FSU's 1999-2000 Cultural Events Series will present "Hello, Dolly!" Tuesday, Sept. 14, and Wednesday, Sept. 15, at 8 p.m. in the FSU Performing Arts Center Drama Theatre. Plan to attend and to enjoy the excitement as FSU hosts Mainstage Production's opening performances of its national tour of this musical treat for the whole family.

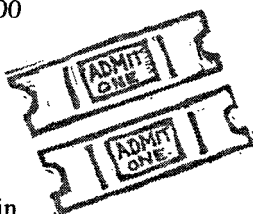
"Hello, Dolly!" tells the story of a busybody widow, Dolly Levi, who makes her living as a meddling matchmaker in the horse and buggy era of New York City. As she sets out to arrange a marriage between Irene Molloy, a lovely widowed New York milliner, and Horace Vandergelder, a rich curmudgeon of a Yonkers merchant, Dolly leaves a whirlwind of merry mix-ups along the way.

Dolly will be played by Tracy Jordan, who appears for the fifth time in this role. Jordan has performed throughout the world in most media, including TV and film. In addition, she has appeared in numerous cabaret and concert arenas including "Richard Rogers — A Man & His Music" in which she co-starred with Walter Cronkite, Florence Henderson, Marsha Mason and Giorgio Tozzi.

James Lee Flynn brings a wide range of theatrical experience when he takes the stage as Horace Vandergelder. In addition to leading roles in stock and regional theater, Flynn has played on Broadway and has toured nationally and internationally with numerous well-known artists, including Chita Rivera, Kathryn Crosby, Scott Wise and John Davidson. He holds degrees in music education and taught music for 23 years in New York public schools.

"Hello, Dolly!" is the winner of 10 Tony Awards, including Best Musical. It is based on the play "The Matchmaker" by Thornton Wilder, with book by Michael Stewart and music and lyrics by Jerry Herman.

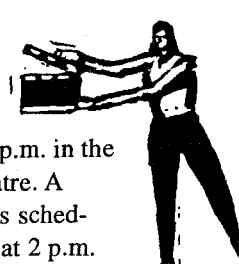
Follow the rise of J. Pierrepont Finch as he climbs the corporate ladder from lowly window washer to high-powered executive. Enjoy the hilarity as he tackles the boss' whiny, nepotistic nephew, the office party, backstabbing co-workers, caffeine addiction and, of course, true love.

Tennessee William's **"The Glass Menagerie,"** one of theater's most frequently produced plays, will be performed Nov. 19 and 20 and Dec. 2, 3 and 4 at 8 p.m. in the PAC Studio Theatre. A Sunday matinee is slated for Nov. 21 at 2 p.m.

William's work, often described as being "translucently autobiographical," tells the story of the Wingfield family through the "memory" of son and narrator, Tom. Meet Amanda, the mother, a daughter of the Old South who is out of step and out of time in the tumultuous world of the 1930s, along with her daughter, Laura, a frail misfit whose fragile existence is defined by her cherished collection of delicate glass animals.

"She Stoops to Conquer," a delightful drawing room comedy, will show March 3, 4, 9, 10 and 11 at 8 p.m. in the PAC Drama Theatre. A Sunday matinee is scheduled for March 5 at 2 p.m.

Written by Oliver Goldsmith, the play follows the misadventures of a shy young man on his way to meet his intended bride for the first time. Enjoy the laughs as he mistakes his betrothed's house for an inn, her father for the innkeeper and herself for a maid.



Paula Vogel's 1998 Pulitzer Prize winner, **"How I Learned to Drive,"** will be performed April 14, 15, 20, 21 and 22 at 8 p.m. in the PAC Studio Theatre. A Sunday matinee will be offered April 16 at 2 p.m.

The play is one woman's penetrating look back into her vulnerable adolescence and the unusual "driving" lessons she received over several years from her uncle. In the hands of Vogel, the seemingly taboo subject of pedophilia becomes a subtle and delicate memory play that carefully avoids sensationalism and stereotyping.

According to the *New York Times*, "Vogel has a gift for sustaining humor and pathos at the same time, without trivializing either emotion." This play is recommended for mature audiences.

