University Theatre will open its 1999-2000 season with "How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying" Friday and Saturday, Oct. 8 and 9, and Thursday to Saturday, Oct. 14, 15 and 16, at 8 p.m. and Sunday, Oct. 10, at 2 p.m. in the Performing Arts Center Drama Theatre.

Power, sex, ambition and greed ... it's just another day at the office. In this "delightfully irreverent" musical satire of big business and all it holds sacred, we follow the rise of J. Pierrepont Finch as he climbs the corporate ladder from lowly window washer to high-powered executive. On his way, Finch tackles such familiar dangers as the aggressively compliant "company man," the boss' whiny, nepotistic nephew, the office party, the backstabbing co-workers, caffeine addiction and, of course, true love.

"How to Succeed..." is based on the book by Abe Burrows, Jack Weinstock and Willie Gilbert. Music and lyrics are by Frank Loesser.

Flamenco Comes to FSU

The FSU 1999-2000 Cultural Events Series will present "Flamenco Vivo" by the Carlota Santana Spanish Dance Company Saturday, Oct. 9, at 8:30 p.m. in the Cordts Physical Education Center Main Arena.

"This is an infectiously joyful celebration of music and dance," noted The New York Times. With their earthy, gutsy and passionate combinations of song, rhythm and dramatic dance movement, this group conveys humanity's most fundamental emotions.

Founded in 1983 by Carlota Santana and the late Roberto Lorca, the company uses flamenco not only as an art form, but also as a device for breaking down cultural barriers. In each performance, the audience clearly feels the essences

of Spanish, Judaic, North African and Gypsy influences on the creation of Spanish culture. They have toured extensively throughout the United States performing to sold-out houses including Lincoln Center's Clark Studio and The Joyce Theatre.




Cellist to Perform Music from Around the World

Tickets are still available for the performance by internationally acclaimed cellist Daniel Kazez and pianist David Hapner Sunday, Oct. 3, at 3 p.m. in Pealer Recital Hall in


We would like to have one, two, three, four or more of your favorite recipes as soon as possible. Your name will even be printed in the cookbook with each of your own recipes!



According to Hart, the Commission oversees the administration and allocates the funding for service and volunteer programs throughout the state.


