A November to Remember

FSU will celebrate the magic of fall in Western Maryland with "A November to Remember" during its 2001 Homecoming, from Thursday, Nov. 1, through Sunday, Nov. 4.

Bundle up in your favorite sweater and join FSU alumni as they enjoy an array of activities, including a spirited football game, horse-drawn hayrides around campus, activities and the classic tunes of the '70s folk-rock group America.

Festivities begin **Thursday, Nov. 1**, at 8 p.m. with two activities. Dance aficionados can enjoy the **Dance Company Fall Concert** in the PAC's Drama Theatre. Others may choose to watch student organizations (and some surprise guests) lip sync to their favorite songs during the **Delta Chi Lip Sync** in the Main Arena of the Cordts P.E. Center. Tickets are available at the door for both activities.

Friday's action begins with a 10 a.m. tee-time for the **Hall of Fame Golf Outing** at Frostburg's Maplehurst Country Club. At 5:30 p.m., the **Bobcat Hall of Fame Dinner** will be served in the Lane University Center's Manicur Assembly Hall. Tickets for the dinner, which cost

On Friday evening, three events are open to Homecoming guests. A reception for the **Hilmar Gottesthal Exhibition**, featuring a variety of artwork from an acclaimed local artist, will be held from 7 to 8:30 p.m. in the Roper Gallery, in the Fine Arts Building. At 7 p.m., the Lane University Center's Live! at the Loft series presents a free concert with singer-songwriter **Roger Day**, known for his blend of rock and acoustic music. Free desserts and cider will be served. The Dance Company again presents its **Fall Dance Concert** at 8 p.m. in the Drama Theatre.

Saturday's activities begin with **registration and refreshments** provided by the State Employees Credit Union from 10 a.m. until 3 p.m. in the Lane University Center's second floor lobby.

From 11 a.m. until 2 p.m., the **Campus Carnival** in the Lane Lobby will offer family fun, including caricature artists, face painters, balloon artists, tarot readers and sand artists. **Roger Day** will perform his original children's show at 11 a.m., and hayrides will

depart from the steps of the Lewis J. Ort Library between 11 a.m. and 2 p.m.

FSU **Football** kicks off at 1 p.m. when the Bobcats face the Waynesburg College squad at Bobcat Stadium. Tickets will be sold at the gate. The half-time show will feature the **Homecoming Court Coronation** and the **FSU Alumni Band**.

Saturday night comes alive at 6:30 p.m. (doors open at 5:30 p.m.) in Manicur Assembly Hall with the **National Pan-Hellenic Council's Step Show**. Tickets will be sold the day of the show in the Lane University Center from 10 a.m. until show time.

At 8 p.m., a final performance of the **FSU Dance Company's Fall Concert** will be held in the Drama Theatre.

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America, Edwards to Perform

The band America will perform on Saturday, Nov. 3, at 9 p.m. in the Cordts Center Main Arena. Opening for America will be singer-songwriter Jonathan Edwards.

One of the most beloved and influential groups of the 1970s, America helped establish a new genre of popular music that fused free-wheeling rock 'n' roll with elements of folk and country. University Theatre to Present "Buried Child"

University Theatre will present Sam Shepard's play, "Buried Child," on Friday, Oct. 26 and Saturday, Oct. 27, at 8 p.m. in the Performing Arts Center's F. Perry Smith Studio Theatre.

This Pulitzer-winning gothic farce about the disintegration of the American dream is set against the barely suppressed violence and unease of a squalid family farmstead. A terrible family secret lies somewhere out in the field behind the house. When son Vince makes an unexpected homecoming with his new girlfriend, he anticipates being welcomed with open arms, but instead finds the hollow shell of what was once his family. As in most of his work,

Shepard reveals a shocking - and often humorous - look at just how far a family will go to survive.

The New York Times calls this play "...a bona fide classic: a work that conveys the mystical, cannibalistic pull of family ties as they unravel."

Actors Sought for 'A Soldier's Play'

Auditions will be held for the FSU production of "A Soldier's Play" Tuesday and Wednesday, Oct. 23 and 24 from 5 to 7 p.m. in Room 224 of the Performing Arts Center. Callbacks will be Thursday, Oct. 25 at the same time and place.

For decades, the stories and memories of thousands of African American soldiers who served in World War II have often been overlooked. Those stories will be told in the Pulitzer Prize-winning play by Charles Fuller.

This production explores the roles of African American men in the Jim Crow era and their roles in the military.

Set in a Louisiana Army camp in 1944, "A Soldier's Play" focuses on the mystery of a black company sergeant's murder. The play takes an unconventional look at how racism engenders self-hatred.

Fuller's drama emphasizes the cruel ironies of a segregated U.S. military and the even more hostile race relations out in an ostensibly egalitarian society.

