News Brief

Summer Sessions--

Frostburg State College will offer a comprehensive studies program during its 1978 Summer Session, according to David L. Sanford, Dean of Admissions, and Dr. Paul R. Lyons, Director of Graduate Studies. Scheduled during the summer will be three undergraduate sessions, three graduate level study periods, courses in Master's degree in Management Program, and a series of special course offerings. Registration for all courses is now open. Students may register for the first session by mail or in person through May 5 or on the first day of classes. Complete information may be obtained by contacting the Office of Admissions or Graduate Studies Office. Dates for the three sessions are: May 15 through June 15, June 19 through July 19, and July 20 through August 18.

Commencement Schedule Announced

The commencement schedule for the May 1978 program has been announced and is listed below. Several items need to be brought to the attention of all students, especially those planning to participate in the program. First, all students participating in graduation must wear academic regalia. Caps and gowns will be handled through the Bookstore in the Lane Center and distribution will begin with exam week. Special hours will be established on Saturday and Sunday preceding Commencement and will be announced during rehearsal. Second, rain tickets will be distributed on Saturday after rehearsal and each student will receive five (5) tickets. Tickets are only required for admission to Commencement if the program is forced indoors due to bad weather. No tickets will be required if the program is held outdoors. The Senior Luncheon on Sunday is by reservation only and is not

covered by the student meal ticket. Invitations and reply cards to the luncheon are being mailed to the graduating students permanent address. Reply cards and payment must be returned to Miss Geraldine Drake, Lane Center, by May 5. The President's Reception on Saturday is open to graduating students, their family members and all faculty and staff members. Students not participating in the Commencement program may pick up their diplomas in the Registrar's Office beginning May 19. Graduates not participating in the ceremonies should advise the Registrar's Office of their correct mailing address and their desire to have their diplomas mailed to them.

The 1978 Commencement schedule is as follows:

May 13, Saturday: 10:00 a.m.--Rehearsal (required) at the New Physical Ed. Center; and 8:00 p.m.--

President's Reception at the Lane Center.

May 14, Sunday: 11:00 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.--Senior Luncheon (by reservation) at Chesapeake Dining Hall; 2:00 p.m.--Processional line-up at Compton Gym; and 2:30 p.m.-- Commencement on the Main Quadrangle (location subject to weather conditions).

Pre-registration April 10-21

Pre-registration is now in progress. Any off-campus student who hasn't received their registration packets must pick them up at the Registrar's office, weekdays between 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. All students

are recommended to see their advisors before pre-registering. The deadline for submitting the course request card is Friday, April 21.

Pre-register. Continuing students who do not submit course request cards by April 21, will not be permitted to register until Wednesday, August 30, the first day of classes, at the Registrar's Office. Students who are undecided about returning for the Fall 1978 semester should pre-register, but notify the Registrar's Office as soon as possible after a withdrawal decision has been made. Students who fail to withdraw properly will have an unofficial withdrawal noted on their records.

Bills for continuing students will be mailed to the permanent address during the week of July 17. Any student who pays this bill by August 18, will receive his academic class schedule card and other materials by mail at his permanent address. Any student who does not pay by mail, may pay in person at the Business Office and pick up his schedule at the Registrar's Office. On Monday, August 28, schedule cards will be distributed

at the Registrar's Office. The Registrar's Office is urging all students to keep their local and permanent addresses updated at that office.

Important Announcement

There are two openings in the Student Association House of Representatives to be filled immediately. In this small way, it is our hope that some bit of knowledge will be disseminated throughout the FSC community. Further, it is hoped that this knowledge will serve to combat the malady of ignorance which has caused the racist cancer that is malignant in the body of the community of mankind. Dr. Charles Drew

Since we are dealing with sickness and disease this week, let's focus our attention to one of mankind's healers, Dr. Charles Drew.

Drew was born in Washington D.C. on June 3, 1904. He graduated from Amherst College, not only an outstanding scholar, but

captain of the track team as well as the football team's star halfback. He went on to teach and coach at Morgan State University. In 1933 he received his M.D. from McGill University, and the year of 1935 found him teaching pathology at Howard University. In 1940 he earned his D. Sc. from Columbia University completing research involving the techniques for separating and preserving blood plasma at the Columbia Medical Center in New York City. His dissertation on "banked blood" won him world acclaim, and the British immediately enlisted his services to set up the first blood bank in England. During WWII, Drew was made the Director of the American Red Cross Blood Donor Project, but was later dropped because he disagreed with the ARC's policy of refusing blood from black donors.

Yes, Drew himself was Black. The father of blood plasma, the man who discovered the techniques for separating and preserving plasma, and that blood plasma could replace whole blood in a transfusion, was a Black man. Ironically, on April 1, 1950, this individual of great worth died from injuries suffered in an automobile accident in an ambulance on route to a "Black" hospital. He might have lived, but a nearby "white only" hospital turned him away. Wake up everybody.

Forensics Bring Home Gold

The Frostburg Forensics Union closed out the 1975 competitive season on a high note by winning nine awards at the P. Kappa Delta Provincial Tournament held in Plymouth Mass.

P. Kappa Delta, the Honorary Speech Fraternity, of which Frostburg is the Maryland Beta Chapter, holds Provincial tournaments every other year in order to promote Fraternal brotherhood and as preparation for "PiKap" Nationals. This years tournament sponsored by Bridgewater State College, pitted a young Frostburg team against twelve other schools from the "Province of the Colonies."

In Provincial and National competitions medals and certificates are awarded to the top ten per cent in each event with certificates being awarded to the top twenty per cent. For the top two finalists in each event a gold medal and superior ranking is awarded: for the third place finalist a silver medal and excellent certificate is awarded, and for fourth and fifth place a bronze medal and also an excellent certificate is awarded.

