## Six FSC Students

### Interning

The Public Affairs Internship Program of Frostburg State College has placed six students, including two from Cumberland, with federal, state and local government agencies for the summer.

The Internship Program, under the direction of John N. Bambacus, serves to provide staff assistance to governmental offices and agencies and to give student participants the opportunity to work in government positions while receiving college credit.

Tom Melvin, Cumberland, is an intern under Mr. John Devenny, Director of Group Home, St. Gabriel's Hall in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Tom serves in an administrative capacity for this public, nonprofit organization, as well as working with the courts of Philadelphia.

John Bass, Cumberland, is serving in the U.S. Senate election campaign of Paul C. Sarbanes. He is assigned to Congressman Sarbanes' campaign as a coordinator in Western Maryland. He is now involved in an evaluation of the primary campaign in order to determine the effectiveness of certain procedures to be used in the general election.

Susan Charuhas, Chevy, is interning in the of-

office of United States Congress woman, Gladys N. Spellman. Her duties include attending committee hearings, answering constituency letters and speech writing. She is also involved in the planning of Ms. Spellman's campaign for reelection.

Thomas Murphy, Wheaton, is working for Mr. Keith Kolodgie in the Finance Office of the City of Rockville. He has been working with elected officials in drawing up and evaluating the budget for the city.



### Bianco Elected President of MEDA

Dr. Robert S. Bianco, associate professor of music and director of bands at Frostburg State College has been elected to a two year term as President of the Maryland Band Directors Association. The MEDA is an affiliate organization of the Maryland Music Education Association and its membership is comprised of all band directors at the junior high, middle school, senior high, and college levels in the state of Maryland.

The MEDA serves to improve the quality of instrumental music education in Maryland public schools and sponsors all of the district and state band festivals, solo and ensemble festivals, and the Maryland All-State Junior and Senior High School Bands.

Dr. Bianco also serves as Maryland state chairman for the College Band Directors National Association and holds a position on the national advisory board of that organization. In addition to his professional organization affiliations, Dr. Bianco is active as an adjudicator for band festivals and guest conductor in Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia.

### New Policies Implemented

Two policies have been implemented for campus BYOB affairs by the staff of the Lane College Center.

The first is actually enforcement of state law and previous policies in that only beer and wine are permitted for BYOB functions. Since the majority of our student body is under 21, at these affairs.

## Romney Man Charged in Rape Attempt

Investigation has been completed of a rape attempt which occurred in a dorm on the FSC campus during the early morning hours of Friday, September 3, according to Mr. Robert Merican, Chief of Campus Police.

Authorities have apprehended a 22 year old Romney, West Virginia man on charges of assault with intent to commit rape, burglary, and two other charges connected with the same interest. The suspect has waived extradition and is

currently being held in default of \$10,000 bond.

Dr. Alice Manicur, Dean of Students, commented, "The problem of the non-student on campus--especially in the residence halls--has become the most threatening and violent problem our students now face." Dr. Manicur further emphasized, as did Mr. James Lund, Director of Housing, that this incident was the first of its kind on this campus, and that future incidents could be avoided with an increase of security consciousness on the part of the students.

## Literacy Project

### Scheduled

A local project on literacy and public policy entitled, "What's in a word? Literacy in America: The Use and Abuse of Language," has been scheduled for next March in the LaVale Public Library. The project is sponsored by the Frostburg State College Foundation, funded by the Maryland Committee for the Humanities and Public Policy, and directed by Don Smith and Dennis Gartner, who along with a group of local citizens have been responsible for planning the project and securing the grant. The project will consist of a series of four panel discussions, followed by audience participation, focusing respectively upon these concerns: basic literacy; gobbledegook and legalese; 'doublespeak,' or manipulative language in advertising, news reporting, and politics; and racial and sexual bias in language. As part of the project Professors Smith and Gartner are gathering books, articles, and other

materials that will be donated as a special collection to the LaVale Public Library. They would appreciate having called to their attention any especially relevant articles or other materials that anyone happens to come across. The project will also include, if possible, the appearance of a national speaker on language usage to kick off the project.

## Bank Policy

### Stated

Frostburg National Bank, your campus banking facility, welcomes your patronage and pledges to provide the college community with good sound banking services.

Due to circumstances beyond our control, the following policy changes, regretfully, have been implemented this year: 1. Checks drawn on other banks will not be cashed. 2. No second endorsements will be permitted. Student must appear personally to deposit funds or to cash checks. 3. Out-of-town checks will be forwarded, if requested, for collection. This involves a delay of approximately four days. 4. Deposit ticket and check book must be presented with each deposit transaction. This will expedite entry or deposit and provide proper receipt. 5. Savings Accounts will be opened with minimum deposit of \$10.00. Minimum withdrawal is \$5.00 or balance of account, if less. Depositor must appear personally for deposits or withdrawals. 6. No trans- action will take place without student I.D.