The show is an all-male cast under the direction of student Jessica Dukes. Auditions will be closed. Those auditioning are encouraged to dress to impress, with no athletic gear. Scripts are available in the University Theatre office in PAC 302.



Faculty Brass Quintet to Perform Oct. 28

Brilliant brass music spanning the past 400 years will be performed by the FSU Faculty Brass Quintet on Sunday, Oct. 28, at 3 p.m. in the Performing Arts Center Pealer Recital Hall. The concert is free and open to the public.

Members of the quintet are Jon Bauman and Kurtis Lemmert, trumpets; Stephen Luzader, horn; Brian Plitnik, trombone; and Bryce Quarve, tuba.

The program begins with five Renaissance Dances by Susato. A work from the Baroque era, "Canzona Bergamasca," by Scheidt is next. "La Rose Nuptiale" by Lavalée represents the Classical period. The first half concludes with a 20th-century work, "Satirical Dance," by Shostakovich.

Following intermission, the quintet returns to 16th-century music with "Canzon II" by Peuerl. "Centone No. 7" by Schein is from the early 17th century. Next is the beautiful "Es Ist Ein

Ros'Entsungen" by Brahms. It is followed by a very unusual 20th-century composition, "Madrigals," by Frank Campo.

Bringing the concert to a fun finish is "The Entertainer" by Scott Joplin.

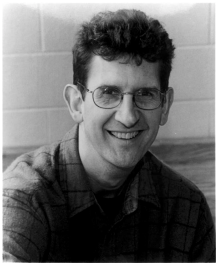

Bobby went to bed a happy, fulfilled man, but woke up dazed and injured sitting in his dining room window staring up at a pickup truck. The truck, driven by a man whose blood alcohol level was twice the legal limit, crashed through the wall of his bedroom traveling over 70 mph. His wife was dead and his life was changed forever.

A former teacher and coach, he uses his high energy to empower and motivate all ages and walks of life with his humor and message.

Philosophical Forum Offers 'Meaning of Life'

The Philosophical Forum will sponsor a lecture, followed by discussion, on Tuesday, October 23, 7:30-9:00 PM, in the Leake Room.

The lecture, titled "The Meaning of

Life as a Philosophical Question," will be presented by H. Skott Brill, who joined the Philosophy Department this fall. Brill comes to FSU with a Ph.D. in philosophy from Michigan State University.

It is sometimes said that the most important philosophical question is: what is the meaning of life? Brill's presentation will emphasize the importance of laying the groundwork necessary for an intelligent and fruitful exploration of this central philosophical question. In his view, laying an appropriate groundwork principally involves becoming clear about the question itself — that is, generating and critically examining possible interpretations of the question, in an effort to arrive at an interpretation such that the question is "irreducible, answerable, and important to answer." Brill will also connect his view about the importance of laying an appropriate groundwork to an issue central to studies on the meaning of life: whether the existence of God or an afterlife is necessary for life to have meaning. In his view, the answer may well depend in part on how we interpret "life" and "meaning."

'Europe to America' to be Presented at Roper

"Europe to America," a collection of works by local artist Hilmar Gottesthal, will be on exhibit through Sunday, Nov. 4, at the Stephanie Ann Roper Gallery in the Fine Arts Building.

This eclectic collection of sculptures, drawings, watercolors and oil paintings reflects Gottesthal's experiences in Europe and the United States.

Born Hilmar Udo Fister in Carinthia, Austria, the artist began to sign his works with "Gottesthal," the name of his childhood village, while studying at the Vienna Academy of Fine Arts. The word means "God's Valley." Now an American citizen, he lives in Flintstone, Md.

Gottesthal's interest in Byzantine art and an Austrian-Turkish Cultural Exchange Grant took him to Greece and Turkey, where he spent 30 years painting, sculpting and studying ancient ruins, myths and religious icons of the region. His style often reflects a Byzantine influence, with its use of mosaic-like patterns and complex pointillism often used to express spiritual ideas. Many of his works are inspired by mythology, Christian scriptures, current issues and the surroundings of his Western Maryland home.

Take Note

NCATE Accreditation Team Visiting Campus

The visitation team from the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education will be on campus through Wednesday, Oct. 24. This is an important step for the new state requirement for accreditation of FSU's College of Education.

Any student or faculty member who wishes to speak to the team will have that opportunity on Tuesday, Oct. 23. Students are invited to an open meeting that day at 1 p.m. in Framptom Hall 117. The meeting for faculty members is in the same room at 2 p.m.

The team is made up of five people from around the country appointed by NCATE, as well as four members appointed by the Maryland State Department of Education. The NCATE team will be looking to corroborate what is in FSU's institutional report. The state team will be looking to see to what degree FSU has incorporated the 1995 Maryland Redesign for Teacher Education into its own standards.

