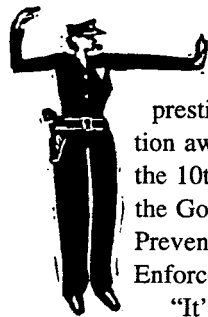

Univeristy Police Lauded for Crime Prevention



University Police recently won four prestigious crime prevention awards, including, for the 10th consecutive year, the Governor's Crime Prevention Award for Law Enforcement Agencies.

"It's like Sammy Sosa and Mark McGwire put together," said FSU Chief of Police Brian Shanley. "Winning four is very rare and reinforces our standing as the safest campus in Maryland."

The award for law enforcement agencies recognizes the FSU department for incorporating an overall outstanding crime prevention program as an integral part of its daily operations.

University Police was required to show significant activities in the areas of personal, residential and commercial security; involvement of patrol officers in security surveys, which are on-site, in-depth surveys of premises for security weaknesses, and referrals; crime prevention training, among other efforts.

In addition, Police Officer II Jamie Winters was awarded the Governor's Crime Prevention Award for Law Enforcement Officers for her public safety efforts. Her nomination noted that as a result of her activities, the University Police have integrated into the student life program to an unprecedented level. Each FSU police officer is required to perform two crime prevention activities per semester. Winters performed 30 in the year.

Winters' efforts include teaching Rape Aggression Defense, advising fraternity and sorority groups on legal issues such as hazing and speaking in freshman orientation classes.

FSU's Student Government Association was honored with the Governor's Crime Prevention Award for Community Groups, Organizations and Individual Citizens for its efforts to make late-night social events safer. The SGA, acting as the umbrella organization for student groups, recognized that the potential for violence, including gun violence, exists on campus, particularly

at late-night social events that attract non-student visitors. The result of their efforts was a three-point program to 1) scan all attendees for weapons, 2) record the identity of all non-students in attendance, and 3) set standards such as lighting, hours and minimum number of police officers assigned.

In addition, Timothy R. Stevens of the University Police was recognized for performing at least 50 security surveys.

The awards will be presented at a state ceremony to be scheduled in November.

Internationally Acclaimed Cellist to Perform

The FSU Department of Music and the Center for International Education will present a

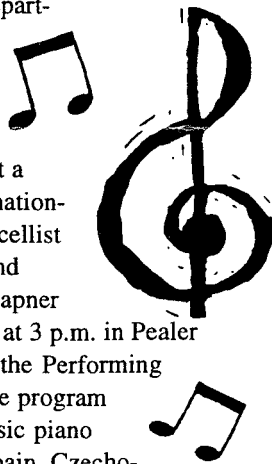

The program will feature music piano from France, Spain, Czechoslovakia, Israel, Hungary, Germany, Canada, Russia and the United States.

The recital is free and open to the public. Concertgoers will have an opportunity to meet the musicians following the performance.

Dr. Kazez began playing cello at the age of 5. A student of world music, he has traveled, studied and performed around the world, including India, Java, Bali, Turkey and Greece, in addition to Europe and the United States. His scholarly work includes two books, one the most widely used rhythm textbook in the U.S., "Rhythm Reading: Elementary through Advanced Training."

Hapner, in addition to his work with instrumentalists, has worked in musical theater and opera, including productions of Verdi's "Tosca," starring Placido Domingo and the world premiere of Leonard Bernstein's "A Quiet Place."

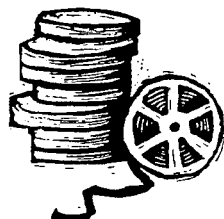

The Frostburg State University Activities for Life Office will offer a class on women's self-defense on



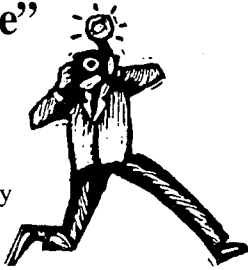
Tuesday and Wednesday, Oct. 26 and 27, from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. in the Cordts Physical Education Center, room 165.

Calling All Students Going to Ireland in 2000

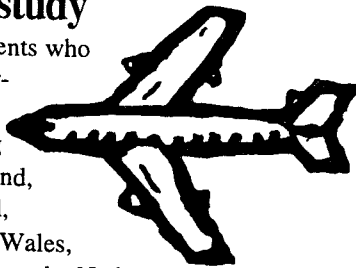

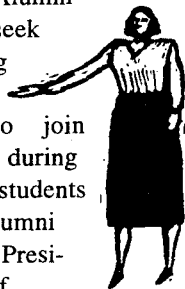

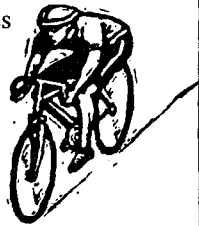

Protect Your Bike

Most thefts are crimes of opportunity. Reduce the opportunity and reduce bike in a well-lighted, well-traveled area, even if it means having to walk a little farther.



Always attach your bike to an immovable object, such as a large tree, bike rack or light pole. Make sure that the bike can't be taken merely by lifting the chain or cable over the fixed object. The University has provided bike racks at different locations on campus. These racks are designed for security and constructed to prevent damage to your bike. Because University Police regularly patrol the areas where the racks are, securing your bike to them is preferred.

Position the lock as high off the ground as you can so it's difficult to gain leverage by bracing one leg of a bolt cutter against the ground. This also will reduce the likelihood of anyone trying to smash the lock or pry it open. If possible, keep the lock high on the bike by closing the shackle around some portion of the bike such as the handlebar or seat support.

Always try to anchor both wheels as well as the frame with your chain or cable. Thieves will as willingly steal part of your bike as the whole thing.

If you don't lock your bike, don't leave it. Turning your back on an unlocked bike is an open invitation to loss. It takes only seconds to steal it.

If your bike is stolen, report it as soon as possible to University Police.