The team coached by Dr. Mike Wallinger continued Frostburg's winning tradition by providing 5 medals in debate and two medals and two certificates in individual events.

The Debate team of Gary Brett and Monica Neuman went undefeated in four rounds and were awarded gold medals and a Superior Ranking as the best debate at the tournament. Gary and Monica were also named as superior speakers in the debate competition and awarded a second gold medal. Although

going only 2-2 the debate team of Lisa Paschal and Mary Lynn Logsdon were also awarded as one of the tournaments Superior Debate Teams and received gold medals for a second place finish. Lisa Paschal also received a silver medal as she finished behind Gary Brett and Monica Neuman in speaker points.

In the individual events rounds, Frostburg dominated the Impromptu competition. As an event Impromptu tests a speakers ability to quickly, and without any preparation put a speech together on any given topic in a total of seven minutes. It is the lack of preparation time and before hand knowledge of the topic which makes Impromptu one of the more difficult speaking events. Yet it is an event in which Frostburg seems to excel, winning one medal and two certificates in the competition. Along with qualifying for nationals, Senior Kevin Fitzgerald received a gold medal and superior ranking in the event. While Mary Lynn Logsdon and Carolyn Dillion both received excellent certificates, Fitzgerald also received a bronze medal and a ranking of excellent in the tournament Interviewing event.

On his team's success, Dr. Wallinger stated that he was extremely pleased with the entire teams efforts and felt that Frostburg made a strong showing even in the events in which no one made the finals. The team now looks forward to renewing its competitive season next semester and making the journey to St. Louis for the Pi. Kappa Delta Nationals.

Winter - Spring Competition

Bobcats Thinclads Set Many Records in Successful

The powerful FSC men's track team is well on its way to establishing itself as the best track squad the college has ever had. The Bobcat thinclads have already easily won the Mason-Dixon Conference indoor championships, the Marietta (Ohio) Relays, and the Maryland State College championship meet. Coaches Bob Lewis and Charles Hircock, however, regard the eighth-place finish in the NAIA national indoor meet and the third-place finish at the Davidson (North Carolina) Relays as more indicative of the real talent and depth on the team. Coach Lewis said, "This is a track team of which the college can be very proud. It is truly an honor and a pleasure to coach so many high-caliber and hard-working athletes. They expect the best out of themselves, and they aren't afraid of competing with anybody. At the Davidson Relays, there were twenty five teams from seven states in the competition, and we almost won the meet. FSC was the only team in the top eight that does not give track scholarships, so

we are obviously pleased with our performance there. A great many people heard about our college for the first time. I'd say we earned some respect." (Included among the teams we beat were Duke and Wake Forest.)

TRACK SEASON HIGH - LIGHTS INDOOR

Jan. 28, Pitt Invitational, Tim Gavin ran a 9:06.6 Two-mile and shattered the previous mark of 9:22.9. The Mile Relay team also broke a FSC mark.

Feb. 4, Maryland Colleges Invitational, three F. S. C. records established: Wayne Cottman - 50 yd. dash in 5.4, Tony Christian - 50 yd. high hurdles in 6.4, and Tim Gavin in the three-mile run - in 14:16.0. Gavin and Matt Cline were the individual winners (Three-mile and mile runs).

Feb. 15, FSC vs. Navy Plebes and Junior Varsity, FSC won 71 to 64. Two FSC records were set.

Feb. 25, NAIA National Indoor Championships in

Kansas City, Mo., Carl Schueler became FSC's 1st national champ in track by winning the two-mile race-walk event. Tim Gavin placed third in the two-mile run with 9:04.3. Both named to the All-American team. The team finished in eighth place.

Feb. 26, Mason - Dixon Conference Indoor Championships, the Bobcats won with 88 points. The closest opponent was Mt. St. Mary's with 45. Frostburg won eight out of the thirteen events and set four FSC records: Palmer Grott - Shot Put at 51'13/4", Mike Taylor - Long Jump at 22'2 1/2" and Triple Jump at 47'1 1/2", and Tony Christian - 7.5 time in the 60 yd. High Hurdles. Taylor's triple jump distance was also a conference indoor record.

March 11, East Stroudsburg State Invitational, FSC finished second to the last school in a very close meet. Fifteen teams from four states competed. Matt Cline won two events (the Mile and 1000 yd. Run).

FSC records were set by Jon Dundiak in 600 yd. dash (1:14.0) and Wayne Cottman in the 300 yd. dash (32.5).

OUTDOOR

March 22, Fsc 119 - Catawba College (N. Car.) 24, Palmer Grotte set a Fsc outdoor Shot Put record of 49'5". The old mark was set in 1972.

March 25, Atlantic Coast Relays at North Carolina State University, only a few FSC athletes competed due to extremely cold rainy weather. Roger Erricker place third in the High Jump, Don Quinn set a FSC record in the 10,000 Meter Run, and Steve Kelly established a FSC mark in the 5,000 Meter Run.

April 1, Marietta Relays, Frostburg State took the team title for the third consecutive year, won all the events but two, and set a meet record for the number of points scored. Four FSC records were broken.

April 4, FSC 121 - California State 14.

April 8, Davidson Relays, Coach Lewis said that this was one of the top FSC team performances in the history of the sport at FSC. Eight College records and many personal records were established.

April 14, FSC 132 - Towson State University 25, the meet was held on Towson's superior track facility, and the Bobcats totally dominated the competition. FSC won all but two events. Outstanding performances were turned in by Cottman, Christian, Gavin pole vaulters Bob Sweeney (14'3") and John Philbin (14'3"), and high jumpers Mike Savoy (6'5") and Roger Erricker (6'5").