The NCATE team visit is the culmination of nearly three years of effort. Individual subject areas first had to meet standards set by national associa-

tions designated by NCATE. FSU has been recognized by the national associations for secondary math, early childhood education, reading, master's level administration and supervision, secondary English, secondary social studies, physical education, all four disciplines offered in secondary science – physics, biology, chemistry and earth science – and elementary education. The only approval that is pending is for the health component of the health and physical education program.

FSU will receive a written report approximately 30 days after the visit and will have 30 days to respond to the report. A recommendation will be made to the NCATE Unit Accreditation Board and a final decision is expected in April of 2002.

"As a professional education unit, we are eager to have national and state validation of our program," said Dr. Dave Fell, co-coordinator of the NCATE accreditation process with Dr. Mary Kay Finan.

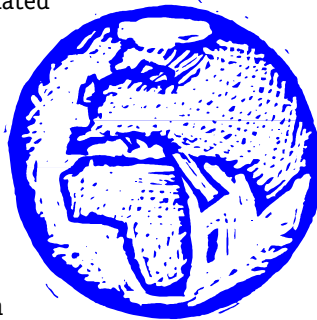

Study Down Under: Australia, New Zealand

FSU is affiliated with AustraLearn, an organization that provides unique opportunities to study at a variety of universities in Australia and New Zealand. AustraLearn arranges cheap flights, an orientation program on the Great Barrier Reef, pre-registration and transcript evaluation. Students may choose from a broad range of course offerings at campuses set in beautiful and exotic surroundings. Scholarships are available from both FSU and AustraLearn.



Study in Newcastle, England

Students interested in studying at the University of Northumbria in Newcastle, England, may apply now for next spring semester. Newcastle is one of the liveliest cities in the UK, just across the Channel from Amsterdam and three hours north of London (one hour south of Edinburgh) by train. Course offerings are available in a wide variety of subjects. The cost of the program about the same as one semester at FSU and all financial aid will transfer.

Do Your Student Teaching in Copenhagen

Education majors who would like to earn a semester of FSU credits while studying in Denmark should apply now for next spring semester's exchange program with the KDAS School of Teacher Training in Copenhagen. Students complete projects and spend several weeks in Danish schools practicing student teaching skills. All courses are in English. Financial aid transfers and scholarships are available.

Octoberfest or Mayfest in Germany

FSU students who would like to take

part in UMUC's semester programs in Schwabisch Gmund in southern Germany are advised to apply to the CIE. The campus is part of the University of Maryland system, and all credits transfer back to FSU. Live in a beautiful medieval village and study on a campus with students from over 100 countries. All teaching is in English, and German instruction is offered as well. Scholarships are available from both FSU and UMUC. Students may apply for fall or spring.

Study in Limerick, Ireland

Students interested in taking part in the Ireland Exchange Program in Limerick should come by the CIE for information about the spring 2003 program. Participants in the program study at Mary Immaculate College and take one FSU class and three MIC classes. All financial aid will transfer and scholarships are available.

Semester Overseas for Same Price as FSU

The International Student Exchange Program allows FSU students to register at FSU, pay FSU tuition and housing, and then study overseas for a semester, year or summer at one of over 200 locations. Students may take financial aid with them and may apply for scholarships from the CIE. Students may choose programs taught in either English or other languages. For the price of an airline ticket, this is a great way to earn credit towards your FSU degree while enjoying life in a foreign culture. Apply now for summer and fall 2002.

Choose from over 20 Locations to Study

FSU affiliates with the American Institute for Foreign Study (AIFS) which offers study abroad programs in a variety of locations at universities around the world. Programs are open to all majors. Study in Prague, South Africa or Japan. You may register at FSU and use your financial aid for all programs. AIFS offers scholarships to qualified students.

Scholarships Available for Overseas Study

In addition to taking financial aid overseas, students may apply for a variety of scholarships for study abroad programs. The CIE offers scholarships for all FSU programs in the amount of \$500 and \$1,000. Some departments also offer scholarships for overseas study. There are additional scholarships available from study abroad

organizations, such as AustraLearn and ISEP, and there are two new scholarships available for residents of

Maryland (MIEA) and for U.S. students on financial aid (Gilman). There are also national scholarships, such as the Rotary scholarship, the NSEP scholarship and the Fulbright.



Gain Work/Volunteer Experience Overseas

Students interested in working abroad should come by the CIE for information about internships, volunteer organizations and paid work overseas. Many organizations help students obtain jobs and work permits, and some help to arrange housing as well. Students can choose from short experiences (1 to 2 months) to longer experiences (4 to 12 months), or even look into a more serious commitment (1 to 3 years). Destinations are available throughout the world.

Learn More About Study Abroad

Students who would like to learn more about study abroad opportunities and how they fit into a degree program, may come to the CIE. The staff will provide an overview of study abroad programs and requirements and have application forms available. Scholarship and financial aid information will also be available. Students may use the CIE library and computer to search for programs. Videos are also available.
