Explore the Labyrinth





Her adventure brings her into contact with several outrageous characters, including a dimwitted thug, a claustrophobic policewoman and a crude hand puppet. Claire's virtual rollercoaster ride as an amnesiac in search of her fractured life is hilarious, yet disturbing and poignant.

"Fuddy Meers" has the feel of a

Describing herself as "an educator by training and experience, a teacher by temperament and a writer by passion," Williams has received the Kentucky State University Distinguished Service Award, the Hilda A. Davis Award for Educational Leadership of the National Association for Women in Education and the Paducah Black Historian Achievement Award in Education. Her article "Missing, Presumed Lost: Teachers of Color in the Nation's Classrooms," published in Black Collegian, won the 1989 Unity Award in Media for education reporting.

As part of FSU's Scholar-in-Residence Program, Williams will meet with student leaders for a discussion and dinner on Monday, April 15. The sponsors for this event are the Department of Student and Community Involvement, the Communication Studies Program and the Leadership Studies Minor.

On Tuesday, April 16, she will present a lecture/discussion, "African American Leaders, Then and Now," from 3:30 to 5 p.m. in the Lane University Center. This presentation, which is free and open to the public, will focus on African American leaders of the Civil Rights movement, their legacy for minority leadership and the role of campuses in emerging paradigms of minority leadership in the 21st century. A reception will immediately follow the program.

Later Tuesday evening, the MLK Speak Out Program will take place from 7 to 9 p.m. in the Lane University Center Loft. Students, faculty, staff and the public are invited to this celebration of the life and legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Participants will perform live musical selections, engage in creative readings and short stories and display artwork. Norma Blacke Bourdeau, a professor of African American Studies, English and Philosophy at FSU, will serve as the program facilitator.

The logos are located on the Campus\$ drive (U drive) in a folder aptly named "FSU Logos." You will find two-color and onecolor logos in tiff and eps formats, as well as a copy of the university seal in this folder. It is recommended that these digital images be used for print publications instead of the low resolution logos from the Web site. The tiff and eps logos are higher resolution and will print much sharper than the web logos. The images may still look "fuzzy" onscreen but should print clearly.

To place a logo in a Word document,



you go to Insert>picture>from file and you then scroll to abovementioned logo folder on the U drive and click on your selection. Click on the logo once it appears in

your document, and then, while holding down the shift key, drag one of the corner handles to adjust the size.

Please note that the university seal is meant to be used only on official documents such as citations and certificates. The logo is the official emblem of the University.

An updated campus map will be available soon in the same folder.

A reminder: It is against University policy for departments to create their own letterhead.
