BURG Makes International Waves

FSU's BURG Peer Education Network has been honored as International Outstanding Network Affiliate by BACCHUS & GAMMA Peer Education Network at this year's General Assembly, held Nov. 11 to 15 in Orlando, Fla.

BURG is one of some 900 affiliates of the BACCHUS & GAMMA Peer Education Network, an international association of college and university based peer education programs focusing on alcohol abuse prevention and other related student health and safety issues. BURG's award came in its division of schools between 4,000 and 12,000 students.

"It was definitely a suror us," said BURG President Jennifer Stevenson. "This will continue our growth and motivate us for the future." BURG won the international award three years ago as well.

In addition, FSU student Philip Stamper was selected as the Student Advisory Committee Area 12 Representative, acting as the student voice to BACCHUS & GAMMA for all of the colleges in the Maryland, West Virginia, Virginia, Delaware, Washington, D.C., and North Carolina region.

BURG advisor Don Swogger said, "I was exhilarated to see several thousand college students creating ideas and brainstorming on how to become more effective on their campuses. It is a privilege to know we belong to such an awesome network."

"It's very competitive," said Drew Hunter, BACCHUS & GAMMA executive director. "You've got a great group of people there, and they're making a difference."

Eleanor Smeal to Visit

Eleanor Smeal, president and co-founder of the Feminist Majority Foundation and past president of NOW, will be on campus Thursday, Dec. 2. Smeal will speak at 2 p.m. in Lane Center 201 on "Forging Feminism and Fighting the Backlash."

This event is free and open to the public.

Smeal is a renowned leader in the feminist and civil rights movements. She was also the longest-standing president of the National Organization for Women and a key leader in the campaign to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment.

She is trained as a political scientist and was the first to identify the "gender gap" – the difference in the way women and men vote. She is the author of *How and Why Women Will Elect the Next President* (Harper and Row, 1984). Smeal is known as a "political analyst, strategist and grassroots organizer."

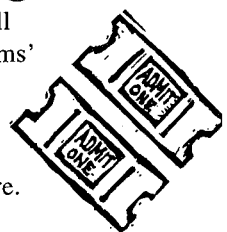
University Theatre Offers "The Glass Menagerie"

University Theatre will present Tennessee Williams' "The Glass Menagerie" on Dec. 2, 3 and 4 at 8 p.m. in the Performing Arts Center Studio Theatre.

Williams' work, often described as being "translucently autobiographical," tells the story of the Wingfield family through the "memory" of son and narrator, Tom. Meet Amanda, the mother, a daughter of the Old South who is out of step and out of time in the tumultuous world of the 1930s, along with her daughter, Laura, a frail misfit whose fragile existence is defined by her cherished collection of delicate glass animals.

Originally produced in 1944, this play has charmed both theater professionals and audiences for nearly 55 years. It continues to be one of the most frequently produced plays at all levels of the theater.

AC and FSU to Present Mantovani Orchestra

Allegany College and FSU proudly present "Christmas with the Mantovani Orchestra and Chorus," a Mainstage Production, Tuesday, Nov. 30, at 7:30 p.m. in the Allegany High School Auditorium.

Mantovani's Christmas concerts are rich in the size and variety of their offerings. This big and dramatic performance will include ballet selections by Tchaikovsky, festive and fun favorites such as "Santa's Sleigh Ride," devotional pieces like "Onward Christian Soldiers" and numerous traditional melodies made special by the indelible stamp of the Maestro's cascading strings.

The Mantovani Orchestra has been delighting audiences for more than 50 years with a sound made famous by its founder, Annunzio Paolo Mantovani. With a string section as its centerpiece, Mantovani would compose, arrange, transcribe and conduct the orchestra molding the sounds that he heard into interpretations of the music he wanted to present to his audiences. This formula produced the unmistakable "Mantovani sound."

By the time of Mantovani's retirement in 1975, he had become a household name in the field of popular entertainment. Late in 1981, one year following his death, at the urging of a family friend, the Mantovani children, Ken and Paula, made their father's library of music available to symphony orchestras. From this, an idea was born to form another Mantovani Orchestra and send them on tour. Since 1983, the more than 41 performers have toured steadily, continuing to delight audiences throughout the world.

The Orchestra is led today by Charles Ellis, a conductor who has led the concerts of numerous symphonies including the Baltimore Symphony, Rochester Philharmonic, Jacksonville Symphony, East Texas Symphony and South Bend Symphony, among others.

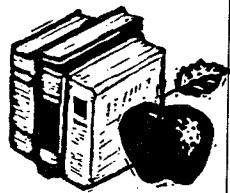


McAuliffe Memorial Education Awards

The Sharon Christa McAuliffe Memorial Teacher Education Award provides funding to full- or part-time students who have completed 60 credits and wish to pursue teacher certification in a critical shortage subject area. The shortage areas for academic year 2000-2001 are career and technology education (agriculture, technology education); computer science; English for speakers of other languages (ESOL); foreign languages (German, Spanish); science (chemistry, earth/space science, physical science, physics); and special education (generic infant to grade 3, generic grades 1 to 8, generic grades 6 to adult, hearing impaired, severely and profoundly handicapped, visually impaired).

The deadline to apply is Dec. 31.

Study in Oxford, England, in August

Students who would like to spend three weeks in Oxford at St. Edmund Hall, Oxford University, and earn credit towards their FSU degree should apply for this program, co-sponsored by Indiana University in Pennsylvania. Two FSU faculty members are offering courses next summer: Dr. Judy Dieruf



(Fine Arts), who also coordinates the program, will be teaching Watercolor in Britain – Art 221, 421 or 621, and Dr. Eira Patnaik (English) will be teaching Greco-Roman Mythology (Engl 290). The program fee includes excursions to points of interest within the area. 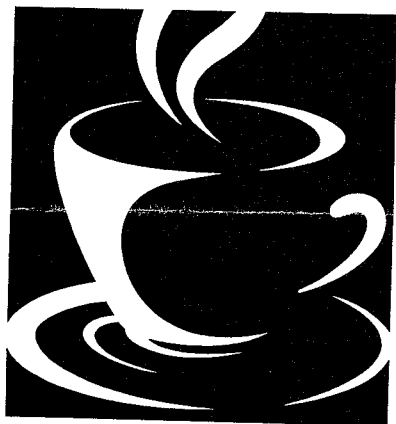
