## Assistant Professor Receives Appointment

Dr. Jon W. Bauman, Assistant Professor of Music Theory and Composition and Director of the Jazz Ensemble at Frost-

burg State College, has been appointed to a three year term as Governor for Province 31 of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia Fraternity.

The national music Fraternity is geographically divided into thirty-eight provinces with over 250 active chapters at colleges and universities in the United States. Province 31 includes Frostburg State College, West Virginia University, Madison College, West Virginia Wesleyan College, the Shenandoah Conservatory of Music, and Salem College.

Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia is the national Fraternity representing the music profession. The primary purpose is to encourage and actively promote the highest standards of creativity, performance, education, and research in music in America. The American Man of Music Award, Sinfonia's highest honor, is presented triennially to a member of the Fraternity, who through significant musical activity, has distinguished himself and furthered the cause of music in America.

The celebrated concert artist and actor William Warfield has been named Phi Mu Alpha's American Man of Music for 1976. Acclaimed throughout the world as one of the great vocal artists of our time, Warfield is a star in virtually every area of the singer's arts. Past recipients of the Award include composers Howard Hanson and Aaron Copland, conductor Thor Johnson, music educators Earl Moore, Joseph Maddy, Archie Jones and Price Doyle, musicologist Sigmund Spaeth and concert artists Van Cliburn and Pablo Casals.

As Governor for Province 31, Dr. Bauman is a member of the National Council which is the legislative body of the Fraternity and a member of the National Delegate Assembly. He is the representative of the National President in all matters pertaining to activities within his Province and a member of the Province Governor's Council, the Fraternity's most important advisory body.

## Fry Urges Continuation

### of Student Evaluations

The following is a reprint of the original letter which Don Fry, President of the Student Association, presented to that body's House of Representatives on October 7 of this year. This letter, after receiving House approval was sent to Dr. Nelson P. Guild, President of FSC, and Dr. David Dean, Chairman of the Faculty Assembly.

With the recent decision by the College Faculty not to have mandatory teacher evaluations I feel it is time that I make a statement as the President of Student Association. I feel it is vitally important that some sort of mandatory evaluation be continued. Evaluations are the only way in which a student has a chance to relate his observations of the course material, comment on the way the material was presented, and to evaluate the performance of the instructor.

The decision of the College Faculty places Student Association in a position it is not, in my opinion, ready to assume. The Student Association is strongly in favor of man-

datory evaluation and if the Student Association will be forced to organize, conduct, and publish its own form of teacher evaluation. I feel that if the Student Association is forced to assume this responsibility the good relationship that exists between students and faculty will deteriorate. I don't believe the Student Association is ready to assume the teacher evaluation responsibility nor is the faculty ready to accept the idea of published evaluations.

I agree with many professors who claim that the evaluation is poor. However, I don't believe that is an adequate reason to make the evaluation optional. When a law of the land is outdated or poor we do not toss it aside, but revise it to fit into our desires.

The final decision is yours. Is it worth risking the good student-faculty relations by agreeing with a small majority of professors? I would certainly think that a more appropriate answer would be to continue mandatory tea-

cher evaluation as they are the Faculty does not share our philosophy on this matter. I urge you to re-write a new evaluation acceptable to all sides.

I remind you of your concern over the continuation of tripartite government on the Frostburg State College Campus. I also remind you that one of the most important characteristics of tripartite government is good student-faculty relations. Perhaps this is the reason Frostburg has survived this form of governance while others have fallen by the wayside. However, we are now faced with a problem which has strained these bonds. I speak of Student Association teacher evaluation not as a threat but as a reality if the optional teacher evaluation position becomes policy. I urge you to consider the effects that this form of policy will have on faculty-student relations, our tripartite governance system, and on Student Association, but more important on the one group that you and I share in common concern—the students.

## SA Notes

On Thursday October 7, the Student Association held its first functional meeting of the semester. Those issues decided upon included the allocation of money to the Black Student Alliance, the Baptist Student Union and the Rugby Club. The Student Association voted down allocating any money for a Miss son being that Frostburg was already involved in the Miss Allegheny County pageant, a pageant which offers scholarships for the winners. The House also voted to send John Rodriguez to Kansas City for a convention concerning student protection. The last order of business dealt with the Student Association exercising its power as the voice of the student body. The House voted unanimously in support of a letter written by Don Fry concerning the students' desire for continuation of student evaluations. The next meeting of the Student Association will be October 21. All interested students are urged to attend.

## Night Assistant Program Reinstated

The residents of Annapolis, Cambridge, Cumberland, Frederick, and Westminster are being served again this year by a group of vigilant and late-night working students known as Night Assistants. These students, who are residents of the aforementioned halls and work in pairs from midnight to 4:00 a.m., patrol the public areas of the halls to try to avert destruction, to be on the alert for trespassers or prowlers, to prevent thefts, to forestall the danger and nuisance of false fire alarms, and to try to watch for countless other problems that can and do arise in and around the residence halls. They save residents money and, more importantly, work with Campus Police and Resident Assistants to help provide a safer living environment for everyone. The Night Assistants, who carry identification badges, are Casey Bergman, Hank Bober, Mary Evans, Dale Phelps, Tom Reichelderfer, Russ Schantz, Stuart Scherr, Carl Scheuler, Tom Short, and Neil Thomas (Coordinator). The program is sponsored by the Residence Life Office.