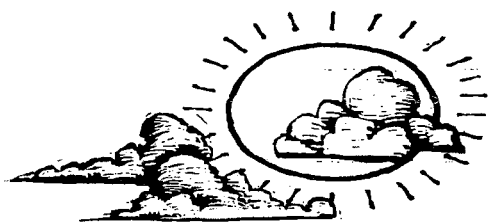

"PlayRights" Looks at Acquaintance Rape

A night involving alcohol and flirtation results in conflicting stories. Who is telling the truth? This situation will be portrayed in "PlayRights," an interactive theater program about acquaintance rape to be performed Wednesday, Sept. 8, at 3:30 and 7:30 p.m. in the Performing Arts Center Drama Theatre.

"PlayRights" is an original program designed to increase awareness of acquaintance rape on college campuses. The presentation uses drama to explore issues and challenge attitudes held by many in our society. Four actors depict a powerful story about rape among friends. At one point, audience members will have an opportunity to ask questions of the characters to discover their motives, feelings and opinions. This provides the chance to explore attitudes and gain new perspectives regarding the

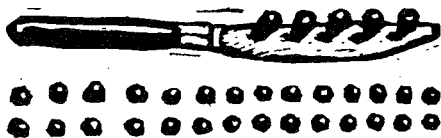
behaviors surrounding acquaintance rape.

"PlayRights" helps clarify what rape is and provides answers to such questions as: What should you do if a friend tells you she was raped? Would a friend rape a friend? If alcohol was involved, is it rape? When does seduction end and rape begin? What do society's values have to do with acquaintance rape? What do rapists look for in victims? What should you do if you are raped? "PlayRights" covers a wide range of topics that are imperative to the safety and well-being of all college students.

The program was developed by Equalogy, inc., a nonprofit organization dedicated to expanding awareness and promoting social change around issues of equality.

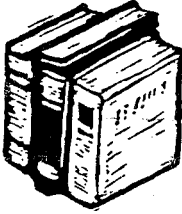

Shakespeare Discussion



Dr. Rochelle Smith of FSU's Department of English will host a discussion of Shakespeare Tuesday, Sept. 7, at 7 p.m. in the Lewis J. Ort Library Room 210. Designed as a community

outreach project in conjunction with the coming Cumberland Theatre production of "The Taming of the Shrew," this free event is open to the public.

Beginning with an introduction to "The Taming of the Shrew," Dr. Smith will discuss the controversy generated by the play and how directors in recent years have dealt with seeming elements of sexism that might otherwise perplex modern audiences. The event will end with a question and answer session.

An additional outreach project involving three area high schools will take place in the Performing Arts Center Friday, Sept. 10. Designed by Dr. Smith and Assistant Professor Mary Yost of FSU's Theatre Department, this interactive workshop will acquaint students with William Shakespeare and "The Taming of the Shrew" through exploration of Shakespearean language and experiments in acting. Actors from the Cumberland Theatre will end the workshop by performing an excerpt from the play.

FSU President Catherine Gira wishes to bring the following policy concerning the scheduling of academic assignments on dates of religious observance to the attention of all members of the University community:

"It is the policy of Frostburg State University that the academic programs and services of the University shall be available to all qualified students who have been admitted to its programs, regardless of their religious beliefs. Students shall not be penalized because of observance of their religious holidays and shall be given an opportunity to make up, within a reasonable time period, any academic assignment that is missed due to individual participation in religious observances. It is the responsibility of the student to notify his/her instructor of conflicts between religious observances and scheduled course activities."

Courtesy suggests that a student should inform the instructor in advance of any absence.

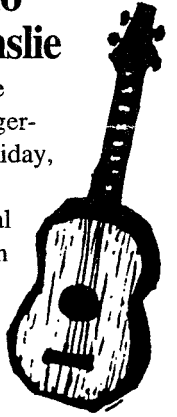
Cafe Frostburg To Feature Scott Ainslie

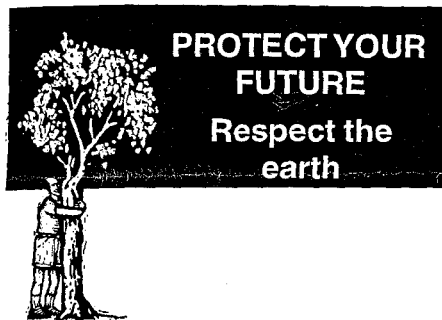
