"In my current work, I try to evoke images that will linger in a person's memory as a sort of feeling or even a dreamy location, if you will," Austin said. "I hope my images remind viewers of some place or circumstance that they have even

experienced before, therefore making my work all that more vivid and memo-rable."

Marian Bingham, or Bing as she is professionally known, also infuses her paintings and photographs with familiar imagery that is timeless and unforgettable. Bing's "Dream Horse Series" focuses on horses, animals that are as present in ancient cave drawings and hieroglyphics as they are in Renaissance and Baroque paintings and modern artwork. Her works often depict faded moments of observation of horses taken from her childhood, when she often rode horses out in her home in California.

"The close association of the horse in the development of man—in the very earliest of art, in myths and literature, and as part of his dreams and literature—forms my connection with them," Bing said.

'Science, Religion and Intelligent Design'

Dr. Richard Raesly, professor of biology at FSU, and Rev. Bill Pinches, pastor of the Frostburg Presbyterian Church, will explore the controversial subject "Science, Religion & Intelligent Design" at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 12, in the FSU Compton Science Center, room 226.

The all-campus program is free and open to the public. It is sponsored by United Campus Ministry.

Raesly has taught biology at FSU since 1989. His research interests and areas of expertise include ecology and evolution of introduced species, evolution and systematics of freshwater fish, biology of endangered species and stream ecology. Raesly's research has been funded by several granting agencies, such as the Environmental Protection Agency, National Park Service, The Nature Conservancy, Maryland Department of Natural Resources, Soviet Academy of Sciences and National Geographic Society. His work has also been published in many peer-reviewed journals, including "Transactions of the American Fisheries Society," "American Midland Naturalist" and others. Raesly received his B.S. in biology from Albright College, Master of Wildlife

Biology from FSU and Ph.D. in Ecology from Penn State University.

Pinches has been pastor of the Frostburg Presbyterian Church for three years and is chair of the Committee on Preparation for the Ministry of Baltimore Presbytery. He also serves as a member of the FSU United Campus Ministry Board of Directors. He received his B.A. in religion from Bates College in Lewiston, Maine and both his Master of Divinity and Master of Theology from Princeton Theological Seminary.

FSU's two performance series, the CES Jazz Club sponsored by Kauffman Music and the Main Stage series, provide an opportunity to enjoy art, music and theater from throughout the world in the scenic setting of Western Maryland. With affordable admission prices and local, easy-access venues, FSU's Cultural Events Series makes it easy for performing arts fans to see top-quality shows without having to go the distance.

The Main Stage Series gets the season off to an explosive start with Neil Berg's "100 Years of Broadway" at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, Sept. 21, in FSU's Performing Arts Center Pealer Recital Hall. This spectacular medley recreates some of the biggest moments from the best known Broadway musical shows of the century, including "The Phantom of the Opera," "Les Miserables" and "Jekyll and Hyde." Supported by an all-star New York band, the show features revivals of Broadway classics as well as numbers from Broadway's newest hit shows being performed by the stars straight from Broadway.

In late September, don't miss FSU's first Appalachian Festival celebrating the artistic and musical traditions of Western Maryland's region! Activities include performances and workshops of old-time music, bluegrass, gospel, shape-note singing and more. Exhibitions and demonstrations of traditional arts such as rug-making, quilting, basketry, spinning, chair-caning, soapmaking and folk medicinal practices run throughout the day Saturday, Sept. 23, in the Upper Quad area on campus. Local vendors will also offer regional foods ranging from buckwheat pancakes and maple syrup to sausage and sauerkraut. A special pancake breakfast prepared by the Frostburg Rotary Club will be held 7 a.m.-noon in the St. Michael Church Cafeteria.

The festival is capped off with an evening celebration performance featuring Liz Carroll, John Doyle, Dirk Powell and Bruce Molskey at 7:30 p.m. Saturday in the Performing Arts Center. Chicago-born Carroll won the Senior All-Ireland Fiddle Championship at age 18 and has been awarded a National Endowment for the Arts National Heritage Fellowship. Dublin-born Doyle is an accomplished musician whose work is heard on radio, television and film, as well as in concert. This daring and inventive duo will share the stage - and their musical roots – with two talented Appalachian musicians, Bruce Molsky, a fiddler, guitarist, banjoist and singer; and critically acclaimed banjoist and fiddler Dirk Powell.



FSU Gains Middle States Reaccreditation

FSU's accreditation with the Middle States Commission on Higher Education was reaffirmed unconditionally in June.

Reaccreditation means that FSU continues to meet the eligibility requirements put in place by the Commission on Higher Education in its Characteristics of Excellence.

In addition, FSU was commended for the quality of its self-study report.

This reaffirmation is the culmination of an exhaustive two-year self-study process that involved nearly 90 faculty, staff members and students, as well as a visit from a Middle States evaluation team in April.

The evaluation team in particular noted that since the last time FSU's accreditation was reaffirmed in 1996, the University has evolved from a comprehensive college to a regional university.

As part of the self-study, a special emphasis was placed on the University's relationship with and commitment to its community, in particular its cultural, community service and economic development efforts.

That community outreach was one of the areas the evaluation team found commendable, in addition to the University's support systems for students, its innovative general education and online programs and its ability to enroll a diverse student body.

• Tutors can help students brainstorm, help them with high-order concerns like thesis, focus, organization, and development, or work with them at the sentence level as well as teach them how to proofread.

• Tutors can help students understand written assignments and/or professors' comments on returned papers.

• The pass rate for tutored students in composition courses in the fall of 2005 was higher across the board than for non-tutored students.

Points of Pride

To date, more than \$213,000 has been raised through the FSU Foundation Inc. for the *Catherine R. Gira Campus to Community Fund*, which will support student leadership programs, alumni connections, community service, internships and study abroad.

FSU's former president established the scholarship because of her belief that that student education is incomplete if it is limited only to classroom learning.

There were two primary fund-raising events. The first, in April, was held at the Hidden Waters home of the University System of Maryland Chancellor, Dr. William E. Kirwan. The second, held in May, was the Crystal Gala, sponsored by the Allegany County Chamber of Commerce and The Greater Cumberland Committee. More than 150 attended the Gala, and about 250 attended the Hidden Waters event.

The Gira Fund is designed to support students who demonstrate an entrepreneurial spirit, critical thinking skills and a determination to be successful. The activities it supports will nurture students who are prepared for the workplace in an increasingly competitive, global economy. Unlike many scholarships, the Gira Fund will assist students with expenses that often make these opportunities otherwise unattainable, such as transportation and housing.


The endowment is now large enough that annual awards are expected to exceed \$8,000.

FSU's Counseling Center was evaluated by IACS against high standards of counseling practice and was found to offer competent and reliable professional services to its clientele. IACS Approval is also dependent upon evidence of continuing professional development, as well as demonstration of excellence of counseling performance.


