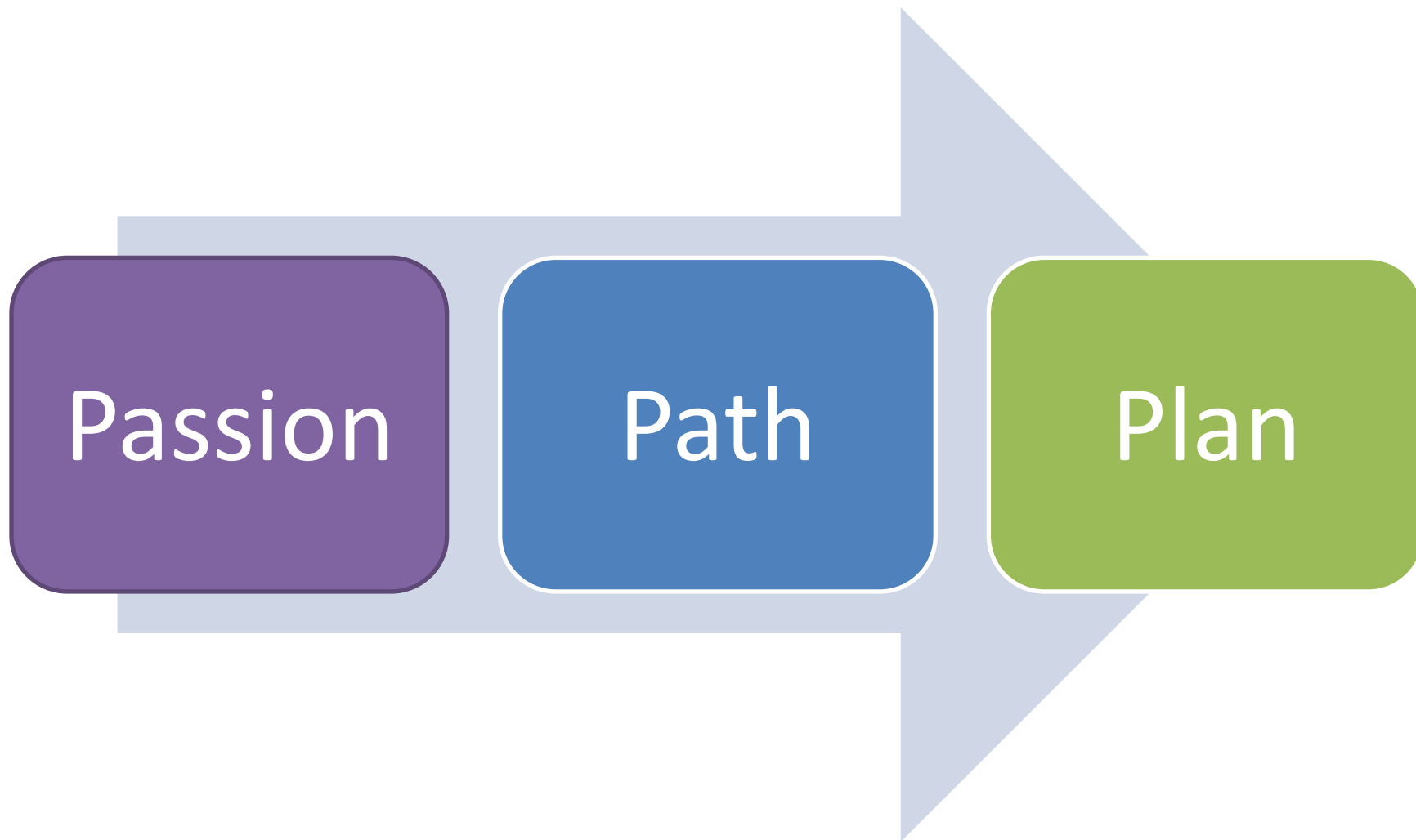

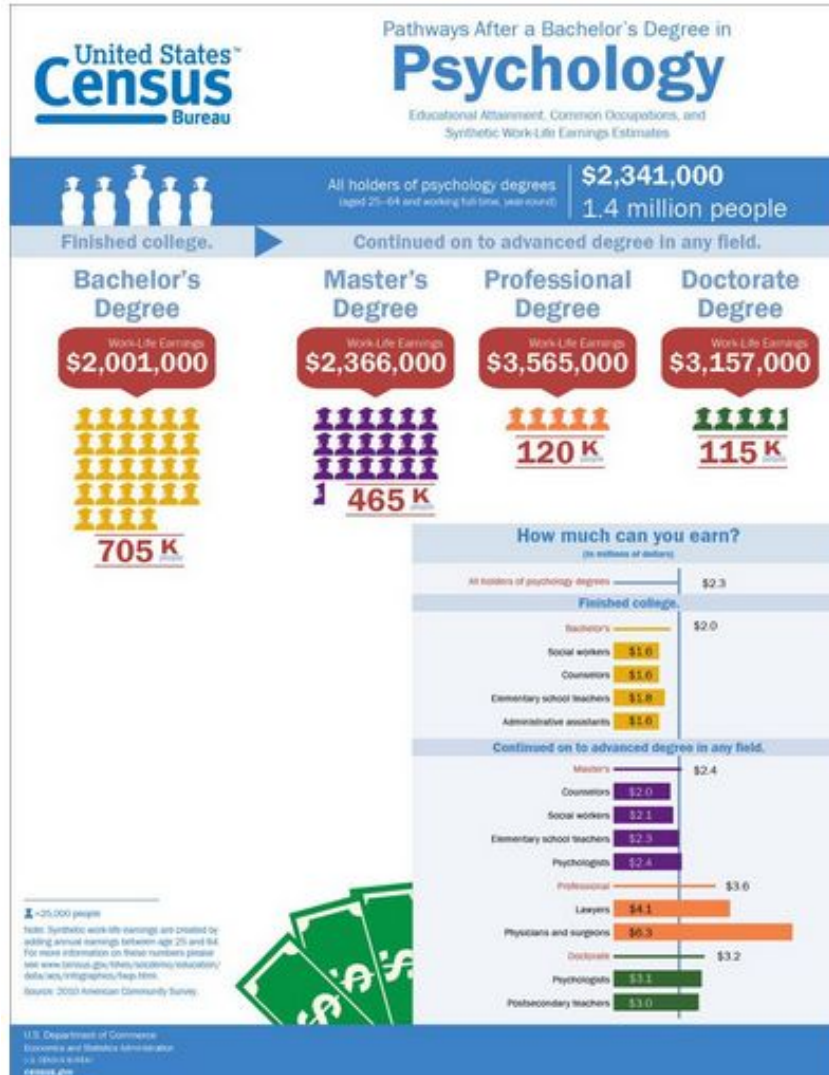

Plan: How are you going to get there?

Do your research

- Understand your career options and interests and how they align with graduate program options.
- Will taking time off make you a more competitive candidate?

Consider the best fit

- Undergraduate reputation does not equal graduate school reputation.
- Researching graduate programs is very different from researching undergraduate programs.
- Consider: how this moves you toward your desired job/career; funding options, location, accreditation, etc.)

Plan how to get there

- Allow time. There are **many** steps. Use a checklist to make sure you have covered everything in sufficient time. (Kaplan's is recommended by CAS).

What can you do to make the most of your opportunities?

- The type of career you have depends on many things. Here are a few things to think about:
 - Highest degree earned
 - Area of Psychology
 - Who you know (networking)
 - Experience
 - Career goals aligning with interests and abilities

Passion □ Path □ Plan

- Do something you enjoy and care about.
- Find your passion and your pathway – create a plan of action.

Experience

- Participate in research experiences, internships, and service.
- Join organizations and volunteer 😊
- Use this to figure out what you want *and* what you don't want in a career.
- Take time off after college to work, if you don't have clear graduate school goals yet.

Resources

- Ask counselors and advisors for advice and information about opportunities.
- Use the Internet wisely.
- Leverage the connections you made in your internships and other experiences.

Connections

- Network
- Use your recommendations.
- Be vigilant – be on the lookout for good opportunities.
