## FSU to Host Annual Tri-State Honor Band

The FSU Department of Music will host the annual Tri-State Honor Band



Saturday, Dec. 11, at 7:30 p.m. in Pealer Recital Hall of the Performing Arts Center. The concert will feature 140 high school musicians from 22 regional schools. Guest conductor will be renowned French horn player Barry Tuckwell, founding music director of the Maryland Symphony Orchestra.

The concert will include works by Robert Smith, Anne McGinty, Charles Sayre, Claud T. Smith and Jay Dawson.

Participating schools include Mount Savage, Flintstone, Beall, Allegany, Westmar, Bishop Walsh, Keyser, WV., Bedford, Pa., and Salisbury Elk Lick, Pa. Other Maryland schools participating include Clear Spring, Smithsburg, North Hagerstown, Williamsport, Linganore, Arundel, Queen Anne's County, Patuxent, Rockville, Col. Zadok Magruder, as well as Monticello from Keswick, Va.

This year's guest conductor/clinician will be Tuckwell, whose distinguished career in music spans more than 50 years. Born in Australia, he was Principal Horn with the London Symphony Orchestra for 13 years. In 1968 he resigned this post to pursue a career as soloist and conductor. Maestro Tuckwell was founding Music Director of the Maryland Symphony Orchestra. Now retired from playing, he continues an active career throughout the world, guest directing, teaching, as well as giving lectures and master classes.

## Phonathon Savings Up \$65,037 in Pledges

During the month of November, 20 FSU students, calling each Sunday through Thursday evening, completed

thousands of calls asking Frostburg State University alumni to support this year's Annual Fund.

The 2000 Annual Fund Campaign has received \$65,037 in pledges from 2,558 alumni during the Fall Phonathon. Student callers through the Office of Annual Giving have made over 15,000 telephone calls to alumni with an average pledge of \$32.65 to support the Annual Fund Campaign through the FSU Foundation. Unless designated, the gifts benefit unrestricted scholarships, the Alumni Association, faculty/staff achievement awards, the Cultural Events Series, student leadership programs and other campus-wide programs.

The goal for FY 2000 is \$110,000 and the effort continues with the annual Faculty / Staff Campaign through payroll deduction. A follow-up phonathon will be held in the spring along with a direct mail campaign to reach all segments of the FSU community.

The callers had three goals: to thank alumni for their generous past support and request a pledge to this year's campaign, update alumni addresses and information, and catch alumni up on the "burg" since they graduated.

### Study in Oxford, England, in August

Students who would like to spend three weeks in Oxford at St. Edmund Hall, Oxford University, and earn credit towards their FSU degree should apply for this program, which is co-sponsored by Indiana University in Pennsylvania. Two FSU faculty members are offering courses next summer: Dr. Judy Dieruf (Fine Arts), who also coordinates the program, will be teaching Watercolor in Britain - Art 221, 421 or 621, and Dr. Eira Patnaik (English) will be teaching Greco-Roman Mythology (Engl 290). ## When the Weather Outside is Frightful



In order to cut down on the confusion surrounding bad-weather cancellation and delay announcements at FSU, the five scenarios for voice-mail and radio announcements are being shared with University employees.

On bad weather days, you can access the University voice-mail system after 6 a.m. for the best information.

Since essential personnel are required to report to work at the regular time regardless of the cancellation or delay, this information will no longer be included in the radio announcements. Your department head or the Office of Human Resources will tell you if you are essential personnel. Some personnel have been designated "Code Blue" or "Code Red" by the FSU Director of Facilities and will be required to report in certain circumstances. Again, these individuals have been informed of their "code."

Unless FSU closure is announced on voice-mail or radio, WE ARE OPEN. In the event of liberal leave, every employee is expected to try to report to work. The final decision with regard to your personal safety resides with you. If you believe it is not safe to come to work while the University is still open, you must contact your supervisor. You will then be charged for the appropriate leave time. The announcement of liberal leave neither cancels classes nor relieves essential employees of their need to report to work during inclement weather. **ALL FACULTY SHOULD SHARE THEIR INDIVIDUAL POLICIES ON LIBERAL LEAVE WITH THEIR STUDENTS AND HOW THEIR STUDENTS CAN FIND OUT IF THEIR CLASSES WILL OR WILL NOT BE HELD.**

### Accessing Voice-Mail to Hear School Closings and Delays (anytime after 6 a.m.)

#### From off campus

Dial (301) 687-4030. If you get a busy signal, hang up and try again.

If the university is closed, classes are cancelled, openings are delayed, etc., you will hear the details immediately when the call is answered by the voice-mail system.