Members of local 239 American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (AFS-CME) has stated that the inspection and its resulting work orders are a positive change in campus working conditions.

Mr. John C. Durst, Frostburg State College's inspector, headed the inspecting team. Mr. Durst, a trained and fully qualified inspector, is a member of the buildings and ground maintenance staff. He was accompanied on the inspection by a representative of OSHA, a federal agency concerned with occupational safety and health. Two members of local 239 also accompanied Mr. Durst, assisting him

Dear Editor,  
Year after year the students who are not seniors, and who drive a car to school must face the problem of not being able to park close to or on campus. This problem has been remedied to a very insignificant degree in past years by the use of State Street as a place to park by the students of Frostburg State College.

However, this year the student body must face the fact that State Street is now unusable. The town council has gone to the expense and trouble of placing along State Street white posts which read 'NO PARKING'. This now makes it impossible to park there since the posts run the full length of the street.

The question is: Could not the City of Frostburg have reaped a financial benefit if that part of State Street had been turned into a paid parking area? This area could be used in much the same manner as 'O' lot is used here on campus. How much money could the City of Frostburg have received in revenue from students who would have wanted to park close to campus?

If thirty cars could park along State Street in an assigned spot, and if the cost would be twenty dollars per car per semester, then the revenue over one semester would come to six hundred dollars, or twelve hundred for a nine month period. Could not the City of Frostburg, or any city use that twelve hundred dollars? An additional six hundred dollars could be obtained from students from the summer quarter. This would bring the total for a twelve month

period to eighteen hundred dollars. This idea is practical since the revenue could be obtained without any large sums of money having to be expended.

Now the final question is how much money was expended and how many man hours were used up putting posts in the ground to stop students from parking on State Street? The fact that the posts are now up will not alter the fact that the students who would have parked there will park someplace else. Why not reap the financial benefit that would come with a paid parking area?

One daughter wrote a hate letter to her mother, attempting to force Mrs. French, an activist in the anti-cult movement, to quit her protest against Moon or face a complete break in communications with the girl. Both daughters, the mother testifies, were subjected to long hours of peer pressure, to psychological methods of persuasion, and possibly to hypnosis or drugs. These experiences resulted in the

alteration of the younger daughter's personality so that she lost her characteristic way of laughing and her intent to persuade the other girl to leave the cult and joined it herself. Again, I sound the alarm to this greedy con game to get college students the worst human bondage of young people since the Nazi youth movement. Good reason exists for anti-cultist Ted Patrick's entitling his book Let My People Go!


You will remember the in the first session during Orientation, you concerned

## Gridlers Lose

### First

Shepherd College rolled into the Burg last Saturday and handed the football Bobcats a 28 to 14 loss which, linked with last year's record, makes it 9 losses in a row.

The game proved exciting courtesy of number 89 wide receiver Mike Adams who led all receivers in receptions. Thanks to Adams' sensational grab that put the Bobcats on the 4 yard line, starting quarterback Joe Corbin managed to dance around the left end of a confused Shepherd goal line defense giving the Bobcats and Corbin their first of two touchdowns.

The second Bobcats score came early in the 4th quarter. Assists go to 3 Shepherd players who committed pass interference and face mask penalties which helped move the Bobcats closer to the T.D. The scoring drive originated with a fake punt and pass play on fourth down that worked perfectly. With a 4th down and 3 to go the Bobcats lined up in punt formation. Jerry Penonie, the center, snapped the ball back to the punter, Tim Woodring, who completed a risky pass to Mike Adams who then ran for the first down.

With the score Shepherd 21 and Frostburg 14, the Bobcats chances for victory seemed to getting better. However, Shepherd was not at all content with a 7 point advantage. After recovering a fumble on the Bobcats 14 yard line, Shepherd mounted a scoring drive that consisted of handing the ball to number 36, their 225 lb. fullback, who went in for the score. The final score was Shepherd 28 Frostburg 14. Outstanding players for the Bobcats were wide receiver, Mike Adams and defensive linebackers Don Fry and Mike Skinner.

## FSC Admitted to New Conference

Frostburg State College has been admitted as a member to the Mason Dixon Intercollegiate Conference, it was announced by Frank Syzmanski, president.

FSC will become eligible to compete for Mason Dixon Conference championships effective September 1977. Frostburg joins the University, George Mason University, Loyola College, Mt. St. Mary's College, Salisbury State College, Towson State College, Towson State University and the University of Maryland Baltimore County in conference membership.

"Frostburg State College looks forward to this new association with the Mason Dixon Conference. We are pleased with the calibre of the institutions

we will be playing," said Dr. Harold J. Cordts, Chairman of the Department of Physical Education and Director of Athletics at Frostburg State. "We feel the conference will be a benefit to Frostburg State and hope that we can be a benefit to the conference," he added.


