Tons, laden with 500 Barrels of Flour, 400 Casks of Wine, 200 Barrels of Pork, 100 Ditto Beef, 100 Anchors of Brandy, 2 Trusses of Gold and Silver laced Hats, 2000 in each, 3 Butts of Shoes, Quantity 3000 Pair, and a Parcel of Slops, &c. a French Prize taken by the Ship Liverpool Privateer, Capt. William Hutchinson, and the Fame Privateer of 10 Guns and 70 Men, belonging to Guernsey. The two Privateers made an Agreement to cruize in Confort, and to share what they should meet with, in Proportion to their Guns and Men, until they arrived at Kinsale, the Place of Rendezvous, the Guernfey Captain being extremely well acquainted with the French Coaft. They cruized close in Shore, and had laid a Scheme to go into Bourdeaux River, the little Guernsey Man to appear as a French Privateer, with a Prize in Company, in order to cut out some of the Ships in that Harbour; but as foon as they got into twenty Fathom Water, on the 8th Instant, they fell in with the Ship Turbett, and a Brig and Snow in Company with her, whom they took. Captain Hutchinson dispatched the Guernsey Privateer and three Prizes (all bound for Canada) for Kinfale, and immediately gave Chace to three other Vessels in Sight. The Prize parted with her Conforts off of the Oldhead of Kinfale, faw the Privateer give Chace to a Vessel in Sight, and, as the Wind was contrary, bore away for this Port. Capt. Hutchinson, before he fell in with a 17 Gun Privateer or these Prizes, had chaced Shore on the Coast of France, and had destroyed a Fishing Schooner, which he stript and burnt, after he had taken the Prisoners on board.

Thirteen of the Jamaica Fleet arrived fafe here also last Night, and the two remaining Vessels, Prescot and Volunteer, were left off of the Saltees near the Mouth of St. George's Channel, all well. They came out of Jamaica in Company with 200 Sail of Veffels, under Convoy of the Rye and Shoreham, two 20 Gun Ships, on the 1st ult. whom they parted with off of Cape-Clear.

It is affored the Engroffers of Grain are diminishing very fast, and, through conscious Guilt of their vile Practices, there is a larger Calendar of Deaths (in felo de fe) among them, than in thefe

By a Gentleman, from the Edge of Norfolk, we are advised, that the Harvest was nearly over there when he left the Country last Week; and, that the Corn of all Kinds is extraordinary good and a vast rich Crop. It being the Opinion of many that this Year's Produce will supply the Nation for three Years at leaft .- So kind is PRO-VIDENCE.

BOSTON, October 10.

Extract of a Letter from Halifax, September 19. " The French Fleet will not come out from Louisburg to engage our Fleet .- They have a large Chain or Boom across the Harbour, to prevent our Ships going in :- They have been very near, and the Hunter Sloop was so nigh that the French fired at ber from the Island Battery .- The Hunter is difpatched to England .- Two Men have been killed near the Eastern Battery on the other Side of the Harbour. The Nightingale Man of War and the Mast-Ship arrived from Piscataqua the 3d Instant. NEW-YORK, Odober 17.

Abstract from a Paper, dated at Walkill, in Ulster

County, October 5, 1757.
"We are in a dreadful Situation here! every Moment expecting to be murdered by the Indians. Last Sunday Patrick Car, who lived about 18 Miles from Hudson's River, was shot lying in his Bed, and his Wife and five innocent Babes, with another Woman, and her five Children, who refided in the same House, were carried into Captivity by the Indians.—We, more than any other Part of the Province, have felt the direful Effects of an Indian War: Nothing has yet been done to succour us; the Frontier-Settlers are all coming in, having abandoned their little Habitations, to preserve their Lives. The late military Duty our young Men were obliged to perform, has caused many of them to go a Privateering (having no Property of their own to defend) fo that we are incapacitated from defending ourselves as we used to do. --- We are in daily Expectation of hearing more Damage done, as we make no Doubt many scouting Parties of Indians are now out on the Scalping Account .- A few Men properly posted in Block-Houses, on the Frontiers, would be a great Protection to us this Winter.

A N N A P O L I S, Odober 27.
