


Featuring internationally distinguished artist Roberto Díaz

A violist of international reputation, Roberto Díaz holds the prestigious position of president and CEO of the Curtis Institute of Music. He follows in the footsteps of renowned soloist/directors such as Rudolf Serkin, Gary Graffman, Efrem Zimbalist and Josef Hofmann. As a professor of viola at Curtis and former principal violist of the Philadelphia Orchestra, Díaz has already had a significant impact on American musical life and will continue to do so in his dual roles as performer and educator.

Symphony, Netherlands Philharmonic, Gulbenkian Orchestra, Saarbrücken Radio Orchestra and the Orquesta Simón Bolivar, among many others. He has collaborated with conductors such as Roberto Abbado, Rafael Frühbeck de Burgos, Riccardo Chailly, Charles Dutoit, Christopher Hogwood, Yakov Kreizberg, Peter Oundjian, Michael TilsonThomas, Gilbert Varga, Hugh Wolff and David Zinman. In addition to Penderecki, Díaz has also worked with important 20th- and 21st-century composers, including Edison

Sierra and Ricardo Lorenz, whose viola October 2010.

Díaz has several recordings on the Naxos label, including an April 2010 release of

Brahms sonatas with Jeremy Denk and a 2006 recording of viola transcriptions by William Primrose, which was nominated for a Grammy Award. Díaz's other releases include a live recording of Jacob Druckman's Viola Concerto with the Philadelphia Orchestra conducted by Wolfgang Sawallisch (New World Records, 2001), works by Henri Vieuxtemps for viola and piano (Naxos, 2004), and Jonathan Leshnoff's Double Concerto with Michael Stern, violinist Charles Wetherbee, and the Iris Chamber Orchestra.

An active chamber musician, Díaz has performed with artists such as the Emerson and Tokyo string quartets, Emanuel Ax, Yefim Bronfman, Christoph Eschenbach, Yo-Yo Ma, Mr. Sawallisch, and Isaac Stern. His festival appearances include Marlboro, Mostly Mozart at Lincoln Center, Spoleto, Kuhmo and

Verbier, among many others. As a member of the Díaz Trio, with violinist Andrés Cárdenes and cellist Andrés Díaz, he has performed throughout the United States, Canada, Europe, Mexico and Chile.

In addition to his decade-long tenure as principal violist of the Philadelphia Orchestra, Díaz was principal violist of the National Symphony under Mstislav Rostropovich, a member of the Boston Symphony under Seiji Ozawa and a member of the Minnesota Orchestra under Sir Neville Marriner.

Some of Díaz's recent and upcoming performances include the Kansas City Symphony with Michael Stern, Fort Worth Symphony with Miguel Harth-Bedoya, Orquesta Sinfónica del Principado de Asturias with Krzysztof Penderecki, Orquesta Sinfónica Nacional de Mexico with Carlos Miguel Prieto, Orquesta Simfónica de Barcelona with James Judd, São Paulo Symphony Orchestra with Gabor Ötvös and the Bilbao Symphony with Juanjo Mena. Recent and upcoming recital performances include appearances at the Gardner Museum in Boston, Library of Congress in Washington, D.C., Cleveland Institute of Music, University of Indiana at Bloomington, the Detroit Chamber Music Society and the Festival Cultural de Mayo in Guadalajara. Díaz has also performed with the National Symphony, Boston Pops, New World

The Children's Concert features In the Beginning, a Native American legend from the Tlingit Tribe of the Northwest Coast. The story of Raven and Ganook comes from the Alaskan Native culture of the Tlingit Tribe. This story centers on how Raven tricks Ganook and brings water to the earth people. The narration is interspersed with orchestral sections: The Soft Darkness, Raven Arrives, The Ghosts, The Fish, Calypso, The Magic Spring, Raven's Waltz, Storytelling by the Fire, Bossa Nova, Raven's Escape, The Wobbly Flight and The Creation of the Crooked Rivers (composed in 2007).

Dominic Armstrong is a tenor on the rise. A graduate of both The Curtis Institute and The Juilliard School, Armstrong has performed a vast range of operas in many styles. From the early music of Monteverdi and Cavalli, to the contemporary works of Argento, Britten and Corigliano, to the standards of Mozart, Donizetti and Puccini, and even the musical theatre of Bernstein and Loesser, Armstrong has continued to successfully prove his vocal versatility.

Armstrong has performed with The Opera Company of Philadelphia, The Wexford Festival, Deutsche Oper Berlin, Opera Regio Torino, Opera Theatre St. Louis, Lorin Maazel's Castleton Festival and The Wolf Trap Opera as a member of the Filene Young Artists. He has also been seen

in concert with the Kansas City Symphony, the National Symphony Orchestra, the Chautauqua Youth Orchestra, the Curtis Orchestra, the University of Missouri Orchestra and the Metropolitan Opera Orchestra as a Grand Finalist in the 2008 National Council Auditions

As comfortable in art song as he is in opera, Armstrong has performed many recitals in a variety of venues, including as a member of the Steans Institute with the Ravinia Festival, and as a guest recitalist for Opera Theatre of St. Louis, NATS Midwest Region, and the French Embassy in Washington, D.C., where he also recently appeared in recital with pianist Steven Blier. He has also appeared in art song masterclasses with tenor Matthew Polenzani,

director Frank Corsaro (as a participant in Marilyn Horne's The Song Continues ... series) and recently participated in a masterclass series with baritone Roberto de Candia in Treviso, Italy.

In the 2009-10 season, Armstrong made his European debuts with the Wexford Opera Festival, as well as Deutsche Opera Berlin and Opera Regio in Torino, Italy, the latter houses as a member of The Opera Foundation. In the fall 2010, Armstrong

made his debut with New York City Opera in the New York premiere of Leonard Bernstein's rarely seen opera A Quiet Place.

Since its formation in 1991, the Capitol Quartet has performed regularly at major concert venues throughout the United States, earning wide acclaim for the ensemble's musical versatility and innovative style. The Quartet's February 2007 performance of the Philip Glass "Concerto for Saxophone Quartet and Orchestra" with Marin Alsop and the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra was lauded in The Baltimore Sun for "... superb technical control, ... seamless blend, and exceptional wealth of character in their phrasing."

The Capitol Quartet has been featured with the Cincinnati Pops, Indianapolis Symphony, Guatemala National Symphony, Rochester Philharmonic, Baltimore Symphony, the San Antonio Symphony, Long Beach Symphony, Virginia Symphony, Springfield (MO) Symphony, Roanoke Symphony, Imperial Symphony (Fl), Bay-Atlantic Symphony, Grand Rapids Symphony, the U.S. Air Force Heritage of America Band, the U.S. Continental Army Band and many other symphonies across the country.
