Latest from France.
The packet ship Francis 1st, at New York from Havre, brings Paris papers to the 21st ult. inclusive. The following intelligence is extracted from the N. York Commercial, American, Post, and Journal of Commerce, but chiefly from the first named journal.

Constantinople, May 20.—The following details are from a genuine letter just received. We cannot guarantee their authenticity.
News has reached us at last of the military operations of the Grand Vizier, Reschid Pacha, during the course of this month. Having despatched several corps to the environs of Varna, and menaced all the points of communication between that town and Iasiotscha, he made a general reconnaissance in person in that direction, where Gen. Roth opposed him with two divisions. Some obstinate fighting ensued, in which the Russians lost a large number of men, in killed, wounded and prisoners. Some accounts say, that quarters was given on neither side, and that Paravadi, after having been taken and retaken several times was finally destroyed entirely.

The Pacha of Nicopolis announces that the greatest misery pervades the Principality; and that the peasantry not being any longer able to comply with the requisitions for the war, have retired into the forests. It is the same thing at Bulgaria, where friends and foes fight together and lay every thing waste. The inference from these different reports is considered at Pera to be, that the second campaign will be like the first, with no decisive result. The succours brought to the capital are consumed immediately. The English Consul General Cartwright has arrived at the Dardanelles, where the Ambassador Sir Robert Gordon is momentarily expected.

WALLACHIA.—From the Frontiers, May 25th.—The executive divan has received orders to prepare provisions for 90,000 men. Two hundred labourers are at work on the bridge of boats at Kallarasch; but it will not be finished for some time; because 30 pontoons have been carried away and destroyed by the late inundation.—Nuremberg Courier.

LEGHORN, May 28th.—We learn from Alexandria, that a part of the Egyptian troops, destined to reinforce the Turkish army in Asia on its march; but the remainder, which forms the strongest part, and which had the same destination, has received counter orders, and will embark to rejoin the Grand Seigneur's army in Europe.—This change of destination is ascribed to the influence of a European power. Augsburg Gazette.

IONIAN ISLANDS, CORFU, 25th May.—Missolonghi and Anatolia are in possession of the Greek troops; this result was accomplished on the 17th, by capitulation, and without loss. The first proposal was made by the Greeks, which the garrison at first rejected, and afterwards accepted.

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EDITORIAL NOTICES
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VERY LATE AND IMPORTANT FROM EUROPE.

The packet ship... The news, particularly from the seat of war, is of great interest. From the New York papers we make the following extracts.

Constantinople was healthy, but maladies were said to have broken out in the fleet and at Shoumla. The government of Morocco had rejected the proposals and mediation of Austria.

The German papers state that the object of Mr. Fenton's going to Shoumla was to propose peace with the Turks, though but faint hopes are entertained of his being listened to.

Intelligence from Mayence states that the negotiations between Prussia and the Low Countries in relation to the free navigation of the Rhine had been closed, the King of Prussia having ratified the proposals made by the King of the Netherlands.

It is not generally known that the Russian General Diebitzsch is under fifty years of age, a German by birth, a soldier by fortune, and son in law of the famous Barclay de Tolly.

Athens has fallen into the hands of the Greeks by capitulation. The arrival of the Ambassadors at Constantinople spread general joy.

The London Standard of the 17th ult. says, that the King of Prussia had appointed an extraordinary Ambassador to proceed immediately to Constantinople, to assist the other Ambassadors in bringing about a peace in the east.

FALL OF SILISTRIA.

The Russian troops are marching on 'conquering and to conquer.' An early consequence of the defeat of the Grand Vizier has been the fall of the important fortress of Silistria, which so completely withstood the skill of the Muscovite during the last campaign.

The Princess of Leuchtenburgh, betrothed to Don Pedro, was about to embark at Ostend for Brazil. Gen. Lafayette was enjoying good health. He left Paris on the 20th July, on a tour to Avergne his native department.

Mr. Brown would leave France in the packet of the 10th August, as Mrs. Brown's health had much improved.

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The capture of Silistria was transmitted by telegraph from Strasbourg to Paris on Friday night. The Augsburg Gazette, which reached us yesterday, contains the following Bulletin, dated Bucharest, July 2, received by express.

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The surrender of this fortress is an event of high importance, as it will hasten and render almost certain the fall of Giurgevo and Rudschuck. Thus, with the exception of Widdin, against which undoubtedly fresh efforts will be successively directed, the whole line of the Danube is secured to the Russians as the basis of their future operations, and the war will, as it were, cease to have Bulgaria for its theatre.

CONSTANTINOPLE.

Under the protection of their respective Ambassadors. The Sultan continues to employ the most professed tranquillity, but in the Turkish capital, and the Sultan's presence in his capital, which made him the greatest respect both of his own countrymen and of foreigners.

From this time the war must take a very decisive character. The Russian reserves have been put in motion to join the active columns, and nothing can prevent the passage of the Balkan if it has been resolved at Petersburg.

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BUCHAREST, 26th JUNE.

The corps de reserve, commanded by Gen. Tolstoi, have received orders to rejoin the army on the Danube. It is composed of thirty thousand men. Gen. Diebitzsch is preparing to pass the Balkan.

From Kallarach the Grand Vizier has sent two Turkish officers to Gen. Diebitzsch to propose an armistice. It is doubtful whether this will be accepted.

Accounts from Semlin state that the Russians have failed in their attempt to cross the Danube in some places.

ENGLAND. The Ministry.—The King is said to regret having given his assent to the measure of Catholic emancipation, and at a late levee treated the Duke of Norfolk and Lord JERVIS as marks of neglect, not even speaking when under the necessity of passing close to them.

It makes an agreeable beverage, and by adding a small quantity of soda and 50 grains of tartaric acid to half a pint, makes a tonic, which is highly recommended in all complaints.

**SWEARINGEN CONVICTED.**

A slip from the Cumberland Advertiser, under date of 22d inst. says:—"The trial of George Swearingen, for the murder of his own wife, in this county, on the 8th day of September last, was closed this day at 4 o'clock, P. M. after a patient and laborious session of three weeks. The Jury retired to their room about ten minutes, when it returned into court and rendered a verdict of 'Guilty of Murder in the first degree.'