# EDITORIAL

Week after week, the staff of this journal struggles to assemble the student newspaper and get to press on time. You know, it's difficult to feel anything but sorry for the football players. Week after week, they get so psyched up for Saturday's game, beat the hell out of the opposition in the first half then totally stop functioning in the second half. It's evident to this reporter that the most contributing element to the Bobcats' present winless record is head coach Mike Davis. In my opinion there exists no rationale to justify bringing an injured ballplayer into a meaningless ballgame and believe me, when Corbin entered the game the score (20-6) was too great a deficit to ignore. If Corbin

would have reinjured himself while trying to make the game respectable how would Coach Davis feel then?

Rumor has it that our controversial football coach is soon to retire from coaching the Bobcats. If this rumor becomes a reality, it is a reality that is long overdue.

I wish not to have my point of view misunderstood by the players, or coaching staff in general. So, let me end this editorial by saying that; I can no longer sit idly by and watch a team with so much talent and potential come out week after week and get beaten. I can no longer watch a defeat that comes about, not at the hands of the other team, but at the hands of a head coach that should not, in the view of this supporter, be in that position of responsibility.

I have supported this team before and I will continue to do so win, lose or draw.

There are several reasons and arguments for ridding Frostburg State College of student evaluations, and I have imparted some of my own below.

1) It is well known that all students are stupid, ignorant, poor spellers, etc. who act on Kohlberg's moral level two, so they can not be considered competent judges of any professor with regard to that professor's teaching ability. Therefore the student evaluation system should be dropped. (Students must be incompetent. Why else would they come to college? If they knew everything there wouldn't be any reason for them to come to college.)

2) The study on and by the University of Western

Ontario has a lot to do with FSC. After all, both are schools of higher learning, and isn't FSC in Ontario or located close to it? And it is obvious that Frostburg College students and Western Ontario University students are one and the same! After all students don't rate their instructors on how much knowledge the instructors impart to their students (It would be almost impossible to do that!). Students only evaluate how well their instructors present the course material.

4) Are not anonymous evaluations illegal? It seems unjust to keep an instructor in the dark as to what each student thinks about him or her, and every instructor is unbiased (the instructor will not take revenge). So anonymous evaluations should not be used. (It should be noted that only students are biased and incompetent in their actions!)

5) Now there is also no need for student evaluations. If an instructor was, say, teaching poorly, he'd know it and change his behavior. But surely, everyone knows that all instructors have proven, by obtaining such titles (as professor etc.) and positions, that they are great at teaching. Even student evaluations from the past indicate that the faculty members do possess great (superior) teaching ability (Note that in general they receive an overall rating of 4.0 out of a possible 5.0!!). Thus, student evaluations couldn't possibly improve any instructor's teaching ability since his ability is already superior.

6) "Reliable reports" (not to be mentioned of course!) point out that students don't take evaluation, in its present form, seriously. Therefore, it is reasonable to assume that students wouldn't take evaluations seriously in any form!! So evaluations shouldn't be had.

After witnessing the superior logic behind the arguments that I have presented for ridding FSC of student evaluations, it is apparent that the student evaluations should go; it is common nonsense to do otherwise! (Please note that this article is only a satire!)

## The Great SAGA Salad Contest

The Great SAGA Salad Building Contest of 1977 is hereby announced. The winner will be the person who can build the best fifty cent salad from the SAGA salad bar using only the plastic bowl supplied, salad bar vegetable assortment, and salad dressing. Best salad is judged by the following criteria: a) Nutritional value e.g. vitamin C and especially ruffage (Ten Percent). b) Aesthetic appeal- not too green or red; just nice (Ten Percent). c) Sheer bulk (volume and weight) (Eighty Percent).

Hints for maximizing fifty cent salad bulk: set a base of Russian dressing in the bowl for planting stalks of carrots and celery, assemble carrot sticks or celery stalks standing in bowl's interior periphery in manner of picket fence towering as much as five inches above top of plastic bowl, pile salad inside, use heavy Russian dressing as mortar for above carrot or celery picket fence (heating or curing the salad dressing with a hair dryer will stabilize the salad). Avoid croutons which are light, occupy unnecessary space, and do not add to the physical stability of the salad (they do add to

the aesthetic appeal, however), after salad is fully assembled pour oil and vinegar dressing to occupy all air spaces.

Solutions to Salad Bulk not allowed (Certain clever members of the Communications Media and Chemistry Departments have suggested unorthodox methods of attaining salad bulk which are now declared to be illegal): a) Discretely add iron filings to salad bar constituents, build salad picket fence as above, pile on material and hold high-powered magnet directly above the salad bowl. This may allow a vertical column of salad some eighteen inches above the plastic bowl rim and thirteen inches above the carrot or celery picket fence. b) Bring a small tablet press and slowly but surely use the entire contents of salad bar and press into a heavy but compact pellet (Nutrition rating full 10%; Aesthetic Appeal 0%; Sheer bulk full 80%). c) Freeze-dry entire contents of salad bar into a fairly light pellet. After judging complete, add water.

**Bobcats Lose Battle of Defenses**

The Bobcats defense held firm in last Saturday's clash with Towson State University but, the offense failed to produce any points as the Tigers walked away with their 3rd win of the year. The 12-0 loss for the Bobcats was their 6th loss this season.

Towson scored in every way possible. Their first score, a 41 yard field goal was followed with a safety which made the score 5-0 at the half. The Bobcats defense allowed only one touchdown and played exceptionally well in the mud, containing Towson's ground game with gang tackles and basic brutishness. The Bobcats uniforms were so muddy within the first 3 minutes of the game, it made it impossible to tell one Bobcat from the other. However, it should be noted that every member of the defensive unit, except Tim Folks because of unsportsmanlike conduct he displayed toward the end of the game, deserves a pat on the back for a job well done.