#### On campus (from a phone with voice mail)

Dial 4030. If you get a busy signal, hang up and try again.

As soon as your general message begins, press "\*".

If the university is closed, classes are cancelled, openings are delayed, etc., you will hear the details immediately when the call is answered by the voice-mail system.

#### On campus (from a phone without voice mail)

Dial 4030. If you get a busy signal, hang up and try again.

If the university is closed, classes are cancelled, openings are delayed, etc., you will hear the details immediately when the call is answered by the voice-mail system.

Here are the messages you may hear on the radio or on FSU's voice mail in the

case of wintry weather:

All voice-mail messages begin with "You have reached Frostburg State University..."

#### **Scenario # 1:**

*Voice-Mail:* The liberal leave policy is in effect for employees at Frostburg State University today \_\_\_\_\_ (day of the week), \_\_\_\_\_ (date). Essential personnel are expected to report to work beginning with the \_\_\_\_\_ shift (day, afternoon, cat-eye). Classes are still expected to be held.

*Radio:* The liberal leave policy is in effect for employees at Frostburg State University. Classes are still scheduled.

#### **Scenario #2:**

*Voice-Mail:* The liberal leave policy is in effect at Frostburg State University today \_\_\_\_\_ (day of the week), \_\_\_\_\_ (date), for employees residing in Garrett County. Essential personnel are expected to report to work beginning with the \_\_\_\_\_ shift (day, afternoon, cat-eye). Classes are still expected to be held.

*Radio:* The liberal leave policy is in effect at Frostburg State University for employees residing in Garrett County. Classes are still scheduled.

#### **Scenario #3:**

*Voice-Mail:* The University is closed from 7:00 a.m. today, \_\_\_\_\_ (day of the week), \_\_\_\_\_ (date) until 5:00 p.m. today. All classes and events scheduled between 7:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., today, have been cancelled. (plus a notice for either essential, "code blue" or "code red" personnel to report to work).

*Radio:* Frostburg State University will close until \_\_\_\_\_ (time.) All classes and events are cancelled until that time. ((plus a notice for either essential, "code blue" or "code red" personnel to report to work).

#### **Scenario #4:**

*Voice-Mail:* The University will be closing at \_\_\_\_\_ (time) today, \_\_\_\_\_ (day of the week), \_\_\_\_\_ (date) and will reopen at \_\_\_\_\_ (time). Classes and events scheduled between those times will not meet (plus a notice that only essential, "code blue" or "code red" personnel should report to work). Only essential personnel should report to work. (The closing time should be linked to a shift.)

*Radio:* Frostburg State University will close at \_\_\_\_\_ (time) and will reopen at \_\_\_\_\_ (time.) Classes and events are cancelled. (plus a notice that only "code blue" or "code red" personnel should report to work).

#### **Scenario #5:**

*Voice-Mail:* The University will have a delayed opening from 7:00 a.m. until \_\_\_\_\_ (time) today, \_\_\_\_\_ (day of the week), \_\_\_\_\_ (date). Classes and events

will resume and all non-essential personnel should report to work at that time. Essential personnel should report to work as scheduled.

(Please note: The times will be linked to a shift, if possible. However, this decision is usually made by the Director of Facilities and is determined by how quickly his crews can work.)

## Faculty, Staff Notes

Counseling center director *Dr. Spencer Deakin* has collaborated with several of his colleagues in revising the International Association of Counseling Services (IACS) standards for the new millennium.

Dr. Deakin is a member of the Accreditation Board of the International Association of Counseling Services (IACS). As the accrediting agency for counseling centers in a wide variety of settings, the primary objective of the Association is the maintenance of quality service delivery. According to the IACS Monograph Series (1993), "the basic purposes of the Association are to encourage and aid counseling centers and agencies to meet high professional standards, to inform the public about those that are competent and reliable, and to foster communications among the centers and agencies."

Dr. Deakin has co-authored with other board members, the millennium 2000 revision of IACS accreditation standards for University and College Counseling Services. The revised standards will be published in the Spring 2000. Review of the publication will be available at the counseling center in Pullen Hall 109..

*Amit Shah* and *Shakil Rahman*, both from Department of Business Administration, presented a paper entitled, "Marketing Health Care Prevention Services: Rural America's Dilemma with HIV/AIDS," (co-authored with Brooks Honeycutt, Business Admn) at the 1999 Annual Conference of the Decision Sciences Institute held in New Orleans, La., Nov. 20-23. The research was funded by the Maryland Department of Health and Mental Hygiene. The paper was also published in the proceedings of the conference.
